

MINUTES

OF THE 57th CANADIAN CONFERENCE OF THE

MENNONITE BRETHREN CHURCHES OF NORTH AMERICA

PART I - DEVOTIONAL SERVICES

SATURDAY, 7 P.M., JULY 1, 1967, YOUTH RALLY

The first public devotional service of the 57th Annual Canadian Conference conducted at the Coaldale M.B. Church on July 1st, 1967 at 7:00 p.m. was sponsored by the Interim Christian Education Committee with the Chairman brother Jake Penner, Vancouver, as chairman of the session.

A warm welcome was extended to all by brother Penner who also indicated that the service was designed to express the general theme of the Conference — "I Will Build My Church."

Brother George Baier, Coaldale, served as the director of the congregational and choir singing and very capably supported the theme with appropriate hymns expressing our faith. Miss Marianne Thiessen served as pianist. As the fiirst number the congregation sang — "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story," followed by — "Come, We That Love the Lord!"

Being united in song we then were led into the Word in the invocation led by Lorlie Barkman, Moose Jaw, who read Ephesians 1:17-23 and led in prayer.

The mass choir then sang two selections: "The Lord is My Light", and "There Is a Balm in Gilead".

The chairman of the Music Committee, Jake Schroeder, Hepburn, the Sunday School Committee, H. R. Baerg, Winnipeg, and the Youth Committee, Henry Dueck, Kitchener briefly testified of the services rendered in their respective fields of service. An offering for the Canadian Youth Project was received following the prayer offered by brother Dueck.

It was then announced that the five Morden brethren who were involved in an accident were in Taber hospital, but not in critical

condition. Prayer was requested for these brethren.

The choir then sang: "Like As a Hart Desireth the Waterbrooks." This was followed by a pannel led by John Schmidt, Calgary, and panel members Ernie Unruh, Vauxhall, Siegfried Hiebert, Edmonton and Elsie Rempel, Calgary, who meaningfully shared their personal testimonies of faith and experience of building the church from within and also by outreach.

A double trio Vauxhall sang, "There Is Life For a Look at the

Crucified One."

The first message of the conference was delivered by Rev. Wilmer Kornelson, Frazerview, Vancouver. Under the Conference theme he based his thoughts on Acts 16:18, 24-26.

Brother Kornelson mentioned that the statement of the text was an unconditional claim made by Christ, implying that no power will prevent or destroy the fulfillment of this claim. Attempts to destroy Christ's challenge have been registered throughout the history of the human race — yet without success.

How does God in Jesus Christ intend to build the Church? Three basic agencies have been used of God to fulfill this mission. Jesus builds the Church by calling upon man to have faith in Him. Jesus builds the Church through the proclamation of His Word. Jesus builds the Church through obedience.

If faith is lacking, the church is not built. But where the Word is proclaimed in faith a new understanding is born which pleases God and edifies the body of Christ. Faith and knowledge serve complimentary toward the building of the Church.

Our threat is not a threat of learning but a heart of unbelief. The more we learn, the greater the demand to relate it in faith.

Neither is the church built by resorting to gimmicks. These may produce thrills, and draw crowds but will not build the kingdom of God. The kingdom is built by the proclamation of the Word.

The Church is built, not by seeking to get what we can from society but by contributing to it through the sacrifice of self. Obedience is God's tool which brings people to repentance and faith. Christ needs youth's enthusiasms, energy and dedication. We should praise God for the church which offers opportunity for the expression of a living faith, proclaiming the Living Word and responding in obedience of service.

A double trio from Calgary sang: "The Spacious Firmament on High," and "Weißt du wieviel Sternlein stehen"

Rev. H. H. Voth, Winnipeg, closed the meeting with a bendictory prayer.

SUNDAY DEVOTIONL MEETINGS

Sunday Morning July 2, at the Auditorium in Coaldale

On Sunday, July 2nd, at 9:45 a.m. we met in the local auditorium for worship. Brother Rudy Boschman, moderator of the Alberta Conference, chaired the service. The mass choir sang "Great is the Lord," conducted by George Baier. The moderator welcomed all guests and invited the congregation to sing — "Come, We That Love the Lord" (vs. 1 and 4) followed by the invocational prayer.

We were then invited to realize the "I Will's" of Jesus.

I will build my church.

I will draw all men unto me.

I will make you fishers of men.

I will come again.

I will raise him up on that last day.

The congregation then sang "Praise ye the Lord, O Praise Ye the Lord (vs. 1 and 4) also "Come Thou Almighty King" (vs. 1 and 4.

This was followed by an announcement made by Br. C. Riediger, Morden, concerning the five brethren involved in an accident. Br. Herman Lenzmann, the Conference moderator, led in a prayer of intercession.

After a prayer of thanks was offered for the blessings of God, an offering was received for the Canadian M.B. Conference.

The choir sang: "Let Thy Holy Presence Come Upon Us we Pray."

Rev. Leo Wiens, moderator of the American M.B. Conference and pastor of the Rosedale M.B. Church at Bakersfield, California, now served the congregation with a message of challenge under the theme. "The Church Endued With Power for Service."

"The Church Edued With Power for Service" (Acts 1 and 2)

Introduction:

- 1. The World is power conscious today bigger and more powerful vehicles for land, air, and even space travel are being developed constantly.
- 2. Nations of our world are not only power conscious, but are as well in a power struggle.
- 3. I believe the church today is also power conscious and in a "power struggle" in the world today!
- 4. Yet, the church today (and individual Christians) often find themselves so limited in power and even lacking! Why?
- 5. Acts 1 and 2 give a wonderful picture of the enduement with the power of God and an insight into the need as well as some answers to meet that need in the experience of the Church today.

I. THE POWER OF GOD PROMISED

- A. The promise is definite: "ye shall receive".
- B. The promise gives indication of human response: "ye shall receive power..."
- C. The promise is specific: " shall recieve power".
- D. The promise is conditional: "the Holy Ghost coming upon you".

Without an open acceptance of God's provision of power promised in the person of the Holy Ghost, the Christian life and the life of the Church is so powerless.

II. THE RECIPIENTS OF POWER CONDITIONED

- A. Who are to receive power? Men, not angels! People such as we!
- B. What kind of people are to receive the power promised? Obedient people — Active people!
- 1) Obedient people:

Luke 24:49: "Tarry ye in Jerusalem until the promise of the Father."

Acts 1:4: "Commanded that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father..."

Faithful obedience was enjoined of these!

- 2) Active people:
- a) Acts 1:11: "Why stand ye gazing up into heaven".

There is a time for waiting, for tarrying, for gazing with longing into the heaven and into the face of Jesus — as did Mary of Bethany — and I believe that worship precedes service. But service unto our God and witness unto Christ is not performed merely by mystical and devotional worship. We must "look on the fields" and "go".

b) Acts 1:8: ye shall be witnesses... unto the uttermost parts of the earth"

Matthew 16:15: "...go ye ino all the world..."

The Lord Jesus commanded action!

III. THE POWER GIVER — Chapt2:1-4

- 1) The Pentecost experience recorded in Acts 2 is such a dramatic display of God's power and also such a vital event in the growth of the New Testament church.
- 2. I believe that the Pentecost experience in its fulfilment is the Christian's experience the receiving of the Holy Spirit in His fullness is an essential to enduement with power for service.

- a) The individual Christian and the church today need note that it is the "being filled with the Holy Spirit" that is the key to victorious Christian living and powerful witnessing.
- 1V. THE POWER OF GOD MANIFESTED IN SERVICE Acts 2:37-41, 47b.
- 1. Peter's sermon and the ensuing results shall ever stand as a wonderful testimony of the manifestation of the power of God flowing through human Channels.
 - a) Peter: "... lifted up his voice and spoke..."
 - b) But it was not Peter (though no doubt a "powerful speaker")
 — it was the power of God by the Holy Spirit that pricked the hearts" of so many men.
- 2. Even so the Church today may be endued with power and experience the manifestation of the power of God in service.
 - a) I believe the "evangelical Church" today the Mennonite Brethren Cchurches today — needs desperately to experience the manifestation of the power of God in their Christian experience of service in witness. It is this that gives further and continued boldness and power for service.

Note: the early church, as recorded in the book of Acts, had as their first concern that they might be granted "boldness to speak the word." Acts 4:29-31.

We today are teaching the Word of God and principles of truth We are equipping with the best of methods and techniques

We are training for service as best we know how, and these are good!

But, the enduement with power for service comes not with teaching, equipping, and training alone. Rather, enduement with power for service comes in the obedience of tarrying in appropriation and in actively going in response to the promise of the Father, "Tarry ye... ye shall be witnesses... Go ye!"

Conclusion:

My great concern — and I trust it is yours as well — is that God might grant to us today His enduement with power by His Holy Spirit — and —

That we in obedience might tarry and go with boldness to labor for Him.

As the congregation was quiet before God, brother Wiens prayed that we might respond in our hearts to God so that this power would flow through us to a dying world.

The choir then sang "O That Thy Holy Fire Were Burning."

Brother Baier then led the congregation in the singing of "Revive Thy Work, O Lord."

The second message of the morning was given by Rev. Victor Adrian:

The Church Edifying Itself In Love — Acts 1:14; 2:41

The church at Penecost was the gathered church. Power came to the waiting church. The church was situated in the midst of a world of change. The church faced this change as a trusting fellowship, demonstrating unity of service.

Before Penecost the church was a gathered church. Gathered for Bible study, prayer, breaking of bread and that with a glad and generous heart. The world looked on and responded, "Behold, how they love one another."

What does the gathered church do? Study, which implies theology which produces steadfastness. Their recital is centered about Jesus Christ — the rule of power.

They also saw fulfillment in the Scriptures. Their thinking and shaping of fellowship was based upon Biblical orientation. They met for a faith and study conference where they got back to the Word.

In fellowship they also realized their social responsibility. This was expressed by common care. Who is our neighbor? Deacons were called to serve. There was a joyous breaking of bread and atmosphere of prayer. The church that ceases to be the praying church cuts itself off from this power.

The gathered church was compared to the vision of dry bones as seen by Ezekiel. There was a re-organizing of structure and the bones became alive and became a mighty army. Even as Moses required the support of others in the wilderness to fight the enemy and attain he victory, so we need Joshuas who will raise the sagged arms and to experience the victory.

The vision of Daniel revealed a stone without hands which grew into a kingdom, the kingdom of God. This is the power of the gathered church which edifies itself in love. The Mennonite Brethren Church can be such a church, we pray it might be. Amen.

The choir served with a number in song, "Christian Hearts In Love United."

The congregation joined in singing the hymn "My Jesus I Love Thee."

Brother Henry Voth, Herbert, led in closing prayer.

Afternoon Service Sunday July 1, 1967 at the Coaldale M.B. Church — 2 p.m.

Brother George Baier led the congregation in the singing of hymns: "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" and "Am I a Soldier of the Cross."

Moderator, Rudy Boschman, extended a welcome to all to the Coaldale M.B. Church for this service.

Roll call was taken by provinces.

Invocation was led by Henry Nickel using Matthew 16:18 as a basis, befitting to the theme.

Announcements were given. The evening service will begin at 7:30 p.m. with the English section meeting in the auditorium and the German section in the church.

Brother Peter Funk of Hillsboro led in the offertory prayer, after which the offering was received for Missions and Services.

Choir sang "Singet dem Herrn eine neues Lied."

Broher J. J. Toews brought the first message of the afternoon on the theme "The Church Victorious in Conflict."

The Church Victorious in Conflict.

Text: Acts 3-6

Introduction: It shall be our purpose not to exegete these four chapters in the thirty minutes alotted to us but rather to glean from the content of these chapters an image of the church victorious in conflict. This might best be done by considering first the nature of the church, secondly, the nature of the conflict, thirdly, the nature of the victory.

I. THE NATURE OF THE CHURCH

The nature of the Church consists of two component parts, the human and the divine. To the world, the church critic, the disgruntled church member, and even the discouraged church minister, the human may seem to predominate. Again to the idealist and those who look for perfection in the church and divine may be predominant. But the nature of the church is not human or divine but consists of the inter-relativeness of the divine and the human. The church is God in man. The church is God working through human instrumentality. Christ speaks of this relationship when He says, "I will build my church."

- 1. In the Church the members trust in the sovereignty of God, the Father, Acts 4:24-25, 28.
- 2. In the Church the members enjoy the consciousness of the resurrected Christ who indwells and works through them, Acts 3: 14-16, Eph. 1:22-23.

3. In the Church, the members surrender to the directives of the Holy Spirit, Acts 4:31. The word, "filled" does not mean to merely occupy space but to be under the habitual control of the Holy Spirit. 1 Cor. 6:19.

In the Church the triune God lays hold on human surrender, occupies it with the presence of Christ and directs it by the Holy Spirit, Eph. 3:10.

II. THE NATURE OF THE CONFLICT

- 1. Is not with flesh and blood. Physically the church is not unique but the spirit that dwells in the church stands in contrast to the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience. The latter resorts to the lowest means, brute force. The former employs spiritual weapons.
- 2. It is a conflict of self-surrender to God, Acts 4:19, 29. The one concern of the Church was to obey God. They never once concerned themselves with obeying the council.
 - (a) Such surrender must be genuine. Acts 5:1-10.
 - (b) Such surrender must be complete, Acts 5:19-21.

When the church surrenders self to God, its God will conquer the world.

3. The conflict was primarily offensive, not defensive. The human may be preoccupied with self-defence but God is on the offensive. In offensive conflict the church marches onto enemy territory to claim trophies for the Lord. Many a church has lost the thrill of the offensive. Elton Trueblood says, "A fire that does not spread must eventually go out."

III. THE NATURE OF THE VICTORY

- 1. Not of Physical Nature.
 - (a) Not an absence of physical hardship, Rom. 8:31.
 - (b) Not in architectural splendor.
- 2. The glory of a great cause, Acts 5:41. They lived for the greatest Name on earth.
 - 3. The glory of spiritual progress, Acts 6:7.
 - (a) The Word of God increased
 - (b) The number of disciples multiplied greatly.
 - (c) Obedience to the faith.

Let us remember that there is no church where evangelism isn't vital and current. In this way the church is victorious in conflict.

After the choir had sung, "Hold the Fort for I am Coming", and the congregation had joined in sing "Work for the Night is Coming", brother H. Hildebrand, Caronport, brought the second message:

The Church Penetrating the World With the Gospel Acts Chapters 7-11

When the Hegelian Dialectic ignited the mind of Karl Marx, communism was born. By means of its philosophy of dialectic materialism it claims to have in possession the key to understand and determine history, whereby they expect to march forward to world domination and a classless society.

However, we believe that the key to the deeper currents of history is the cross of Christ, and the dynamic forward movement is the Holy Spirit through the church of Christ. The book of Acts gives abundant evidence of this.

The message and the method whereby the early church penetrated the world with the gospel are best seen in the witness borne by her men and women.

In Stephen, the first martyr of the Christian church, we see how Christianity was freed from the bondage of Judaism, and thereby released for its mission of world evangelism.

Philip provides an exemplary picture of perfect fellowship in all the orders of the Christian ministry. It is to the credit of the church and its leaders that they did not express the spontaneous spreading of the gospel by its laymen. Instead they utilized it and organized it. It is to the equal credit of Philip that he did not resent the church's delegation to consummate the work he had begun in Samaria. Instead, he welcomed them and proceeded to pioneer other areas.

The conversion of Saul of Tarsus is of interest to the missionary, the theologian, and the historian alike. He became the leading instrument to evangelize the Gentile world. Although commissioned by his risen Lord in the hour of his conversion, he did not launch his missionary career without the prayerful backing of the church at Antioch.

Dorcas and the earlier Almoners reveal how the gospel that saves brings help to the needy. The early church shouldered its social obligations in order to back her main mission of world evangelism.

The apostle Peter opened the door of faith unto the Gentiles. In his preaching it became crystal clear that the church's message was Christocentric. The age of fulfillment had arrived, and the life death, resurrection and exaltation of Christ was the apostolic message.

But the main reason why the church was so effective in penetrating the world with the gospel was the dedication and participation in the gospel preaching of its laymen. "They that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the word." Herman Bavinck, of the Free University of Amsterdam, makes this telling observation, "We gain the impression that an intense role was

played in the missionary activity of the early church by many men and women who held no other office than that of a believer."

The record reveals that the strength of the church lay in the total mobilization of all of its members—energized by the Holy Spirit. The clergy and the laymen worked hand in hand. The aged were not discredited nor discouraged, and the young were not excluded.

And what of the present? How do these lessons apply to us? Men were responsive to the gospel in those days, but today—? Are we surprised at Dr. McGavran's analysis of today's conditions?

"Today God commands His church to work in the most responsive age she has ever known. Never since the ascension of our blessed Lord have so many people in as many countries been so ready to obey the summons to repent and be baptized.

"The basic problem of missions is not resistant populations or rejection of the gospel. The basic problem is to imbue Christians themselves with enough of the Spirit of Christ to send multitudes of them rejoicing into ripe harvest fields."

Once every member of the church contributes a maximum effort to world evangelism, we too shall penetrate our world of today with the gospel. Our task as a church is an unfinished task and always will be—until He come.

Choir sang "Lord the Ransomed Church is Waking"

Congregation joined in the singing of Hymn "When We Walk With the Lord" $(v.\ 1\ and\ 5).$

Closing prayer was spoken by brother Herb Brandt of Vancouver.

Evening worship of the Canadian M.B. Conference held in the auditorium in Coaldale, Sunday, July 2, at 7:30 p.m.

Congregational singing was led by brother Leonard Schroeder of Lethbridge "I Love to Tell The Story."

Brother Peter Funk of the Missions Office in Hillsboro was chairman for the evening service. He extended a welcome to all who had come to worship together for this missions service.

Brother A. Dyck of Saskatoon led in the invocation by reading I Cor. 16:8-9 and led in prayer.

