

# **MINUTES**

OF THE 55. CANADIAN CONFERENCE OF THE MENNONITE BRETHREN CHURCHES OF NORTH AMERICA

### PART I - DEVOTIONAL SERVICES

(All devotional services were held at the Hepburn M.B. auditorium.)

### SATURDAY 7 P. M., JULY 3, 1965, YOUTH RALLY

The program planned by the Saskatchewan Youth Committee on the theme, Faithful Service in the Light of Christ's Return opened with brother Wes. Willems leading in congregational songs.

Brother George Konrad, executive secretary of the Interim-Christian Education Committee, read II Thess. 1:3-12 and led in the opening prayer.

Brother J. Schroeder led the choir in Mendelsohn's "Thanks Be to God". The congregation was impressed with the good quality and the message of the ministry in song.

The chairman introduced the members of the Canadian Youth Committee.

Brother H. H. Dueck, secretary of the committee, introduced two projects as possibilities for service of young people

- 1) The Youth Caravan Project A group of one couple and four young people from Hillsboro may come as a pilot group to visit some Canadian churches and to introduce the project.
- $2)\ \mbox{A}$  Youth rally for 1967 or 1968 was introduced as another possibility.

The **Youth Worker** published twice a year is available to every church upon request. Brother George Konrad is the editor and 550 copies are printed now.

A brief report was given on the radio programs in the Russian language in Saskatchewan and to the people of Japan.

Walter Toews of the Nutana church conducted the massed choir in "Great is the Lord".

Brother A. H. Dueck interviewed four young people in different vocations. Alvin Pauls, a university student, emphasized the need to win people as friends in order to win them to Jesus Christ.

Ben Block, farmer, stressed the importance of being obedient to God in finding occasion to witness.

Elsie Dueck, high school student, told about her opportunities to enter into friendly discussion with students and teachers in and out of class.

Irma Voth related about her opportunities of witnessing to students and members of the staff.

Brother C. Braun, chairman of the evening, introduced Brother Dwight Wiebe, Christian Service Secretary, Hillsboro, Kansas, who gave an inspiring challenge to young and old alike on the theme:

#### A Sense of Direction for Uncertain Times

In this brief message I shall try to speak for the youth. With the youth and sometimes to the youth in our conference.

My theme is: A Sense of Direction for Uncertain Times.

Perhaps the greatest question confronting the youth today is how does the confusion of our age fit into God's time table and how do I personally fit into the picture?

For this reason the conference theme "Behold, I Come Quickly" is of great interest to us. In fact today the subject of Christ's return is no longer optional — It is essential to the meaning of life. Therefore youth today must either choose for or against, pro or con. Scientific advances, have placed this question of Christ's return on the front page of every young person's life.

The battle for the minds of youth is taking place around the world. Communists with world revolution as their method, and world control as their goal, have made giant strides of progress. Only 40 years ago, communist Russia was a discouraging example of hunger, ignorance, political chaos, defeat and failure — but today communist Russia stands as one of the leading world powers. In only 40 short years communism has risen from the ashes until today it controls 38 % of the world's population. This parade of progress at any cost is a tremendous argument in favor of communism which is confusing the minds of millions today in the non-western world.

Here at home the field of science, is marching into the living room of most North American homes as they proclaim the new success of science in the newspaper and T.V. reports. Only 5 years ago talk about man-in-space was an interesting pastime but, today it's history. Who can deny that one man walking in space for 12 minutes covering a distance from Chilliwack, B. C., to Kitchener, Ontario, has forced upon us a whole new dimension of thinking. A dimension so new, so fast and so revolutionary that we would like

to close our eyes and make believe it didn't happen or at least, that it doesn't make any difference to us earthlings down here below.

Into this kind of a setting comes our conference theme, "Behold, I Come Quickly". And now our text taken from I Chronicles 12:32 "And of the children of Issachar, which were men that had understanding of the times, to know what Israel ought to do . ." That is God's message to youth in a nutshell, do we have enough understanding of the times in which we live, so that we know what God's people ought to do now?

Are we looking to God for a sense of direction?

Do we have our hands on the plough but our eyes on the skies? How else can God's people keep in step with the times?

Or perhaps we want to believe that we have turned the corner of church history. From here on out, it's all down hill, and so we can coast on the momentum of the past. Granted, our parents have demonstrated their faith with action and they continue to challenge us with their courage and vision.

Others would have another answer. They would like to turn the volume up and play the old record album once again. This is good as far as it goes — but what sense of direction does it give us for today?

Should the Lord tarry — where will the triumphant procession of Jesus Christ move in 1975 — only 10 short years from today? Will the Mennonite Brethren youth be qualified to march, in that day — or will they be sitting in the bleachers, as spectators instead of carrying forward the banner of Jesus Christ? Could it be that the decisions that we make today, will make all the difference 10 years from now? If Christ's return is imminent, then we would want to redeem the time, today. Should the Lord tarry — we must continue to build the foundation for tomorrow's future, today.

This week I had the privilege of visiting the Pion-Era in Saskatoon. It was an inspiring experience to relive the memories of the past. However, time marches on, and there in the shadows of the past stood a row of huge impressive steam engines, ready to battle with the prairies of the past. What a thrill to see the museum pieces on display. And then to prove their worth, about a dozen steamengines began to stoke up steam and after the pressure got high enough they were able to move all of their weight and machinery around and mind you all — under their own steam — and in a final stroke of glory — the all blew their whistles in chorus at 12:00 noon. Yes, here was a museum piece at its best — all steamed up for the purpose of blowing its own whistle with no place to go.

In this kind of a setting — what does the faith of our fathers have to say to our jet age world which travels faster than the speed of sound? Very much, and it makes all the difference to the youth of today because —

First — youth wants to see God's panoramic purpose for man. It's not enough in today's world to plod along one step at the time. Youth wants to see the total picture. First, God the creator — of man and the universe. Second, Christ the redeemer, of fallen man. Third, — Believers as proclaimers of the gospel. Fourth, God's ultimate intention in eternity. Once this is clearly understood youth is ready to look at the next step.

Second — What is the Church's answer to present world needs for witness? Why after 20 centuries is the Christian Religion only 5th in size among Religions in the world today? And, why is only 6% of the world's population Christian? This means that there is only 1 Christian for every 86 Non-Christians. And to win the lost, the Christian church sends out 1 missionary for every 87,000 Non-Christians. Should we remind ourselves that in the book of Acts chapter 8 we read that "They were all scattered abroad — except the Apostles". Is this the divine strategy of witness that needs to be reconsidered today. What else will stem the tide — when today the world's population is increasing 15 times faster than the growth of the church. Where is the church's emphasis on personal witnessing? What would happen if each one would win one soul for Christ in the next 10 years.

These are not only startling statistics that should help youth to

get started in the task of the church.

Third — What is the prosperous church's answer to world poverty and its effect on our witness? How does the church proclaim the Gospel of Salvation to a world in which 10,000 die daily of starvation? Yes, today half of the world wealth is spent on 7 % of the world's population living in the U.S. and Canada. This means that we in the Christian materialistic West, enjoy 50 times as much wealth as the bottom half of the world's population. Is the British Historian Toynbee correct when he says that "If the world should choose communism, it will, because the Christian west, had so much to offer — but refused to share it." Missionary Laubuch has said: "Relief is good but it's not enough. We must bring education, medicine and technical know-how." Are we willing to do it?

Fourth — Closer to home the question of urbanization and a higher living standard confronts every young person. The pressure of the world for status, success and security is upon us. What contemporary scriptual answer do we have for this issue? In Luke chapter 10, we read that Christ sent the 70 into every city and place where he would come. This is the church's opportunity not obstacle. And who were the 70 except dedicated laymen appointed for a special assignment. Yes this was Christ's concept of Vocationalism Evangelism at its best with results that deserve our careful consideration.

In light of these world conditions it seems to me that only Christian youth have at least four basic alternatives:

One: Rejection of the sinful world around us and a withdrawl into a new system of Mennonite monastaries.

Two: Acceptance of the sinful world and its standards and practices into the church.

Three: A split level compromise which says I will live according to the word on Sunday — and as I please, the rest of the week, because you see Christianity and the secular world don't mix.

And four: Principled participation which seeks to put into practice Christ's commission that we are to be "in the world, but not of the world".

Praise God for the winds of change that are blowing within the church today. Mennonite Brethren young people are not "making time". This year more than 60 are taking part in the total task of the church. They can be found teaching missionary children in schools in Leopoldville, Congo; Sao Paulo, Brazil; or Cali, Colombia. Or perhaps in a variety of assignments in Paraguay, South America. Or may be even in the newest project in Truro, Nova Scotia, where four teachers arrived this week.

As you know in Phoenix, Arizona, the girls from Manitoba have served as Kindergarten instructors reaching 30 families. At Camp Arnes we have John Burkholder and the Don Heinrichs. And again this summer we will have 3 DVBS teachers assisting in the Home Mission Program of B. C. as well as the Youth Caravan which will visit the western States and also B. C. and emphasizing personal witnessing.

Thank God for the youth of our conference who are serving Christ through our Christian Service Program in our M. B. areas of conference interest. Here are a handful of young people who are giving one or two years of their time, their talent and their earnings which amount to \$40,000 per year toward the support of this Conference Program. A few of the additional benefits for our conference follow:

- 1) Youth with a new dimension of vocational evangelism.
- 2) A preaching of Christ in new places by youth.
- 3) Young returning workers, to the Home Churches to inspire us.
- 4) An experienced group of young people who will reconsider the call of the ministry.

Today's world requires of our youth not only a faith for the future, but also a **Christian perspective**, for here and now. For that reason we need to understand what Christ meant, when He asked his disciples to take up his cross and follow Him. Too often we have done this without asking, where this discipleship would take us.

Too often in the past we have said, yes Lord we will follow You,

we will even take our cross if necessary, as long as we can take a few extras along — like our standard of living which means so much to us. — And our American prejudices which help us feel the way we do. — And don't forget Lord that I've never been too far from home and remember sister's wedding in June and the folk's 40th Wedding Anniversary — I hope You don't think I am selfish, just because I have a few simple requests when I say that I am willing to follow You.

Have we stopped long enough to think about who is leading us, and just where Chrsit would take us?

- Never once did Christ say that the abundant life would be measured by the abundance of things.
- Never once did Christ suggest that if yo uwant to get ahead in this world, we should follow Him.
- Never once did Christ indicate that we could follow Him on any route we wanted to travel to any destination.

No — When Christ took His cross He went to Calvary. And that is the only place where cross bearers can go today. However, we have no need to be concerned, because Christ goes on ahead for all who are willing to follow.

Into this triumphant procession Christ calls youth today. The choice is ours. The destination is eternity. By the grace of God may we discern **His will** for youth, so that when He shall appear, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is.

### Sunday Morning Service — July 4, 1965

After the organ prelude and the congregational singing of "God Himself is With Us", the chairman, brother H. M. Willems welcomed the delegates and visitors to sunny and green Saskatchewan.

The choir sang "Bless the Lord O My Soul . . .". After the opening prayer, the choir rendered the song "For the Blessings of the Day".

Brother H. M. Willems read Matthew 25:1-13. In the prayer session two brethren, Ernie Dyck, Quebec, and H. H. Nickel, B. C., led the congregation in prayer.

Brother Peter Rempel, Edmonton, gave the message on the theme "Behold I Come Quickly — This Fact Attracts to a Living Saviour." He based his message on Rev. 22:7, 12, 20 and emphasized from main points in answer to the question: Why does this fact attract to a living Saviour?

- I. Because the wrongs committed cry for retribution.
- II. Because the reality of this fact fills a life with saving grace.
- III. Because of on overwhelming demonstration of his love.
- IV. Because this life will experience the fulfillment of God's purpose for it.

In the light of the imminence of Christ's return, the choir gave the imperative challenge by singing "Seek Ye the Lord".

Brother J. A. Toews, Winnipeg, now brought the second message on the theme "Behold I Come Quickly — This Fact Produces a Living Hope." (An outline of the message follows.)

#### This Fact Produces a Purifying Hope

Texts: I John 3:1-3; II Peter 3:11-14

#### Introduction:

Hope belongs to the very essence of the believer's new life in Christ. (cf. I Peter 1:3; Titus 2:13.)

The world is without any living hope, because its hopes are centered in man.

The Christian's hope is centered on Christ and His Divine intervention in history. He that came to establish His kingdom by His first advent, will come again to perfect His kingdom by His second advent.

How does this fact encourage and inspire a life of holiness?

#### I. BY THE PERSPECTIVES IT PROVIDES

- A. The Parousia involves the termination of history.
  - 1) Of general history.
  - 2) Of redemptive history.
- B. The Parousia involves the judgment of history.
  - 1) A condemnation of the sinful rule of man.
  - A vindication of the sovereign rule of God: of His Truth, His Love and His Holiness.

#### II. BY THE PROSPECTS IT PRESENTS

- A. Perfection of our Knowledge of Christ. I Cor. 13:12.
- B. Perfection of our conformity to Christ. I John 3:2; Rom. 8:29.
- C. Perfection of our Union with Christ. I Thess. 4:17; also Rev. 19:9.

### III. BY THE PREPARATION IT PRESCRIBES

- G. F. Eckman: The question is not, when will our Lord return? but how shall I behave until He does return?
  - A. The Parousia calls for a proper stewardship.
    - 1) A proper attitude to possessions. I Tim. 6:6-10.
    - A proper administration of possessions.
       I Tim. 6:17, 18. Cf. James 5:1-6.
  - B. The Parousia calls for a Progressive Sanctification.
    - Negatively: By the condemnation of a sinful culture. Cf. Rom. 12:2.
      - 2) By the demonstration of a higher ethic. Titus 2:11-14.

It is the ethic of (a) a disciple, and (b) of a pilgrim.

#### Closing Appeal:

A revival of this hope will bring a revival of holiness. May the Lord help us so to live and labor, that we may not be ashamed on the Day of His Appearing.

The final challenge of the morning was given when the choir sang "Who is on the Lord's side?" The morning service was closed with prayer.

#### Sunday Afternoon Service - July 4, 1965

After the organ prelude brother Walter Toews led the congregation in singing "Praise Him" and "All Hail the Coming Son of God". The choir sang "Praise My Soul the King of Heaven".

Brother H. H. Epp, chairman of the servcie, led in the opening prayer. The choir sang "O Be Joyful and Sing Unto the Lord."

The chairman read from Revelation 22 "Behold, I come quickly: blessed is he that keepeth the sayings of the prophecy of this book", and "Behold, I come quickly; and my reward is with me, to give every man according as his work shall be."

Cecil Roberts brought greetings from the Gideons of Canada about to have their annual convention in Saskatoon.

Brother Waldo Hiebert brought the first message on the theme:

### The Coming of the Lord Invites Us to Selfless Service

I Thess. 4, 13-18

#### Introduction:

This passage was written by Paul for young Christians in the young church in Thessalonica. While this passage is often used in

memorial services, its original intent was to fill in a doctrinal truth for young converts. It has applications for selfless service:

# I. THIS PASSAGE OFFERS A HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE TO SERVICE

We are all a part of history. Our time, however, is limited and service opportunities have the factor of uncertainty about them always. He who serves must be aware that the time to serve is now, tomorrow may be too late. All must recognize that we work with urgency. Time is rushing to an end. Servants of the Lord work with a sense of eternity.

### II. THUS PASSAGE OFFERS AN ON-GOING FELLOWSHIP

A great joy is afforded us in Christian service in that we form close ties with wonderful people, children of God. These ties shall never be broken. Although temporarily broken by death, Christians shall be re-united — and be for ever with the Lord. Service is always in context of fellowship and fellow-workers. We are assured that relationships once formed on earth shall be continued in heaven.

### III. THIS PASSAGE OFFERS A FIRM HOPE

In this time of uncertainties, Christ's sure return for His own gives to His servants a foundation upon which to build. In times when Christian work is hard, there is always the sure hope of a final consummation of a crowning glory.

The choir sang "The Lord is My Shepherd." Brother Eugene Gerbrandt brought the second message of the afternoon on the theme:

### The Coming of Christ Excites to Joyous Anticipation.

Luke 12:35-36

We are hidden, not only to prepare, but to look for our Lord. It is one thing to be ready for someone to come, it is quite another eagerly to expect and await the coming of someone.

What will the Coming of Christ mean to believers?

- I. A vital and intimate union with Christ.
- II. An eternal and personal participation with Christ.
- III. The private and heavenly habitation in the new Jerusalem.
- IV. The magnificent and ineffable vision of His face.
  - V. The reunion of loved ones.
- VI. Reward for faithfulness. Degrees of glory in heaven for the believers will depend on the cultivation of Christ-likeness here on earth.

Our Lord calls on us to wait! "Be ye yurselves like unto men that look . . ."

We are given clear signs, yet the day itself is left in suspense. His Coming is certain sometime, it is possible any time, it is imminent all the time, it is likely very soon!

The afternoon offering was held for the cause of home and foreign missions. The choir rendered the song "Let the Mountains Shout for Joy."

### Sunday Evening Service — Foreign Missions Emphasis

(July 4)

After the congregational singing the chairman, Brother J. H. Epp reminded us of the words of Jesus "It is not for you to know the times and the season" and "Occupy till I Come."

Brother C. D. Toews, recently returned from his work in Europe read II Thess. 3:1 and led in prayer. He brought greetings from the mission churches in Austria and in Germany. He emphasized the request of the brethren behind the iron curtain for intercessory prayer.

**Brother Alvin Voth** brought Christian greetings from Choco in Colombia. He read Ephesians 1:12-13.

Sister Katie Peters who is to leave for the Congo was introduced.

Sister Annie Dyck reported on the different phases of the work in Colombia, the purchase of a site at a strategic location in Cali, the literature program and the radio work. An octet served with a song.

Dr. Ferd Pauls who left Winnipeg for the Congo in 1960 to work in the mission hospitals told how they had been led by the Lord through critical and desperate situations during the Congo insurrection: The young Congolese churches had passed through great tribulation and suffering, but were living though a number of their members had died in the insurrection. He reported on 38 recent baptisms in Kajiji and told how the prayers of Christians in Africa requested strength to remain faithful. He was thankful for the intercessory prayers on behalf of missionaries and Christians in Africa.

Sister Katie Penner due to return to the Congo on the next day told how she had found assurance that the will of the Lord for her was to go to the Congo.

Brother John Enns, accompanied by Mrs. Enns sang a solo.

The chairman called upon Brother H. Thielman and brother Dr. A. A. Dick to lead in prayer especially for our missionaries.

The chairman reported that Dr. and Sister Don Konrad from Prince George have been in the Congo now for four months to enable the hospital to continue while Dr. Pauls is on leave.

The service was closed with the benediction.

#### Monday Morning (July 5)

### Conference Message - by Brother J. H. Quiring

Ezekiel 22:23-30

The prophet Ezekiel ministered to a people in exile. They had lived in the land of promise under the assumption that they were God's people and lived securely under his protection. They had not fully realized that this wall of security was crumbling while they violated God's laws and refused to listen to the voice of the prophets. Now they found themselves in the flood waters of divine judgment. Many questions were asked. The Lord came to the assistance of the prophet and gave the reasons for the exile. All this trouble had come because God had not found a man to stand in the breach before Him for the land.

No doubt these words were written as a warning to generations to come. We, too, have considered ourselves a separated people relying heavily on our position for our security. Now we have become aware of breaches in the wall which threaten judgment and reduce our feeling of security. In this situation people point an accusing finger at those who have assumed leadership. While some laud the leaders of the past, others criticize leaders of the present. We are faced with an urgent search for gap-man who will stand in the breach to stay the divine hand of jugdment. We find in our text:

# I. A CLEAR ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE EXISTENCE OF BREACHES IN THE WALL

These breaches are in the realm of doctrine and ethics. The accusation falls on princes, priests, prophets and people. There is:

- 1) An abuse and miscarriage of justice (vs. 25).
- 2) An obliteration of distinctions between the clean and the unclean (vs. 26).
- 3) False doctrinal support for sinful practices (vs. 28).
- 4) A whole-sale departure from ethical standards.
- It is apparent that the breaches have begun to appear in our walls, and we are getting concerned about the consequences.

### II. AN EARNEST CALL FOR MEN OF EXCELLENCE

The call is not primarily for methods or materials but for men—gapmen who will stand in the breach before a holy God in the interest of unholy men. Men who will preach repentance and plead for mercy. We have men today who can raise more questions than they can answer; who are able to diagnose our weaknesses but fail to offer a cure; who can impress upon us the size of our task, but who do little about it. These are not men we want. The men we look for are:

- 1) Men who are gripped by Christ and laid hold on for a purpose.
- Men who realize that ours is a purposeful God and who are committed to that purpose.

- Men whose human abilities of leadership are linked to the energy and wisdom that is unlimited.
- 4) Men whose perspective has been sharpened and whose convictions have been deepended because of the profound impact of other lives on their own.
- Men who can speak boldly to the critical issues of our troubled age.
- 6) Men who can relate their faith to the substantial world in which we live.

We need capable men of faith and vision and compassion to stand before God for the land.

#### III. THE DISCOURAGING RESPONSE TO THE CALL

"But I found none." There was no one willing to stay the hand of judgment.

At a conference like this we are impressed by the piety and zeal of many of our people. However, in every day life we become gravely concerned as we see the waters of judgment seeping through the hairline cracks in our wall of security, with relatively few people to care.

God give us gapmen for our day.

### Tuesday Morning - July 6 - Memorial and Communion Service

Bro. I. W. Redekopp announced the hymn "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" and led in opening prayer. He then mentioned the names of church workers who have gone to be with the Lord during the past Conference year:

Manitoba: Rev. D. D. Derksen, Boissevain; Rev. D. K. Duerksen, Central; Rev. G. H. Sukkau, Elmwood; J. H. Dick (Deacon), Portage Avenue; Wesley Penner, Elmwood.

