

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MINUTES

A record of the 59th convention of the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches as held in Winnipeg, Manitoba from Saturday evening, July 5 until Tuesday evening July 8, 1969.

PART I Devotional Services

From the first strains of the hymn, "Faith of Our Fathers" until the last echo of the benediction, "The Lord be with you"; in devotional services, board meetings, and delegates discussions; by prayer, persuasion and sometimes pleading—the Mennonite Brethren Church engaged in its calling to build the kingdom of God.

The first service was conducted by President Victor Adrian at the Portage Ave. MB Church. This was the 25th anniversary program of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College. The other four services were held in the Winnipeg Civic Auditorium with the brethren George Brunk and Dan Friesen as guest speakers. The outlines which follow should help those who were present to recall what these services meant to them, and for those who could not attend, they will be indicators of how these devotional services were conducted.

The morning service on Conference Sunday was held in the large Winnipeg Auditorium, with an estimated 3000 people in attendance at the combined English-language and German-language services. The services were held in the main auditorium (English) and in a second floor art gallery (German). Both services began at 10 a.m.

A large mass choir under the direction of Alan Janzen, choir leader from the Fort Garry Church, sang in the morning English-language service and a male choir from Niverville in the German. In both cases the music of the choirs provided a great spiritual

uplift to the mood and direction of the services.

The speakers at the morning and afternoon services in the main auditorium were the moderator of the U.S. Conference, brother Dan Friesen, and the Dean of Eastern Mennonite Seminary, Harrisonburg, Va., Dr. George Brunk. The general theme of their messages was found in the verse in Ephesians 3:21: "To him be glory in the Church."

In the first message, brother Friesen compared the life in the Spirit to what he termed "the soul life." Jesus said during his lifetime that "he poured out his soul unto death". Similarly, we must put our soul life, our self life, to death. The Spirit must take over. We need more than consecration, we need concentration on the things of the Spirit. He described the Christian's cross as a voluntary cross. The cross we take involves a conscious acceptance of the consequences of those things we have said we

believe and consider important in God's eyes.

In the message that followed, Dr. Brunk described the parallels between our time and the time of Isaiah when the prophet wrote the 6th chapter in which are contained the words: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts. The whole earth is full of his glory." Brunk maintained that before we can discover the glory of the Lord in the Church, we must see it in its larger perspective "in the whole earth". "The whole earth is full of the glory of the Lord," said Brunk, "and we have no right to fasten on the gloom that wants to settle over so many Christians. It is inconceivable that his glory should settle over so many people without God

showing himself in a mighty way."

In the afternoon, Brunk continued with a message based on Rev. 5:8-14 and 7:9-12 in which he considered the glory which appears in the Church because of the presence of Christ in the Church. That glorious presence manifests itself in a "flaming evangelistic zeal". That glory also manifests itself in Christians' discovery of one another. The seven churches of Revelation refer "not to a single but to the whole Church", he said. We too must look for the whole Church. In this connection he predicted that the "Mennonite walls" are going to come down. Our children won't stand for them. Christ's glory in the Church will also be demonstrated as the Church stands for righteousness and truth in the midst of a very wicked and worldly culture. He encouraged the Church to look for extraordinary demonstrations of God's power and presence. "God may yet break into history at its darkest point, as he did during the Reformation," said Brunk.

The director of the mass choir at the afternoon service was Jake Durksen of the Portage Avenue Church. Again it sang with

great power and conviction.

PART II

Business Sessions

FIRST SESSION - MONDAY MORNING, JULY 7, 1969

I. OPENING SESSIONS AND PRELIMINARY BUSINESS

Brother Henry Voth, Assistant Moderator, led in the singing of "Lord, Have of Me Supreme Control," and "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah," fitting hymns to set the tone of the convention.

A. OPENING AND WELCOME

Brother H. R. Baerg welcomed the delegates and guests on behalf of the host churches of Winnipeg, and the Conference of the host province. He greeted the Conference with Psalm 19:14.

B. Assistant Moderator, Brother Voth, opened the convention by citing the conference motto, "To Him be Glory in the Church" Eph. 3:21, and asking the Lord to guide in the work to be done.

A ladies' trio from the River East MB Church served with the song, "Praise God, Hallelujah."

C. CONFERENCE MESSAGE

Brother D. Ewert moderator, based the conference message on I Peter 2:9-10. He raised the question What is the church? and suggested that the church is both old and new. He emphasized three aspects of the church as the New Community.

- 1. Marks of the New Community.
- a. It is a community which has experienced God's grace—"chosen race."
- b. This community is engaged in kingly service—"royal priest-hood." Every member of the covenant community is to have a sense of mission both individually and corporately.
- c. This community is to be characterized by a holy life—"a holy ethnos." Holiness must be a mark of the new community. These are the great common factors in Christian deportment which should be emphasized in the Christian community.
- d. The Lordship of Christ is recognized—"God's own people." All of life ought to be brought under the Lordship of Christ.
- 2. The Mission of the New Community is to proclaim the great works of God.

3. The Miracle of the New Community

The deliverance from the realm of darkness into the realm of light, the miracle of *transformation*, which took place through the initiative of God. It is also a miracle of *acceptance*. "You were no people, now you are a people"; a miracle of *forgiveness*—"formerly, no mercy, now mercy." The church must live humbly and repentantly from God's forgiveness.

Our thinking and planning shall reflect the marks of the new community and the mission of the new community.

The brethren Harvey Gossen and H. Lenzmann brought the concerns of the Conference before the Lord in prayer.

The ladies' trio sang "Jesus and can it be."

Brother D. Ewert, moderator, now took the chair.

D. CONFERENCE SECRETARY AND ASSISTANT

Brother Ewert explained the absence of H. Unger. Brother H. Swartz was approved as secretary, brother D. Duerksen as assistant. Brother Erich Ratzlaff is to prepare the German translation of the minutes.

II. BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The members of the board took their seats in front. Brother J. M. Schmidt, chairman of the board, introduced members of the board as well as the workers, Bro. Ben Dueck, pastor of St. Therese, Bro. Hainaut, pastor of St. Jerome, and Bro. R. Willms, Pastor of Gospel Light Hour.

A. REPORTS

1. By Chairman:

Interrupting the reading of his report, Bro. Schmidt referred to the accident of R. Boschman and asked the conference to pray for him.

Dear Conference:

Our secular and technological world is experiencing a period of acute disillusionment, uncertainty and revulsion. People are eager for something real, something new, something true and powerful enough to pull them out of the slough of a despondent present and a hopeless future. Likewise, there is hardly a Christian that walks through our church doors on Sunday, who does not yearn to be drawn into a deeper Christian way of life. Who, when the sermon begins, thirsts to be lifted into a dynamically active relationship with the living Christ, which will not only give him the spiritual strength to face the issues of his own life, but to function as a powerful witness, an effective soul-winner for his Lord. Christ is able and willing to meet man at the very point of his need.

Revival and Evangelism are not obsolete, deceased or dead, but are still God's ways of ministering to men's hearts. While some people sing the Requiem over Evangelism, it is refreshing to note that in the recent Billy Graham campaign in New York, over 1,000 persons stepped forward to make decisions for Christ on the very first night. Such demonstrations of spiritual hunger are evidence that people are looking and searching for God. We must make greater efforts to explore and impliment the various means and approaches by which we can reach our generation for Christ.

QUEBEC:

In Quebec the Lord is blessing both work and workers. Souls have been won and several baptismal services have been held. Till lately, the St. Therese and St. Jerome churches functioned as one church. They now have enough members to organize and operate as two separate churches. Brother and Sister Rene Hainaut, past missionaries to the Congo, now pastor the St. Jerome church. The French Radio Ministry, of which Brother Ben Dyck is the speaker, is greatly used to bring the Gospel to the homes of many French Canadians. Miss Martha Wall is in charge of the correspondence. This cooperative venture with the Gospel Missionary Union has proven to be very beneficial to Church planting work in Quebec and we are encouraged to investigate other areas in which we can similarily serve together.

Brother Ernest Dyck's teaching ministry in the Bethel Bible Institute has been appreciated and plans have been made for his full-time participation. Two of our young people graduated this spring. At present, David Franco is assisting Brother Dyck in the work in St. Laurent. Several souls were baptised, and we trust that it will not be too long until a regular church will

be formed in St. Laurent.

MARITIMES:

There are 33 Christian Service workers serving as teachers, nurses, and in other vocations, throughout Nova Scotia. A number of them are stationed in Dartmouth, our home base in that province and the area in which we are seeking to plant a witnessing church. Brother Walter Epp serves as Chaplain to the Christian Service Workers and by the means of Bible Studies, Clubs, S. School, and Personal Evangelism, Camps, and Radio follow-up, is endeavor-

ing to form a group.

In spite of the geographical and philosophical difficulties encountered among the Christian Service personnel, Brother and Sister Epp are doing a commendable job under very trying circumstances. The Board is keenly aware of the impracticality of a dual administration and the perplexing quandary it causes for the Chaplain. We believe that it is essential to make the necessary alteration in the administrative structure at this point, it he work in Nova Scotia is to flourish. The transfer of the treasury from the Hillsboro office to our Canadian treasury, has eleviated many of the problems and we must follow through in this direction to bring the ministry in the Maritimes on a more effective basis. We trust that the Conference will favor and support moving in this direction, and that it will be possible to develop a strong Christian Service program in Canada. We desperately

need a Canadian oriented and administered program in order to challenge and involve more of our Youth in active service. Unless such opportunities are provided and promoted, we will lose some of the finest of our young people. The more we will engage in such a positive service, the more potential leadership will be developed for the cause of Christ. Such a service could be expanded to the Yukon, the North West Territories, the Indian and Eskimo people, as well as the Maritimes and other needy areas. It would be a self-sustaining program which would greatly benefit those who serve, the Community where they serve and our Conference under whom the service would be rendered.

MASS COMMUNICATIONS

Our Radio Broadcast, which is produced by the G. L. Hour and of which Brother Rudy Willms is the speaker, has found good response among its many listeners and is expanding its outreach. The Broadcast is especially proving helpful in provinces where it is combined with the thrust of a Mission Station. (e.g. B.C., Ont., and Nova Scotia) It not only compliments the missionaries' work, but provides new contacts, new converts and new open doors.

After a more thorough study of the entire cost of production and promotion, the G. L. Hour Committee has projected a considerable increase from their original estimate given two years ago. Our Board does not feel that this increase should be assumed by the Canadian Conference but rather by the individual Provinces that make use of the program. This matter has been referred to the Provincial Executives for consideration and action.

Communication by means of television confronts us with a tremendous challenge for evangelism. While it may seem financially prohibitive, it is spiritually imperative that we explore every possible avenue on the provincial and Canadian level for means and ways to transmit our faith to the millions of Canadian viewers. It is not too early, nor too late to make a serious study of how we may utilize this powerful communications media for good. We are most interested to receive reaction and direction from the Conference concerning this matter.

CHURCH EVANGELISM:

During the past two years, this Board has wrestled with the question of how we can be more effective in our total outreach. We are convinced that if Renewal, Revival and Regeneration is to come to, and through our churches, it will not come by the number of theoretical programs, not by human power or mechanical organization, but by the Spirit and power of the living God, who urgently seeks to operate in and witness through each member of the brotherhood. The endeavors of our workers are therefore being directed towards effecting a vital renewal and involvement of the individual believer in personal evangelism. This is no easy contemporary approach to implement.

Brother J. J. Toews, our Executive Secretary, has given him-

self unsparingly for the cause of evangelism. Presently he is on Sabbatical Leave, and upon returning from South America, will pursue his studies on World Evangelism and Missions at the Dallas Theological Seminary in Texas. We do not only count ourselves fortunate, but believe it was the leading of the Lord that we were able to acquire the service of Brother Rudy Boschman for the interim period, Jan. 1, 1969 to July 1970. Brother Boschman has a real burden for the cause of evangelism in which the Lord has already blessed him. His special concern is for our Young People with whom he has enjoyed good rapport.

The following lists but some of the main activities of our brethren, and several anticipated developments in the future.

A. ACTIVITIES IN EVANGELISM IN 1968 and 1969.

- 1. Introducing "Continuous Church Centered Evangelism" to churches.
- 2. Conducting "Library Clinics" and promoting literature on evangelism.
- 3. Meeting with "Ladies Groups", "Mens Fellowships" and other groups and sharing how they can better relate to evangelism.
 - 4. Presenting "Papers" at Ministers and Deacons conferences.
 - 5. Serving at "Summer Bible Camps".
- 6. Conducting "Team Evangelism" in Schools, Open Air, and Churches.
- 7. Organizing "Evangelism in Depth" in Saskatoon and Winnipeg.
- 8. Initiating a "Film Service". The film, "No Time to Wait" has been purchased and paid for from showings.
 - 9. Brother Toews has produced various literature on evangelism.
 - a) Strategy on Outreach
 - b) Church Women in Evangelism
- c) How the Church, the Layment, the Minister and Deacon can relate to an effective program on evangelism.

These and other articles can be ordered from the office.

10. Conducting regular Evangelistic Campaigns in churches.

B. FINANCES

We are happy to report that our operation expenditures have been kept more than \$4,000.00 below the projected budget of last year. We intend to pursue this policy in the future.

C. ANTICIPATED DIRECTION AND DEVELOPMENTS IN 1970-1971.

- 1. To advance from the conventional "Program Approach" into a vigorous and continuous, every believer, personal evangelism approach.
 - 2. To develop "Teen Teams" for evangelism among youth.
 - 3. To endeavor to develop a more Canadian-orientated Christian

Service Program, whereby more of our young people can be engaged in active Christian Service. (Pre-discussions on this matter have been held with the administration of Christian Service)

- 4. To explore the possibilities of evangelism to people living in the Yukon and North West Territories.
- 5. To work together with the Canadian National Congress on Evangelism patterned after the Berlin Congress. (Ottawa, August of 1970).
- 6. To coordinate and strengthen our working relationships with organizations with similar objectives. (Gospel Missionary Union, G. L. Hour, Gospel Messengers, USA Board of Evangelism, etc.)
- 7. To explore the possibility of utilizing the media of Television for evangelism, and take a more progressive approach to Radio Evangelism.
 - 8. To extend the work in Quebec and Nova Scotia.

2. By the Executive Secretary: J. J. Toews

In a bleeding world of moral deterioration, we hear a voice from heaven saying, "Behold I will bring it health and cure, and I will cure them, and will reveal unto them the abundance of peace and truth." (Jeremiah 33:6).

Such redemption in the person of our Lord Jesus Christ is operative before our very eyes in such days as these. Through His church and His children, God is still redemptively reaching out to the hearts of men and women, delivering them from the bonds of sin and snatching them from the jaws of perdition. Indeed, the Gospel is still the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth.

It has been two years since we had the opportunity of reporting to you. During this time, the doors of service have always exceeded our ability to respond. For this we are grateful. Wherever we were privileged to enter, we have endeavored to make known the unsearchable riches of Christ. The statistical report attached in Appendix No. 1 indicates in what capacity we have

endeavored to serve.

We rejoice for the lasting fruit which has been noticeable in some of the churches where we were privileged to be. In other instances the fruit has not been as evident. Some sould have come to know Jesus Christ. However, we feel compelled to add the words of W. Dayton Roberts, in answer to the inquiry 'Why churches in Latin American countries where Evangelism in Depth have been active for a year had not grown more.' He says, "But immediate church growth is not the only positive result that should be expected from a large scale Evangelism in Depth effort. The new spirit of faith, courage, and optimism on the part of the Dominican Republic, as they discovered that not even war or revolution could thwart God's evangelistic purpose through His church, was exciting. This new zeal, this new enthusiasm,

this new boldness to speak the Word of God is difficult to measure, but it is one of the most significant products of an Evangelism in Depth effort." He speaks further of the collective experience on the part of the whole body of Christ in Evangelism saying: "Wherein discouragement turns to hopefulness, negativism to optimism, indifference to aggressiveness, doubt to faith, and timidity to courage." (W. Dayton Roberts, Revolution in Evangelism, Moody Press, pages 84 and 86). These qualitative results cannot easily be measured but we trust that they bring new horizons to many a Christian.

Speaking of our work, we need to underscore that a presentation of Biblical principles of evangelism in a church will need a response of both hearing and doing. In a number of instances where the church has made a conscious effort to implement the Biblical principles of Evangelism, it is exciting to note what God has done. Churches that had not grown for decades have been privileged to add new believers from their community to their ranks, and communities as a whole have become keenly aware that the church has a living Christ to bring right into their homes.

Instead of the Office of Christian Education and the Office of Evangelism addressing themselves to all of the church agencies, the two, by mutual agreement, have divided these responsibilities. Those which fell to our office were:

- 1. Church Libraries. We have sought to conduct Church Library Clinics in every province and believe that in each instance these were very profitable. As a result, we together with Christian Press, have made arrangements whereby we can help the libraries in our churches select from a flooded market, the books that are best suited for a church library and promote the same. The benefit of this arrangement has not yet become evident, but we trust it shall be effective shortly.
- 2. Men's Fellowship. In a goodly number of churches we have met separately with the men to discuss their responsibility in regards to evangelism, and in most instances an attitude of readiness to become involved was evident.
- 3. Ladies Groups have also been challenged to see how great a responsibility and privilege they have in making Christ known to the many women in the community who do not know the Saviour. In several churches, the women's group has begun an active, systematic, prayerful ministry of witnessing to the ladies in their neighbourhood.

From several sources, a concern for our native citizens, the Canadian Indians, has been brought to us and we have become increasingly interested to know just what we could and should do for these precious people. A questionnaire relevant to this point was sent to all of the churches and we have received seevnty-five replies. Almost thirty of the churches who responded, have contact with these native citizens, either in their neighbourhood or through their members in various professions. Various suggestions have been made to us as to how this work should be implemented.

But our study has not been completed, and therefore, we cannot bring any specific suggestions to the conference at this time. Nevertheless, we want to work on and see how the Lord will direct.

Our interest in Continuous Church Centered Evangelism continues. On the few occasions where we have endeavored to implement this program we have not been too successful—largely because, we believe, we were not able to give the local churches the needed help in the various aspects of the program. No doubt, the program itself will need to be revised and adapted to the various local situations so that our churches may become a real evangelistic force in the place where God has placed them.

Along with our ministry in the churches, we have also promoted appropriate literature, which could give further inspiration and guidance in evangelism. This literature has been well received and we believe it has been a blessing to many who have used it.

During the past term, we have also acquired a colored movie film entitled, "No time to Wait", which portrays the battles church people have as they decide whether or not they should become involved in evangelism. The cost of this film is being covered by the rental that is charged to the churches who show it.

It has been a joy to work together with Brother Rudy Boschman since January 1, 1969, and he will report on his work. The other brethren whose services were sponsored through our office in the various churches, are listed in Appendix No. 2. We are grateful for their assistance and encourage our churches to write to the office requesting names of brethren who are available for such work.

Having worked with our churches for the past three years in the area of Evangelism, I am deeply grateful for the warm interest that prevails in so many instances and the gracious cooperation the pastors have given to this effort. I am further grateful to the Conference for giving me the privilege of taking a year for sabbatical studies. The vacation time of this year will be spent in a ministry to our churches in South America in the area of evangelism. Then I will return in time to enter a one-year full-time study at Dallas Theological Seminary in the area of World Evangelism and Missions.

Should the Lord permit me to return to this work, I trust that He shall be able to use me more effectively for His glory, the edification of the church, and the salvation of many people.