The congregation joined in the singing of hymns, "Revive, Thy Work O Lord" and "Rescue the Perishing."

A men's octette sang "Seeking the Lost."

Announcements were given by brother P. Funk.

The congregation joined in the singng of the hymn "He Wants Me Too".

Brother J. J. Toews was chairman of a panel which discussed various aspect of mission work. Members of the panel were:

Henry Poetker, India Mabel Friesen, Mexico Emma Lepp, India Don Block, prospective candidate.

Some of the questions on which the discussion was based were.

- 1. What constitutes a call? Commission, need, conviction.
- 2. How can a missionary best integrate into the national church?
- 3. Is the India church victorious? Backsliders are returning.
- 4. Are we too heavy on institutional missions? Do we have enough envangelism? Are we balanced in our efforts?

Men's Octette sang "Christ is Urgently Calling for Workers."
Offertory prayer by brother J. M. Klassen. Offering was designated for Missions Abroad.

Message — Brother Ernest Dyck, of Quebec. Matth. 4:18121, 28:18-19 "Go Ye".

God Is Calling Men to Build His Church.

The speaker reminded us that we must be on God's wave length to hear His call. It may require cleaning our spiritual hearing to hear when and how He speaks. Abraham, Isaiah, Peter and Paul heard and obeyed. Stephen and Philip were good deacons because they outpreached the preacher.

The call of God always leads us to faith and obedience. Sometimes the doors are closed, but then God opens other doors and leads us into a Macedonian experience. The church at Philippi was born at a Women's Prayer Meeting. God spoke with a definite message. As the church responded, they sensed the joy in the call of God.

As God spoke to the early church, so He calls men and women to follow today. We can be on the right wave length, we can volunteer, we can accept the call in faith and in obedience build His church. May God grant that we would be yielded to His call.

Brother Herbert Brandt, Vancouver, closed the meeting with prayer.

PART II - BUSINESS SESSIONS

First Session, Monday Morning July 3, 1967

SECTION A-INTRODUCTION AND PRELIMINARY BUSINESS

I. OPENING AND WELCOME

- A. Brother Henry Peters, Hepburn, led in the singing of "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less" and "I Need Thee Every Hour."
- B. Brother Rudy Boschman, moderator of the Alberta Conference, welcomed all delegates and guests to the convention on behalf of the Alberta conference. He then opened the session with a fervent prayer laying before the Lord the needs of the conference.
- C. Brother H. Lenzmann, moderator, responded to the welcome extended and also welcomed all delegates. He read Acts 4:29, "And grant to thy servants that with all boldness they may speak thy word."
- D. The assistant moderator, brother J. H. Quiring, took the chair and called upon brother Lenzmann to serve with the conference message.

II. CONFERENCE MESSAGE

Brother Lenzmann read the text John 12:32, "and I when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself." After prayer he emphasized the thoughts:

A. Who is the exalted Christ who draws all men?

He is the Saviour. He is Christ the Messiah. He is the mediator. He is the son of God who became man.

B. What does the thought "being lifted up" mean?

It refers to the suffering and the laying down of his life on the cross to blot out the handwriting against us. The cross is the emblem of suffering, but also of victory. Christ is also exalted in the message of the cross. In the cross we find the wisdom and the power of God. In this connection brother Lenzmann challenged the conference not to be ashamed of the cross.

C. How does he draw to the cross?

We are to witness to men in our everyday life. The Gospel of Christ has the power to change men in our century. He will draw men away from sin and give them light. The preaching of the cross will draw men to him. Preoccupation with the negative will not draw men. Christ draws men through the exemplary lives and testimonies of individual believers, not through methods but through men.

Brother Lenzmann concluded with an emphasis on the promise "I will draw all men \dots "

At this time brother J. H. Quiring, the assistant moderator, called for participation in prayer. Many brethren brought the needs of the conference before the Lord.

III. CENTENNIAL OBSERVANCE

Brother J. M. Klassen led in the service. After a few introductory remarks and explanations followed by a participation of the congregation in a responsive reading of 1 Chronicles 25:10-15 and 1 Peter 2:11-17, the brethren D. J. Pankratz and Harold Jantz led in prayer. After the prayer brother Henry Peters led the congregation in the singing of two verses of "Faith of Our Fathers."

A letter of gratitude to the Canadian government had been prepared by brother Klassen upon instructions from the program committee. The reading of the letter was deferred at this time.

During the course of the convention a greeting was also received from brother C. N. Hiebert. This greeting was returned. A greeting was also sent to Jacob Lepp, Dalmeny. The resolutions committee was also asked to formulate a greeting to the Conference of Mennonites in Canada as well as resolutions of appreciation for the services rendered by J. A. Toews, the Ernest Dycks, H. F. Klassen, Dr. Latham, and the staff of Bethesda Hospital.

The question was raised whether the Nominations Committee would also nominate persons for the Conference Executive. The Board of Reference and Counsel was asked to look into this matter.

At the third session the moderator of the Saskatchewan provincial conference, brother Eugene Gerbrandt gave information regarding the Arelee M.B. church which some time ago withdrew from the M.B. conference for reasons of language. The provincial conference in Saskatchewan has reinstated the church. Pastor of the church is brother Mark Gripp. Membership is 75. This church was reaccepted into the Canadian conference by a vote taken at the third session.

II. DISSOLUTION OF CHURCHES

The secretary of the conference announced the dissolution of the churches of McMahon, Saskatchewan and Sperling, Manitoba. Resons for the dissolution of both churches lay in the small membership.

A. The McMahon M.B. Church was dissolved at the convention of the provincial conference of Saskatchewan. All members of this church were received into the Swift Current M.B. Church. Membership as listed in 1966 Yearbook — 20.

G. B. Dyck Secretary

B. The Sperling M.B. Church was dissolved at the convention of the provincial conference of Manitoba. Members of this church will probably join Winnipeg churches. Membership as listed in 1966 Yearbook — 10.

The dissolutions were noted.

III. SUBMITTED QUESTIONS

A. Request for assistance in Building Program -

Requests for permission for offerings for building programs were granted to the following M.B. churches: Meadow Lake, Saskatchewan; Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan; Williams Lake, B.C. (Cariboo Bethel) and Brookswood, B.C.

1. The Churches of Meadow Lake and Moose Jaw request permisison to ask churches of the Conference for an offering toward the Building Fund.

The British Columbia Conference requests that permission be granted to the:

to appeal for funds from the Canadian M.B. Churches to assist in their building programs.

B. Request of the B.C. Conference Re: Implementation of TV Program

The following request was read by the secretary:

We recommend that the Canadian Conference implement the production of a televised program.

- That the Canadian Committee on Evangelism investigate and recommend the procedure to be followed.
- That this program be carried out within three years if accepted.

At the first session a motion carried that the Committee on Evangelism and he Committee of Reference and Counsel look ino the matter.

A the sixth session the secretary of the conference read the preamble and the recommendations of the combined committees.

1. Preamble

The matter of television in our homes has been a concern in our constituency and an item on the Canadian Conference agenda at different times.

Measures ranging from seeking to prohibit members of our churches from possessing T.V. sets to warning them of the dangers involved in viewing T.V. have been presented at our conventions, and this not too many years ago. We are aware that whatever actions have been taken or statements that have been made have not been revoked. Since the issues created have never really been settled, the reaction to the use of T.V. continues to be a problem with many in our conference. It is natural therefore, that the involvment of the conference in a telecast could well agitate this problem as well as create others. We might well ask ourselves, "Is there a conflict of principle involved here? Can we on the one hand

question the use of T.V. while on the other hand we produce our own program?" The question as to whether or not we should produce a T.V. program, therefore, involves more than matters of finances and talent. We need therefore to look at this whole question first of all as a matter of principle. It is in the light of this that we present the following recommendations:

Recommendations of the Combined Committees of Reterence and Counsel and Evangelism:

- (1) The question "Do you favour the use of T.V. as a means of proclaiming the gospel by our Conference?" is to be placed before the delegates to the convention. The vote will be taken by secret ballot. If the vote is in the affirmative, the following recommendation is to be presented:
- (2) We recommend that we delegate the whole question of a T.V. program to the Board of Evangelism for a thorough investigation. The results of this study are to be presented at the next convention in 1969.

The result of the vote taken at the sixth session of the convention was 169 — affermative; 97 — negative. At this session recommendation (2) was not accepted since (1) did not carry by a two third majority.

C. Request for Assistance for Gospel Light Broadcast, Saskatoon.

The secretary presented the following request by the Manitoba provincial conference:

Submitted Question

The Manitoba Conference appreciates the assistance given by the Canadian Conference in airing the Russian Gospel Light Hour program over the Saskatoon station and would again ask the conference to contribute \$1000 for this cause.

A. J. Dick, Secretary

A motion to continue assistance was withdrawn after discussion. The question was referred to the Committee on Evangelism at session 6 thin committee presented a recommendation to grant the request.

This recommendation was accepted.

Brother Henry Peters served with the solo "The Love of God." At this time the members of the Committee of Reference and Counsel were asked to come forward. The conference voted in favour of the reappointment of J. J. Riediger as treasurer for the next two years.

A. Report.

The secretary of the committee read the report. Dear brethren of the Conference:

The concerns of the Committee of Reference and Counsel for the brotherhood during the past year find expression in the prayer recorded in Ephesians 3:17-21 and read by brother Lenzmann as an opening to the February sessions of the committee: 1. "That... he may grant you to be strengthened with might through his spirit in the inner man" 2. "That Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith" 3. "That you may have power to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth, length, depth and height" 4. "That you may know the love of Christ and may be filled with all the fulness of God."

During the past conference year the CRC met at Corn, Oklahoma in November, 1966, in Winnipeg on February 13th and 14th 1967 and here at Coaldale on July 1, 1967. On these occasions questions submitted by the Board of Christian Education, the Christian Education Committee, the Bible College Board and the Publications Committee were discussed and considered. Some of the question and concerns discussed will be brought to this conference for consideration in the recommendations submitted by the respective committees or by the CRC. Specifically the major efforts of the CRC during the past year have been directed toward planning for the implementation of conference reorganization and sponsoring the Ministers' and Deacons' Conference on Faith and Ethics in Winnipeg.

Plan for the Implementation of Reorganization

The result of the vote of the churches on the proposal for reorganization was as follows:

1. Business and Faith Sessions Alternating

In favour 1943 Opposed 597 % in Favour 76.49

2. Conference Reorganization

In favour 2060 Opposed 391 % in Favour 84.04

3. Executive Secretary

In favour 1628 Opposed 612 % in Favour 72.68

In order to implement the reorganization at this convention, the CRC appointed a nominating commission consisting of the brethren D. Neumann, B.C.; R. Boschman, Alberta; J. M. Klassen, Manitoba; John D. Goertzen, Sask. and J. G. Baerg, Ontario. We wish to thank the brethren of the commission for preparing a slate of candidates which will be presented to this conference later. Would members of the provincial executives also take note that in the future members of the nominating commission are to be

elected by the provinces one year in advance of the convening of the Canadian Conference (1966 Yearbook, Rec. 1g, p. 67).

With regards to the position of executive secretary three brethren have been officially contacted, but all have declined to serve in this capacity. At the time of the writing of this report, the CRC has no candidate for recommendation to the conference.

At its February meeting the CRC gave further directives to the conference secretary and the program committee towards planning for the implementation of conference reorganization.

Conference on Faith and Ethics

Nearly 200 ministers and deacons attended the Faith and Ethics conference in Winnipeg on February 15th and 16th. Four papers were presented:

- 1. The Inspiration of Scriptures V. Adrian
- 2. Marriage of Believers and Unbelievers. D. B. Wiens
- 3. An Approach to the Problems of Ethics D. Ewert
- The New Testament Teaching Concerning the Deaconate H. Brandt

The papers were discussed and statements on the four areas presented were accepted by the Faith and Ethics Conference. These statements were published in the M.B. Herald of March 3. Brother Ewert's paper was printed and sent with the M.B. Herald to all M.B. homes. Approximately 25 additional copies of each of the other papers were mailed to interested persons requesting them. It is the hope of the members of the CRC that the conference has been valuable to the participants and that it has to some extent at least prepared the way for the further discussion of relevant problems of faith and ethics at our future biennial faith conventions.

With conference reorganization and the introduction of more executive secretaries the problem of space for conference offices is becoming more and more acute. At the July 1st meeting of the Committee of Reference and Counsel this problem was discussed at some length. At this time two offers for the year 1966-67 were available. The college offered to supply four rooms for executive secretaries and their secretarial help. The Interim Christian Education Committee brought to the attenion of the Committee of Reference and Counsel an offer from brethren in B.C. to make office space available to our Canadian Conference in the city of New Westminster. Enough space would be available for three After a discussion of both alternatives, a executive secretaries. motion carried that the present Committee of Reference and Counsel charge the new Board of Management to study the principle of establishing conference offices during the next two years. In the interim period individual boards assume the responsibility for office space of their executive secretaries. Individual boards are asked, however, to work in close consultation with the Board of Management.

Further aspects of the work of the CRC during the past year are presented for your consideration in the recommendations of the Committee.

On behalf of the CRC D. D. Duerksen

The report was accepted after attenion had been drawn to one omission. In connection with the report the question of job description of executive secretary was discussed. It was pointed out that the job description is not yet clear. The executive-secretary will be expected to coordinate the work of the boards; he will need to think in terms of the whole conference. The question whether he is an ex-officio member of all boards needs to be spelled out. He should receive copies of minutes of all board meetings, He may also assume part of the present conference secretary's work.

B. Recommendations of the Committee of Reference and Counsel

The secretary read the recommendations and moved their acceptance.

The Committee of Reference and Counsel Recommends:

- 1. That local churches be given as much autonomy as possible in gathering their contributions in order that those churches operating on budget systems and making their contributions by this method rather than by taking the designated offerings may feel that they operate within the wishes of the conference.
- 2. That upon the request of the Board of Missions and Services the treasurer of the Canadian Conference be appointed assistant treasurer of the Board of Missions and Services.
- 3. That since according to the old constitution standing boar is and committees organize internally, this method of electing chairmen and other board officers be continued this year.
- 4. That the minutes of the 1969 business session be published in German as well as in English in order to accommodate our older brethren in our conference.
- 5. That Henry J. Unger, Clearbrook, be elected conference secretary.
- 6. That provincially elected members from the boards of British Columbia and Manitoba serve for a two year period, and members of the boards elected by the provinces of Ontario, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, serve for a four year period. (Read at the second session at which it was explained that this was the procedure for now to enable boards to start working.)
- 7. That the first meeting of the Council of Boards be held December 28 and 29th, 1967. (Second session)

The moderator announced that this committee would not give a report this year.

VII. PEACE COMMITTEE

A. Report (Not read, but included in Yearbook)

Dear Brethren:

Jesus said: "My peace I give unto you". John 14:27

It is this peace which He gives that enables us to be peace makers. May we be found among those who are in the way of peace and make peace for others.

This past year we have again distributed literature on Peace witness as well as outlined helps and suggestions which pastors could use at their discretion on Peace Emphasis Sunday. We are aware of the inadequacy of this procedure but are assured that this doctrine is at least touched upon once a year.

We feel, however, that a more frequent and integrated teaching on this subject is necessary. We also feel that it would be more beneficial if this doctrine would not be treated as an isolated teaching ministry. This would of necessity entail a new approach to the matter and a more consistent teaching of this Peace principle applicable in our everyday life. We trust this will be accomplished under the reorganized Conference structure.

It was my privilege to be present at a Mennonite Central Committee conference in Minneapolis in December 1966 where other Canadian Mennonite Brethren were also present and to inform the M.C.C. constituency of our position with regards to Peace marches and letters of protest to U.S. and Canadian governments. Our position was appreciated and the M.C.C. executive promised to honour our request and position.

We pray that our young men and women may find their way through the present-day dilemma and be able to accept this Way of Peace and support it whole heartedly. May we as older brethren and sisters be an example to them in a very practical way.

After announcements by the assistant moderator, brother C. D. Toews closed the first session with prayer.

The moderator called upon brother Leo Wiens, Rosedale, Calif. for the invocation.

Brother Wiens read 2. Thess. 1:2-12 as a greeting from the U.S.A.

Conference and after expressing his appreciation of the opportunity of sharing in this conference, opened the session with prayer.

After the secretary had announced the offerings and the number of delegates (394) attending the convention, he read and moved the adoption of the minutes of the first session.

The minutes were adopted after attention was called to three

errors which were corrected.

Election for the Board of Evangelism took place (Recorded

under Section B. V. Elections)

The Conference of Mennonites is meeting in Leamington, Ontario. Brother Herbert Giesbrecht read a greeting prepared on behalf of the conference by the Resolutions Committee. The greeting was accepted with the provision that a verse of scripture be included.

II. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Brother A. A. DeFehr, the chairman, read the report after introducing members present.

A. Report

Dear Brethren:

We, as board members, believe the Lord has been good to our Conference in that he supplied us with the necessary funds to carry out the program and meet our financial commitments. We would also like to thank our brotherhood for the confidence they have placed in us.

The following matters were attended to by your Board of Trustees

- Re Cenotaph at Winkler. Arrangements have been made with Mr. Dave Kuhl of Winkler to see that grass will be kept trimmed at all times and shrubs planted, to make the Cenotaph look attractive. The costs involved, for the above, will be paid for by the Kroeker Foundation. This is a Canadian Conference project.
- We had a buyer for the McIntosh house, now being used by the Bible College, for \$9,000.00. After some consultations the Bible College Committee decided they would like to keep it for the time being, so no action was taken.
- 3. Re Group Insurance—A questionnaire was sent out to 123 churches, 38 replied, or 30%. Of these, 63% were in favour and 37% against the plan. We feel that no further action should be taken due to lack of interest by the churches.
- The Canadian M.B. Conference has been registered as a nonprofit organization, qualifying it for issuing Donation Receipts acceptable to the Government.

