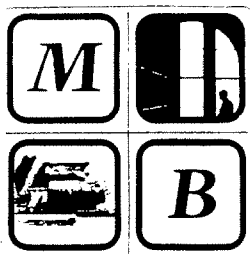

IN THIS ISSUE

On October 29, 1982 the Mennonite Brethren Historical Society of Canada sponsored a special "appreciation evening" remembering the service ministry of Brother Cornelius A. DeFehr of Winnipeg. Three presentations were given at this event. Two are reproduced, in shorter edited versions, in this newsletter. The third, presented by Dr. J.B. Toews of Fresno, will appear in a subsequent issue.

The first article is a brief biography of C.A. DeFehr written by his oldest son, Abe C. DeFehr. This is followed by an account of DeFehr's business career written by his grandson, Dr. B.B. Fast.

A BRIEF BIOGRAPHY OF C.A. DEFEHR

Our father, Cornelius A. DeFehr, was born on October 6, 1881 in the village of Einlage, South Russia, founded in 1788-89 by 462 families including his grandfather, Cornelius Benjamin DeFehr. His parents were Abraham and Helen (Peters) DeFehr. When father was seven, the family moved to Petrowka and it was here that he received his education at a Russian school. More important, however, were the bible studies conducted for the young people by Rev. Jakob Reimer and Abram Wall. It was under this influence that our father committed himself to the grace of our Lord Jesus, and upon personal testimony was baptized and received into the Mennonite Brethren Church at Petrowka. Here too, dad met our mother Elizabeth Dyck, the daughter of Wilhelm I. Dyck. Their bond of love and commitment was sealed on November 13, 1903.

Soon thereafter our parents moved to Millerowo, where in the course of six years, six children were born. Of the four sons and daughters, one son and one daughter died at an early age.

In Millerowo, our father participated in a business partnership with his brother-in-law Rev. Cornelius Martens and his father-in-law Bishop Wilhelm I. Dyck. From a tiny one-man shop, he developed one of those prosperous manufacturing industries for which the Mennonites were well known by the time of the first world war. As busy as he was in running the factory, he always found time to be engaged in community work, the church, school and hospital.

As with many others, the war of 1914 was the beginning of sad and difficult times. The 1918 communist revolution in Russia added to the suffering of its people. This chapter in Mennonite History is familiar to many of us.

Like so many entrepreneurs, the DeFehr's lost everything in the upheavals of the revolution. However, thanks to God, we were most fortunate to escape with our lives one night and land with a group of other refugees, relatives and friends weeks later in a Mennonite village in the Kuban area of the Caucasus. Here we settled down as refugees for a period of six years. Besides Dad's efforts to provide for the family during these years of hardship and persecution, it also provided him with a special opportunity for service. For our father it was the beginning of a deeply involved and active church life within the Mennonite community. He loved the brotherhood and gave his time in serving it.

As for thousands of Mennonites, the opportunity arose to emigrate to Canada and on September 11, 1925 our family arrived in this land of new promises. A few days later we arrived in Gnadenthal, Manitoba, where father and mother stayed for the winter. Our sister Elizabeth with her husband B.B. Fast and son Bernie, together with my brother Cornelius and I left for Gretna, Manitoba to attend the Mennonite Collegiate Institute. William attended the local public school in Gnadenthal.

In the meantime our father with the help of a Mennonite friend and a businessman in Hamburg, started a small scale importing business. This was the foundation of our family business operating under the name of C.A. DeFehr and Sons. Eventually the three sons and son-in-law joined the business.

It was no small task to transplant language, culture, vocation and start a new business with borrowed funds. However, the conviction that God is with us in the pilgrimage of life gave strength to persevere. In time the fruits of father's efforts became obvious. As a family we are grateful for this but more so in knowing that our father stands as "one among many" who served the Lord in his home church, in various positions at the Conference level, colleges and schools, served under the Mennonite Central Committee at home and abroad, and fulfilled his calling as deacon by being a friend and helper to many. For us as a family, father C.A. DeFehr was a Christian trailblazer, who combined faith with practice. His example made it easier in choosing right when the call of Jesus beckoned in our hearts.

His greatest love, however, at least so it seemed, were the inter-Mennonite programs in immigration, relief and resettlement, for which he served as

treasurer and which led to special assignments in Paraguay in the post-World-War II movement of refugees. He was instrumental in facilitating the founding of Mennonite Central Committee (Canada) in 1963. Fortunately, for future generations, he has shared himself in an autobiographical work entitled Memo-ries of My Life.

As a family we were privileged to celebrate with our parents their silver, golden, diamond and iron wedding anniversaries. Mother went to be with the Lord on March 23, 1972 and Father on February 11, 1979.