APPENDIX NO. 3

EVANGELISTIC PROJECTIONS FOR THE FUTURE

"Where there is no vision, the people perish," (Proverbs 29:18). The harvest of our Lord is still plentious. Therefore, we do not want to stand idle, but our prayer is that we may be our best for God. In evangelism, the following vision is growing in our hearts:

- 1. Evangelism Through Every-Member Involvement. Here our primary aim will be to produce soul winners, and this through:
 - practical training sessions in groups
 - preaching and teaching sessions
- practical street witnessing and visitation closely knit to the local situation and needs,
- teaching and promoting the intercessory ministry so that this may be done under the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit.
- teaching and promoting the use of the Sword of the Spirit with love in the believer's heart.
- 2. Revival-Evangelism. Here our primary goal shall be to pray down revival fire which will be contagious in the hearts oft the believers and the community, and this through:
 - expository revival preaching
- workshops with small groups in which we want to learn to understand the times in which we live.
- the principles of evangelism which need to be employed in a respective church situation with personal evangelism going hand in hand with revival, witnessing, and soul winning.
- 3. Evangelism Through Church Agencies. Here our primary objective shall not be to create new organizational structures for the local church to do evangelism, but to bring into focus the purpose of existing church organizations for evangelism. This we shall seek to do through:
- a biblical definition of the purpose of the church here on earth.
- a biblical definition of the purpose of the church agencies within the structure of the church.
- a study of how each agency may relate itself scripturally to witnessing and evangelism.
- 4. Continuous Church-Centered Evangelism with the necessary adaptation to a given church situation. Here our primary goal shall be to make evangelism, not only a periodic effort of the church, but a continuous involvement under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. This program has been spelled out at an earlier occasion and was published as part of the Strategy of Outreach, which appeared as an insert in the Mennonite Brethren Herald a few weeks ago. For this reason, we shall not repeat the points here.

Let us conclude by saying that the day of Evangelism is

not past. The Lord has commanded us to occupy until He comes, and we want to pursue the goal of making Jesus Christ known to all men with prayer and diligence.

3. By Evangelist: Rudy Boschman

Dear Fellow Workers:

There is no greater joy than to see Paul's words in II Corinthians 5:17 become a reality in a person's life, "When someone becomes a Christian, he becomes a brand new person inside. He is not the same any more. A new life has begun. All of these new things are from God, who brought us back to Himself through what Christ Jesus did, and God has given us the privilege of urging everyone to come into His favour. For God was in Christ restoring the world to Himself; no longer counting men's sins against them, but blotting them out. He has given us this wonderful message to tell others. We are Christ's ambassadors. God is using us to speak to you. We beg you, as though Christ Himself were here pleading with you, receive the love he offers you. For God took the sinless Christ and poured into Him our sins. Then, in exchange, He poured God's goodness into us. As God's partners, we beg you not to toss aside this marvelous message of God's great kindness." (Living Letters).

It has been a tremendous source of inspiration to me to see men and women become new creatures in Christ in the last six months, during which it was my privilege to be engaged in this ministry of evangelism. Equally exciting, was seeing Christians experience a revolutionary crisis in their life through the enthronement of Jesus Christ in their hearts, and then becoming instrumental in soul winning. The experience of being yoked together with Brother J. J. Toews has been enriching and rewarding, and I would ask you for your sincere prayer support for him as he now ministers in a very heavy schedule in South America. We are not in this work alone. All of us are involved in that degree that we desire to be—in praying, giving, going, sharing, witnessing—and our joy is in direct proportion to our involvement. Let us pray for one another.

I do not intend, by any means, to press the panic button, but I want to say right at the outset that "We are in trouble, when we realistically examine our evangelistic thrust on the local church level; not everywhere, but in many places. It is not all right with a church, when we are told that 95% of evangelical Christianity never talks about Christ, or shares its faith with others."

POINTS TO PONDER

— Philip E. Hughs and Frank Colquhoum say in their introduction to the book, "Our Guilty Silence" by J. R. Stott, "In a day when the church's evangelistic mission was never more urgent, it would seem that the church's evangelistic enterprise has never been more lacking or ineffective. It is certainly true that the church, as a whole, displays more enterprise in other fields (for

example, in theological debate, liturgical reform, and social service)

than in the realm of evangelism."

— In the book, "Towards the Conversion of England" which was written on the basis of research by a special Commission on Evangelism, appointed by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, the following is stated as a major problem in evangelism: "Reticence is one of the hindrances—shyness in speaking about the things of God."

— It was P. Wilson Carlile who coined the phrase, "I have the biggest job I ever tackled in my life. I am trying to open

the mouths of the people in the pews."

— John R. Stott says, in his book "Our Guilty Silence": "Many of us clergy are tongue-tied too. We cannot exaggerate the importance of breaking down this traditional English reserve which produces a church of 'silent saints'."

I believe we are correct in saying that this is not uniquely the problem of the English-man, but also of the MB man. Like the Samaritan lepers in the Syrian Camp, we've got to recognize and say, "We are doing wrong. This is a day of good news, yet we are holding our tongues." I am not going to say more about this, it speaks for itself. These are extremely important points to ponder.

PITFALLS TO PREVENT

 This does not call for a defeatist attitude to be fostered and finally succumbed to.

- This does not necessitate the act of catering to feelings

of despondency and discouragement.

— This does not call for despair and a mind set of "I-guess-there-is-nothing-we-can-do-about-it-any-way-so-why-bother". We have:

PLANS TO PROMOTE

The fact as it stands and confronts us, calls for transparency and honesty on the part of all of us to 'tell it like it is' and that to one another and to God. This is, in fact, confession (agreeing with God), repenting (asking God to forgive, which He so readily does), and then seriously searching to discover what Jesus meant when He says in John 7:38, 39—"He that believes in Me as the Scriptures have said, out of his heart shall flow rivers of living water. Now this He said about the Spirit which those who believed in Him were to receive." In his thousands of contacts with church people of evangelical churches, Dr. William Bright finds that most Christians are not witnessing, and the reason is, he says, that self is on the throne. When this is the case we are confronted with a carnal man who is controlled by self, and self never wants to die. Witnessing and sharing Christ with others always demands a death. Jesus says, "Except a grain of wheat fall into the earth and dies, it remains alone, but if it dies, it bears much fruit." And so we have a plan to promote, and that plan must be to see Christ enthroned in the lives of

the individual members of our congregations. The Holy Spirit must be at the 'control center' of the Christian's life. When He is there, the automatic result or consequence is that out of that person's inner-most being, out of his heart, will flow not a trickle—nor a stream—nor even a river—but rivers of living water. Such people live rich, abundant, overflowing, exciting lives.

This is the burden of my heart, to bring this message into the churches, and to see the fire kindled in the hearts of some, and I know of nothing quite as contagious as fire-particularly when it is the fire of the Holy Spirit, and we permit it to burn and spread. In some cases it will have to be spear-headed by laymen in the church. In some cases the clergy are already the 'ignited' ones. I am sensing an uneasy stirring not only in the adult laity and among our young people, but also in the leadership of our churches, and sometimes these are looked upon as the 'trouble-makers' who are 'trying to rock the boat'. I sense very keenly the necessity for 'rocking the boat' because in some of our 'boats' many of the 'fishermen' are sound asleep and do not care to be disturbed in their 'comfortable pew'. What did Jesus mean when He said, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men."? "... out of his heart will flow rivers . . . ye shall receive *power* when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you *shall be my witnesses*."? What did these same men to whom Jesus said this and who experienced that power in their lives say?-"We cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard." It is demonstrated and said over and over again of these men: "... they spoke the Word of God with boldness", "... those who were scattered went about preaching the Word."

I see a new day dawning for evangelism in our constituency. But being honest in my stance of evaluation, I see it coming not only through the leadership, but also through the laity, and in many cases through our youth. We have a lot of genuinely 'positive innovaters' in all three of these strata, who are 'ready to launch the rocket' for an evangelistic thrust geared to contemporary society and present times, in vehicles which will do the job today. Referring again to the book, "Towards the Conversion of England", chapter 2, where the Commission says: "It is the presentation of the Gospel, not its content that changes with the generations and their varying conditions."

The Pilot Project Tour of Northern British Columbia, which we undertook, bears out this fact very clearly. See Apendix No. 1 and 2. In contemporary times, we must use contemporary idioms and styles in order to do what Christ's example, of whom it was said that "He was a friend of the publicans and sinners, and He ate with them." Paul also says it so nicely in I Corinthians 9:20. "To the Jews I became as a Jew in order to win the Jews. To those under the law, I became as one under the law, though not being myself under the law, that I might win those under the law. To those outside the law, I became as one outside the law, not being without law towards God, but under the law of Christ, that I might win those outside the law. To the weak,

I became weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all men that I might by all means save some. I do it all for the sake of the Gospel that I may share in its

blessings." (R.S.V.)

To say the least, the Pilot Project with the team of young people, whom we called the "Valley Minstrels" was exciting and thrilling. The message was stubbornly and centrally Jesus Christ—that's the only message we had. That's the only message we brought to the unchurched young people, and these people were reached and brought face to face with Jesus Christ. This was mainly because they inquired and wanted to know after we had presented our 'Sing-In' or our 'Concert' or our 'Sing Along'. There is a hunger there which is surprising.

Yes, I am optimistic when I look ahead! In the Institute for Evangelism in Winnipeg just a few weeks ago, Dr. Don Jacobs was speaking of a similar institute held in the States where a lot of denominations, particularly Mennonite denominations, were represented, and someone there had made the following statement speaking about evangelism. "The MB's are like a rocket 'hissing on the launching pad". I pray to God this is so. Brothers, Let's

get on with the count-down!

APPENDIX No. 1

"PILOT PROJECT IN TEAM YOUTH EVANGELISM"

It was May 23rd when Conference Evangelist, Rudy Boschman, together with the "Valley Minstrels" started out for British Columbia on a pilot project to attempt to reach people who were not generally in church—people who seldom came into contact wiht the Gospel, people who had relatively little or no contact with the organized church. During this time, it was the objective to find ways and means of relating redemptively to people of this calibre. The music which we used was provided by the team, being made up of George Thielmann, Richard Enns, Carol Zerbe, Alice Driediger, and Erwin Froese. Instrumental accompaniment was the traditional hymn and gospel song approach with piano accompaniment. Some of the music was acappella. Then, the majority of the repertoire was religious folk song accompanied by a guitar, a tub bass, a tamborine, as well as a ukulele. It was a full and sometimes hectic schedule which we found available to us, and we found that God had literally limitless opportunities for us to relate to people in a very practical way what Jesus Christ meant to us and what He had done for us and in us by His grace.

The following are excerpts taken from the diary which Alice Driediger kept for the team during this pilot project tour of Northern British Columbia, which took us to Terrace, Kitimat, Port Edward, Prince Rupert, New Hazelton, Smithers, Vanderhoof

and Prince George.

Friday, May 12. First day and it has been great! If this is any indication of what is to come, I can hardly wait! R.B., Carol,

Erwin and myself drove to Cache Creek where we met Rich and George, George clued us in as to what the mixed quartette from school had experienced and then R.B. related some of the details of this tour to us. We all got real excited about everything. Since we were all together now, we were led to have our devotions together in the car. As I remember, Erve read Romans 5, 6, 7, and 8. Things just seemed to pop out at us and we really enjoyed R.B. explaining some of the concepts we didn't understand. Conversational prayer isn't new to any of us and so it was really great talking to God in the car. We all had the same purpose and desire; to glorify God and to win others to Him. We also became very aware that in everything we undertook, we wanted to be led by the Holy Spirit. Tonight we are in Prince George. We spent most of the evening practising some of our songs. It has been a long and exciting day. I am tired and yet I think I will find it hard to sleep. There's so much to think about.

Saturday, May 24. It seems that this morning was more than just another morning. We woke up in good spirits, and had a good breakfast. As we drove today we organized our program for tomorrow morning, and then also sang through some of our repertoire with the aid of the ukulele. The car isn't the best place to rehearse in. We keep being reminded that Fraser Valley isn't the only beautiful place in the world; the Bulkley Valley runs a close second. We arrived at Terrace about 6:00 this evening. Rev. Balzer gave us a warm welcome. After a hasty supper, we all rushed back to the church and practised a bit before going to the "Couples' Night" at the Evangelical Free Church. Young married couples from three local churches were gathered there for an "Old Time Get Together". This was our first opportunity to try some of our religious folk songs, and the people really enjoyed them. About eleven o'clock we went back to the church and ran through our program for tomorrow morning. Seeing that this was to be a radio broadcast, it had to be rehearsed at least some. We're really curious about tomorrow. We have prayed that God would use the broadcast for His glory. It's nearly one o'clock. I hope that not every night is this late, although God will give us strength.

Sunday, May 25. It gives you a wierd feeling when you wake up in the morning more tired than when you went to bed. R.B. said he was up a good part of the night preparing his message too. In a session of conversational prayer, we committed ourselves and our services to God and then left for the Evangelical Free Church to sing in their Sunday School Worship Service, to which we had been invited. There were adults and young people and I must say it was a close fellowship experience. Going back to the MB Church, we sang for the children in Sunday School. At eleven o'clock sharp, with a wave of a hand from the radio technician, we knew that we were on the air. "God's Love" was R.B.'s message and our songs conveyed the same truth. "Our team, plus the young people of Terrace, were invited to "Parkers" for a barbeque this afternoon. We enjoyed sharing with them in song and testi-

mony. This evening was really great! Team spirit was really high! We were trusting God tonight, and He sure didn't let us down. R.B.'s message was so obviously Spirit-led. It was neat, since we were praying for him while he wes talking. We felt our prayers were answered. R.B. is so enthusiastic about the Four Spiritual Laws. I am really anxious to use them. I hope we have opportunities tomorrow.

Monday. May 26. We were all glad to be able to sleep in a bit this morning. A young couple, the Victor Lepp's gave us the red-carpet treatment today. We went to their house at 11:00 and rehearsed some, and then ate a real good lunch. We got to talking and sharing and it was slmost 1:30 by the time we left the table. On our way to the Hot Springs, we stopped at Mr. Lepp's office (he is a dentist) and sang there. R.B.and George were scheduled for an interview on the local TV station at 6:00 this evening. In the interview, we felt that God was intervening and His Holy Spirit leading. The interviewer seemed to get interested in "the Christ" that they portrayed. The evening service was well attended. Our group did some slightly more traditional songs tonight. After the evening service, we went to a congregation of Indians gathered in a home led by the Salvation Army, Corporal Young. Here we saw another mission field. I wonder what Christ would say to us about our brother, the Indian. Do we consider him the 'Samaritan' of today? What actually is our responsibility?

Tuesday, May 27. Before we left for Kitimat this morning, we got together at the church to practise for a while, and to arrange our program for the High School there. So any of these kids don't have a religion-in fact they don't want one. As a matter of fact, they don't need one-they need Christ! Christ to them is "churchianity", and "churchianity", as they see it, has turned them off. In the afternoon we went to Alcan for a tour. I didn't catch on to the whole process, but I guess it interested the guys. We had a unique experience at supper. Bill Esau and Les Sawatzky, who are from the Fraser Valley and are batching and working in Terrace, had us over for supper in their cabin. We enjoyed ourselves. It was also informal. R.B. gave a very practical message on the Great Commission tonight. We all appreciated it. I am sure that when someone shows us new ways to show Christ's love for others, every Christian ought to be keenly interested. In the workshop we held afterwards, we studied through the Four Spieiru 1 Laws and the practical ways in which we could approach people with the message of Good News.

Wednesday, May 28. We did so many things today, it is hard to remember. We met at the church at 10:00 to rehearse and then at 11:30 we went to Benno Toews' Elementary School where we sang to aprosimately 175 students. They were so taken in by the music. Kids can be influenced so easily. I can see why we should live carefully. They even wanted our autographs afterwards. After lunch, we took off for about an hour or so with the intention of sharing Christ with someone on the street or in the coffe shop in Terrace. We were all led to someone and when

we met again, we were really enthusiastic about going again. After committing ourselves to God to use us and after some orientation, we went out on the different streets to do a religious survey and use the Four Spiritual Laws, when and where the Spirit led. The people we found were not only cooperative, but hungry and searching. God was so good to us in encouraging us today. We were just so full of praise! The time flew and we can hardly wait to go again. R.B. hadn't had time to prepare for tonight's service at all and we hadn't practised much either, but the Holy Spirit granted us such liberty and really spoke dynamically through him as he spoke, and us as we spoke and sang.

Thursday, May 29. Almost the first thing this morning, we, the Valley Minstrels, went to the Upland Elementary School and sang for the entire student body. R.B. had a session with the Ladies' Fellowship, not only of the MB Church, but also others as well. Just before lunch the entire team got together and we got set up in the High School Gym in Terrace for our concert "Sing-In". By the time we started there, there must have been about 250 or 300 high school students there. We found a unique opportunity. After the concert, we invited the kids to stay and talk, and a lot did. The grade twelves have a "Commons Room" which they can use during school hours, and they invited us into this room to have a discussion. While we were in the "Commons Room", R.B. was sharing Christ with some of the other students in the hallway and in the gym. These grade twelves wanted to talk about something which was important, like evolution or some such thing. George showed them how futile an argument of that nature would be. So the kids started asking questions about God and Christ and our relationship to Him. George can communicate to a group so well and the Spirit was giving him such intelligent answers that the rest of us were fairly quiet, and just prayed. We could feel God there with us. The kids are really searching and they can't argue against our experiences or against Jesus Christ. We stayed there until 3:30 and we hope to go back again. We then had a quick snack; we hadn't even thought of eating, and then we went to the Lepp's who later took the team and some of the church's young people out to the lake for supper. There was a whole bunch of young people in the church tonight and we are really thankful for that. The young people, together with the team, were invited to the Hislops-people from the Evangelical Free Churchfor coffee and refreshments after the service. We sat and sang, and ate, and shared with each other. There seem to be so many kids who find that Christianity is such a drag and we are trusting God that He is using us to show them that it doesn't need to be. It can be something which is vibrant and vital and dynamic!

Friday, May 30. I could write a book—but I won't, because it is 1:30 in the morning already. So far, today was the best. In the afternoon, we sang at the Thornhill Elementary School to all the grades. The questions about why we sang thesongs we did really floored us. We don't always realize that kids, even in Grade six and seven think too. After a time of sharing and preparing

ourselves for tonight, we went to the Toews's for supper, after which we went to Braun's Island for a "Young People's Sing-In". We were really glad to see some o fthe kids out to whom we had talked in the "Commons Room" yesterday. R.B.'s theme was "History's Greatest Love-In". After singing outside for awhile, we went inside a building for doughnuts and hot chocolate. We sang and shared Christ with the kids. We could really feel the Spirit guiding us. The meeting was formally dismissed about 11:00 and P.B. invited those who did not have a curfew to attend to, were welcome to stick around and talk about Christ and we would be willing to stay longer. The Spirit just led us to directly to talk to different kids, or they came and talked to us. It was unbelievable. It was about 12:35 by the time we left the camp. We were all so full, we just had to go and share. We met the Lepps againwonderful Christians-and together we went to a restaurant and ate and talked. We had so much to talk about. It seemed that no one could think of eating and sleeping. I just can't believe that God can use us little people to work through. It's fantastic!

Saturday, May 31. We got to sleep in again today. Most of us did our washing and repacked, etc. Right after lunch, we left for Kitimat. We met a group of young people at the First Baptist Church and then we went to the Kitimat Trades Fair. There was an entertainment stage set up at the Trades Fair and we noticed that the music was amplified throughout the grounds too. We managed to get some time on the stage between two other groups. It was such a contrast from the other groups. After, the people came and asked us why we were singing about Christ. It was a real good opportunity to tell them why. It was too bad we couldn't stick around longer, but we had to get back to the church. By the time we got there, supper was ready and we quickly ate and get ready to go to the hospital. There we sang in the corridor for about fifteen or twenty minutes. We got back to the church just in time for the Youth "Sing-In". There were lots of kids there—a good many from Terrace too. I was tired, I didn't feel likes inging at all, but it was neat because we all prayed about it and God just filled me with joy. It was fun singing and sharing with the kids. After, we went downstairs and ate and talked to the kids some more. Pastor Highfield of the Baptist church had everything arranged very nicely for those who came to visit for the Youth Retreat that weekend. The guys slept in the church and the girls slept in the Manse-"wall to wall" in sleeping bags. It was fun being with about twenty to twenty-five girls, except that we didn't get to sleep until about three this morning.