5. The Bible College Student Fund Loan is running dry. The Board of Trustees feels that a drive should be made to strengthen this Fund. It plans to discuss this matter with the new President of the College, in the near future.

6. The Bank Loan of the Christian Press has been combined with that of our regular Canadian Conference Loan. In this way we can keep our loan with the bank at a minimum.

7. Our Loan at the bank for 1965 was \$197,000.00 1966 112,000.00

1967 113,000.00

(this includes (\$35,000.00) for Christian Press).

The report of the Board of Trustees was adopted.

The elections for the Board of Christian Education took place at this time. (Recorded under Section B-V Elections)

At this time brother Alvin Reimer sang the solo "O the Bitter Pain and Sorrow."

B. Recommendations of the Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees recommends that the new Board of Management be charged with the responsibility of looking into the feasibility of combining the different conference treasuries under one treasurer.

The recommendation was accepted

The assistant moderator took the chair. The Bethesda Committee came to the platform and gave reports and made recommendations (Proceedings of Bethesda Committee are recorded under Section E-V The elections of the Boards of Higher Education and the Board of Publication followed (Recorded under Section B-V, Elections)

Brother Alvin Reimer led in the singing of "Blessed Assurance". The secretary read Hebrews 13:20-21 to be included in the greeting to the Conference of Mennonites.

The proceedings of the Publication Committee followed. (Record-

ed under Secion D-V)

The elections for the Board of Management took place at this time (Recorded under Section B-V).

The moderator announced the beginning of the evening session at 7:00 p.m.

The assistant moderator read the announcements. Brother G. D. Huebert brought the concerns of the conference to the Lord in closing prayer.

THIRD SESSION - MONDAY EVENING, JULY 3, 1967

Brother C. D. Toews led in the singing of "Come Thou Almighty King." The moderator called the convention to order. Opening prayers were spoken by the brethren H. Unger, Clearbrook and J. H. Friesen, Kennedy Heights, B.C.

The minutes of the second session were adopted with one change. The recommendations of the Publications Committee were considered at this time. (Recorded under Section D. V.)

This was followed by a consideration of the recommendations of the Bethesda Committee for Western patients. (Recorded under Section E. V.)

SECTION D — EDUCATION AND PUBLICATION

I. INTERIM-CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Interim-Christian Education Committee was called to the platform. The chairman, brother J. H. Penner, read the report which was adopted.

A. Report by the Chairman of the Interim-Christian Education Committee.

Dear Brethren:

In Romans 14:12 we read these solemn words: "So then every

one of us shall give account of himself to God."

Yes, we are all accountable to God for what we do and for what we don't do. As elected members of committees we are also accountable to our Conference. Thinking of this I sometimes feel that we have come far short of what we should have accomplished.

We are thankful, however, to the Lord for answering your and our prayers and directing us in finding an Executive Secretary for Christian Education in our Conference. We would take this opportunity to present Rev. Wilmer Kornelson, our Executive Secretary. Our prayer is that the Lord would bless his ministry as he takes on this great task of directing Christian Education in our Conference. His duties commence on August 1, 1967. We covet your continual prayers on his behalf.

Since we didn't have an Executive Secretary, members of the executive declared themselves willing to help promote Leadership Training in each of the provinces. I believe those committees that

availed themselves of this opportunity benefitted by it.

We are thankful that the Lord gave grace for a closer working relationship with out brethren from the U.S.A. during this past year. The executive of the U.S.M.B. Board of Evangelism und Christian Education met with our executive to discuss and plan areas of work which we have in common. A further meeting is planned for the beginning of September. May the Lord really bring us together in a bond of love and fellowship.

We also met with our own committee on Evangelism seeking to see how best we can serve the Lord in our Conference. After much discussion it was agreed that for the present at least we should have two separate Boards. However an outline was drawn up to form a basis of co-operation in the work assigned to the two committees by the Conference. This outline will be available to the newly elected Board, and we trust will facilitate implementing a program that will win souls for Christ.

B. Recommendations

The Interim-Christian Education Committee recommends:

General Recommendations

1. That the conference ratify the appointment of brother Wilmer Kornelson as Executive-Secretary for Christian Education and

support his ministry in prayer.

2. That organizations responsible for Christian Education in the provincial conferences and local churches be urged to invite brother Kornelson to serve as speaker, workshop leader or as resource person at conferences and rallies.

3. That the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS we recognize the real need for strengthening the emphasis on evangelism in our Christian Education agencies and extension through our Christian Education program and realize that our teachers must be challenged to actively evangelize and help in ways and means of doing this practically. AND WHEREAS we realize that the teaching procedures in our Christian Education program need to be improved and teachers need to be helped in acquiring better tools of communicating Scriptural and moral truth.

AND WHEREAS we also recognize that teachers need to be helped to acquire a better grasp of Biblical truth and strengthened in the resources they have available to deepen the students in their understanding of this truth and lead them on in spiritual growth, the Board makes the following resolution:

We as a Conference affirm our conviction that the Service Training Program is one of the major tasks of the Christian Education Program at all levels (Conferences as well as local churches) and we therefore commit our resources and pledge our support in the implementation, promotion and administration of the Service Training Program at all levels.

4. That the Board be authorized to convene a Christian Education Workers' Conference on the Canadian level as soon as possible.

Music Committee Remommendaions:

The Committee recommends:

1. That the bursaries be continued as in the past; (i.e. three bursaries of \$200 each), subject to the following conditions:

a) That it shall go to students who prepare to serve in our Conference and not to professional musicians.

b) That if students find gainful employment during the year of the bursary, they disqualify themselves and return the bursary funds.

c) That they be given to full-time students only.

2. That \$1000 be allowed in the budget for the Committee on Music.

Sunday School Committee Recommendation:

The Committee recommends: That we continue to consider both the M.B. Imprint material and the Scripture Press material as the curriculum material which this Conference recommends for us in our Sunday Schools.

Youth Committee Recommendations:

The Committee recommends:

 That the following youth projects be accepted for 1967-68 and 1968-69:

Total \$6,000 Detailed allocation of funds shall be made after further con-

- 2. That the Youth Worker continue to be published jointly with the Scripture Press Training Hour Youth Guides.
- 3. That the last week in January be observed as Youth Week in our Canadian churches based on the general topic: "The Nature of the Church."
- 4. That all churches be urged to send one or more youth delegates to attend Canadian Conference Conventions.
- 5. That the Youth Committee be permitted to convene a Canadian Youth Rally as soon as practicable.

All General Recommendations were accepted.

Music Committee Recommendations: Recommendations 1 and 2 were accepted. Recommendation 3 was accepted with the budget at bession six.

Sunday School Committee Recommendation: Accepted.

Youth Committee Recommendations: All of the five recommendations were accepted. In connection with Recommendation 5 the new board is to be alert to the fact that the Christian Education Workers Conference and the Youth Rally should not take place in the same year.

II. MUSIC COMMITTEE

(The report was not read but is included in the yearbook.) Dear Brethren of the Conference:

We as music committee are grateful for the many music directors we have in our conference. Many are doing a splendid work in our churches. We are also grateful for the purpose of the music program as indicated in the president's report. We have had quite a concern because of a lack of qualified choir directors in some of our churches. With the emphasis as stated our needs should be met. Since music is such an integral part of our church, we need qualified dedicated men for this area of service.

I wish to report to you that we have had two meetings. For our main project for the past conference year the committee has decided to send to each choir director a package of anthems to help them in the building up of a repertoire which seems to be the problem of every choir conductor. We look upon the music in our churches not only as a serving aspect but also as a teaching ministry as the Apostle Paul points out to the Colossians in Colossians 3:16 according to Philips translation.

To the churches our conference we would say: Pray for and support your music directors, and to the directors we would throw out the challenge to be faithful in this great ministry and help to build the church.

III. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Board of Christian Education was called to the platform. Brother Eugene Gerbrandt read the report.

A. Report of the Chairman:

Dear brethren:

Over the past four years since the re-organization of the Board of Christian Education, we have sought to carry out the responsibility assigned to us, namely, "to develop a structure of Christian education." In the 1964 report the Board stated its findings, that "we must eventually place our whole theological and liberal arts program under our Canadian Conference." (64 Yearbook, p.62.) In 1965 (Yearbook, pp. 109-110) the Board gave its reasoning for an eventual centralization of the Bible Institute program. At the 1966 conference the Board made a recommendation for a specific first step in a long term program of unification of the Bible schools programs (66 Yearbook, pp. 120-122). Since at present three Bible schools are functioning well, and two provinces are not sponsoring their own school, this proposal aimed at a

more equitable division of financial responsibility. It was felt that free movement of students to existing schools regardless of home

provinces would also be stimulated.

The recommendation presented to the 1966 conference reads, "That we begin direct subsidy of our Bible Institutes from Canadian conference funds. That the subsidy be at the rate of \$100 per student enrolled in the school and \$2,500 per school per year." The action of the Canadian conference was: ". . . to refer this matter to the provincial conferences for their consideration and action." At the writing of this report we do not have the result of the action taken on this issue by the provincial conferences.

During the past year the Board has given attention to the

following:

- 1. Student Services. Bro. H. R. Baerg has given considerable time and effort to this area of work. In November 1966 the Student Directory was mailed out to pastors, youth workers and conference committees. Included in this survey are all students who have completed senior matriculation (Grade XII) and are attending institutions of higher learning. Students have received a special student issue of the M.B. Herald with a covering letter and three Newsletters. A number of responses indicate that this contact from the Canadian conference level is appreciated.
- Graduate Student Seminar. This seminar, a self-financed endeavor, was in session during the Christmas holidays. Invitations were mailed out to our graduate students.
- 3. Summer Seminar, 1966. This was held August 6-19 at the Associated Seminaries campus, Elkhart, Indiana, but was not too well attended. The 1967 Summer Graduate Seminar for university students will be held August 20 to September 1 at Pacific College, Fresno, Calif. It is hoped that this year there will be more participation in view of the fact that it will be held in Fresno where we have a large M.B. community. Our Board is agreed that this is a worthwhile endeavor and that we need to be involved in it both financially (our share is 1/6 of the total cost) and by way of active participation. Brother Baerg has the responsibility of drawing students' attention to this seminar.
- 4. Student Services Committee Session is held annually in Chicago. The Canadian Mennonite Brethren have had a representative at these sessions the past four years. It is deemed profitable to remain in conversation with the other conferences in regard to student services.
- 5. Student services projection.
 - a) Feeling keenly the importance and urgency of Student Services, the Board would urged that the provincial conferences recognize this need and elect a committee, if one is not already in existence, to be made responsible for this area of service on a provincial level. Provincial conference efforts could be supplemented by mailings, suggested reading mat-

erials and possibly an itinerant ministry provided by the Canadian conference Board of Christian Education. Provincial committees should be encouraged to share their information and concerns with this Board and to request assistance from

it when required.

The Board feels that in most university towns it would be of value to have local laymen who are in contact with students to conduct some form of "chaplaincy" in their homes. A step in this direction has already been taken by the Ontario conference in the appointment of Alvin Enns as parttime student service worker.

- b) Further services to students should be investigated to determine the feasibility of part-time instructor-counselor, parttime or full-time chaplain, pastoral services, etc.
- c) This Board sees the need to continue the ministry of student mailings.
- 6. Bible Schools and Biblie College attendance.

It is significant to note the ready movement of students across the country as a reflection of our mobility. We have noted also the changing pre-Bible school educational experience of our students. We face a different situation than before. The trend to a higher educational level cannot be ignored. Accordingly, we must make the pattern of education in our Bible schools suitable for our students. With this in mind, we would urge that the reorganized Board of Higher Education give due consideration to our Bible school program.

As we move into re-organization of the structure of our conference we should not look at structure first, but rather at the functions which we wish to have performed. The conference needs to, at some time, take a serious look at that which we wish to achieve in the field of education and then build a structure to fit the need, rather than continuing to work from what we have by making as few changes as we can get away with.

- B. Results of the Vote on Subsidy to Bible Schools. (The secretary announced the results.)
- 1. Ontario:

After a lengthy discussion of the question of a unified and centralized Bible School Program in Canada, we as Ontario Mennonite Brethren Conference have resolved that the question be passed to the Ontario Education Committee for further study. At our next annual Convention in 1968 the Committee shall present specific recommendations concerning this matter.

It was further emphasized that we as Ontario Conference are following our own plan in supporting Bible School students as well as Bible Schools of our Conference financially and that we intend to continue such assistance until the matter is settled. The Ontario M.B. Conference, therefore, is not ready to accept the proposed recommendation to subsidize our Bible Institutes from Canadian Conference funds at this time.

- 3. Saskatchewan: The reaction was negative.

4. Alberta. In favour.

5. British Columbia: A negative vote.

C. Recommendations of the Board of Christian Education.

The secretary of the Board read the recommendations.

- 1. That we continue the student survey and budget \$500 for this.
- That we allow the Board up to \$150 for secretarial services if needed.
- That \$150 be allocated for travel to meetings concerning student service possibilities.

All three recommendations were accepted.

At this time brother Eugene Gerbrandt communicated the reinstatement of the Arelee M.B. Church to the convention. The church was accepted into the Canadian Conference. (Recorded under Acceptance of New Churches.)

After this announcement the chairman of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College, brother H. W. Redekopp, and President-elect, brother Victor Adrian, were called to the platform. The chairman read his report and the president-elect read a part of his report.

After announcements by the assistant-moderator, the moderator called upon brother Victor Adrian to close the third session with prayer.

Fourth Session - Tuesday Morning, July 4, 1967.

Memorial Service

At 8:30 delegates and guests gathered at the cemetery of the Coaldale M.B. Church for the memorial service. The thoughts of the members of the congregation were taken beyond the cemetery when brother A. J. Froese opened the service by asking all those present to join in singing, "Wenn aufstehn am gloreichen Morgen." After leading the congregation in prayer, brother Froese based his message on Hebrews 13:7-9 and several verses from Joshua 4. The following brethren were remembered in a particular way: Wilhelm

Toews, Leamington, Ontario; H. H. Redekop, Portage Avenue, Manitoba; D. J. Thiessen, Arnaud; H. G. Bartsch, Yarrow; J. G. Thiessen, Vancouver; and A. J. Sawatzky who ministered in Huron, South Dakota lately and who passed away in Vancouver. After asking the congregation to spend a moment in silent prayer for the bereaved families, brother Froese spoke words of encouragement, emphasizing particularly the steadfast testimony left by God's witness in the past as an incentive for us to follow. After the brethren D. B. Wiens and J. Falk had spoken closing prayers, this service ended with the congregational song, "Kommt, Brüder, steht nicht stille."

Communion Service -

Brother J. K. Schroeder led in the singing of "O Blessed Faith in God." Brother R. Boschman opened the service by asking the congregation to sing two verses of "Alas, and did my Saviour Bleed." After prayer brother Boschman read 1 Cor. 11:23-26. He emphasized the thought "This is My Body which is broken for you." These words have for us a message of the incarnation, the crucifixion, and the substitutionary work of Christ. Fellowship around the communion table was observed after the congregation had sung, "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross." After a number of brethren had particitated in prayers of thanksgiving, brother P. J. Doerksen closed the service with prayer. The whole congregation joined in singing "Sure I Must Fight if I Would Reign."

Brother H. Lenzmann, the moderator, called on the secretary to read the minutes of the third session. The minutes were adopted with one addition.

The brethren of the Resolutions Committee read resolutions to Dr. Latham, H. F. Klassen, and to the staff of Bethesda. (Recorded with Greetings and Resolutions)

The moderator read a greeting from brother C. N. Hiebert (Recorded with Greetings and Resolutions.)

IV. MENNONITE BRETHREN BIBLE COLLEGE

Brother Victor Adrian continued reading his report. Both the report of the chairman and the report of the president-elect were adopted.

A. Chairman's Report:

By God's grace we have completed another year at the Mennonite Brethren Bible College. How successful and how valuable it is for our churches only God will know. It is gratifying to realize that while there are wars and rumors of wars, we were privileged and enjoyed the opportunity to continue to give instruction and guidance to our students at our College.

One year of administration by a Committee has shown us how dedicated and how willing instructors were to make this year a success. It also shows us that there are numerous areas where a president can make greater contribution to the welfare of the college especially in long-range planning.

At our annual meeting on January 28, the college board decided to extend a call to brother Victor Adrian to assume the presidency. After some deliberation brother Adrian accepted the call and now we are happy to report to you of this decision. We are looking forward with anticipation to what God will do for us in the future.

We must also report that brother J. A. Toews is leaving the College for an undecided period of service away from our college. We appreciate his twenty years of service and regret his leaving but we must accept God's leading and so we would thank him and hope that he may be back soon.

Since brother Ewert will be away from College for his Sabbatical year, there will be some changes at the Mennonite Brethren Bible College, but by the President-elect's report you will notice that the College will be completely staffed and that we can look forward with great hope for our future in what God will do for us.

We should report that at the annual meeting the Board went on record firmly encouraging the faculty to continue working towards maintaining the Bible College as the core of our school, continue the present liberal arts program, and strengthen the B.D. program as an arm of preparation for the pastoral ministry.

The Board made provision to engage a business manager for this coming year if this could be implemented. However, after consultation with our president, the decision was made that we wait a further year because of limited finances and other reasons.

We must report with regret that we will have about a \$3,000 deficit in our budget. Unexpected repairs to the building and also remuneration for extra staff has put us in this position. We hope that the brethren will see by our finance report how closely we have adhered to the budget. I hope that they will keep in mind that for three years we have tried to work on the same allowance from the Conference but have come now to the point where we will not be able to go on with the same.

We have not raised our tuition fees very much for the coming year, keeping in mind always that the students that come to the Mennonite Brethren Bible College are our students and we would not want to discourage them from coming.

