## MINUTES

A record of the 62nd convention of the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches as held at Three Hills, Alberta, from Saturday morning, July 7 until Tuesday evening, July 10, 1973.

### PART I - BUSINESS SESSIONS

First Session - Sunday Evening, July 8, 1973.

The first business session began at approximately 8:15 on Sunday evening following a worship service which consisted of the Conference message by F. C. Peters, from Ontario, and a Communion Service.

There was an expression of regret from the floor that only two of the seven new churches had found it desirable to include the words "Mennonite Brethren" in their title.

## II BOARD OF SPIRITUAL AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

### A. Report - F. C. Peters

In writing about "our common salvation" Jude admonishes his readers "to contend earnestly for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints."

The Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns has been charged by the Canadian brotherhood to give guidance in doctrine, ethics, and in matters relating to Mennonite Brethren polity for the Canadian Area of the Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches.

Your Board has met twice in the interim and this report reviews what was done.

### I. Questions Submitted to the Board

1. One question submitted by a congregation inquired about the practice of transferring non-immersed members from one congregation to another. The question has now been clarified by the General Conference 1972 Yearbook (p. 15):

"The Board of Reference and Counsel, encouraged by regional conferences, churches and concerned individuals, studied once again, the question of acceptance into membership of non-immersed believers and their transfer to churches within the brotherhood. As a Board we recommend to our brotherhood:

a) We re-affirm that the M.B. Church practice only one form of baptism and that this be immersion (as stated in our confession of faith).

b) Also, that we encourage those who apply for membership in our churches and who were baptized upon confession of faith

by some other mode, to consider baptism by immersion.

c) However, in view of the generally favorable acceptance of the practice initiated at the 1963 convention we as a Board recommend to our brotherhood that non-immersed members who have been accepted into the fellowship of local churches be allowed to transfer to other M.B. churches, by letter."

2. A further question concerning "Underground Evangelism" was discussed and the Chairman of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns was asked to publish a letter of clarification in the M.B. Herald.

We advised our congregations to support our Russian Gospel Light work and referred them to "Licht im Osten" in Germany. The Board felt that there was sufficient evidence to question the work of both "Underground Evangelism" and Pastor Wurmbrand.

3. A question was raised whether articles published in the M.B. Herald should be in agreement with the doctrinal view of the Conference.

The Board felt that the Herald is a teaching instrument of the Conference but that does not exclude the possibility of meaningful dialogue in matters where there is perhaps no clear position in the Church. It should not be necessary to have to add comments to what is published since we must assume that readers will accept these articles and letters as personal views only. However, official positions of the Church or a Board should be identified as such.

This does not mean that the Board is not concerned about what is published in the Herald. To the contrary, we are very concerned and would counsel our Board of Publications and the Editor to continue to exercise judgment and care concerning what is being published. We believe that a Conference publication has a very important role to play in the teaching ministry of our Conference.

#### 4. Cancellation of loans for Canadian brethren studying at Fresno

When U.S. Seminary students at Fresno who have borrowed money from the Seminary loan fund enter the ministry in the U.S.A., their indebtedness is cancelled. This did not hold true for Canadian seminarians who studied at Fresno and returned to Canada for a ministry in our churches.

The Board recommended to the Council of Boards that \$500. be paid of the debt incurred at Fresno by any Canadian seminarian presently serving a church in Canada.

#### 5. Membership in the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada

The Board of Social and Spiritual Concerns has investigated the relationship of the Canadian Conference of M.B. Churches to the E.F.C. and recommends that we join this body as a Conference. The cost for the Conference would be 10 cents per member.

## II Discussion Papers

The Board has reviewed a number of papers which were prepared by various brethren of our brotherhood.

#### 1. Our Mennonite Brethren Identity by J. A. Toews

This paper was published in our Mennonite Brethren Herald. The Board felt that it was time that we clarify our relationship to our tradition in the light of our understanding of the New Testament. A resolution will follow.

#### 2. The Charismatic Movement - David Ewert

The Board reviewed the paper which Brother Ewert presented to the

Denver Study Conference. The paper has been published in the Herald.

The Board expressed the hope that more pulpit presentations on this topic would be undertaken to clarify the confusion in our brotherhood which often results from conflicting views in the larger Christian community.

3. The Multiple Ministry - Henry Harder

The brethren of the Board were concerned that we continue in our understanding of a New Testament pattern of ministry for our Church. While we acknowledge the need and the biblical basis for special leadership in the church and also the necessity of support for such leadership, the Board would encourage the congregations to identify the various gifts which God has given to the Church and to make room for them in the ministries of the Church.

4. Discipline in the Church - John Regehr

Concern was expressed about the apparent erosion of New Testament discipline in the Church. In his paper Brother Regehr examined the New Testament position on this subject. A resolution follows.

5. The Ministry of our Sisters in the Church and Conferences - F. C. Peters

This paper was prepared for discussion in the Board and it was approved in principle. The Board agreed that this topic should be placed on the agenda for the next Canadian Area Study Conference.

III General Concerns

A number of general concerns were discussed by the Board.

The Occult Today - Brother Henry Harder was asked to write an article for the Herald.

The Crisis in our Homes - Concern was expressed regarding appropriate material for the family altar.

Associate Membership - What place do such believers have in the fellowship of the local church who have been baptized as infants?

Ordination Procedures - Should there be a common procedure for examining and commissioning candidates for the ministry?

IV The Pulpit Committee

Brother Epp reports that in the past two years 21 churches have requested assistance in obtaining candidates for a vacancy in the pulpit. The function of the Board in this area is to collect names of brethren who would consider a call and forward these names to the churches who inquire.

V M.B. Historical Commission

This Commission of the General Conference will give a brief report to the Convention after which the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns will present a recommendation.

1. Report Concerning the Foundation of the Historical Commission of the General Conference - J. B. Toews

Brother Toews gave a short informational report, outlining the rationale for the founding of this commission. The commission represents a co-ordinated effort to gather historical information about our Conference and to make this material available to students of Mennonite history. He expresses the regret that much valuable material has already been lost.

Brother Toews further conveyed the greetings from the M.B. Churches of Europe to our Conference.

Recommendation from the Historical Commission of the General Conf.

The Historical Commission of the General Conference, in seeking to carry out decisions made by the conference in its 1972 sessions, is requesting the support of the brotherhood. Only as the various regional conferences and local churches work together can we unitedly use our historical heritage for the greater glory of God. If we believe that the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and of the New Testament Church, also worked in our brotherhood, then the study of our past becomes a means whereby we see our God acting in history. As we develop a greater historical consciousness, we will see more fully how, in the providence of God, the story of our brotherhood is part of the story of the people of God.

The Canadian Conference has long recognized the need for taking action to preserve the records of our history. In 1943, the conference accepted a recommendation presented by Dr. A. H. Unruh in which he proposed that collectors of historical materials should be appointed in each "Kreis." Unfortunately, Brother Unruh's vision was not fully captured by the brotherhood. But once again, only a few years ago, the Canadian Conference gave leadership to our entire brotherhood when an archivist was appointed and partially salaried by the conference.

Now, the General Conference has taken action to encourage and regularize the collection, preservation and study of materials relating to our heritage. Brother J. B. Toews has accepted the invitation of the Historical Commission to give leadership in the development of this historical vision. He will visit conferences and churches as he seeks to alert us to the need to understand God's purpose in the history of the Mennonite Brethren Church and to the necessity of preserving the historical records of our brotherhood. Holders of historical materials, such as committee and church records, diaries, letters, etc. will be encouraged to deposit these in their respective historical libraries, such as those in Winnipeg, Hillsboro or Fresno. This will assure the continued availability of these documents. Unfortunately, many materials have already been lost because they were not housed in appropriate depositories.

Accordingly, the Historical Commission should like to request that the Canadian Conference:

1. Encourage the provincial conferences and local churches to support the efforts of the Commission;
2. Endorse the work of Brother J. B. Toews as he plans to visit various conferences and churches, as well as individual church members, to give leadership in developing a greater awareness of our historical identity, and to give direction in the collection and preservation of historical materials.

The Historical Commission believes that, in the providence of God, such action will stimulate spiritual renewal and growth in our brotherhood, and will deepen our love for God and His church.

### Second Session - Monday Morning, July 9, 1973

The second session was opened with the singing of "At the Cross". The moderator then announced the accidental drowning death of Gordon Redekopp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Adolf Redekopp, pastor of the Waldheim M.B. Church. Condolences are expressed. The Redekopp family requests prayer support.

### Message - "Christ" - H. Warkentin (B.C.)

To speak about the Lord Jesus Christ I consider a high honour, but it is also an awesome task because the subject is so vast and profound. But because I love Him dearly I gladly speak of Him.

One of the richest summaries of Christology we read in Colossians 1:15-20 which inevitably must lead us to worship. Certainly Paul places Christ into the very centre of all creation, of time and eternity. Nor do we have to be very profound students of Scripture to discover the centrality of Christ in this revelation of God, indeed the Bible is His Story. The Old Testament attitude is one of waiting on tiptoe, as it were, waiting for the revelation of Christ, while the New Testament is full of Christ. In view of this, the question is often asked:

#### WHY IS THE LORD JESUS CHRIST SO IMPORTANT?

#### I HE IS IMPORTANT BECAUSE OF WHO HE IS.

Even though we do not regularly recite the Apostles Creed as some denominations do, we could possibly come up with a number of the basic truths as to who Jesus Christ is. By the way, that creed coming to us from the fourth century, contains one line on God the Father, two

lines on the Holy Spirit and five lines on Christ. (As given in our hymnal). He is the Son of God, conceived of the Holy Ghost and born of the Virgin Mary. We may have the confession down pat on paper, but how deep and genuine are our actual convictions. Could it be that our Christianity is little more than a "paper tiger"? We need to guard against two extremes: 1. A very wordy, philosophical and theoretical confession which leaves people bewildered and confused. It also leaves the distinct impression that ours is but a "paper Christ". 2. There is the danger of oversimplification. We resent the presentation of Jesus Christ just as a "Superstar", but we also need to guard against a familiarity which breeds contempt. We can talk so much about "Jesus" that we forget that He is "LORD" and the "CHRIST".

While today we do not meet as many people who confront us with absolute denials of Christ, we meet many who claim it is impossible to define what they believe about him. Just as you cannot analyze the aroma of the rose, or the beauty of the sunset, so they say, I cannot say who Christ is. He is marvellous and wonderful, but one may say this and the other that, probably both are right. Everybody is right. And I am inclined to think that this view is too widespread in our churches, to be comfortable. That is why we need to refocus on what Scripture states so clearly about who Christ is, and articulate this in a very readable confession of faith.

## II HE IS ALSO IMPORTANT BECAUSE OF WHAT HE DID.

This is indeed familiar ground for all believers. Jesus said He came not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. Never was such a precious, pure and perfect life given for such a vile and sinful humanity. One of the most beautiful statements on what Christ did comes from redeemed in glory when they sing the new song: "Why are thou to take the scroll and to open its seals, for thou wast slain and by thy blood didst ransom men for God from every tribe and tongue and people and nation, and hast made them a kingdom and priests to our God ... " (Rev. 5:9-10). Yes, He was crucified, He rose from the dead, He ascended into glory, He sent the Holy Spirit, the Comforter, and He is building His church. We may well join with the songwriter: "How much I owe for love divine!

How much I owe since Christ is mine!

But what He did for me, I know.

I cannot tell how much I owe!"

## III HE IS ALSO IMPORTANT BECAUSE OF HIS CLAIM ON OUR LIFE.

1. Christ is our life. Col. 3:4. When Christ who is life, dwells in us, He is our life. He fills us, as a result of a very close connection with us. Jesus said: I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly. Paul could say: To me to live is Christ. So with Christ we have that divine, that eternal life within - apart from Him we have no such life - only physical life - and even that is a gift of God's. So Christ is indispensable to the believer.

2. Christ is our authority. Near the end of his life, the late A. W. Tozer, shared a heavy burden in one of his articles: The Waning Authority of Christ. His concern was that the authority of Christ seemed to be eroded in the evangelical churches. The present position of Christ is like the limited constitutional monarch. So Christ in gospel churches is little more than a symbol. "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" is the national anthem, the cross is her official flag, but in the daily conduct of life someone other than Christ makes the decisions. He has a right to claim the place of authority in our life. Yet how many pastors and church boards and conference boards really ask the Lord: Lord, what is Your will? We so often pray piously and then ask the Lord to help us and to bless our efforts.

3. Christ is our message. Paul said: I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. I Cor. 2:2. To the Galatians he said that he placarded Christ before them. Our one business is to preach the Lord Jesus Christ. People need to be brought face to face with Christ so that they must make a decision. That does not mean that we are to preach only evangelism; the gospel of Jesus Christ is much broader than that; it included all of the Bible, the Word of God. So let us never allow our proclamation to mere paste jewellery, replacing the brilliance of the genuine diamond.

4. Christ is our hope. In Him alone rests our future, and that is not indefinite or questionable but as certain as the historical life of Christ. So let us ever strive to gain a clearer vision of who Christ is. May we ever become more grateful for what Christ did for us, and let us ever recognize more fully what claim Christ has on us, and how dependent we are upon Him.

Yes, Christ is indispensable to every believer and the only hope for lost mankind. May our goal ever be to KNOW HIM.

The minutes of the first session were read by the secretary and accepted as corrected.

#### Fraternal Greetings

Greetings were received from:

- (a) J. A. Toews - from South America.
- (b) Fred Peters (M.C.C - Saskatchewan) - extends an invitation to a Thanksgiving Service, at Rosthern, Sask., July 21, 22, commemorating the entry of Mennonites into Canada since 1923.
- (c) European Brethren - who send greetings through J.B. Toews.
- (d) David Pankratz - sends greetings and has resigned from the Committee of Spiritual and Social Concerns.
- (e) Brother Frank Epp brings greetings from the Conference of Mennonites in Canada, expresses appreciation for the ministry of David Ewert to their fellowship. He comments on the centenary 1874-1974 of the Mennonites entry into Canada. A book centered around the unifying thread of the story of the emigrating Mennonites is being written. Frank Epp related some of his experiences in his visitation of churches of northern B.C. and Alberta. He closed his brief report with the comments, "Please be close to the rest of us, because most of the rest of us want to be close to you."