Sunday, June 1. Can you believe that we got up at 6:00 this morning? It was awful! By seven this morning we were all at the church and had divided into five groups. Each team member took one group and had a Bible Study with them. Most of us, I think, studied I Corinthians 13 and other related passages. For myself, I had never led a group like this before and I was really encouraged by the participation and the honesty of the kids. The church service that morning was over an hour and a half long,

but it just seemed like ten minutes. R.B. spoke on the Supreme Sacrifice demonstrated on the cross because God loved us; Carol gave a children's feature about a prayer which was really interesting; also a communion service for which I was glad. It is great to be reminded of Christ's suffering for you. He actually loved us so much that He allowed us to nail Him to the cross. It just seems unreal-such love! It's fantastic The church gave us and the young people a lunch and soon after that we got ready to leave for Port Edward. The young people there gave us a royal send-off. It was really hard to say good-by to them. It sure is surprising how attached we had become to each other in just a few days. I wish we could have stayed longer! There are so many more that need Christ! By 5:30 we got to Port Edward, where we had supper at the church and got ready for the service. There was a good turn out. We had so much to share with the people about this weekend, we could have gone on much longer. But now we are all about ready to go to bed. This weekend really took a lot out of us physically. R.B. is particularly tired, but he is always cheerful! If anyone lives Christ, he sure does!

Monday. June 2. I don't have much to write tonight because we didn't do much. It rained all day—typical Orince Rupert weather. We had the morning to ourselves. All afternoon we shared with each other, and relaxed and enjoyed each other's company. We drove downtown Prince Rupert and looked over the town. Then we met the pastor of the regular Baptist Church there. We stayed at the supper table until nearly eight o'clock, and then sat and talked with our host for awhile. So this was sort of our day off. I can't quite see why the Lord had to send rain in order for us to have to change our plans. We were going to have open-air meetings in the Indian and Japenese villages around.

Tuesday, June 3. We know now why we had to rest yesterday, because today was good and busy. We had lunch in Port Edward and then left for the first school. By the end of the afternoon, we had been singing in three elementary schools, and one high school. The kids were just as responsive as usual. We had to ruch from one school to another, so we couldn't talk to many of them. We sang at a real old High School-it was sort of an ISCF deal, but there was a good group out and the kids were hanging around the door. We invited the kids out for tonight and quite a few of them showed up. Tonight we had our "Sing-In" in the regular Baptist Church. We expected only young people, but there was a good cross-section of people out. We had a great time-and then also afterwards downstairs, talking and sharing with the kids. Many of the young people here have it real rough. The parents seem interested only in making money and so the kids are sort of on their own and so many seem so starved for love and meaning in life. I wish we could have stayed there longer!

Wednesday, June 4 . After a good breakfast, we left for Hazelton via Terrace. We stayed in Terrace for lunch. The minute we stopped someone said "Hello" to us from across the street. It was a young lady whom we had met earlier, whose husband

is a Baptist and a Christian. She was really enthusiastic about us and about our message, but she waid it wasn't for her. She joined us for lunch in the Cafe. When we told her that we would pray for her she literally trembled. She said she was afraid of what would happen if we did. R.B. talked to her while we were at the school for awhile and whe asked us to pray for her. She insisted that we were the first 'real Christians' that she had ever met. Oh, she had met a lot of Christians, but not real ones. I just can't believe that this could really be so. We spent a couple of hours at the High School again. We got to see into the drug problem. They claim 90 percent of the kids here have had contact with drugs in one form or another. Those kids have got so many strikes against them. Then we were on our way to Hazelton in time for supper. Immediately after supper, we sang for about fifteen or eighteen Boy Scouts and their leaders. We then went to the church, which was full. I guess this lack of sleep is catching up with me, and I am getting a good cold, but I suppose there is even a purpose in that-although I don't know what. I hope R.B. is practising up his soprano.

Thursday, June 5. We got together about eleven o'clock this morning to make up the program for the lunch hour. We drove into Olw Hazelton and set up a PA system by a store, and sang while the kids came out of the schoo. Oh-there weren't great throngs or anything like that, but people standing all over and listening to us over the PAsystem. After the lunch, the team went to Kispiox, an Indian village about twenty miles away. Aparently the natives in the village wanted to hear us sing. One of them had been in Old Hazelton and heard us. So we did! Tonight, we sang at the St. Mary's Catholic Schoolauditorium. When contacted about the use of the auditorium, the priest had said, "Oh, by all means. Yes-you may have the auditorium. We need much more of this kind of thing in our society today. You are welcome to have it, and that also free of charge." And so we had a concert in the Catholic auditorium and we had the opportunity of sharing the Four Spiritual Laws and the Good News of Salvation in an informal way with quite a few after the service.

Friday, June 6. Well, we hit the road again. This time our eyes set on Vanderhoof. However, we had made arrangements to sing at the High School at Smithers and sowe stopped there at noon. We were given the use of a classroom which was well filled with students, and also faculty members. It's funny how curious people are as to how we got together and why we sing what we do—why our message is Jesus Christ!? Since we planned to be in Vanderhoof for supper, we couldn't stay for long. The ride was beautiful. It's hard to believe there are so many colors of green. Tonight the young people and our Team drove out to Echo Lake—about twenty miles out of the town of Vanderhoof, and except for the mosquitoes, it was beautiful. We sang, shared and ate, and sang and shared some more.

Saturday, June 7. It was fairly hot already this morning when we got up and it wasn't even late. We drove to Prince George

in the bright sunshine and in good spirits. We got to the church and recorded some of our songs for R.B. By the time we had done that we had worked up a good appetite, so we went out for lunch. After lunch we did some shopping (mostly window shopping), while R.B. went to the doctor with his arm, with which he had had trouble for some time. After that he wasn't feeling too hot, so he went to his host's while we were shown the town. Mr. Block drove us up the mountain where we could see the entire Valley. It was nich of him. At seven-thirty, we all met at the park for an open-air service. The group consisted of young people from a lot of churches. We had a wiener roast and then sang and shared with the kids. It was great to hear that some of the kids had experienced what we had—just to know that the Holy Spirit isn't confined to one particular person or area or four church walls thrills me.

Sunday, June 8. Well, today was out last day together. Before church we met at the home of one of our hosts to evaluate the two weeks to some extent and to prepare fort he mornin service. The church was crowded and we really enjoyed singing and speaking. We were served a quick lunch after church, so that we could be on our way. We got home around ten-thirty—none the worse for the heat. It was a great two weeks! I am glad that we didn't do anything! God did it all!!

APPENDIX NO. 2

EVALUATIONS OF TEAM MEMBERS

These last two weeks have been a time of sharing our faith in the living Christ through the words of contemporary religious folk songs, in dialogue with students in high schools, and in sharing with church groups. The methods we used were good, I believe, especially when we looked at the response. In many of the high schools, the kids showed an overwhelming interest in what we shared about our living relationship with Jesus Christ who had changed our lives. The words of our religious folk songs presented the message of Jesus Christ in an idiom that was familiar to teen-agers. I believe they found it easy to identify with us as peers and hence, they were open to the message we had to offer. Our presentations in the churches. I believe, were refreshing for many people in that it added zest and vitality to the larger scope of the message we were presenting.

For future efforts, I think we could be more effective if we got into more high schools, and also got into them earlier in our stay at any particular place. I believe the method of staging a concert and then talking individually to interested persons after-

wards, is very effective in that it first creates interest and rouses questions and then gives opportunity for personally sharing one's

faith with a person.

I would rate this two-week tour as very successful, both in terms of people contacted, and response to the Gospel of Christ as a first-time experience, and in terms of people letting the Spirit have full control in their lives and they themselves sharing Christ with neighbours, friends, and associates. I would highly recommend this type of approach to evangelism for the future, as it has proved itself an instrument of God to reach people so successfully in this short time. All of us as team members have found it thrilling to share our faith in Jesus Christ in this way.

George Thielmann

Being a member of the first team ever to go out under such conditions, I have made several observations. Naturally, the venture

has also left an impression upon me.

As a team member, I know that I have grown both spiritually and mentally; spiritual growth fed by a continual communion with God. I found that I had to trust God for simple details. Various circumstances and occasional days could have been very trying if we had not depended upon God. It was great how we all wanted to be used of God, for His honor and glory. And since we were available to Him, He could and did use us.

Mentally, or perhaps socially, I have grown through meeting new people. Coming from a rather closely knit "cultural" society, I found i tfascinating to talk with other people, who had been

brought up and thought differently than I.

Basically, we found the kids were really open to God's love. They were searching for something, even though they didn't always label it. We found that we could communicate to our age group well, because we were one of them as far as our dress and music-style went. They could identify with us. Because of this, they were ready and willing to confide in us, which they did. We, in turn, could share with them. Many had never realized that they could have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Because they knew He was real to us, and that we were happy and satisfied, they wanted to know more. We had so many opportunities! In fact, it was really special, because no one else could really approach these kids.

One of the highlights was the afternoon spent in the "Commons Room" at the Terrace High School. As far as faculty and Christian students are considered, that room is God-forsaken. However, after our noon-hour concert, (which was well attended) we were invited into the room. The kids were curious as to what we thought about evolution and other controversial subjects, but we showed them the insignificance of such a discussion and instead we introduced Jesus Christ. Except for occasional questions or remarks, the room was deathly quiet. George told them how Christ had changed his life, and the rest of the group listened, spellbound. The rest of our group was praying as George spoke. We felt Christ's presence so close to us that afternoon!

Next evening, a good many of the kids from the "Commons Room" were at our open-air rally to hear more, and we shared with many of them till late into the night. We really praised

God that night for using us as His instruments.

One thing I would like to recommend if a team such as ours ever goes again: that is-that the group would remain in one area for perhaps several weeks. We stayed in Terrace almost a week, and by the time we left we had made many friends. It's not too hard to 'lay it thick' if you're only staying womewhere for a day ro two, but if you remain in an area for a few weeks, then kids can really see Christ in you.

Alice Driediger

Jesus is sure great! The things He has been doing on this tour are just fantastic. His love has unified us with a perfect bond, just letting Christ use me and all of us to do what He wanted to do. I have learnt a lot on this tour, just a little more each day, especially about people and particularly young kids. We need more groups like this to reach young people-not inside the institutional church but kids who never have heard about Christ the way He really is. The kids that go to church you will meet as a result.

The idea of a team like this full-time or in summer would be just great. You've got to reach kids on their level and present Christ as He is and what He can be in their lives, not only the way Christ has been presented within the four walls of a church building. Our whole philosophy of evangelism has to be changed in order to be able to communicate to young and old alike.

Evangelism, in my viewpoint, is just 'living' and to live is Christ. "A city on a hill cannot be hid." No human being has told me to share Christ with others, I just want to. People around us are going to be affected in Christ means everything to us. The high points of this tour were the opportunities, when after singing, we began sharing our faith in Christ with the kids. I'd love to do this all summer!

Erwin Froese

These two weeks have been those of discovery for me. I'd never before met kids o f16 and 17 who had really lived it up and now were just plain sick of life. And I saw that they were terribly hungry for reality, fulfillment, peace, joy and happiness in life; and only Christ can offer this. For example, in one high school, a girl came up to me and said, "How can you kids stand to go around singing about something like this? Isn't it boring? And yet you all look so happy and satisfied." She really listened too when we explained that Christianity is really exciting. You could just see how much she wanted Christ, yet she couldn't accept the fact that Christ loved us that much. She still wanted to try it on her own. I prayed even harder for her when one of her friends told me that she'd tried to commit suicide by slashing her wrists just a week earlier.

I saw too that young people are just plain sick of "churchianity", but when they saw Christ they got excited too. One thing we have to remember is the Christianity is not a standard of conduct but arelationship of Christ. If our whole lives are Christ's, His Holy Spirit will live through us and show us how to live. One person said to me, "Most Christians sit like stones as long as they're in church, but you kids looked so happy when you sang; you wouldn't have even had to say you had the joy of the Lord. It was written on your faces that Christ is everything to you." Im' so glad Christ has given us this joy and though as an individual, I can't do anything for Christ, Christ working through me can do the impossible.

My eyes were opened too when people said, "If you'd dressed in your Sunday best and sang hymns in church style we wouldn't have listened to you, but you sing our kind of music and dress like us, etc." It was really neat too, to see that it was the 'in' crowd that was really curious and wanted Christ. Some of the greatest times we had were after our 'sing-ins' when we shared Christ personally with kids. We don't need loud invitations with lots of emotional appeal. Kids are anxious to hear more from you as a person. They want to hear now Christ changed our lives. And thus, I really saw that sharing Christ is the most exciting thing I've ever done.

Carolyn Zerbe

This tour has meant an awful lot to me personally. For myself, I would say it was almost like having another whole year of Bible School in terms of things that I have learnt personally.

I believe we need more teams like this where people can meet at their level and where they ar. This ned not necssarily be a musical team but a group of kids who can understand this generation and who can see them as Christ saw them. Christ saw the individual with all his imperfections, problems and needs. This is what this world needs—people who are willing to live with and for others.

I believe that this group was effective because we are just above high school age, and therefore, we were treated as peers by teenagers. Also, to all of us, Christ was a living reality, and therefore, we were united by a common bond of love and others took notice of this.

The only drawback that I felt was that our follow-up work is limited. In the future, I think it should be arranged that kids work in these towns which have been visited by a team. This could be other committed Christians who are looking for a job

away from home.

Last night some of us sat in the park until 1:30. The park was full of high school and junior high kids. We sat around with them, doing more listening than talking. Some of them were drunk; othersin vario us stages. They just sat around the fires, grouped off into various cliques. As I sat watching the fire, I thought to myself, 'What are we Christians doing to help these kids? Wouldn't it be better if Christian teenagers stuck around the park long enough to listen and help these kids than to go home and do their Sunday School lessons and then get a good

night's sleep for church the next day?" How many of us would consider this opportunity a nuisance and a waste of time?

Jesus met people wherever they were. This is what I think our team, with God's help, accomplished. This is why I think we should continue this project next summer. God can only use people who are available to Him and are living for others.

NOVA SCOTIA

fields, with projections for the future, follows:

During the second year of the ministry of Brother and Sister Walter Epp, the Lord has graciously blessed the witness of His servants. As you know, they are working in a dual capacity, under the Missions and Services Christian Service department as counsellor and coordinator, under the Canadian Board of Evangelism as Church planter.

A. Areas of Ministries

1. Radio release — seems to be much appreciated. Responses from radio stations and audience are very positive. One lade wrote: I listened to your radio program on Sunday and I believe you have hit my problems and it seems that my marriage is a duel instead of a duet." This lady came to the Epp home that very day and accepted Jesus Christ.

2. Children's clubs — in the community — "a going concern".

Good community response.

3. Outreach through Library — growing.

4. Home Bible Studies — several regular every week, Others irregular.

5. Regular Sunday School and Family Worship — Neighbour-hood requests have initiated plans to begin in September of 1969.

6. Personal contacts — have resulted in conversions, provided

counselling opportunities.

- 7. Ministry to Christian Service Personnel Brother Epp states: "The work among Christian Service workers falls into two categories, namely the spiritual and the domestic. As a chaplain, I am required to visit all workers once a month. During these visits we discuss all areas of relationships, namely work, socially, church related and with Jesus Christ. When required I also give assistance with teaching preparations. In the domestic areas I negotiate the employments of C.S. workers, their apartment rentals and furnishings, transcript evaluations with the Department of Education, summer school ennrolmets, assist employers to accept and understand our people, and remain available when needed."
 - B. Projections for the future:
- 1. Clarification of goals: Our boards have been told that our "Focus is fuzzy" on our objectives. We agree, and are working.
- 2. R-evaluate existing working relationship between Board of Evangelism and Missions and Services (Christian Service). Changes

seem imperative at this time, and are being considered by the Boards concerned.

- 3. St. Laurent suburb of Montreal
 - 2 baptized
 - Sunday School and service every Sunday afternoon
 - good contacts with inquirers at Sermons from Science
 - Contributed well financially.
- 4. Bethel Bible Institute
- two of our young people have graduated this spring.
- 5. Personal Evangelism
 - door-to-door literature distribution done regulary by local Christians.
- 6. Radio Gospel Missionary Union broadcasts by Brother Ben Dyck.
 - provides opportunity for follow-up

C. Projections for the Future

1. New fields to be considered

2. Continue to work toward self-support and local autonomy.

The Board of Evangelism is grateful unto God for the dedicated workers. They have given of themselves unreservedly for the work in the kingdom. Certainly they merit our prayers. May the Holy Spirit continue to anoint them daily. We praise God for the converts and for the many victories won. Also we request intercessory prayer for the church and for those still to be reached before our Lord returns.

5. Gospel Light Hour

The Gospel Light Hour has witnessed a very encouraging increase in letter response during the past year. Letters have come to us from every area where the broadcast is released. Of particular interest to us are the individuals who request spiritual help or who state their decision to follow Christ.

Here are several letter excerpts:

Rev. Walter Epp, Nova Scotia: "We are receiving very positive responses. Just recently a lady called after the program and arranged to see me. That afternoon she got right with the Lord. I continued visiting her home, and several seeks later her husband accepted Christ."

Ontario: "I enjoy listening to your program. I was especially interested in your message this week. My husband is not a Christian, and we have been separated for many years.

Manitoba: "I would like to say Im' glad your show is on, for

I learned to know the Lord through it."

Alberta: "Thanks for the messages each Sunday night. They are so helpful to my soul. I starter to read my Bible more and hope to by Gods grace."

B. C.: "I enjoy your program every Sunday morning. I live in the country and do not get to church, so appreciate the

radio all the more."

Just a few weeks ago an elderly gentleman (72 years of age) from Central Alberta came to Winnipeg to see the "preacher" he heard on the Calgary station. He was a total stranger in Winnipeg, but after questioning various people he met on the streets he found Gospel Light Hour studios. He was a Christian, yet wanted a time of fellowship with me. After the brief visit, he returned to his home.

During the past year every MB church in Ontario, most churches in Alberta and Manitoba and several in southern Saskatchewan were visited by one or more staff members of the Gospel Light Hour. The reception on these visits was most cordial and the interest shown in Gospel broadcasting was most gratifying.

We are living in a day of mass communications. Although some are questioning the value of Gospel broadcasting, I am convinced that we have barely tapped the potential of Gospel radio. People are being led to a commitment to Christ.

As I read the many letters, I sense a hunger for a simple Bible teaching ministry. There is a hunger for the truth, Man's

soul needs feeding, not tickling. What we need today is a greater vision and faith. We need pastors and members who will use the broadcasts as a point of witness and outreach. We need prayer. Christ changes people in answer to prayer.

R. Willms

Brother Schmidt clarified a number of questions asked.

Brother Dyck mentioned that the Quebec program was aired on some 23 stations covering the whole province of Quebec.

Report by brother Schmidt was accepted. Brother Schmidt called attention to the brethren who have assisted in evangelism, and to the reports by the brethren Toews, Boschman, Willms which will be included in the Conference yearbook, but were not read.

Brother R. Hainaut greeted the conference from our brethren and sisters in Quebec. He made reference to the open door in Quebec. He asked the conference to make use of these open doors to communicate the gospel.

Brother R. Willms reported briefly on the radio ministry. A motion to send greetings to brother Boschman with regrets that he could not be here, carried.

Dear Brother Boschman,

The fifty-ninth Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference was moved with regret as we were informed of the accident that kept you away from the convention. Although we cannot always understand why God permits obstacles to cross our path, for His ways are past finding out, nevertheless we can be confident that God's dealings with His children are meant to draw us closer to Him. We wish you a speedy recovery and extend to you the greeting of the Conference in the expression of David in Psalm 23.

Television involvement was discussed. It was pointed out that the Commission of the General Conference is working on this problem; and that cooperation with the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada in this matter was to be considered.

The motion that the board of evangelism be charged to study the matter, and propose concrete plans as soon as possible, was

seconded, discussed, and approved.

B. RECOMMENDATIONS

Brother V. D. Toews, secretary of the board, read the recommendations.

1. In view of the fact that we will require the services of an assistant Evangelist in some of the phases of our work we recommend that:

We retain the services of Brother Rudy Boschman after the

termination of his present assignment in 1970.

2. We move in the direction of establishing an area of short term service for young people of our Conference. Such service is to be financially self-sustaining and to be basically tied in with our overall program of Evangelism. The details of its operation as well as its relationship to the Board of Missions and Services of Hillsboro are to be established in the interim.

The implications of the recommendations were discussed at some length.

Recommendation 1. Changed to read — from, "after the termination of his present assignment in 1970" to, "to work as an evangelist until July 1971." Carried.

Recommendation 2. After a motion of referral the delegates accepted (in the fifth session) the following as Recommendation 2:

The Board of Evangelism, in consultation with the Board of Missions and Services explore the possibilities of developing a short term service program to be administered in Canada. The result of this study is to be presented to the Council of Boards for further direction.