THE BUSINESS CAREER OF C.A. DEFEHR

The Mennonites of southern Russia were mainly an agricultural community, so it was unusual for my grandfather to have chosen a business career. He was undoubtedly influenced by the example of his father who pursued a vocation of farmer and carpenter in Kronsweide. The workshop on the farm however held a stronger fascination for him than did farm labour. In his "Werkstube" his father built furniture and wagons, later he also built houses and windmills. Much time was spent in the Werkstube and in his book he says "I recall being spanked more than once for losing or ruining my father's tools." He goes on to say that "already as a child it became my ambition to enter business."

In 1904, at the age of 23 with a young wife and child, he chose to settle in Millerovo, 250 miles to the east and some 200 miles north of Rostov. It was a railroad centre with a population of 10,000, mostly Russians surrounded by German-Lutheran colonies. Beginning in 1903 a number of Mennonites, later referred to as the "Millerova Geschaefstgruppe" (business group), had begun to develop this area industrially. In the next decade they built four mills, one factory, three implement repair businesses and one implement dealership on what came to be known as the "Deutsche Strasse".

My grandfather, in partnership with his brother-in-law, Cornelius Martens, opened up a workshop and an implement dealership on a two acre site, on which he also built a residential duplex. Five years later his father-in-law, W.I. Dyck, became a shareholder in the business which carried the name Martens, DeFehr and Dyck. The initial capital investment was a modest 2,500 rubles. He has said he had "good health, courage and perseverance, as well as some skills in wood and metal work that he had learned from his father."

Their market was in the Don River area, mainly among Cossacks and Russians with whom they established good relationships. However, they lacked sufficient credit for further development and were restricted to a loan of 1,000 rubles at the regional bank. At this time the Bank of Commerce opened up a new branch with a young and energetic man as its manager. When my grandfather approached him he discovered that the manager already had information about their business and was willing to offer them financial support. My grandfather boldly asked for a loan of 20,000 rubles and with this "considerable sum" they were able to purchase machines and equipment for the manufacture of a variety of machinery. They were successful with drills and seeding machines. By the third year they had added threshing machines to their production. They then began the manufacture of hydraulic presses for the processing

of flax and sunflower seeds. Their manufactured products were practical, of good quality and sales were good. A further asset were the high tariffs against imported equipment that existed at the time.

Since it was necessary to purchase motors from Germany, these were acquired from the Heinrich Schuett import firm in Hamburg, whose son Hermann visited them in Russia frequently. Thus an important business association and friendship was established which was to be very important to him later in his life.

At the end of five years they had 50 employees. Just prior to the Great War, they had 100 to 120. The business volume was approximately one million rubles.

The war years were prosperous years. Because the business received several large orders from the Defense Ministry, the partners and all the workers were exempt from military service. Their main order was for transmission systems to be used in other factories as well as mobile army kitchens.

At the outbreak of the war, because of anti-German feeling, they were advised that they were to be denied bank credits. At this time they owed some 200,000 rubles. Soon their business returned to normal and they were in a position to repay the bank debts in the prescribed time. Some time later the bank told him that the credits would again be available but now they were in a position to advise them that henceforth they would try to get along without bank credits.

During the post-war revolutionary period, December 1919, Millerovo, became an area of conflict between the Reds (Revolutionary Forces) and the Whites (The Tsarist Army). On short notice it was necessary for the family to leave by railway car with some personal belongings and 30,000 rubles. Expecting that things would eventually return to normal, they had secreted some expensive tools as well as personal belongings under false floors in the factory. Their next destination was Velikoknyazheskoye, in the Kuban district of the Caucasus, which was a Mennonite colony less affected by revolutionary conflict. The Soviets had devalued the money and had expropriated and redistributed agricultural land so that grandfather and his brother turned to farming. The crops proved to be above expectations. He then began a small business in partnership with Johann Derksen, sending flour in four pound boxes to the Baptists in Moscow in exchange for cloth. Their business grew until they were able to ship a whole car load of flour at one time. About this time it was rumored that the Reds would requisition all the grain after harvest. In order to prevent this, he took his freshly threshed grain to the mill every day, had it processed into milled flour, took it back home before daybreak and hid it. "The result was that his family did not have any grain to turn in. They had enough food, and they were in a position to help others that were starving."

In 1923 Lenin proclaimed a New Economic Policy with which trade and commerce were to be activated. Former owners of businesses and factories were encouraged to begin operations again under contract. Grandfather made plans to return to Millerovo, when, on a business trip to Rostov, he read a news-

paper report about the Martens, DeFehr and Dyck implement factory now under Communist government. While moving some heavy machinery it had fallen through the false floor and the secreted machinery and personal belongings of the former owners were discovered. The newspaper reports were inflammatory and "hateful". In January of 1925 he attended the last General Conference of Mennonites of Russia in Moscow and concluded that the political and economic situation held no future for the Mennonite people and so he made plans to emigrate.