Greetings to the Conference of Mennonites presently in session in Edmonton have been conveyed by Herb Brandt.

#### B. Recommendations - Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns

##### Resolution 1

That the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns be permitted to present its paper on the Confession of Faith at the 1974 Faith Conference. It was moved, seconded and carried.

##### Resolution 2 - The Evangelical Fellowship of Canada

We recommend that the Canadian Conference join the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada for a period of two years. In the interim, the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns will review this position



and make an appropriate recommendation to the 1975 Conference.

### Resolution 3 - The Historical Commission

We recommend that the Provincial Conferences and the Local Churches support the work of the General Conference Historical Commission as Brother J. B. Toews visits the conferences and the churches in the interest of this work.

### Resolution 4 - The Role of the Sisters in the Ministries of the Church

Since the Canadian Conference will meet as a Study Conference in 1974 and

Since one of the topics to be discussed is 'The Role of the Sisters in the Ministries of the Church' and

Since at that time a resolution on this topic will be forth coming at that time,

Be it resolved:

a) That the Canadian Conference take no further action in this area until that date.

b) That the Canadian Conference request the Provincial Conferences and the Local Churches to follow this same pattern.

c) That in the immediate future the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns publish the paper on the topic which clarifies the official position which the Board has reached at its January 12-14, 1973, session.

### Resolution 5 - Mennonite Brethren Identity

As a brotherhood, we humbly and gratefully recognize God's gracious and overruling providence in the origin, growth, and preservation of the M.B. church. In their origin, as well as in their historical development, Mennonite Brethren have been guided by their primary identification with Christ and the teaching of Scripture and by their secondary identification with the "Anabaptist Vision." (cf. references to the teachings of Menno Simons in the Document of Se-cession). The early Brethren rediscovered in the Anabaptist Vision a historical realization of the New Testament ideal of the Believers' Church. An emphasis on the historical dimensions of the faith has always been a significant factor in the spiritual identity, as well as the spiritual dynamic of any religious movement. Christians need to identify not only with the Christ in heaven or in the human heart, but also with the Christ active in the history of the Church.

We believe that the Anabaptist-Mennonite movement, of which the Mennonite Brethren are a part, has been and still is a vital spiritual force which God is using to accomplish his redemptive purpose in the present age.

We confess that, as a result of exposure to various "winds of doctrine", and due to the indiscriminate acceptance of views which are contrary to both the New Testament and the Anabaptist Vision, we have in recent years experienced an identity crisis. This identity crisis has manifested itself in a polarization of theological views (evangelism-social concern) and in an alienation of our youth from the historic foundations of our faith.

In order to clarify our vision and strengthen our witness, be it resolved:

1. That we encourage our homes, our churches and our schools to teach the "whole counsel of God", including such doctrines (or distinctives) which Mennonite Brethren have always considered as an integral part of the New Testament message, (e.g. discipleship, peace

and nonresistance, mutual aid, relief, etc.).

2. That we encourage our homes, our churches and schools to provide instruction in the Confession of our Faith, and to acquaint members and students with the spiritual heritage of our brotherhood. A knowledge of our historical background can play an important role in strengthening our spiritual identity.

3. That we strengthen our ties in certain areas with other Anabaptist-Mennonite bodies with whom we share not only a common spiritual heritage, but also common contemporary concerns in both missions and services. We will also continue to cultivate our fellowship with other Evangelicals with whom we share a basic understanding of the Gospel. In both cases we must exercise spiritual discernment in areas where principles and practices are contrary to our understanding of the teachings of Scripture.

4. That we provide more Christian literature in harmony with our Confession of Faith, recognizing the fact that the literary diet in our homes, schools, and churches molds our spiritual vision and affects our spiritual and denominational identity.

#### Resolution 6 - Ordination

We recommend that the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns be authorized to prepare a questionnaire to be used by the Provincial Conferences in examining candidates for the ministry and that brethren from other denominations entering the M.B. ministry be asked to submit to the same examination.

Action - Resolution 2 - Regarding joining the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada for a two year period. Carried.

#### Comments

- a) The cost to the Conference will be about \$1,700.00.
- b) The objectives of the E.F.C. are basically -
  - to give a united voice to the evangelical cause in Canada
  - to strengthen the cause of the evangelical churches in Canada

Resolution 3 - Regarding support for the Historical Commission - Carried.

Resolution 4 - Regarding permission to present the paper on "The Role of the Sisters in the Ministries of the Church" at the 1974 Conference. Carried.

Resolution 5 - on our "M.B. Identity" in amended form. Carried.

Resolution 6 - on "Ordination". Carried.

Resolution 7 - We recommend to the Conference that \$500.00 indebtedness be cancelled for those Canadian Seminary students at Fresno who prior to 1972 have borrowed money from the Seminary loan fund and have as yet not repaid it. This applies only to those Canadian students who have returned to Canada after their study and have subsequently undertaken a pastoral ministry in a Canadian M.B. Church. It was moved, seconded and carried.

##### REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMISSION

As we met together for the purpose of preparing a slate of nominees for the elections at the 1973 Canadian Conference sessions, we felt our inadequacy for the task keenly. It was in prayer and with an appreciation for God's presence that we began our task.

We looked closely at the ministries of the various Boards, the areas in which they serve, the programs they administer and at the kinds of gifts that would be needed for an efficient, God honoring service. We next looked closely at the persons across our Conference to whom God has given gifts, persons who could render service to and through the Boards.

We took our task seriously, sensing it to be a preliminary part of the great ministry of bringing together the areas of service, the needs of the Boards, and the resources, the gifts of persons that the Lord has given to our churches, our Conference.

The slate of nominees is a random listing of persons who have been contacted and have agreed to serve on a Board should they be elected. The accompanying paragraph will, we believe, be of assistance in becoming acquainted with the nominee.

It is our prayer that in the choice of persons who will serve on the Boards of our Conference, we will sense the guidance of the Lord.

#### IV TREASURER'S REPORT AND TENTATIVE BUDGET

At this point in the agenda a complete report is not given. Henry Block, chairman, introduces Dave Warkentin, chairman of the Bethesda Committee.

##### Bethesda Report - Dave Warkentin

The three Ontario members on the Board of Management form the Bethesda Committee.

It has been a pleasure to meet regularly (at least monthly) as Bethesda Committee and Administration, sharing in a devotional period and then discussing and planning the work together.

We are thankful to God for the opportunity available at Bethesda Home for providing special care to those with special needs in an atmosphere of Christian love. Both the care and the Christian philosophy extend also to the families of the residents, thus giving us an enlarged mission.

It is of course, gratifying to notice that families and residents are generally pleased with the care given. Often families long to have their exceptional children come to live at Bethesda. The Provincial Health authorities likewise appear satisfied with our program. There is continuing consultation with them concerning the entire work and facilities.

In recent years the program has been modified as the need arose because of the changing resident population to that of mostly mentally retarded. Furthermore, with the addition of 14 more beds by renovating one of the floors, more space was needed. So we are thankful that the new chapel, gymnasium, administration complex was completed this year. It is now possible to provide good medical care, chapel services and other spiritual ministries, gymnasium activities, and at least three different levels of occupational activity. With some further anticipated improvements in kitchen and workshop facilities, the program at Bethesda should be most acceptable. A few more beds may also become available with further renovation and rearrangement of facilities. Thus the planning and activity goes on in an attempt to provide the best care possible for as many needy as possible.

The cost of the new facilities, including considerable furnishing, was \$191,416. Of this amount, the Ontario Government granted \$112,000. The remainder was paid for with surplus funds generated from Government budget allowances for Bethesda, and with gifts from interested individuals, families of residents, and organizations. We were pleased to learn that all residents at Bethesda would be covered by Ontario Health Insurance, so that operating surplus funds are no longer used up for support of Western patients as previously.

The Bethesda family covets your continued interest and support. Although some degree of financial independence seems to be our lot just now, we also need God's blessing in our efforts to deal with staff, residents, and their families in true Christian love, and to continue planning wisely.

We trust that the work done in this institution will always be a credit to the Conference and a faithful example of practical Christianity.

J. J. Riediger made a few observations about the state of the treasury and the budget. Details will be considered later.

Henry Block showed a breakdown of provincial contributions

to Canadian Conference projects. He pointed out some of the apparent trends. He was asked to have these observations in writing to be available for further study. The observation follows:

a) That the greatest number of our constituents speak through their gifts.

b) That our constituents are in better financial position than ever before in our M.B. history.

c) That the % of giving to income to all M.B. causes is possibly at the lowest point ever today.

d) That a major part of our giving by our constituents is given to other than M.B. fully supported causes.

e) That this trend may well support the opinion of "the more financial wealth a man possesses the more independent he becomes as to where his gifts go."

f) The giving trends also indicate our constituents' concern regarding the costs of our publications.

g) The giving trends speak loud and clear regarding our Higher Education confusion.

h) The trends of giving also speak to the increased provincial Educational costs supported by our constituents.

i) Finally, the Board of Management interprets the lack of giving as a lack of a clear, acceptable challenge to our churches.

### III BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION - H. H. Dueck

#### A. Report - Board Chairman

The period since the 1971 Canadian Conference sessions has been marked by a stabilization of the changing role in post-secondary education, a consolidation of existing programs under the responsibility of the Board and a redefinition of purpose of M.B.B.C. within the brotherhood.

Members of the Board have felt that many within the entire brotherhood shared our concerns for the future of M.B.B.C. Much has been spoken and written. As a Board, we are the servant of the Conference

and want to listen to what is being said. At the same time, we understand it to be our responsibility to exercise leadership in the area of Higher Education by means of projections for the purpose of helping the Conference ascertain its mind, under God, about the role of an institution that continues to have a potential for a significant contribution to the Canadian brotherhood in the years ahead. We would hope that serious, prayerful consideration would be given to the proposal concerning the future of M.B.B.C., which is the Board's most important submission to the Conference.

#### M.B.B.C. Committee

The M.B.B.C. Committee has carried out the responsibilities for the major tasks of the Board, under the chairmanship of Brother John Wall, Winnipeg. We are very happy to report that a positive, Christian atmosphere exists on campus. Faculty, students and committee members have experienced another good year. The Board has full faith in the doctrinal positions of the faculty members.

For the sake of brevity, I shall enumerate some of the major recommendations approved by the Board from the M.B.B.C. Committee:

1. The administrative structure and decision-making process at M.B.B.C. have been revised.
  2. M.B.B.C. has been incorporated with the Manitoba Government as an undergraduate College in association with the University of Winnipeg.
  3. The "core program" requirements have been defined more clearly.
  4. Student recruitment has been promoted quite vigorously. New student enrolment and the geographical distribution of students has remained fairly constant. The enrolment in the Arts program has increased even though 18 out of 31 courses offered in 1972-73 were in the Bible-Theology area; for 1973-74 the College will offer 19 out of 30 courses in Bible and Theology. In spite of a low enrolment, a student potential exists and constituency wide support is solicited to increase the enrolment.
  5. A joint Ministers' Course was sponsored by M.B.B.C. and C.M.B.C. in February. This was quite successful and will be repeated in 1973-74. The Board would ask that each congregation would send both lay and ordained ministers to the next Ministers' Course, February 25 - March 1, 1974.
  6. All financial commitments for M.B.B.C. have been met, and we want to express our sincere appreciation for continued support.
  7. Resignations from the Faculty have been accepted from the brethren Victor Adrian, Peter Hamm, and Roland Sawatsky as full-time faculty members; Henry Regehr, part-time; and Allan Guenther, who was on a leave of absence. We want to express our sincere appreciation to each of these brethren for their devoted service to M.B.B.C. Brother Adrian, in particular, served as President of the College during five difficult years, for which we are very grateful.
- For next year, the brethren Peter Klassen and George Epp are joining the Faculty again, so that we now have a full staff for the 1973-74 academic year. Dr. John Regehr, Acting President, and Dr. Abe Dueck, Acting Dean, have agreed to serve another year in these offices.
8. Committee and Board have considered a variety of options for the future role of the College within the brotherhood. The projected proposal, with an undergraduate degree, approved by the Council of Boards in January, 1973, was structured to meet the following needs:

- (a) to spell out a unique, identifiable role for the

College within the educational structure of the constituency.

- (b) to prepare Canadian students for admission to a post-graduate theological program at the Seminary in Fresno. (See the recommendation for details.)

9. A number of brethren have been contacted in our continuous search for a President.

#### Inter-School Relations Committee

This Committee is working under the chairmanship of Brother Rudy Heidebrecht, Hepburn, Saskatchewan. The transfer of course work from Bible Institutes to the College is a continuous project. It must always be remembered, that even though courses at the two institutions may appear to be identical, the nature and purpose of the two are different. Transfer students from the Bible Institutes to the College will continue to get transfer credit based on individual student evaluation.

#### Student Services Committee

The Student Services Committee, under the chairmanship of Brother John Friesen, Vancouver, B. C., is proposing to strengthen the work among students across Canada. Brother Vern Ratzlaff has been appointed by the Board as a student services co-ordinator on a Canada-wide basis. Efforts are being made to determine the resources of the Christian community on the campuses where we have major concentrations of M.B. students. It is hoped that our students will be brought into a meaningful contact with Christian resources such as IVCF, SCM, Campus Crusade and Navigators.

Additional efforts are also being made to maintain contact with M.B. students by means of a newsletter, regional meetings and visits to campuses by dedicated Christian educators.

#### Recommendations Re Future Role of M.B.B.C.

The most significant item of discussion at the Council of Boards meeting in Winnipeg from January 12-14, 1973, was the future role of M.B.B.C. and College of Arts. Members of the Council reviewed the past contribution of the College and its future at three of its meetings.