At the same (fifth) session the following additional recommendation was also accepted.

3. The Conference ratify the appointment of Brother Rene Hainaut as a worker of the Board of Evangelism in Quebec.

C. FINANCIAL STATEMENT AND BUDGET

Brother Victor Toews presented this report. After clarification of several questions the budget was received.

D. ELECTION

V. D. Toews had asked earlier that his name be deleted. Candidates by nominations commission: Henry Willms, E. A. Isaac, Jake Schmidt, Jake Neufeld.

It was agreed that in the case of nominations from the floor a check should be made that either the person is present or that he has consented to stand for election.

Nomination from floor: Victor Nickel, Neil Funk, John Froese, John Redekop.

Elected: Henry Willms, E. A. Issac, Jake Schmidt (1973).

After announcements by the moderator, brother John Epp invited delegates to a meal downstairs and gave directions to delegates.

Brother H. S. Rempel closed the morning sessions with prayer.

SECOND SESSION - MONDAY AFTERNOON, JULY 7, 1969

Brother John Block directed in the singing of "All the Way my Saviour Leads Me". Brother Elvin Penner, Warman, Saskatchewan, opened the session with prayer.

The conference secretary read the minutes and moved their adoption. The minutes were accepted with several changes.

Brother H. Warkentin read three resolutions; to the Conference of Mennonites in Canada, to brother H. Unger, and to brother Rudy Boschman. The greetings were accepted.

Brother J. M. Schmidt asked for a postponement on the reading of the Budget of the Board of Evangelism. The postponement was granted.

III. BOARD OF SPIRITUAL AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

A. Report

Brother J. H. Quiring, chairman, introduced the board members pointing out that Brother David Epp had replaced Brother Peter Rempel who had replaced Brother Rudy Boschman. Brother Quiring then called upon brother H. J. Brandt, secretary, to read the report. (Formerly Board of Reference and Counsel)

Introduction

The rapidly changing world with its increase of knowledge and influence continue to have its favorable as well as adverse effects upon the Christian Church. This is certainly true of the Mennonite Brethren Church. Changes are taking place. But change for change sake is not a sufficiently valid reason for introducing innovations. On the other hand, adhering to a practice just because it is traditional is not reason enough to resist change. While change is doubtless inevitable, our conference is constantly confronted with

whether or not the change is contrary to the Scriptures, or will be detrimental to its welfare. Brother Frank Peters in his paper Consensus and Change in our Brotherhood said this: "Perhaps nothing has vexed our brotherhood more in the last few decades than the phenomenon of change . . . Since change has always been a characteristic of spiritual growth, the deeper problem involved in changes must be one of evaluation. How can one be sure that the changes that are taking place are in the right direction? Is the church gaining or losing ground?

Issues Dealt With The Board of Reference and Counsel has become increasingly more aware that its responsibility lies in seeking to help the

Brotherhood to find answers to these questions.

The Board itself has not remained unaffected by change. The new organizational structure accepted in 1966 and initiated the following year, placed the Board into a new relationship to the Conference and to the other areas of conference work. This required some adjustment.

This change necessitated a study to determine the actual areas of responsibility. According to the Board's interpretation of the provided guidelines its assignment can be broken down into four

areas.

1. CONSTITUTION

The new organizational structure of the conference made a new constitution imperative. The Board charged H. H. Voth to head a commission to draw up a draft for study and revision by the Board and the Council of Boards. The proposed constitution has been presented to the churches and is before this Convention for consideration.

2. SOCIAL CONCERNS AND INTER-CHURCH RELATION-

The Board has attempted to come to grips with the matter of our relationship and involvement with M.C.C. and M.C.C. Peace Section.

Letters from two provincial conferences helped to focus the issue and led the Board to call a meeting with M.C.C. personnel (Daniel Zehr and William Snyder), M.C.C. Board Members, and the Conference Executive. This meeting resulted in a very profitable exchange and a better understanding of each other as well as of the issues and problems involved. A statement drawn up to help clarify the issue is presented to this Convention.

The matter of relationship with the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada has been studied. Since this association is somewhat new, its appeal for membership brought inquiries from some churches.

In response the Board sent out the following statement:

"In answer to inquiries from several churches for clarification and direction in regard to the appeal of the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada for membership in the association, we should state the following;

Having considered the position and purpose of the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada we would encourage churches and individuals of our Conference to become involved in this united evangelical witness in Canada if they so desire."

3. DOCTRINAL, ETHICAL, FAITH CONFERENCES, AND $\ensuremath{\textit{PEACE}}$

The Faith and Life Convention held last year was in many respects an experiment, but it certainly proved to be a good experience. The exact responsibility of this Board in the preparation of the Convention program needed clarification and this was defined during the process of working with the Conference Executive.

The weaknesses of the Convention program must be charged to our account. The Board has spent some time in seeking to evaluate the Convention, and while it realizes that there is room for improvement, it believes that the large attendance and active participation are indicative of a need and of a desire to find answers as a brotherhood.

The question of our peace witness continues to be a current issue. To help strengthen our conviction in this doctrine, the Board asked Brother J. M. Klassen to write his testimony concerning non-resistance. This was distributed to the churches in time for Peace Sunday, 1968. We thank Brother Klassen for his contribution.

The validity of the observance of Peace Sunday has been questioned. The Board endorsed the observance by continuing the practice of distributing the specially prepared bulletins provided by the Mennonite Brethren Missions and Services.

The papers on "Expression of Our Peace Witness" presented at the Faith and Life Convention helped to bring the matter of peace to our attention. This Board, charged by the Convention with the task of studying the Declarations, is presenting a revision to this Convention.

The paper dealing with an evaluation of Situation Ethics was chosen as a carry-over from the Faith Conference held in Winnipeg.

The Board was to study this declaration also and come to the Convention with a revision.

4. PULPIT AND CHURCH POLICY

A survey has been conducted to gather information from pastors concerning remuneration, training, experience, future availability, etc. A statistical report on some of this has been made public.

Requests for assistance in securing pastors have been responded to with some degrees of success. It is hoped that greater assistance can be given in the future.

Wallet size ordination certificates prepared by the MB Publishing House are being made available to all Ministers through the Provincial Conference Executives. The actual issuing is left up to the individual provinces.

Issues under Study

The Board is keenly aware that there are many issues that

cannot be dealt with easily nor hurriedly. A number of issues have appeared on the agendas during the past two years, but as yet have not really been clarified sufficiently to suggest any solution or directives. They are, however, vital concerns with which our brotherhood will need to come to grips. Among these issues are:

1. The question of speaking to government in matters involving

legislation in moral and social matters.

2. The involvement of our brotherhood as a conference and as individuals in the social problems of our communities and our nation.

3. The problems created by the resolution of the General

Conference in 1963 re reception of non-immersed believers.

4. The proper action of the church and its relationship to believers involved in a marriage relationship with non-believers.

5. Consideration must be given to ways and means of improving the pulpit ministry in our churches, in face of the fact that the pulpits are being criticized and attacked today.

6. The lack of involvement of "lay people" in the pulpit ministry is a growing concern. This matter will require study and

evaluation.

7. The question of Trade and Labour Unions was presented by a provincial conference, but further study has been tabled pending action on this subject at the coming General Conference.

8. The request for dual Conference membership has come to the Board from two churches. The pros and cons of such an

arrangement are difficult to predetermine.

9. The method of transfer and release of membership in our conference has been questioned. Urbanization and other factors have brought about new situations which tend to complicate the once simple procedure.

Issues in Projection

Our brotherhood is confronted with many issues that have not been given conference consideration. The many new problems crowding in upon us make it impossible for the Board or the Conference to deal with all of them. Discernment is needed to know in which areas we should make projections. The Board desires to be alert and to be alerted to current needs. The following are concerns that have come to the Board for study and possible presentations at our Faith and Life Conferences:

1. Employer Labour Code

Capital Punishment
 Divorce Laws

4. Abortion

5. Affluence

6. Free time, Entertainment, Recreation.

7. The Concept of the Church.

8. Discipleship in the light of rules.

Conclusion

The Board of Reference and Counsel has worked in love and unity under the blessings of God. We are confident that the Lord

has great things in store for us. But we appeal to the brotherhood to join together to pray and seek God's face that we might experience a spiritual revival. The peculiar nature of our age and the brevity of time should motivate us on to greater faithfulness and to renewed desire to watch and pray for the coming of the Lord.

Brother Brandt read the report and moved its adoption. After discussion and clarification of several points, the report was adopted.

B. RECOMMENDATIONS

The brethren Brandt, Quiring, and Voth presented recommendations:

The Board recommends that:

1. The following statement be accepted:

STATEMENT CONCERNING OUR ATTITUDE TOWARD MCC

In response to letters of concern and criticism from two provincial conferences in regard to the nature of some phases of MCC work and after an open and thorough discussion of the total program with MCC representatives, we would like to reply with the following statements:

(1) Let us cultivate a positive attitude to the co-operative work of MCC. Those in charge are trying to do their work according to the mandate given by the constituent groups. It is their expressed desire to serve in a way that is consistant with the teachings of scripture and the example of our Lord.

(2) Through the work of MCC we are participating with other conferences in a world wide ministry of love. Much good has been done through this service in the Name of Christ, without regard to race, colour, or creed. This ministry of compassion calls for our wholehearted and continued support. We believe that it arises out of our commission to be true witnesses of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. It is not the mandate of MCC to establish churches, but the work because of its nature can be used effectively to open doors for the Gospel of Redemption.

(3) Because the constituency of MCC is made up of a number of denominations, it is obvious that there will be differences of opinions and views on some phases of the work. Without compromising any basic position we should manifest a spirit of under-

standing and tolerance.

When criticism is voiced it should be based on facts not on hear-say or unfounded accusations, and it should be constructive in nature. Such criticm is encouraged and welcomed by our

representatives as well as MCC at large.

(4) Our MCC representatives should have the confidence and support of the brotherhood. They should endeavor to know the mind and feeling of the entire MB Conference on various issues of MCC work and represent the constituency accordingly. To enable them to do this, the conference should provide opportunities for discussion and interaction with the representatives on relevant issues.

Since we as an MB Conference have never clearly stated the need and extent of social and cultural involvement in the pursuit of our program of evangelism and mission work, we have precipi-

tated some of the problems we are now facing.

Our conference should, as soon as possible, clarify and state its position in relation to the need and extent of social, cultural, and political involvement in the total proclamation of the Gospel of Redemption. This would give our members in the various vocations and services a clear scriptural and unified position from which to serve and communicate. Also following a clear definition of our understanding we as a conference would be in a position to review the MCC Constitution and make representation to MCC on issues as deemed necessary.

2. The following declarations be approved as an expression of

our concensus:

(a) The Declaration on Our Peace Witness

The Situation Calling for a Re-examination of Our Peace Witness.

 The world with its moral, spiritual, and political confusion, is seeking a solution and way of peace without apparent success.

2. Since the church, including evangelicals, has been involved in war, and often in the history of the world has been an active advocate of war, and violence, the world is confused as to the role of the church in its relationship to peace, and therefore questions the primacy and relevancy of the Gospel of Christ.

3. The church is facing questions of immediate and long range importance relating to current problems of government, industry, racism, war, etc. The Mennonite Brethren Church needs

to know how to speak to these issues.

4. Pacifism variously motivated is on the increase and its advocates look to the evangelicals of the peace churches for cooperation and support. These peace churches do not know whether or not they can join hands with pacifism arising out of other concerns than the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

5. Some members of the Mennonite Brethren Conference question the validity and scope of our present peace position.

6. The evangelical church with its message of forgiveness of sins, life and peace in the person of Jesus Christ, needs to discover channels of communication whereby it makes this message of redemption and peace known to all stratas of society in all the world.

7. While we express concern about national and international conflicts, often so little of the true spirit of Christ finds expression in interpersonal relationships, in community, home, church, and

economic affairs.

THE BASIS FOR OUR PEACE WITNESS

1. We accept God's total progressive revelation as found in the Old and New Testaments and in Christ, his exemplary life, teaching and redemptive death as basis for our peace position. Hebrews 1:1-2. The church speaks authoritatively in application

of our peace witness only when Scripture clearly speaks to the issue; when Scripture is silent, the church seeks to establish a brotherhood consensus to unite members in their interpretation but leaves room for personal interpretation and application to the individual.

2. We consider ourselves non-resistant and responsible for a peace witness because we have experienced the work of regeneration. Titus 3:3-7; I Cor. 6:6-11; I Cor. 5:17; I Peter 2:1-2; 19-24.

3. The Spirit-filled life expresses itself in love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness and temperance as stated in Galatians 5:22-23 and I Corinthians 13. Peace is not superior nor inferior to other virtues mentioned in Scripture but in conjunction with other virtues governs all our interpersonal relationships.

4. God's estimate of human life and the fact that man has an eternal immortal soul, impel us in our peace witness to spare man's life, and to seek to win from him a hearing for the Gospel

of Christ.

DECLARATION RE OUR PEACE WITNESS

1. Current Opportunities

That we, who carry the conviction for peace witness be alert to current developments within our church and our world society in which we can offer a positive Christian peace witness.

2. Obedience to Government

That we support the government in its efforts to maintain law, order and justice. Since God has placed responsibilities and powers into the hands of government which are not the direct responsibilities of the church, believers should be subject to it and pay taxes, pray for the powers that be, and live exemplary Christian lives. When the demands of the government are contrary to Scripture, the church or the individual should obey God rather than man, regardless of the consequences. The spirit of Scripture does not allow any agitation for or inciting to rebellion; and any civil disobedience is to be justified only on biblical grounds.

3. Military Services

That we, in commitment to Christ and the Scripture cannot participate in military service intended to destroy human life, but that we in gratitude offer to our country constructive, alternative service.

4. Church Speaking in Government

That we, through the officially chosen executive personnel, continue to communicate to government our position on moral issues including our peace witness. However, this does not absolve the individual citizen from expressing his Christian convictions to government.

5. Demonstrations

That we believe that the Scripture discourages participation in violent protest marches or demonstrations. We need to be tolerant to those who arrive at the personal conviction that they should participate in peaceful demonstrations as a means of witness and concern.

6. Race Relations

That we, with respect to racial relations, declare that all races are equal before God and that we need to give evidence of this conviction by love and acceptance in personal and group relationships. Where race conflicts could develop or already exist we should be willing to become involved in practical ministries which can help toward reconciliation.

7. Labour Relations

That we, stand for peaceful negotiations between labour and management in the settlement of disputes, and do not allow ourselves to become involved in any violence or threat to violence; that we, are prepared to suffer loss rather than compromise Christian principles:that we, whether employer or employee, be governed by the Spirit of Christ in an attempt to give expression to the Christian virtues listed in Galatians 5:22-23.

8. Inter-church Peace Witnessing

That we, in recognizing that our peace witness cannot be separated from our mission to evangelize, periodically assess our relationship with other denominations to whom we relate in our peace position; and that we actively seek to co-operate with evangelical churches who share our concerns on peace issues.

9. Teaching

That we, commit ourselves to teach our peace position in our schools, homes, churches and mission fields, and that we emphasize that the peace position is related to practical issues in every day life.

(b) The Declaration on Situation Ethics

We, the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches in session, profess and affirm that:

- 1. We believe that ethics and theology are inseparably linked and that this places upon us the obligation to insure that in our homes, and in our schools and in our churches, we teach and preach clearly the doctrines of Scripture which provide the basis and content of our ethical norms.
- 2. We believe that changes in the ethical expression of the Christian life should be an evidence of a position and dynamic discipleship which arises out of a growing understanding of the implications of the Gospel together with a better knowledge of the world in which we live.

This calls for an unswerving commitment to the Word of God as the final authority for the Christian life, as well as a sensitive discernment of the values inherent and operative in the world in which we live.

3. We believe that our life and involvement in a fallen world will occasionally place upon us as individuals the necessity to

chose between conflicting demands. We believe however, that we must as individuals, be ready to submit such decision to the counsel of the community of disciples given in obedience to the principles of Scripture under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

- 4. We believe that situation ethics has some emphases which are good and worthwhile. But we further believe that we cannot accept its basic theological presuppositions nor the answers which arise out of these, in our search for answers consistent with the nature of the Christian life, in the moral issues we face because situation ethics promotes:
- a) the right of the individual to assume full responsibility for decisions regarding the principles governing ethics, thereby ignoring the principles of Scripture and the counsel of fellow believers.
- b) a separation of love from law which leaves love without guidance and directive in decision-making thus abandoning the person to the influence of sentiment and sublimated selfishness.
- c) a false conception of man in that there is an overestimation of his innate capacity to love, and an under-estimation of the radicalness of his depravity.
- d) a limitation of the 'situation' to the immediate circumstances, thereby ignoring the fact that a 'situation' may be much more comprehensive and far-reaching in its influence and involvement.
- e) a faulty understanding of the total relationship between God and man, and man and his fellows in such ways as:(i) a failure to concede that every action is made before a loving God who is at the same time a God of holiness and justice and One who has revealed his will to mankind. (ii) a failure to concede that it is God who defines sin, and that although two persons may agree to a certain action, it may still be sin. (iii) a failure to recognize that every act has an eschatological significance rather than significance only for the here-and-now.
- 3. The question of Dual Conference Membership be dealt with by the acceptance of the following:
- (a) That we are not ready at this time to make a decision on the request for dual conference membership.
- (b) That we accept the invitation by the Ottawa Mennonite Church to send representatives to help in a study of the matter of dual membership.
- (c) That no provincial conference make any decision until after a study has been undertaken and presented to the Convention for action.
- (d) That this study be undertaken by the Board of Reference and Counsel during the coming interim.
- 4. The Convention be prepared to undertake a study to develop a unified procedure of ordination of ministers and deacons.
- 5. The proposed constitution as presented to the churches be accepted with some changes and additions.

Recommendation 1 — Statement Concerning attitude to MCC. The recommendation was discussed and questions asked were illuminated and clarified. The motion carried to accept this recommendation.

Recommendation 2

(b) Declaration on Situation Ethics — The motion to accept changes in phraseology were suggested. The motion to accept the declaration as a provisional guide-line carried.

(b) Declaration on Situation Ethics - The motion to accept

the declaration carried.

Recommendation 3 — Dual Membership — The motion to accept the policy laid down in the recommendation carried.

Recommendation 4 — Uniform procedure for ordination of ministers and deacons — The motion that the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns conduct this study carried.

Recommendation 5 — The motion to accept the constitution as a whole with all the amendments, was seconded and carried.

CONSTITUTION OF THE CANADIAN CONFERENCE OF MENNONITE BRETHREN CHURCHES (The first part of the Constitution is the Charter, Bill G6, passed by the Senate, 22nd November, 1945.)

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I — The Confession of Faith of the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches, hereinafter referred to as "the Conference", is the Confession of Faith of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches.

ARTICLE II - The Conference and Other MB Conferences

- Section 1 The Conference is an area Conference of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches and is subordinate to its decisions.
- Section 2 The provincial conferences are functionally united with the Canadian Conference and are subordinate to it. Each provincial Conference develops its own By-laws, it being understood that such By-laws will be in harmony with the provisions of the Constitution of the Conference.

ARTICLE III - The Conference and Its Churches

Section 1 — Any organized church desiring to become a member of the Conference must first become a member of some provincial Conference. The provincial Conference which has received it into membership then recommends its acceptance into the membership of the Canadian Conference. All the member churches of the provincial Conferences are also member churches of the Canadian Conference.

- Section 2 Each member church is autonomous in the structuring and management of its own local affairs. However, member churches accept as binding the decisions made by the Conference according to provisions of its constitution.
- Section 3 When a member church is unable to resolve an issue which is harmful to its life and witness, the Conference has the right and the duty to offer its assistance in resolving the difficulty, upon request or in consultation with the respective provincial Conference.
- Section 4 The Conference may withdraw the privilege of membership from any church which ceases to be in harmony with ideals and standards of the Conference.
- ARTICLE IV Conventions of the Conference and of the Council of Boards
 - Section 1 The Conventions of the Conference may be of two kinds:
 - a) Business Conventions at these conventions the boards of the Conference report on their work and present projections and recommendations for the future. The Conference acts on these reports and recommendations and carries out the necessary elections.
 - b) Faith and Life Conventions The Conventions are more devotional and inspirational in character. Papers are presented and discussed and resolutions are accepted concerning pertinent areas of faith and practice in the churches of the Conference.
 - Section 2 The frequency, the character, the time, the place and other details of such conventions are decided by the Conference.
 - Section 3 Council of Boards The Council (Art. V, sec. 3) shall meet regularly twice a year, at the occasion of the Board meetings (Art. V, sec. 2), or at the call of the executive to:
 - a) share concerns and present plans and proposed actions of the various boards.
 - b) act as the Conference in the interim.
- ARTICLE V Organizational Structure of the Conference
 - Section 1 Executive Officers and Executive Committee a) The Executive Officers of the Conference are:
 - 1) The Moderator
 - 2) The Assistant Moderator
 - 3) The Secretary
 - Section 2 The executive secretary is an appointed officer of the Conference who serves in a consultative and liason capacity. He is appointed by the Conference executive committee with the approval of the Conference.