The small changes that are made in board and rent will even out some of the rates at present in effect as well as add some to our income.

At this Conference we had hoped to present to you plans for further expansion of the campus. We are aware of the great need and a considerable amount of thought has been given to the future plans of the physical campus of our plant. The planning is not at a complete stand-still but again we are not ready at this time to put before you detailed plans; we are however keeping in mind that we have the permission of the Conference to keep on planning.

The new library building that was built and finished last year had no provision for air conditioning. The second floor of the building now has the conference offices. Because of the anticipation of using these offices more and more we must report to the Conference that this air-conditioning should be installed.

We thank all the churches for their support and interest in our college. We must make mention that when we made an appeal for help, either for money or for blankets, the response was very gratifying.

We thank all our teachers and staff that have so faithfully and unreservedly given themselves to training the young people that have committed themselves to the Lord and to His service.

We also want to thank those who have given us part-time help during this year: Brother Henry Derksen, who studied with us and taught several courses, is returning to the Congo, Brother I. W. Redekopp, and Brother Alvin Reimer, who is continuing his studies in music. Miss Nettie Guenther, who earlier indicated her desire to enter practical nurses training, is also leaving us this year. Her services have been very much appreciated. Miss Gloria Schroeder, graduate of Tabor College in Home Economics, and of M.B.B.C. will serve as dietition and head cook next year. Brother Swartz, visiting lecturer last year, has been made a member of the faculty and has assumed Office of Registrar. Brother Allen Guenther completes his courses at Gordon Divinity School and will begin his services with us this fall. We have also enlisted the services of brother G. W. Peters to teach an accredited course in Missions in January, and brother Orlando Wiebe, Tabor, to teach an accredited course in Church History (Pietism) in November.

This Conference should have a feeling of thankfulness that the spiritual seed sown in their sons is bearing fruit as younger men are taking responsible place in God's ministry. Facilities

Our facilities are adequate to permit us to teach efficiently as well as to house our students. The most urgent need, which we trust can be met within the next few years, is a girls' dormitory and a suitable dining hall and kitchen. We are happy with our library facilities; each year we add new shelves to place the books for an expanding library collection. The considerable gifts thankfully received from private donors have enabled us to purchase many books beyond that permitted by our annual budget.

Recruitment and Publicity

The best recruiting agents for theological and Christian training at the Mennonite Brethren Bible College are Bible school teachers, pastors, parents, and graduates; that is, those who are interested in the spiritual welfare and mission of our denomination. The A Cappella Choir visited churches in northern Saskatchewan and Alberta and some places in Manitoba.

Brother Herbert Swartz, the registrar, visited churches and met with young people in Ontario. Several brouchures were sent out to young people across Canada.

The Mennonite Brethren Bible College and the Evangelical Mission of the Church.

A theological school must develop a program of studies in accordance with the mission of the church. You as members of the Church of Jesus Christ and our denomination must always ask the question: Is our college in its teaching program emphasizing that which will contribute to the work of the church — to get the gospel of Jesus Christ into the world?

As faculty and board members we have renewed our commitment to that task. We are committed to the policy that the primary task of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College is to prepare men and women for such ministries as pastors, missionaries (at home and abroad), teachers in Bible schools and Christian high schools, and MCC services. At this juncture where we witness a tremendous expansion of university programs in the arts and sciences, we are committed in the other direction — to increase our emphasis on a teaching program to prepare men and women for church-related ministries.

We believe the great need of the church lies in this direction. Unless we all join together as parents, as members of the church, as pastors and as Bible school and college teachers, in one united body, to cultivate among our children and young people an interest

in the work of the church, we will be in dire need of pastors, evangelists, and missionaries in the next generation. The time to take a clear stand from the grass roots and upwards for such a policy for the Mennonite Brethren Bible College is now!

There are many other pressures in our culture today; there are many attractions towards other good professions in our society. You all know how we are penetrating every level of Canadian culture — the business world, the professional world, even the political world. There is no doubt that this opens up many opportunities for a more extensive witness to the redemption in Jesus Christ. To harness this potential for the Church of Jesus Christ, however, requires active pastors and teaching leadership. This is suggested not only in the Epistles of Paul, but in the books of men of God who today call for a renewal of the church. There is an urgent need for young men and women to be challenged to enter church-related callings. We need pastors; we need men in home missions both in urban centres and in remote places; we need men and women in foreign fields.

Is this the type of college you want? A college which focuses its primary attention on the task of preparing men and women for the ministries of the church to the end that we will fulfill our evangelical task in Canada and abroad? If so, let us hear your response! If so, let our young people in every province sense our unity in that task! Let them know that we love and support our pastors and teachers and missionaries; let them know that we trust one another, love one another and work together for the sake of Christ and the church! Let them know that our Christian educational institutions support one another and are united in this major calling of the Church of Jesus Christ!

There is a secondary task of the college, also of high-ranking importance. We must help Christian laymen become effective witnesses in their various professions, training them to make contributions to the work of the church. Christian laymen need wellgrounded Christian convictions; they need biblical knowledge and Christian theology behind their belts in order to do some hard thinking about their vocation and about the Christian's social action in society, and about building the Church of Jesus Christ. The exhortation of Peter is relevant: "Be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you for the reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear." Christian laymen must join hands with pastors and Christian teachers. Each year we also have a number of older students who in the midst of life's occupations heard the call to the minstry or to service in the mission field or other church-related ministries. May God continue to call in such a way.

What is the role of the Arts Department? The Arts Program plays a contributory role related to the primary and secondary tasks outlined above. While the Arts Program, therefore, cannot be central at the Mennonite Brethren Bible College, its contribution

to the preparation of service today is highly significant. It is important, in the first place, that pastors and missionaries and those who enter church-related ministries know something about the world in which they live, and man, to whom they want to witness. It is important that they know something about man's ideas, his literature, his history and manner of life. Therefore we require of all graduating students some arts subjects.

Secondly, the church cannot carry out its ministry in the world without dedicated laymen. There are a number of students who combine their arts courses with theological courses in the hope that as they enter into the various occupations and professions in society they may be faithful witnesses of Jesus Christ and give able assistance to the continuing needs of Sunday School, youth work and teaching ministry of the church. In order to train an ever-flowing stream of active Christian laymen in our churches and society, the Arts Program is closely related to the theological (1) Arts subjects are related to Christian pre-suppositions, (2) all Arts students are required to take some theological courses, and (3) all Arts students are challenged to be open to God's call in their future ministry.

What role does the Music Program play? Frankly we admit that there has been perhaps too much of an emphasis on performance and technical training and not sufficient emphasis on a churchrelated program.

You will be pleased to hear that during the last half year in a number of consultations the men of the music faculty have taken stock of the situation and committed themselves to an increasing emphasis on the needs of our churches today, and this in the interest of helping the church fulfill its calling to bring the gospel to men and establish believers. We have revamped some courses and made a shift in our goals. We are concerned that in our age of language change and other cultural changes we cherish the Christian hymnody in our churches. Christian theology must always be a doxology; theology must sing! An evangelical church must be a singing church! We need to make greater efforts to preserve our Christian faith through hymns from childhood on: "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, as you teach and admonish one another in all wisdom and as you sing songs and hymns and spiritual songs with thankfulness in your hearts to God" (Colossians 3:16). We are grateful to God that our music graduates are being used by our churches and schools. Last year the Hepburn Bible School called one of our graduates to their music department; this year the Winkler Bible School called another; and in the Clearbrook Bible School a former graduate of the Mennonite Brethren College is faithful in his ministry of music.

In summary, there is a conscious effort in the Mennonite Breth ren Bible College faculty to examine our goals and curriculum and deliberately move in the direction of Christian education and theological training for church-related ministries as our primary task. We are doing this because we feel here is the greatest need for our denomination for the future. Students studying at the universities can be cared for by (1) encouraging all students to take a year or two at our Bible schools or our Mennonite Brethren Bible College, and (2) by a chaplains' service for students, such as is going into effect in Ontario and Manitoba. I believe our Committee of Higher Education should occupy itself in greater measure with this question. The Mennonite Brethren Bible College will, however, commit itself to training men and women specifically for church-related ministries.

If you agree with this emphasis, please let us know and support us with your prayers and your efforts to encourage our youth to enter Christian and theological training for the sake of the Church of Jesus Christ. We welcome your directives! We encourage you to express your concerns! We are your servants and Christ's. We believe in the presence of Jesus Christ, the power of the Holy Spirit and the future service of our denomination as we commit ourselves on all levels of endeavor and in unity to the missionary task of the Church.

Victor Adrian

A lengthy discusion in which numerous brethren expressed the approval of the spelling out of the policy of the board by the president-elect followed. In connection with this discussion a motion that the policy statement of the president-elect appear in the papers carried. In the discussion it was further pointed out that we have had confidence in our college leadership in the past. Our former presidents have followed the same course as spelled out in the statement. The sentiment for a continued whole-hearted support of the Bible College was expressed repeatedly. A discussion of the B.D. program was initiated at this point. The need of strengthening this program in view of the future needs of the churches was stressed by the president-elect. The question of the advisability and the possibilities of further cooperation with U.S.A. brethren was also aired at this point.

C. Financial Reports

Brother J. M. Klasssen presented the financial reports. A motion to accept the reports carried.

1. Auditor's Report

We have examined the balance sheet of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College as a May 31, 1967 and the related statements of revenue and expenditure and cash receipts and payments for the year ended on that date. Our examination included a general review of the accounting procedures and such tests of accounting records as we considered necessary in the circumstances, with the exception that Accounts Receivable-Student Charges have not been

verified directly with the students.

In our opinion, subject to the foregoing, the accompanying balance sheet and related statements of revenue and expenditure and receipts and disbursements present fairly the financial position of the College as at May 31, 1967 and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The budget was accepted with the acceptance of the total budget at the sixth session. The budget was discussed. The question of raising tuition fees was raised, but no action was taken.

E. Recommendations:

The secretary of the college board read the recommendations.

- We recommend that this Conference clearly indicate its support of the renewed commitment to the purpose of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College and College of Arts as outlined in the report of the President-elect.
- We recommend that the Board's appointment of Brother Victor Adrian as president of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College be confirmed by the Conference.
- We recommend that the Conference register its appreciation for the twenty years of dedicated service at the College by Brother J. A. Toews.
- 4. We recommend that the Conference approve the allotment of \$3,000 to place a ventilation system into the Unruh Memorial Building (\$,1411.95 is still in the Building Fund.)
- We recommend that the churches continue to support the college with two offerings per year plus a third offering if and when visited.

Preamble to Recommendation 6

In 1965 the Conference made the following decision with regard to future building plans: "We recommend that the College Board be allowed to plan for the expansion of the physical plant provided that this does not necessitate an increase in the conference levy."

Subsequent to that decision changes in college administration

have not made it possible to present concrete plans to be approved by this conference.

Since the next business conference will not meet within two years and the building program needs urgent attention, we place this recommendation before you.

6. We recommend that this Conference permit the Board of Higher Education to present building plans for a College Girls' Dormitory and Dining Hall to the Council of Boards during the course of the next year and then to the churches for final approval.

Recommendation 1 was accepted.

Recommendation 2 was accepted. On behalf of the conference the moderator wished President Victor Adrian God's grace, and asked the congregation to stand for a special prayer of gratitude, petitition, and commital. After the prayer the president accepted the charge and also expressed his gratitude to those who served before.

Recommendations 3-5 were accepted.

Recommendations 6 was accepted with a few opposing votes.

At this point the question of a B.D. program and a seminary was aired once more. In connection with this discussion the motion that the Board of Reference and Counsel take the initiative in studying the whole question of a Canadian M.B. seminary carried. The referee declared the motion null and void since this assignment would conflict with the assigned duties of boards as accepted by the conference at the 1966 convention.

A motion that the conference encourage the faculty of MBBC to do as well as possible in the B.D. program offered at the college at the present time carried.

A further motion that the Committee of Reference and Counsel of the General Conference take the question of a joint seminary into the agenda of their November meeting and report its findings and decisions to the Council of Boards in December carried.

V. PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE

(Proceedings and deliberations as they took place during the second and third sessions on Monday July 3 are recorded here)

A. Chairman's Report:

Brother D. Duerksen, chairman of the Publications Committee read the report.

Dear Brethren:

The Publications Committee of the Canadian Conference is grateful to God for the opportunity of serving Him and the Conference for another year. If you have been following our two conference publications, the Mennonitische Rundschau and the M.B. Her-

old, closely and carefully throughout the year, you will have noticed the tremendous amount of activity our members are involved in. This increase in activity and productivity is quite impressive; whether such activity is always of the most productive nature — spiritually—is another question. For this reason articles endeavoring to channel our thinking and interest into those areas where God would have us be, are so vital in this day and age. If, as a result of what has been written in our publications, our church members have become better informed, inspired and challenged, to serve God and man more faithfully and effectively, then the efforts of the Committee, the Editors and the Staff have not been in vain.

Financially, as you will note from the Manager's report, we have come from a \$4,000 deficit in FY 1966 to a \$4,000 profit in FY 1967. Our printing department in particular, is showing a very encouraging trend. This is being achieved without the full financial return we could and should realize from the Mennonitische Rundschau and the M.B. Herald and without any specific effort to solicit new business. Our printing department is showing its worth and could make money for us if we would provide them with the equipment and the financial means for expansion. To do this, we would only need to reimburse the Christian Press by the same amount that we would have to pay for printing these papers elsewhere, and no further financial assistance would be required to provide the funds for additional capital expenditures.

You will recall that the 1966 Conference voted in favor of the principle that every home in our conference is entitled to receive, free of charge, one of the two Conference papers; and that on request members should be entitled to receive the Mennonitische Rundschau in place of the Herald. To date we have had a total of 1,731 such requests. This means an additional subsidy of \$2.30 for every such transfer granted (as agreed upon at the 1966 Convention, p. 146, 1966 Yearbook).

Your instructions to find ways and means of disposing of "surplus" stocks of books and materials has received as much attention as could be given. Even so, only about \$3,085.00 worth of such material has been sold at reduced prices. The ads in the Mennonitische Rundschau brought results, but much remains to be done. The Board of Missions has been enlisted to help in selling or donating books in South America but definite results from this approach have not yet materialized. We still have an inventory of about \$20,000 worth of such books and supplies to dispose of, the market for which appears to have disappeared in Canada.

To date, the Committee has not been successful in finding a permanent Manager for the Christian Press. This has created extra work for the Executive and frustrations for the Staff. We have been fortunate in obtaining the services of brother Vern Ratzlaff as Interim Manager. We have greatly appreciated his resourcefulness and enthusiasm for the work.

Brother Eric Ratzlaff will assume the duties of Editor of the Mennonitische Rundschau as of August 1, 1967. We wish him God's guidance and blessing and trust that the readers will give him the support that brother H. F. Klassen has also received. To brother Klassen we express our sincere appreciation for his dedication to the work of Christian publication for so many years. He sends this message to the Conference:

Dear Brethren:

As the retiring editor of the "Mennonitische Rundschau", your Christian German Family Weekly, I am thanking you for your trust in my services through 22 years.

The business report will show what this publication costs. What

it has yielded God knows and the readers.

I am not a professional editor and journalist, but have attempted to serve our widescattered Mennonites in the Name of Christ. I published what interested me, knowing that we all are not much different, are of one faith and have more or less the same interests.

While groping for an idea, I was certain of one thing that a Christian family paper should not do: it should not set a brother against brother, friend against friend and one church against another. I thank God that contributors very rarely asked for space for such articles in the "Mennonitische Rundschau."

I am grateful that the "M. Rundschau" was not forced to become a direct voice of the Conference but could remain a Christian family paper, abiding by the principles of our Mennonite Brethren and yet reach many.

In my spirit I wish to be with you today and act like our fathers 60 and more years ago to salute you with an holy kiss (Rom. 16, 16). Sorry, I can't be with you at this conference.

Alas, in public activities it cannot be avoided to hurt someone and to become hurt. Forgive me and I, by the grace of God, shall forgive those who hurt me.

Lately I have tried to attend conferences but could not contribute much, and lack of health makes me stay at the office. May God grant me in future to be with you again.

I pray that He will bless this Conference and the churches whom you serve!

P.S. I am very grateful that the Board of Publications permits me to use my office and be on the payroll till the end of this year.

The reporters from our churches have slowed down in the last weeks. Dear co-workers, the "Mennonitische Rundschau" needs your contributions. Be loyal, the new editor will certainly appreciate it.

After a longer vacation I shall probably look for work again.

We owe a vote of thanks also to brother Harold Jantz, Editor of the M.B. Herald. Whenever the Editorial Committee had an opportunity to meet and discuss matters of policy and future plans with him, it was evident that his sincere desire is to make the Herald a vital force in helping to influence the readers in a positive way. From him we have the following words to the Conference:

What does one say in a few moments of report to an annual conference. My heart is full of joy at the work that God is doing in this world and among his people. During the past year, I have become increasingly aware that God is at work in this world accomp-

lishing his purposes.

The great hunger for the spoken and written Word of God evidenced by the distribution of Scriptures and the formation of many small Bible studies, the growth in Christian conscience evidenced by the widening concern of believers for the social and spiritual needs of people about them, the growing understanding for the nature of the Church shown by our willingness to recognize and work with believers where we see them — all of these are demonstrations of the working of the Spirit of God.

During the past year we have published 46 issues of the Mennonite Brethren Herald. Among many others, we have focussed on such questions as the struggles of the Christian student, the witness of local churches, the work of the ministry, the importance of Christian families, the witness of Christian teachers, the necessity of

thoughtful giving and the problem of war.