In summary, the Council adopted the following statement presented by the Board of Higher Education, to be ratified by the Conference in July, 1973, and reviewed again in 1975.

#### Purpose

1. To offer a strong program of biblical studies which would be credited towards a general B.A. Degree with the University of Winnipeg, a supporting program in music, a selection of arts courses in which Christian perspective makes a significant difference in teaching approach and in the content of the courses. The goal is to provide a sufficient program to enable students to take most of their courses on the College campus during the first two years of their Bachelor of Arts degree program.

2. To offer a parallel program in various areas which are significant for training workers for church ministries and for the Christian life of the student, but which cannot be credited toward a B.A. degree (e.g. Christian Education, Mennonite History, Church Music). Such a program serves two functions:

- (a) It leads to a Bachelor of Religious Studies (BRS) degree, with a major in Religious Education, The-

ology, or Church Music.

- (b) It contributes towards a core program which students in the Bachelor of Arts degree are required to take.

3. To provide a setting for a vibrant Christian community of students, making available qualified, committed, and mature faculty members who are alert and responsive to the needs and concerns of students and the larger academic community.

The Board believes that this is the direction to follow in Canada, based on the current situation and the proposed Canadian participation with the M.B. Seminary in Fresno, California.

#### Concerns

The Board is very concerned that the Conference would recognize the continued need for an undergraduate degree College for the Canadian brotherhood. Whatever decisions the Conference will make regarding the Canadian participation with the Seminary in Fresno, they cannot be carried out without implications for the College in Winnipeg. The Board also solicits your continued support for prayer, students, and finances.

## Mennonite Brethren Bible College

### President's Report - John Regehr

#### A. Gratitude

We thank God for a good year at MBBC. The faculty was characterized by a deep commitment to the cause of Christ and his church, and by a sense of unity and mutual respect and support. The student body was characterized by a healthy balance between academic seriousness and a desire to work out the practical implications of Christian community.

We are deeply grateful to God for the Board of Higher Education and the local College Committee. A special thanks goes to the chairmen. They have proven themselves worthy leaders and wise brothers. To the Board and the Committee is due much of the credit for making this year at MBBC a good one.

#### B. Graduates

The sense of serious purpose observable in our students is demonstrated, too, in the continuing pursuits of our graduates. Of the 22 graduates of the last two school years,

- three are presently serving churches as pastors
- one has just recently accepted a charge
- one is looking for a pastoral position
- three are looking toward the pastorate but are not presently ready to assume such a position. Of these one is presently attending seminary and one will enroll at the M.B. Biblical Seminary in Fresno in September
- five are serving in other local church leadership roles
- one is returning to Zaire to continue his teaching and preaching ministry
- two are looking toward a teaching ministry, perhaps in a Bible Institute
- three are engaged in missionary work. (One of these is working in Home Missions, one is about to leave under the Good News Corps program, and one has already been overseas for a year.)
- three are continuing further university studies

In addition to this, students who did not enrol in our degree program but spent one or two years with us are now engaged in significant Christian ministries. Of those who attended in the last three years, some are under MCC assignment, some in Christian camp work, some in other forms of church-related activity.

#### C. The Year That Was

For us the Council of Boards' meeting in January of this year was an important event. We heard our brotherhood endorsing the very significant work which the Board and the faculty had undertaken with regard to the articulation of our purpose and direction. (See Board chairman's report for the proposal.)

Let me recapitulate in three concise statements how the faculty see the practical implications of this proposal.

1. We are a Bible College. Of the 30 courses which we will offer in 1973-74, 19 are biblical/theological in nature. Of the remaining 11, five are music courses, and six are non-theological liberal arts courses.

2. Our purpose for existence is the Church of Jesus Christ. We want to encourage our students to seek full-time church-related vocations if they have the spiritual gifts to do so. At the same time, we recognize that the Spirit gives gifts to all members of the body of Jesus Christ. Even those who do not become administrative

ministers in the church have the obligation to put their gifts to use for the upbuilding of the church. We seek to help students discover their spiritual gifts.

3. We are pledged to help students toward a B.A. program in an effort to prepare them for vocations other than directly church-related. We treasure our association with the University of Winnipeg because it enables us to concentrate on our own specialty and concern, and at the same time allows students to pursue a B.A. program while taking biblical/theological courses or music courses. Six of our biblical/theological courses and five of our music courses can be taken for University credit.

It will be of interest to the conference to know that the essential nature of the core program which was accepted two years ago at St. Catharines has been retained, although, by Board request in January, 1972, it was made somewhat more flexible. Essentially, the "core concept" means that new full-time students without previous theological training are required to take a minimum of 30% of biblical/theological courses.

#### D. The Year That Will Be - God Willing

1. The enrolment prospects are encouraging. The number of students who indicated that they would be returning is higher than it was last year. The number of new applications to date is greater than it was last year at this time. Though it is too early to project with accuracy, we are much encouraged.

#### 3. Significant Events for 1973-74

(a) A Retreat is planned for the first weekend, September 15-16. (Registration is September 13-14.)

(b) The Christian Emphasis Week is planned for mid-October to provide a spiritual orientation just after the work load has settled on our shoulders. We are hoping to have Brother I. W. Redekopp serve as God's servant for this occasion.

(c) The Missions Conference is being planned for February 8-10, 1974. The conscience of Canadian Christians has been aroused regarding our obligation to evangelize native Canadians. This

is a formidable task because events of history have separated Indians from non-Indians by miles of emotional distance. To our missions conference we plan to invite persons who can help us understand the culture and mind-set of the Canadian Indian so that we might befriend them to Christ. We want to learn what the church would look like in a totally Indian setting.

(d) The Ministers' Course is set for February 25 - March 1, 1974. We are again planning this event jointly with CMBC. One such joint project is insufficient experience for making valid judgments about co-operative ventures. We are not disregarding the significant distinctives between us or the differences of perspective. But we feel that this is an ideal occasion for ministers of the two conferences to engage in dialogue. In this way we are able to determine whether the fears some have are founded or not, or whether the wish on the part of others to disregard differences is wise or unwise. We would rather that this process of mutually ascertaining our theological premises and the direction of our commitments be carried out not only at the level of conference leadership or in the educational institutions, but also at the level of local ordained and lay leadership.

(e) We are looking to a possible involvement in Urbana 73. We have not been able to commit ourselves to this, since we do not know what our student body will look like in September of this year, and some students have already made plans for Christmas, but we have been invited to bring to Urbana 73 a group of singers who will give expression to the Christian faith in the more traditional and Scripture-weighted musical idiom. As David Howard, Director of Urbana 73, says, "No other school in North America will have this exposure at Urbana 73."

We are looking forward to 1973-74. We go in confidence. Our confidence is rooted in God and in his calling. We believe that the kind of undergraduate theological training which MBBC provides is necessary for our conference at this time. It cuts a significant swath between the Bible Institute and the Seminary and provides a continuation of learning for those who choose to attend a Bible Institute, and also provides a very helpful base for those who choose to enrol for Seminary training.

Our confidence is also in the brotherhood. We trust that this conference will take as seriously as we do the Council of Boards' decision of January, 1973.

#### Board of Higher Education - Supplementary Report

As the Board met to prepare for this annual Convention, several additional items had to be discussed.

The Board was concerned about the lack of factual information concerning the College and Seminary programs, which each delegate would need in order to make intelligent decisions at this Conference. In spite of a number of printed reports in the MB Herald and those mailed to church pastors, there still appeared to be a lack of concrete information immediately at the disposal of the delegates. In order to facilitate the distribution of information and discussion, the Board approached the Conference Executive Committee for the arrangement of two Open Forum meetings held on Saturday and Sunday. The addition of the Seminary proposal to the discussion helped to clarify two related issues.

The Board wishes to express our appreciation to all those who attended these meetings and shared with us your questions and concerns.

Another related area to the work of the Board, is the activity of the Conference Archivist. Brother Herbert Giesbrecht has been collecting archival material on behalf of the Canadian Conference in his dual capacity as Librarian of the College and Archivist of the Conference. He is attempting to co-ordinate his activities in Canada with those of Brother J. B. Toews as "historical co-ordinator" of the General Conference and also in co-operation of the Historical Commission of the Board of Christian Literature. The three M.B. archival centres are Fresno, Hillsboro and Winnipeg.

The Board has discussed the work of the Archivist and his relationship to any Board of the Conference. As it appears, that his area of responsibility and duties have never been clarified, the Board is presenting a recommendation to undergird and strengthen his area of work for the future.

The Board has discussed the matters related to Seminary students in Fresno. Those studying there have had their matters handled by three different Boards this past year. We ask you to support our recommendation so that the procedures can be co-ordinated under one Board and make it easier for the students involved.

The Board has discussed the possibility of placement of MBBC graduates in churches throughout Canada. Young, inexperienced but spiritually qualified young men often need to look to small rural churches for their first opportunity of service. The Board would suggest, that this Conference would urge large, urban churches and Home Mission Boards to provide apprenticeships so that young men can work alongside a senior minister for one year after graduation, before being called to full responsibility in a church or assigned to a mission post. We would appreciate some response to this suggestion.

A resolution concerning the future of the College has been referred to the Board by the B.C. Committee of Reference and Counsel. The Board has discussed the concern shared in the resolution by the B.C. brethren. At the Council of Boards meeting in January, 1973, the Board discussed various options with members of the Council for three days. At the conclusion of that period, the Council endorsed the recommendation before you today, which is the one the Board believes to be the best alternative at this time in the development of the College.

We ask you to support it. But to work meaningfully, we also need the commitment of the brotherhood to it. To ensure that the work is supported by the brotherhood, we request a solid majority in the vote in favour of the resolution in order to carry it out.

During the past two years the Board has listened to many voices. We have taken much of your time in meetings and counsel. We have made efforts at rebuilding trust and confidence, both within the College and with the constituency. But we need your continued support in every respect.

We want to recognize the faithful service of Brother Jack Block (9 years), Brother Henry Redekopp (12 years), and Brother John Wall (6 years), as members in leadership positions on the Board. Their contributions have done much to help the College through difficult periods.

## Alumni Report of M.B.B.C. - Victor Neufeld

The executive of the M.B.B.C. Alumni Association began its responsibilities a year ago, July, 1972. We recognized that a renewed interest in the alumni as an association and in the College as the conference school was essential. This became our priority.

To achieve this we sought to obtain contact personnel in the five western provinces. Their task would be to assist the college and alumni in dissemination of information and the organization of alumni meetings with college personnel if and when that was a possibility; i.e. deputation and/or guest speakers. This was only partially successful. We are, nevertheless, grateful for what has been accomplished.

We further sought to contact alumni members through letters and to update our address files. The purpose of these contacts was to inform alumni of developments at the college, and solicit prayer support. Alumni members were also asked for suggestions regarding the improvement of the college program, the work of the alumni, and the support of the school financially. To date two \$100.00 scholarships were awarded and some monies have been received for the alumni college project (purchase of a new vehicle to replace the 1959 Chev. station wagon).

Three alumni meetings were held. The homecoming and banquet (Nov. 26, 1972) drew slightly over one hundred people. A meeting of B.C. alumni with the college choir and several faculty members took place in mid March. A third meeting of alumni members was held on March 24 at the Portage Avenue M.B. Church. This was in conjunction with the Christian Education Conference. A fourth meeting is scheduled for July 7 at the time of the Canadian Conference.

The tone of the college alumni at this time seems to be one of guarded optimism, (for some it is heavily guarded). The desire to support the college appears to exist but the reservations and uncertainties felt by many and cultivated by some breed hesitation and indecision.

Passive support for any institution is not sufficient. Therefore, it remains our priority to awaken the alumni to their responsibility. This responsibility is to support the school that gave them light and to insure that it will continue to give light to students and to our conference.

### Third Session - Monday Afternoon, July 9, 1973

Belated greetings from the India M.B. Church to the Canadian M.B. Conference were relayed by Henry Poetker, missionary to India.

Agenda Order

The Executive recommends that before a vote is taken on either the College or Seminary question that both items be discussed. By a show of hands this procedure is overwhelmingly accepted.

Discussion

Some questions about enrolment statistics were asked and the information was provided by the Registrar of the College.

It was moved and seconded that we suspend discussion of the report and proceed to the presentation of the recommendations. Carried.

B. Recommendations - Board of Higher Education

We recommend:

1. That the Conference ratify the action of the Council of Boards, January 14, 1973, to endorse the proposal of the Board of Higher Education concerning the College; this action to be reviewed again in 1975.

2. That the Board of Higher Education be charged with the responsibility of handling all necessary matters relating to the Canadian Seminary students.

3. That, in future, the archivist be responsible to the Board of Higher Education.

Discussion:

The discussion was limited more or less to Recommendation 1. Some comments:

1. Reasons are given why we should vote in favour of the motion: The College fills a vital need that cannot be met by the Bible Institutes or by the Seminary. Its role is unique.

2. It is mentioned that we cannot financially support both the College and the Seminary as proposed in the Fresno alternative. Some feel we can and must - that the per capita cost is not prohibitive at all.

3. It is mentioned that the school lacks the proper spirit - that the plan looks good on paper but that the spirit that emanates from the College does not convince people to support it, nor does it attract students.

4. The various courses the Conference can take are presented - plotted on a chart together with the possible consequences for each course of action.

5. It is felt by some that the present program needs more time, 2 years at least, to prove itself. Others feel that it has had a number of second chances, and to specify 2 years as a period of time before another review takes place would in itself be harmful and demoralizing.

6. It is pointed out to us that an institution may be judged by its product. If this is done, in this case, the result is not always encouraging - the product, in this case the student, sometimes has its faith shaken rather than strengthened.

7. It is argued that we badly need a Seminary - a place of training for our leaders and a place of Biblical Studies to explore new frontiers of knowledge.

8. It is stated that the college and the faculty cannot be expected to operate on a mere majority vote. It needs a vote that indicates solid support - 80% is mentioned.