Section 3 - Boards and their Committees and Commissions

- a) The Boards of the Conference are:
 - 1) Board of Christian Education
 - 2) Board of Evangelism
 - 3) Board of Higher Education
 - 4) Board of Management
 - 5) Board of Publication
 - 6) Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns
- b) Committees of the Boards Each Board may, at its discretion, appoint committees to supervise one or more sections of the Board's responsibilities. Such committees are responsible to their boards.
- c) Commissions Boards may appoint temporary committees, known as commissions, for special assignments.
- Section 4 Council of Boards The Council consists of the following:
 - a) The Executive officers of the Conference who also serve as the executive of the Council of Boards.
 - b) All the members of the Boards of the Conference.
- Section 5 Nominating Commission Each provincial Conference, one year in advance of the business Convention at which elections are to be held, elects one person to serve on a Nominating Commission. The chairman of this commission is appointed by the executive committee of the Conference from the provincial representatives.

Section 6 — Election and Term of Office

- a) each Board consists of 11 members:
 - Each provincial Conference elects its representative to each of the six boards of the Conference.
 - The other members of each Board are elected at large by the Conference at its business sessions from candidates nominated either by the Nominating Commission or from the floor.
 - Newly elected provincial representatives and members elected at large shall take office after adjournment of the Conference convention.
- b) The term of the executive officers is two years.
- c) The term of office of each Board member shall be four years. The terms of office of no more than six members of any Board shall regularly expire at any one business convention.
- d) No person may serve in the same position for more than two successive terms. In special circumstances this provision may be set aside by a 2/3 majority vote of the delegates of the convention.
- e) Vacancies occurring on any Board involving a member at large, or the Executive between conventions shall be filled, if deemed necessary, by appointment by the Council of

Boards from candidates nominated by the respective Board or Committee. When a provincial representative on a Board must be replaced, the respective province makes the appointment.

ARTICLE VI - Duties

A - Executive of the Conference

Section 1 — The Executive Officers

- a) Moderator The Moderator serves
 - 1) as chairman of all Conference Conventions
 - 2) as chairman of the Executive Committee
 - 3) as chairman of Council of Boards
 - 4) as official representative of the Conference
- b) Assistant Moderator He assists the moderator and serves in his stead when circumstances require it.
- c) Secretary the secretary serves as
 - 1) recording secretary at sessions of the Conventions of the Conference.
 - 2) recording secretary at Council of Boards sessions and also executive committee sessions.
 - 3) secretary for business arising out of the Conference Executive responsibilities.

Section 2 - The Executive Committee:

- a) Plans the business conventions in consultation with the executive of the province in which the Convention is held.
- b) Serves as consultants in the planning of the Faith and Life Conventions, and acts as executive officers of these conventions.
- c) Prepares the agenda for the sessions of the Council of Boards.
- d) Submits to the churches, all issues which require church action or vote.
- e) Supervises the work of the executive secretary.
- f) Supervises the work of the nominating commission.
- g) Represents the Council of Boards between sessions.

Section 3 — Council of Boards:

- a) The Council of Boards seeks to co-ordinate the plans and activities of the various Boards of the Conference.
- b) The Council acts as the Conference in the interim, and is subject to the Conference in its decisions.
- c) The Council arranges for the filling of any vacancies ocurring on any Board of the Conference, or on the Executive Committee during the interim, in consultation with the respective body concerned.
- Section 4 The executive secretary is responsible to the Conference executive committee.

B - The Board of Christian Education

- Section 1 The Board shall seek to initiate, promote and strengthen the program of Christian Education in the local churches of the Conference by providing counsel, offering courses, providing publicity and instructional materials, arranging and conducting regional and national conferences. The particular areas of concern are:
 - a) Sunday School
 - b) Youth Work
 - c) Vacation Bible School
 - d) Mid-week Program
 - e) worker Training Program
 - f) Music and Choirs
 - g) Camps and Clubs
 - h) Library
 - Any other educational agencies as the churches and/or the the Conference shall from time to time establish.
- Section 2 For the execution of this program the Board provides staff and office facilities, subject to the approval of the Conference.
- Section 3 The Board of Christian Education works in close co-operation with the Board of Evangelism in all areas of common concern.

C — Board of Evangelism

- Section 1 The Board shall seek to initiate, promote and strengthen the work of Evangelism in local churches, and all individual agencies of the church, by such means as seem expedient, desirable and fruitful. For the execution of this program the Board provides staff and office facilities subject to the approval of the Conference.
- Section 2 The Board is entrusted with the integration and extension of the mass communications media such as radio and television.
- Section 3 The Board supervises and promotes work of evangelism and outreach which does not fall within the jurisdiction of a provincial conference.
- Section 4 The Board of Evangelism works in close co-operation with the Board of Christian Education in all areas of common concern.

D — Board of Higher Education

- Section 1 The Board operates and promotes the Mennonite Brethren Bible College and College of Arts.
- Section 2 The Board is responsible to seek to structure and integrate, together with the boards and faculties of the Bible Institutes and Bible College, the Biblical and theological training program of the Conference.

Section 5 — The Board is charged with providing salary schedules

for Conference personnel.

Section 6 — The Board appoints a treasurer whose duty shall be to receive, hold in custody, and disburse all funds under the supervision and administration of the Board.

F - Board of Publication

Section 1 — The Board is charged with the responsibility of operating, promoting and supervising the Christian Press.

Section 2 — The Board is charged with the responsibility of

publishing Conference publications.

Section 3 — It shall be the responsibility of the Board to encourage, promote and supervise the publication of materials designed to meet specific needs of the Conference.

Section 4 — If the Conference has a book store then the Board shall maintain and operate such a Book Store.

Section 5 — The Board shall seek to distribute helpful Christian materials.

G - Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns

Section 1 — It shall be the duty of the Board to watch over the spiritual life of the Conference and its churches and to give guidance and direction in matters of Faith, Doctrine

Section 3 — The Board is responsible for initiating and supervising a Student Services Program to give spiritual assistance to students on the various university campuses in Canada. Section 4 — The Board is charged with the responsibility of

Section 4 — The Board is charged with the responsibility of arranging for and distributing assistance to students in the form of bursaries, scholarships, etc.

Section 5 — The Board is responsible for all Canadian Conference relationships to schools and colleges other than Mennonite Brethren.

E - Board of Management

Section 1 — The Board is responsible for the operation and supervision of Bethesda Home.

Section 2 — The Board is charged with the administration and supervision of all the physical assets of the Conference.

Section 3 — The Board is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Conference budget as well as for carrying out the required budget control.

Section 4 — The Board is responsible for the maintenance of

adequate Conference offices.

and the Christian Life, including the giving of leadership in the clear and forceful teaching of the Peace position within our Conference and its churches. Further, it shall be responsible for giving directives for structuring our peace witness in our country and in our constituencies.

Section 2 — The Board shall when it deems it necessary, initiate appropriate action or serve as a reference body in issues of

social concern.

Section 3 — The Board shall be responsible for providing direc-

tion in matters of church polity. It shall also establish and maintain a functioning pulpit committee to assist churches in ministerial placement.

Section 4 — The Board shall be responsible for fostering wholesome contacts in Inter-Church relations as well as for contacts

with other church-related bodies.

Section 5 — The Board shall watch over the Constitution and implement required amendments.

Section 6 — Plan Faith and Life Convention programs in consultation with the Executive officers of the Conference.

H. Nomination Commission

Section 1 — The commission shall prepare a slate of candidates for all the offices that are to be filled at the business

conventions of the Conference.

Section 2 — The commission is responsible to the executive committee of the Conference and presents its slate of candidates to the secretary of the Conference, two months before the convening of the Convention.

ARTICLE VII - Amending the Constitution

Section 1 — Notice of Amendment of the Constitution may be given at any Convention of the Conference or at any session of the Council of Boards.

Section 2 — Such notice of amendment is then to be presented to the churches of the Conference at least three clear months before the convention of the Conference at which it is to be

voted on.

Section 3 — A two-thirds majority of those present and voting shall be required to carry an amendment.

CONFERENCE PRINCIPLES AND POLITY

(To be added as appendix, but not part of Constitution)

- 1. Churches are entitled to be represented at the conventions of the Conference by one delegate for every twenty five members or portion thereof, with a minimum of two.
- 2. Voting on Issues at the Convention:
- a) Normally issues will be declared as accepted by simple majority vote (i.e. at least one more vote than ½ the total number of votes cast). The conference has the right to request a higher percentage of votes to carry an issue. The right to exercise this privilege can be determined by a simple majority vote.
- b) A vote by ballot on a specific issue must be carried out when such a vote is requested, even if only one person requests it.

In response to a question, Brother Quiring pointed out that "The Blessed Hope of the Church" is the tentative theme for the next Faith and Life Convention in Saskatchewan.

C. ELECTIONS

Brother Ewert asked the Board of Higher Education and the College faculty to take their places in the choir loft.

Brother Ewert informed the conference that Brother John Goertzen is representing us as the fraternal delegate at the Conference of Mennonites of Canada being held in Saskatoon.

The question of the Executive- Secretary was raised by the moderator. The executive had been charged with clarifying this question and had appointed a commission in this regard. The question was discussed with the Board of Reference and Counsel. The executive recommended the postponement of this appointment. It was moved to accept this recommendation (Motion carried).

Delegates rose and sang one stanza of "Ich bete an die Macht

der Liebe".

Brother H. Voth, assistant moderator, took the chair.

IV. BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION

A. REPORTS:

Brother D. H. Neumann introduced the board members, members of the faculty, and called upon the brethren John Wall, Jack Block, H. R. Baerg, and Victor Adrian to report in turn.

1. The Board of Higher Education

The Board for Higher Education has been active in three areas. For each area of activity we had a sub-committee responsible. Brother John Wall has acted as chairman on the Committee for Student Services. Brother Jack Block worked with a number of Brethren on the co-ordination of the programme of studies of the Bible Institutes and that of the MB Bible College. Brother Henry Baerg was the chairman of the College Sub-committee. The three Brethren will report to the Conference in that order.

2. STUDENT SERVICES COMMITTEE

"A campus work will never be a highly dramatic public work in the sense that it can be statistically well documented. It does not achieve its justification through mass rallies or a whirl of social and religious activities. Instead the campus becomes a place where the gospel is preached individually and personally. The target is the individual student and his problems. A campus ministry must help the student solve his personal difficulties and make him willing to share these with other Christian students or a special worker. Then he must be encouraged to share the faith with others. Essentially the campus ministry is concerned with training Christian students to engage in an active witness." (1966 Conference Yearbook p. 118).

The emphasis of this conference report of several years ago, with its insistence that a really meaningful ministry to students is possible only on an individual and personal basis, is the emphasis to which we as a committee subscribe. This has been confirmed for us by observations and evaluations which we have been able to make, as well as by the insights and suggestions those people have shared with us who are directly engaged in student work. With this understanding then we have urged the provincial conferences to elect a committee, if one was not already in existence, to assume responsibility for a ministry to students on a local area level. To date Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan

and British Columbia have done so.

The approach that has proven useful has been for the provincial committee to conduct an orientation week-end particularly designed for freshmen, just prior to the opening of the school term, and to follow this up with further weekend retreats or a series of student-oriented discussions of key issues during the winter or spring terms. The appointment of a staff person on a parttime basis with the assignment to relate to individual students on campuses, and to be available to them during the course of the year, has provided at least the beginning of a personalized pastoral and fraternal ministry in several provinces, that is designed to complement such ministries as the local church is able to offer. It is our view that these efforts need to be further augmented by a more deliberate capitalizing on the potential counseling services of Christian professors on campuses, and interested members in our local churches, who have themselves successfully integrated their university training and professional skills with their Christian commitment.

We believe that this basic approach merits a fair trial in each province. It is sufficiently flexible to permit whatever modification might be desireable to meet local situations, yet at the same time sufficiently defined to provide direction and some

degree of uniformity within the Canadian conference.

One of the areas deserving further exploration is that of facilitating greater interaction between those faculty and student members of our churches on secular campuses, and the faculty and students of our Bible College and Bible Institutes, with a view to encouraging a joint grappling for solutions to issues facing our student world today.

The annual compilation of a student directory and the periodic mailings to students are being reviewed in an effort to make them more useful. The overall promotion of Student Services within the Canadian constituency is under study with the hope of making it more effective.

The importance and urgency of a ministry to our students and a Christian witness on campuses today cannot be overstated. The Lord has given us as a Canadian Conference a tremendous treasure and potential in our student young people. We need to stand by them with the kind of pastoral care and fraternal love and understanding that grows out of a recognition not only of their

needs, but also of their mission as a valid arm of the church with a responsibility to the members of their generation in this age.

3. COLLEGE—BIBLE SCHOOL COORDINATION COMMISSION

In December 1967 a meeting of faculty and Board representatives from Bible schools and College met in Winnipeg to discuss ways and means to coordinate programs. It was generally agreed that the total educational endeavour in the MB Conference should be coordinated in its appeal to students and in its appeal for qualified teaching personnel.

At a meeting on March 2, 1968 in Hepburn, Board and faculty representatives pursued the following topics:

a. To formulate a definite pattern of courses which students in various Bible Institutes could offer toward a BRE and a BTh program at the College.

 ${\it Note}$ — A plan was hammered out and is being followed at the present time.

b. To generate some publicity which would represent the total picture of opportunities for Christian education offered in our Conference.

Note — Some 12,000 jackets to be used as church bulletins were distributed to all the churches in the MB Conference in Canada.

c. To plan for a joint meeting at Clearbrook during the summer Conference where all teaching personnel would exchange ideas about curriculum requirements.

 ${\it Note}$ — This meeting occurred in Clearbrook and we are reaping the benefit of the discussions.

A word of commendation is due Brother Adrian who gave strong leadership toward improving the cooperation between Bible schools and the College. He successfully conveyed the message that the Bible school fulfills a needed service to our churches and it undergirds the College program. A spirit of unity moved the Brethren as they discussed the various alternatives of Christian education.

In conclusion I would see the role of the Board of Higher Education as a catalyst to stimulate continuing discussion among our Brethren. Education is an extremely expensive project not only in Conference funds but also in time and effort of students, faculty and members of the Churches. Unless we plan carefully and soundly, support for Christian education will wane and the Church will suffer the consequences. The Board of Higher Education must continue to coordinate the total effort in our Conference and to develop and saintain strong liaison between the schools and Conference agencies.

4. COLLEGE SUB-COMMITTEE

As we come before the Board of Higher Education and the conference with our report on the operation of our theological training institution, we do this with joy and gratitude for God's abundant provisions. We are also thankful to the faculty and students who were involved in the program of higher education as provided by our conference. To Mr. Adrian for his untiring, optomistic and creative efforts during the past year, we are deeply indebted.

Faculty-wise, the college has been able to operate with adequate strength during the past year. However, we look forward to a year of operation in full-force with the return of Brother David Ewert. A replacement has been secured for Br. Peter Klassen who will be on sabbatical next year. The president will inform

us more fully on the matter of staffing in his report.

Nevertheless we must express concern about an area of decline, namely the area of student enrolment. Somehow, we must solicit the support of our entire constituency when it comes to the matter of student recruitment. In a day when the facilities of the institution of higher learning are over crowded and enrolment is registering a substantial increase each year, we have seen decline in the student body each year the past few years at MBBC. Should we as a constituency not feel compelled to promote our institution to young people interested in higher education? May each of us become a recruiting officer enlisting young people for Bible training.

The financial support which we have received from the constituency is only commendable. We want to express our thanks to the Churches for the offerings, which was about \$5,000.00 above what was budgeted, and to individuals for their special donations.

In the past year we have had our regular monthly meeting plus several additional sessions to look at pressing matters. One such item is the 25th anniversary celebrations of the College. We pause at this juncture to thank God for the more than 500 who have graduated from MBBC since 1947 — the first graduating class. We are certainly thankful for the hundreds, yes several 1000 others who have been to college.

As we recommend a special building project for our college to the conference during this Ebenezer year, the 25th anniversary, we trust that all of us will "have a mind to build" and that we will raise a fitting monument of thanks to our God. We can only stand to benefit from investing in our young people.

We commit the college, faculty and staff and the whole program in the interest of our young people to your prayers and whole-

hearted support.

5. PRESIDENT OF THE MENNONITE BRETHREN BIBLE COLLEGE AND COLLEGE OF ARTS

Introduction

"Be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus and what you have heard from me before many witnesses, trust to faithful men who will be able to teach others also" (II Timothy 2:1-2).

Seventeen graduates this year chose part of that text as their motto. Before they entered into their various callings, they directed their attention to that which enables for effective Christian service-the grace in Christ Jesus. Five of them have been called into the challenging and exciting pastoral ministry: two in Manitoba, two in Saskatchewan, and one in British Columbia; some will enter into work on the church frontiers in home mission fields; others will enter into more established fellowships. One graduate entered into MCC services; others will be in the teaching professions, while others will continue their studies.

These graduates of the twenty-fifth year of the existence of your college join over 500 others who have literally gone into all parts of the world and into the various strata of our society in order to serve Christ. They are characteristic of past graduates in that they consist of a number who enter into church-related ministries, while others become active Christian laymen in our society. A recent survey of the graduates of the last seven years at MBBC indicates the following:

37 in the pastoral ministry

11 under the Board of Missions and Services

15 (approx) teaching in Bible Institutes and Christian High Schools

The majority is in the teaching profession; some are nurses. Besides these there are a number of others who came for a year or two to find themselves, restore their Christian orientation, or enter into a deeper ralationship with Christ, who today serve the church as faithful members.

A. Christian Education in Our Revolutionary Age

We are all aware that Christian educational programs are severely tested in this revolutionary age. For the last few years we have been asking a number of questions; have been in touch with students, graduates, parents, university professors, Christian business men and laymen active in our society, pastors, Bible Institute teachers and other educators. We believe that our program is tested on at least two points:

Can we meet the needs of youth today in respect to their personal faith?

Can we meet the needs of Christian leadership in our churches in our day?

A The mood of today is not conducive to faith. Overwhelmed by modern man's so-called realistic view of the world and pre-occupa-

tion with self, we are inclined to see less of the lordship and love of Christ, the building of the church "against the gates of hell", and the presence and joy of the Holy Spirit. Our attention has been drawn to the world of violence, anxiety, aimlessness and disillusionment.

That mood can only be challenged by an active, adequate, personal faith in the God of Jesus Christ. The idea-world of today must be confronted by the thought-world captive to Christ (II Cor. 10). While the revolutionary age of today tests the reality of our faith, it also opens up new opportunities for a fresh expression of Christian faith in life. The sixteenth century reformation emerged in an age of widespread social, political and economic revolution. But it did not emerge without a new accent on a personal living faith-an encounter experience with Jesus Christ.

The question is, Can the Mennonite Brethren Bible College with its educational program encourage and foster such personal faith in youth of our day? We believe it can and does for these

reasons.

(1) Faith in the context of modern thought and life

Faith must be nurtured in the context of modern life and thought; it must be permitted to grapple with current issues, lest it be too much of a "hot-house" faith which wilts when faced with the strains and stresses of modern life. Our educational program at MBBC is geared for this need by combining meaningfully (integrating) Biblical knowledge with the Arts subjects. How do our two years of arts differ from those in any other university? Our arts courses do not differ in academic standards. Our students write university examinations and transfer into universities such as the Waterloo Lutheran University, University of Manitoba, or the University of Winnipeg, with which we have an excellent relationship. As a rule our students have done very well.