**British Columbia:** Rev. Jacob D. Dick, Clearbrook; Rev. Heinrich H. Rempel, Clearbrook; Abram Willms (Deacon), Kennedy Heights; A. A. Wiens, Clearbrook.

The brethren Jac. Bergen and F. H. Friesen led in prayer thanking God for the faith and service of those gone before and praying that we might imitate their faith.

Bro. Redekopp then read Hebrews 11:13 (German) and Luke 22:14-24, 31, 32. His message dealt with the theme "Christ's New Covenant with His Own." This covenant

- 1) Reaches down to our needs, taking account of our suffering, our human weakness and pain of separation.
- The convenant binds us to the eternal as we remember Christ's ministry, His suffering, and His intercession for us at the right hand

of God. The convenant ties us to our loved ones who have gone to be with Him. It also ties us to his keeping-power illustrated in their lives.

3) Christ's covenant leaves us with the change to identify ourselves with the cross, to proclaim the gospel to the world and to anticipate His return.

Bro. J. D. Goertzen, Waldheim, called upon the ministers and deacons who had been asked to serve.

He pointed out that we have been busy, sometimes noisy, but are now quiet; we have hurried, but are now at peace. There is a time to plan and to work, but now is the time to remember.

Bro. Goertzen read I Cor. 11:23 ff. and the delegates and guests fellowshipped around the communion table.

A male choir of delegates under the direction of Bro. Helmut Janzen sang "Were You There When They Crucified my Lord?"

Bro. Quiring led in closing prayer.

### PART II — BUSINESS SESSIONS

First Session, Monday Morning July 5, 1965.

#### SECTION A — INTRODUCTION AND PRELIMINARY BUSINESS

#### I. OPENING AND WELCOME

A. Emphasizing our dependence upon God, Bro. C. D. Toews, East Aldergrove, led the assembled delegates and guests in the singing of "I Need Thee Every Hour" and "There Shall Be Showers of Blessing".

B. Brother H. M. Willems, Moderator of the N.Saskatchewan Conference, welcomed the delegates, pointing out that this is the diamond jubilee year of Saskatchewan. He cited Psalm 46:10, a prayer that God be exalted, and led in the opening prayer after which he called upon Moderator J. H. Quiring to assume the chairmanship.

C. Brother Quiring in his opening remarks emphasized the great missionary responsibility of this Conference. He also underscored the theme of our conference "Behold, I come quickly". In this connection he referred to the sudden home-calling of the brethren G. H. Sukkau and D. K. Duerksen.

#### IV. CONFERENCE MESSAGE AND PRAYER SESSION

Brother Henry Brucks, assistant moderator, called upon brother J. H. Quiring to give the conference message. Brother Quiring based his message on Ezekiel 22:23-31. After elaborating upon the context of this scripture portion, brother Quiring pointed to certain parallels with our own Conference. He pointed to cracks in our walls and made an urgent appeal for gap-men to stand in the breaches to avert the judgment of God upon our brotherhood. There is a pressing need for strong leadership. What matters is not the organization and program of our Conference, but the kind of people we are. (For complete outline of message see Part I — Devotional Services.) Brother Brucks then led the Conference in a session of prayer.

#### V. TIME SCHEDULE

The moderator announced the time schedule as recommended by the local church.

Morning: 9:00 — 12:00 Afternoon: 2:00 — 5:00 Evening: 7:00 — 9:00

#### VI. RULES GOVERNING CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The moderator called the attention of the delegates to the rules of order and parliamentary procedure to be followed during the business sessions.

#### VII. ELECTION OF CONFERENCE EXECUTIVE FOR 1965-66

#### A. Moderator

Candidates nominated: J. A. Toews, D. J. Pankratz, J. H. Quiring.

Elected: J. H. Quiring.

#### B. Assistant Moderator

Candidates nominated: D. Ewert, H. Lenzmann, D. J. Pankratz, D. B. Wiens, J. A. Toews, J. B. Baerg. Elected: D. J. Pankratz.

At the second session another vote was taken since, according to the constitution, the election of an officer requires at least fifty per cent plus one vote of the total number of votes cast. Candidates at this time were the three brethren who had received the highest number of votes: H. Lenzmann, D. J. Pankratz, J. A. Toews. D. J. Pankratz was elected.

#### C. Conference Secretary

In accordance with the decision of the Conference in 1964 (1964 Yearbook, p. 120) the Committee of Reference and Counsel, nominated brother D. D. Duerksen as secretary of the Conference. The motion carried that brother Duerksen be elected by acclamation.

#### D. Conference Treasurer

Brother Quiring announced that the Committee of Reference and Counsel has appointed brother J. J. Riediger for a two-year term according to the constitution. At the second session a motion carried that the Conference approve the appointment of brother Riediger as Conference treasurer.

#### VIII. ANNOUNCEMENTS AND GREETINGS

The moderator and the secretary made announcements relating to various aspects of the conference.

The secretary read greetings from brother and sister C. N. Hiebert, brother and sister C. C. Peters, brother J. G. Reimer. The moderator presented a telegram greeting from brother C. J. Rempel, Ontario. Somewhat later brother Brucks read a greeting from brother J. G. Thiessen, Vancouver. Brother Duerksen read the greeting sent to the General Conference of Mennonites now in session at Clearbrook. In the subsequent business sessions, the following names of churches and brethren and sisters were submitted to be greeted by the Conference: brother H. M. Janzen; United Mennonite Church, Thompson, Manitoba; Bethesda personnel; brother G. W. Peters in response to his greeting to the Conference; brother and sister H. H. Janzen; brother A. Huebert; St. Jerome and St. Therese congregations in response to their greeting to the Conference; F. C. Peters; H. F. Klassen; J. K. Neufeld. A telegram in response to the greeting to the General Conference of Mennonites was also received.

The motion carried that the resolutions committee respond to these greetings. The Conference expressed confidence in the formulation of the greetings as written by the committee and agreed that they need not be presented to the Conference for acceptance.

The North Saskatchewan District Conference is happy to announce the revival of the former Compass M. B. Church and the relocating of its place of workship to Meadow Lake, Saskatchewan. The official name of this church with 15 members will henceforth be The Meadow Lake Mennonite Brethren Church.

A further motion that at this conference each request be dealt with separately carried.

Four separate motions to grant permission to the Bakerview M. B. Church, the Brooklands M. B. Church, the Salem M. B. Church, and the Zion M. B. Church to appeal for assistance in their building projects to the churches of the Canadian M. B. Conference carried.

# B. Request of the Manitoba Conference — Re: Support of Release of the Russian Gospel Light Hour over Saskatoon Station

The Manitoba Conference and its Radio Committee continue to have considerable concern for the subsidy required for the release of the Russian Gospel Light Hour over the Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, station. Since this broadcast is being prepared entirely for a different province the Manitoba Conference repeats its request made last year to the Canadian Conference (see English Yearbook p. 11, 1964) that the Canadian M. B. Conference assume responsibility for the subsidy required, beyond the grant of the Canadian Youth Committee.

In the name of the Manitoba M. B. Conference, A. J. Dick, Secretary. The question was read by the secretary and submitted to the Radio Commission for a recommendation. At the second session the Radio Commission recommended that the Conference subsidize the Russian program as released by the Gospel Light Hour with \$1,000 during the next conference year. A motion carried to accept this recommendation.

### III. COMMITTEE OF REFERENCE AND COUNSEL

The members of the CRC took their places on the platform and were introduced to the Conference by the moderator.

### A. Report of the Committee of Reference and Counsel

Brother D. D. Duerksen read and moved the adoption of the report.

Dear Brethren of the Conference:

Greetings with Ephesians 3:14 und 16: "For this cause I bow my knees unto the father of our Lord Jesus Christ . . . that He would grant you according to the riches of his glory, to be strengthened with might by his Spirit in the inner man." The concern that our Conference needs the strengthening of the inner man and a deeper understanding of the love of Christ was expressed by brother Brucks in the introduction to one of the sessions of the CRC. This concern is shared by the other members of the committee, and towards the goal of strengthening the inner man, committee members have thought, deliberated, and laboured.

The CRC met for its winter deliberations on March 3 and 4 in Winnipeg. Another meeting was held on Friday, July 2. The following problems were considered and to some extent dealt with during the course of the year:

- 1) At the March meeting the members of the CRC felt the loss of both conference treasurer, G. H. Sukkau and conference secretary D. K. Duerksen, keenly. Both brethren went home to be with the Lord about a month prior to the March meetings. The brethren J. J. Riediger and D. D. Duerksen, were appointed to serve as treasurer and secretary respectively for the interim.
- 2) The request from the Committee on Evangelism to become a standing committee was channelled through the CRC. The secretary submitted the question to the churches for action with the result that 3,333 members voted in favour of the request and 144 members opposed. Thus the committee on Evangelism is to become a standing committee.
- 3) The advisability of having a biennial Canadian Conference was referred for further study to the provincial committees of reference and counsel. The CRC's of the B. C., Ontario, and South Saskatchewan have gone on record in favour of moving in this direction. The CRC of Manitoba favours this move but sets certain prerequisites. The CRC of Alberta recommends holding alternate business and faith conferences for a trial two year period instead

of the annual business sessions. The CRC of North Saskatchewan is opposed to holding conferences biennially. On the basis of the information received the Canadian Committee of Reference and Counsel has a recommendation to submit.

- 4) Upon the request of the B. C. Conference and upon the recommendation of the interim treasurer, the CRC instructed the secretary of the Conference to solicit from the Churches their membership on May 31. The CRC recommends that the date for the establishment of official church membership for Conference purposes be May 31 instead of January 1, as in the past.
- 5) In reply to a question submitted by one of our churches as to whether the practice of certain churches to exempt certain members from conference dues by establishing dual membership lists is proper procedure, and CRC formulated a statement of policy as follows: "The CRC goes on record as considering it inconsistent to have a dual list of church membership for the payment of Conference dues. The local church takes the responsibility for those who cannot pay. The commission of finance should study this matter and bring its findings to the attention of the CRC at a future meeting."
- 6) The same church submitted the question as to whether the practice of some churches of withholding a portion of their offerings for their own maintenance is in accordance with Conference policy. The CRC has referred this question to the commission of finance for further study.
- 7) The radio commission submitted its report to the CRC. The report was discussed and recommendations on the basis of this report were made. The CRC submits the report to the Conference for consideration.

## Report of the Radio Commission to the Committee of Reference and Counsel

The Commission appointed by the Committee of Reference and Counsel of the Canadian Area Conference presents this report of its findings with the sincere desire that it prove helpful to the brotherhood as it seeks to ascertain God's will for a radio outreach.

The members of the Commission have worked individually in the provinces and collectively in sessions of one meeting held in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The Commission recognizes, with gratitude to God, that individual churches and provinces have done a great work in broadcasting. It is truly surprising to note the number of broadcasts which are sponsored by Mennonite Brethren in Canada today.

#### a) Philosophy and Objectives

i) The Mennonite Brethren Church recognizes the gospel to be the message of God's saving grace revealed in Jesus Christ and inscripturated in the Bible. This gospel is to be proclaimed by the church to a world lost in sin. Such a proclamation constitutes the primary task of the church.

- ii) The methods employed in proclaiming the gospel will be adapted by each generation to the existing conditions of that day. We believe that radio has been and still continues to be an effective medium of mass communication and that the Mennonite Brethren Church should use this channel for evangelism. We also believe that a radio broadcast could have positive public relations value for our churches and our Conference.
- iii) We believe that the church should utilize several means of evangelism rather than to concentrate on one basic approach. In developing its radio ministry the Mennonite Brethren should seek to supplement other areas of witness such as home missions, church evangelism and Christian education. The church should endeaver to maintain a wholesome balance among the various avenues of witness lest the development of one area weaken the impact of another.
- iv) We believe that the Mennonite Brethren should support a radio ministry in the context of a denominational pattern. Such a ministry would be in keeping with the total program of church expansion as it is carried on today. If the denominational pattern of our Conference activities is justified, then a denominational radio broadcast would be justified by the same reasons.
- v) We believe that an effort in radio evangelism as a Canadian Mennonite Brethren program would make for better quality of broadcasting, would be more economical, and would unite our Conference in this area of witnessing. With the wide selection of religious broadcasts available today, it becomes imperative that we air a program of good quality to insure desired effectiveness and to justify the expenditures of time and money.
- vi) We believe that the major thrust of a Canada-wide program should be of an evangelistic nature. However, in order to set forth the gospel in its wider biblical framework, other emphases would also be introduced. The implications of the gospel would be made relevant to our present day.

#### b) Production

- i) We believe that the center for producing such a broadcast could be Winnipeg. The reason for suggesting Winnipeg centers around the availability of studios and personnel in Winnipeg. Two alternative means of production might be considered, if Winnipeg were chosen as the production center:
  - aa) An independent program could be produced renting the facilities owned by the Gospel Light Hour.
  - bb) The Gospel Light Hour might be asked to produce a program for the Canadian Conference.

ii) We would suggest that the Conference consider a fifteen minute broadcast. It is felt by experts consulted that a fifteen minute broadcast, well done, has a greater appeal to the unsaved than a thirty minute program.

iii) The Conference might consider the advisability of using the Conference evangelist as the speaker on the broadcast. In this way he would become known and the public relations value might help

him as he visits the churches.

iv) The music on the broadcast, as also the speaker, should make for continuity. It would be inadvisable to alternate musical groups and speakers.

#### c) Administration

- i) We believe that the radio work should be delegated to the Committee of Evangelism. Since this committee already reflects provincial representation, it could enlarge its operations to include this phase.
- ii) Should the Conference choose to produce its own program, it would become necessary to engage a full-time manager for the production of this broadcast.
- iii) We do not believe that the releasing of a Conference program should be made mandatory for the provinces, but it is hoped that this broadcast would replace many existing, independently-sponsored programs.
- iv) A program of follow-up should be initiated which would be carried out in co-opertaion with local churches in the area from which correspondence comes.

#### d) Finances

- i) In order to retain provincial involvement we would suggest that the provincial conferences pay all or a substantial share of the radio time in the respective provinces. In recognition of this, the name of the sponsoring body would be aired.
- ii) The Canadian Conference would pay for the cost of production and perhaps a share of the radio time if donations would warrant this.
- iii) An estimate of the cost of such a broadcast might be as follows if the conference decides on an indepedent program:

Manager, speaker, secretary, rent of facilities, tapes

The radio time here is predicted on the use of fairly complete coverage in the 5 provinces and the Canadian Conference paying for 1/4 of the cost.

If the Conference should decide to ask the Gospel Light Hour to produce the program for the Conference, the production cost would be decreased considerably.

It would be difficult to estimate how much could be expected

from listener response.

8) The question of a complete reorganization of our own Canadian Conference received thought and consideration.

9) During the course of the year counsel was given to a number of other committees of the Conference in their part of the task of building the Kingdom of God.

May God guide us in our deliberations at the conference. It is the concern of the CRC that as a brotherhood we may continue to grow and that we may solve in strength and unity according to scriptural principles some of the complex problems that face us today.

After a discussion of the report in which attention was drawn to one omission, the report was accepted.

#### B. Report of the Finance Study Commission

(Given at the second session, but recorded here, since the finance commission was responsible to the CRC, but could not report in time to have its findings included in the CRC report.)

Brother Nick Willems read and moved the adoption of an extensive report of the committee.

#### 1) Introduction

II Tim. 4:1: "I charge thee therefore before God and the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall judge the quick and the dead at His appearing and His Kingdom."

Realizing that this occasion is imminent, it is good to reexamine our response to the open door which has been set before us. Paul, states in Romans 1, that he is a debtor and with all that is in him he wants to respond, that the Gospel might be preached. There are still millions of people who have never heard the Gospel, hundreds of people in different cultures have not even a portion of Scripture printed in their language. Two hundred million North Americans enjoy great wealth, where a vast advertising industry stimulates an ever increasing appetite for material comforts and gadgets so that yesterday's luxuries have become today's necessities. In this same world two billion people are starving. The burning question today is, "How ought a Christian to live and be a faithful steward for Jesus Christ?"

Sacrifices have been wrought from the earliest time of human history. The bringing of the tithe was already practised by Abraham and was part of the Old Testament Mosaic Institution. At times it was difficult to differentiate between the tithe and taxes.

In many areas Israel was treated somewhat as a minor, till the promise of the Savior might be fulfilled. With progression in Divine revelation has come increased responsibility. In the New Testament we see Jesus our Saviour and example for us to follow, responding to the many needs with His divine provision. The epistles continue to unveil the great plan and program of God. We have become joint-heirs united with Christ in one body of which He is the head. We are co-laborers with God in seeking to evangelize the world. Paul speaks of giving and illustrates it with the natural law of sparce sowing, resulting in a meagre harvest. Every one is to give as God hath prospered him and this is to be done systematically from week to week. It is furthermore the inner motivation in giving, which shall give evidence in a cheerful response which is acceptable to God.

For some years we have had a system of levies in our Conference work, and also in many churches. Here and there have come voices of displeasure and certain churches have with sort of feeling of guilt, pioneered in new ways of receiving gifts for the Lord's treasury. Levies are a burden for some people because they would rather not give at all. Some would prefer not to be told what to give, others find it hard because of economic pressures and still others feel satisfied in that they have given all that was asked of them. Some of the money we have received has been pressed and many others have not been challenged.

In the matter of administration this has been possibly the most simple way of gathering money. This is however far from training people to become faithful stewards and often we have robbed our treasuries and the Lord's work of much money that should have been given to our Lord.

In general the economic strength of our members has increased and some God has blessed exceedingly. Our giving has however not increased accordingly. In the history of the church, Christians have again and again gone without necessities to the extent that they fasted certain days a week in order to be able to give. So we today must again emphasize the truth given by Paul, "... we brought nothing into the world and we take nothing out." We are here for a temporary period of time in preparation for time to come. While we are here we are not to live for self, but for Him who died for us.

### 8) Interpretation of Statistics

The information gained is at best incomplete since we were not able to get all the churches to give us the information we needed.

a) The methods used in gathering money vary greatly from church to church. There seems to be a move toward the setting up of budgets and then gathering the money on free will basis. Some employ the category system, others leave amount to be contributed entirely open. This manner of giving will increase the need for the training of our members to a mature systematic type of giving. It would be in place to have Bible conferences on stewardship. Members could be encouraged to give the tithe as a voluntary self-discipline in giving. Tithing should not be considered as the ceiling in giving but rather as the floor and the percentage should be increased as the basic wage increases.

The last pattern could serve as a sample of a simple budget which churches could use. May we encourage churches to set up balanced budgets so all areas of our conference are adequately taken care of. Many churches have budgets and offerings are not specified but designated as an offering to the Lord. The allotment from each offering to the different causes is then designated by the church.

We noticed that much money has been spent at the local level in building programs. Not only has money been spent for sanctuaries but much has been spent on education buildings and parsonages. Only two provinces report that help was received for building programs, and this was in the amount of \$79,189. Most individual churches have received in the vicinity of 3,000 and up, from contributions across Canada.

- d) Taking note of present situation of giving and spending in the province.
- B.C. is close to the average in all but missions outside of our Conference.

Alberta is very high in provincial spending and lower where it comes to pulpit support.

Saskatchewan is highest in pulpit support.

Manitoba follows the average in most areas except in building programs where Manitoba is highest.

Ontario is the highest in matter of local spendings.

e) In regards to the question of a Canada-wide fund for building and the supporting of ministers, many churches did not make any comments and a great number were negative. There were also some favorable comments.

There are possibly two reasons

- i) We are reluctant to give up our autonomy in this matter.
- There was too little information as to details to give a rational response.

There were only a few churches that have witheld names of some members for conference lists. This is also true in regards to withholding part of the offerings for local purposes.

May we encourage the brotherhood to give as God would have us give. He evaluates our giving by what is left after we have given. The brother who has received ten talents in earning money or received money by means of favorable circumstances will certainly be required to give accordingly.

Respectfully submitted, Nick Willems (chairman) The report was adopted.

- C. Recommendations of the Committee of Reference and Counsel
- 1) The committee recommends that the date for the establishment of official church membership for conference purposes be May 31 instead of January 1, as in the past.
- 2) The committee recommends that a three-man study commission be appointed to study the total structure of our Conference including the advisability of changing to biennial sessions, and then bring to the next conference appropriate recommendations.
  - 3) Recommendation regarding a Canada wide Radio program:

    a) The committee recommends that the Canadian Conference undertake the production of a Canada wide Radio broadcast, beginning with an English program.

- b) The committee recommends to the committee in charge to consider the production of a weekly fifteen minute broadcast to begin with.
- c) The committee recommends that this broadcast be released in the provinces in co-operation with the provincial conferences.
- d) The committee recommends that the Committee on Evangelism be charged with this work and that the name be changed accordingly.
- e) Should the conference wish to produce its own program, the CRC recommends that the Committee on Evangelism engage with Conference approval personnel according to the need.
- f) The committee recommends that the program be produced in Winnipeg utilizing the facilities of the Gospel Light.
- g) The committee recommends that the production costs of the program be paid by the Canadian Conference and that the station time be paid by the provinces. The allocation of funds received through the listener could be apportioned by a formula decided at a later date.
  - h) The committee recommends that this question be submitted to the churches for action by November 1, 1965. (Canadian Conference, Yearbook 1964, p. 12.)

## 4) Recommendation Regarding the Finance Study Commission

The CRC recommends to the Conference that this commission continue to work under the direction of the Committee of Reference and Counsel during the coming year and that the commission be permitted to meet once during this time at the expense of the Conference.

Recommendation 1 was accepted.

Recommendation 2 was accepted. A motion related to the recommendation that the CRC appoint this three men study commission carried.