9. The thought is expressed that should we pass the recommendations, in some form or other, that new directions suggested by the Conference would have to be undertaken by another group or agency other than the present Board of Higher Education and the present faculty. It is suggested that the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns could be given the assignment.

At the end of the session, fear was expressed that there is a danger that the unity of the brotherhood is at stake over this question and that a very sincere unity of purpose must be maintained if we are to solve our problems.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer.

#### Fourth Session - Monday Evening, July 9, 1973

The Linden Lee Singers favored the Convention with a series of songs.

#### Message - "Discipleship" - John Regehr (Manitoba)

A disciple is a learner who follows after. The apostle Peter describes discipleship well when he speaks of Christ's having "left us an example, that we should follow in his steps" (I Peter 2:21).

- A. Discipleship requires a firm and repeated 'No' because of the danger of being distracted, or lured away, from following. (II Corinthians 6:14,17).

Becoming separated requires a decisive act. "Come out!" says God. He demands a firm 'No' to the world in which we have become entangled; a deliberate move out of the kingdom of this world, the places where the spirit of this world rules.

Who can deny that we have become trapped, and snared? We grieve over those who have left the faith and have stumbled into flagrant sin, making sin their way of life.

Who can deny that in a thousand subtle ways we, too, have been snared? We have joined the race in which this world's values are pursued. We have acknowledged that this world's goals are noble,



and have sounded the bugle in the chase. We have come to respect this world's artistic sentiments, and are swinging to its rhythm. We have recognized that this world's methods are effective and have borrowed them.

In a million enticing whispers the devil has offered us the kingdoms of this world; and we have felt so honored! Yet, like a serpent, he is swallowing us alive!

In our brotherhood we have not been able to retain our Anabaptist ideal of standing aloof from, and above, the regional and political boundaries which separate us. We have taken on the color of the political, economic, geographical, educational and social environments which we have chosen.

Those of us who live in Manitoba think as Manitobans think; those who live in B. C. think as British Columbians think. The 49th parallel does separate us. U.S. and Canadian M.B.'s have significantly different mind sets. We are in danger of serious rifts in our brotherhood. We already have them. The danger is intensified when we consider our brotherhood as a world wide community.

The devil is offering us these kingdoms in which we live, yet Jesus prayed that we might be one.

After our hundred years of history, it is time that we as a Conference again speak a decisive 'No'. And in our churches must ring ten thousand echoes: No! No! No! "Be separate!" says God, "Come out from among them." We cannot shrink back from that demand, and hope to be disciples.

B. Discipleship requires a firm and repeated 'Yes'.

1. We must say 'Yes' to the way of righteousness. (Rom. 6: 17-19)

We have "become obedient", says the Word. As decisively as we broke with the old servitude, so decisively have we committed ourselves to a new one. We have done so from the heart. It was a total being response. Our obedience was to a "standard of teaching." We accepted God's demands as they came to us in the Scriptures.

Thus we have become "slaves of righteousness" (v. 16). Having promised obedience, our identity is fixed. This is who we are: slaves to righteousness. We belong to him who is righteous.

By that deliberate choice we have entered upon a way that demands continuing choices. "Yield your members to righteousness for sanctification!" says God (v. 19). Sanctification is a process, the end of which is eternal life (v. 22). The once-for-all 'Yes' to righteousness must be confirmed again and again, as the Way is shown to us in the Scriptures.

2. We must say 'Yes' to service as well. (I Cor. 4:1-2)

We keep saying 'Yes' to Christ because we are servants; He is master.

We keep saying 'Yes' to the people of God, because we are stewards; they are our charge.

We keep saying 'Yes' to the Word of God because these are the mysteries entrusted to us.

We keep saying 'Yes' to our task, because to seek first the kingdom of God is our obligation and we want to be found faithful; indeed, this is required.

C. Discipleship requires a deliberate and repeated reaching out to each other.

A firm 'No' and 'Yes' still permits stark individualism. This is the mood of the day, in spite of the group movement, and the youth culture.

"My faith is between God and me," we say, "it is my concern, and mine alone." This is so in matters of ethics, as well as in Christian service.

"My life is my business," we say. "My opinions are as good as yours, and therefore I don't have to listen to you!"

1. The New Testament sees Christian disciples as forming a body. (I Cor. 1:10-13a)

The letter was written to Christians in one city, meeting at different places. They were a cluster of smaller groups. But these groups had become separated in heart. They were building fences; and spitting judgments at each other across them.

Here was not a division of labor, as there is among members of one body. Rather, here was dissension, a separation of heart.

2. The New Testament indicates that the measure of our oneness is the measure of our discipleship. (Phil. 2:1-5)

We have so much going for us: there is encouragement in Christ; there is participation in the Spirit; there is affection; there is sympathy.

The great goal of oneness is possible, it is only a step away. Yet it will not be achieved by default, any more than a happy marriage is achieved by default. Only a deliberate act of reaching out to each other will achieve Christian unity.

Not to achieve this togetherness is to sell short our discipleship. The measure to which we achieve togetherness at the Conference will be the measure of our discipleship.

Conclusion:

1. Let us say 'No' firmly, and thus realize and maintain our separateness from the world.

2. Let us say 'Yes' totally, and thus become genuine followers both in our life-style and in our service to God.

3. Let us reach out to each other, and carry our brotherhood tasks shoulder to shoulder, proving by our love that we are indeed disciples.

Several brethren were asked to pray.

The minutes of the third session are adopted as read by the secretary.

It was moved and seconded that we ammend Recommendation 1 by deleting the words, "this action to be reviewed again in 1975".

It was moved and seconded that Recommendation 1 be tabled. Carried.

Interpretation of Motion to Table

The motion to table, which was carried, implies that the College will continue to operate according to the mandate which it received at the 1971 Canadian Conference at St. Catharines. "That the Conference ratify the 'Core Curriculum' as spelled out in the President's report." (1971 Yearbook, p. 66).

Recommendation 2 - Re Seminary students. Carried.

Recommendation 3 - Re Responsibility for the archivist. Carried.

## VI COUNCIL OF BOARDS

### A. Report

F. C. Peters prefaces the introduction of the recommendations of the Council of Boards, regarding General Conference Seminary, with a review of the basic assumptions of such a seminary and the various alternatives.

### B. Recommendations

- Related to the Report of the Commission of Post Graduate Education.

1. The Commission recommends that the Canadian Conference move in the direction of the establishment of a General Conference Seminary. Carried.

The implementation of the recommendation should come in three phases.

#### Phase 1 - 1972

a. According to the decision of the Canadian Conference, July, 1971, the B.D. program at Winnipeg is to be phased out. The MBBC would not accept new applicants for the B.D. program in September 1972, but would complete the programs of those presently enrolled.

b. Two observer-participants would be appointed to the U.S. Seminary Board. It is assumed that this action would be taken by the Council of Boards in January, 1972.

c. The Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference would subsidize seminarians who attend the M.B. Biblical Seminary in Fresno. This would be a per-student annual bursary given to the student. This action would be taken by the Canadian delegates in caucus in Reedley, California (1972). Suggestion: \$500. per student annually.

d. The Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference would make a per capita grant to the Seminary budget. This action would be taken by the Canadian delegates in caucus in Reedley, California (1972). Suggestion: \$500. per Canadian student attending Fresno Seminary.

e. The Seminary staff and the U.S. Seminary Board would be invited to recruit students in Canada. This action would be taken by the Council of Boards, January, 1972.

#### Phase 2 - 1973-75

Following the General Conference at Reedley in 1972, the Area Conferences would discuss the proposal for a General Conference seminary. The Area Conferences would take action on the proposal. If both Areas take positive action, the following steps would be undertaken:

a. A General Conference Seminary Board would be elected at

the General Conference sessions in 1975.

b. A budget for the Seminary would be accepted at the General Conference sessions in 1975.

c. The Seminary Board would be empowered to make future changes.

### Phase 3 - 1975

The Council decided that Phase 3 be referred for discussion and action to the 1975 General Conference.

a. The General Conference Seminary Board would study the question of the location of the Seminary.

b. The recommendations of the General Conference Seminary Board on relocation would be referred to the Area Conferences.

c. If a decision to relocate is made, a fund drive would be initiated.

2. The Commission recommends that the Canadian Conference make a feasibility study concerning relocation of the Fresno Seminary to Vancouver.

This study should be ready for 1975 to be submitted to the newly-elected General Conference Seminary Board for consideration. However, co-operation in the General Conference Seminary program should in no way be dependent on the acceptance of the Relocation Study.

It was moved and seconded that Recommendation 1 be accepted.

It is suggested that we vote on the phases 2 and 3 separately. This suggestion is not accepted.

### Question and Explanations

1. Why is it necessary to approve all three phases now? If not, then phase 1 could continue indefinitely for Canada and would really be unfair to the U.S. Mennonite Brethren.

2. Why did the Council of Boards take this action without Canadian Conference ratification in 1972? The Canadian Conference did not meet in 1972 because of the Mennonite World Conference.

3. Have the possibilities of a joint seminary with other Mennonite groups been explored? Of 17 submissions from M.B. pastors and other persons, 15 expressed the desire to establish a General Conference Seminary.

Recommendation 1 with all three phases was put to a vote and it was carried.

It was moved and seconded to table Recommendation 2. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that we ratify the appointment of the two observer participants, H. H. Dueck and F. C. Peters as members of the M.B. Biblical Seminary Board. This motion was withdrawn.

It is then suggested that we proceed with the election of four members to the M.B. Biblical Seminary Board. The nominations committee is instructed to find nominees for the M.B. Biblical Seminary Board.

## VII BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

### A. Report - David Redekopp

Brother Redekopp presented part of the report but could not finish before it was time to adjourn.

### Closing

J. H. Quiring welcomes the new moderator, Herb Brandt, to his post. Brother Brandt dismisses the meeting with prayer.

### Fifth Session - Tuesday Morning, July 10, 1973

#### Message - "Non Resistance" - John Redekopp (Ontario)

Ephesians 5:1-2; Matthew 5:43-44.

#### A. We have a Problem

1. We agree that Christian Non-Resistance is biblical but often feel uncomfortable about it.
2. Too often we have accepted this emphasis in theory but not in practice.
3. Too often we give the impression that this biblical emphasis is optional; that it should be placed off by itself somewhere.
4. In our brotherhood there is increasing apathy and rejection of this emphasis.

#### B. Why Do We Have This Problem?

1. There are definite reasons for this state of affairs.
2. We have tended to separate Christian Non-Resistance from its source, from the fundamental Christian doctrine of love.
3. We have not shown clearly how the practical application of Christian Non-Resistance fits into the doctrine of love.
4. We have not been sufficiently positive. Our main thrust has been the avoidance aspect, but love, especially Christian love, stresses the opposite: association, involvement, interaction, service, concern for others, sharing, and sacrifice.

#### C. We Need Another Perspective

1. We need to understand that Christian Non-Resistance grows out of John 3:16. It is part of the great Christian radiation of love.
2. Perhaps it is time that we start using a less confusing and more accurate term. I suggest "Limitless Love". (Of course, this term is totally unrelated to what the world terms "free love".)
3. Our emphasis on Limitless Love is grounded not in tradition but in God's inspired Word.
4. We need a perspective which more accurately reflects Christ's teaching and example.
5. We need to reflect this alternative perspective, and perhaps use a new label, in our Confession of Faith.

#### D. The Rationale For This Perspective

1. "Non-Resistance" is not a basic trait of the God-head; love is.
2. Love is the root; "Non-Resistance" is part of the fruit.
3. The emphasis on "Limitless Love" is nothing new, if we read our Bibles carefully.
4. Limitless Love includes many facets: suffering love, reconciling love, sacrificial love, non-resisting love, a winning love, a giving love, a respecting love, a joyous love, a rebuking love, a disciplining love
5. The doctrine of Limitless Love lays claim to our relationships in a series of ever-widening circles:  
We are to love God. Matthew 22:37  
We are to love ourselves as sons of God. Matt. 19:19; Gal.4:6  
We are to love our family. Ephesians 5:25; I Timothy 5:8

We are to love the brethren. Hebrews 13:1; I Peter 2:17  
We are to love our friends. John 15:13  
We are to love our neighbour. Matthew 19:19  
We are to love the stranger. Hebrews 13:2  
We are to love our enemies. Matthew 5:43,44

Is there any biblical reason to draw a line of where our love ends at a place other than where God draws it?

#### E. Conclusion

1. Perhaps the term Limitless Love is inadequate but I submit that the perspective or emphasis is not.

2. Limitless Love is central, joyful, positive, action-oriented. We do not have to create this; we need only to recognize it and then commit ourselves to put it into practice.

3. Viewed in Biblical perspective, Limitless Love is at the heart of witnessing, of evangelism, of discipleship, of a dynamic prayer life, of being a Jesus follower.

4. God's love for us knows no limit, does He set a different norm for us?

5. Since Christian love is basic and is commanded, is it not better to accept its validity 100% rather than 50% or 75%?

6. The doctrine of Limitless Love is no odd option, it is no quaint aberration, it is no tangential tenet, it is no fifth wheel, it is no apocryphal afterthought, nor is it a denominational hobby horse. It is the logical and intrinsic part of the one and only ethic God has given us in His inspired Word!

In John 15:9 we read, "As the Father hath loved me, so have I loved you: continue ye in my love." The Anabaptist distinctive is nothing more and nothing less than taking this commandment seriously.

The minutes were read by the secretary and accepted as corrected.

#### A. Report - of the Board of Christian Education (continued)

Brother David Redekopp briefly reviewed the main points of the report, from the previous day.

#### Report of the Canadian Mennonite Brethren Board of Christian Education

Dear Conference:

Since our last conference in Ontario in 1971, many things have happened in our Board.

In December, 1971 a large group of teenage young people (about 700) gathered in Banff for one of the finest youth conferences we have ever had. We praise God for the tremendous blessing and inspiration and thank all those who helped make this conference possible.