The major difference between our under-graduate arts program and that of other Universities is that we seek to integrate theology with the arts—to combine faith with sanctified reason. Recent studies by the Lily Foundation indicate that this integration can best be made at the under-graduate level. This is to say that a student should seek to study theological and biblical subjects concurrently with his other university subjects, in order to acquire a Christian "weltanschaung". In terms of his academic program this could mean that a student at MBBC would combine a BRE

or BTh or BCM with a BA program of studies.

I believe the last five to ten years in our denominational experience with university students across Canada has borne out the fact that unless a Christian view of life and a Christian commitment is properly integrated with other disciplines of studies a student is headed for trouble. We are grateful that we have been able to help students at College during their first few years of Arts studies. These are the most important years where the key issues of man's existence are being raised in such subjects as English and German literature, Psychology, Philosophy, Sociology and History. At the same time we do not think that a student

ought to take all his subjects with us on a small denominational campus. We are therefore not teaching the final year in the BA program, but encourage a student to take his final year on a secular university campus, where his faith may be tested and confirmed and where he has the opportunity of interaction with a large body of students. We believe this exposure is important for students who seek to serve our church. Faith must be nurtured in the context of the life and thought in other disciplines of study.

Do Bible Schools and seminary institutions put a squeeze on the Bible College program? Not really. Neither Bible Schools nor seminaries are geared for such a program. Bible schools are more concerned with a study of Biblical subjects and church-related areas. This is good and right but not completely adequate in our day. For this reason we have entered upon discussions with the faculty and boards across Canada and arrived at a formula of integration with the Bible school program to permit students to continue at college. This relationship is encouraging and must be strengthened.

During this past year I have been in many provinces in Canada and spoken to university students and Christian university professors. While I believe that a Christian student can be strengthened in his faith on a secular university campus and enjoy his interaction with fellow students and professors seeking both to articulate his faith as well as to proclaim it, the fact is that many are in an agonizing struggle to maintain their faith while others are faltering. Christian organizations such as the Inter-varsity Christian fellowship can be of tremendous help on campus, as well as the chaplaincy help which is available, on certain campuses. It would seem to me, however, that there is a need for an approach in greater depth-an approach which is available in our Christian Educational program at MBBC, where students can find the assistance of Christian teachers both in the Arts and in the Theological faculties to answer the questions raised in the studies of the humanities and the social sciences. This is a day in which we must speak out decisively for such a Christian Educational program in our Conference, in the interests of our youth and the future mission of the church.

(2) Post-graduate Theological Studies

Can the MBBC meet the needs of Christian leadship in the church in our day? Not without a post-graduate theological program. Two years ago, this Conference in Coaldale, clearly and loudly indicated that the primary task of MBBC was to train men and women for church-related ministries. This was a strong endorsement of what originally had been the reason for the establishment of our College. What does such endorsement mean?

- (1) It means that MBBC is not to be exclusively an arts college. It means that the emphasis on a theological faculty and a theological program is to be continued.
- It means that MBBC is to be more than a Bible Institute. Therefore, the emphasis on

(a) Advanced Theological and practical instruction for Christian service.

(b) The introduction of a Seminary program BD in 1962 according to the Conference decision of 1958 (MB Conference

p. 90).

- (c) The formation of a faculty with advanced theological degrees and competence to teach in a graduate theological program. Because several faculty members left us a few years ago, we have not been able to expand the program as necessary, however, more recently a faculty member has completed his doctoral program, and two others are doctoral candidates. Among the other staff members some have completed their Masters in Theology, and others are in the process of completing theirs.
- (3) In accordance with the Conference directives we plan by the fall of 1970 to have an adequate faculty to teach the last two years of a three year BD program in separate classes for those who have completed their BA studies.

The pattern we would suggest for future students who sense a call for the ministry is as follows:

- (a) For those who have senior matriculation: One year of theology together with their BA program with us and two additional years of theology after they have completed their BA degree.
- (b) For those with a BA: Three years of Theology studies for a BD program.
- (4) Is it a good policy to have a Bible College program and a post-graduate (BD) theology program on one campus?

This is a growing pattern in today's educational world, where different institutions cluster together and therefore, is a far-sighted policy. For us it has merit for the following reasons:

- (a) It prevents an ivory-tower complex in a graduate theological program by providing for constant opportunity for interaction with the college students. Faculty members also are kept in touch with the humanities and the social sciences.
- (b) The college program benefits by the lecturing of faculty members who are more or less in the Seminary program.
- (c) It is financially advantageous because both Seminary and College can share in a number of facilities: Library, Classroom, Residences, and Dining Hall.

B. Gratitude

There have been many pleasant tasks associated with the operations of the MBBC during the last few years. For the following developments we are thankful.

(1) The consolidation and unity of the faculty and staff. We have enjoyed our work and appreciated one another in our college duties. This last year Brother John Regehr entered upon his teaching ministry with us for the first time and made an excellent contribution in the practical theological department. This

coming year Brother Dave Ewert, having completed his doctoral studies at McGill, will be back on campus. Brother Victor Martens has accepted a position on the staff at the Waterloo Lutheran University. His contribution in the field of music for about eight years has been appreciated by many. We wish him well in his new teaching position. The other faculty members and the College staff will be with us as indicated in Exhibit A.

- (2) We are thankful for the development of clarity with regard to our task and goals at College. We have been able to strengthen our offerings in practical Theology and have revised our Musical Degree program to conform to the pattern of our other degrees. The new degree program is the Bachelor of Church Music. This program is more church-related than the BA with Music Options, and less performance oriented. It also has more emphasis on creative music and hymnology. (See Exhibit C)
- (3) We are grateful for the wholesome and serious student attitudes and generally good atmosphere prevailing in the student body. For example, students appropriated funds to send out student deputation groups to solicit other students for the college program for next year. We have appreciated this spirit and this activity. We have also had opportunities for free and open discussions between faculty members and the students on ethical and administrative concerns during our coffee hours. The dean of students has worked out a policy with the student council to enable students to express their interests and give help in certain aspects of College life and activity. (See Exhibit B)
- (4) We are grateful for the *improved relations with Bible Institutes* through various exchanges of views and professional discussions. Last year we had several sessions where we reviewed common course offerings and exchanged syllabi.
- (5) We are also grateful for the *improved relations we are* enjoying with the University Community. We have entered upon exploratory talks for an affiliate relationship with the University of Winnipeg. During the last two years our students have increasingly transferred to that University and have received full credit for the courses taken with us. Likewise another western university has changed its attitude to the transfer of our students into its graduate programs. We believe that remaining difficulties with a few universities should be cleared up in the near future.
- (6) We are thankful for the eager response and interest shown on the part of the laymen and ministers in the serious and responsible dialogue we had at our laymen's and ministers conference in February. We believe that College must not become aloof from the mainstream of life in our society. It must listen to the Christian layman who works in the market place, and in our political and social world so that it can become a better servant of the church. Because of the number of inquiries we are planning to publish a booklet containing the talks and the summary of the discussions of the sessions we had at that time.
 - (7) We are thankful for the Institute on World Evangelism

which we were able to hold on our campus June 16-22 in cooperation with the Council of Mission Board Secretaries and the Council of Mennonite Seminaries. Over sixty-five participants enjoyed the lecturers and discussions of the brethren Don Jacobs, Nelson Kauffman, Paul Hiebert, and Takashi Yamada.

- (8) We are grateful for the firm development of the *College* and *Alumni Bulletin* published quarterly as well as for the revised *Voice* publication which will be published quarterly. We have set as our aim a broadening of interests in the articles so as to appeal to a wider spectrum of the members of our constituency. We want to serve the pastors and laymen. We are also making a drive to expand our subscription lists by mailing a free copy as an insert in the MB Herald. We would urge all of you to get a subscription.
- (9) We are most thankful for the generous and loving financial support we received this year, particularly in response to the appeal by mail. As a result of widespread interest and concern for the ongoing ministry of College, we will have a surplus this year.
- (10) Most of all we are thankful for the presence and power of the Holy Spirit on our campus changing and directing in the lives of faculty and students to make us more fit to serve Christ in our day.

C. Concerns

We also have a number of concerns as we face the future.

(1) We have been concerned about the decline in student enrollment. Since 1963 there has been a steady decline as follows: (The numbers are the equivalent of full time students:)

63-64 - 166; 64-65 - 159; 65-66 - 153; 66-67 - 144;

67-68 — 115; 68-69 — 106.

It may be difficult to determine the reason for our decrease. Some of our potential students have been absorbed by growing Bible schools. Some of our decrease is due, I believe, to the rapid change of faculty members a few years ago; in the future we should guard against sudden changes of a number of faculty members. Some of our decrease is due, I believe, to the decline in interest in theological training. Some of the decrease is due, I believe, to a lack of clear spelling out of the aims and the objectives and program which we have at the College.

To remedy this situation we as pastors and teachers in theological institutions, and parents must rally with greater interest and support behind our Christian educational program. We must all seek to solicit the interest of students to acquire their theological and arts training with us. whether they go into future "full-time" Christian service or serve as Christian laymen in the various

needs in our society.

(2) We are concerned with the need to be more successful in communicating the merits of our program and the love of the faculty for the Lord, His Word and His Mission, to our constituency. We are also concerned to improve our selection of

musical idioms in such things as our choir performances and choir tours, so that we can communicate more meaningfully to our listeners. We are concerned that we remain sensitive to the personal needs of students who come to us, as well as to the needs for the training of Christian leadership for churches today. Conclusion

In this anniversary year, we are grateful for the courage and vision of our fathers who conceived the idea of higher Christian Education and brought this Institution to birth. We are grateful for the faithful and loyal ministry of a dedicated faculty during the course of these years, and for the large numbers of graduates and students who are today active in the Church of Jesus Christ.

We call on all of you to pray for the faculty that their lives and their teaching may inspire our youth and prepare them for a life of faith and Christian service in this day of opportunity.

For the future we envision an expanded student body responding to our program—a program which we have outlined in considerable detail above. This program deserves your enthusiastic endorsement. We also, envision closer working-relationship with Evangelicals in Canada. We have begun discussions with the Winnipeg Bible College on administrative and board levels to explore the possibilities for cooperation in the Arts and in the advanced theological program. We also anticipate closer working relationships with Fresno Seminary and have been in several discussions with their Administration and Board Chairman. On July 22, this year we have slated a meeting of some faculty members and board representatives to explore further possibilities of cooperation. The MB Bible College has organized a two-week inter-semester period in January to which a professor from Fresno Seminary has been invited to teach a regular two hour course. This is only part of broader areas of cooperation for the future.

To carry on an effective program at college we believe that two things are important. The first is that we need to restructure the College committee, so as to have other than Manitoba or Winnipeg members on it. This has in the past given the impression that Winnipeg or Manitoba runs the Bible College. It is therefore imperative that we structure the Board so as to include members from other provinces. Secondly, we ought to move ahead in a building program as set forth in Exhibit D. Both these items

will be discussed with the recommendations.

b) Curriculum

Two factors must be considered when defining the curriculum. The first is in the Bible College and is related to the need for a wholistic, rather than a fragmented, approach to Biblical studies. A study in course consolidation is being made. The second is in the College of Arts and is determined by changes being effected in the B.A. program by Waterloo Lutheran University from a restricted 16 course program to an open 15 course program. The consequential changes in the B.A. (with Music Options) program suggest that music students should rather pursue a general B.A. wich includes a major in music, and that the Bible College consider offering a Bachelor of Sacred Music degree program.

A group from the Fort Garry MB Church served with messages in song: "Praise ye the Lord of Hosts" and "I Sought Him in His Temple".

The secretary read the minutes of the afternoon session and moved their adoption.

Moved that statement on Demonstrations under the Declaration Re. our Peace Witness be accepted as changed. (Motion accepted) (156-152) The minutes were accepted with other alterations. Brother Henry Voth made several announcements. The Motion to begin tomorrow's session at 9:00 a.m. without a coffee break. Carried.

IV. BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION, continued

A. REPORTS, continued

In the discussion which followed appreciation for the work of the college was expressed, problems were aired and clarified. It was emphasized by the president that we ought to *shape our college* and be sold on its development. The question, "Are we spreading ourselves too thin?" was raised and discussed. It was emphasized that recruitment should be started early in the family. Concern was expressed regarding restrictive offerings in College courses. The president mentioned a movement towards affiliation with the University of Winnipeg for a greater variety of courses.

B. FINANCIAL REPORT

Read by Brother H. R. Baerg who moved its acceptance. Several questions were asked, clarified, and then the report was accepted.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. We recommend the appointment of Brother Peter Hamm, India to serve on the college faculty, largely in the field of missions to begin in fall 1970.
- 2. We recommend that Herb Giesbrecht, College librarian be appointed archivist for the Canadian Conference to spend a quarter of his time in this work.
- 3. We recommend that the MBCA be given the right to continue its discussions with the University of Winnipeg to complete the affiliation relationship.
- 4. We recommend that the Board of Higher Education be permitted to raise \$6,000 toward the budget per year for the next two years by personal appeal to our membership, and that church donations be \$20,000 (a sum reached each year for the last two years).
- 5. We recommend the acceptance of the budget (see Exhibit A).
- 6. Since the conference in 1965 and again in 1967 approved further planning for a building program, and since we were allowed to expand our physical plant "provided this not necessitate an increase in the conference levy", we, therefore, recommend that we proceed immediately with the building program (as outlined in Exhibit D).

An amendment that the college raise a total amount of \$73,000 before the beginning of construction was defeated. The motion that two-thirds majority of those voting in the churches be required for the approval of the Building Program carried.

Recommendation 7 — It is recommended that a member of the MB Bible College Alumni, as designated by the Alumni Association, be added as a voting member to the MB Bible College Committee as constituted by the Board of Higher Education. Such a member is to serve for a period of two years. Amendment to delete the last sentence, "Such a member is to serve for a period of 2 years." (Amendment carried).

The motion was then declared out of order.

The motion that the College teacher's salary schedules be published tomorrow, was discussed, however, a motion to adjourn carried.

Brother C. D. Toews led in closing prayer.

FOURTH SESSION — TUESDAY MORNING, JULY 8, 1969

Brother H. Voth led in the singing of "O Lord, my God, how great thou art".

Brother Ewert took the chair, announced that 400 delegates had registered, and introduced Brother Dan Friesen who opened this session with a message from the word of God. He based his message on Acts 15:10. He emphasized that the greatest need in the MB Church is the joy of the Lord. "The joy of the Lord shall be your strength". Genuine god-fearing children of God should be themselves. The Bible emphasizes an exchanged life-"Not I but Christ lives in me". The child of God will shun sin, but should not assume an unnecessary yoke. There is joy in Christian liberty. The Christian life is not to be an over-worked life, but an overflowing life. There is a yoke that we ought to take. When we are yoked with Christ the yoke is easy and the burden is light. A child of God can find rest and consolation in the truth that all things work together for good to them that love God. Faith in God and his son Jesus Christ gives his children peace, rest, and joy.

The moderator thanked Brother Friesen for the message, asked several brethren to lead in prayer, and called upon Brother and sister Cornelius Balzer to serve with a number in song.

Brother and sister Balzer sang "It was love, that sent the Saviour".

Brother Ewert read a greeting from the Evangelical Mennonite Conference.

Brother H. R. Baerg presented the budget as indicated in Recommendation 5, and moved its acceptance. The question of salaries and increments was discussed. Motion: Consider this the budget and leave any alterations to the Board of Management (Motion carried).

A number of questions were asked and clarified.

The budget was accepted.

Student Services Budget of \$800 was accepted by motion. Appreciation to faculty members to be expressed on behalf of the conference in a resolution formulated by the resolutions committee.

To the Faculty of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College: The Conference has again been impressed with the unreserved and unassuming spirit of dedication to the Lord and to the cause of our Bible College, and the concern you have for the training of our youth, and the Spiritual welfare of our churches. We want to encourage you not only with our warmest greetings but also with our continued prayer and moral support. But even with our best and united efforts we want to remember the words of Paul in I Cor. 3:6, "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase." We challenge you to continue to be the example to our Brotherhood that you have exhibited.

The 59th Annual MB Conference

V. BOARD OF MISSIONS AND SERVICES

A. REPORT

Brother Vernon Wiebe recognized the board members present, and introduced the Henry Borns, George Baiers, and A. J. Neufelds

who are going back to the mission field. He then called on

Brother Neufeld to introduce the workers present.

Brothers and sisters: Adeline Enns, Margaret Suderman, Sylvester Dirks, Ruth Klassen, Anne Wiebe, Brother Schmidt, Brother E. Dyck, Peter Loewen, Brother and Sister Balzer, A. A. Unruh, Emma Lepp, D. J. Arthur, and Alvin Voth.

The Board of Missions and Services report as read contains a general statement, a description of the financial status and a

discussion on current issues.

Introduction

When Jesus appeared to His disciples in the upper room He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. He said to them, "This is what is written, that the Messiah must suffer and be raised from death on the third day and that in His name the message about repentance and the forgiveness of sins must be preached to all nations beginning in Jerusalem. You are my witnesses of these things and I myself will send upon you what my Father has promised. But you must wait in the city until the power from above comes down upon you." (Luke 24)

The disciples did wait. After Christ's ascension they all joined together in a group to pray frequently. When they had waited according to God's time, the day of Pentecost arrived. All the believers were gathered together in one place. Suddenly there was a noise from the sky which sounded like a strong wind blowing and it filled the whole house where they were sitting. Then they saw what looked like tongues of fire spreading out and each person there was touched by a tongue. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to talk in other languages as the spirit enabled them to speak. (Acts 2) That was the power which our Lord had promised his disciples. This they used to evangelize and plant churches. The record of those missionary adventures is almost beyond belief. Every day the Lord added to their group those that were being saved.

Out of this power the church at Corinth was born. Somehow with time and the mixing of humanness the power that God had promised through his Holy Spirit was diluted. By the time that Paul wrote his second letter to the Corinthian Church he needed to give them some encouragement. He reminded them that the Gospel was to reach unbelieving minds. The light that comes from the Good News about the glory of Christ who is the exact likeness of God was to be brought to every possible human being. He reminded the Corinthians that humanness slowed down the carrying of light to darkness and that this would bring discouragement. Paul witnessed to them that supreme power belongs to God and shared with them what is so aptly our own testimony. "We are often troubled but not crushed. Sometimes in doubt, but never in despair. There are many enemies, but we are never without a friend. Though badly hurt at times, we are not destroyed. For this reason we never become discouraged." (II Corinthians 4)

This is a good word for Mennonite Brethren and their Missions/ Services program today. Nearly three years ago we reorganized our

Missions/Services program at the Corn Conference. A new beginning required that we take stock of ourselves. Some of the things that we saw in this new inventory discouraged the churches. (It is no encouragement to hear that we are in debt and that we are sending no career workers this year.)

If we take the promises of God seriously we know we are not to become discouraged when we find that we have not done as well as we should. We are to take His promise again that "we may be troubled, but not crushed, sometimes in doubt, but never in despair" and work from there. God has promised that when we love Him with our heart and mind and soul, that when we wait upon Him, that he will give us power to do his work.

I believe that He has given Mennonite Brethren more power

than they realize. We have to lift up our eyes and see it.

I am thinking about the power of personnel. Right now we have more qualified and willing Mennonite Brethren who would go than we can send. We have the power of money. The Mennonite Brethren Church around the world has never experienced the affluence that our North American Mennonite Brethren Churches now enjoy. We have the power of language. North America may be ugly, but their language is not. English is a highly desired commodity around the world, for advanced technology is couched in it and everyone wants to be associated with people who speak English. We have the power of organization. We have placed two good boards together to form Missions/Services. We enjoy a reputation of substantial missions and services work wherever we have gone. We have the power of the brotherhood. The Mennonite Brethren Conference of churches is a body of churches and believers who have intimate and immediate contact with each other. Many an organization would covet the network of fellowship and understanding that we have between churches and members.

I know that life in the Spirit and the power thereof is ethereal and mystical, but it is also practical and utilitarian. The power that we have in our willing people, our money, our language, our mission organization, and our brotherhood is, I believe, God's

practical outworking of the Pentecost promise. We work under the promises of God that His word will not return void, that His kingdom shall not fail, andth at all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our Lord. This is the task for which Mennonite Brethren have been given power and we are grateful for it.