Recommendation 3 regarding Radio program. On this point numerous questions were asked and a wide disussion followed. A motion carried that the first clause of recommendation 3e be deleted. A further motion carried that recommendation 3h be changed to read "We recommend that this question together with the above recommendations and the report be submitted to the churches for action by November 1, 1965."

Recommendation 4 was read and accepted at the second session.

Announcements were made by the moderator. Brother D. J. Pankratz closed the first session by bringing the cause of the Conference before God's throne of grace.

### Second Session - Monday Afternoon,

July 5, 1965

Brother Jake Pauls, Ontario, led the assembled delegates and guests in the singing of the hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers".

The moderator welcomed brother C. F. Plett, pastor of the Harvey M. B. Church in North Dakota. Brother Plett led in the opening prayer.

Brother Quiring then welcomed other conference guests: the brethren J. H. Epp, Elmo Warkentin, Peter J. Funk, Waldo Hiebert, Dwight Wiebe and John Redekop.

The secretary read the minutes of the morning session and moved their adoption. The minutes were adopted with some alterations.

The moderator submitted greetings from the United Mennonite Church, Thompson. (Recorded under Greetings.)

The Conference voted its approval of the CRC appointment of brother J. J. Riediger as treasurer. (See Election of Conference Executive for 1965-66.)

Another vote on assistant moderator was taken. (See Election of Conference Executive for 1965-66.)

The brethren Eugene Gerbrandt and J. M. Schmidt of the Radio Commission were invited to the platform. (For recommendation of this commission regarding subsidy to the Russian Gospel Light Hour Broadcast see Submitted Questions.)

# III. COMMITTEE OF REFERENCE AND COUNSEL (continued)

Brother Nick Willems read and moved the adoption of the report of the finance commission. The report was adopted. A recommendation of the CRC regarding the Commission of Finance was read by the secretary. A motion to accept the recommendation carried. (Details recorded under III B. and C. of first business session.)

# IV. SUNDAY SCHOOL, YOUTH, AND INTERIM-CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEES

Brother J. H. Penner, chairman of the joint committee, called upon brother H. R. Baerg to introduce the members of the Sunday School Committee and upon C. Braun to introduce the brethren in the Youth Committee. Brother Penner then read a brief report.

# A. Report by Chairman of Interim Christian Education Committee

Dear Brethren:

Greetings with Eph. 6:23 "Peace be to the brethren, and love with faith, from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."

We have now completed two years of work as an Interim Christian Education Committee. Needless to say there are many things yet to be learned as we travel along this new path.

We as a committee are thankful to the Lord that we have been able to engage the services of brother George Konrad as our Executive Secretary. In spite of the fact that it is only on a part time basis at present, we as a committee feel that a great deal of ground work has been done. Since he is the one who is directly involved in the work, I have asked brother Konrad to report to the Conference on behalf of the Interim Christian Education Committee.

I would like to take this opportunity to encourage all Christian education workers to avail themselves of materials and help that is available through our office of Christian Education

# B. Report of the Executive Secretary of the Interim Christian Education Committee

Brother George G. Konrad, Executive Secretary of the Interim Christian Education Committee read and moved the adoption of his report.

#### 1) Introduction

During the past months the fledgling child has taken its first steps. These may have been faltering or even mis-directed, but they were signs of life and growth. Now, no doubt, we are looking for further maturation and development.

In the world of Christian education certain basic reorientations are in evidence which will also influence our work. An increasing emphasis is being seen in identifying Christian education along with evangelism and others, as one of the primary functions of the church, rather than restricting it to specific agencies in the church. The great commission given to all Christians is to preach the Gospel to all nations for the salvation of individuals, and then to continue teaching them for increasing submission to the will of God. High-

lighting the purpose of spiritual gifts, Paul said "Seek that ye may excel to the edifying of the church." (I Cor. 14:12.) In seeking to develop our future work our disire is to be used of the Lord for the building of the church so that it might realize more fully its purpose in the world.

This report is being presented on behalf of the Interim Christian Education Committee presently comprised of the Youth and Sunday School Committees. It will be largely restricted to a summary of some of the major activities which took place during the past year.

### 2) Conferences and Meetings

Whereas in the past. Canadian-wide conferences were sponsored by the Sunday School Committee, presently the emphasis is being placed on conferences conducted provincially. Youth rallies, as well as Christian education conferences, have taken place in most of the provinces. A relatively new approach was a combination of the interests of youth, Sunday School, and music, within the framework of provincial conferences. This is a reflection of the recognition that Christian education is more than any one agency, but rather is a concern of the entire program of the church.

It was my privilege to participate in some type of conference in each of the provinces. A youth rally and a meeting with the Sunday School workers in Ontario, a DVBS training session and a leadership conference in Manitoba, a series of meetings with the church workers in Saskatchewan, a youth and Sunday School workers' camp in Alberta, and two Christian education conferences in British Columbia again helped me to recognize the vitality of our Christian education concerns while also leading me to a better understanding of some of the needs existing in our churches.

Regional conferences are making a distinct contribution to Christian education in terms of inspiration, unification, education and training. However, it is thought that the primary thrust of our future work might be more directly related to the local church, and this for the following reasons:

- a) Greater efficiency in terms of reaching the people who are directly involved in Christian education.
- b) The specific needs of the local church can be more directly taken into account.
- c) Provision of greater opportunity for assistance in the implementation of changes and improvements.
- d) Deliberations tend to become more practical and applicable.

#### 3) Articles for the Mennonite Brethren Herald

In co-operation with the editor of the Herald, a series of articles appeared in the column "For Church Workers". The articles dealt

with various aspects of Christian education. The series was intended to be helpful and stimulating, rather than controversial.

The response to these articles has been modest, sometimes expressing agreement and occasionally disagreement, in addition to requests for literature which was referred to in the articles.

This column was prepared in close co-operation with Brother Elmo Warkentin, Executive Secretary of the US Board of Church Schools. Presently Brother Loyal Martin, Delft, Minnesota, is carrying the responsibility for this work in the US, and we are again working together in the planning and preparation of future articles.

# 4) Literature Mail-outs to the Churches

Several types of literature were prepared during the year and mailed to the responsible individuals in the churches. Our intention was to provide some practical information and guidance to the Christian workers in the churches. These mailings included the following:

- a) Various helps relating to VBS.
- b) Promotional and informational literature concerning the Youth Worker training course.
- c) An evaluation of the club materials of the AWANA's, Torchbearers, Brigades, and Royal Ambassadors.
- d) Plans for the Christian education year.
- e) Information and promotion of the Scripture Press Training Hour materials for youth workers.
- f) Survey of various aspects of the local youth programs.
- g) Survey of the use and evaluation of the new Adult Quarterly.

The survey relating to the use of the Adult Quarterly was undertaken on three levels: students, teachers, and superintendents. Although this survey was somewhat troublesome to the participants, the response was gratifying. May all the participants accept our warm expression of appreciation.

Plans are again being made for the preparation of literature that will be useful in the local church program of Christian education. Areas which are presently being given consideration include the church library, leadership training, and a Christian education planning calendar.

#### 5) The Youth Worker

The **Youth Worker**, a special responsibility of the Youth Committee, is another important area of endeavor. This magazine appeared twice during the past year containing a total of approximately 79 programs for youth gatherings.

The Youth Worker is intended to supplement the Scripture Press Training Hour materials with specifically Mennonite Brethren distinctives. A survey of various aspects of our youth work shows that of the churches that responded, 74 per cent are using the **Youth Worker** in some measure, while 38 per cent are using Scripture Press Training Hour materials.

It is important for us to consider the possibility of a regular training hour for the young people in our churches. A weekly, well-structured, and well-planned program of Christian education dealing with matters of concern to our young people from a Biblical perspective could prove to be invaluable. We would encourage churches and youth workers to explore the possibility of such a training program in their church. The curriculum provided by Scripture Press and which was officially adopted by the Conference in 1962, could provide an excellent outline for this purpose.

## 6) Youth Week

Youth Week is a special emphasis directed to young people in the church and outside the church, usually beginning with the last Sunday in January and continuing for one week. This year's theme was "Occupy till I Come," emphasizing personal stewardship in view of the Lord's return. According to the survey which we conducted, 72 per cent of the responding churches had some type of special Youth Week activities. Properly utilized, this emphasis can prove to be a spiritual highlight in the life of your young people, and again we would encourage churches to continue, improve, and where necessary introduce such a program.

#### 7) Mid-week Materials

Churches are continuing to look for materials for use with their children and young people during the week. Many feel that this mid-week program should not be a duplication of the Sunday school session. Some aspects which have come to the fore in discussing the purpsoe of a mid-week program include the following: outreach, learning by expressional activities and involvement, prayer and testimony, missionary teaching and training, service opportunities, crafts and outings under the leadership of a church, and training for leadership and participation.

Several programs, all of which have found a certain amount of acceptance in various churches, are presently available for use. The following, while being used with varying degrees of success, each have their strong points as well as their limitations. An evaluation of this material is available at the Office of Christian Education:

- a) Christian Service Brigade, Box 150, Wheaton, Ill. (Pioneer Girls, Box 92, Wheaton, Ill.)
- b) AWANA Youth Association Boys' and Girls' Clubs, 3859 North Central Ave., Chicago 34, Ill.
- c) Wayfarers and Torchbearers, Herald Press, Scottdale, Pennsylvania.

## 8) Adult Quarterly

Some of the more important conclusions which can be reached on the basis of the survey of the Adult Quarterly are the following:

- a) Most of our churches are using the new Quarterly.
- b) Some churches, while using the student **Quarterly** are not using the **Adult Teacher**. The **Teacher** is prepared by Scripture Press and must be ordered separately.
- c) The major criticism appears to be that the lesson text is too long and thus too hard. The earlier comments in Brother Baerg's report are in place here.
- d) A substantial number of students do not use all the sections which are provided in the **Quarterly**, with some complaining of an overlap in materials and emphasis.
- e) A significant number of teachers do not use some of the important helps which are provided in the **Teacher**.

A new undertaking for this year was the preparation of an insert for the Adult Quarterly. This insert, as an educational tool, was to provide various teaching helps, highlight important aspects of the Sunday school material, promote different emphases as the need arises, and provide general educational materials. The first insert, which has been prepared, and which is published in the third quarter of the Adult Quarterly, includes the following four sections: "How to evaluate your own Sunday School," "Search the Scriptures," "Sunday School Goals," and "Plan for Planning Day."

This project was undertaken in co-operation with the responsible brethren of the US Area Conference and is being given further consideration.

# 9) Teacher Training

A growing recognition of the importance of the teaching ministry of the church, inevitably leads to a re-emphasis of teacher training. Our statistical report indicates an increase of about 11 per cent in number of teachers in our Sunday schools. In addition we must include all those having leadership responsibilities in various other capacities.

The local church bears the responsibility of calling forth and training those to whom God has given the gift to teach. The local church must greatly supplement the training opportunities provided in our institutions. Regular and progressive leadership training courses need to be offered in all our churches to Sunday school teachers, youth workers, music directors, and others. We hope to be able to provide further motivation and direction in this important area of concern.

#### 10) Church Library

A further instrument of Christian education is the church library. The library can prove to be an important adjunct to all other areas of teaching and training. All age-groups as well as all agencies will greatly benefit from a well planned, developed, promoted, and utilized library.

In keeping with an earlier decision of our Committee, this will be one of our important projects this coming winter. The development of this service will be undertaken in close co-operation with our publishing house, The Christian Press.

### 11) Committee Meetings and Study Conference

Last fall the executive of the ICEC had the opportunity to meet for two days of deliberations. There were significant hours, where the work of the Committee was thoroughly reviewed. A major concern was the planning of a Study Conference for the Easter recess of 1965. The two major considerations of this occassion were to be: A Philosophy of Christian Education and a study of curriculum materials. Unfortunately, due to various uncontrolable circumstances, this Study Cnoference had to be postponed. Further plans are presently being made.

## 12) Conclusion

Christian education has held an important position in our church growth for many years. The prayer of our Committee is that we may continue to explore and develop an even fuller utilization of this ministry in our continued growth and development.

The work of the Executive Secretary has barely begun. Slowly, on the basis of growing experience, a job description is being developed. Our desire is to be of assistance where help is needed. To determine this continued communication will be entirely necessary. Your personal letters of counsel and encouragement are greatly appreciated. We deeply covet your continued prayers.

# C. Report of the Sunday School Committee

Brother H. R. Baerg read and moved the adoption of the report. Dear Brethren:

"May grace and peace be multiplied to you through the knowledge of God and our Savior Jesus Christ" (II Peter 1:2).

The responsibility of teaching the "knowledge of God and our Savior Jesus Christ" is an on-going task. As long as we accept the

great commission as being binding for us, we must also "teach them to observe." Furthermore, as long as children are being born in our homes, we have the responsibility to teach them the testimonies and commandments of God for "he commanded our fathers to teach them to our children" (Psa. 78:5). Also, while there are unsaved people in our neighborhood and around our churches, we must reach them for Christ and teach them the Word of God according to which "the secrets of every man's heart shall be judged" (Rom. 2:16) in the day of judgment.

The work of the committee has consisted largely in planning, policymaking, coordinating and consulting with the provincial committee chairman. The implementation of projects and working with the grass roots of the Sunday Schools has been left to the Executive Secretary and largely to the provincial committees. Due to the fact that our Easter Study Conference was cancelled, the committee also dispensed with is annual meeting until Annual Canadian Conference. We have thus been unable to analyze, evaluate and work with current trends and needs in our constituency. We believe, however, that local and provincial men responsible for the area of Christian Education have given good leadership, in attempting to upgrade our teaching ministry.

# 1) Executive Secretary

Despite the work the executive secretary has done in the areas of contact with the local church, speaking at conventions and writing articles for our paper, we believe that we need to step up our contact with the grass roots of Christian education in the local church. We would like to encourage leaders of educational agencies in the local church to maintain contact with our Christian Education office. Any questions or suggestions which you might send to the office at 81 Henderson Hlwy., Winnipeg 5, Manitoba, will help brother Konrad to become aware of needs and give leadership to our churches. We want to express our thanks to brother Konrad for the work he has done and the inspiration he has been to those working in Christian education in the local church. We are looking forward to the time when he will be able to devote his full time and energy to promoting Christian education in our churches and schools.

#### 2) Curriculum

We are still confronted with curriculum problems. It is distressing to observe that more and more of our churches are insisting on taking the easier road in use of curriculum — we are not sure that it is the better road. As long as churches through their delegates vote to accept recommendations given by the committee and then follow their own course of curriculum selection, there is not much the committee can do by way of giving guidance and maintaining uniformity in use of material. Although major revisions are being undertaken in the Herald Press Primary, Junior and Inter-

mediate curriculum, we are at this time unable to say how satisfactory these will be and we are of the opinion that it will make little difference in the minds of those who are responsible for Christian Education in the churches that have dropped the M. B. Imprint. The only way out of our problem, as we see it, is that churches where this is not an issue stay with the use of M.B. Imprint. Those who are encountering serious difficulty, should change to Scripture Press, however, still placing their order with Christian Press, Wininpeg. We feel that we should discontinue imprinting material completely in order to use up stock which we have on hand. Also, to facilitate the whole matter of ordering and sales, it appears to us to be advisable to turn this area over to Christian Press.

By all indications the adult curriculum has gone over well. We believe it necessary to stress the use of the discussion method in class instruction in order to facilitate the use of the survey method, to stimulate participation and interest. We have by no means expanded and utilized Adult Christian Education to its possible limit. We see a wide field open to further conquest exactly in this area. We would like to stress the further promotion and upgrading of Adult education through creative and spirit-directed use of Through-the-Bible Adult study lessons, Mid-week Bible study, Adult publication, Library, and Family worship.

## 3) Organization

The organizational arrangement for the interim period has worked out quite well, but leaves much to be desired. Somehow, we feel that we are not really a board of Christian education, neither do we hold surveillance over the whole field of Christian education in our churches, areas are being neglected and overlooked e. g. Christian Family, V.B.S., Camp and other agencies. It would seem to us that the committees responsible for various agencies of Christian education, (S.S., Youth, Music, Bible Schools) should be merged into one board whose responsibilities would include all phases of Christian education from Home to Sunday School to Music and Student services. It is our understanding that the conference is entertaining the thought of reorganization; should this be the case, we would recommend that this view be given serious consideration.

# 4) Study Conference

For reasons beyond our control, the conference planned for Easter did not materialize. The postponement of the conference was not because we did not think it important. Rather, because of the basic nature of the topics under consideration, we felt it wise to reschedule the conference for a time when more brethren working in the field of Christian education could be present and all those who had assignments time to prepare more adequately. We are

therefore asking that we might schedule the conference for the coming Easter week, 1966.

We are living in times of rapid change, also in the area of Christian education. We need to be careful that we do not splinter up in our churches by a multitude of programs; also, we do not want to fragment our conference by a variety of curricula. We are therefore hoping that recommendations made by the committee be taken seriously. We would also appreciate having the churches consult our Christian Education office in matters pertaining to corriculum rather than proceeding unilaterally in making changes. We hope that we will be able to serve the churches more efficiently in the years that lie ahead.

# D. Report of the Youth Committee

(Not read, but to appear in the 1965 yearbook)

Dear Brethren:

In Psalm 119:9 (RSV) the psalmist asks a very pertinent question concerning the life of young people, "How can a young man keep his way pure?" His answer is deeply significant for us today, "By guarding it according to Thy word." In an age when the moral fibre of many young people is disintegrating and many feel that life has no purpose, we are concerned as a conference and especially as youth committee to help our churches to train youth leaders and to teach young people so that they can by the grace of God live victorious lives and be the salt of the earth and the light of the world.

I would like to point out several ways in which this has been attempted by your youth committee.

# 1) The Youth Worker

This past year our executive-secretary, brother G. Konrad, with the help of an editorial advisory board has prepared and edited the Youth Worker. It was intended that this booklet provide youth program materials to help the youth leader in the local church to supplement the training hour materials supplied by Scripture Press. We are grateful to brother Konrad and the editorial board as well as to the contributing editors for the fine work they have done in the two issues that have been published in 1965. We are also thankful to brother H. H. Dueck for supervising the printing of the booklets. We trust that our churches have found the materials helpful.

#### 2) Youth Week

During the last week in January many church youth groups kept Youth Week. Program materials and bulletins emphasizing the theme "Occupy Till I Come" were prepared by the committee. Many churches participated and we trust even more will plan for this in 1966.

# 3) Youth Leadership Training Course

For two years now we have sought to introduce youth leadership training courses. We have tried, perhaps not too successfully, to encourage the provinces to hold monthly classes with their youth leaders. One of our problems has been to get materials prepared on time. We are glad that some provinces and even local churches have done a splendid job with a minimum of help from our committee.

During the past year \$5,772.86 was contributed by our churches toward the following youth projects:

Two new projects are being given serious consideration by the youth committee for the coming year. We are considering joining the Youth Caravan project which is sponsored by the Christian Service department of the Board of General Welfare. This caravan will be visiting some of the B.C. churches this summer. Then we are also considering a nation-wide M. B. Youth rally. We believe that this would unite our young people and open their eyes to the great service opportunities in our own conference.

Please continue to pray for the youth of our churches and our land and also for your youth committee.

# F. Recommendations of the Interim Christian Education Committee

- 1) In view of the fact that certain churches are discontinuing the use of the M. B. Imprint material and in view of the fact that there are considerable stocks of material at the Christian Press and the M. B. Publishing House and in view of the fact that additional supplies of this material, without the Imprint but otherwise substantially the same, are available either at Herald or Faith and Life Press, we recommend that we discontinue publishing the M. B. Imprint. This recommendation is not to be construed as a recommendation to discontinue the use of this material in our churches.
- 2) The committee recommends that the existing stock of M. B. Imprint material at the Christian Press be turned over to the Christian Press without further financial obligation on their part. The Christian Press would, however, be responsible for ordering and maintaining adequate stocks and for handling the orders from the churches in the same way as they do orders for Scripture Press material.
  - 3) That the following youth projects be accepted for 1965-66:

6) That the Youth Caravan Project be undertaken and planned for the Canadian churches in 1966 subject to the results of the visit to the B. C. churches this summer.

7) That a Youth Rally be planned and implemented for all young people in Canada.

- 8) Believing that every church is responsible for the evangelization of its own constituency, the committee recommends that each of our churches recognize and acknowledge the potential of Christian education as a means of outreach and evangelism in its immediate community and take concrete steps to implement a program that would enlist those from its community who are otherwise unreached.
- 9) That in view of the continuing need for church workers, the churches be challenged and encouraged to continue to offer Leadership and Teacher Training courses, both on the local church and provincial levels, and that as far as possible, they work toward a unified Christian workers training program, incorporating the various educational agencies of the church.
- 10) That, in view of the necessity to postpone the Study Conference last Easter, we be permitted to conduct it during this conference year.
- 11) That we be permitted to continue our organizational structure on an interim basis.

Recommendation 1) carried.

Recommendation 2) A motion to defer this until after the report of the Board of Trustees carried. The recommendation was accepted at the fourth session.

Recommendations 3) - 5) carried.

Recommendation 6) carried with a few opposing votes.

Recommendation 7) It was moved and seconded that the Committee plan for the youth rally, and present these plans for approval at the next conference. (Carried with a few opposing votes.)

Recommendations 8, — 11) carried.

## V. MUSIC AND HYMNAL COMMITTEES

Brother Helmut Janzen, chairman, reported the names of the committee members, and the members present came to the platform.

A. Report of Music Committee (Not read in 1965, but included in the yearbook)

Dear Brethren of the Conference:

"Praise ye the Lord. Sing unto the Lord a new song, and his praise in the congregation of saints." Psalm 149:1. What a privilege for us as God's people to sing this new song in praise of our God!