We have printed scores of letters in which people have carried the discussions farther which were begun in the articles. We have sought to have the paper be a place where brethren could speak to one another and challenge one another to a greater "spiritual understanding" and a heightened sense of "Christian responsibility." While we know that we have on occasion offended brethren, it was not our intention to offend or become a stumblingblock.

At this occasion, I would publicly like to acknowledge the contribution of John H. Redekop, one of our contributing editors, for his great and sustained contribution to the *Herald*. Many important questions have been broached to us by brother Redekop and thereby become our concern. I would also like to recognize the assistance of Mrs. Hedy Durksen, editor of the women's page and assistant to the editor during the past two years. Through her valuable contribution, women of our brotherhood have faced most constructively some of the most vital questions of the Church.

We look forward with enthusiasm to the coming year. In the months ahead we hope to pay especial attention to our "evangelical-Mennonite" identification, the nature and work of the Church, the witness of several of our vocational groups, and crucial social issues that need to be seen from within a thoroughly biblical orientation. We invite your participation in the paper. Write to the editor. Write an article if you like. Invite your wives to write to Wayside Inn. Encourage your young people to read—and write. Our hope is that we will speak to our needs as we come to see them and in so-doing to assist one another in that great life into which we have been called.

The printing department was forced to purchase new equipment which we had not bargained and budgeted for. The old Johannisberg press broke down and could not be repaired. Fortunately, we were able to buy a new Mergenthaler press just

before price increases came into effect. There has been a slight change in the size of the Mennonitische Rundschau but the amount of material which can be printed is essentially the same.

The manager's report was given by Vern Ratzlaff.

Sales Trends

Our operating statement shows a net profit of \$4,232 for FY67 after a charge of \$7,895 for depreciation, a cash profit of \$12.127.

Finances

Private loans have been reduced by \$7,164 to a present \$9,836. On the Conference loan, however, only interest has been paid. Should the Christian Press be allowed to operate on a profit basis, however, this could be repaid.

Sales returns from Conference-donated stocks amounted to \$3,711, but this figure is shown in the surplus account and is not included in the operating statement.

Projection

The bookstore's deficit needs a comment if we are to consider the bookstore's true position. Reduction of non-moving stock through drastically reduced prices has reduced the sales figure. Further, since the bookstore is to be a service to our Conference, margin profit on sales of books to churches and our policy of paying all shipping costs to churches even outside Manitoba have reduced the operating margins. To bring inventory to a realistic operating level will involve action which will result in a further recorded deficit FY68.

Our potential for service is as great as is the need of our churches. For the July-Sept. quarter, we served 87 churches with Sunday school material from four publishing houses. We have had opportunity to help in establishing church libraries in churches outside our own conference.

If we are to continue a favourable returns-situation in our printing department, we will have to acquire equipment. The General Conference Board of Christian Literature will be publishing material which we will be printing. Our own periodicals also require dependable equipment if they are to serve the increasing needs of our reader-constituency. That we are still engaging competetively was shown in a Sept./66 analysis of cost estimates based on job-printing our periodicals in other shops. These estimates averaged 15% higher than our own shop-printing costs.

C. Auditor's Statement:

The Members, Mennonite Brethren Conference, Winnipeg, Manitoba

We have examined the Balance Sheet of The Christian Press as at May 31, 1967 and the Statement of Income and Expense for the year ended on that date, and have obtained all the information and explanations we have required. Our examination included a general review of accounting procedures and such tests of accounting records and other supporting evidence as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In our opinion, and according to the best of our information and the explanations given to us, and as shown by the books of the Company, the accompanying Balance Sheet and Statement of Income and Expense are properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the state of the affairs of the Company as at May 31, 1967, and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.

E. Recommendations:

The recommendations were read by the chairman of the committee. He also moved and seconded their adoption. At the third session action on the recommendations was taken.

 We recommend that a Conference grant of \$44,678.42 be approved to defray the publishing and distribution costs of the MB Herald for the 1967-68 fiscal year.

 We recommend that the Conference approve a subsidy of \$25,700 to cover the anticipated deficit of publishing and distributing the Mennonitische Rundschau for the 1967-68 fiscal year

To this is to be added \$4.00 per year for all MR transferals until May 31, 1969 pro rated on a monthly basis.

We recommend that the following equipment purchases be authorized:

 a) One tape type-setting machine and tape perforation typewriter for immediate purchase.

b) One 18" Offset press, typesetter and accessories, as re-

quired.

It is understood that because of the increased efficiency, reduced labour requirements and a greatly increased business potential, no Conference funds will be required. The financing of the above is to be planned in consultation with the Board of Management.

4. We recommend that our Canadian Conference Boards, Churches, and church groups be encouraged to patronize, as fully as feasible, our Conference printing department and bookstore, and that they cooperate in all possible ways to help in the distribution of surplus books and supplies, as this

might apply to the Board's sphere of activity.

5. We recommend sending a positive reply to a request from the Manitoba and Ontario Historical Societies regarding publication of a "History of Mennonites in Canada" with the stipulation that we do not accept any financial obligations at this time, and that the financing and format of the project be reconsidered and renegotiated.

6. We recommend that \$3,000 be allowed on the budget for

literature publication and distribution.

7. We recommend that a letter of appreciation be sent to brother H. F. Klassen in recognition for his 22 years of service.

Recommendation 1 In the discussion of this recommendations the moderator clarified that in view of the reorganization it is understood that the budgets presented for a one year term now will be the same next year. By a show of hands the delegates expressed their approval of this thought. The Publications Committee expressed the hope that after two years the conference subsidy would be reduced. Discussion of the recommendation was to continue at the third session.

At the third session Recommendations 1-4 were accepted.

Recommendation 5: Concerns were expressed relative to being financially involved as a conference. The recommendation was defeated. A motion carried that the conference go on record as encouraging the historical society to publish the book, but that the conference assume no financial commitments in support of the project.

Recommendation 6 and Recommendation 7 were accepted.

VI. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE OF GENERAL CONFERENCE

(Proceedings as they took place at session six recorded here)
The moderator called upon brother Wm. Neufeld to read the report.

After mentioning the Canadian Board members, brother Neuteld read the report:

The Board of Christian Literature, officially established by the General Conference last year at Corn, Oklahoma, has received the assignment to:

- coordinate the production of literature in our conference
- encourage Christian writing and journalism
- disseminate lists of Christian literature of particular value
- produce literature in areas of need

The Literature Board is a supplement to present literary efforts. It is not to take over publishing which other boards or the publication houses project. In order that the board be an effective clearing house, other agencies are URGED to inform the board of publications.

The Initial Stages

The Board was asked by the Reference and Counsel committee to launch a devotional booklet. Worship Together appeared January 1, 1966. It has been well received and has met a family need. George Konrad will succeed A. J. Klassen as editor beginning with the September, 1967 issue. Consideration is being given to requests to translate Worship Together into German and Spanish.

A noteworthy milestone is the release of a new book, The Church in Mission, at this conference. Edited by A. J. Klassen of the Mennonite Brethren Seminary, Fresno, the book examines the mission challenge facing the church at home and abroad. Twenty-two writers contribute biblical, historical, and evaluative essays in this Festschrift dedicated to J. B. Toews, one of the many brethren used of God in our brotherhood to focus the missionary task.

♣rojections

Biographical materials written for youth are to appear in the text two years. Manuscript assignments have been made for 60-page booklets on the lives of Johann Classen, P. M. Friesen, David Duerksen, A. Schellenberg, J. F. Harms.

Within a year a 48-page booklet, **Introducing the Mennonite Brethren Church**, should be available. This booklet, written in popular style, should be of value in presenting our brotherhood to adults and to youth.

Preliminary work is being done on the preparation of a pamphlet series on ethics: situation ethics, professional ethics. In this connection we commend the **Mennonite Brethren Herald** for its insert pamphlet on ethics.

Two manuals, the one designed for our ministers and the other for membership classes, are now in preparation. The Alberta Conference was among those requesting a pastor's handbook.

The first two of a number of Christian Writer's Institutes are to be held in the coming year at Winnipeg and Fresno.

Periodically a newsletter mailed to pastors and educators will list key books in certain areas.

The delegation to the General Conference indicated brotherhood concern for literature by allocating \$30,000 for the triennium for **Worship Together** and \$30,000 for the production of other literature. We desire to be good stewards of our opportunity. We welcome your suggestions and desire your prayer.

The Board of Christian Literature

A motion to adopt the report carried. During the course of the report brother Neufeld raised the question as to whether the Canadian Conference would favour translating the book Worship Together into German and Spanish. In this connection a motion carried that if the need is there, the Canadian conference would encourage and also support such translations.

After announcements by the assistant moderator, brother John Voth, Saskatoon closed the meeting with prayer.

Fifth Session: Tuesday afternoon, July 4, 1967

Brother J. K. Schroeder led in the song "The Work is Thine". Brother H. Poetker opened the meeting with prayer. The secretary read the minutes of the fourth session. The minutes were adopted with one correction. The conference received greetings from brother H. G. Tielmann from the Coaldale hospital. A proposal for a change in the time schedule from the executive was rejected by accepting the motion to remain with the original schedule, to work till 3 p.m. at which time the meeting of the boards would take place. It was also agreed to start the evening session at 6 p.m.

SECTION E - MISSIONS

I. BOARD OF MISSIONS AND SERVICES

Representatives of the Board of Missions and Services came to the platform. Brother J. J. Toews made opening comments and introduced the brethren P. J. Funk, H. Brucks and A. J. Neufeld.

Brother H. Brucks conveyed greetings from the chairman of the Hillsboro office staff, brother J. H. Epp, and other staff members. He also asked all missionaries to stand. Briefly he introduced the workers to the conference.

A. Report:

Brother Henry Brucks read parts of the report with accompanying comments. Brother A. J. Neuefeld commented on the work of the deputation ministry to the churches. He expressed gratitude for the speaking of interest in the churches in bringing people to Christ.

Dear Delegates to the Canadian Conference:

We are reminded of the words of Jesus in His prayer when He says, "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word: that they all may be one... that the world may believe that thou hast sent me."

If the world is to come to a saving knowledge of Christ, there must be a united witness of God's people. We thank God that as a General Conference we can work together to bring the Gospel to 15 countries in some 16 languages. More than 32,000 baptized believers around the world are praising God because we cared. And then there are the unknown numbers who have gone into eternity who are with the Lord because we told them of Jesus and His saving grace.

At the sessions of the General Conference in Corn, Oklahoma, we presented a detailed statistical report of our work. We have tried to get a copy of this report into every home. If there are those who do not have it, feel free to write for your copy. Our present report will therefore not include these statistics. We will just refer to a few highlights.

The decision to merge the ministries of the Board of Missions and the Board of General Welfare and Christian Service has been a highlight of this past year.

The newly elected Board of Missions and Services consists of the following fifteen brethren:

Waldo Hiebert serves as chairman; J. J. Toews as the vice-chairman; and H. H. Dick as secretary.

Two meetings have been held to grapple with the practical aspects of merging the two programs. Overseas General Welfare and Christian Service assignments have been transferred to the respective area desks. Certain domestic responsibilities are to be transferred to area or district committees. The Board of Reference and Counsel has suggested that domestic Christian Service continue to be the responsibility of this board.

With this in mind the board visualized the following adminstrative structure:

A General Secretary - who will be responsible to the board for the total program. Under his direction there are to be four or five associate secretaries — finance secretary, area secretaries and a communications secretary. An interim arrangement has been made until these positions can be filled.

Rev. H. R. Wiens has resigned to assume responsibilities of the Buhler Church. We have appreciated his services to the cause of missions and we wish him God's richest blessings in his new field of work.

The following administrative secretariat is functioning at present:

J. H. Epp — Chairman and area secretary for Asia and Africa Henry Brucks — Vice-chairman and area secretary for Latin America and Europe, as well as presonnel and deputation

P. J. Funk - Secretary and office manager and Secretary of Finance

Dwight Wiebe - Domestic Christian Service Secretary

A. J. Neufeld — Minister of Deputation

To work with the secretariat in preparing recommendations for board action, the board has divided itself into area committees dealing with geographical areas of work as well as into various commissions dealing with such matters as policies, personnel, finances, and comunications.

We are grateful to the General Conference for increasing the operational budget by 20%. This will enable us to more adequately meet the needs of the hour. We are trusting the Lord to make it possible for our churches to meet this need.

We take this opportunity to thank our Canadian Churches for their contributions. Though the average giving during the last six months is still under par, we are confident that with the present trend of increased giving we will be able to reach the goal set by the adopted budget.

The following highlights in our misisons activities should be an incentive for continued prayer and praise.

Brazil

The David Nightingales in Brazil report, "We are deeply grateful to God for the grace He gave for the survey of the German areas in Parana and Santa Catarina here in Brazil. There were opportunities for personal work and preaching. Please pray for the Lord's guidance as we, together with the M.B. Conference of South America, plan the next phase of this follow-up ministry." This follow-up work is carried on in connection with the German broadcasts of HCJB for which our conference is responsible.

Starting in July of this year the Bill Wagners will begin working among university students in Curitiba after a year of language

study in Sao Paulo.

As part of her work among nurses and women Miss Edna Thiessen reports of joy in her work as she teaches 17 students in a state controlled school of nursing. Thus far 5 of the 17 students are coming at least once a week for Bible study.

Theological Institute — John Boldt reports that the Theological Institute in Curitiba has an increased enrollment over last year, the number being 25. The testimony of good sacred music is very powerful in Brazil. The people respond readily to the Christian message in song and music.

Christian Service Workers — Through the work and ministry of the Bill Wagners and the Jim Nickels, five members of the land-lord's family were gloriously saved and are now diligently studying the Bible. Many of the Christian Service workers are involved in teaching Bible classes, Sunday school or some other form of church work besides their regular work in the classroom.

Colombia

More than 10,000 Colombians heard the gospel through the showing of films and distribution of literature by the M.B. Conference during March.

In radio, the M.B. Conference in Colombia feels they should start their own program with their own speaker for most effective results. They have sponsored a program which has not been getting mail response and are also looking for different station outlets.

Miss Elizabeth Tieszen leaves America on July 8 for an assignment in Colombia. She will be working in the area of Christian education, selecting curriculum materials and training teachers.

Peter Loewens will be going there this fall to serve in secondary schools. At present they are in language study in Costa Rica. Their report concerning the distribution of New Testaments in a Roman Catholic area was refreshing and inspiring news for all readers.

Christian Service Workers — The Christian Service workers in Cali are joining missionaries in a program of canvassing the people of the city with Christian literature during the month of June. Many of the Christian Service workers report that their meetings with the regular mission personnel are both informative and inspiring.

Congo

The doors to the Congo remain wide open. The young nation is struggling to gain an economic balance. She is trying to subsidize the education and some of the medical programs. But the Congolese depend heavily upon us to supply the needed personnel. Our missionary force in the Congo has increased considerably. A number of teachers are subsidized by the government. We have agreed to supply medical personnel for one of their hospitals. Short term and Christian Service workers are there in relief projects to supervise the proper use of foreign aid funds and also serve as teachers in the American School in Kinshasa.

Much help is needed in the literature program. Congo has the highest literacy rate among African countries but we have supplied little for them to read. Our missionaries are working overtime to supply the needed reading and study material. Thus we only have a few who are able to give themselves to direct church related ministries.

More than 3,000 Africans are studying the Word by mail through our Bible Correspondence School in Kinshasa. Through this medium the Word is presented to people ranging from government officials to prisoners.

The revolution of the past with the accompanying evacuation of the missionaries has taught the national pastor to assume full pastoral responsibilities. The ground work for the incorporation of the national church has been completed. It is thus only a matter of formality and the national church will have full legal standing with the government.

We want to pray that God will continue to raise up strong national leaders in all our fields.

Europe

The Roland Marsch family have accepted the call to pastor the Neuwied Church as of June of this year. Complications have arisen with the illness of Mrs. Marsch and their son Bobby, shortly after their arrival on the field.

J. A. Toews will be serving on the Luxemburg radio broadcast as well as Bible teaching and evangelism while B. J. Braun is on furlough. Brother Toews will also be serving the Müssen Church in a series of deeper life and Bible emphasis services during the month of October.

The church in Salzburg has been able to rent a small chapel on Mozart Platz 4 in the heart of Salzburg. This fall they hope to start with a full church program. Linz, Austria is planning evangelistic meetings (tent) in an outlying part of the city from the 6-17 of September. The Lord willing they plan to begin a new work there.

The group in Kaiserslautern reports that several souls were saved through the radio ministry this year. There have been some visible results through the free record offer that was made available to listeners. The Lord has graciously blessed the literature and record production as part of the follow-up program in their radio-outreach.

India

We thank God for strong spiritual national leaders who are emerging in India. An active evangelistic program under the direction of nationals has developed under the guidance of our missionaries. We thank God for scores that have been added to the churches during recent campaigns.

Evangelistic campaigns are being conducted in each of the nine fields. Ten special campaigns will be held among the Lombardi tribes people this summer and ten in a new area in Kalwakurthi field.

We have deeply appreciated the ministry of Brother and Sister

A. A. Unruh who have now reached their retirement age. We know that in their ministry to our churches at home they will continue

to inspire us for missions.

The David Friesens from La Glace are scheduled to arrive in India on July 12. We wish them the Lord's blessing as they will serve in the missionary children's school. The Jake Falks of Winnipeg are waiting to get permission to go to India to help in church work. We covet your prayer that the visas will be granted.

Japan

The work in Japan is progressing and moving ahead. Brother and Sister Roland Wiens, who visited many of our churches a year ago, have returned to the field and have started work in a new housing area. To begin with, two Christian families were found where Bible classes were begun. Recently a Christian doctor from Canada visited this place and found a group of more than forty assembled for worship in a home. Twenty-five of these were professing Christians.