Immediately following the July, 1971 conference the Youth Committee introduced the Bible Quiz on the Book of Acts which was finalized at Banff. All Grade 11 and 12 students were encouraged to participate in their local church and province in the contest. Special recognition goes to the Banff winners, Ernie Klassen and Annemarie Enns of the Scott Street M.B. Church in St. Catharines, Ontario.

The Banff Youth Rally must definitely be regarded as the highlight of Youth Committee work during the last year. The rally meant renewed commitment for hundreds of our Mennonite Brethren youth across Canada. Its results are still influencing our churches today.

This year on March 23-25 our Christian Education Conference was held at the Portage Avenue Church in Winnipeg. From reactions and

reports received, we believe the conference met distinct needs and served to encourage workers in Christian Education. There were 630 people registered but the attendance at the services ran up to 850-900. Many of the 59 workshops were over-crowded, but they were meaningful and helpful to those who attended. It was our privilege to have excellent speakers, Rev. Henry Hildebrand from Briercrest and Dr. Austin Lovelace from Texas. Both men, we felt, were sent by God and carried a message from Him.

On November 10, 1972 our Board sponsored a one-day Study Conference for Canadian church workers at Reedley, California just prior to the General Conference. A total of about 45 brethren attended. This session consisted of studying and analyzing trends and needs in our Sunday School and projecting possible ways by which we could better offer Christian education to our churches.

Both our English and German Adult Quarterlies continue to be used by our churches. The use of the German translation is slowly declining. This decline is irreversible in our Conference, although there may be a possibility of selling some German quarterlies to other Mennonite conferences. We will continue to produce the German Adult Quarterly since it is serving our Conference and to our knowledge there is no alternative material available in the German language.

We are making a slight profit on the English quarterly; however, on the German quarterly we are operating with a deficit. Overall, at the present we are financially solvent and are in the black. The profits from the English quarterly are held in the bank as a reserve to pay for the deficit on the German material and for the promotion of the material. However, with rising costs in materials and a declining German reading clientele we will not be able to maintain this for long without a price increase or increased use of the English quarterly. We, therefore, encourage our churches to use the adult quarterlies. We plan to add some features to the English quarterly and are attempting to make it as meaningful and attractive as possible.

In June of 1972 we attended an inter-Mennonite conference at Camp Amigo, Sturgis, Michigan, at which we studied the possibility of jointly producing Mennonite Sunday School curriculum materials with a distinct Anabaptist emphasis. The Old Mennonites and General Conference Mennonites were the main sponsoring bodies of this conference. Seven Mennonite Brethren attended: three from the United States and four from Canada.

The Columbia Bible Institute has graciously housed our Christian Education Office for five and one-half years. We appreciate this and thank them for this service. However, with C.B.I.'s expanding student body they now needed the space and so we were compelled to move to new quarters. We have found a fine new location at a reasonable price at the Cedar Park Shopping Centre, #2 - 2599A Cedar Park Place, Clearbrook, British Columbia.

In the past six years we planned three conferences. The first one had a predominant emphasis on the Sunday School and was held in Saskatoon; the second one, for youth, was held at Banff; and the third one with a major music emphasis was held in Winnipeg. All three conferences have inspired those who attended and thereby have helped the churches. We are presently planning another youth conference to be held at Banff, December 31, 1974 to January 3, 1975.

We are grateful to God for the services of our Executive Secretary, Wilmer Kornelson. Since there is more opportunity to serve than one can follow through on, the work load is determined by priorities. Our Executive Secretary spends approximately 25 per cent of his time away from the office ministering to our churches, Bible schools, Col-

lege, and serving at conferences in giving leadership in the field of Christian education.

The Office of Christian Education continues to work in the areas of Sunday School, youth work, music, V.B.S. and midweek programs within the framework of the Canadian Mennonite Brethren Churches. The work of our office has included the following areas of ministries as they relate to the above:

1. Promoting worker training courses in our local churches through the Service Training Program.

Presently 67 churches are using this program. To date we have approximately 1,349 students who have completed one or more courses. Arrangements have been made between our office and J. J. Toews that courses offered by him in the churches on family living can be taken for credit in our Service Training Program by those who wish to do so. Certificates issued to those having completed courses can be used toward the obtaining of the Service Training Program Diploma.

2. Publications.

- a. Youth Worker - twice a year;
- b. Adult Sunday School Quarterly - with the U.S.;
- c. Calendar of Activities - with the U.S.;
- d. "Let's Talk Church Work" column in M.B. Herald;
- e. Other special materials; for example, brochure on Christian Education Workers' Meetings, etc.

3. Services directly to churches.

In this past year the Executive Secretary has served 28 churches in one way or another. In the majority of these churches the ministries were directly related to a Christian education emphasis. The meetings generally consisted of special lectures on some area of Christian education or messages of inspiration. In this past year the Executive Secretary has served in all provinces except Ontario.

4. Workers' Conferences.

Besides being responsible for the implementation of the Christian Education Conference conducted in Winnipeg in March of this year, our Executive Secretary took part in:

- a. Workers' Conference at Dawson Creek, B.C., which included our M.B. churches in that particular area.
- b. The Alberta Christian Education Conference last fall.

5. Youth Work.

a. Youth Week materials were prepared and made available to the youth workers on the theme, "Learning to Live." These were used in the churches during Youth Week.

b. The Youth Worker is issued to all youth workers twice a year. It appears as though the use of the Youth Worker materials varies greatly from church to church. We would encourage youth groups to make more extensive use of these materials. Suggestions on how to improve them or ideas to be included would be appreciated.

6. Bible Institutes and Bible College.

a. Our Executive Secretary served each of the institutes this past year with messages and special lectures on Christian education.

b. The M.B. Service Training Institute Diploma which is offered by our office to students majoring in Christian education has encouraged Christian education training. This diploma requires more of the student than did the E.T.T.A. diploma used by our Bible schools



in previous years. All of the Bible institutes now offer the Service Training Institute Diploma. To date we have issued 103 institute diplomas to students graduating from our Bible schools who have adequately taken the required number of courses.

7. From the office we handle correspondence dealing with various needs and requests as submitted to us by workers in our churches throughout Canada. The Executive Secretary also finds himself involved in counselling of Christian education leaders in our churches.

#### 8. Special Focus.

In these past few years we have become particularly aware of the following:

a. A need for local churches to take training of workers at the local level much more seriously.

b. There is a growing concern for adequate curriculum materials, particularly within the Junior to Senior Teen Departments.

c. The sharp decline in Sunday School attendance, particularly in the Adult Department, alerts us to the need to emphasize and build our Adult Departments.

d. There is a keen awareness developing to help families in the process of Christian education. This would include helping parents to be involved in the teaching process and to train young people in preparation for marriage and home life, as well as to offer courses for those who are already married.

#### Report of the Executive Secretary

Dear Brethren and Sisters of the Conference:

Matthew 28:19-20: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age."

This passage of scripture in a large measure spells out the directives for us in our ministries in Christian education. While Christian education may often deal with programming, scheduling, records and training, it is more! It is teaching the Word of God that individuals may be brought to accept Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord and nurtured in Christian growth and discipleship. It is hoped that evangelism and nurture will so much be the focus of our commitments and efforts in Christian Education that programming, scheduling of agencies, while necessary, will always be the means to an end and never become an end in themselves.

After working six years as Executive Secretary with the Board of Christian Education in serving our churches one cannot but help evaluate one's efforts and ministries. Being involved in the interests of Sunday School, Youth Work, Midweek Boys and Girls Clubs, V.B.S. technically music, Christian Education Conferences, publication of the Adult Sunday Quarterly, the Youth Worker, Calendar of Activities and other publications, and ministering to local churches in a variety of ways and special lectures at Bible Institutes constitutes a broad assignment. With that, of course, some frustrations.

In this, however, it has been a privilege to see souls saved, to experience revival and see new commitments made by many as at Banff '71 and other occasions. To have served to help agency leaders, youth workers, teachers and others or to see groups encouraged in their ministry is not only evidence of God's grace but reason to offer Him praise and thanksgiving.

Over the years one also makes observations which become items of

concern and challenge. Let me briefly list some of these in order to alert us and encourage us to do whatever we can at the place where each of us may be serving.

1. There appears to be a declining emphasis and zeal for outreach and evangelism through our Christian Education agencies. While many from our communities may be enrolled in one or another of our agencies, carefully planned follow-through and witness is often lacking. I want to again emphasize that unless we win the parents to Christ we, in most cases, lose the children by age 12.

2. A declining Sunday School attendance is reason for us to be alerted. From statistics and average norms established through samplings, it appears that we may have up to 9,000 members of our own M.B. families in Canada not even enrolled in the Sunday School, not alone to speak of average attendance. The 1971-72 statistics indicate that our Sunday School enrollment is lower than our church membership for the first time since 1958.

3. There is an increasing need to assist parents in building solid Christian homes. The need to offer assistance to parents through instruction and counselling is becoming more apparent. We must also learn how to involve the parents more directly in the process of teaching their children. Our multiple agency approach seems to have given the parents the impression that the church is doing it and therefore they can relax.

4. There is a need for more teaching on discipleship and doctrines and principles distinctive to our faith.

5. Training of teachers and workers at the local church level deserves our attention. Our Service Training Program (S.T.P.), designed to assist churches in this ministry is presently being revised and should be available to our churches early this fall.

6. There is a need for cell groups which are meeting for Bible Study, fellowship and evangelism to be more closely aligned with the church, in order to conserve the fruit by bringing new converts into church for fellowship, nurture, baptism and church membership.

May God grant us grace as we work at these together. Your prayers for this ministry are not only requested but needed as together we seek to serve the Lord.

### Discussion

There was some discussion about the apparent decline in Sunday School attendance. Brother George Epp, Conference Statistician, stated that perhaps the picture had been somewhat distorted by inadequate statistical reporting for the previous yearbook, although a correctional factor had been taken into consideration in the analysis. The picture for 1972 is better. In 1972, Sunday School enrollment figures exceed church membership figures again, approximately by 200.

It moved and seconded that the report be received. Carried.

### B. Recommendations - Board of Christian Education

1. Resolved that the projected Banff '74 Youth Conference be approved.

2. Resolved that we conduct Christian Education Conferences during 1975-76 on a provincial basis in conjunction with the provincial Christian Education Boards.

3. Resolved that we continue to allot \$200 to each province to assist local churches in conducting music workshops in the

areas of church music (including Sunday School singing, children's and youth choirs, senior choirs, congregational singing, music committee organization and function, and instrumental music).

4. Resolved that we recommend to the Canadian Conference of M.B. Churches not to become publishing partners nor co-operating users of the Anabaptist Curriculum as projected in the "Proposal for a Co-operative Curriculum by Churches in the Anabaptist and Believers' Church Tradition".

#### Action

Recommendation 1 - Carried.

Recommendation 2 - Carried.

Recommendation 3 - Carried.

Discussion on Recommendation 4 - Some felt that the materials we are proposing to reject meet our needs better than some materials which are now being used.

It is suggested by others that if present materials are weak in certain areas that this can be remedied by producing materials ourselves, supplementary to what we are using.

A real concern is expressed about the inadequacy of some materials now being used.

Recommendation 4 was carried with the understanding that the accompanying rationale be omitted.

The Board of Christian Education is encouraged to continue to seek ways to bring about an improvement in the instructional materials now being used and to give directions to local churches in these matters.

### VII BOARD OF EVANGELISM

#### A. Report

Chairman George Braun made a brief introduction to the report but did not read the report to the Conference. Committee members were introduced and the respective chairmen were called forward to speak briefly about their spheres of work.

#### Canadian Board of Evangelism

The Apostle Paul in his zeal for the proclamation of the gospel states it thus in I Cor. 9:19-23.

19. "For though I am free from all men, I have made myself a slave to all, that I might win the more.
20. To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews; to those under the law I became as one under the law - though not being myself under the law - that I might win those under the law.

21. To those outside the law I became as one outside the law - not being without law toward God but under the law of Christ - that I might win those outside the law.
22. To the weak I became weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all men, that I might by all means save some.
23. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, that I might share in its blessings."

From this Scripture we note that Paul had an over-riding concern to share the gospel. As individuals, churches and conference, we must continue to have this burden. We believe that the Board of Evangelism has received the mandate to encourage and promote evangelism by every honorable means available to us.

This report is to reflect on the activities of the various phases that come under our jurisdiction. The Board has three distinct areas of responsibility and in order to do justice to them the Board has appointed three Committees to supervise the various phases. The Committees and the members are as follows. Media Committee - Ernie Isaac (Chairman), Ed Lenzmann and Robert Roxburgh; Canada Inland Mission Committee - N. J. Dyck (Chairman), A. L. Klassen, Jake Neufeld; Evangelism Committee - J. M. Schmidt (Chairman), Peter Boschman, Jake Schmidt and Henry Willms. Let me share the work of these Committees with you.

#### Media Committee

You will recall that at our last Canadian Conference sessions the Board recommended that we discontinue the Canadian Gospel Light Hour as of June 1, 1972. This has been done as planned and since then we have explored various approaches. In both radio and television we have tried not to duplicate existing programs of gospel broadcasting. It has been our aim to reach the unchurched and the disinterested person, who may in fact, even be hostile to the gospel. The Media Committee has participated with other Mennonite groups (Mennonite Church, General Conference Mennonite and Mennonite Brethren, U.S.A.), in a joint production of a fifth series of television 'spots'. This series of two 'spots', encourages viewers to consider Jesus' way of forgiveness and loving acceptance. The one, 30 seconds, shows a young couple involved in a loving, forgiving reconciliation. The other 'spot', 60 seconds, depicts a phone booth scene and a conversation between a run-away teen-age girl and her parents. These 'spots' are being marketed across Canada and the United States and will be shown by more than 500 television stations on free time valued at more than a million dollars. In Canada, 50 of 72 English language T.V. stations have indicated that they want to show these 'spots'. In addition both the C.B.C. and C.T.V. networks have requested the 'spots' for network showing. If you see these 'spots' on your station we would suggest that you contact your station and express your appreciation to them for showing the same.