The Canadian Music Committee consists of an executive (three members elected by the Canadian Conference) and the chairman of each provincial music committee. The committee had sessions in the spring of 1963 and 1964 but they did not meet this year. The executive met several times and also three brethren met in British Columbia to finish an assigned paper "Toward a Christian Philisophy of Music". In view of the aggressive work of the provinces and stewardship of money we decided not to have an all-Canadian meeting this year. We envision a music conference on the Canadian level in the near future again.

We trust the following information received from the provincial chairman will help to give further direction and will be of interest.

Ontario: In March 1964 the provincial music committee had their first joint Educational Convention with the Sunday School and Youth Committees. This joint effort proved to be very successful.

One of the efforts of the Ontario Music Committee that has proved very gratifying is the sponsoring of exchange choir programs. These generally are evening services where the choir gives the program. The committee arranges these visits annually so that no church is overlooked.

Manitoba: As in past years several districts continue to find the annual Songfest during the summer months of special benefit. Brother Victor Martens conducted a series in the Central District and brother John Neufeld of Lena gave direction to "Kurse" in the Western District.

A new venture was the special fall conference in Winnipeg under the sponsorship of the Christian Education Committee of Manitoba, at which time brother Wilbur Sutherland of I.V.C.F. and others served with messages. The Music Committee conducted four workshops as their part of the program and arranged for various musical times.

A study session is planned for in November 1965 and a choral retreat for the afternoon of the third Sunday in May, 1966.

Saskatchewan: In August of 1964 the Northern District had a Songfest. The conductors of the participating churches shared in the rehearing and performances of the musical numbers.

In February the Music Committee had a joint conference with the Christian Education Committee. Brother Victor Martens lectured on topics such as: Music in Our Church, Music in the Home, and Music as an Outreach.

Alberta: The Music Committee assisted in providing musical numbers for the Alberta Youth Camp. A workshop on Music and Personality Development was conducted at the annual Youth Workers' Conference at Vauxhall.

A conductors' workshop was held in Gem during the first weekend in April. This was an intensive short course. The congregational song leaders and the Sunday School and church choir conductors received much help in the actual conducting techniques. The course also included lectures and discussions on the topics: The Conductor, The Choral Rehearsal, Leading Congregational Singing, and Building a Repertoire. Brother Helmut Janzen served during the course.

**British Columbia:** In August brother Peter Klassen introduced the conductors to new music. Two sessions of repertoire reading were held. In September brother Victor Martens served in two sessions devoted to conducting techniques.

District Songfests were initiated by the committee. The Yarrow-Chilliwack area presented a program based on the historical progression of church music. The Clearbrook-Abbotsford churches jointly presented a cantata, "Penitence, Pardon and Peace" on Good Friday. Future activities will largely be held in cooperation with the Provincial Education Committee.

## B. Recommendations of the Music Committee

Brother Helmut Janzen read the following recommendations and moved their adoption:

 That the brethren and sisters in the Conference continue to share in the music ministry by active participation and prayer support.

2) That the music executive be elected every three or four years, pending on the times of the conference sessions in the future.

- 3) That the monies continue to be in by the end of May each year for the M.B.B.C. Music Bursary Fund.
- 4) That a budget of \$800.00 be accepted for 1965-66.

Recommendation 1) was accepted.

Recommendation 2) was amended to read "that the executive be elected for one year, and that long term planning be referred to the study commission on conference structure" (Carried as amended)

Recommendation 3) carried.

Recommendation 4) deferred until after the budget presentation.

#### C. Election of the Music Committee Executive

Candidates: Albert Dyck, B.C.; Helmut Janzen, B.C.; John Goertz, Ontario; John Martens, Manitoba; J. K. Schroeder, N.Saskatchewan; John Durksen, Ontario.

Elected: Helmut Janzen, John Martens, J. K. Schroeder.

Brother J. K. Schroeder led the congregation in the singing of the hymn, "Take my Life and Let it Be, Consecrated Lord to Thee".

## D. Report of the Hymnal Committee

Brother Peter Klassen read the report and moved its acceptance. It is a pleasure to greet the Conference on behalf of the Hymnal Committee and to report briefly of the year's activities:

### First Meeting:

In December, 1964 the Canadian Hymnal Committee met at MBBC to examine every song in our present English hymnal (the grey book) as a group and to grade each one. All songs were given a grading of 1 (accept), 2 (tentative acceptance) or 3 (tentative rejection). Choices were made on the basis of suitability of text and tune, suitability of translation or harmonization, familiarity and actual use in the churches. This twoday session served to select the core material in our present hymnal.

# Second Meeting:

This meeting was held shortly ofter the previous one — January 3-4, 1965, also at MBBC. Present at this meeting were the executive from the respective conferences, and was out first joint session. The purpose of this meeting was to consider ways and means of effectively carrying out the hymnal project and to make the necessary plans.

The following should be noted:

- 1) The structure of the hymnal committee was finalized, and will consist of 4 musicians and 2 theologians (3 from each conference).
- A list of factors to be considered when making selections of committee members was drawn up.
- 3) The duties and responsibilities of the hymnal committee were listed in detail, from which the following bear mention:
  - a) All members are expected to attend all meetings.

- b) The hymnal committee will work in close co-operation with the music committees of the respective conferences, and will be responsible to the Bord of Reference and Counsel of the General Conference.
- c) The Hymnal Committee assigns special tasks to individuals or groups and receives reports from them for review. It also welcomes material and comments from interested individuals or groups from the constituency at large.
- d) It will work in consultation with the publishing houses of the respective conferences.
- e) It will prepare progress reports and submit these to the respective conferences and to the General Conference when in session.
- f) The Hymnal Committee stands at the centre of the hymnal project and is responsible for the publication of a new English hymnal for the M. B. Church of North America.
- 4) The expenses in connection with the work are to be carried by the respective conferences until the General Conference sessions in the summer of 1966. From that time on it is to become an official project of the General Conference and financed from General Conference funds.
- 5) A tentative publishing schedule was accepted.
- A tentative table of contents for the hymnal was presented and accepted.

Note: Since our representation on the full committee was limited to three members, we asked the CRC to appoint the theologian representative for Canada. Brother Eugene Gerbrandt was selected.

Third Meeting: June 7-10, 1965, at Fresno, California.

This was the first meeting of the full Hymnal Committee and represented something of a milestone for us. The committee was organized on a permanent basis with Paul Wohlgemuth (Tabor College) as chairman; Eugene Gerbrandt (Saskatoon) vice - chairman; Peter Klassen (MBBC) secretary; and other members included Dietrich Friesen (Pacific College); Victor Martens (MBBC); and Elmer Martens (Fresno). Some publicity regarding this meeting appeared in our papers.

Items on the agenda which received attention were:

- 1) The table of contents was reviewed and revised and will shortly be mailed to all pastors, choir leaders, and interested persons for help in making hymn selections for the new book. This questionnaire will assist the committee in deciding how many hymns are required for various sections or topics. An explanatory letter will accompany the questionnaire.
- A statement of philosophy underlying the publication of the new hymnal was presented and tentatively accepted.

- 3) The main task before the committee consisted in a thorough examination of every hymn in the two hymnals. All hymns were given a tentative grade. Since the respective committees had already examined their own books, this represented a joint examination. There was a good deal of discussion concerning the merits or demerits of various hymns. The varied tastes of congregations were taken into account. At present it would seem that the "core material" of both books would be represented by about 450 songs. It is expected that about 150—200 English hymns from other sources will be added, especially in those areas where our own are weak.
- 4) Plans for the future included various tasks assigned to committee members. Next meetings will be in December, 1965 at MBBC and August, 1966 at Tabor College, prior to the General Conference.
- 5) Tentative publishing schedule is as follows:
  - 1967 manuscript completed, including workshop aids, etc.
  - 1968 Clearance of permissions and copyrites.
  - 1969 proof reading and engravings.
  - 1970 January 1, delivery to printer.
  - 1970 June 1, delivery from printer.
  - 1970 July 1, publication date, in time for the Canadian Conf.

#### **General Comments**

We are just at the beginning of the new hymnal project and realize there is a great deal of work yet to be done. We are challenged by the knowledge that the singing by the congregations in our churches is of great importance in our total worship to God. To fulfill this task should be our contest striving.

We are pleased to report that the work on the hymnal has been carried on in a fine spirit of unity and mutual understanding. We are convinced that the new hymnal will draw our conferences more closely together.

In the meantime we encourage all of you to take an interest in this project. Some of our old hymns need new translations. Some new hymns ought to be written to give expression to aspects of our faith that should receive greater public emphasis (such as non-resistance). We further encourage our churches to use the present M. B. hymnals and to make plans to purchase the new one when it becomes available.

On behalf of the Hymnal Committee, Peter Klassen (Secretary).

The report was accepted.

Brother John Goertzen presented the names of the brethren to serve at the communion.

Brother H. S. Rempel brought the concerns of our brotherhood to the Lord in a fervent closing prayer.

Brother J. P. Redekopp, Manitoba, opened the session by leading in the singing of the songs "Blessed Assurance" and "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing my Great Redeemer's Praise."

The moderator introduced brother John H. Froese, assistant sup-

erintendent of schools for Yukon.

Brother Froese made an appeal for teachers of our Conference and possibly for a minister to move to the north to strengthen the Christian witness. Brother Froese led in the opening prayer.

The secretary read the minutes of the afternoon session and

moved their adoption. The minutes were accepted as read.

At this time the agenda was altered and the Bethesda Committee came to the platform (Details of Bethesda Committee recorded under Section E Relief and Public Welfare.)

# VI CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE

## A. Report

A brief report was read by chairman brother C. C. Warkentin after his introduction of committee members.

Dear Brethren of the Conference:

We have made efforts in line with paragraph 3 of our last year's report to bring about publication of the constitution in loose leaf form. The cost of the constitution printed in loose leaf form could amount to \$1.25 per individual copy which we hope may prove economical in the long run. In view of impending important constitutional changes we have decided to await developments along this line before we go to the actual printing of the constitution at this time.

At this occasion we wish to present to you for adoption the constitution for the Mennonite Brethren Bible College in Winnipeg,

which has been received since the last conference.

The report was adopted.

# B. Constitution of the M.B. Bible College and College of Arts

Brother Warkentin presented the following draft of the section of the Conference constitution applying to the Mennonite Brethren Bible College and College of Arts:

#### 1. The Institution

## a) Aim

The M.B.B.C. is an institution of the Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Church. It seeks to provide opportunity for men and women to prepare for service in the Kingdom of God, as ministers, teachers, missionaries, choir leaders and other ministries.

b) Granting of Degrees

The M.B.B.C. is authorized by the Canadian Conference to grant degrees to graduates who successfully complete the various theo-

logical and other courses offered by the institution and which are approved by the Board and the Conference.

- c) The Administrative Officers
- i) The President shall be responsible directly to the Board in all matters of administration, personnel, and general and spiritual welfare of the institution.
- ii) The President shall make annually to the Conference in session a detailed report of the internal operation of the College.
- iii) The Dean of the institution shall be responsible to the President in all matters related to curricula and internal academic matter.
- iv) The Dean shall advise the President in the appointment of faculty and staff.
- v) The Dean shall assume the responsibility of the President in the latter's absence.

#### 2. The Board

- (a) The Board consists of elected representatives from the provincial conference. The members are elected at the regular session of the Conference from candidates submitted by the provincial conference.
  - (b) Representation
- i) The number of members in the Board is regulated by electing one representative for every 2,000 church members (or fraction thereof) in each provincial conference.
- ii) The M.B.B.C. Alumni Association shall have one representative to the Board. He shall have the same rights, duties, and responsibilities as the other members except that he may not be elected to the executive committee of the Board.
  - (c) Term

All representatives from the provinces shall be elected for a three-year term of service.

(d) Organization

After each Conference session the Board shall meet for organization and provide the necessary officers. To facilitate the practical execution of the work of the executive and to economize on travelling expenses it is advisable that the members of the executive be from Manitoba. This does not necessarily apply to the office of the chairman. The chairman, the assistant chairman, and the secretary form the executive of the Board.

(e) Meetings

Two regular meetings of the Board shall take place annually: one at the time of the Conference in session, and one in the winter at a time designated by the executive of the Board. Special meetings may be called upon the consent of the majority of the members of the Board and the consent of the Committee of Reference and

Counsel. The travelling expenses incurred by the members of this committee shall be borne by the Conference treasury.

#### (f) Duties

## i) Duties of the Board

aa) The Board shall have general supervision of the institution and shall administer its affairs. It shall have full authority and freedom of action pertaining to the institution within the scope of the decisions and policies of the Canadian Conference.

bb) The board shall make recommendations such as are necessary for the development of the institution to the Conference in session.

cc) The Board shall have authority to appoint committees as it sees fit for the proper operation and administration of the business of the institution and such committees shall be responsible to the Board.

dd) The Board shall appoint the President of the College. This appointment must be ratified by the Conference in session.

ee) The Board shall appoint the Dean of the College upon the recommendation of the President.

ff) The Board shall appoint the faculty and staff after due consideration has been given to the recommendation of the President. All recommendations to the Board shall be made in consultation with the executive.

gg) The Board is authorized to borrow money for operational purposes providing such funds are within the limits of the approved budget.

hh) The Board shall recommend to the Conference the sale or purchase of property in the form of land and/or buildings. If such recommendations are approved, the subsequent transactions are carried out according to the provisions of the constitution and in consultation with the executive committee.

ii) The Board is authorized to receive special donations, bequests and gifts to be used for the operation of the College and for special projects approved by the Conference.

# ii) Duties of the Executive Committee

aa) The executive shall meet once a month (or oftener if necessary) to carry out the administrative affairs of the College.

bb) The executive shall be responsible to the Board for the work it has done in the interim of Board meetings.

cc) The executive shall supervise the erection of buildings on the College campus.

#### iii) Duties of Officers

aa) The chairman of the Board shall preside at the meetings of the Board and of the Executive Committee. He shall also be an exofficio member of other committees appointed by the Board. He shall perform such other duties as may come within the scope of a chairman. In the absence of the chairman, the assistant chairman assumes all responsibilities of the chairman.

bb) The chairman upon consulation with the executive shall report annually on the operation of the Board and submit this report to the Conference in session.

cc) The secretary shall keep the record of all sessions of the Board and of the executive committee. He shall enter them into the minutes and shall perform such duties as may be assigned to him or which come within the scope of such an office.

We respectfully move the adoption of this report and the bylaws of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College as included above.

## The Constitution Committee

In accordance with the constitution, this proposed draft, with several corrections that were made in the discussion, is now to be sent to the churches for approval.

#### VII CONFERENCE TREASURY

## A. Treasurer's Report

The report was given by bnother J. J. Riediger.

## Dear Brethren:

It is with mixed emotions that I stand before you at this time and bring you the 1964-65 conference Treasury Report. Our beloved Brother Treasurer was called home in the midst of his work and in the prime of life. This is hard to understand. We do, however, have God's assurance that He makes no mistakes.

The year 1964-65 has been another prosperous one for the Conference. The funds have come in so that all conference undertakings have been fulfilled as planned. The verse found in II Cor. 8:12 "For if there be first a willing mind it is accepted according to that a man hath and not according to that he hath not" seems to indicate the spirit of our brotherhood at to this past year.

There are two items which are included in the statement this year for the first time:

1. The funds that were sent to Br. C. C. Warkentin for the Endowment Fund. An amount of \$13,217.71 is shown as in and out. Figures supplied by Br. Warkentin.

2. The MCC monies that have been sent directly to MCC provincial headquarters. This sum is \$88,714.37 for a period of 12 months ending Nov. 1964. This is the close of their year and the figures were supplied by MCC Canada.

It is pleasing to note that the Foreign Missions contributions are up a little over 9% this year. This is encouraging, as this work cannot stop but has to grow.

When checking comparisons with last year it is encouraging to note that our giving is up indicating prosperity and blessing from above. May God give us the wisdom to apply this prosperity to His glory for the furtherance of the work in His kingdom.

I would also like to express my sincere appreciation and gratitude for the wonderful co-operation and guidance from the committees involved, as well as the co-operation received from the treasurers of the provinces.

The Cash balance at June 1, 1964 plus all cash receipts during the fiscal year 1964, 1965, less all disbursements during the same period show a cash balance in agreement with the cash on hand and the balance of the Conference account at the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce as of May 31, 1965. This balance is verified by the signatures of our Committee in the Conference Treasury books.

Books are kept neat and in order.

#### VIII. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

# A. Report and Balance Sheet.

After introducing the Board of Trustees, Brother J. J. Riediger read the general report and the capital funds balance sheet and moved their adoption.

# 1. Report

Dear Brethren:

Paul in II Cor. 9 outlines the spirit in which they are to make offerings showing in verse 12 the abundance of funds for the saints through administration, also thankfulness towards God for the facilities available for this giving.

We as M.B. Conference, seem to have facilities available to give abundantly. May we be found as true stewards in this respect.

As a Board of Trustees we wish to report the following:

- 1. Negotiated a loan for \$175,000 to facilitate the construction of the College Building program.
- 2. Establish a valuation for the Bible College and set up the records.

- 3. Set up a capital fund balance sheet for the conference showing the fixed assets and the net invested in capital after depreciation. The liquid assets and liabilities are used by the different committees as working capital.
- All budgeted payments for capital have been received and applied to capital debt.
- a) The assets and liabilities of Christian Press have been transferred to the Conference name and it now will operate as a Conference work and not a separate corporation. All future profits or deficits will be absorbed by the Conference.
- b) There is an inventory of approximately \$25,000.00 at Christian Press belonging to the Conference. This consists of hymnals, German and English, Historic books and booklets that the Conference has instructed to be printed and paid for. This inventory has never been reflected in the operation of the Conference but the cash sales from the inventory have been recorded.
- 6. In view of the annuity program started by our Mission Board through the corporation of the General Conference in the U.S.A, considerable thought and investigation has been given this matter. We would like to present a recommendation for consideration to the conference regarding this matter.

If you will now turn to the next page we would like to explain the capital fund balance sheet.

The discussion of the reports was postponed. The assistant moderator made the announcements. He pointed out that after hearing the treasurer's report, we ought to be grateful for God's blessing in the material realm. Brother F. H. Friesen, Manitoba, expressed this gratitude to our Heavenly Father in his closing prayer.

# Fourth Session - Tuesday Morning, July 5, 1965

Brother Albert Dyck, B.C. led the congregation in the singing of the hymn "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less". The moderator called upon brother John H. Redekop, Fresno, California to lead in the invocation. Brother Redekop underscored I Thess. 5:25 in his reading of several verses of the Scriptures. Brother Redekop reported on his recent visit in Eastern Europe and brought greetings from an evangelical church in Prague, the Mennonite Church in East Germany, individual Christians behind the iron curtain, as well as from brother and sister Hugo Jantz, and brother and sister John Klassen and their churches. Brother Redekop

gave a short, but vivid account of his experiences and of the problems of Christians in Eastern Europe. He pointed out that some of their problems are similar to those of our churches. Brother Redekop paid tribute to our fathers who strove to retain the purity of the gospel; he challenged the younger delegates to prevent the "intellectualization" of the gospel. Brother Redekop led in the opening prayer.

#### VIII. BOARD OF TRUSTEES (continued)

#### B. Recommendations

Brother Riediger read and moved the adoption of the recommendations.

#### 1) re Conference Inventory at Christian Press

Taking into consideration the past methods of handling these inventories by committees and by the Christian Press, and taking into consideration the fact that Christian Press is no longer working as a corporation, but is owned and operated by the Conference, we recommend:

That the inventory of stocks be given the Christian Press and that in future the Christian Press management be responsible for inventory and for keeping the committees informed as to stocks on hand.

This would have the following effects:

- a) give Christian Press a better working capital
- b) provide stricter control of conference inventory
- c) place responsibility for sales promotion of printed material with the management of the Press
- d) assure better control of outside purchases (eg. S.S.)

# 2) Recommendations regarding annuities

In view of the expansion of Conference activities, of the increased cost in capital construction, of the continual demands for capital funds in mission work, of the inadequacy of past methods of financing to meet present expansion, in view of the danger that the present areas of work might have to be restricted, we recommend that the Conference:

- a) approve the annuity method for financing capital projects
- b) authorize the Board of Trustees to arrange the necessary changes in the charter to enable the implementation of this program
- c) authorize the Board of Trustees to arrange a contract with a Trust or Insurance Company until the necessary amendment to the charter become effective.

At this time the secretary read **Recommendation 2** of the Interim Christian Education Committee deferred from the second

session. This recommendation carried. (See Interim - Christian Education Committee.)

Recommendation 1 carried.

Recommendation 2. Brother Riediger and brother Quiring gave further explanations of annuities. After a number of questions had been answered, the recommendation was accepted without a dissenting vote.

## C. What is an Annuity?

An annuity is a specified income to be paid to the insured person during his or her life after specified age limit is reached in consideration of previous payment or payments.

A gift-annuity agreement is a contract drawn up by the donor and the Board of Trustees of the Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference of North America to give the donor a specific amount of interest on his or her gifts for the rest of the life of the donor.

A portion of each annuity is considered an immediate gift to the Board of Trustees for the purpose designated. This amount is determined by an actuary. The balance is invested in Conference projects and can only be considered a gift on the death of the annuitant or donor.

The return on these gifts are determined by the age of the donor (whether single or joint agreement,) or by length of time held before the payments begin. Payments may begin six months or 1 year from the date the agreement is made and payable annually or semi-annually.

There are tax advantages from the estate point of view. The income tax regulations have to be explored.

Different forms of annuity can be drawn up such as a gift annuity or a revocable gift agreement in which a portion of the gift can be returned to the donor on a 30 or 60-day notice.