Thus another church is being born to be added to the eleven we already have after seventeen years of operation. We thank God for churches. Pray for the workers and for our training institution, the Osaka Biblical Seminary. The new administration classroom building was dedicated in March. At the dedication service the head of the residential area in which the seminary is situated said: "More than 20 years have passed since the end of the war... and it is time to show the fruit of the saying, "Well fed, well bred." But as yet, there is no sign that the depravity of the human mind is being cured... If there is an increase in the numbers of Christians who have such a way of life as you have, then those fears will surely disappear."

The seminary has graduated 35 students, most of whom are in fulltime church service. The school is in need of a dining hall and dormitory space. The present dining hall which is being rented is to be taken away to give way to a highway that will cut across this area. The field is asking for \$20,000 to help erect this building.

Mexico

A total of 67 decisions for Christ during May through the showing of a Spanish gospel film are reported by M.B. Conference missionaries. Most of those making decisions were channeled into evangelical churches for nurture since the M.B. Conference has not yet begun a church in its evangelistic efforts in this city of

Guadalajara in Southwestern Mexico.

The M.B. Conference has explored the possibilitity of opening a Christian literature distribution center in Guadalajara as part of an evangelistic outreach in that area. They were planning on the possibility of opening a bookstore under the Latin America Mission but L.A.M. has decided not to continue to be a wholesaler in Mexico. So the initiating of a conference bookstore in Mexico is at a standstill at present.

In the city of Monterey in Northern Mexico, conference missionaries Dan Petkers from Corn, Oklahoma, are continuing their

assignment of evangelism and church planting.

Plans are that German Contreras and his family, a worker of Mexico Mennonite Brethren Conference, will begin working in Reynosa in August. They have been engaged in evangelism and church building in San Miguel where a small church has been started.

Mexico will need special prayer support during the next months.

Panama

Mr. and Mrs. David Wirsche and Willodene Vogt, R.N., left the United States by plane for Panama on June 11. There they will spend several months ministering to the Indians in the interior. Their work will include nurturing the believers in the Word, teaching Indians to read, teaching women to fulfill their roles as Christians in the family, medical services, and teaching of basic hygiene.

The Jim Harrisons who have been involved in student tutoring

will be coming home on furlough.

Brother H. H. Janzen served the South American churches for a four-month period in the spring of this year. He ministered to the churches and Bible institutes in the area of Bible conferences and Christian worker rallies.

Paraguay

The church building in the Bernardino Caballero section of Asuncion is nearing completion. It is the second such building in the Asuncion area and is expected to be finished in August of this year.

Sixteen young people attended he Bible institute for Paraguayans this past year.

Friesland — Arndt Funk and Edwin Janzen are working with the lepers and also distribution of literature.

In September 1966, Rev. J. H. Franz together with conference leader Hans Wiens was named to a commission to make a detailed study of the Indian resettlement in Paraguay's Chaco. The results of this study have now been completed and presented to the South American conference.

Peru

Brother and Sister LaMont Schmidt — They will be leaving the United States in the latter part of August for San Jose, Costa Rica for Spanish language school. After having studied a year they will proceed to Peru where they will spend time with the Wycliffe translators who have an agricultural program among the Indians. LaMont will be helping Campa Indians to become selfsupporting.

The Sylvester Dirks who have been working with the Campa

Indians are returning home for furlough this summer.

In the Evangelism-in-Depth program each church is having an

evangelistic campaign in the month of June. This will be followed by a region-wide united evangelistic campaign to be held in the regional capital (Pucallpa) the last 15 days of September. M.B. Conference missionary Joe Walter is coordinator for Evangelism-in-Depth in Eastern Peru.

During the months of August, September and October, Paul Friesen will be teaching in the Swiss-Indian Bible Institute where a number of Campa men are attending. In the months following this, he will go with them to their villages to help them in preaching and teaching.

South Texas

The Latin American Conference is taking preliminary steps in assuming greater responsibility for the work both spiritually and financially.

In June of this year the Chihuahua M.B. Church decided to take the first steps toward self-supporting and self-governing. This

arrangement has been made on a one-year trial basis.

The Daniel Wirsches who have been working in South Texas for the past eight years have left the field and are making pre-

parations to go to Uruguay this fall.

Alfred Quiring who has completed his Spanish language study is now assisting in the LaJoya Church and with the vacation Bible school program.

Uruguay

The Dan Wirsches plan to arrive in Montevideo on October 20 to replace the J. P. Neufelds in the field of German and Spanish evangelism and church work.

On February 5 the newly erected M.B. Church in Montevideo was dedicated. The bi-lingual (German and Spanish) services were attended by over 100 persons. Walter Presa, Uruguayan Mennonite formerly a Baptist, who is assisting in the M.B. Spanish outreach, took an active part in the inauguration program.

In January of this year Brother and Sister J. P. Neufeld visited the churches in Brazil and Uruguay. He also attended he M.B. Conference in Uruguay and served them with several messages.

Intermissions

1. HCJB, Quito, Ecuador

Motto for this year, "Harvest for Heaven in 1967."

A new transmitter was put into operation in April and two new 100 KW transmitters have been ordered, one of which should be on the air before the end of this year.

The Peter Hueberts of the German department are now on furlough and deputation assignment in Brazil. The Jacob Duecks (Olga Pries) who have been working in Brazil have replaced the Hueberts during their absence.

April was a record letter month for the Russian Department of HCJB. One letter reported that 60-70 people in a village in Russia accepted the Lord, mostly as a result of the broadcasts from this station.

The newest program, a ministry in the French language, brings in more than 1,000 letters a month.

2. Missionary Aviation Fellowship

This service organization provides air transportation for missions into areas where land travel is not possible, difficult or time consuming. This service has been a tremendous boom for the cause of missions. We have four couples serving under M.A.F. today.

3. Sudan Interior Mission

We have five missionaries serving under Sudan Interior Mission in Nigeria and one in Ethiopia. We are happy to report that the Lord is blessing the ministry and has protected our missionaries even during the up-rising in Nigeria.

4. The Evangelical Alliance Mission

We have one doctor and his family serving in India among the Tibetian refugees in this program.

5. Gospel Light Ministry

As a mission and service board, we provide one-half of the financial support for foreign releases in the various parts of the world. We count it a special privilege to have Brother D. B. Wiens, whose Russian messages are carried to the people in Russia as well as to Russian-speaking people in other areas.

Domestic Service Program

1. Highlights

- 92 workers serving in the Christian Service Program at present
- 137 Christian Service workers have completed terms of service in Domestic and Overseas program
- 24 projects in U.S.A. and Canada
- New projects in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia; Prince Edward Island; Ulysses, Kansas
- Christian Service sponsors largest Orientation School in Winnipeg — 27 enrolled
- 12 new workers being assigned to overseas projects
- 30 new workers being assigned to domestic projects this year
 21 young people entering Summer Service assignments in B.C., Ontario, P.E.I., California, North Carolina

 Retired Ontario couple accepted a two year assignment as houseparents in Detroit, Michigan

2. Church Building Through -

a) Church Development — In Phonix, Lincoln, Omaha and Minot, the Christian Service workers are actively involved as Sunday School teachers, choir members and Church Building Committee members.

b) Church planting — A new work is being started to establish an MB witness in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. Christian Service is assigning teachers to this area in order to strengthen

the witness of the church.

c) Church Construction — The Hugo Wienses, Christian Service workers from Ontario, will assume the responsibility of contractor for the church building in Lincoln, Nebraska. Additional workers are invited to join this church building team. A new church building is also being planned for

Phoenix this fall or winter.

d) Church Outreach — Our kindergarten programs in Phoenix, Omaha and Minot have greatly assisted the churches in their outreach to the families in the area surrounding the churches. The families are beginning to respond by becomming involved in the church program activities. In Phoenix 140 people attended the closing program of the kindergarten at which time 26 boys and girls graduated from the school. A pre-school program will also be implemented in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia this fall to assist in the establishing of a church there.

e) Christian Education — The Christian Service Program is active in helping build leaders for our own churches by assigning workers to the staff of the following schools: Tabor College, Pacific College, Freeman Junior Academy, Immanuel

Academy (Reedley), Corn Bible Academy.

f) Mission-sponsored School — At the present time we have one Christian Service worker assigned as elementary teacher at the El Faro School in Texas. The school in El Faro was begun by the Board of Missions and then transferred to the Southern District Home Mission Board, serving the young

people of our South Texas Mission field.

g) Medical Ministry — At the present time we have six Christian Service personnel serving in various hospitals in Phoenix, Arizona. This presents opportunities for them to minister to the physical as well as spiritual needs of the people they serve. This fall the Christian Service Program will also be assigning personnel to the Ulysses Hospital project under the management of M.B. leadership from the local community on the Board.

h. Camps and DVBS — provide our Christian Service personnel with the opportunities to work especially with youth. The Christian Service Program is sending workers to assist in camps and DVBS in British Columbia; Eden Bible Camp in Ontario; Murray Harbour Camp on Prince Edward Island; Hartland Camp in California; and in Boone, North Carolina.

3. Called To Be Sent

In the age of crisis, the Lord is speaking to our conference young people to become involved in the task of the church.

Instead of apathy, God calls for dedication.

Instead of aimlessness - purpose.

Instead of materialism - safrifice.

We praise God for our conference youth who have heard the call of the Lord in our congregations and are willing to give their time, training and talents for the cause of Christ.

We covet your prayers, your support and most of all your young people whom God has called and sent out into the world to help build His church John 17:18 — "As thou didst send me into the world, so I have sent them into thy world."

Christian Service workers are among the youth who have heard the call of the Master and have chosen to march in step with Him.

Ministry of Deputation

Dear Brethren of the Canadian Conference:

"When they reached Jerusalem they were welcomed by the church and the apostles and elders, and reported all that God had helped them to do." Acts 15:4.

It is now 10 months since I have actively entered the service to our churches in the ministry of deputation. The ministry has been a blessed one to me personally. In many areas vital interest in missions has been registered. A significant response has come from individuals indicating their desire for personal involvment.

Permit me to present a brief statistical report on my ministry from September 1, 1966 to July 1, 1967.

It is my impression that there is a distinct growing awareness of the charge God has committed to our brotherhood. We must increasingly explore possibilities of utilizing the potentials given our brotherhood in personnel, as well as unprecedented material wealth.

It is also my impression that we must see more of our people channeled into active, full-time ministry of the gospel. As we encourage the general laity to complete involvement in their individual

professions, we must also emphasize and underscore that the need for the full-time Gospel ministry is continually before us. And while we are grateful for every gift given to promote the preaching of the gospel, we need to encourage our hearts to learn of the Macedonian congregation. Though they were tried hard they were so "exuberantly" happy that from the depts of their poverty, they have shown themselves lavishly open-handed. Going to the limit of their resources — and even beyond that limit — for they gave their very selves. — Provided there is an eager desire to give, God accepts what a man has; he does not ask for what he has not. II Corinthians 8.

B. Financial Report — Brother P. J. Funk gave the financial report. Church giving for missions has increased about 10%. He drew attention to the sacrificial giving that is evident. Brother Funk encouraged the conference to continue to pray and to give.

The assistant moderator expressed thanks for the reports and for the impressions left with us.

Brother H. Lenzmann took the chair.

The secretary read the appointments by the executive of brethren to hair the first meeting of the six boards.

II. EVANGELISM

(Proceedings and deliberations as they took place in session six recorded here.)

Brother John M. Schmidt, chairman, introduced Board members,

executive secretary, J. J. Toews, William Schmidt, radio speaker, and read the report.

A. Report by Chairman:

Our Lord's authoritative command in Mark 5:19, "Go home to your friends, and tell them how much the Lord has done for you, and how he has had mercy on you" (R.S.V.), is not only an injunction to a single individual who had experienced a miraculous healing, but contains and reflects the very basic principles of all biblical evangelism, and is therefore mandatory for all believers. In keeping with this divine and imperative decree, the Committee has directed the main thrust of its endeavour toward this objective. We have sought to design a program which will assist the individual member of our congregations into a closer relationship with Christ and effect a conscious commitment of involvement to personal evangelism.

We are deeply grateful to the brethren of the C.R.C. for their kind consideration and for graciously accepting the Committee's request to adopt the subject of "Evangelism" as the main theme for this Centennial Conference convention. We are confident that this emphasis will be a blessing to the delegates and produce positive results in our local churches. Besides the regular sittings in July, the executive met with the Interim Christian Education Committee and the Gospel Light Hour in December. The Committee also convened again in February at the time of the Faith and Ethics Conference. We were also able to meet some U.S.A. brethren who are engaged in similar work at the General Conferenc in Corn, Oklahoma, USA.

Reports received from pastors and the churches where the Executive Secretary has served, forcefully indicate that the Lord is graciously and abundantly blessing the work of our Br. J. J. Toews. Requests for the type of ministry adopted have multiplied to the extent where it is physically impossible for him to meet the growing demand. The scheduling of campaigns is governed by a Master Plan by which each province will receive services proportionate to its total membership. While the Committee keenly recognizes the need of an additional worker, it is not prepared to make such a recommendation at this time. The follow-up work which is vitally important to the type of approach now employed, will of necessity have to be carried through by the local church leadership. The conservation and development of resolutions formed during the services, are largely dependent upon the follow-up program fostered within the respective churches. With all due considerations to the effectiveness of our evangelist's work, and the supporting literature, it must be said, that the realization of lasting fruit will still be in direct proportion to the nurture and encouragement received from the local fellowship, and its willingness to implement evangelism through the individual member. While it is too early to make a proper statistical survey, there are a sufficient number of positive factors which would indicate that the present approach to evangelism is more effective than the old conventional method. The Committee however, would gravely warn against abolishing Evangelistic Campaigns. It would encourage these churches who have established rapport with seeking persons in their communities, to plan for and conduct such services. They have and will continue to be one of the fruitful means which the Holy Spirit uses to win souls.

During the past year our Board has been in frequent contact with the G.L. Hour Committee. It was mutually agreed to appoint a Commission of five brethren — two representatives from each committee with Br. J. J. Riediger serving as neutral chairman. This Commission was to prepare a detailed brief which would serve as a basis for a happy working relationship between the two Committees. Although the brief necessitated much laborious work, it is now nearing completion. The placing of the Can. Radio Broadcast has developed rather slowly as the decision to air the program in the individual provinces, was contingent upon the resolutions of the area conferences, most of which were only held a few weeks ago. The following provinces have to date decided to air the Can. Gospel Light Hour in their constituencies: British Columbia, Alberta, Manitoba, Ontario. We are happy to report that the program is enjoying an increasing demand. Requests from a number of offices of radio stations, offering time for its release over their facilities, as well as offers from Christian business men to support the program have come in. Our speaker and director brother Wm. Schmidt is doing a commendable work and needs our prayerful support. This Radio Broadcast can develop into a very meaningful and effective arm of the Conference, providing the provinces will give it their wholehearted support. This we most sincerely cherish and trust that the Lord will grant us an increasing unity of mind and spirit, vision and zeal to reach our neighbor's soul with the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.

As to the direction and nature of the future course, the existing Committee is not in the position to speak for the incoming Board. However, we believe that all effort should be employed to develop a manifold approach to evangelism in which the various types, e.g. Lay Evangelism, Visitation Evangelism, Education Evangelism, Mass and Personal Evangelism, Saturation Evangelism and Evangelism in Depth are all utilized to achieve the objective — "that I might by ALL MEANS SAVE SOME." 1 Cor. 9:22.

In the name of our old Committee I wish to express our deep appreciation for the confidence, co-operation and support received over the past years. We welcome the re-organization and wish the new Board God's wisdom, empowerment, guidance and success in promoting the cause of evangelism in our Conference.

The above 16 churches: B.C. — 2; Alberta — 3; Sask. — 7; Man. — 4; Ont. — 0; made arangements for campaigns through the Committee on Evangelism and consequently received the specified finanial assistance, i.e. remuneration for the number of days served and travelling costs.) The brethren served a total of 98 days, with an average of 6% days per campaign. The provision for such aid was initially made to assist smaller churches who wish to conduct evangelistic campaigns, but who might find it diffcult to procure the services of an evangelist, or who due to a lack of finances are not sufficiently solvent to administer all expenditures incurred by such a venture.

Churches desiring assistance should make their request known in good time. As the Committee now has the services of a full time clerical secretary, all communication related to evangelism

C. Report by the Executive Secretary

Brother J. J. Toews read the report:

"Go out into the highway and byways and compel them to come in that my house may be filled." Luke 14:23.

The Lord has permitted us to labour in our churches for one Conference year seeking to stimulate an appropriate response to the above expressed concern of our Saviour. Since our assignment called for a new approach to evangelism in our churches, we were very much aware that we were treading on virgin soil. Our search for a program of evangelism that will really meet the need of our

Conference and gain the support of all of our churches and pastors, has only begun. We are asking the Lord for further directives so that evangelism within our churches may not only be an occasional irregular attempt but that the Lord would show us how we could, in a biblical way, employ all the soul-winning potential within our churches to His glory and the salvation of souls. In our search, we do not believe that we have already arrived nor come to any final conclusion, but with the devoted support of the Evangelism Committee and in consultation with our pastors and brethren in the constituency, we want to anticipate that God will show us a plan which He can use in this 20th century to bring a harvest of souls.

In this search for a method, we have studied the program of Evangelism of several denominations and movements in our day. Such research has been time consuming and will continue to call for considerable effort. In any program which we anticipate we will need to be constant in our message but flexible in our method. However, several biblical principles have already emerged.