The next series of T.V. 'spots' will have, 'Permanence in Marriage', as its theme and will be aimed at the 18-30 age group with the purpose of counteracting the current ideas of marriage as an easily dissolved relationship. Viewers will be challenged to take marriage seriously, as a life-long commitment, as a Christ-centered relationship.

It has already been stated that the Canadian Gospel Light Hour has been terminated. We, however, are still convinced that radio can still be used with good effect. The release, 'Choice' is a program that is produced by Mennonite Broadcasts, with David Augsburg as the narrator-writer, the sponsoring group is again inter-Mennonite.

The program has a 90 second format, heard daily 5 times a week for 13 weeks. The theme of the new series, 'Choice IV', is on living in right relationship to Jesus Christ and to others. These brief, incisive messages are aimed at the 20-40 set and aired during morning and evening traffic times. The last series, 'Choice III', was heard on 32 radio stations in Canada and was placed there by interested pastors, churches, inter-church groups and businessmen.

To date our media ministry has been primarily for English speaking people. At a recent meeting of the Mennonite Radio Television Council (MRTC), of which we are a member, plans were made to investigate the possibility of adapting the T.V. 'spots' and the 'choice' type program for usage on French stations. On another level explorations are also being made to produce a theatre 'short' (5-10 minutes) film with a message, to be shown to theatre audiences.

The use of the media, radio and television as well as film, is a highly sophisticated, expensive venture, in fact far too expensive and complex to go it alone. In the light of this our media ministries are being undertaken in co-operation with other groups. We appreciate the way in which we have been welcomed, as partners in mission, by others who have been very willing to share their experience and expertise with us.

We ask you to pray for us and for 'an open door' in the proclamation of the Good News of our Lord via the electronic media.

#### Canada Inland Mission Committee

This Committee oversees the work in Quebec and Nova Scotia. The work of this Committee is very much like that of a Committee that would be responsible for the Home Mission endeavors in the provinces. Since we do not have provincial Conferences in Quebec and Nova Scotia, the development of the work falls on the shoulders of this Committee.

It is with real joy that we observe the growth of this work and we strongly recommend the work to you and ask for your interest and prayers. We would like to share some of the policies and projections for our work in Quebec and Nova Scotia.

We strongly feel that the churches must become self-governing, self-propagating and self-supporting as soon as possible. It is encouraging to note that one of our pastors, David Franco, is a convert of our witness in Quebec. The Lord is calling another young man, Jean Tremblay, into the ministry. The church of Quebec is endorsing his candidacy. He has completed his training at Bethel Bible Institute. We believe that Quebec must be reached by its own people. We also believe that we must be prepared to give assistance to prospective leaders, through grants and loans. Plans are being finalized for David Franco to go to Paris in 1974 for advanced training. A fund is already in existence for such assistance. When your church may be approached for such assistance we hope to find a ready ear and a willing heart to help along.

A further possibility is being presently explored regarding the establishing of an English speaking witness. It is quite possible that we will again be assisted by Christian Service in establishing such an endeavor.

Presently we have 4 churches in Quebec. The Cartierville Church is located in the suburb of Montreal. David Franco and his wife are providing pastoral care. The church is presently meeting in an Anglican Church and they are hoping for more adequate facilities. This past year they have had several baptisms.

The St. Therese Church is approximately 16 miles north of Montreal. Ernie Dyck and his wife and family are our pioneer workers in

Quebec. We are deeply grateful to them for their untiring efforts. It takes a lot of sticktoitiveness to carry on this work and we praise God for their ministry. Weekly Bible Studies are being conducted with the students of a nearby Catholic College. This ministry has resulted in conversions and baptisms.

Rene Hainaut and his wife and family, former missionaries have good rapport with the French Canadians. Rene is the pastor of the Ste. Jerome Church which is located approximately 35 miles north of Montreal. It is the only evangelical church in this city of 35,000 people. Because of constant growth the church has expanded its facilities. The church has recently added a bus ministry.

Our youngest church in Quebec is in Ste. Agathe which is nestled in the Laurentian foothills, some 65 miles north of Montreal. Dan and Gladys Wolfe and family are the workers in the church. The Wolfes are also former missionaries from Africa. Dan's spirited leadership in the new forming church is providing enthusiasm and vision for extension. A 30-minute gospel program produced and aired weekly over a local radio station, is well received.

The Mount Edward Bible Fellowship group in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, met on January 14, 1973 to commit themselves to the Mennonite Brethren tenets of faith, and thereby to apply for membership in the Canadian Conference. Brother Nick Dyck was able to attend the above named organizational meeting.

The pastor, Isaac Bergen, and the congregation are optimistic about the future of the work. The church is negotiating for the purchase of a fairly new church building complex which would adequately accommodate from 150-200 people. The placement of a Christian Service Unit in Dartmouth has been very helpful in beginning the work. Several former Christian Service personnel have taken up permanent residence after completing their assignment and have become a part of the community. The Christian witness is being extended through home visitation, Kindergarten program, clubs, camping program and, of course, the regular church services.

We want to encourage you to remember our brothers and sisters in Quebec and Nova Scotia in prayer. We also encourage you to personally acquaint yourselves with the representatives from the two provinces.

#### Evangelism Committee

Before I report on the ministries of the brethren Rudy Boschman (Evangelist) and Jacob J. Toews (Executive Secretary of Evangelism), allow me to share some of the areas in which the Board has been involved. Through Conference action and endorsement the Board has encouraged the constituency to participate in at least three major endeavors that relate to Evangelism.

In April of 1972 the All-Mennonite Consultation on Evangelism convened in Minneapolis. An estimated 2,100-2,400 Mennonite delegates came together to "Probe" into Evangelism under the Convention theme, "The Gospel of Christ that Reconciles". Dr. Myron Augsburger, the Committee chairman, stated, "This may be the moment of the greatest opportunity for the Mennonite Church". He said, "I refuse to see a tension between service and witness. Service does not replace evangelism, service authenticates the word of evangelism by its demonstration of compassion". Our regret was that only a very limited number of Canadian Mennonite Brethren attended this Consultation. Rudy Boschman and J. J. Toews and 2 members of the Board attended these sessions.

In June of 1972 another great happening in evangelism took place in Dallas, Texas, called Explo '72 sponsored by Campus Crusade for

Christ. No doubt you have followed the coverage of this event through local newspapers, T.V. news releases and church periodicals. Statistics indicated that 81,500 people had registered and many others attending brought the number to over 100,000. The impact of such a happening cannot be measured by numbers. We are convinced that individuals' lives have been changed and this has effected changes in churches and communities. Both our men active in Evangelism were in attendance.

"Calling our Continent to Christ," has become a caption that is familiar to many of us. This is the theme that has been set for what is known as a unique, simultaneous, continent-wide evangelism thrust for 1973. In short this emphasis is known as Key '73. As a Canadian Mennonite Brethren we have leant this emphasis our support. From news releases a number of our Mennonite Brethren Churches are involved on various levels. We are not so much concerned that we be involved on an organizational level but that we together with fellow Canadians and Americans confront our countrymen with the claims of Jesus Christ. We have been encouraged and criticized for our anticipation. Personally, I am convinced that we could have provided tremendous leadership in evangelism had we arisen to the challenge. We would still like to encourage local congregations to give evangelism a heavy thrust through this emphasis. Brother J. J. Toews has spent part of his time promoting Key '73.

Now we want to briefly reflect on the ministries of Rudy Boschman and J. J. Toews. These men are both involved in evangelism programs. Their ministries are different, yet we feel that they complement each other.

Rudy Boschman's ministry has been geared more particularly to campaigns and Crusades. During this past year he has been in many of our churches. In his report to the Board he states, "It is difficult to put into words what one sometimes feels in the ministry and so it seems that the Psalms are very appropriate to describe feelings that one has when one wants to express himself in regards to God's goodness and God's leadings. Psalm 105 sums up my feelings at this moment. "Thank the Lord for all the glorious things he does; proclaim them to the nations. Sing His praises and tell everyone about His miracles. Glory in the Lord; O worshipers of God, rejoice. Search for Him and for His strength, and keep on searching".

Rudy's ministry has been in camps, in churches, by himself, and in Team Crusades. Over the years many churches and areas have requested a Team Crusade. The members of the Team are Rudy Boschman, the evangelist; Ron Carleton, accompanist; Abe Block, Menno Kroeker, Bill Schroeder and John Block comprise the quartet. Because of their versatility they are able to minister to a broad audience. The response in most of these meetings has been very encouraging. The Team has also served a number of churches in the United States. The Crusades in churches and areas are set up in such a way that the calling church or area underwrites the ministry of the Team. Rudy receives his remuneration from our Conference. We praise the Lord for the ministry that they have rendered. Exhibit 1 gives you an insight as to how their ministry is accepted.

Rudy has also conducted campaigns apart from the Team and again the response to these meetings is refreshing. We can say with some certainty, that the response in the meetings is often in direct proportion to the time that has been spent in preparing for the meetings.

We thank God for Rudy's ministry and we want to continue to remember him and his family and the families of the Team members in our intercessory prayers.

Brother J. J. Toews has continued his ministry of Church Instit-



utes and Missionary Conferences. The Board of Missions and Services underwrites the expenses involved in the Missionary Conferences. The summer of 1972 was primarily used for Missionary Conferences in both Canada and the United States. Many weekends were also devoted to Missionary Conferences. His major work has been in the conducting of Church Institutes. The following areas have benefited from such Institutes. The churches in Western Manitoba, Brandon, Alexander, Justice, Boissevain and Killarney were served during September to December 1971. January to the end of March, 1972, were used to conduct Church Institutes in the Clearbrook area, including Bakerview, East Aldergrove, Matsqui, Clearbrook, Central Heights, South Abbotsford and King Road Churches. During September through December, 1972, Church Institutes were conducted in the Chilliwack area, churches including Arnold, Yarrow, Greendale, Broadway, East Chilliwack and Harrison Gospel Chapel. From January through March, 1973, the churches of Ontario including Scott Street, Virgil, Niagara Christian Chapel, Orchard Park, Kitchener and Vineland had these Institutes.

The Church Institutes have a three-pronged approach. One of these prongs is the Friendship or Visitation Evangelism. This approach involves the training of one man and one lady in the matter of making friends for the church and the Lord in the community where the Church is located. The ultimate aim of such friendships shall be to introduce people to Jesus Christ. The training program involves both classroom and field experience. Those who availed themselves of this opportunity were most appreciative. Read the testimonies of pastors in Exhibit 2 and 3.

A second prong of Church Institutes are the lectures, "Happy Family With a Purpose". Brother Toews writes, "Here we seek to enroll as many people in each church as possible, including grade nine and up. The enrollment varied from church to church, depending on various factors. Wholehearted support of the pastor and the leadership of the church for these Institutes also was very significant in each instance. In some of the churches the enrollment went above the 100 mark, and others it was as low as 30. However, those who did enroll and participated usually retained a keen interest right to the last session of the 10-week period".

"During the enrollment we always stressed that church people shall bring non-church going people to these courses. In some instances this has been done, but we do not consider ourselves to have been too successful in making this course an evangelistic thrust in different communities."

The third prong is Group Dynamics or Fellowship Evangelism. This course aims for a maximum enrollment of 24 participants, 6 young people, 6 ladies, 6 men, and 6 from a mixed adult Sunday School class. The aim is to give the participants an experience in true Christian fellowship and then teach them that New Testament fellowship always expresses itself in a concern, not only for each other, but also for those in spiritual need. The enrollment in this course has also been quite encouraging; however, some participants withdraw when they learn what true fellowship really entails. It is hoped that these small groups may continue to nurture fellowship and become a dynamic evangelistic cell used by God to reach others for Him.

Thus far these Institutes have been primarily conducted in our own constituency. There is considerable interest in other churches for such a ministry and Brother J. J. Toews and the Board are contemplating to open such Institutes to churches in a community who are not necessarily Mennonite Brethren. Arrangements for such involvement could be undertaken by a Ministerial Association.

Presently, Brother J. J. Toews is on a six-month loan to the



Board of Missions and Services, and he is serving churches in South America. Included in this report is a letter known as Exhibit 4 that was addressed to his relatives and friends in which he entails his ministry in South America. We recommend him and his wife to your intercessory prayers. May God richly bless his ministry.

Brother Toews will be returning on September 18 and will conduct a further Institute in Northern Saskatchewan. We are looking forward to his return.

As members of the Board of Evangelism we are keenly aware of our responsibilities as well as our limited abilities. We are, however, aware of the limitless resources that are ours in Christ. We wish to thank you for your prayerful interest and support and want to encourage you to continue to pray for the activities of the Board of Evangelism.

#### Exhibit 1 - Church Institutes

The Church Institutes with Brother J. J. Toews have meant a great deal to us as a church. An early attitude of apprehension soon gave way to a spirit of enthusiasm. As a pastor I would heartily endorse these Institutes and the work of Brother J. J. Toews.

In a particular way, I would wish to single out the course we were most apprehensive about; namely, Visitation Evangelism. Our church is one of the original M.B. Churches in B.C., established in 1932. It has known all the so-called barriers of culture and language. This may partly explain our apprehensiveness, wondering how a community we knew so well would respond. The experience has, however, made us aware of many friends and open doors in our community.

Prior to Brother Toews' coming I had heard, read and even participated in workshops based on the James Kennedy approach to visitation evangelism. I had even taught a series of lessons in our church on this approach and was now at the stage where I was to move out with my people. It was in this area that I received the greatest benefit from Brother Toews' ministry. It was timely both for me and for the church. We were able to explore various other facets of visitation evangelism and then apply them in a practical way to our own community. I personally enrolled in the course, along with a Sister from

the Church.

In selecting homes for visitation, we concentrated on two categories; a) Homes already in contact with the church through Sunday School, V.B.S., Youth and Clubs, b) New people in our community. In no case did we encounter a closed door or a strained relationship. As far as results, one mother invited Christ into her life as a result of a follow-through visit. Along with this, we feel we have gained many friends in our community. Our objective was simply to leave a positive blessing through personal contact. We feel that this was accomplished.