The advantages of this program are that your money is helping the Conference in its total missionary program. You can see its progress and, at the same time, have an income for life.

The following organizations have their annuity programs established:

1) Board of Trustees of General M.B. Conference (started).

2) Salvation Army.

- 3) Canadian Bible Society.
- 4) United Church of Canada Foreign Missions Program.

5) Moody Bible Institute.

- 6) Back to the Bible.
- 7) Wheaton and Le Tourneau Colleges, and many others. Returns on annuity contract vary from 3-8 % depending on circumstances.

#### SECTION C — MISSIONS

# I. BOARD OF MISSIONS (General Conference of M.B. Churches)

Brother Quiring invited members of the board and the missionaries present to the platform. Brother J. J. Toews, assistant chairman of the board of missions, introduced them and read II Peter 3:9.

#### A. Report

Brother J. H. Epp, associate general secretary of the board of missions, read parts of the report:

We greet the conference with the words of Isaiah 53:11 -54:3. "He shall see of the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied; by his knowledge shall my righteous servant justify many; for he shall bear their iniquities. Therefore will I divide him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he hath poured out his soul unto death; and he was numbered with the transgressors; and he bare the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors. Sing, O barren, thou that didst not bear; break forth into singing, and cry aloud, thou that didst not travail with child; for more are the children of the desolate than the children of the married wife, saith the Lord. Enlarge the place of thy tent, and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitations; spare not, lengthen thy cords, and strengthen thy stakes; for thou shalt break forth on the right hand and on the left; and thy seed shall inherit the Gentiles, and make the desolate cities to be inhabitied." This truth is expressed in the New Testament in other words when Jesus says: "Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone, but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit."

The unchangeable law of God is that life is produced only in direct proportion to the extent that we are also willing to suffer and even to die. These birth pangs must be experienced, not only by the missionaries on the field, but by every individual member of the body of Christ. The Apostle Paul said: "My little children, of whom I travail in birth again, until Christ be formed in you." His continual prayer was, "that I may know Him and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings, being made conformable unto His death."

The parents and pastors who have a deep concern for the spiritual welfare of those entrusted to them know of these spiritual sufferings. But if we as a conference are going to do the task of winning men and women of the world to Christ, we will have to enter into these experiences of suffering. In an affluent society such as ours, it is becoming more of a problem, to find people who are willing to take upon themselves the privations of missionary life; the privations of encouraging our children to expose themselves to such a life, the privations of sacrifices of our earthly wealth to give to missions. Love of self and the fear of suffering are taking a

strangle-hold on us. May we be stirred afresh to be ready to take up our cross and follow Christ.

We thank God for the many who have been doing just this. God has graciously kept and protected our missionary staff in the Congo in the midst of dangers and uncertainties. God has answered your prayers on their behalf. One of our missionaries in Mexico, Sister Elizabeth Petkau, was called home to be with the Lord while she was faithfully serving Him in the field of nursing. We want to pay tribute to her faithful service. Though we cannot understand why the Lord would take her after such a brief time of service, we submit to God and are confident that also this will be to the furtherance of the gospel.

We have a splendid missionary force of 208 active missionaries working in 11 of our own fields and in 6 other fields where they serve with other service agencies. These are working together with a host of national workers in numerous churches. Most of these churches have their own national pastors who are pastoring thousands of members. Missionaries spend much time in a Bibleteaching ministry in the churches and in conferences. In some countries we still have to operate grade and secondary schools. Most of the grade schools are under the direction of the nationals, but we still need missionary help in the secondary schools.

Through our literature program we are trying to reach those who are learning to read. With other missions, we must confess that this is a field that we have just begun to enter, and much more needs to be done.

The radio ministry also affords glorious opportunities of reaching the multitudes. In practically all of our fields, we have a radio outreach. Eternity alone will reveal just how many have come to a saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ through such a ministry. Many of them come to our churches. Others again identify themselves with other mission groups. But we thank God for its ever-increasing opportunity of reaching the many through the radio work. The doors are still wide open and all fields present new challenges where we will need more workers and more finances.

We thank God for the 14 new missionaries that we have been able to process during this past year. The Lord willing, these will be on the field by the end of the year. We also thank God that our churches have increased their giving, so that we have been able to increase the budget 5 % annually according to the decision of the General Conference. We are especially grateful to God that He has enabled the Canadian churches to contribute so liberally. May the Lord bless each one for your prayerful interest and your generous support. We would like to give you a brief report of each of the fields. Since our work is so vast, and our time limited, these reports, of necessity, must be very sketchy.

1) Brazil. We believe that the Lord has a great people in this

large land. A little more than a year ago, it was spared a Communistic takeover. The doors are wide open now for the gospel. The missionaries and the national believers are courageous and busily at work. The national churches, established through the efforts of our European Mennonite Brethren people and those established by our North American missionaries, have in this past year organized these believers into a national conference, representing 256 members and 14 churches or preaching places.

The enrolment at the Bible Institute has increased from twelve to twenty this year. Besides their studies, the students are led into practical Christian work. The efforts of the school during the last two years have led to the establishment of a church in a Curitiba suburb. This year they are going to a new area.

The orphanage operates with 72 children. This year they have more Brazilians on the staff, who are fine Christians and dedicated to the Lord and to the children. It is important to have Brazilian staff members, so that the children learn the genuine Brazilian culture in which they will spend the rest of their lives. Many conversions have taken place and a goodly number have been baptized this past year.

On the same piece of land where the Bible Institute, orphanage and the Eberaba M.B. Church are located, we also find the Ginasio. Bible instruction is given in all grades. Many have made decisions for Christ in the past year.

In our missionary outreach the work in Sao Paulo is progressing nicely. Recently a parcel of land was purchased for erecting a church building. A new place is being opened for a gospel witness in the western part of Brazil.

2) Colombia. This country is wide open for the gospel today, but politically and economically, it is rather shaky. Many predict that this will be the next Latin American country that the Communists will try to take over.

Churches in the Cali area have experienced a wonderful in-

gathering of souls several months ago. Careful preparations were made beforehand by having special prayer meetings, house visitations and literature distribution. During the months of March and April special evangelistic services were conducted at the various places of worship, with the result of over 400 professed decisions for Christ. This indeed, is refreshing, for which we should especially praise God. Evangelism and churchbuilding are carried on by nationals and missionaries in many different places, in the Valle, the area about Cali and in the Choco, near the border of Panama.

This past year a radio program was inaugurated over a powerful station in Cali. The program is aired at 1:00 p.m. Sunday.

This is a strategic time, and good results can be expected.

In six churches they have grade schools taught by national teachers. A secondary school has been started at La Cumbre this past year. It is planned that they will also offer the Normal School course here in due time, to prepare Christian teachers for the public schools as well as for our church schools. The Bible School is operated in Cali. They are in need of students with enough academic training. The missionaries are also busily engaged in teaching Bible classes in the various churches.

We have two nurses working in the Cali University Hospital. The nurses are good witnesses there and are organizing Bible study classes to which the nurses and doctors are coming.

3) Congo. When we reported to the Canadian Conference a year ago, the rebels in the Congo had overrun a large territory affecting much of our field. The missionaries who were beginning to return to Kikwit had to get back to Leo due to the unsettled circumstances. This, together with health problems, caused the Arnold Priebs and the A. J. Esaus to come home on an extended furlough.

We praise God that there is relative quietness at present and that the missionaries are again active in Kikwit and other centers. The nationals are courageously moving ahead. The field reports of more conversions in the past year and more literature distributed and sold than in a similar period of time when peace prevailed. New opportunities in the radio and the follow-up work present themselves.

We will need to consider opening a permanent work center in Leopoldville. We need further personnel to help in the Bible teaching and training ministry. We need teachers to give guidance, especially in the secondary school system. Pray that we may have the needed wisdom and courage to enter the doors that are now open.

4) Europe. We have cause for gratitude as we see what God is doing through the few workers that we have sent there. There are eight churches or places of worship established in Germany and Austria. Our brethren also serve in many other churches over the week-

ends, and lecture often at church Bible conferences. This is a blessing and God is rewarding those diligent labors of love.

6) Japan. The field of Japan continues to be a tremendous challenge. Steadily new churches are developing and being established. This requires the purchase of building sites and the erection of churches. Churches, after they have become established, are

assuming greater and greater financial responsibility in paying the salary of the pastors as well as in repaying the loans needed to build the churches. However, where we enter new centers, we have to be willing to advance the funds to secure these meeting centers. During the next year we will need about \$100,000 to meet this need. Two-thirds of this will be a loan to the Japan churches. We are looking for friends who would like to invest in these projections.

Our seminary in Japan is training national pastors who are coming back to serve our churches. Our daily radio program is also an effective means in introducing many of the millions in Osaka to the gospel of Christ and to our church program. A monthly radio rally is held at a central public meeting place. It is here where decisions are made for Christ. These converts are then introduced to our established churches or they become a nucleus of a new potential church.

7) Mexico. This field is courageous and energetic. The national brethren are willing to shoulder greater responsibility in planning and administering the evangelistic advance. Revival is being experienced and souls are turning to Christ. The mission operates principally in three areas—in and about Durango, the Nuevo Ideal area, and near the U. S. - Mexico border, across from our South Texas Latin American churches. This summer a missionary couple will open the fourth area of evangelistic outreach, namely in Monterrey.

Short term Bible schools are conducted in various churches. These are proving to be a great help in establishing the believers, and in reaching others for Christ. For the coming year, a strong literature program has been planned with Durango as the center. This holds great potential for the gospel outreach. The maternity clinic in Nuevo Ideal is serving both the nationals and the Old Colony Mennonites. Through it many are hearing the gospel. Our missionaries were also appointed by the health department to carry the innoculation program to ten villages. They had to visit each village three times. This has won the hearts and confidence of many people for the missionaries.

8) Panama. The gospel outreach is continuing to grow in the tropical jungles of the Darien province near the Columbia border. The Indians and colored believers are carrying the good news to their own people with good success. Our missionaries go there in the summer and carry on a program of evangelism and Bible teaching. The results are gratifying. Also during the summer months, in connection with evangelism, the missionaries carry on an intensive literacy program. The missionaries produce readers, Bible story books and translate portions of Scriptures in both the Waunana and Epera languages.

We are co-operating with the Department of Education of Panama, and they have made valuable concessions to us. They permit the mission to supervise the literacy work among the aforementioned Indians, and have promised to salary the teachers. One of our missionary couples is now in Panama City supervising a number of capable Indians while they are receiving training to become teachers to their own people.

9) Paraguay. In this land we work in close co-operation with our Mennonite Brethren people that immigrated there from Europe. Here also, we are happy to report that God's blessings are being experienced.

Among the Indians we work with and through "Licht den Indianern", a mission society with its headquarters in Filadelfia. The work is principally carried on among the Lengua and Chulupie There are at present more than a thousand believers. Indians. They live among the Mennonite settlements of the Chaco. The mission serves these people in various ways. Besides the main evangelistic outreach, a good school system has been developed with grade schools in most villages. Indians are the teachers in such schools. At Yalve Sanga, they have a school for preparing the capable and diligent Indians for Spanish school. They have a Spanish school for the advanced Indian students and the Paraguayan children of the community. This school is proving to be a door to the homes of the Paraguayans for the gospel. The Bible School is training the preachers and leaders for the Indian churches. There are also schools for girls, teaching them the art of home-making, fundamental hygiene and Christian ethics. The

missionaries recently were much encouraged in their work when a Chulupie couple volunteered as missionaries to the Morro Indians.

The work in Asuncion is being carried on in three places. Souls are being saved and added to the church. The Bible School is offering evening classes in two churches, which enables more people to attend. With the assistance of the Mission Board a suitable tract of land with a good building on it, was purchased lately for their school program. They will conduct their Bible School there next year. The plan is to eventually have a grade school, secondary and normal school on this site. All instruction will be in the Spanish language, and will be an effort to reach the Paraguayan people in that large capital city.

Brother Cornelius Balzer reported briefly. In his report he emphasized the recent changes in the schedule of radio releases on the Luxemburg station.

#### II. BOARD OF WELFARE

#### A. Report:

Brother John Wiebe introduced board members and brother and sister H. W. Dueck, board workers from Brazil. Brother Wiebe read the report of the board and moved its adoption. Dear Delegates:

Greetings in the name of Christ, our Lord, who loved us and gave Himself for us.

Your General Conference Board of General Welfare is happy for the opportunity to present its report to the Canadian Conference of what God has done through the ministry of our churches to the needs of the world.

# The Ministry of Love: God's Charge

God's greatest deed is summarized in the message, "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son." And because He loved us so much, we now can love. In fact, this is our most important ministry, our reason for existence — as individuals and as a brotherhood.

How is your Board of General Welfare fulfilling this great purpose of God?

First, by depending on the wisdom of His will and guidance as we face the gigantic task in the world around us.

Second, through effective planning that is in step with the rapidly changing times in which He has placed us.

we as His servants are dedicated to the Lord in this way, the work of our Board brings glory to His name.

# The Ministry of Love: Our Response

During the past year your Board has been used of God in these ministries:

Your office staff in Hillsboro carries the day-to-day responsibility for the world-wide program of the Board of General Welfare. Three men and a secretary administer the Board activity in Christian Service, in the South American aid program, in relief and in other services.

Your nine-member Board, composed of both Canadian and U.S. members, meets in annual session and makes the decisions that govern all Board operations. Representing the 29,000 Mennonite Brethren of North America, these nine men reflect the concerns and wishes of the church members who support the program. With the death of Brother G. H. Sukkau the number of members has been temporarily reduced to eight, but J. J. Riediger has consented to serve as Canadian treasurer. (Canadian Board members are: C. J. Rempel, John Wall, John Wiebe, and D. B. Wiens.)

Your workers on assignment are the real rutting-edge, the forces

Third, by serving Him and our neighbor with those talents which God has entrusted to us and especially to our young people. When on the front lines of world need. They are sent into the world to serve the Lord with their specialized ministry of love.

Your program in which each one of your churches shares in its involvement all around the world, has three major aspects, which we here illustrate with a few real-life situations

#### 1) Christian Service

In Truro, Nova Scotia the first continuing Christian Service project is being launched this month with the endorsement of the Canada Inland Mission. Several teachers arrive this week for summer school and will teach in the city schools and assist Brother John Esau in his Christian witness to the community.

In Leopoldville, Congo Agnes Konrad, Matsqui, British Columbia last month had the joy of leading a number of her school pupils to salvation in Christ. This is the result of her witnessing in her school classes which, in addition to the children of our missionaries, include the children of diplomats from several non-Christian religions.

Last summer in Camp Arnes, Manitoba John Burkholder, Omaha, Nebraska, and Don and Sandra Heinrichs, Marion, Kansas were privileged to lead boys and girls to faith in Christ as they worshiped God together during the camping program.

In **Phoenix**, **Arizona** Rita Matthies, Winnipeg, Manitoba, and Mary Poetker, Lena, Manitoba, made house calls on the families of their kindergarten pupils. One family has responded by attending

church and becoming members. No less than 10 families with either a Mormon or Catholic heritage sent their children to this Mennonite Brethren kindergarten.

In a remote village in northern **British Columbia**, **Nukko Lake**, two young ladies conducted Vacation Bible School last summer and penetrated with the Gospel witness to those who had probably never heard it before. Twenty children were saved as the result of their two-week teaching.

During August the 6-member Christian Youth Caravan will visit three communities in **British Columbia** in their youth-to-youth ministry. Last year's pilot project included Winnipeg, and was well received there. The Caravan demonstrates a new and effective method of bringing the Gospel into the everyday life of the present generation.

These are a few examples of how some of our Mennonite Brethren young people are making a significant impact for the Lord. Including the young people going out, continuing, and returning, the Christian Service Program numbers about 70 persons involved in 1965, in two-year terms and summer service, at home and abroad.

## 2) South America

Some years ago our late Brother G. H. Sukkau, Board of General Welfare worker, encouraged Heinrich Janzen, a young man in Paraguay, to attend Bible School. He did so well that he went on to the Theological Institute in Curitiba. Both schools are supported in part by the Board of General Welfare. Then he received a call from the Mennonite Brethren Church in Blumenau, Brazil to be their minister. He is doing a very good job in the church, in extension work, and also as radio minister. He has two weekly radio broadcasts: one in German and one in Portuguese. Many a listener has found the Lord and several are now attending the church services.

In East Paraguay Arndt Funk is the "doctor on horseback." He brings physical healing to his leprosy patients but always has time to leave a word of testimony and some literature.

In the small village of **Blumental**, **Paraguay** Alvin Enns, Brandon, Manitoba teaches in the local school. He and his wife Sue have been so well received by the community and the church that the council has asked Al to give even more time to serve the congregation. He has consented to extend his term of service one more year which includes the ministry of music and preaching.

A five dollar **Home to Home** gift from Saskatchewan has helped the Marco Fernandez family in Asuncion to buy their first mattress and a hymn book. The father of six children has a very low income and is often unemployed. Some time ago the Gospel has made a child of God out of a drunkard. The family life is now changed but the home lacks most of the essentials of clothing and household supplies. This Home-to-Home gift is one of hundreds given by Men-

nonite Brethren families in Canada and the U.S. to bring relief from the daily routine of misery and want for both body and soul.

In Sarandi, Uruguay a new colony of Mennonite Brethren was facing foreclosure because of repeated crop failures and high interest rates. In emergency action \$16,000 were made available to them of which the Canadian and U.S. Mennonite Brethren conferences each contributed \$2,500 cash grant and \$3,000 loan. The Mennonite Central Committee has given the remaining \$5,000.

The erection of the church building of the Mennonite Brethren Church of Sao Paulo, Brazil is being completed this month and will be dedicated to the Lord. The Board of General Welfare has contributed half of the building expenses.

# 3) Other Services of the Board of General Welfare

In the U.S. and Canada your Board is the liason between the Mennonite Brethren conference and Mennonite Disaster Service, which brings aid in floods, tornadoes, wind storms, fires and earthquakes.

Your Board also carries responsibility for peace education, mental health, mutual aid, stewardship, and a ministry to the aging; study of political involvement of Christians, of race relations, and of a Christian philosophy of vocation, particularly with reference to labor unions.

Again, your Board participates in the operations of the MCC, both in the policy-making decisions and also "on the field," where we are deeply grateful for the young people serving in its program. Also, our relief giving and distribution of food, clothing, blankets, bundles, and other supplies is channeled through MCC.

# The Ministry of Love: The Holy Spirit's Future Challenge

In June the Spirit of God moved among eight representatives of our two major boards, Missions and Welfare, as they met for over a day to consider the possibility of merger. They found a common ground and worked out plans which will be presented to the Boards when they meet in August.

During the following year the Board of General Welfare will continue to:

- strengthen and increase the scope of the Christian Service Program
- continue the support, financial but especially spiritual, of the brethren in South America
- coordinate relief giving of clothing, blankets, and the proposed fall MCC drives
- sharpen up the numerous other services we are engaged in, and emphasize the local congregations' role in becoming more involved in the needs of the world right around them.

These are a few of the tasks that lie ahead. The poor and the lost we always have with us. But while we are fully aware that

our strength is small when compared to the great needs around us we know that His love knows no limits. We can trust Him to work His works of love through us to our lost and needy world. Let us commit ourselves to be faithful in this ministry of love.

The report was adopted.

# C. Report by Brother H. W. Dueck

Brother Dueck, worker of the board on furlough from Brazil introduced Mrs. Dueck and reported on his work at the Theological Institute at Curitiba. He brought greetings with I Thess. 1:1-3 from the South American churches, specifically from the church at Villo Guaira.

# D. Recommendations of the Board of Welfare

Brother John Wiebe read and moved the adoption of the recommendations.

- As a general conference board we work on a three year assignment. However, annually we would commend to you those who work on our behalf:
  - in the Board office in Hillsboro
  - in the various Christian Service assignments
  - and in the schools and churches which we support in South America.

Pray for these people who carry on the Ministry of Love as our Lord commanded.

- Br. H. W. Dueck is returning soon to work in the Theological Institute in Curitiba, Brazil. May we solicit the prayers of this Conference for Brother Dueck and his family.
- 3) We would also recommend:
  - a) that you give your financial support by continuing to take three offerings annually in each church for the Board of Welfare work.
  - b) that as last year, you allow \$4,500 from the Conference treasury for the administration of the M.B. Christian Service program.

The motion carried to accept all of the recommendations.

Brother H. Brucks made announcements and read a telegram of greetings from the General Conference of Mennonites (Recorded under Greetings).

The memorial and communion service followed (Recorded in Part I, **Devotional Services**). After the communion service moderator brother J. H. Quiring, closed the fourth session with prayer.

Brother Henry Voth, Herbert, led the congregation in the singing of "O Worship the King". The moderator introduced Brother Peter Kroeker, mayor of Winkler, Manitoba, who had just returned from a visit to Moscow and Leningrad. Brother Kroeker reported on his work with the Canadian and Russian government authorities, Red Cross and Red Crescent officials in the matter of obtaining visas for members of separated families. Brother Kroeker appealed for intercession on behalf of the attempted unification of these families. He then led in prayer.

The secretary read the minutes of the previous session; these were adopted with several corrections.

Brother Quiring welcomed the missionary couple, brother and sister Abe Dyck of Colombia to the Conference. Brother Brucks conveyed a greeting from brother G. W. Peters with II Tim. 1:6-7. The resolutions committee was instructed to send greetings to brother and sister H. H. Janzen, to Bro. A. Huebert, and to return greetings to brother G. W. Peters. (Inserted with greetings.)

#### III. EVANGELISM

Brother H. J. Brandt, chairman of the committee, introduced committee members and read his report.

# A. Report of the Committee

# 1. Chairman's Report

#### Dear Brethren:

The supreme task of the church is to evangelize. We believe that the gospel is the good news and the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believes. And because we believe this we continue to promote evangelism through the Committee on Evangelism.