- 1. The local church and its pastor will need to remain central in all systematic program of evangelism.
- 2. Evangelism in the church building can only be an overflow of the evangelistic activities of the church members outside of the church building.
- 3. The Church will need to recognize that the purpose of its services or the purpose of the "Church gathered" is to be an effective "Church Scattered" throughout the week.
- 4. The pastor is the key to church renewal and evangelism. Trueblood, in his book, The Incendiary Fellowship, says, "The ministry is the point at which to begin because ministers are usually placed where they can make a difference. . . . Time and again we have witnessed in a church a change for the better or for worse with the coming of a new minister. Given the same people, the same social environment, the same instruments to work with, one man will discover to the church its real reason for being and uncap latent forces of great spiritual power while the other will fail . . . The pastor is important, not because he is wiser or better than are other men, but because he is so placed that he may be able to draw out and direct the power of other men." pp. 35-36. We can never hope to have an evangelistic church without an evangelistic and soul-winning pastor.
- 5. Yet while the pastor remains the key, for an evangelistic church, the involvement of each member in evangelism is imperative, for it is not the shepherd that gives birth to the lambs but the flock.
- 6. All organizations and agencies within the church will need to focus their purpose on soul-winning and thus become an evangelistic arm of the church.
 - 7. We will need to be careful not to swing too readily in favor

of any new movements for evangelism which have or may spring up and thus hope to find the key in a method instead of in a spiritual travail for children to be born. Youth for Christ, Intervarsity, Navigators, Campus Crusade, community crusades, all have merit. But to swing from one to another without keeping the local church central will result in repeated spurts without permanence. Our churches need to be the primary soul-winning agency in the minds of our people.

8. Our churches will need to carefully plan for more than a two week effort each year. Evangelism needs to be a constant aspect of church life and programming. If Barth says, "The Church exists by mission as fire exists by burning," we only need to change one word to say, "Evangelism is to the Church, what fire is to burning." In other words, an evangelical church that does not evangelize has ceased to be a church.

The work in the churches during the past year has largely consisted of Church Growth Clinics in which we sought to stress motivation, intercession, use of scripture for soul-winning, plus the responsibility of personal witnessing and establishing of good rapport of the churches and its members with the community. In most instances, the Church Growth Clinics were well received but the lasting effects of them have not been ascertained, this largely because we did not have the possibility of remaining in contact with the churches visited. It is our impression that we will need to develop a program whereby the Church Growth Clinics will only be a beginning of a soul-winning thrust which would be followed by at least a year of concentrated soul-winning effort on the part of the respective church. Such efforts as training in soul-winning, visitation, etc., should follow, and a systematic outreach into the community be established. This would culminate with a church campaign, which we trust, will result in a harvest of souls. After such a year of concentrated effort we would believe that the evangelistic fervor thus generated would continue in a local church permanently. The basis for such a year-long program may be gleaned from the various denominations such as the Southern Baptist, Missionary Alliance and others who call it Saturation Evangelism or Progressive Evangelism. However, before we promote such an approach too specifically, it will need to be reviewed by the board of Evangelism and adapted so as to fit into our specific context most effectively.

It is our prayer that not only the church as a whole may be harnessed for the soul-winning effort, neither do we want to be content to inspire certain individuals in this direction, but it is our aim that also every organization within the church will become a dynamic force which the Lord may use to reach the lost.

In the past year we have visited eight churches in Ontario, two in Manitoba, nine in Saskatchewan, four in Alberta, and four in British Columbia, or a total of twenty-eight churches. The contact Besides continuing our work in the churches we want to survey the market for appropriate material which may be helpful for the purpose of evangelism to our churches and their various organizations. We would also want to gather information as to any successful work in the area of outreach done anywhere within our constituency and communicate this to such of our churches who are eager to exploit their opportunities.

We are grateful that the Lord has sent Miss Rita Unruh to assist us as office secretary and we can confidently assure you there will be more prompt response to your inquiries and requests. May we invite you to feel very free to send your requests or suggestions to us and we will do all in our power to be of service to the Lord and our churches.

As we continue, we do covet your prayers and counsel so that we may be fruitful in our efforts.

A motion carried to adopt the report. The board chairman encouraged prayer for brother J. J. Toews and his family.

D. Report by Wm. Schmidt on Gospel Light Hour

At this time brother William Schmidt reported briefly on the radio ministry of the Gospel Light Hour. The program is released in the four western Canadian provinces. There are possibilities for an even more effective ministry as we are united in this effort Canada-wide, making this a real missionary arm of the conference.

A motion to adopt brother Schmidt's report carried.

E. Recommendations

Brother Victor D. Toews, secretary, read the recommendations.

We recommend that:

- 1. The ministry of intercession and prayer be strengthened for the total program of Conference Evangelism which includes the Radio work, the Executive Secretary's ministry, the service of the office secretary, and all workers of the Canada Inland Mission.
 - 2. We approve the appointment of a full-time office secretary.
- We approve a Sabbatical leave of absence for the Executive Secretary. The time of this leave to be arranged in consultation with the Board of Evangelism.
- 4. We seek to acquire and engage the services of a substitute during the Executive-Secretary's absence.
- 5. We encourage the provinces to invite the Executive-Secretary to Minister's and Deacon's Conferences, Youth Conferences, Sunday School, Christian Education and Evangelism Conferences, Youth Camps and other meetings where his contribution could be beneficial.
 - 6. We join the U.S. brethren in conducting a Congress on Evan-

gelism which is planned biennially and would alternate between Canada and U.S.A. and that we assist the Board of Evangelism in sending some of its members to this Congress.

7. We encourage our churches to avail themselves of the services of ministers of our Conference to conduct more evangelistic

campaigns.

8. We authorize the Board of Evangelism to investigate the possibilty of a complete assumption of the operations of the Gospel Light Hour by the Canadian Conference. The Board of Evangelism will inform the Board of management of its findings and will receive from them such directives as are deemed advisable in order to present the whole question to the next Convention in 1969.

9. We recommend that we continue to support this program with a contribution of \$1000 during the next year. In the meantime the Manitoba Gospel Light Hour Radio Committee will study the advisability of continuing this particular release of the program.

III. CANADA INLAND MISSION

Brother Harvey Gossen, chairman of the committee, called upon brother Ernest Dyck to read the report from Quebec. Brother Gossen then read the chairman's report.

A. Chairman's Report:

Dear Brethren:

We thank our heavenly Father for His blessing during the past conference year. Hebrews 13:8.

Quebec: As the result of faithful personal witness and regular church services the Word of God has been proclaimed to many people of all ages. Individuals have accepted Christ; believers have increased in faith and fruitfulness and our missionaries have endeavoured by various methods to fulfill the commission of Christ. It is encouraging to hear of believers in our church in Quebec witnessing for Christ to their friends. Sermons from Science at Expo '67 is also affording a unique opportunity to share the gospel.

We are grateful to God for the sacrificial service of Bro. and Sister Ernest Dyck for the past six years. They have received and accepted a call from the Board of Missions and Services. We regret losing them but pray that the Lord will use them for His glory as they return to the Congo.

We praise God for replacements and for the willingness of Bro. and Sister Ben Dyck to join our ranks as workers in Quebec. Pray

for them and for the Don Balzers.

Maritimes: In 1960 Bro. John Esau then returned from the Congo began to teach in the Teacher's College in Truro, N.S. In 1962 and again in 1963 he requested CIM to begin a Christian witness in the Maritimes. The CIM was not ready but encouraged him to contact the Christian Service for personnel to assist him. In 1965 five people were sent in by Christian Service. This number increased to seventeen in 1966.

Bro. Dwight Wiebe, of Christian Service contacted us because of his concern that the witness of the personnel in Nova Scotia might have a greater and more permanent value. Consultation and letters between Christian Service and CIM as well as a number of meetings of the CIM committees to discuss this has resulted in a conviction that we should begin a witness in the Martimes (See 1966 Canadian Conference recommendation #1, p.108 accepted). This decision was reached at our meetings in Corn, Oklahoma last fall. It was agreed to begin in Dartmouth, N.S.

Christian Service also agreed with us to place some personnel in Dartmouth N.S. this fall in order to assist the CIM missionary in a church building program. Our missionary would begin by spending half of his time for CIM and the other half as chaplain for the Christian Service personnel.

After much prayer we are happy to announce Bro. and Sister Walter Epp as our new missionaries to the Maritimes. They are convinced as we are of God's leading. Pray for them.

May God help us to be faithful to the challenges before us.

B. Quebec Workers' Report

Dear Brethren:

During the past Conference year the workers in Quebec have again and again experienced the truth found in 1 Cor. 1:9a, "God is faithful." The promises of His Word and the working of His Spirit have encouraged us to sow and to reap in St. Jerome and Ste. Therese.

We would also at this time wish to thank the churches of the Canadian Conference for their faithful financial and prayer support. Your interest in the work of the Lord has been appreciated by those who serve as your representatives in French Canada.

This past year the Don Balzers have laboured in the St. Jerome area while the Ernest Dycks have spent the greater part of their time working in the Ste. Therese area. The Lord has continued to give open doors for the Gospel through weekly meetings in the chapel, Bible studies in the homes, hospital and prison visitation, literature distribution, radio programs, and Bible-based articles in a weekly newspaper "Echo du Nord."

Last August six young people working with Operation Mobilization co-operated with the young people of the local M.B. Church in person-to-person witnessing in six towns surrounding the St. Jerome and Ste. Therese area. The areas reached were St. Rose, St. Eustache, Lesage, Shawbridge, St. Sauveur and St. Adele. A street meeting was also conducted in the city of St. Jerome during this time.

The Lord Who has promised to build His church has again encouraged our hearts in the past year through visible progress in the local congregation. Most of the members are now active in some service for the Lord. They participate in the work as members of the choir, young peoples committee, Sunday School teaching and visitation. Two young people, Annette Tasse and Margaret Bryson have completed their first year of training at Bethel Institute, Lennoxville, Quebec. Our young people's leader, David Franco and his wife are preparing to attend the same school the coming winter. Canada Inland Mission and the local M.B. church are co-operating in the operation of this Bible Institute through a visiting lecturer and offerings for the school. Ernest Dyck served two weeks as a visiting teacher during the past year.

Further we rejoice that the Lord sent Rev. and Mrs. Benjamin Dyck to the Ste. Therese area last summer. They are missionaries who have served under the Gospel Missionary Union in Europe and Africa. At present, the brother is director of the radio program, "Le Chant Joyeux." Their work in teaching and preaching has

been appreciated by the local church.

During the past year we were thankful to observe that the Lord was working in our midst through His Word and by His Spirit. Eight people joined our congregation through church letter or personal testimony and five others were baptized on May 28 upon their confession of faith in Christ. Will you continue to pray with us for the young converts that they would grow in their new found faith.

The radio program, "La Foi Vivifiante," has been going forth with the Gospel each Sunday morning. We believe many who are afraid to come to church are reached by this program. We are thankful that our Canadians M.B. young people make this positive Gospel witness possible through their financial support and prayers.

The church in Ste. Therese is praising the Lord that all plans for the building of the chapel have been completed. The building permit has already been granted by the city authorities. The Lord willing the construction of the church building is to begin on Iuly 15.

A study trip to evaluate trends in mission work and church planting in Quebec was made by Don Balzer, Ben Dyck and Ernest Dyck last November. We visited workers and churches of a number of evangelical denominations working in French Canada. We were challenged by the fact that there were open doors for the Gospel wherever we travelled. We were also impressed with the need to produce French Canadain workers who will heed God's call and serve Him among their own people.

As we look to the future we would ask prayer for wisdom in the follow-up work of the contacts made through counselling at "Sermons from Science" at Expo. Many Catholics are remaining in the counselling room for spiritual help. Martha Wall from our church is spending four months this summer working as a counsel-

lor at Expo.

Then we further need the Lord's help and guidance in producing workers in the local churches. We thank the Lord for progress in this area during the past year but realize there is still a need of doing much more to encourage the members to become better instruments in the service for Christ our Lord and Master.

We again ask you to pray for the local church, the workers and the C.I.M. committee that they might discern what methods and procedures should be employed in effectively reaching the people of Quebec with the Gospel. D. Brother Ben Dyck's Testimony

At this time brother Ben Dyck gave his testimony:

it is with joy that I express, in these few words what the Lord has done for us. I praise Him for His great love which was manifested towards mankind in the person of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. I thank the Lord for having drawn me to Himself by showing me that I was a guilty, lost sinner and that my only hope was in Christ and in His finished work on Calvary. Romans 5:8;

Ephesians 2:8.

I count it a great privilege to be an ambassador of Jesus Christ. Is there a greater calling than that of beseeching men to be reconciled to God? The Lord led us to Gospel Missionary Union, a mission society under which we were privileged to witness for Him on three continents. In 1955, my wife and I sailed for Europe where we spent one year studying the French language. After this we went to Mali, West Africa and were stationed in Bamako, the capital city, to be in charge of the G.M.U. French Church. ministry was with the 5,000 French people in that city as well as with the educated Africans. The 3 years spent there were blessed ones in spite of serious health problems. When we returned for furlough in 1959, we were advised not to go back to Africa because of my health. The Lord had given us a real burden for French people and so we asked G.M.U. whether they would consider sending us to France. This they did and so we spent a very interesting and challenging 4 years engaged in evangelistic and pastoral work in France as well as French speaking Switzerland. The Lord blessed and honoured His Word to the salvation of souls.

When we returned for furlough in 1964, G.M.U. approached us regarding taking over the French Radio ministry in Canada which had been carried on for a few years already by Mark and Rose Gripp. After much prayer and consideration, we felt led to accept this challenge believing that the Lord's hand was leading in a very definite way. Thus we are engaged in the spreading of the Gospel among French Canadians by means of Radio. Our program is heard weekly on 15 stations in Canada plus one in Haiti.

Our move to Quebec from Saskatoon opened up new opportunities to minister. It has been a joy, during the past months, to help in the church at Ste. Therese and St. Jerome and we are looking forward with keen anticipation to even greater ministry to French Canadians.

E. Brother Walter Epp's Testimony

Dear Brethren,

The Lord has led the brethren of the Christian Service and the Canada Inland Mission Boards to accept us for the task of Church Planting in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. Little did we expect that we were the couple whom the Lord wanted for this particular program. When we became willing to surrender all to the Lord, we had envisaged an entirely different pathway for our lives. However, looking back upon the Lord's leading, I am reminded of how God called Moses, Exodus 3:4, "And when the Lord saw that he turned aside to see, God called unto him out of the midst of the bush, and said, Moses, Moses. And he said, Here am I." Like Moses, I turned aside to see how I could best serve Him. When the Lord saw my desires, He called unto me and I too answered, "Here am I." We continued to work in our home church until we were encouraged to help in a neighbouring M.B. Church. Seven months ago we felt led to return to our home Church.

Today we stand on a new threshold. Behind us lie the old challenges, securities, satisfactions, and promotional opportunities of the teaching profession. Before us lie challenges, fears, possible frustrations, uncertainties, and new challenges of the chaplaincy and ministerial responsibilities. Although we feel inadequate for this task, we have placed our trust in the Lord. He has strengthened our faith with Jeremiah 1:8: "Be not afraid of their faces: for I am with thee to deliver thee, saith the Lord." More recently, He has given me the promises of Rev. 3:8, "Behold, I have set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it."

Since the promises of God are sure and they are based upon intercessary prayer, we covet your prayers for all Christian Service workers stationed in the Maritimes, for the various methods of Evangelism, open doors and a fruitful ministry.

Therefore we recommend:

1. That we again designate the Easter offering for the CIM.

a) That the resolutions committee voice our appreciation to Bro. and Sister Ernest Dyck for their 6 years of service in Quebec and wish them God's blessing as they return to the Congo.

b) That we welcome Bro. and Sister Ben Dyck as their

replacements and our new workers in Quebec.

c) We recommend the appointment of Sister Martha Wall on a part-time basis. Her work will consist of (a) church visitation, (b) literature distribution, (c) Follow-up work from (1) radio broadcast, (2) enquiries resulting from contacts in "Sermons from Science."

d) That because eastern Canada is presently in a state of flux, economic expansion, and religious upheaval and because of the changes presently taking place in the Roman Catholic Church, the committee feels that all opportunities for expansion should be seriously considered and asks that the Canadian Conference commit itself to a program of expansion by authorizing the CIM to hire an additional worker, if and when such action seems necessary.

3. Maritimes:

a) That we approve the CIM committee's decision to enter the Maritimes with a mission and church building program. (See 1966 Canadian Conference CIM recommendation 1, page 108.)

b) That we ratify the appointment of Bro. and Sister Walter Epp as our workers in the Maritimes. They will also serve our Christian Service personnel as chaplain.

c) We recommend to the Canadian conference and to the Christian Service of the Board of Missions and Services that our worker be responsible to the Board of Evangelism and receive direction from them as mutually agreed upon by the CIM and the representative for Christian Service.

All recommendations were accepted.

After the announcements had been made by the moderator and the assistant moderator, brother Ben Dyck closed the session with prayer.

Sixth Session — Tuesday Evening, July 4, 1967

Brother Peter Siebert led in the singing of "Take My Life and Let it Be." The moderator called on brother H. S. Rempel to open the session with prayer. After prayer he wished brother Rempel, the oldest member present at the convention, God's blessing in the name of the Conference.

The secretary read the minutes of the fifth session. A motion to adopt the minutes carried.

Brother William Neufeld reported briefly for the Board of Christian Literature of the General Conference. (Details recorded under (Section D. VI Board of Christian Literature of the General Conference).

At this time the delegation voted to send a greeting to brother J. Lepp, Dalmeny. (Recorded under greetings.)

Resolutions of gratitude for the work of J. A. Toews and Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Dyck were read and accepted.

The Committee in Evangelism came to the platform. (Proceedings recorded under E. II — Committee on Evangelism)

IV. MCC (CANADA)

A. Report

Brother J. A. Toews read the report. The report was accepted.

When John the Baptist was in prison, awaiting the pleasure of Herod the tetrach, he sent two messengers to Jesus to confirm that Jesus was really the Messiah. (Matth. 11:19-20.) Jesus' reply surprises us. Instead of a theological discourse he says very simply: "Go and shew John again those things which ye do hear and see: The blind receive their sight, and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached to them." (Matth. 11: 4-5). The prophet Isaiah had foretold the Messianic manifestations (Is. 61:1-2) and Jesus himself confirmed them (Luke 4:16-21). With this assurance John the Baptist went to his death.