For those involved, there is a new community awareness; for those visited, there is a new church awareness. Tonight we will be moving out in two groups of three, hoping to contact a minimum of four homes. The unknown causes us to tremble, but the One whom we know gives us confidence.

1. The HAPPY FAMILY Course proved very appealing to young people, as well as parents and older people. I only wish that the whole congregation had attended. The questions of young people concerning dating and marriage were dealt with from sound, biblical perspectives, yet practical. The related matters such as divorce, remarriage, abortion, pre-marital sex were discussed in a spirit of openness, yet always maintaining the spiritual priorities. I appreciated particularly the lectures on communication between husband and wife as well as youth and parents. These were very helpful.

2. The GROUP DYNAMICS Course offers some valuable insights on group methods. Its success depends very much on the willingness of participants to give themselves realistically. Regularity in attendance is very significant if groups are to become effective. I believe the principles will be very helpful in establishing fellowship groups or Evangelistic Bible Studies.

3. The personal evangelism instruction has been well received by the participants and has made them willing to remain involved in visitation and also training others.

### Exhibit 3 - Crusade Evaluation

The week of Crusade Evangelism at Elmwood Mennonite Brethren Church, April 22-27, 1973, has been a blessed experience. It had been many years since meetings of this type had been held at Elmwood.

Some concerns had been voiced before hand by certain members, for example, the music of the Messengers is too loud, Rudy Boschman is too emotional and response to the invitations is due to stirred-up emotions. The ministry was greatly appreciated by the majority of our congregation.

We found the Team sensitive to our situation and needs and willing to adapt. I was happy to note that Rudy Boschman is using various methods in calling for a commitment, namely personal private commitment; those who desire to experience victorious Christian living were invited to stay for a work shop and some 70 responded; and the more traditional altar call was used only on the last two nights.

Our records show that some 38 individuals were counselled. Of

these 12 were for salvation, 8 for reaffirmation or assurance, 10 for cleansing and restoration, and 8 for dedication and filling of the Holy Spirit. Many visitors attended the nightly meetings and we count it a privilege to share the gospel message with friends who attend and respond to the straight forward proclamation of God's Word regardless of church affiliation.

We are praising God for what he has done among us these days. The work of the Team has been deeply appreciated. Somehow their message comes through with conviction and you feel the enthusiasm for their work and their love for the Lord. It is our sincere prayer that we may be faithful in following up those who have taken new steps of faith and help them to grow in grace and knowledge of their Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

#### Exhibit 4 - Letter to Relatives and Friends

"For they themselves show of us what manner of entering in we had unto you and how you turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God." (I Thess. 1:9)

We are not only saved to go to heaven, but to serve the living and true God. This is our desire and Lena and I are praying that we may find Grace in God's sight to do it acceptable. As indicated in earlier communications to you, we are about to leave for the South American assignment. A schedule of our travels and forwarding addresses is herewith enclosed and it would indeed be good to hear from you. But even more do we solicit your prayers for the work in His kingdom. We know that Satan will oppose this effort and will try to make the Word ineffective. We on the other hand want to believe God that He shall condescend to use such earthen vessels as we are to glorify Christ and lift Him up so that He may draw many unto Himself.

In Panama we will visit our mission work among the Indians which the Lord has blessed in a signal way. This work has been done differently than any other work, namely by non-resident missionaries. The question is: How has this worked out? At the same time we also want to check, with the people on the field, our manuscript which we have written regarding the development of the work there, to make sure that we have things as accurately as possible. We will be checking manuscripts in the other places too where we are going, hoping that it will add to the completeness of the records.

In Colombia we are to minister to the national church leaders with the Word and thereby seek to meet certain needs which are crucial in that field. God has already worked on the hearts of the nationals and we trust that we can be used to further establish His cause in his people.

In Quito, Ecuador, we will be taping messages to be released simultaneously with the evangelistic work in Santa Catarina, Brazil. The release of these messages simultaneously with our evangelistic work in various communities will greatly supplement efforts. It will be a heavy schedule for we will need to tape enough messages for the duration of our stay in Brazil.

We are taking a day or two in Peru to visit Cusco and do some other sightseeing and then make an on-the-spot survey of mission work in Bolivia.

In Paraguay we will have three weeks of missionary conferences and deeper life meetings with our churches in the various colonies and also survey the work which is being done among the Indian people.

In Uruguay, too, we want to visit the churches that are there and see what potential for missionary outreach there is in the country.

In Brazil, as said earlier, we will concentrate primarily on seeking to reach the German nationals for Jesus Christ in the Santa Catarina province.

On September the 17th we hope to return home, due to arrive in Toronto on the 18th in the morning. There we will pick up all the things which we left behind when we departed for South America and motor to Winnipeg for a few days. We then will continue to Northern Saskatchewan where we will have Church Institutes beginning late September and continue into December, 1973.

For Christmas we hope to be back in Winnipeg. We feel often quite lonely in our task, not being able to contact you as often as we would like. But our prayers can meet at the throne of grace and if Jesus Christ is glorified, that shall compensate for anything that we may be foregoing while we are away from you.

May God's choicest blessings rest upon you, yours and your labours for Him.

#### Media Committee Report - Ernie Isaac

This committee has been involved mostly on an inter-Mennonite level. The possibility of co-operating with the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada presently exists. A sample viewing of the Mennonite Broadcast T.V. spots was made.

#### Canada Inland Mission

Nick Dyck briefly introduced the work of the Canada Inland Mission. Isaac Bergen, pastor of the Mount Edward Bible Fellowship Church in Nova Scotia brought greetings from that province and briefly reported on the work in that province.

Nick Dyck introduced Rene Hainaut who gave a lively report on the work in the centres of St. Agathe and St. Jerome. Rene Hainaut is the chairman of the fellowship of Mennonite Brethren churches in Quebec

Ernie Dyck then briefly outlined his work as pastor of the Ste. Therese Church in Quebec. He introduced Pierre Boisclair, deacon at the Ste. Therese Church. Ernie reported an increasing readiness to accept the gospel. In the last three years the church in Ste. Therese has doubled. Bible studies have been used as an effective means of evangelism.

The chairman notes that prayer for the work in Quebec is requested and that Quebec must be won by citizens of that province.

#### Closing

Jacob Doerksen invites the delegates and guests to be the dinner guests of the province of Alberta. The invitation is graciously received.

Rev. T. Rendall of P.B.I. is introduced. He welcomes the Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference to the campuses. He states that the disposal of the campus facilities to the Conference is an expression of gratitude for Mennonite Brethren support of P.B.I. He invokes God's blessing upon the conference and closes the session with prayer.

#### Sixth Session - Tuesday Afternoon, July 10, 1973

This sixth session was opened with the singing of "To God be the Glory" and "Revive Thy Work".

Message - "The Church" - H. H. Voth (Manitoba)

## Introduction

1. I Timothy 3:14-15 - Paul refers to the church here as:
  - Household of God
  - Pillar and bulwark of truth

The connotation of these terms is very rich and significant - the church is not incidental or peripheral in the work of God here on earth. It is not so in our understanding as set forth in our statement of faith.

2. The significance attached to church - partly demonstrated by fact that almost 2 pages out of a total 11 pages devoted to setting forth what we believe concerning the church.

3. A real concern in the formulation of this Article has been to base it on Scriptural foundation. Twenty separate references stand above the wording of these articles. Perhaps this was done for the same reason as that which moved the formulation of the 1900 Confession of Faith to state in the introduction to that statement: These Scripture references stand in the text (of the Confession of Faith) not under the text. With this we wish to say - the words of the statement of faith are not to be taken as of the same authority as the inspired Word of God ..... our confession stands under the Word of Scripture not with it.

I We affirm the church to be a Unity and also a Universal Church.

1. It is universal and yet also restrictive. Universal in that it recognizes no restrictions in national, racial, social, cultural differences. This also speaks for its essential unity in the presence of denominational differences. Unity - not geographical, organizational.

2. But we do affirm that there is only one basis on which this unity and universality can be established:

- a) not - on common bond of humanity
  - on the acknowledgement of the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man
  - on common assent to certain moral or religious truth - e.g. non resistance
  - on common concern for human happiness and well-being.
- b) rather - statement specifies clearly that the unity of the universal church demands:
  - believers regenerated by faith in Christ
  - cleansed by His blood
  - baptized by His Spirit
  - separated unto God

This common work of God's Spirit in our lives makes us one.

3. In those who thus relate to Christ, the Spirit works this oneness of essence, distributing among them gifts for the up-building of the believers and the propagation of the Gospel.

II We further affirm that this Oneness ought to be given concrete expression in the local congregation, in conferences and in co-operation and fellowship with believers in other Christian groups.

1. No believer is called to live, to work and worship in isolation. Rather he is to voluntarily unite with others of the same Spirit, through baptism, in a structured program of worship, fellowship, nurture, service and witness.

2. The believer recognizes that, humanly speaking, authority rests in the congregation and not in any one person or group of persons either in the congregation or beyond it. Each congregation regulates its own affairs.

3. Likeminded local congregations affiliate as a conference for fellowship and work. The Conference is representative of

the congregations, not an entity in itself, and expresses the majority understanding and consensus of the individual local congregations. The work it does is carried out in a spirit of inter-dependence, love, and submission to one another.

III We also confess and affirm that the Church is a community of persons who care, and that, in a double sense.

1. Care in that there is a bond of genuine affection and love for one another.
2. Care in that the love they have for each other expresses itself in providing for the Christian nurture of all, in practising discipline among themselves.

- a) This work is done publicly and privately through:
  - public teaching
  - sympathetic encouragement
  - private counselling
  - earnest rebuke

b) The goal of this work is that each member might live a life of Christian discipleship and progress towards spiritual maturity. Then the overall purpose will be realized - "that the church will glorify God in the world."

c) This work is always to be constructive in approach and redemptive in motive and design, even when it may ultimately lead to formal exclusion of a non-repentant person from formal membership. The door of re-entry is to be always open for one who repents, and all members are under obligation to encourage disciplined persons to return.

IV While nurturing and disciplining constitute a very fundamental task of the church, we believe that the primary task of the church is to make disciples. All are to be involved in this primary task in that all are called to be a witness to Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit.

#### Conclusion:

1. This we confess and affirm concerning the church.
  2. This is our ideal - it is good for us to uphold our ideal.
  3. It is also good to relate our ideal to our actual life.
- Is this ideal descriptive of what we really are?
4. In comparison with our past - are we realizing our ideal more fully?

The minutes of the fifth session were accepted as corrected.

Recognition was given to Greg Klassen for the fine work he has done in handling the audio and visual equipment.

Rudy Boschman was asked to report briefly about his work. He shared some of the blessings of the ministry of evangelism in plazas, schools, camps and churches. Many lives have been changed, old and young alike. Married couples and families have been restored.

Rudy Boschman made a request for \$20.00 to provide two Bibles for two lads who recently became Christians.

George Braun thanked Rudy Boschman and the Messengers for their diligent and effective services. He also announced that the gift of \$20.00 requested for the Bibles had just been received from an anonymous donar. The anonymous donar is thanked.

Greetings to the Conference, Isaiah 61:1, were received from J. J. Toews, now serving in South America.

#### B. Recommendations

1. As we reflect upon the work of Evangelism in our Conference we want to thank God for the blessings that have come to people as a result of the various ministries. In a particular way we want to thank Brother Rudy Boschman for his ministry. His cheerful optimistic and contagious testimony has been a challenge to many within our Conference. We wish him success and God's richest blessing for the future.

2. Quebec Property and Building - The Board of Evangelism in consultation with the Board of Management recommends that up to \$25,000.00 maximum (or 50%) be allocated for the purchase and preparation of facilities for local church planting.

3. The Board of Evangelism recommends the appointment of Jean Tremblay as a full-time worker in Quebec.

4. We recommend the acceptance of the proposed budget.

5. We request permission from the Canadian Conference to solicit funds on deputational visits for purchase of camp property in Quebec.

#### Action

All five recommendations are carried.

### IX M.C.C. CANADA

Brother Friesen introduces C. J. Rempel, Ontario, Conference Representative, and Dan Zehr, Executive Secretary.

#### A. Report - Hugo Friesen

##### Introduction

"I am not trying to relieve others by putting a burden on you; but since you have plenty at this time, it is only fair that you should help those who are in need."  
(II Corinthians 8:13-14a)

The above quotation illustrates the compassion which moved the early church when they learned about the needs of their brothers. So too, MCC was born 53 years ago out of the need to help our brothers in Russia. Since that time, people in over 90 countries have been helped through relief and service at the hands of nearly 6,000 workers.

The needs in the world today are many and varied. Out of the stance of servanthood before God and fellowmen, MCC seeks to bring a balanced ministry through words and actions in 36 countries around

the world.

It is the purpose of this report to summarize the 1972 program and the approved projections for 1973. The 28 member board of MCC (Canada) representing 11 conferences and five provincial MCCs acts officially at each Annual Meeting. MCC (Canada) looks to the conference representatives to share the views and concerns expressed at this annual conference and throughout the year.