We thank God for the reports of blessings, for the souls harvested, for each minister who served as evangelist, and for each church that reached out through evangelism.

The work of the committee has fallen into four general areas. These we wish to share with the conference in order that we might determine more closely whether or not we are going in the desired direction.

Firstly, we have sought to fill the requests of the churches for evangelists or Deeper Life Service speakers. We acknowledge that it has been impossible to work out any reasonable plan whereby we could economically accommodate every request. Time and again we have been faced with the fact that we need a Conference Evangelist.

This brings us to our second area of work, namely, seeking a fulltime evangelist. To date the Lord has not seen fit to give

us one. We have asked ourselves various questions as we have approached the Lord for guidance in this matter. Has the Lord not given us men whose specific gift is that of an evangelist? Have we not prayed the prayer of a righteous man? Is our program not a challenge? Or is the challenge too great to accept? Is our entire approach to evangelism wrong or out of date? Wherein lies our answer? We appeal to the brotherhood for guidance. If we believe that the chief task of the church is evangelism then we must keep this task foremost in our program.

Thirdly, we have attempted to evaluate our approach, and seek to establish a program that would meet the current need of the churches. A general concern of those who serve as evangelists is the absence of non-Christians in the services. This emphasizes the need for a renewal of personal evangelism, visitation evangelism, and a passion for souls in general. Our recommendations of the last three years have pointed out our desire to establish a program that would prepare the Christians for an evangelistic thrust. To accomplish this we envision a program that would employ a man whose task it would be to conduct evangelism workshops, preferably on the local level either prior to evangelistic services or for the purpose of stimulating to year-round evangelism by the congregation. The demand for such a program comes to us from various areas of our country. We believe that God is in it, stirring our churches to the need for community outreach.

If the supreme task of the church is to evangelize, then the cost factor is a secondary matter. However, we have been confronted with the matter of good stewardship in regards to our responsibility to God and the Conference. Since no itinerary could be worked out under our present system, travelling costs have been exceptionally high. For many churches the cost factor has created a severe burden and in the future will handicap their evangelistic activities. We acknowledge that lack of information has created misunderstanding concerning conference policy regarding church financial responsibility. We sincerely trust that the churches will feel free to continue to inquire concerning the policies that have been laid out. (A copy of which accompanies this report.)

We are confident that our brotherhood under the guidance of the Spirit of God will endeavoour to put forth every possible means to further God's work through a united evangelistic effort.

# 3. Conference Conditions for the Evangelistic Services

#### , a) Evangelist

The Committee on Evangelism is there to serve the church by making contact with the evangelist suggested by the church.

The final arrangements are made by the church through direct contact with the evangelist who has declared himself willing to serve.

#### b) Remuneration

The conference assumes the responsibility for the remuneration of the evangelist.

The church is asked to submit to the Committee on Evangelism the number of days the evangelist has served. This should not be left up to the evangelist.

#### c) Travel Expenses

The conference pays the fare for the travel of the conference evangelist. The church is expected to pay the travel expenses for any other evangelist. It is preferred that the evangelist be reimbursed directly by the church, either before the services or immediately thereafter. The committee is prepared to give the church every consideration in this matter.

# d) Offerings

The Conference requests that you have two strong offerings for every five days of services in your church, and that the amount so gathered be sent to the treasurer of the Canadian Conference. (This may be done through the provincial treasurer). All monies should be clearly designated.

# e) Service Report

Since the committee no longer requests the evaluation form to be submitted, it is requested that the church submit to the committee the name of the evangelist, the dates and the number of days served.

With thanks, The Committee on Evangelism.

The report was adopted and several questions were answered.

# B. Recommendations of the Committee on Evangelism

Brother J. Bergen read and moved the recommendations.

- 1) We recommend that the brethren and sisters of our churches pray specifically for the following:
  - a) The work of evangelism through the Committee on Evangelism.
  - b) The work of evangelism in the local churches.
  - c) The need of securing an evangelist. We recommend that as a Conference we claim Matt. 9:38 as God's promise of provision for this need.
- 2) We recommend that the Conference endorse a freer interchange of pastors for the work of evangelism in our churches, and that the Conference encourage the churches to release their pastors for such work.
- 3) We recommend a budget of \$10,500. (Full-time evangelist, assisting churches in evangelism, office expenses.)

## C. Election of the Committee on Evangelism

The Committee on Evangelism is now to be a standing committee in accordance with the vote of the churches. The constitution for this committee has not yet been drafted. By common consentit was agreed that we elect six members, one from each area conference, from the list of candidates submitted by these conferences. According to the number of votes, two members are to serve for three years, two for two years, and two for one year.

A motion carried that the constitution committee be asked to prepare the constitution as it concerns the Committee on Evangelism, and to send copies to the churches in time for action before next year's conference.

#### IV. CANADA INLAND MISSION

#### A. Report

Brother Henry Warkentin, chairman of the committee, introduced committee members and read the report.

Dear Brethren,

It is well that we remind ourselves of the words of Jesus: "I will build my Church." Mat. 16:18. He will do this in very unlikely ways and often in unlikely places as far as our reasoning goes.

As we review the past year, we praise the Lord for the first Mennonite Brethren Church in Quebec, organized October 25th, 1964, with eighteen members. Eight of these are at home in Quebec. The progress of the Church is encouraging. Others are being added. The members are interested and responsive. They are becoming a giving Church, with \$3,291.65 contributed toward missions and local needs.

We are glad to report of the enthusiasm of our workers. The Dycks have been working hard and are willing to continue. The Don Balzers are busy in language study at present and are looking forward enthusiastically to their entering the work in a limited way this coming winter. They have appreciated the experience of the past year; while Brother Balzer was studying and Sister Balzer was teaching, they could become aclimatized to Quebec and its culture. Beginning this year we are supporting them.

Then we would also make mention of the valuable support of a number of teachers in the area. The Ed Wiebes of Vineland have made a great contribution to the growth of the Church. They will be sorely missed as they leave Quebec. The Ben Klassens are a great help with their knowledge of the French language. Some of the others are giving themselves wholeheartedly to the work. This is to be encouraged.

Some preliminary investigation has been carried out regarding possibilities of work in Northern Canada. This, however, is inadequate. We trust that more intensive investigations can be carried out this coming year,

We encourage you all with us to praise God for what He has done in Quebec, and to continue in prayer for the continued building of His Church.

# B. Worker's Report

Brother Ernest Dyck greeted the Conference on behalf of the St. Jerome and St. Therese congregations with I Cor. 15:58. He then read a report which was adopted. Dear Brethren:

In Rom. 1:16 Paul expressed his faith in the Gospel of Christ which is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. During the past year the believers in St. Jerome and St. Therese have been encouraged and strengthened in their faith

as the Lord permitted them to experience the power of the Gospel in saving souls and in transforming lives.

The organizing of the M.B. Church in Quebec on October 25, 1964 was a time of rejoicing and praise for all who had worked and prayed for the establishing of a visible local group of believers. Sixteen adults from three different language groups joined hands and hearts to become members of the church in the Sunday morning service. In the afternoon this infant church had the joy of baptizing the Ferdinand Bouchers upon their confession of faith and added them to the local group.

During the winter months the Lord has blessed the preaching and teaching of His Word. Souls have been saved and a number of Christians have become burdened for the lost and are witnessing to them.

A few weeks ago the Church had the joy of baptizing two young people on their confession of faith in Christ. The Lord willing we are looking forward to another baptismal service in fall. Will you continue to pray that these new believers will grow in grace and in the knowledge of Christ.

We thank the Lord for the teachers who have moved into the province and are learning French and helping in the work. We are looking forward to the Don Balzers entering more fully into the work after a few more months of language study. We will miss the Ed. Wiebes who are returning to Ontario after teaching in Quebec for two years. The brother has been active as choir director and in Sunday School work in our church.

The Ben Klassens who moved into Rosemere last fall will be settling near St. Therese. The brother has been teaching the adult class in the church and has also participated in the preaching of the Word.

The Bible course on "Soul Winning," taught during the winter months has encouraged a number of Christians to begin witnessing for their Lord. One Protestant teacher from St. Jerome, who accepted Christ as her Saviour in October, is spending the summer studying at Moody Bible Institute.

We are continuing to cooperate with other Evangelical groups in the province in youth and literature work. There is also a possibility that the Mennonite Brethren will cooperate with other groups in camp work and in the teaching program of Bethel Bible Institute.

The radio program, "Paroles de Vie," sponsored by our Canadian Young People, is on the air every Sunday. Many are listening to the Word of God who would not have the courage to attend the chapel. The couple we baptized last October listened to the radio program for two years before they began attending the church services. Continue to pray for the ministry of the Word via radio.

As the Mennonite Brethren Church faces the future in Quebec,

its members thank God for your financial help and prayer support in the past. We are counting on you to continue to uphold us in your prayers in the coming year so that the Gospel of Christ may save sinners and transform lives.

The St. Therese group is in dire need of a permanent place of worship. So far we have rented a dwelling for our meetings and now the group has felt led to set aside \$1,000.00 from their offerings towards the purchase of property for a chapel. We need to move forward now to reach the lost in this city. Pray with us that the things which are impossible with man will become possible with God as we "Trust and Obey".

# SECTION D: EDUCATION AND PUBLICATION

# I. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Brother Brucks read on excerpt from the 1963 yearbook concerning the organization and function of this board.

# A. Report

Brother John Wiebe read the report and moved its adoption.

Dear Brethren:

The brethren who have directed education at the institutional level in our conference have been dedicated, sincere and ambitious. Over the years we have built and maintained a number of schools, more or less successfully. There have been changes in the educational programs that have reflected the changing attitudes of our educators, the changes in the previous preparation of the incoming students, and the costs of operating a school. Underlying all these changes have been some basic desires:

- that we further biblical knowledge in the members of our churches.
- that we prepare leaders whom the public can accept and respect as authorities in their field for our church.
- that we maintain centres of theological study to give direction to our constituency.
- that we prepare certain workers in specialized areas such as missions and Christian education.
- that we obtain a greater world and community consciousness to enable us to get more effectively involved in wider world ministry.

There have also been other reasons for building and supporting our institutions. We hope that it has been the objective, even of individuals to advance the influence of certain teachers or communities.

As we look to the future of our total Bible training program

we must be prepared to see some of the weaknesses that exist, and some of the new problems which we are likely to face:

- Our resources in finances, staff, and available student potential are limited. Unnecessary duplication should be avoided as much as possible.
- Our educational needs are so varied that no one institution can successfully meet all these needs. We must have a number of institutions but these should have an integrated educational program.
- Schools, in order to attract students must have adequate facilities, staff, and a fair existing student body. The school must also develop a distinctive character recognizable by potential students and parents.
- Any friction which develops between schools will reduce the effectiveness of those schools. Conference unity must be promoted if our educational program is to remain active and effective.

It is obvious to all that there is no one easy answer to the question of future planning of our educational program. easiest way for our Board to have proceeded would have been to say that since the existing schools are functioning, and since these schools have indicated that they are not anxious for direction from a Canadian Conference board, that we would then simply endorse the existing programs. The suggestion from this Board to the 1964 conference "that we must eventually place our whole theological and liberal arts program under our Canadiain Confenrece", has not been endorsed by some of those most directly involved. Yet, we as a Board feel that it is now time to spell out in more detail, for your consideration, some goals toward which we think we should strive. These come before you not as recommendations for action, but as a brief for discussion and mutual enlightenment. We feel that these goals should be discussed by the delegate body at the conference to get a broad concensus of opinion and then assignments can be made for further planning and action.

To plan for a more economic and more unified educational program, and to facilitate student recruitment, we plan for an educational program as follows;—

Seminary Level — The General Conference Executive is working on this and we endorse their concern with this issue and encourage them in this work.

Bible College Level — At present we do not consider it practical for our Canadian Conference to develop a four year liberal arts college, and we give our approval to the liberal arts program as currently offered at the M.B. Bible College in Winnipeg.

Bible Institute Level — That as much as possible we seek to co-ordinate the work of our Bible Schools. To facilitate this the

Canadian Conference should be given a greater role in the direction of the Bible Institute programs, and in possible eventual centralization.

If centralization of the Bible Institute program occured, this would of course result in considerable dislocation and a temporary loss of local interest and support. This sense of local loss we think would be temporary, and the overall effect could be advantageous since it would, we believe;—

- strengthen the bonds of unity within the conference, since we would all work equally on a joint program.
- facilitate development of a unified program of christian education, and allow an easier delineation of function between the Bible Institute and the Bible College.
- increase the student potential, and the actual enrolment, and therefore the size of the student body at the one institution.
- allow the development of much more widely diversified program at the institute. In this way students who are high school graduates, and who are heading for professions, as well as those with lower academic achievement could be served. A "streaming" would be possible in the larger institution to meet the needs of the diverse student group.
- be advantageous financially. Both library and administrative facilities must exist at an institution regardless of its size. A larger central school would reduce cost per student in these items, while offering a wider and richer choice to the students.

In addition to the major work reported, we have been active in the following projects;—  $\,$ 

Student Services — Three Canadian M.B. students attended the summer seminar for Mennonite students held at Elkhart, Indiana. As in previous years some of the speakers at the seminar were from our Conference. No seminar is planned for the summer of 1965.

The student survey conducted by the U.S. Youth Committee was carried out again this past year. As a Board we reconsidered our position on this survey. In this past year the survey was not completed until well on in the school year. It is planned that this survey be conducted in Canada by our own committee and then the results be forwarded to the U.S. Youth Committee. This should speed the completion of the work, and make the survey results available when they can be of more use.

The board chairman attended part of a "Consultation of Christian Churches and Agencies Regarding Student Work in Canada". This consultation was held at Carlton University May 19-20, and was attended by representatives of the major denominations and the

agencies that work on university campuses. A brief report was given in the Herald, and a more detailed report to the Board just prior to the conference.

The proposal of last year to send one of our brethren to visit the various university campuses in Canada could not be carried out. The brethren we asked to do this could not find time for the work.

Brother Victor Adrian who we had hoped might perform this chaplaincy service, but who could not go, prepared a brief on university work which he presented to the board. This will be used to assist in further planning in this area.

Education Day — The Board was charged with the responsibility for planning an Education Day in the conference. We used the M.B. Herald and direct letters to pastors as our means of publicity. The publicity material covered all our Christian educational institutions rather than the MBBC only. We will appreciate frank comment on this approach.

Teacher Placement Bureau — As in the past, the Board, through Brother Henry Dick, offered its services as an intermediary between our schools and potential teachers. Both the schools and interested teachers were invited to contact Brother Dick. A list of teachers that would be qualified to teach at high school or Bible Institute level was prepared. This information is available to all school administrators.

It is often difficult to see the Lord's hand in the day to day work of school or a committee. When we speak of buildings, and staff recruitment, of student deputation and budget difficits we should remind ourselves of the words in Phillipians 2:3-5 "Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory: but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves. Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others. Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus."

For the Board of Christian Education, John Wiebe (chairman).

The report was adopted.

The question of possible coordination of Bible schools under the Canadian Conference evoked wide discussion.

A motion that this question be referred to a study commission carried.

A further motion that the present Board of Education constitute this study commission also carried.

There was further discussion about other aspects of the report of the Board of Education, including the matter of student services and a liberal arts college. The delegates encouraged the Board in its efforts regarding Education Day. It was suggested that an appropriate bulletin be prepared for the occasion.

# B. Recommendations and Budget of the Board of Christian Education

Brother George Braun read and moved the adoption of the re-

commendations.

The Board of Christian Education was appointed for a two year period. We must now consider the future existence of the Board, its responsibility and representation on the Board.

For Board operation in 1965-66 we recommend; -

- 1) allow travel expenses for at least one meeting per year.
- 2) Budget \$400.00 for conducting and preparing the Canadian portion of the student survey.
- 3) Budget \$100.00 for secretarial and correspondence expenses of the Board.

Regarding the preamble to the recommendations a motion carried that the Board of Christian Education be elected for another two-year period.

Regarding representation on this board, a motion carried that Ontario and Alberta in which no Bible school is functioning at the present time, be permitted to have the chairmen of their education committees on the Board of Christian Education. (The term "Christian education committee" to be interpreted by the provinces concerned.) — See Representation on Board 1963 Yearbook pp. 90-91.

Recommendations 1—3 carried. It was pointed out that according to the constitution the CRC may authorize further expenses if needed.

# A. Report by Chairman of the Board

Brother H. W. Redekopp introduced Board members, read the report, and moved its adoption.

# Dear Brethren:

It is with gratitude to God that we report to our Canadian Conference regarding the operation of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College. As a Board we have met three times during the past year and we have tried to carry out our responsibility as representatives of our entire brotherhood.

We are thankful to our churches for the interest and good-will they have shown to the College in the past year. Groups of students and teachers have visited and served various areas of our constituency and the fine way in which they were always received was most appreciated. We are especially thankful to our churches for the financial support and for the consent given to the College to carry out the building program.

Our college President has carried an extra heavy load during the past year owing to our building activity and we want to thank him and the teachers and staff for the way they all have faithfully discharged their duties.

We are thankful for the students as they have diligently carried on in school and also supported the College financially. We are also thankful for our Alumni who have continually supported our school morally, spiritually and financially.

Through the support of many individuals and the good administration of our College, and also as a result of the fact that we had more students enrolled than originally taken into account in the budget, we are happy to show a surplus in this year's financial report.

We are also happy and grateful to announce that through the action of the Manitoba Government we will be granted a considerable reduction in taxes in the future.

During our Board meeting in January we studied policies to follow in regard to making appointments to the teaching staff of the Bible College. We know that this has been of some concern in our brotherhood. The resulting policies are recorded in the minutes of the Board meeting and should prove helpful guidance for future employment of teachers. One of the items laid down in the policies is as follows: "The prospective teacher of the M.B. Bible College must be in agreement with the Confession of Faith of the Mennonite Brethren Church and be willing to declare his position either verbally or in writing before a committee of brethren agreed upon by the Board of Administration."

The Board reviewed the salary structure and made upward

changes which will be shown in our budget. We feel that this change in schedule was due and also necessary to keep good teaching personnel at our College.

The Board spent considerable time on the question of our College name. The question of re-naming our College has been raised in the constituency from time to time. Since our affiliation with Waterloo Lutheran University this has become a practical problem for us. Waterloo Lutheran University does not permit an affiliation of a Bible College. Consequently we now use two names: The Mennonite Brethren Bible College, and The Mennonite Brethren College of Arts. We use different letterheads and print separate catalogues upon request of Waterloo Lutheran University. The suggestion has been made that we seek to find a name that would cover our entire educational program. This thought has gained considerable support from faculty and staff. It could simply be the "Mennonite Brethren College," or another more neutral name according to the example of Tabor, Pacific, Goshen, Hesston and others. The Board agreed that this question should go to the Committee of Reference and Counsel. The latter committee has in the meantime reviewed this request and has encouraged the College Board to bring this question before the Canadian Conference.

Last year this Conference accepted an estimated building project of \$225,000.00. Except for a few small items the building is now completed. We are happy to report to our brotherhood that the cost has not exceeded this estimate but has been somewhat less. The details will be in our financial report. The buildings have already been of great value to our college. It is still necessary to remove some of the old buildings and landscaping has to be done. After this we will have an attractive campus.

The Board gives thanks to God for the many ways in which He provided for the needs of the College and we recommend the Bible College and the College of Arts to the Conference for further moral, financial and prayerful support.

# B. Report by the President of MBBC

The college president, J. H. Quiring gave the report and moved its adoption.

Dear Brethren:

I present this report to the Conference with deep gratitude to God, to the churches, to the Board, to my fellow-laborers and to the students. We have labored together as individuals and as groups and now look back upon another profitable year at MBBC.

My intention is to report briefly on the operations of the past year and to project plans for the future.

# 1) Faculty

In the final analysis a school will be measured by the calibre of its faculty and the quality of the instruction offered. For this reason those who are responsible for promoting schools are concerned to have teachers on their faculty. We may not have any reason to be boastful but we feel that we have a right to be grateful. The following full-time instructors have worked with diligence and devotion during the past year:

Victor Adrian, B.A. (Hon.), M.Th. David Ewert, M.A., M.Th. Herbert Giesbrecht, M.A., Th.B. Peter Klassen, M.A. Victor Martens, B.A., A.R.C.T. Frank C. Peters, Ph.D., Th.D. J. H. Quiring, B.A., B.D. John A. Toews, Ph.D., B.D. Jacob J. Toews, M.A., B.D. Henry Voth, B.A., B.D.

With the exception of Dr. F. C. Peters all full-time instructors of the College will continue to serve for the coming school year. Brother Harry Loewen, who has taught for several years on a part-time basis, will join the staff for next year. We sincerely regret brother Peters's leaving at this time, but we must yield to his conviction that the Lord leads him to another field of service. We wish him God's blessing and will remember him as a dear brother and colleague.

Most of the faculty members will spend part of the summer months in continuing their studies. Br. Voth took a leave of absence during the second semester to study at the University of Minnesota.

# 2) Staff

We are grateful for a devoted, friendly and efficient staff on campus. During the past summer and fall the new construction and the renovations in the administration building created extra work for some, under adverse circumstances, but all have given of their best to the life of the school.

Brother J. A. Konrad has been very busy as supervisor of buildings and grounds. In the office Anne Schmidt, Alice Dueck and Mrs. Susan Brandt have served well as bookkeeper, secretary and receptionist, respectively. Mrs. Esther Horch, serving parttime, has made a vital contribution as Dean of Women. Students have been well served in the dining hall by Anne Froese, head cook, and her assistants, Katie Thielmann and Mrs. Kay Thiessen.

The Lord will continue to bless them in their respective ministries.