The world today rejects the Messiah and proclaims that God is dead. God is not dead! Jesus is Lord! Every believer must give evidence of his faith in a living Saviour, by following Christ's teaching and example by meeting the needs of men. One avenue through which this may be done is through participation in the work of the Mennonite Central Committee. Participation takes place provincially, nationally and internationally. Detailed reports are given at the time of the annual meetings at each level of organization and through the publication MCC (Canada) Annual Report 1966. Additional facts and figures are attached to this

report.

Plans for 1967, which were approved at the annual meeting,

included the following:

a) To send \$345,000 in cash to the international MCC for its overseas program of relief, service, peace and disaster service. (Since the annual meeting MCC has added another \$70,000 to the budget to meet emergency famine needs in India. MCC (Canada) wants to raise \$35,000 for this purpose.)

b) To collect, process and send \$350,000 worth of material aid-

in-kind for distribution abroad.

c) To intensify efforts to send a representative to North Vietnam, with a view toward beginning a relief ministry there, and further, to create a designated fund for relief contributions for North Vietnam which are to be used at the discretion of the executive committee.

d) To appoint a person to study immigration, biblically and historically, and to prepare a document on a possible phil-

osophy of immigration.

e) To study the Indian, Eskimo and Metis problem in Canada with a view toward possibly starting a service program.

f) To continue, and if possible expand, the summer service program.

g) To plan for a Study-Work Camp at the International Peace Garden on the border between Manitoba and North Dakota, as a special Centennial project involving a maximum of 25 Christian men and women 18 years of age and over.

h) To encourage Mennonite and Brethren in Christ Churches in Canada to hold appropriate Centennial services on June

25, 1967.

i) To send to the Canadian government early in the year, a letter expressing the Mennonite and Brethren in Christ churches' appreciation for the freedoms they have enjoyed in Canada during the last century.

j) To encourage oratorical and essay writing contests across

Canada on the subject of peace.

k) To encourage existing historical societies or other interested groups to write a history of the Mennonite and Brethren in Christ churches in Canada.

Under the direction of a seven-man Executive Committee, a staff of three administers the MCC (Canada) program from rented quarters in the Paris Building in Winnipeg. J. M. Klassen is the Executive Secretary, Kathleen Froese, secretary and Anne Bueckert (a voluntary service worker) stenographer. On August 15, 1967 Daniel Zehr, will join the staff as an administrative assistant with responsibilities for peace and voluntary service.

The Material Aid Centers in Yarrow, British Columbia and Kitchener, Ontario, each having three full-time workers, process

all the material aid-in-kind.

Self Help directors, provincial committees, staff members, and volunteers all form important links in a chain by which our faith can be expressed in deeds of love and mercy, "In the Name of Christ."

Thank you for participating in this work and for giving us (me) the opportunity to represent our group on MCC (Canada). Please continue to support this ministry with your prayers and contributions.

V. BETHESDA

(Proceedings and deliberations recorded as taken place at the second and third sessions.)

A. Chairman's Report: The chairman brother C. J. Rempel introduced board members and read the report.

Dear Brethren of the Conference:

It is a pleasure to again report to the Conference of what has been done at Bethesda by our faithful staff who have been used by the Lord to bring sunshine into the lives of many patients. God has been gracious to all of us and we have much cause for thanksgiving.

At our last conference we made mention of the request to make our facilities available for greater expansion, to make possible a programme for mentally retarded. The conference authorized further exploratory work which we have done. Correspondence and meetings have taken place but at this time no definite plans are made and no special report can be presented. We asked for some definite information for this conference but nothing has developed.

It is quite evident that the Private Sanitaria Act under which we are now licensed, will be repealed shortly. When this happens we will need to make a decision as to which of the three Acts available to us will be most acceptable. These are The Private Hospitals Act; The Chronically Ill Hospital Act, and the Community Hospitals Act. All three are being studied to determine

which will be chosen.

A new chapter was written when three of our Western patients were returned to Manitoba in order to receive care in their home province. We believe this worked out well for all concerned. This now reduces the number of so-called "Western" patients to 7. Our greatest joy and satisfaction comes at times when we can discharge patients enabling them to rejoin their family and friends. During 1966, we list 15 as being discharged and 7 in 1967.

Along with our staff which serves so faithfully, we as a Board want to thank our congregations for your faithful prayers and financial support without which we would not have been able

to operate. May God bless you for it.

B. Chaplain's Report to the Canadian Conference:

Brother Block read the report.

Dear Conference:

During the past year God has given us many opportunities to witness for him and to render a service to the people who come to us for help. It is my prayer, and the prayer of many of our staff members, that we may give to God the best that we have in order that He will be glorified through the work of our conference hospital.

Of interest to our brotherhood may be the church affiliation of our staff members. It is as follows: Mennonite Brethren -44, United Mennonite -9, United Church -3, United Missionary and Roman Catholic -2 each; Lutheran, Baptist, Presbyterian, and Anglican -1 each, and non-church members -6. When we

consider the spiritual life of the hospital, we must take into account that it is influenced by each one of these staff members.

The distribution of the religious background of our patients is approximately this: Mennonite Brethren — 17; other Mennonites — 41; Roman Catholic — 9; other Protestants — 41.

Paul said in 1 Corinthians 16:9, "For a great door and effectual is opened unto me . . ." Certainly, in view of the religious background of many of our staff members, as well as a large percentage of our patients, the door for a Christian witness has been

thrown wide open for our brotherhood at Bethesda.

An attempt is being made to minister to the spiritual needs of both our patients and our staff. Two worship services for all are conducted weekly. With one exception, all the patients who are able, have chosen to attend these services. Evening devotions are conducted regularly on the wards by our staff members. Each Monday noon members of the staff meet for prayer in which we remember especially our patients' needs. On the third Thursday of each month our staff meets for an evening of Christian fellowship.

We thank God for our many staff members who have been motivated by God to perform an important service. We are also grateful for the support of our brotherhood. We realize full well that if Bethesda's purpose shall be realized, we must bring all the spiritual resources that have been entrusted to the Church, to bear on the problems that confront our patients. We covet your continued interest in Bethesda, and together with the Apostle

Paul we say, "Brethren, pray for us."

C. Administrator's Report:

Brother Nick Braun read his report as well as the Financial reports.

Dear members of the Conference:

In Philippians 4:19, we read: "But my God shall supply all your needs according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus." This we have experienced spiritually and physically at Bethesda. God has indeed supplied all our needs.

The patients entrusted to us have received the necessary care and treatment. Admission and discharge statistics are as follows:

Admitted in 1966: 14 male, 16 female — Total 30.

Discharged in 1966: 6 male of which a died; 14 female of which 3 died — Total 20.

Admissions in 1967: 3 male; 4 female.

Discharged in 1966: 6 male of which 2 died; 14 female of which 3 died.

We have a bed capacity of 110 and all are set up. The average occupancy is 105. A rather larger waiting list for those requiring psychiatric care and also for the mentally retarded, presents a problem because we do not have the accommodation and many

applications have to be turned down. This is not a simple thing to do.

Our facilities include an Occupational Therapy Department, a Rehabilitation Program and an organized Recreational Program. A modest workshop is available, a grooming room and farm facilities. Medical Therapy includes Drugs and Electric Shock Treatment, Occupational, Psychotherapy and Group Therapy.

Seventy people are on staff, who carry out their duty with devotion. Their attitude is one of service and dedication to the care of the Mentally Ill. Registered Nurses and Registered Psychiatric Nurses are on duty, and the Medical work is supervised by our Medical Director. Regular conferences are held with patients and a Consultant Psychiatrist participates as advisor. At these conferences methods of treatment are reviewed and plans considered for the patients' future.

The recruitment of staff does not present too great a problem, except for the shortage of available Registered or Registered Psychiatric Nurses. On occasion we have to recruit such staff outside of our brotherhood. This has worked out quite favourably, but we would appreciate a greater interest for professional staff to accept the challenge of working in our M.B. Conference institution.

To operate the hospital efficiently, it is necessary to have adequate equipment to meet our needs. This requires considerable maintenance and when a breakdown occurs, it often results in a major expense. New equipment is required from time to time as well. For these purposes we do receive some fine support from churches, individuals, friends and relatives of patients. We are very grateful for this.

Income from farm and also from donations, is used towards the maintenance cost of patients, who come to us from the western provinces. Allowances for depreciation on buildings and equipment are paid to the conference treasury for the retirement of the Bethesda Loan.

Many improvements were made during the year, enabling us to give better service to our patients. We still have many needs which would improve our service and we hope in time to be able to construct an elevator, which is long over-due and must be installed soon to relieve a very unsatisfactory situation. Other needs are additional essential equipment for the wards, nursing office, laundry and kitchen. We should soon consider an Administration Building. Our present facilities are geographically inadequate and over-crowded.

The work at Bethesda is our service given to us by God. Our appeal to you is that you would share with us the trials and joys to achieve our "goal" in providing better conditions, health and a happier life for those who are less fortunate then we are.

Again on behalf of everyone at Bethesda, I wish to thank you for your continued interest and prayer support.

E. Recommendations

Presuming that the Conference will expect certain recommendations from the Board of Bethesda Home, we have the following recommendations to present for your consideration.

1. That we re-appoint Br. N. Braun as Administrator and Br. I.

Block as Chaplain of the Bethesda Home.

2. That this and all future appointments to these two offices be on a four year period, subject to a six month's notice, from either party in case of termination of service, prior to the expiration of the four year period.

3. That our Conference express their sincere thanks to Dr. H. D. Latham, Medical Director of Bethesda Home, and to the

D. Latham, Medical Director of Bethesda Home, and to the entire staff for their devoted service to the patients at Bethesda. An appropriate resolution to be prepared by the Resolutions Committee.

4. That for the next 2 years the Bethesda Home will contribute \$15,000.00 annually to the support of maintenance costs of

patients who come to us from the Western Provinces.

5. În order to assure an uninterrupted supervision of the work at Bethesda, the Conference should appoint an interim committee to function during the period until the Board of Management can take over this work.

All recommendation carried. In connection with Recommendation 5 it was moved and seconded that the present executive of Bethesda function until the Board of Management can make necessary arrangements. The executive is to function under the board of management. (The motion carried.)

F. Recommendation of the Bethesda Committee for Western Patiens.

Brother I. H. Block presented the following recommendations at the third session.

- In view of the fact that the Bethesda Committee contributes \$15,000 for Western patients, we recommend that the churches of the conference contribute two liberal offerings towards the support of Western patients and that the relatives contribute \$2.00 per day.
- 2. In view of the fact that there are patients in some of the Western Provinces which are considered by the Special Committee for accommodation in Bethesda, we recommend that the Board of Management be charged with the special duty to assume all responsibilities with regards to western patients. Both recommendations carried at the third session.

SECTION F - CONCLUDING BUSINESS

I. STATISTICAL REPORT

(Not read at the convention, but included in the Conference Yearbook).

Dear brethren of the Conference:

Once again I would like to express my thanks to those statisticians who have faithfully completed the reports during the past

year. Unfortunately 13 churches had not submitted their membership reports by June 20. Calculations had to be made on the basis of last year's membership.

- 1. The total membership figure for our conference May 31, 1967 may be slightly higher that the indicated number 15,822 for several reasons:
 - a) The figure does not include membership gains that may have taken place in the 13 churches who did not report.
 - b) The figure does not include those who were transferred to the new Waterloo church formed in Ontario.
- 2. The fact that the number of baptisms plus the readmission of excommunicated members exceeds the total of the number of members who died, the number excommunicated and the number joining other denominations by only 30 indicates that in spite of the diminishing of the language problem, we do not appear too successful in winning others for our denomination. The total growth over the past year according to the figures we have was only 65 members. As pointed out this may increase somewhat when final membership is in.
- 3. Since officially the conference, to my knowledge, has never taken a stand permitting the release of members apart from a release to another denomination, I have not listed these under a separate category. However, in the category of 163 members who joined other denominations, 31 members who were simply released are included.
- 4. Again there is an increase in total Sunday School enrolment as well as in giving for the Lord's work through the Sunday School.
- 5. Enrolment of students in MB Bible schools appears to have been rising steadily during the past three years; enrolment in Christian high schools is down somewhat. There has been a steady and significant rise in enrolment of our young people in public high schools and university. This trend appears to be continuing.
- 6. Of the 296 marriages reported in 1966, 181 were between members of the MB church, 74 in which one member belonged to another denomination, 15 mixed marriages and 24 marriages of unbelievers in which one or both parties were children of church members.
- 7. Four ministers and six deacons were reported ordained during the past year. In 1966 282 ministers and 204 deacons were reported as serving the churches.

As in the past the offerings for most categories of missions as well as the total church offerings are again somewhat higher than in the previous year.

The figures presented in this report are only as accurate as the statisticians reporting them. We are grateful to God for the work He has enabled us as a conference to do. We hope and pray, however, that in the future, we as members of the church of Jesus Christ will be able to grow inwardly in faith and love in order that our proclamation of the Gospel may be effective in winning others to become partakers of the grace of Jesus Christ.

IV. REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Brother H. H. Voth read the report.

During these Convention days we were made aware once again of the increasing scope and diversity of the work in which the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches is engaged, and of God's manifest blessing upon that work. While God has allowed Canada, our adopted home, to grow steadily as a nation and to prosper in various respects—a fact of which this Centennial year of 1967 so vividly reminds us-He has also given our own Brotherhood unusual opportunities for spiritual growth and out-For such spiritual increase and influence as God has granted our Brotherhood, we are deeply grateful. We confess and regret the fact that at times we have failed to see or to grasp the opportunities which have come to our churches and to our Conference. But we do rejoice in the fact that our Lord, by His grace, has entrusted so much to our Conference, and we do believe that Christ has been building His Church—to remind ourselves again of the theme of this Convention-in and through the Committees and churches of our Canadian Conference.

We were very happy to welcome five new churches into the Conference at this Convention. We trust that the admission of these churches represents something more than a numerical increase for our Conference and that their participation in, and contribution, to the Conference will prove profitable for them and for the Conference as a whole.

We also perceived evidence of the fact that Christ is building His Church in our midst in the widespread interest which the Conference on Faith and Ethics called forth and in the enlightenment which it provided for many in our churches. We recognized evidence of it, also, in the increased giving in our churches, generally, for various phases of our total Conference program. And we were persuaded that Christ is building His church among us by the fact that both the vision and effort of many of our Conference's Committees and Boards have been steadily expanded.

We were reminded in a reverent and yet moving way of those ministering brethren who were used of God to instruct and strengthen churches in our Conference over the years but who departed to be with Christ during the past Conference year. .May our remembrance of these cherished brethren prompt us to serve

Christ with the same loyalty and devotion.

The kindly and efficient reception accorded so many delegates impressed all of us very favourably. We would express our sincere gratitude, herewith, to the Alberta M.B. Conference for hosting us so cordially and generously, both here at the Convention and in the individual homes. And we extend our thanks to all persons who, by faithfully performing assigned duties, helped to make our reception during these days such a satisfying experience for us. May our Lord reward each one in His own wonderful way.

We would acknowledge, finally, the competent and patient leadership exercised by the executive of the conference during these sessions. May the brethren of the executive feel rewarded, in some measure, in knowing that delegates followed the proceed-

ings with continuing attention and interest.

It is surely the desire of all delegates at the conclusion of this Convention that the promise of Christ—so frequently reiterated during these days—may be more fully realized throughout our brotherhood: "and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it.

The Resolutions Committee

The delegates accepted the resolution after a motion carried requesting that a note of gratitude to our government be included in the resolution. The secretary felt that this note of gratitude was very adequitely expressed in the letter prepared by brother J. M. Klassen and deferred at the first session and unfortunately not read to the delegates at the final session. In view, however, of the foregoing motion and after consultation with the conference moderator, the secretary forwarded this letter to the Prime Minister of Canada.

V. LETTER OF GRATITUDE TO THE PRIME MINISTER OF CANADA

The Right Honorable L. B. Pearson Prime Minister Government of Canada Ottawa, Canada Honorable Sir:

On July 1—4, 394 delegates representing over 15,700 adult members of Mennonite Brethren Churches in six provinces met in

Coaldale, Alberta for their 57th annual convention.

Since 1967 is the one hundredth anniversary of confederation, the convention paused to reflect upon the significance of this occasion, to read appropriate passages from the Bible, to sing a hymn of praise and dedication, and to offer prayers of thanks and supplication.

The first Mennonite Brethren Church in Canada was organized in 1895 with a membership of 48. It met for worship in a building located in southern Manitoba. Since that time 122 congregations have been established. Part of the growth can be attributed to

Canada's immigration laws which made it possible for many of our members to find homes in this country. It can also be attributed to the freedom in this land where we can share our faith with others and bring them into fellowship with God through faith in Jesus Christ.

We are grateful to God, and to our government that we can enjoy the liberty of this land and use the opportunities it presents to pursue our Christian obligations at home and abroad and to follow the teachings of the Bible as they apply to faith and practice. As citizens of the Kingdom of God, we want to be good citizens of Canada and contribute to its growth and development and we support its efforts to practise justice and to restore and maintain peace in this troubled world.

In the years ahead we want to continue to pray that God may give our government wisdom to direct the affairs of this land according to His holy will.

With brief words of encouragement based on 1 Cor. 1:9 he wished the next executive God's grace. The newly elected assistant moderator, brother Henry Voth, asked for prayer on behalf of the executive and the boards.

Both brethren, Voth and Lenzmann, prayed in closing. Delegates joined in singing "Bis an mein Ende hin" as the closing affirmation to follow Him who said "I will build my church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."