Current Affairs

Several parts of our program have precipitated questions to which we need to address ourselves so that all may understand

how our program works.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE: The Christian Service Program was begun 1960 to offer young people the opportunity to use their technical skills to share their faith, to form fellowships, and to help people in need. The program has grown to 97 people serving in the United States and Canada, and 32 people serving in Brazil, Columbia, Congo, Mexico, Paraguay. Christian Service workers serve

for one, two, or three years. A few are selected for summer

services in Vacation Bible School and camping programs.

Christian Service workers are chosen on the basis of their personal written testimony of conversion, their membership in a church, their recommendation from three persons, including their pastor, and approval from their church council. They are not junior missionaries but are looked upon as extra-ordinary laymen who can witness, help build the local church and are willing to help people in need.

The BOMAS has given a clear mandate that this Christian Service is to pay for itself. All expenses are accounted against it except the time of the director, Dwight Wiebe, and his secretary.

Christian Service places most of its people in earning positions. These persons work as nurses, agricultural technicians, secretaries, social workers, orderlies, hospital orderlies, etc. for the going rate of remuneration. This is transmitted in full to the Christian Service budget. In turn the Christian Service workers are paid maintenance and \$10 per week for personal expenses.

During 1967-68 fiscal year, these young people cost an average of \$195.08 per person per month. Their work resulted in a net profit of \$14,773.72 in 1967-68. This money has been appropriated for Christian Service related projects such as the Gospel Light Hour

program in Nova Scotia.

Earning a profit, however, is not the first objective of the program. It only makes these people able to serve and witness. It also enables them to carry some of the service opportunities where the costs are higher than remuneration.

37 of the 129 Christian Service people come from Canada. 61 are girls. 52 are U.S. young men who are receiving selective

service credit for this service.

During the past week we have had an orientation for 46 young people who are entering service or have been in service for less than a year. The prime objective of the orientation is to help these young people become witnesses and church builders and to understand how the program works.

The program is less than 10 years old and still has growing pains. All of us who have studied it at close range are convinced that it has been much more productive than it has cost us.

MISSIONARY FURLOUGHS: This General Conference year brings many missionaries home on furlough.

The purpose of furlough is to bring physical, social, educational, and spiritual refreshing in the homeland, to renew relationships with friends, relatives and churches, for social, moral and cultural prientation of children, for the establishment of the children in a normal family, community and church life, and for deputation services in the church.

The missionary may choose furlough time according to the following schedule: 32 months on the field—four months furlough, 42 months on the field add up to six months furlough, 60 months on the field add up to 12 months furlough.

Missionaries are encouraged to live within the district or

province of their home church. Their respective district or province or home church is encouraged to furnish the missionary with housing, utilities, and transportation during furlough time.

PERSONAL FINANCING OF MISSIONARIES: Considerable interest has developed in the direct support of missionaries on the field. To provide the brotherhood with information concerning this possibility, the schedule below is offered.

Personal Gifts to Missionaries

Personal gifts of money may be sent to missionaries through our office. The full amount of the gift will be forwarded to the missionary. It is not considered a part of support and no part is withheld for handling costs. It must be understood that no "gift" to a missionary can be made an income tax deduction.

FRONTIERS IN THE FUTURE

Highest priorities:

Conservation-in-Depth - A great service has been done for our missions in saturation evangelism on a national basis. It is time that we modify and apply these principles more directly to our fields. This calls for strategy planning and execution by national

church and missionaries in each field.

We must make the same progress in understanding church planting (conservation-in-depth) that has been made in saturation evangelism. The Mennonite Brethren Church holds a high view of the local church and the brotherhood. We should take the initiative in helping missions understand how churches are formed.

Leadership — We have not given ultimate responsibility in matters of field leadership to anyone on the field. Instead we have worked through administrative committees. In this administrative pattern the chairman was responsible for his regular duties and was given the added role of coordinator-leader on the field. Because of this the chairmanship was sometimes considered an added burden and declined by able leadership.

It seems to me that we must initiate a system of field leadership that will give to the person the time and responsibility for personal utilization and national church relations. Wherever possible the field leader should be a national brother so that the, national church can become independent as soon as possible.

Financial Management - Our finance commission and our auditors have already helped us. The job description of the new treasurer must place major emphasis on a comptrollership. Our fields must know budget allotments so they can plan their work within them. We must find ways and means of spending only as much money as the Lord gives us.

As to income, we must amplify the New Testament principles of support that are available to us. The major source of our income will continue to be that which is proportionately given on the first day of the week. Beyond that we must help our

people think through bequest giving.

It is generally recognized that financial efficiency brings with it program efficiency. We are not interested in spending less money; we are committed to doing more with what we have.

Church Relations - We need new ways of introducing and interpreting missions to our constituency. Our present system of deputation usually gathers the faithful remnant of missions supporters for another missionary report.

We can develop a new style of reporting that will attract the uncommitted in our congregation. Well-developed audio-visual reports can communicate needs in an effective way. This will give our missionnaries more time for perso-to-person contact in the congregation.

Priorities

Personnel Recruitment — It seems to me that the Lord's army is a conscripted one. When the church in Acts needed workers, it reviewed the job descriptions and chose the persons who were most fit for the work at hand. Then it called them!

Our mission forces overseas must plan our strategy within the goals of our mission. From their strategy will come job descriptions. The job descriptions will be used by our local churches to call and select the persons who are needed for the work.

I think we are ready to put the name, training, and occupation of every Mennonite Brethren into a computer memory. We would use this to match qualified persons to mission work.

When the church at Jerusalem needed deacons, it *looked* around for men who could do the job who were full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom.

Purtnership with Nationals — We have begun to move on this frontier. We need yet a great deal more wisdom and courage to place the leadership of the national church into national hands. This will not mean a reduction of personnel and financial support. The church in the countries less developed will still need our help and our support.

Personnel Resources — The world and our Missions/Services program is too complex to leave its planning and execution in the hands of a few brethren. In our congregations are brethren who are skilled in economics, finance, business, agriculture, medicine, public relations, and a variety of other gifts which must be brought to bear on our planning and our work, and its leaders will be consulted more frequently concerning Missions/Services.

Finally more laymen will be encouraged to go overseas to practice their professions independently of our Missions/Services

program but alongside our young churches.

Brother Wiebe pointed out that there is a good working relationship between the Board of Missions and Services and the Board of Evangelism of the Canadian Conference. A number of questions were asked by the delegates and then answered by Brother V. Wiebe.

The chairman announced that the Offerings for the Sat. and Sunday meetings were: Sunday — \$5,425.00; Sat. Evening College Offering — \$965.00.

VI. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

A. REPORT

Brother D. E. Redekop introduced the members of the sub-committees of the Board and then read the report.

Greetings with I Corinthians 1:20-25, "So then where does that leave the wise man or the scholars or the skillful debaters of this world — God has shown that this world's wisdom is

foolishness. For God in his wisdom made it impossible for men to know him by means of their own wisdom. Instead, God decided to save those who believe, by means of the foolish message we preach. Jews want miracles for proof and Greeks look for wisdom. As for us, we proclaim Christ on the Cross, a message that is offensive to the Jews and nonsense to the Gentiles. But for those whom God has called, both Jews and Gentiles, this message is Christ, who is the power of God and the wisdom of God. For what seems to be God's foolishness is wiser than man's wisdom, and what seems to be God's weakness is stronger than men's

strength."

This has been true in the working of the individual committees as well as the entire board during the past. Our strength has not been in our own wisdom but rather in the Power of Jesus Christ. We are glad to report that we have experienced God's guidance. It is natural that during a re-organizational time such as our conference has gone through the individual boards will spend some time in assessing their own position in dividing their responsibilities amongst the various members and commissions and in setting aims and objectives and priorities. This also has been the case with the board of Christian Education. I am glad to report that I think we've had a very fine board with capable and dedicated men. We are also starting to operate more and more as a board should operate. A good example of this was the Saskatoon Christian Ed Conference. I would like you to know that the program for instance, was not made by any one or two individuals but rather by the whole board with each committee taking its responsibility for various sections of the program. This type of an arrangement is of utmost importance to us, as a brotherhood.

In the past year the board's big objective was the Saskatoon conference which was held on March 6-8. Our attendance was above expectation-around 700 registered. The program was well received. The host churches did a tremendous job inspite of a real accommodation problem. Financially it didn't cost the confer-

ence anything-in fact, we made a little money.

Spiritually I trust the Christian Education Conference was a real inspiration and help to those who attended. I do hope that part of the blessing and inspiration was felt in the local churches.

The second major item that we have been concerned with has been the publishing of our Adult Quarterly. The chairman of the Christian Ed board as well as the executive secretary and the chairman of the Sunday School Committee of the U.S. area and the Canadian area had several meetings in regards to the printing of the quarterly. As you know we presented some recommendations to you at the Mid-Year meeting in Calgary. This was followed by a survey sent to the churches both in the United States and in Canada and as a result we are coming up with new recommendations which we feel will be acceptable to most everybody.

The S.T.P. program has been well accepted in many areas of Canada and as a result we can now look forward to a great

number of trained teachers and workers as well as far more unity in our training methods. We are planning to continue this program with even greater vigour.

Plans are underway for a Canada-wide Youth Convention (Urbana-type) to take place in the fall of 1971.

A change in Canada Youth Projects has been arranged so that 50% of former total is provided in provincial, locally selected projects and 50% as formerly.

Br. W. Kornelsen is to meet with provincial youth leaders of the various provinces in the course 1969-70 with special emphasis on leadership training, programming, etc.

There is ample room for improvement in return of information requested by mail of provincial committee members and local

leaders.

The music committee has done a great job in being responsible for the programming and implementation of music workshops at the Christian Wörker's Conference in Saskatoon. They also encouraged the creative writing of texts and music for hymns and have sight read most of the hymns and anthems that were written during this past year. Some they feel are of a very high calibre. Brother Peter Klassen at the request of the committee has written a number of arrangements and compositions. This committee has also contributed towards three bursaries for music students at the MBBC. The hymn writing contest was quite encouraging.

The Mid-Week committee has been mostly concerned about the evaluating of MidWeek materials and programs. The concensus of opinion is that the boys Brigade and the Pioneer Girls can be recommended as a good program for our churches. This is with the understanding that we do not have to fully comply with matters such as the militaristic aspects which we may not be able to conscientiously accept. We note however that this program

is being used very effectively in a number of churches.

Two years ago when we received the services of a full time executive secretary, Rev. Wilmer Kornelson, there were some questions as to the responsibility and job description of an executive secretary. Was such a position warranted, was there enough work, would he be doing the work the board should be doing, etc. Now after two years I believe many of these questions have been answered. There's no question of not having enough work, it's a matter of priorities. We believe that God has given us the right man for this position. Brother Wilmer has been exceedingly busy at our office in the MB Bible Institute, and has visited a great number of churches giving help and inspiration in the S.T.P. program, the youth work and the Mid-Week besides a number of other details too numerous to mention.

In the past year we have spent some time in working out the line of responsibility between the board of Christian Education of Canada and the provincial Boards of Christian Education and the local church Christian Education boards or committees. At the Saskatoon conference we had a meeting of all the members that were there of the Canadian and Provincial Boards. At this conference we have planned a similar meeting and hope to establish a good line of communication between all these boards so that there is a minimum of duplication and so that we can utilize to the greatest advantage the talents that God has given our brotherhood. These meetings have been well accepted and we

believe will prove profitable.

As you will notice from our recommendations we have an ambitious program. The opportunities are unlimited. We believe that our brotherhood must not only perpetuate our Faith amongst our own people but that we must also go into the highways and biways and win the lost to Jesus Christ in our generation. We believe that the Board of Christian Education has a direct responsibility here and under God we want to do our part.

Report on the Adult MB Sunday School Quarterly By Wilmer Kornelson

A study by the General Conference Board of Christian Education regarding the Adult MB Sunday School Quarterly, helped the board come to the following:

1. That our churches clearly indicate a need for the Adult

Quarterly.

2. That we make an improved adult quarterly available to our churches in both the English and German language.

3. That the quarterly is to be pupil centered and to be used by the teachers in conjunction with the Scripture Press Adult Teacher's Manual.

4. That we continue fo follow the Scripture Press All Bible Knowledge approach which means that we use their text, theme aim, key verse, and outline.

5. That we have a one editor approach plus one who prepares

study discussion questions.

6. That the quarterly consist of 40 pages plus the cover page.
7. That the German quarterly be an editorial translation of the English Quarterly.

8. That the MB Publishing House for the time print the quarterly.
9. That we draw to the attention of our conference that the quarterly is not subsidized by conference levies, and pays for itself entirely.

The report was received.

B RECOMMENDATIONS

Brother Rudy Bartel read the recommendations:

1. The Christian Service Brigade and Pioneer Girls programs for the mid-week program for our boys and girls in our churches. In connection with this keep in mind:

1) that we should play down the militaristic aspect.

2) that by undertaking this program, the local church is obligating itself to a certain financial support of the organization.

3) that churches wanting to begin the program contact our Executive Secretary for further information.

that this program should be a part of the total church program and not an end in itself.

2. That V.B.S. Camping, Christian Service Brigade and Pioneer

Girls programs be used as outreach of the church.

3. That the music committee continue the hymn writing contest.

4. That the music committee again help the choir conductor in the selecting and acquiring of repertoire for choir work.

5. That the music committee suggest good music books which can be used by the Sunday School song leaders in our churches. The promotion of these books to be done through our Christian Education office by our Executive Secretary.

6. We recommend that our Churches continue to use MB Adult Quarterly materials in the light of forthcoming improved materials.

7. We recommend that we continue to promote the S.T.P.

Program in our Churches.

8. We recommend that the conference grant us permission to have a Canada Wide Youth Conference in 1971 and a Christian Education Conference in 1973.

9. Youth Week 1970 — that we recommend the observance of Youth Week in 1970 January 25 - February 1 under the M.S.A.A.

theme. "Christ and the inner Dimension".

10. Canada Youth Projects — that the total Canadian goal be reduced to \$3,000. and steps be taken to encourage the acceptance of smaller projects on local or provincial levels. The Canadian Projects Fund allocation is envisioned to be: 2 x \$500. projects in Foreign Missions. 3 bursaries of \$200. each for students at MBBC, and 3 bursaries of \$200 each for Bethel Bible School in Quebec, and 2 x \$400 projects in Missions in Canada. Total \$3,000.

A concern: In light of the weak mid-week adult programs in our churches, we express concern regarding the need for prayer

and Bible fellowship.

A motion to adopt all recommendations, and the concern, with appreciation for the work done, carried.

C. BUDGET

Brother D. E. Redekop presented the budget and moved its adoption. The budget was accepted.

Our wish for you is that you would experience God's presence and direction in a real way as you continue to serve in the particular area where God has placed you.

The Canadian MB Conference

Brother H. Voth, assistant moderator, made announcements. Brother John H. Epp invited the delegates to the noon meal. Brother J. J. Thiessen led in closing prayer.

FIFTH SESSION — TUESDAY AFTERNOON, JULY 8, 1969

Brother A. J. Neufeld led in the singing of "A Wonderful Saviour is Jesus My Lord." Brother Ernest Wiebe, fraternal delegate from the Conference of Mennonites in Canada, led in the opening prayer.

The brethren representing MCC (Canada) were called to take

their places at the front.

Mrs. Jake Suderman, Portage Ave. MB Church, sang "Lord

Lay Some Soul Upon My Heart."

The secretary read the minutes and moved their adoption. The minutes were adopted with some corrections.

VII. MENNONITE CENTRAL COMMITTEE (Canada)

A. REPORT

Brother C. J. Rempel, one of the MCC representatives of our Conference, read the report and referred briefly to the financial statement. Upon request brother J. M. Klassen summarized the main points of the brief of MCC (Canada) to the Prime Minister of Canada.

Introduction:

"Let us stop discussing the rudiments of Christianity. We ought not be laying over again the foundations of faith in God and of repentance from the deadness of our former ways by instruction about cleansing rites and the laying-on-of-hands, about the resurrection of the dead and eternal judgment. Instead, let us advance toward maturity; and so we shall, if God permits." Hebrews 6:1-2 (NEB).

The writer's emphasis on maturity is consistent with the Apostle Paul's encouragement to "press toward the goal" (Phil. 3:14), to "be rooted in him" (Col. 2:7), and "with deep roots

and firm foundation (may you) be strong to grasp, with all God's people, what is the breadth and length and height and deptth of the love of Christ, and to know it, though it is beyond know-

ledge." (Eph. 3:17b-19a).

It does not require a great deal of maturity to engage in a cooperative effort, if the action is in areas of work where there is complete unanimity of viewpoints and where, through constant repetition the customary patterns have become established. The text of love and maturity comes at the point where there is diversity of viewpoint and where there are no well-travvelled familiar routes. Yet individual Christians and groups of Christians cannot mature if they remain in the sheltered calms of life, but they must enter the arena of real life situations and apply to them God's principles, as revealed through His Word and by His

Son and our Lord, Jesus.

MCC (Canada), approaching its sixth birthday, can report that there is unanimity of viewpoint and solidarity of support for a very large portion of its work. There are also some concerns and tensions in areas of work which, to some people, appear to be deviations from the central purpose and mandate of MCC(Canada), but which in actual fact have been principles approved and applied by the larger Mennonite Central Committee for over two decades and which MCC (Canada) has been trying to adapt and apply to the Canadian situation. The world is not static and Christians must have the maturity that makes them flexible enough to seek new ways of applying timeless, God-given principles to new situations. MCC (Canada) needs and values the contribution and participation of each of its member groups. Through this cooperation work experienced, groups are discovering that they have much in common.

The twenty-five members that represent twelve conference groups and five provincial MCC's work together in love and harmony. Diversity of opinions become the points at which mutual admonition and growth can occur. As your representatives, we have tried to reflect our constituency's viewpoint and emphasis. It is understandable that the product of the committee's interactions should be more than simply the sum of its parts. We believe that God has used MCC (Canada) even in its short history and that we

may expect greater things in the years ahead.

Let us support this united work with our prayers, gifts and

ideas.

This report seeks to summarize the 1968 program and the approved projections for 1969. Much of this report is for information only but, time permitting, questions and concerns are welcomed on any aspect of the work. If the conference wishes to give any directives, it should feel free to do so. (To conserve time and space, the report is given in abbreviated point form. Additional information is available upon request.)

CANADIAN PROGRAM IN 1968

1. The self-study committee to evaluate the five-year-old MCC (Canada) came to the conclusion that essentially the status quo was advised by the majority of people who responded to the questionaire.

- 2. 145 pastors and 388 lay delegates of 6 constituent conferences in Canada completed the Peace and Social Concerns Study questionnaire. Among other observations, the results indicate that a large percentage of those who completed the questionnaire agreed that the non-resistant peace position is an integral part of the Gospel. As could be expected, not all agree on how this belief should be worked out in practice. It is interesting to note that there is as much diversity of opinion within conferences as between conferences.
- 3. A study on responsibility in immigration has been done by Frank H. Epp and is now published in book form with the title, *Your Neighbor as Yourself*.
- 4. The Middle East Special Project brought in \$32,028, about \$3,000 short of the goal for Canada. The Biafra appeal brought in \$32,270.
- 5. The Self Help program brought in over \$42,000.
- 6. Cash contributions in 1968 were \$482,239. Total cash income was \$708,686.02.
- 7. 50 persons served in voluntary service projects in Canada in the provinces of Newfoundland, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and British Columbia.
- 8. 45 persons served in summer service projects in Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta.
- 9. \$526,817 in cash was sent to MCC in support of the international program.
- 10. \$7,204 worth of medical equipment and supplies have been sent to North Vietnam.

APPROVED PROJECTIONS FOR 1969

- 1. That the Executive Committee be authorized to designate a "special project" for 1969 in accordance with emergency need during the year. (Nigerian/Biafra has been designated as the special project).
- 2. That in line with the revised structure of the MCC Peace Section:
- a) a member be appointed to the Peace Section from MCC Canada) who regularly reports to the MCC (Canada) Executive Committee.
- b) the MCC (Canada) Peace and Service Secretary look to the Peace Section appointees and the provincial MCC peace committee chairmen as a counselling body, with program approval given by MCC (Canada) Executive Committee.
- c) that a task force be appointed for any special study in relation to questions on Peace and Social Concerns on the Canadian scene.
- d) the MCC (Canada) Executive Committee assume responsibility for representation at the Annual Assembly of the Peace Section.