# 3) Curriculum

Our program of studies has been continued with only minor changes. We offered theological courses leading to the B.R.E., Th.B. and B.D. degrees; music courses leading either to a diploma in sacred music or to a B.A. with a major in music; and liberal arts courses which were offered in affiliation with Waterloo University College. The above mentioned B.A. degree is conferred by Waterloo University College.

Beginning with the coming school year our students enrolled at Waterloo will write the Waterloo final examinations according to their time schedule. We believe that this arrangement will be advantageous to all concerned.

Any major adjustments in our program will be made in accordance with current needs and demands and with the approval of the Board. It is our intention to keep our program flexible in order to meet the needs of our constituency.

# 4) Students

We were privileged to enrol 168 students during the course of the year. Of these, 154 were full-time students.

The enrolment figures indicate a number of things to us:

- 1) That we serve mainly our own denomination.
- 2) That an increasing number of non-Mennonite Brethren students show their interest in our school.
- That the College enjoys a fair measure of confidence in all of the provinces.
- 4) That the College continues to draw the professional people and such who have been in the ministry.
- 5) There is a marked increase in the registrations with Waterloo University College.
- 6) The greatest interest of our students lies in the theology program which must continue to represent the core of our teaching program.

On May 30 we graduated 33 students. Of these, three graduated with the B.D. degree, thirteen with the Th.B. degree, and seventeen graduated with the B.R.E. degree. The majority of these graduates had plans for the immediate future. Although our Conference does not assume any direct responsibility for placing graduates from theological schools, there are numerous inquiries for qualified students. The more capable and dedicated students we can recruit from our churches, the more we can train and recommend for service.

The prospects for new students is encouraging. The early trend in applications gives indication of a very promising student body for next year.

### 5) Finances

Our financial report will indicate that we were able to stay very close to the accepted budget for this year. Our income and also our expenses were somewhat higher than we had anticipated. Due to the increase in student income and the response of the churches in their offerings, we were able to close our books on May 31 with a cash balance.

The appeal for financial assistance to purchase new furniture for Riverton Hall has met with a very good response, although cash and pledges received are somewhat below what was required. We should report here that we were able to purchase the furniture at a very low cost to us through the courtesy of C. A. DeFehr & Sons and A. A. DeFehr Manufacturing. Those who still wish to have a part in this project and help us with the balance owing to the furniture fund, will find us willing to receive their contributions with gratitude.

During the course of the year the representatives of the four Bible Colleges in Winnipeg submitted a brief to the Premier of Manitoba requesting some tax concessions. In response to this, a private member's bill was passed in Parliament, which provided for exemption from school taxes levied by the council of a municipality. This law becomes effective on January 1, 1966 and will reduce our taxes by approximately 50%.

It has been our concern throughout the year to find a proper balance between economy and efficiency. We have sought to offer our students as much value as we could for the money which the brotherhood was willing to entrust to us. Here I want to pause to thank all individuals and organizations who have been used of God to supply all our financial needs. May God reward you.

# 6) Facilities

Our facilities for accommodating students and providing better studying conditions have improved considerably as a result of the completed building project. January 24, 1965 was a great day for us and marked the grateful dedication of the new buildings to the training of our youth for Christian service. Special dedication folders were mailed to the churches to enable those far away to join with us in spirit on that memorable occasion.

Our classrooms and offices look respectable. The library provides a wide selection of books and magazines and a well illuminated reading room which can easily accommodate 100 students at one time. The service rendered by the librarian is excellent. Here I would like to acknowledge a larger donation from B. B. Fast Estate which has been designated for the B. B. Fast Memorial Reference Library which will be located in the library reading room.

A larger designated donation by one of our brethren has enabled us to renovate our general office and to arrange for new administrative offices in close proximity to the general office. These and other changes have greatly improved our working facilities and have enhanced the general appearance of the administration building.

# 7) Deputation

During the past twelve months we have put forth a major effort to visit most of our Canadian churches with larger and smaller singing groups. The purpose of this deputation ministry was two-fold: To bring at least a part of the College to the constituency and to recruit a part of the constituency for the College.

The College male octet has made several excursions during the year and visited the churches of the Fraser Valley in June of 1964; the neighboring churches in North Dakota in February, and the Ontario churches in March, 1965. The male quartet, accompanied by a student speaker, toured the smaller churches from Manitoba to B.C. in July and August of last year. Various groups, accompanied by faculty members, have served the Manitoba churches. The A Capella Choir utilized a long week end to serve at the following centres in the prairies: Herbert, Coaldale, Calgary, Hepburn, and Saskatoon. We thank the churches for the very cordial reception given to the visiting groups and to their message, and for the assurance of prayerful suport. We trust that all the efforts put forth will continue to produce desirable results.

# 8) Publicity

Keeping our larger constituency informed and interested in any one phase of our Conference work is no easy task. However, we have sought to do this through verbal reports while on deputation and also through the printed page. Special news releases have appeared from time to time in our Conference publications. We have mailed a special dedication folder to the churches and also a small twelve-page illustrated brochure describing the life and program of the college. Periodic letters of information have been sent to the pastors. Some of the comments that have been received have encouraged us to continue this practice.

"The Voice", the official bi-monthly publication of the College, is now being published for the fourteenth consecutive year and has been read with interest by many of its subscribers. Writing for this periodical adds to the faculty load. It would therefore be appreciated if circulation could be extended to many more of our lay brethren whose influential role in the church is so significant.

# 9) The Future

At this point our memories of the past begin to fade and the future, looming on the horizon, calls for attention. Education today constitutes big business. It absorbs approximately 50% of our municipal tax dollars. It enlists all our young people and predicts that within a reasonable period of time it will hold them in training for the first thirty years of their life. To the schools of higher learning come the requests and the demands for persons who are destined to give leadership in the development of tomorrow's world.

In this mad race for training the experts and the specialists with their professional skills, it becomes necessary for the church to provide for a training center from where its leaders will come to give guidance in the development of tomorrow's church. We need our specialists who are also capable of seeing beyond their immediate interests and to understand and to help the larger community of people in their various walks of life.

In planning our educational program it is imperative that we re-assess once more our values of life in a secular world and review our missionary assignment. We need to gain reassurance that our educational efforts are worth everything we are willing to invest in. We will only support an educational program that has intrinsic merit and that will transmit a worthwhile heritage and help to equip our young people to live worthwhile lives.

As a Board and as faculty we want to work together to build a college that will enjoy the confidence of the churches, that will draw our young people to its classrooms and will send them forth, well equipped to meet the demands and the challenges of our day.

We plan to subject our program of studies to a continual scrutinizing to make it relevant to our days so that our graduates may learn to speak not to a generation that is past and will not listen, but to the generation that is here today. We want to impart pertinent facts and skills. But education is more than stratifying and classifying bodies of facts. Students must be stimulated by a deep and abiding sense of purpose. For this reason we want our curriculum to aid in instilling purpose to help mold Christian character, to encourage true discipleship and to train for loyal leadership.

To do this great work we desire to retain and employ the best qualified faculty we can rally for such a program. This will require advance planning and may also require advance commitment.

We plan to do what is in our power to win and to retain the goodwill of our supporting constituency as well as of the educational community. Our growing alumni has given us some very fine support in the past, but we realize that we have barely tapped the great potential that is inherent in our alumni and ex-students.

Our campus requires further improvement and expansion. The Board has requested the administrative committee to study our financial operations to discover better ways of financing our expansion program. This assignment has not been completed. However, we note a growing interest on the part of members of our Conference in a plan that would involve a long-trem loan to be repaid with internal revenue.

We have a letter from the Head Office of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, stating that the College is considered eligible for a loan under **Part VIA** of the National Housing Act. We would like to ascertain the thinking of this delegation on such a method of financing future expansion.

Looking ahead we see great opportunities and much hard work. We will need wisdom and the will to work together unselfishly in the interest of all. We will have to rally to give prayerful and financial support to a worthy cause.

As a faculty and staff we pause once more to thank the churches, the Board of Education, the Building Committee and all others who have devoted so much of their time and energy to promote the work of the College. May you have found real joy and satisfaction in doing so.

The report was adopted.

# F. Recommendations of the MBBC Board

The moderator, brother Quiring, made announcements. Brother I. H. Tiessen led in closing prayer.

Brother John Durksen, St. Catharines, led the congregation in the singing of "When Jesus Comes to Reward His Servants." Brother Jac. P. Dueck, Clearbrook, read Acts 11:23, made brief comments and led in prayer.

The secretary read the minutes of the afternoon session and moved their adoption. The minutes were adopted after several corrections.

# III. PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE

A. Chairman's Report

Brother A. W. Schellenberg, chairman, introduced the members of the committee, read the report, and moved its adoption.

Dear Brethren of the Conference,

In the Bible the Lord repeatedly commands His servants: "Write ...!" And what they in obedience to this command have written is today our precious heritage of divine revelation, the Holy Scriptures. Thus God has demonstrated in His Word, the Bible, that the written word is an extremely important tool in the building of the Kingdom of God. Today this is even more so than ever, as the printed page is being made meaningful and available to more and more people who acquire the skill of reading. We could today well change the words of the Apostle Paul to say: "How shall they believe in him of whom they have not read? and how shall they read without writers? And how shall they write except they be commissioned to?" And so we believe it is the first and foremost duty of any Christian press to provide Christian literature for the individual Christian, for the home, for the church, and for all activities of the Kingdom of God. May God help us in the faithful discharge of this our duty.

At last year's conference two tasks were assigned to us. The Christian Press was to be incorporated into the structure of the Conference. This has been done. Then, too, we were asked to change the fiscal year of the Christian Press to coincide with that of the Conference. This we have done, too. The Christian Press will continue to operate under that name, but it is now a department of the Conference. These are external changes which have been made with respect to Christian Press.

Internally changes have been made too. Since September 1, 1964, Brother Henry Dick has taken over the management of the Christian Press. We are grateful to the Lord for sending us Brother Dick for the post of manager. All in all, we believe, our Conference has much reason to be thankful to the Lord for the many young people, who, ignoring financial gain, have put their talents into the service of the Lord and our Conference. Brother Dick, our manager, will report on the business part of the Christian Press later.

Brother H. F. Klassen, having been relieved of the duties of management, is now full-time editor of the Mennonitische Rundschau. Brother Klassen was ill for some time this spring. He has recovered and is now again back at his work. Brother Klassen is not present at the Conference but here is a brief note from him:

"'Blessed be the Lord, who daily loadeth us with benefits, even the God of our salvation.' This is my testimony, although I cannot personnally be with you at the Conference. During the course of my work since 1945 up to today God has been very gracious to me; he has given me strength, your support, faithful co-workers, and good guiding committees.

In 1955 I fell severely ill, was, however, soon able to return to work. This year, from March on and into May, I was unable to work. Thanks to faithful co-workers the Mennonitische Rundschau was regularly published. God has given me recovery so that today I am again able to work. I thank you all for your loving intercession." (See full text in German yearbook.)

Here we would like to mention Brother J. K. Neufeld, too, our production manager of the Christian Press printing department. He was in the hospital for several weeks. Now he is at home, but he has not yet returned to his work. Let us also remember brother Neufeld in our prayers.

Our English family paper the M.B. Herald has again regularly appeared in our homes these past twelve months. The paper is received with much favour. Many speak of blessings received through the messages of the paper. It is of especially great help to those who, away from home and home church, pursue their studies or carry out assignments God has given to them. Once again we would like to thank all of those who — from the time of the first issue on to the present — have helped to make this paper the good Conference paper it is today. We feel that our editor, brother Jantz, is working faithfully and with good success. Here, too, is a word from brother Jantz to the Conference:

"It has been my privilege to edit the Herald for one year. It has been an exciting, tremendously challenging and instructive time. In the process I have learned to appreciate our brotherhood anew with all its idealism and conservatism, its energy and pockets of stagnation, its unity and its disharmony, its desire to see the Lord's work done and its unwillingness in many places to be doing it—and its unquenchable life in the presence of death. I am under the overwhelming impression that at this juncture in our history we stand on the threshold of the greatest growth our brotherhood has experienced in the last half century. The servants in the parable of the talents were judged on the basisi of their faithfulness in capitalizing on the opportunities the Lord laid into their hands. We shall endeavour to make the Herald a means of alerting ourselves to the opportunities that lie ahead of us and of uniting the brotherhood behind these opportunities."

During the course of the year the Publications Committee has again been asked whether it is not possible for those who so desire to receive the **Mennonitische Rundschau** Conference-paid instead of the **M.B. Herald.** We would like to point out that two years ago we recommended this to the Conference. Our recommendation was, however, turned down.

Christian Press has this past year published one book: **Das ernste Ringen um die reine Gemeinde**, by J. A. Toews, D. Ewert, F. C. Peters. This book is available — in German only — in the Christian Press book store at the price of \$1.95.

We have this past year again sent the Mennonitische Rundschau to South America to many who want to read this paper but cannot pay the subscription money. The \$2,000 you have given us for this purpose has been used in this way. This help for our brethren of the South is of great importance and we strongly recommend continuing this policy.

For capital investment we received a loan of \$14,500 from the Conference during this last year. This money has been used for the purchase of much-needed machinery. We need, however, still more equipment. Then, too, our mannagers have so often deplored the lack of money for operational purposes.

In brief we have given you an insight into the activities of the Christian Press and the Committee. We would like to tell you that we have worked with much confidence. The whole Committe met once, in November, 1964. The Executive has met repeatedly. We look hopefully into the future. And in conclusion we would like to express our gratitude to all members of the personnel of Christian Press, — not only those who are constantly in contact with our society and brotherhood. We would like to express our thanks also to those who work behind the scences, the linotype operators, the type setters, the proofreaders and the mailing clerks. We express our thanks to those who do the clerical work in the office and to those who supply us with books from the bookstore of Christian Press. May God bless you all! To our brotherhood we would like to say: Let us not forget to pray for this work of our Conference and to encourage in every way possible its mission.

# B. Manager's Report and Financial Report

Brother Henry Dick read the manager's report and the financial report.

# 1) Manager's Report

Dear Brethren:

This report, accompanied by the auditor's financial statement, covers the 17 month period ending May 31, 1965 and reflects the financial position of our publishing house at this date. The two

operating statements, December 31, 1964 and May 31, 1965 have been combined so that the fiscal year of Christian Press will coincide with that of the Conference.

On the basis of a decision made at the last conference the following capital expenditures were made: A new addressograph \$7,300

The improvement in the store has drawn many favorable comments. Our open house at the end of March received a good response from the community. We experienced some delay in the delivery of the addressing machine. This equipment will result in considerable time saving for us in the mailing process. The office centralization, consolidating three specific working areas, has been a great improvement making for better working conditions and time saving.

I find myself in a rather unenviable position in making this report. Although business volume in most major departments has been constant, the financial position, as reflected in the balance sheet, is considerably different from our previous report. You will note that whereas we showed an earned surplus position of \$23,454 on the Dec. 31, 1963 statement we now find ourselves in a deficit position. The following explanation, I believe, accounts for this change.

In the past both methods, cash and accrual, have been used to record income. It will be realized that this can create a problem in a business where you receive payment in advance for services to be rendered, such as the publishing of a paper or the handling of merchandise on a commission basis.

Since the Conference and the Press are interrelated in the area of budgets and their fiscal years have not coincided it will be appreciated that further complications can arise in the above mentioned method of determining income. We have, in consultation with our auditors, decided to employ only the accrual method of accounting since this will present a more accurate and consistent position of our affairs. The following adjustments as at May 31, 1965 were therefore necessary:

Prepaid subscriptions had been recorded on a cash income basis. The M.B.S.S. material was dealt with on the basis of showing income at the time of purchase. Thus in effect, future income has been shown in the operating statements in the past years. These are charges to prior years' earnings and reflect a decrease in the earned surplus account of \$13,515.

The current operating statement shows a loss of \$19,000 which, together with the above mentioned adjustments brings our earned surplus account into a substantial deficit position. The operating loss is due to the following circumstances: The Rundschau operated at a loss of \$6,500 for the 17 month accounting period. This is due to a revision of internal advertising revenue and expense, and to increased production and editorial cost.

The Bookstore loss reflects in part the method of accounting procedure mentioned earlier which effected the current period and is also caused by the new fiscal year ending which comes after a 5 month's normal low income period and does not reflect a true

"annual" condition in cost/income ratios.

A major problem in the bookstore is the method of merchandising 'dealer' trade and inventory control. After study of the trade problem we have made changes with more to follow which may result in less sales volume but should improve net income. Our approach should be that of a retail outlet, do a good job in this, and retract from the area of wholesale supply. Thus our interest would be to provide service to the churches that own the business and to the entire constituency.

The inventory situation will be difficult to correct, and more than likely costly due to outdatedness in certain items. CBA reports show that our type of business should have a turn over of at least 3 to 1. Taking into account our Sunday School sales which in the past have required relatively no stocking on our part, our stock turn over was less than 1 to 1. This has been one cause of our tight liquid cash position. Due to a good amount of seasonal merchandising it may take a considerable length of time to bring this ratio into a better position.

In view of the fact that not sufficient provision has been made for equipment improvement in the past we will be faced with capital expenditures in this area for some time to make greater efficiency possible. We are making certain cost studies of our operation so that any equipment purchase consideration can be recommended on a self-liquidating cost basis. This approach presupposes long-range programming. In other words, we must foresee a definite need in the area of publication beyond the year-to-year basis in order to perfect efficient production.

I have been with Christian Press less than a year. My business experiences have been very different from what I had expected. Even so, I have enjoyed my work.

It has been my intention to present a fair and realistic review in this report. I have tried to anticipate the general areas of interest of the delegates as it pertains to our Press, and I trust that I have succeeded in this.

This report is history. We cannot change the past. The immediate future of our Press will demand hard work. My association with the Committee and Executive has been one of mutual concern

and endeavor. In my brief experience I have gained the impression that there is a definite place for our Publishing House in our Conference. Someone has said that poverty of purpose is worse than poverty of purse. The Board certainly has not shown a lack of purpose, but they have assigned to me the rather difficult task of dealing with the immediate poverty of purse. I am quite prepared to accept this challenge, and I trust that after my few months of orientation and study of the business that I will be able to be of service to the Board and to the Conference, and that this may be done in the spirit of Paul's admonition to the Corinthians, "Doing all things to the Glory of God."

# C. Recommendations of the Publications Committee.

The recommendations were read and moved by Peter Klassen.

The Committee recommends to the Conference:

That the Conference consider Christian publication a missionary enterprise devoted to the promotion of the Kingdom of God through the printed word which therefore merits our continued support.

2. That \$2,000 be assigned in the Conference budget to the distribution of Christian literature abroad (mostly in South

America).

- 3. That \$1,000 be assigned in the Conference budget for special Conference publication projects. Proceeds would back into Conference treasury.
- 4. That the MB Herald, our family paper, be published for an indefinite period of time, and that the contract price to the **Christian Press** for publishing and distributing the Herald for the coming year be \$31,850.
- 5. That the Conference provide a grant of \$13,680 to defray the anticipated deficit of publishing the Rundschau for the period of Jan/65 to May/66.
- 6. That a capital investment loan (or grant) of \$15,000 be made to Christian Press to be spent at the discretion of the manager in consultation with the Publications Committee. (The manager will provide information concerning immediate needs.)
- 7. That the Christian Press be authorized to make interim short-term loans up to a ceiling of \$35,000 when occasion demands it for operational purposes only.
- That the Conference send greetings to the brethren H. F. Klassen and J. K. Neufeld and wish them a speedy recovery.

Recommendation 1 carried.

Recommendations 2-4 were deferred until after the budget.

Recommendation 5 carried.

Recommendation 6 carried after the deletion of the words in parenthesis ("or grant").

Remommendation 7 — A motion (Ernest Ratzlaff — Wilfred Grenzberg) for the acceptance of this recommendation carried.

Recommendation 8. This recommendation was accepted with a standing vote. In addition to this an extra motion by brother I. W. Redekopp to express confidence in the work of the brethren H. F. Klassen and J. K. Neufeld carried.

A motion was made that families be permitted to receive either the Rundschau or the M.B. Herald free. In the discussion of this motion it was pointed out that this would increase the deficit considerably. A motion of order that the above motion be deferred, and referred to the Publications Committee for further study carried.

The Conference indicated its gratitude to Brother Dick for his extensive research work on the operations of the Christian Press. Confidence in brother Dick's work as manager was also expressed.

The Conference also expressed its appreciation of the work of brother Harold Jantz in his first year as editor of the MB Herald.

# SECTION E - RELIEF AND PUBLIC WELFARE

# I. MCC (CANADA)

### A. Report

Brother J. M. Klassen, executive secretary for MCC Canada, came to the platform, mentioned the names of the MB members of MCC (Canada), read the report, and added a recent item, the participation of MCC in the Centennial Commission of the Government of Canada as representative of the Mennonites and Brethren in Christ of Canada. Brother Klassen then moved the adoption of his report. The report was adopted.

This report is written with a deep feeling of gratitude. We are grateful that our Heavenly Father left us not only with a Commission but also with the means to carry it out. We are grateful for the twelve Mennonite and Brethren in Christ conferences and groups and the five provincial inter-Mennonite committees that have pooled their resources and consolidated their strength in the formation of a service agency — MCC (Canada). We are grateful for every individual who has made it his personal responsibility to give of his means, his time and, in many instances himself, in support of the ministry of compassion.

Where 1964 was the year of organization and transition, 1965 has seen MCC (Canada) launch out with actual programs. Basically, MCC (Canada) has two major functions:

 To provide a united voice for Canadian Mennonite and Brethren in Christ churches, and an organization to carry out projects in Canada.

At the first Annual Meeting in February, MCC (Canada) was asked to speak to the Canadian government of three issues:

- a) a statement of our belief in the biblical teaching of nonresistance.
- b) a concern for just immigration laws.
- c) a request for agricultural commodities for our overseas programs.