Thus at the age of 38 he left a successful and prosperous manufacturing concern that he had built in 15 years. Before leaving he decided to visit Millerovo for a final farewell. The new manager, a former laborer who had affiliated himself with the Communist cause, was reluctant to grant him the request stating that he could assume no responsibility for his safety. Grandfather replied that he was willing to do so at his own risk. When his former employees saw him, they left their tasks and came to express their regrets that he was planning to leave the country, thus demonstrating their respect and friendship.

His emigration was delayed by "the dreaded eye disease of trachoma", for which he required treatment in Russia and later Germany. However, during his stay in Hamburg, he had opportunity to visit his business friend Herman Schuett and to discuss with him his future in Canada. The latter reassured him about his support and financial credits.

On arrival in Canada they located in Plum Coulee, Manitoba. After enrolling his older sons and son-in-law at the MCI in Gretna, he sought to begin anew in business. He purchased a Model T Ford half ton truck and took to the road. He visited German and Russian speaking businessmen, displayed the literature on products such as separators and hardware, convinced them of their quality and their moderate price, and received orders which he wrote down in German and forwarded to his friend Schuett in Hamburg. On delivery of the products he was then able to make payment.

In the spring of 1926 he moved to Winnipeg and established the firm, Standard Importing and Sales at 159 Princess Street, near other implement and hardware dealers such as John Deere, Massey Harris, etc. Initially this firm was in partnership with Mr. Victor Guenther. This was dissolved in 1927.

They acquired a dealership for a Standard Separator Company, and sold hardware products such as tools, cutlery, meat choppers, waffle irons, shaving equipment and guitars. Later items such as sewing machines, plow shares, binder twine and washing machines were added. A further important step was the introduction of the Arfie seeder plow. This European plow was an innovation in Canada and proved to be a popular piece of farm machinery. Sales promotions were by a limited amount of advertising and direct mailings, but mainly by extensive trips in the three prairie provinces. One by one the family joined the firm, Abe in 1930, Cornelius in 1933 (who later took on the Edmonton Branch), William in 1934, and my father, a former schoolteacher, in 1938. All of them made extensive sales trips throughout Western Canada. Cost control was important. It is documented that my Uncle Abe, in three weeks of traveling had a total of \$17.10 in travel expenses. The sales however improved greatly in volume between the years of 1926 and 1929.

The initial success was affected by the Depression and aggravated by the succession of droughts in Saskatchewan. Having largely depended on selling imported products, increased government tariffs resulted in a loss of competitive margin and this was aggravated by a dollar exchange problem.

But sales improved and the company prospered. Initially the products sold were of German manufacture, since they believed these to be of a superior quality. In addition to the Standard cream separator, they added the Westfalia and Domo cream separators from Germany and Sweden, respectively. Cream separators at this time were as much a household requirement on a farm as in later years washing machines and refrigerators. By 1937, the company had diversified their sales product to include washing machines manufactured by Gilsons of Guelph, Ontario, and coal and wood ranges from Quebec and U.S.A.

However, they had not anticipated World War II. Imports, except from Sweden, were completely cut off resulting in an almost total depression for the DeFehr Company in contrast to the general prosperity that occurred in the Western economy during those years.

Prior to the war, the DeFehrs had purchased a 320 acre farm at Niverville and another smaller one at Springstein. As business activity decreased, idleness was replaced by activity on the farm. All who were able were recruited to assist in farm production. The business survived and in the post-war period the business diversified to include Canadian manufactured furnaces, refrigerators, washing machines, kitchen ranges, oak heaters as well as farm equipment, binder twine and paint. By 1948 the firm no longer considered itself an importer but a factory distributor.

The prosperity of the firm as well as the support of the family made it possible for my grandfather to devote more and more of his time to the church and the Mennonite community. In 1947 he undertook a term of service in Paraguay. On his return in 1950, he chose the opportunity of the 25th anniversary to reorganize the informal partnership into a corporation with five equal shareholders under the name of C.A. DeFehr and Sons Limited. He describes this as "a good move as it distributed the responsibility among the five of us, which resulted in equal opportunity and equal interest."

He continued to hold the position of President and kept in touch with the family business where his office and desk were always waiting for him. He acted more and more in a consultative role and as an advisor to his sons and grandsons who had joined the firm. In 1963, he relinquished all ownership and DeFehr's became a four man partnership. He continued to hold the office of President. I might add that he also continued to have the largest office with its beautiful, comfortable red chair and beautiful wooden carved statue.