The representation of MCC (Canada) on the MCC Peace Section is in addition to the denominational representatives from each

participating conference.

3. That MCC (Canada) invite jointly with the Baptist World Alliance several brethren of the All Union Council of Evangelical Christian Baptists of the USSR to visit Baptists and Mennonites

in Canada in May 1969.

4. That recommendations contained in the final chapter of *Your Neighbor as Yourself*, be given attention as feasible, and with continuous review of priorities relative to internal Canadian need (i.e. the poor, untrained peoples), under the guidance of the Executive Committee immediately following the return of J. M. Klassen to the office in July 1969.

5. That MCC (Canada) contact its constituency and seek a mandate to publish an MCC (Canada) information media requesting that preferences be stated for one or more of the following formats:

a) inserts in several existing publications in Canada.

b) a monthly MCC (Canada) publication to be circulated separately.

c)an inter-Mennonite paper with news and views.

d) any other suggestions. (See attached details)

- 6. Adopted a budget which anticipates an income of \$1,178,100 of which \$778,100 is expected in cash and \$400,000 in material aid-in-kind.
- 7. Authorized the Executive Committee to prepare a brief to be presented to the Prime Minister by a delegation to Ottawa.

8. The MCC(Canada) offices moved from their present location in the Paris Building to 210-1483 Pembina Highway.

9. There is some concern about the decrease in Canadian volunteers

for the international MCC program.

10. Information regarding Canadian Indians is being made available

to constituent churches.

It was moved and seconded that the conference go on record as favouring the deleting of the point on the recognition of mainland China, as included in the letter to the Prime Minister. A motion

to table the motion on the recognition of mainland China, carried. A final motion to refer this brief to the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns for further study, carried.

Brother C. J. Rempel presented the proposals for a MCC (Canada) sponsored publication.

MCC (CANADA) SPONSORED PUBLICATION

MCC (Canada) has the formidable task of giving heed to several voices which frequently attempt to pull two or three ways simultaneously. All of these voices claim their views stem from their relationship to and knowledge of Christ. Upon closer examination, one often discovers that these voices know little about MCC's actual work and sometimes less about other conferences, both of whom are targets of their criticisms.

These observations seem to indicate a need for more complete information about MCC and information about sister conferences.

There are an estimated 30,000 households which make up MCC (Canada)'s entire constituency. This indicates something of the potential readership of a possible communications media.

At its annual meeting on January 10-11, 1969, MCC (Canada) took action to contact its constituency and seek a mandate to publish an MCC (Canada) communications media requesting that preferences be stated for one or more of the following formats:

a) Inserts in several existing publications in Canada.

This would require the permission of existing publications to be thus used and would cover the homes of those who now subscribe. Content would be primarily limited to information about MCC programs.

b) A monthly MCC(Canada) publication to be circulated separately.

This would be limited to information about MCC, and would have the possibility of reaching all constituent homes.

c) An Inter-Mennonite periodical with news and views.

This would carry information about MCC and about any and all constituent conferences in addition to carrying opinion articles. This, too, would have the possibility of reaching all constituent homes.

d) Any other suggestions.

Note: Both b) and c) would lend themselves to advertising revenue to cover a portion of the cost. Alternative a) would need to be negotiated with conference publications.

MCC (Canada) constituent groups are asked to consider these (or other) opinions and to express themselves indicating their preference, if any. Responses should be communicated to MCC (Canada) via the elected representatives.

Brother J. A. Toews moved that we accept suggestion a), as that favoured by the MCC representatives of our confnerece. A discussion of the motion followed (Motion carried).

VIII. BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS

Brother D. Durksen introduced the members of the Board, read the report, and moved its adoption.

A. REPORT

Dear Brethren:

In Matthew 4:4 we read: "But he answered and said, 'It is written: Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God'." Here Christ confirms the importance of the written word in spreading the message of His love toward mankind. As Board of Publications, it is our concern that we do this as effectively ad responsibly as possible. How effective we have been is something with which there is some disagreement within the constituency. We have done our best and God alone can really judge in this area. That we have tried to act responsibly is reflected in the financial statement.

The bookstore had a small deficit this year. Projecting the trend of the last three years and taking into account a greater amount of promotional effort which is being planned for next year, we should be able to report a balanced budget next time. Promotion and distribution of Scripture Press and Gospel Light Sunday School and VBS material constitutes an important part of bookstore function. Early last winter it became evident that a reprinting of the "Gesangbuch" was warranted. The first printing was sold out and a second printing was necessary. A total of 2,250 books were printed; about 500 are in stock at present. The "dead" stock of German books has been reduced to a manageable amount.

The printing department, in spite of a reduction in staff, has been able to show an increase in business and a favorable balance. Equipment problems have been resolved for the immediate future. Last December, we reduced our printing department by selling the Ukrainian linotype to Popular Printers. Our operator left as well, but we are still doing some of their press work. Perodic checks confirm the fact that the printing department is saving the Conference considerable costs in the printing of our periodicals, compared to what it would cost if done on a custom basis. We now have a department with highly specialized staff and machinery. But it can function effectively only with good supervision. It is appropriate that we recognize the contribution of Brother Don Kornelsen in this regard. Without his dedication and

willingness to spend many long hours of extra time in the various aspects of the business, our report would undoubtedly not have been as favorable.

The Mennonitische Rundschau is continuing to fill a definite need for our German speaking readers. Brother Eric Ratzlaff has now worked for two years as Editor. We appreciate his enthusiasm and dedication to his work. We feel that God has given us the right man as Editor of the MR. This year we had 122 applications to obtain the MR as their free Conference paper. Brother Ratzlaff reports to the Conference as follows:

"Mennonitische Rundschau," Editor's Report

Two years ago the Board of Publications of this Conference entrusted me with the responsibility of Editor of the "Mennonitische Rundschau". It will be obvious that a new editor should have new ideas as to how to form the paper he has taken over. This was also true in my case. After assuming responsibility for the paper, I asked the Executive of the Board of Publications to appoint an Editorial Committee which was to give me direction in my work. The Committee has given me sound advice, for which I am grateful.

Inspite of the change at the wheel of the "Mennonitische Rundschau," we succeeded to keep the paper on an even course. The increase in the annual subscription from \$4.00 to \$5.00 was necessary due to a postal rate increase. This caused the cancelation of some subscriptions, but the majority of our readers have remained faithful.

One of the tasks of the "Mennoitische Rundschau" is to form a connecting link between the Brotherhood in North and South, in East and West. This is only possible through continuous support for the subscriptions to our brethren in the South.

Last fall we conducted a survey. Well above 50 percent of the readers questioned, answered the survey. The results have made it possible to form a paper, in which the readers are offered what they need for their intellectual and spiritual life. Certain changes have as a result of the survey already been implemented and others are being prepared.

It gives me a great pleasure to express my satisfaction with the spirit of genuine cooperation between the different branches of the "Christian Press." To the editor of the "Mennonite Brethren Herald," Br. Harold Jantz, I am indebted for his vigorous driving force which has given me some inspiration in my own work. Our manager, Br. Don Kornelsen, the office staff, the book store personnel, and the workers in the print shop have all done their best, to make the last year a success in every way. something we are deeply grateful for.
Publication is a way of communication. Our words will be

meaningless though, if they are not expressing the power of the Holy Spirit which dwells in us through our living faith in our

Lord and Master, Jesus Christ.

Erich L. Ratzlaff, Editor You will have noticed considerable changes in the Mennonite Brethren Herald this past year. The Conference last year agreed to reduce the publication of the MBH to bi-weekly. The Editor of the MBH, Brother Harold Jantz, responded to the challenge by making some major changes in the format of the Herald. We believe that the readers have appreciated and responded to a more attractive and highly interesting paper. We have received numerous expressions of approval. We have also received official expressions of concern at the number of "controversial" articles being printed. It is the sincere desire of the Board, the Editorial Committee and the Editor that the MBH should be a positive force in building the readers spiritually and in uniting the membership. Brother Jantz would like to outline in detail some of his plans and ideas for the future. Since we do not have the time at this Conference, we can give you only a brief resume of what he would like to say to you:

From Menonite Brethren Herald Editor:

One of the satisfactions during this past year has been the growth of our circulation among persons like Smith, Stanton, Sopher, Ladoucer and Phippen. You may be aware that our total Canadian membership grew by about 1.5 percent during the past Conference year. We are happy that our circulation grew by 3 percent in that same period and that almost one-third of that growth was among families who do not carry traditionally sounding "Mennonite" names. That delights us.

Having said that, we would like to encourage you to do what a number of churches have already begun—sponsor subscriptions for families with whom you would like to maintain contact as a church. Recently a Sunday school sponsored four such subscriptions. In another case a church paid for 11 subscriptions for non-members. The conference treasury of one province paid for a half dozen subscriptions recently. For only \$50 you can buy ten such one-year subscriptions. We think it would be a good investment.

Have you ever stopped to analyze how many of the Christian publications you receive originate in Canada? You may be surprised that beside the *Herald*, none of them do. There are in fact very few evangelical publications printed in this country, and still fewer that are aimed at a broad cross-section of the Protestant community. I think this ought to concern us.

We need a sturdy evangelical press in this country—both denominationally slanted and that which reaches across to all evangelical bodies. I am well aware that there are a number of our members who question the wisdom of spending a substantial sum of money each year on a Mennonite Brethren paper. Let's not consider it a luxury that we could as well do without. The Herald reaches a high percentage of Mennonite Brethren homes and informs us regularly of life throughout the brotherhood, of the work of our missionaries, of the efforts of our schools, of the witness of individual churches, and of the issues that we face. Through its many fine articles, it deepens our understanding of the Word. Without it the contact of many of our members with the brother-

hood would be virtually ruptured. It's a vehicle that we cannot do without.

Therefore, I would like to encourage you to think of it as your paper doing a job for you and your church. I would like to encourage every pastor to see that every member entitled to a subscription gets one. And I would like to encourage individuals, Sunday school classes and churches to sponsor gift subscriptions for others. Let us help you talk with your friends and neighbours.

Harold Jantz, Editor Both editors have cooperated in budget control throughout the year. Postal costs will increase from \$3,400 in 1968 to an estimated \$10,950 next year. You will note that our final costs for the periodicals was just below what we had budgeted for. We hope we can do this again in the coming year.

C. MEMORANDUM TO CONFERENCE DELEGATES CON-CERNING ALTERNATIVE DISPOSITIONS OF CHRISTIAN PRESS BOOKSTORE.

The continued operation of the Christian Press bookstore in its present form has been brought into question at the just concluded meetings of the Council of Boards. Concerns have been expressed about the real value of this bookstore to the Conference as a whole; about the failure of the store to show an operating profit; and about the priorities for conference office space requirements.

The Board of Publications has accordingly examined the matter again in the last few days. We now ask the conference to choose from the available alternatives the one it finds most acceptable. This memorandum is circulated among the delegates so that they may acquaint themselves with the alternatives. We also outline the principle advantages and disadvantages of each course to put before you some of the considerations. These should not be regarded as either exhaustive or necessarily of equal validity.

The alternatives are as follows:

- 1. Maintain the operation of the bookstore in its present form. Advantages
- a) This permits us to provide at least the present level of service in this area to the Conference. All other alternatives would provide decreased service.
- b) Much effort has been spent integrating the present operation into the over-all operating unit of the Christian Press. Alterations or discontinuance would affect the existing unit not only in bookstore but in printing.

c) This bookstore is the only one in Canada to carry a

significant supply of Christian German language material.

d) A survey carried out by a commission under authroity of the Board of Publications within the last year indicated a significant number of people favouring retention of the bookstore.

Disadvantages

a) The present bookstore has experienced an operating loss in four of the last five years.

b) German Christian bookstore operation experience indicates that a maximum profit of only 1 - 2 percent can be anticipated.

c) The store has only one location and hence necessarily provides reduced service outside the metropolitan Winnipeg area.

d) The store requires space which could be utilized for other

Conference purposes. e.g. Conference offices.

e) Bookstore inventory ties up Conference capital.

2. Reduce Scope of Operation of Bookstore in Same Location. This envisages moving the store downstairs in the Christian Press building to occupy space which can be made available to the printing department. Inventory would have to be considerably reduced and only highest demand stocks carried. The entire present bookstore area of the building would than be available for other use.

Advantages

a) Less tie-up of Conference capital for inventory.

b, Possibility of improved financial performance. c) A less drastic shift of direction than other alternatives.

d) Would continue to provide service in respect of Sunday school material, VBS material, STP Program, Board of Evangelism material, as well as supporting literature for such programs.

e) Would continue to provide bookstore service to those areas

with no other Christian bookstore access.

f) Would provide space for establishment of Conference

g) Could continue to provide service in respect of Christian German material.

Disadvantages

a) Service below present level in terms of variety of material

available.

- b) Would still require disposition of a substantial amount of inventory. The more rapid disposition of a substantial amount of inventory.
- c) A fair amount of inventory would still be required with attendant capital requirement.

d) Less space for printing department.

e) Renovation costs.

3. Disposing of present bookstore entirely and carrying only a mail order business for Sunday School, VBS, STP materials.

Advantages

a) Would require sharply reduced inventory.

- b) Would still provide some Christian Educational service in the Conference.
 - c) Would free existing space for other use.

d) Would minimize maximum potential losses on operations. Disadvantages

a) Would provide very little useful service to the Conference that could not be obtained elsewhere.

b) Would require a supplementary literature service that

would also cost money.

c) Would require disposition of all existing inventory. Losses of at least 50 cents on the dollar should be anticipated. These would probably be higher.

d) Would result in larger disruption of an existing interrelated functioning unit at Christian Press along with some demoral-

izing effect on staff to be anticipated.

e) Since mark-up is about the same, we need not necessarily expect any significant profit.

4. Complete Disposition of Bookstore Operation.

Advantages

a) Some capital would be freed for other purposes.

- b) Space for other Conference purposes would become available.
 - c) Possible reduction of operating losses.

d) Reduced administration.

Disadvantages

- a) No literature service to Conference unless supplied by other boards in which case they also involve costs.
- b) We lose the effect that active literature promotion can have.
 - c) Loss on inventory disposition.
- d) Cut off supply to those areas not having access to Christian bookstore.
 - e) Loss of monies for payment of existing debts.
- f) Loss of mission with Mennonite churches not in our Conference.

Submitted on behalf of Board of Publications, Walter Kehler

It was moved and seconded to accept alternative 3. The Board of Management strongly favours alternative 2. The Board of Publication sees 1 and 2 as reasonable alternatives. A lengthy discussion followed. The motion to accept alternative 3 was defeated. It was moved to accept alternative 1. (Motion carried)

D. RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. We recommend that a Conference grant of \$48,000.00 be approved to defray the publishing and distribution costs of the MB Herald for the 1969-70 fiscal year. Accepted, after discussion.

2. We recommend that the Conference approve a subsidy of \$35,700.00 to cover the anticipated deficit of publishing and distributing the *Mennonitische Rundschau* for the 1969-70 fiscal year. (This amount consists of \$17,700.00 Conference Grant, \$10,000.00

purchase price for about 2,000 "free" subscriptions and about \$8,000.00 subsidy for South America copies.) Accepted.

3. We recommend that \$3,000.00 be allowed on the budget for

literature publication and distribution. Accepted.

IX. SEMINARY QUESTION

Brother Ewert asked Brother Voth to read the resolutions presented by the moderator of the General Conference, F. C. Peters, at the 1968 convention:

"We recommend to both the United States and Canadian Area Conferences that we initiate plans at the 1969 General Conference Session to establish a unified seminary in the Vancouver area."

The findings of the commission appointed to study the question were discussed at the Council of Boards meeting in January.

A motion was made to accept the recommendation. The result

of the ballot vote was, Yes — 61, No — 283, defeated.

After several announcements the delegates adjourned for the evening meal. Brother D. J. Pankratz brought the afternoon session to a close with prayer.

SIXTH SESSION — TUESDAY EVENING, JULY 8, 1969

Brother Bill Baerg led in the singing of, "I've Learned to Sing a Glad New Song". Brother Ben Dyck led in the opening prayer.

Brother Ewert explained that the resolutions from the various provincial conferences had been directed to the various boards for action.

The secretary read the minutes. They were accepted without correction.

G. BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Brother H. J. Block introduced the members of the board, and called on the brethren J. V. Friesen and J. E. Janzen for their reports.

REPORTS:

A. CONFERENCE OFFICES

The question of studying the feasibility of an official conference office was delegated to the board in 1967. Brother J. V. Friesen reported on the need for establishing a joint office in order to unify the conference and to help increase administrative efficiency. The board would now like direction as to where this office is to be established.

The report was accepted, however, the recommendation to act on this report was tabled indefinitely. Motion carried.

B. BETHESDA HOME

In the absence of brother C. J. Rempel, this report was read by brother J. E. Janzen.

At the meeting of the Canadian Council of Boards in Clearbrook, B.C., July 5, 6, 1968 a recommendation regarding Bethesda was accepted and reads as follows:

"Whereas the Association of Mentally Retarded and the Ontario Government representatives of the Dept. of Health-Mental Retardation Branch—have urged Bethsda to expand its facilities for Mentally Retarded and Whereas the Board of Management recognizes the Bethesda

project as a witness and service to humanity,

We move that the Bethesda Committee be charged with the responsibility of preparing a feasibility study of such an expansion project including possible self liquidating financing, size and cost of building, staffing and other pertinent details as many be necessary. The results and projection of their study to be presented to the Board of Management in January, 1969."

This feasibility study was made and a plan proposed at the meeting of the Board of Management on January 17 and 18, 1969 at Calgary. The tentative plan of an expansion program was

considered in specific phases, as follows:

Phase 1 A residential unit of 48 beds in units of 12 single and double room occupancy, each unit to have its' own living

room, dining area and kitchen.

Phase 2 Renovation to main building to allow for changes. Phase 3 An additional unit of 48 beds. The three phases to cost approximately \$1,160,000.00. Two-thirds of this amount would be financed by the government and one-third to be financed by involvement of the Associations and contributions from our Conference. It was thus decided to recommend that the Association be asked to raise \$287,000.00 and the conference share in the contribution by way of \$100,000.00.

In accordance with the recommendation, an outline of the method for financing of the \$100,000.00 was prepared. The money will have to be borrowed and repayment may be expected over a possible ten year period. The funds can be realized from operating

profits, depreciation funds and farm profits.

With these facts in mind, the following resolution was prepared by the Board of Management for consideration and acceptance by the Canadian Conference.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING BETHESDA HOME

1. That we plan for a building project, based on a proposed out-lay of approximately \$1,160,000 of which the Ontario government will pay two-thirds by way of capital grants and the balance

of \$386,700 to be raised as follows:

That the Associations for the Mentally Retarded of the Niagara Peninsula, Ontario, be asked to contribute \$286,700 and our Conference \$100,000 with our portion to be paid over a period of ten years from funds received for depreciation, interest on investment and farm profits.

2. That we ask the Conference to contribute toward the maintenance of western patients on the same percentage basis

as formerly, which is 39 percent of the total cost.

3. That we co-operate with the Associations and invite one of their members to attend our board meetings at specific times during the year to act in an advisory capacity to us and at the same time keep the Associations informed.

4. The Building Program would develop as follows:

a) To receive the Government's approval of the building project and commitment for a grant.

- b) To receive assurance of active financial support by the Associations for the Mentally Retarded of the Niagara Peninsula of Ontario.
- c) Final plans to be brought to Council of Boards for approval.

All the recommendations were accepted after some discussion. The term "invite" was noted in 3.

The statement was read by brother J. J. Riediger.

A 5 percent increase is to be added to salaries for the year 1970-71, in order to give the board time to study the matter of salaries, group insurance, and pension plans for conference workers, and pastors. The study report is to be presented to the Council of Boards in 1970-71 for further action. Accepted.

G. FINANCIAL STATEMENT AND REPORTS

This comprehensive statement with the descriptive reports was received after being briefly presented by brother J.J. Riediger.

H. BUDGET

Brother J. J. Riediger also presented the final budget figures. It was moved, seconded and accepted. Special notice was taken of the minimal increases in the levy of \$1.00 per year for the next two years,