The brief has been prepared, approved by all the members, and will be presented to the Prime Minister at a convenient time.

A Peace Booth was sponsored at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto. A special bulletin was issued publicizing this project.

The Annual Meeting urged MCC (Canada) to consider work in the area of prisoner rehabilitation. Inasmuch as there are more than twenty Mennonite homes, hospitals and institutions it was also suggested that MCC (Canada) investigate the need for an association that would bring these institutions together for consultation and sharing. Both suggestions are currently under study.

Mennonite Disaster Service has become a section of MCC on provincial and national levels. This makes MDS a vital part of the larger inter-Mennonite organization and brings to MCC (Canada) a significant lay expression of Christian love and concern.

The Winnipeg branch of Menno Travel Service has been brought into a closer relationship with MCC (Canada).

MCC (Canada) has been asked to assume greater responsibility for the administration of the MCC Summer Service projects in Western Canada. A director has been appointed to work on this project during June, July and August.

MCC (Canada) works in close co-operation with the provincial committees. Some of them have their own projects within the province, but all of them work with and through MCC (Canada) on national and international programs.

Canadian laws provide for the immigration of close relatives of Canadian residents and persons who possess skills and/or training which is needed in the Canadian economy. Our office assists in the preparation of applications and in the transmittal of travel funds. This small service is appreciated by those who are helped, but we feel that a greater service can be rendered by working for the revision of immigration policies so that the open doors which once welcomed our forefathers may be open also to others who wish to come regardless of their race or creed. We are in contact with the government concerning emmigration from the U.S.S.R. Several persons have come to Canada from the U.S.S.R. in the past year but it is impossible to predict what may develop in the future.

 To provide gathering services for the Canadian constituency in support of the total program of the Mennonite Central Committee, Akron, Pennsylvania.

To carry on its program, MCC needs people, money and things. MCC (Canada) is about one-third of the MCC constituency so we should be providing about that portion of the items needed. Canadian personnel is playing a vital part in the total MCC program. Because MCC workers are, for the greater part, short-term volunteers serving 2-3 years, there is a constant need for replacements. Every year MCC needs at least 180 new volunteers to replace terminating workers. More are needed if new programs are to be undertaken.

If every member of the MCC (Canada) constituency gave \$6.00 this year, we would be able to contribute our fair share to the work of MCC. Some members do; some do not. Giving is voluntary. For us, \$6.00 is really a very conservative figure when you consider

that we spend a good deal more than this on things that we really do not need. Yet, there are those who are touched by our ministry for whom our contribution is often the difference between sickness and health, illiteracy and education, life and death.

Each province is responsible for collecting "things" needed in the Material Aid program. MCC (Canada) has Material Aid Centers in Yarrow and Kitchener where these supplies are processed and packed for export. We do all the gathering and pay all the expenses connected with it and then the finished products are turned over to MCC for distribution. Last year we had a successful blanket and meat drive. This year we are collecting one-horse garden cultivators, sheets and towels, and meat and dried fruit. All of these special projects are in addition to the steady flow of regular contributions of needed supplies.

Not only do we perform the gathering services, but MCC (Canada) actually is a part of the greater MCC. Our representatives are members of MCC and as such they help to guide and direct the en-

tire program.

The MCC Annual Report for 1964 and the MCC (Canada) Report for 1964 and Program for 1965 have received wide distribution within the constituency. It is not necessary to repeat that information contained in these reports. Attached are several pages showing some statistics.

### B. Recommendations

1. That the work of MCC (Canada) be upheld in prayer.

2. That a minimum of \$6 per member be considered as the objective for 1965 contributions to MCC.

3. That pastors and ministers, youth workers, Sunday School teachers and ladies groups be encouraged to undertake and promote projects in support of MCC.

4. That a special effort be made to encourage committed Christians to consider a period of voluntary service in MCC.

"Blessed is he that considereth the poor." Psalm 41:1.

Recommendation 1 carried.

Recommendation 2 was defeated. In its place a motion to encourage continued strong support of MCC carried. (This suggests keeping the monthly offerings in those churches where it has been so practised.)

Recommendations 3 and 4 carried.

### II. BETHESDA

(These deliberations took place at the third session July 4,1965, but are inserted at this point to maintain organizational unity of the Yearbook.)

Brother Martin Durksen, member of the Bethesda Committee introduced the committee member, the chaplain brother D. A. Friesen, and the administrator, Brother Nick Braun.

### A. Report of the Committee

Brother Durksen read the report on behalf of chairman C. J. Rempel who was absent.

### Dear Brethren:

"Therefore, beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." These words seem so appropriate to us who are connected with the work at Bethesda. We too, encounter difficulties and disappointments which at times seem to outweigh the joys of service and the apparent successes. These words, therefore, shall always be considered as our underlying strength and motive for the work with our patients.

Our year has been one of activity and several patients have made remarkable recoveries. Each such case brings joy to our workers and to administration and gives encouragement to further devoted service.

Our Board has again served harmoniously. We held 11 meetings, plus many other consultations in order to solve the many questions which are characteristic of a work of an institution which has a registered list of over 100 patients, has a physical value of \$492,000.00 and an annual budget of over \$300,000.00. Sometimes it almost frightens us to think that our Executive Board has but 3 voting members (with one of these being the chairman) to pass officially on these financial matters. At times this responsibility lies heavily on our minds and hearts.

Other reports will give more details about various aspects of

our work. Allow me to report briefly on some positive achievments as follows:

- The Rules and Regulations for the institution were reviewed and updated.
- 2) A canteen wagon service to patients was inaugurated.
- 3) Our basic wage structure was throughly studied and updated.
- A new training programme for the retarded patients was successfully launched.
- 5) A newsletter was prepared and sent to our pastors.
- Training programmes for our new staff members were successfully conducted.
- A "chapel choir" comprised of patients and staff members, was organized.
- The over-all administrational structure was completely reviewed and re-structured.

Allow me to pay tribute to our workers who serve so faithfully and with devotion. Our staff now numbers 68 and at times we have problems which need clarification. By and large we have much reason to praise God for our workers and we would like our Conference to recognize this. They and the Board members need your prayers and we would solicit your intercession.

No basic changes have taken place in our top personnel. Sister Friesen has not been well and we have granted to her a year leave of absence. Our administrational heads have continued with D. A. Friesen as Chaplain and N. Braun as Administrator and Jake Penner as Nursing Supervisor. May we remember them and all other workers in our prayers.

### B. Chaplain's Report

Brother D. A. Friesen then read his report as chaplain of Bethesda and moved its adoption.

### Dear Brethren:

"And Jesus entered" . . . Luke 19:1

That inconspicuous man, Zachaeus, would never have been mentioned, had "Jesus not entered". But this made the difference. It also makes the difference to us. We rejoice today with Zachaeus that "the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost."

Some day we will meet Zachaeus and give him a big handshake and we will say to him: Jesus also entered my life, He also found me! How we will rejoice together! In somewhat like manner there will be many who will say with gratitude and joy: How glad we are that the Mennonite Brethren Church entered the field of service to the mentally ill. That is where "Jesus entered" into the suffering and into the life of many an individual. It was here where many a one met the Lord at a time when they were at the brink of losing hope and faith, but the hand of love laid hold on their life. Inspite of the thundering cataract of emotional disturbances they were again and again confronted with the love of God and they did not lose the hold on the Rock, which is Christ Jesus.

Bethesda, our Home for the Mentally III, has operated for another year. We stand before you with gratitude and rejoicing, for we know that the Lord has been with us. Time and again we were able to experience the blessed fact that Jesus was present. We praise Him for His presence when our understanding and our efforts proved so very inadequate. He has again proven Himself faithful and ever sufficient.

As of June 1st, 1965, we had 108 persons on our list; 98 in the hospital and 10 on probation. During this past year we have admitted 26 patients. During the same time we have discharged 17 and 11 have passed away. A monthly average of ten people have been on probation. A few have had to be returned. Each one, whether resident or on probation, is of great concern to us.

The opportunity to witness to the relatives and friends, as well as to the community is great. Time and again we are fronted with the question: How come your institution is so different to other places? How did you get so large a group of such wonderful workers? We are happy to be able to refer them to the love of Christ, which constrains us.

Of particular interest to us as workers, is the fact when a patient leaving us has a new outlook on life and his attitude toward Christ and Christian life changed.

We cannot but mention the many who are staying with us until the call will be extended for them to come home. Some have lost the ability to think. Others smart under the burden of a hopeless situation. All have needs that must be met. None is forgotten by God and none should be neglected by us. Some day the Master will say: I was hungry, I was alone, I was forgotten, I was in great need: ye took note of Me and served Me. To the feeble we want to lend a helping hand, to the lonesome we want to be a faithful friend, and to each one — whether from our own people or from other groups — we want to be an example of stalwart faith in God. Please, help us pray that this could be realized.

### C. Administrator's Report

Brother Nick Braun, Administrator, read his report and moved its adoption.

### Dear Brethren:

It is very evident that the Lord is with us in Bethesda. Again and again we have the opportunity to remind ourselves: "We then that are strong, ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves." Rom. 15:1. Men and women are brought here to receive help and it is a joy to know that staff members give this help cheerfully, diligently, and as unto the Lord.

Our staff presently consists of 63 people. They are classified as follows:

- 1 Chaplain
- 1 Administrator
- 1 Doctor
- 2 Office Personnel
- 1 Nursing Supervisor
- 43 Nursing Staff
- 17 Kitchen Help, Laundry, Cleaning and Maintenance
- 2 Farm

68

Although general staff requirements are met quite well, our almost constant need is Registered Nurses. Several letters were mailed to each pastor of our Mennonite Brethren Churches in Canada appealing for this help. Could we ask our conference to help us pray and find these people who would be willing to serve God at our Bethesda Home.

It is still somewhat difficult to get enough help from our churches and we have to turn to help from others. Perhaps we could interest more of our young people to accept the challenge of serving at Bethesda.

The financial picture is again submitted to you, and please observe that the operations of the hospital are closely held to the available funds, and extreme care is exercised to keep expenses at a minimum. Many things are needed, and as some of the buildings are getting older, more repairs are necessary. It is rather difficult to meet all these needs, with a tight budget situation.

About 28 of the average of 95 patients originally come to us from the western provinces. Eleven are supported at \$2.00 per day from relatives or relief committees, the balance of \$6.37 per day is paid for by funds from farm profits and General Account Operations. The total committed for this purpose was \$20,000.00 for the conference year. It is extremely difficult to raise this large amount, especially in view of the fact that there are so many needs. In addition, \$10,425.00 is paid by Bethesda to the Conference

for the repayment of the Bethesda Loan. Interest on borrowed money, amounting to approximately \$3,000.00 and \$1,100.00 taxes are allowed by the O.H.S.C. in the budget, and therefore are not paid by the Conference.

The Institution buys all produce for kitchen use from our farm such as meat, eggs, poultry, fruits, vegetables and milk. The working barea of our farm is about 150 acres of which 17 acres are planted to grapes; about 5 acres fruit; 5 acres vegetables and other small fruit. The rest is used for grain and hay crops. At present we have 88 head of cattle, 600 chickens, and 15 hogs. Each month one steer and 2 to 3 hogs are butchered for our own consumption. Milk production yields an average monthly gross income of \$1,612.00; eggs — \$150.00; livestock and poultry — \$905.00; crops — \$450.00. We haul our own water by truck and the expenses are covered by the household budget. Gross income to the farm for hauling water averages \$350.00 per month. These items and others included, and the operating expenses deducted, the farm had a net profit at December 31, 1964 of \$7,053.23. This money was used for the maintenance of western patients.

An important matter of gratification to us all, is the fine donations that we receive from time to time from sympathetic people. Contributions are received from churches, private and relatives of patients who have passed away. Accompanying these donations of which some are quite sizeable — up to and surpassing the \$1,000.00 mark — many expressions of appreciation of service well rendered were indicted. These monies enable us to make some much needed capital purchases, such as furniture, dishes, floor polisher, name tape machine, hot water tanks and other items. Should the Lord lay it upon your heart to have a part in this deed of love, please think of us at Bethesda. Capital expenditures are only paid from the source of donations as no allowance is made for it in the operating budget and we do not receive any other special grant.

Looking into the future, in order to develop our hospital property, we should think of an elevator, two additional wards, kitchen extension, and administration building. This will be a costly project, however, with a long range view and with good harmonious working relations in our conference, this should be possible.

Again on behalf of the board and the entire staff, may we solicit your prayer and support? God will bless you for it.

### E. Recommendations of the Bethesda Committee

- 1) We ask the brotherhood to continue prayer intercession for the staff and patients of the Bethesda Home.
- 2) We recommend that we as a Conference greet the personnel also our representatives in this mission of mercy as well as Dr. H. D. Latham, the medical director of the institution, and that we wish them the Lord's blessing.
- 3) We recommend that the Special Bethesda Committee for Western Patients continue to work as they have in the past.

4) We recommend that the Conference approve a loan to a maximum of \$18,000.00 to finance capital expenses during the fiscal year, of this amount \$14,800 has already been spent, the balance of \$3,200.00 to be used towards the purchase and installation of a new boiler. (This loan was approved by the Board of Trustees.)

All recommendations were accepted.

### F. Resignation of Chaplain for Bethesda

### 1) Statement of the Committee

Brother Martin Durksen reported the resignation of chaplain D. A. Friesen due to the poor health of Mrs. Friesen:

After much prayer and searching for God's will in his Word, brother and sister Friesen feel led to resign from their position in Bethesda due to the poor health of Mrs. Friesen. As Bethesda Committee we regret their resignation for their work has been a blessing to the patients as well as to the personnel. God will reward them. Please assist us in finding prayerfully the right couple to replace brother and sister Friesen. — The Committee.

2) Statement of Brother and Sister Friesen — In a statement to the Conference brother Friesen expressed his feelings about his service and about his resignation.

### Dear Brethren:

Permit us, at this time, to express our appreciation and gratitude to our Conference for the opportunity to serve for a few years in our Home, Bethesda. Many times we have experienced great blessings from the Lord. Inspite of the fact that we so often realized our limitations and inabilities, God was ever willing to graciously bless us and the work entrusted to us.

We have deeply appreciated the help that has come through Bethesda to many a one in great need. Bethesda has become very dear to us. We shall continue to pray for this so very important work of our Conference.

To you, dear brethren, we say once more: Thank you for the opportunity to serve you in Bethesda. May the hand of God continue to rest upon our Institution.

### G. Special Bethesda Committee for Western Patients

### 1) Report

Brother Isaak Block, chairman, introduced the member of this committee, read the report and moved its adoption. The report was adopted.

In Psalm 37:5 we read, "Commit thy ways unto the Lord and trust also in Him, and He shall bring it to pass." This was and still is the challenge to us as committees and Conference concerning Bethesda.

This committee was appointed to solve questions related to Bethesda and to regulate acceptance dismissal and financing of patients from western provinces.

When we look into the work of Bethesda, we must say that God's ways are higher than ours, and we must confess, that the Lord has done great things in and through Bethesda. At the time when we as a Conference took over the Bethesda Home we rejoiced to have a hospital for our Conference church family members. This has been changed by the leading of the Lord. The Lord has seen fit to make Bethesda a place where many of our patients have been helped physically and mentally but also where God has given us an opportunity to serve and witness to people who do not belong to our families. For this we are grateful to the Lord.

In this past year we helped along in making arrangements for

one patient from the province of B.C.

At present we have 11 patients in Bethesda whom we support. The cost of eleven patients for the period of June 1, 1964 to June 1, 1965 is \$29,226.57. The exact contribution of relatives or Relief Organizations for the same period is \$7,362.00. This sum of \$29,226.57 has been paid thus:

\$20,000 by Bethesda Home, \$7,362.00 by relatives and \$2,000 has been taken from the collected money of our churches. The balance of the collection money will be used to pay debts which were made at the time when we encountered difficulties.

We want to close our report with the words: "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us", and has given us as Conference an opportunity to bless the staff and patients at Bethesda.

- b) Whereas the \$20,000.00 will not cover the cost of western patients, we recommend two offerings per year for this purpose, and any money not used for this purpose to go for retirement of debts.

Both recommendations were adopted.

### III. PEACE COMMITTEE

The report was not read, but appears in yearbook.

### A. Peace Committee Report

Dear Brethren of the Conference:

Another year has rapidly come and gone in which the message of peace in Christ has been proclaimed in the home, the schools and the church. The walk and testimony of "Peace" toward an unrestful and war-threatened world is more necessary than ever before.

The Peace Committee of the Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference wishes to report that the long hoped for "Peace" literature will soon be ready for distribution among our Young People. Contacts regarding this literature were made two or three years ago but not until last week were any definite results reportable. The Committee is now in possession of a number of Peace emphasis booklets which are presently being studied by the committee members. We trust the Holy Spirit to guide us in the correct choice of material to promote the doctrine of Peace in our churches.

The recently organized MCC (Canada) has a Peace department in its manifold program. We are watching the development of this undertaking in their publication of a pamphlet, "Peace and Missions," which is available upon request.

Most of the provinces have held inter-Mennonite Peace Conferences and the committees responsible have also distributed literature pertinent to the topic.

We are concerned that the Peace efforts of the MCC (Canada) and the efforts of the Peace Committee of our Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference may be synchronized to establish a positive Peace witness in our churches and Conference.

The prevailing circumstances, are such that tend to curtail the functions of the Peace Committee. It is with regret we became aware of the intention of withdrawal by the members of this committee from B.C. and Alta.

With firm convictions regarding a positive, Bible-centred Peace witness we solicit your prayer support for this important issue.

### SECTION F - CONCLUDING BUSINESS

### I. STATISTICAL REPORT

Brother D. D. Duerksen made a few remarks referring to the complete report to appear in the yearbook.

### A. Analytical Report, 1964

While working on the statistical reports, I was led to think about Ephesians 4:15. Amid the apostle's admonitions to the church to strive for perfection and unity in Christ, we find the words: "But speaking the truth in love may grow up into him which is the head, even Christ." Briefly I should like to share with you three concerns in considering the 1964 statistics.

### 1) The Reliability of the Statistics

Do the figures in the accompanying report really speak the truth, Let me point out several factors that affect the reliability of the statistics. In compiling the information our attention has been drawn to errors, ambiguities, unnecessary complexities, irrelevancies, and important omissions in the questionnaire. Although the details of these inconsistencies are too numerous to mention in a brief report, several illustrations will indicate the type of flaw in some of the questions. The chairman of the finance commission focussed our attention on an error in the question regarding the average contribution per member. One statistician in reply to the question about the language used at young people's commented, "Do any youth groups still use the German?" The pastor remarked about the necessity of making provision for reporting Wednesday night activities. In order that the statistical reports of the future speak the truth more fully, the Committee of Reference and Counsel is taking measures to revise the questionnaire in order to simplify wherever possible and to remove existing errors and ambiguities. Another factor affecting the reliability of the statistics is the response of our churches. In order to get a complete picture, complete returns are essential. Heeding the admonition of the Scriptures to exhort one another to good works, we might well learn from our churches in Ontario, the first to submit complete returns without letters of reminder. I wish to thank the faithful statisticians from all provinces for their meticulous work in spite of the flaws in the questionnaire. Nevertheless, in a number of reports there was considerable room for improvement both in accuracy of response to questions and in promptness in meeting deadlines. Might we encourage ourselves to be faithful even in these little things in the interest of truth.

### 2) Trends Revealed by the Statistics

In spite of the foregoing points about the reliability of the statistics, certain trends are evident when we consider the twelve statistical reports compiled since 1953. In this connection I should like to pay tribute to Rev. H. Regehr and to my late father. Only after having worked at compiling the statistics of one report myself, can I appreciate fully the labour gone into the compilation of the others.

We are, indeed, thankful to God for the modest growth evident over a period of years. This growth is evident in the increased membership as well as in the increase in the number of churches. Might I clarify one point here. You will recall that more than two churches were accepted into our conference last year while the 1964 report indicates the addition for only two churches. The discrepancy lies in the fact that in the 1963 report all mission churches, even if not accepted formally into the Canadian Conference were included. Growth is also evident in Sunday School enrollment, particularly in the departments below the seniors as well as in the adult department. The contribution per member calculated on the same basis as in previous years is also up in 1964.

Although we rejoice and are thankful for the growth in various areas in what sometimes has been called a post-Christian era, we might well view certain trends with some concern. The number of members leaving our church for other denominations was again up in the past year. The general trend for members leaving seems to be to join other evangelical denominations. The emphasis on secular education appears to be increasing. This trend is indicated in the increased enrollment in government high schools and universities. The university enrollment as reported by church statisticians has increased by 74 students during the past year. Our boards and committees ought to consider this fact in planning our educational programs both at the institutional and the church level. May God grant us the right awareness of some of these trends and the grace to plan wisely that these trends might be properly channeled that "we may grow up into him in all things which is the head, even Christ".

### 3) The Voice of the Brotherhood

It appears to me that another purpose of the statistical report forms has been to give an opportunity for suggestions from the various churches of our brotherhood. Let me assure you that your comments, criticisms, and suggestions have been noted and have been channeled to the chairman of committees concerned with your problem. We are thankful for these comments and hope that in the future the voices heard from our brotherhood in this way may increase. We hope that ultimately these voices from our churches will blend into a harmony leading to our mutual growth in Christ and to the advancement of His kingdom.

This offering is to be sent to provincial treasurers for relief work.

- 9. Youth Work Offerings at youth meetings for support of youth projects.
  - 10. Scholarships for Music Students at MBBC
    - a. From choirs with 14 singers or less \$6.00.
    - b. From choirs with 15-25 singers \$12.00 per year.
      - c. From choirs with 25 singers or more \$20.00 per year.