But he continued to consider himself a businessman. This is illustrated in an anecdote that I have had occasion to repeat in the past. In 1967 he was anxious to attend the Mennonite World Congress in Amsterdam. He was now getting on in years and sought my advice about traveling. I thought that he was well enough to do so but that he should travel with a companion. He arranged to go with Mr. Frank Friesen of Morden who was then in good health. Perhaps his intuitive good sense prompted him to remark to me casually, "If Mr. Friesen cannot go, maybe you will," and with little thought agreed. Then Mr. Friesen broke his hip ten days before their planned departure. I was vacationing at Victoria Beach with my family and received a telephone call from my grandfather reminding me of my promise to travel with him. This we arranged on short notice. It proved to be an enjoyable and an enriching experience for both of us. He met many old friends and associates. It had

become his custom to bring home some gift or memento for his wife. In Amsterdam, in the duty-free shop, he found a nice, I think modestly expensive piece of costume jewellery which he referred to as a brooch. When he arrived in Montreal, he had lost his sales slip and the customs officers seemed particularly curious about this item. I can only imagine that they were concerned about its value since he seemed to be a man of means and was returning from Amsterdam, then the diamond capital of the world. Among other questions, the customs officer asked my grandfather what he did. His reply was, "I am an importer." This, at a time when I had considered him to be long retired from business. The office fortunately seemed satisfied and we were able to make our flight connection from Montreal to Winnipeg.

I would like however to conclude by enumerating some of the qualities that I think made him a successful businessman:

1. "Entrepreneur", (one who undertakes an enterprise) and "shrewdness" (astute). Some of this might be described as having "Mutterwitz". In spite of a limited education and training, he was able to initiate business opportunities, pursue others when they presented themselves and adjust to changed circumstances.
2. Honesty and integrity in all of his business dealings. This provided support, both moral and financial, when it was needed. He reciprocated in kind and was able to assist former business associates in Germany in the immediate post-war period with care packages, etc.
3. Family partnership. He valued this association and although he referred to them as "meine Jungens", he treated them as equals. Business decisions were made on the basis of consensus. My father joined the firm later, and though he had less business experience was accepted as a business equal. Indeed my father and grandfather had a special relationship. Someone recently kindly referred to my father as a "true Christian gentleman". His quiet and diplomatic manner assisted in resolving family difficulties and disputes when such arose. Grandfather particularly sorrowed the loss of a true friend and supporter when my father died in 1963.
4. Relationship with his employees was one of respect and fairness. They were part of his extended family and were all included in anniversary celebrations, picnics, etc. He knew their families as he knew his own. I have been unable to define this role but it was something like the village squire or Seigneur in olden days and in the best sense. In current times it is, perhaps, exemplified by the productivity and innovative success of the Japanese post-war economy where a similar somewhat paternal relationship exists between employer and employee.
5. A man of distinction. He dressed well and had a presence about himself that we might now refer to as "class". He was courteous and thoughtful, remembered occasions and the formalities that went with them.

6. Good temper, but I would say lacking in humor. I never recall him as having lost his temper. His criticisms were limited to "bist mir ein schoener Junge" when someone did something like break a window. To my knowledge he never told a funny story but often used well-known maxims such as "Morgen Stund ist goldene Stund" or "der Faule tragt sich zu Tode", and others.
7. A firm belief in prayer and God's guidance. On many occasions I heard him use the expression that "Gott ist gut zu uns". In my youthful callousness, in what were better times, I thought that he considered it a just reward for being "fromm" and following the German-Mennonite work ethic. It is apparent, however, that in good as well as in difficult times, he pursued prayer and felt God's guidance in a personal way and in all of his activities. This was illustrated particularly by the seemingly unfortunate circumstances that led to the loss of his business in Russia which was rewarded by the great fortune of emigrating to Canada.
8. He enjoyed himself. He enjoyed company, business as well as Church and Mennonite community workers and he included his whole family in the social events. As a result it was my fortune in my youth to meet such prominent leaders as B.B. Janz, A.H. Unruh, C.F. Klassen, Orie Miller, Mr. J.B. Toews and many others.

Finally, I would like to say that I am proud to have had such a grandfather and I am grateful to the M.B. Historical Society that they should have honored him and his memory in this fashion.

Peter Letkemann of Toronto will survey the musical multi-culturalism of the two denominations and Harry Loewen of Winnipeg will concentrate on their respective creative literature. Concluding the Symposium will be a paper by Lawrence Klippenstein and Ken Reddig, both of Winnipeg, analyzing the relationships between congregations of the two groups.

The Symposium will begin Friday evening, November 4 and run through Saturday evening, November 5. The papers will be spaced to permit plenty of time for discussion of each one. The committee sponsoring this event hopes that it can be a significant time when the historic relations between these two denominations can be openly discussed.