#### Activities in 1972

1. Voluntary Service - Of 196 volunteers serving in North America in 1972, 83 served in Canada in projects in British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, and Newfoundland. The services rendered include teaching, counselling, recreation, community rehabilitation, ministry to offenders, houseparent roles, etc.
2. Material Aid - During 1972, 420,253 pounds of material aid were shipped from Canada to India, Vietnam, South Africa, Algeria, Bangladesh, Jordan, Paraguay and Nigeria. Of this amount, 215,109 pounds were sent from the Yarrow, B. C. Material Aid Center, and 205,144 pounds from the Kitchener, Ontario Center.
3. Publicity - MCC (Canada) periodically releases news items which supplement the items from MCC in Akron. Four bulletin inserts, known as "News Briefs" were sent to the Canadian churches in 1972. Films and filmstrips are available free of charge from the MCC provincial offices, and many of these are being used. Your evaluation and suggestions for publicity are welcome.
4. Cash Contributions, 1972 - Total cash receipts from the Canadian constituency amounted to \$661,540, compared to \$677,149 in 1971.
5. Government Grants - The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) granted \$113,000 to MCC (Canada) in 1972. This was granted on a matching basis for projects in the countries of Botswana, Bangladesh and Paraguay.
6. Self Help Project - This project received \$22,755 in 1972, compared with \$34,393 in 1971.
7. Russia Concerns - At the time of Prime Minister Trudeau's visit to Moscow, and during Premier Kosygin's return visit to Ottawa, MCC (Canada) made representation on behalf of numerous Mennonite families that wished to be reunited. Many of these requests have been granted. There are continuing contacts with our government as well as families in Canada who seek to bring relatives from Russia to Canada. A Russia Concerns Committee meets periodically to advise the MCC (Canada) staff and Executive Committee on further proceedings.
8. Mexico Concerns - A Mexico Concerns Committee has also been appointed to provide counsel to the staff and Executive Committee on problems confronting Mennonites in Mexico. A survey of Mexican Mennonites in Canada is underway to determine what adjustment problems they have and what assistance they may need. Canadian immigration policies have also been shared with Mexican Mennonites through German papers.
9. Mennonite Disaster Service - The Canadian Mennonite constituency responded commendably by providing personnel to assist in the clean up after two major disasters in Rapid City, South Dakota, and Buffalo Creek, New York.
10. Peace and Social Concerns - The Peace Scholarship Program made a slow beginning in 1972. Four scholarships were awarded to students in two Mennonite colleges for peace projects that met scholarship qualifications.

A contribution was made toward the development of a Peace Library



in Conrad Grebel College, Waterloo, Ontario

MCC (Canada) urged the Prime Minister and Leaders of the Opposition to provide an unrestricted immigration policy for the Ugandan refugees who suffered as a result of their country's action. The Prime Minister and other party leaders personally acknowledged MCC (Canada)'s encouragement and offer for assistance with gratitude.

11. Meeting with Baptists of Canada - In June, 1972, MCC (Canada) Executive Committee members and several conference leaders met with Baptist Federation of Canada leaders in Toronto for three sessions of presentations and dialogue concerning Mennonite history and doctrine. The possibility was left open for MCC to invite the Baptists to a return visit where Baptists would relate in some detail, areas of discipleship where they have experienced particular success.

12. Quebec Consultation - With the encouragement of the Mennonite Mission Board of Ontario and of other concerned individuals, MCC (Canada) held a second consultation in Montreal just following the September Executive Committee meeting. This consultation led into the current joint sponsorship of a community services program in Montreal. Presently, MCC (Canada) and the Ontario Mennonite Mission Board, along with the Mennonite Church in Quebec, are co-operating on the project.

13. Inter-Mennonite Leadership Conference - In conjunction with the January Annual Meeting, conference leaders met with the MCC (Canada) Board to familiarize all concerned with the program and concerns of the various conferences and of MCC (Canada). Most leaders remained for the Annual Meeting and contributed valuable counsel to the issues at hand. It was agreed that a second, possibly extended meeting of this type, be planned in conjunction with the January, 1975, Annual Meeting.

#### Projected Plans for 1973

1. 1973 Budget - A budget of \$1,337,866 was accepted for 1973. This will require cash contributions of \$700,000 in addition to over \$100,000 anticipated from CIDA. The value of Material Aid-in-Kind anticipated is \$276,000 and Voluntary Service receipts of \$263,000.

2. Inter-Mennonite Leadership Conference - During the Inter-Mennonite Leadership Conference that preceded the January Annual Meeting, it was agreed that MCC (Canada) together with church conference representatives plan another Leadership Conference for 1975. It is hoped that conference representatives can meet with the MCC (Canada) Executive Committee on September 21-22, to project plans for the 1975 conference. Suggested concerns and issues for such a conference are welcomed through conference representatives on MCC (Canada)

3. Voluntary Service Plans - The Executive and staff were authorized to proceed with the full-time appointment of a Voluntary Service Director in Canada. A person has not yet been secured; however, it will be his responsibility to continue the administration of current voluntary service projects in Canada and to work more closely in conjunction with constituency congregations who wish to have assistance and counsel with voluntary service projects. He will also be expected to give more concentrated effort to the area of native Canadian needs and needs in French Canada.

4. Receiving of Government Funds - The pros and cons of receiving government funds were discussed at length at the Annual Meeting. It was felt that monies which can be wisely used and which do not have objectionable strings attached in terms of MCC's philosophy, should be solicited from the government of Canada through CIDA.

5. Ottawa Presence - It was decided that the question of an

Ottawa office be reopened in MCC (Canada) and that, for this purpose, the pros and cons of opening an office be heard once again at the next Annual Meeting in the form of short papers to be solicited or volunteered for that purpose.

6. Capital Punishment - A statement which called for the abolition of capital punishment was accepted by the MCC (Canada) Board and was sent to all Members of Parliament, with a cover letter which clearly stated that it was being sent from MCC (Canada) and not as representing all Mennonites. About 60 replies have been received from Members of Parliament, the majority of whom agreed with the statement in principle. About 12 were not in agreement and a few others were undecided.

#### International Program

The following are condensed statements with regard to the overall Mennonite Central Committee activity as supported by North American and some overseas Mennonite churches.

1. Financial Summary - The 1972 income of Mennonite Central Committee totalled \$6,829,000. Of this amount, \$3,386,000 was in cash, while \$2,842,000 worth of material aid-in-kind was received. European churches contributed \$32,000 and Latin American churches \$3,000. The balance was received through Teachers Abroad Program earnings, Voluntary Service earnings, contributions for peace, trainee program, Mennonite Disaster Service, Mennonite Mental Health Services, and several smaller items.

2. Personnel - in 1972, 759 persons served with MCC, of which 194 were Canadians, an increase of 21 over the previous year. This is encouraging from the Canadian perspective; however, current applications are down in numbers and there is some cause for concern about the apparent reduced interest in our constituency to volunteer for service assignments.

3. Material Aid - Material Aid supplies totalled 1,221,582 pounds from the five material aid centers, compared to 1,346,580 pounds in 1971. The intent is to hold the line on the number of pounds received at the five material aid centers because of decreasing program efforts in cold climate countries. The desired direction was realized at the three centers in Kitchener, Reedley and Yarrow. The centers in the eastern half of the United States increased because large contributions of clothing were received originally intended for flood victims in the States, but not needed. The 1972 total was 9% less than in 1971 and 10% less than 1970.

As Mennonites and Brethren in Christ, we are all part of MCC. It is dependent on our financial, personnel and prayer support. The most important contribution to MCC is dedicated Christian personnel. MCC needs well over 300 again this year. We encourage pastors and teachers in our churches to lay the challenge before our youth to serve in the Name of Christ.

Your MCC (Canada) Representative(s)

Brother Friesen did not read the report but rather referred to the report as it was submitted to the Herald in the Conference insert, June 15, 1973. He referred to some of the issues and concerns contained in the report. He stated that MCC (Canada) is looking for a Voluntary Service Director and asked for suggestions. Also, it was mentioned that MCC needs more voluntary workers and that we should encourage each other to respond.

Executive Secretary, Dan Zehr, also addressed a few words to the delegation. He brought greetings from the fields: From the Art DeFehrs in Bangladesh, the Neil Janzens in Calcutta, the Dennis Neu-

manns in Nepal. He further shared some of the experiences he had with these people and expressed appreciation and admiration for their work.

A telegram was read from Walter Kroeker, Conference Representative to MCC (Canada), expressing concern about some of the activities of MCC and urging that the Conference Moderator attend executive and MCC director meetings.

It was announced that Hugo Friesen is on the Executive of MCC (Canada) and that H. H. Dick, Fresno, is on the International Executive.

#### Discussion

1. Approval was expressed that MCC involves itself in social issues.
2. MCC was encouraged to continue to accept funds from government agencies like CIDA and to use it for MCC purposes. It was noted that no political strings are attached to these funds but that they must be matched by MCC money.
3. General support for MCC policies and activities was expressed.

It was moved and seconded that the Conference pay the cost of travel for our Moderator to attend the Annual meetings of MCC. Carried.

It is further explained that MCC is not involved in any way with the World Council of Churches but sends an observer on invitation to the meetings of the Canada Council of Churches.

### X BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS

#### A. Report

#### Report of the Board of Publications to the Canadian Conference, July 7-10, 1973

The Board of Publications has been happy to serve the Mennonite Brethren community for another year. Our prayer is that during the last twelve months no one will have been untouched by the Word of God, that everyone will have been helped to become a better Christian and to serve the Lord more effectively. Our specific mandate is to achieve these ends by encouraging the publishing and the reading of good Christian literature.

#### Mennonite Brethren Herald

During the past year Brother Peter Klassen has very ably, and with dedication, served as editor. There has been a slight change in character of the paper, but this only shows that he has really put his heart and his soul into the work! The Board would like to thank Brother Klassen for his work during this year.

Brother Harold Jantz, our regular editor, has spent the last year studying and working in Ontario for about six months, then travelling rather extensively in Central and South America. We have enjoyed his interesting and stimulating reports in the Herald during this period. The Jantzes returned from South America in May and will spend the summer in Canada completing some of the work which was initiated earlier in the year. We look forward to Brother Jantz's re-

suming the editorship of the Herald in September.

Currently about 8,300 copies of the Herald are being printed. During the past year the printing process has been changed, so you may have noticed slight typographical irregularities. These have only been temporary, and we hope to continue the good quality of production which we have come to expect.

The Herald comes into most of the homes in our conference, and as such can have a considerable influence. We hope that it helps the members of our constituency in their faith and inspires them to better Christian living. This does not mean, however, that everyone will agree to all aspects of everything that is published. We feel that in a live vibrant Christian community it is necessary to have a forum of discussion. Times change, and so ideas and problems change. Certain basic truths are unequivocally part of the belief of a true Christian, but many aspects of our theology and practice are open to honest difference of opinion! Brotherly dialogue between members of our constituency can only help in the search for Christian truth and the unity of the Brotherhood in the long run.

Several conference agencies, such as the Board of Missions and Services and the MCC make use of our periodicals quite regularly. It is sometimes felt, however, that other branches could benefit by providing more information to our Brotherhood through this vehicle of communication.

#### Mennonitische Rundschau

Brother Erich Ratzlaff continues as the editor of our German weekly publication. We thank him for his dedication and excellent work. We realize that to a large extent the continued interest of the readers is due to his efforts.

At present about 5,600 copies of the Rundschau are mailed weekly. There is a steady decline in the readership due to natural attrition, and we expect this decline to continue. For the present, however, we feel that our German speaking members are well served by the Rundschau and look forward to continuing our service to them while it is necessary and appreciated. In July of this year a special anniversary edition will be published to commemorate the 50th year of publication of the Mennonitische Rundschau in Canada!

The Board of Publications feels that the Rundschau is a vital link in the world-wide M.B. Conference. At the present time about 750 copies go to South America and 300 to Europe. There are few other methods of communication that can bring our brotherhood together as closely. In the past the General Conference has subsidized the sending of the paper to South America, but now this support is being withdrawn. We feel, however, that this link with our brethren is important enough to maintain, important enough to subsidize if necessary.

Generally speaking the reader response to the Rundschau is good. The editor feels, however, that more articles and reports from the younger members of the constituency would be desirable.

We hope that both the Herald and the Rundschau will continue to be vehicles for the proclamation of God's Word and for the fellowship of true believers.

#### Fellowship Bookcenter

Our bookstore is a joint venture of the Canadian M.B. Conference and the General Conference of Mennonites. Co-operation between the conferences has been excellent and no major problems have arisen.

Harold Petkau is the Bookcenter manager, and has been very enthusiastic in his work. Mailorder and retail business are gradually in-

creasing; Brother Petkau and Brother Kornelson have had displays at various church conventions and have visited many churches in the interests of the Bookcenter.

During the past fiscal year (year end is September 30) the store has operated at a slight loss (\$4,400, of which \$1,900 is depreciation expense). In the first eight months of this year there has been a substantial increase in sales (22%) and we expect the year end statement to show improvement. Success of the operation, however, must be measured by how many readers are affected by the books and materials we sell, not necessarily by the profit-loss statement.

When the original agreement to merge bookstores was made with the General Conference, it was felt wiser to continue the operation on the second floor of the Christian Press at 159 Henderson Highway in Winnipeg. Now almost two years later, it is felt that the "temporary" arrangements we began with are inadequate, and that it is time to follow the second part of the agreement. At the present time we are actively considering alternative sites for the bookstore, though no specific arrangements have been made as yet.

#### The Printshop

The presses are rolling in our printshop. At the January, 1973, meeting of the Council of Boards purchase of new equipment was allowed; a photo-composition machine was installed in March and a new camera in April. We feel that our conference is well served by having a modern efficient plant with competent personnel. This allows the production of high quality printed material at a reasonable cost.

Publication of the Herald and the Rundschau represents about 40% of the work of the shop, with the rest being job printing. Under the management of Don Kornelson, we have a substantial profit from the management of the shop for this year (about \$14,000). Brother Kornelson is also the overall Christian Press manager, in this capacity working with the two periodicals and the Bookcenter.

#### Publishing

During the past year we have considered our conference mandate a little more carefully. We feel that the time may have come to think of stepping into the publishing field more actively. Up to this time we have printed books for other organizations and left the marketing up to them. Recently several exciting possibilities of publishing books have been considered. We are currently studying the possibility of marketing by ourselves or in conjunction with other organizations; various methods of financing have been discussed and will need further study.

Would the conference be ready to accept the risk of slight financial loss in order to make sure that good Christian literature reaches the market place? Perhaps this would be a worthwhile investment!

1. Resolved that the conference agencies more actively supply our periodicals with information relating to their ministries.
2. Resolved that the Board of Publications send an observer to the meetings of the Mennonite Publishing Service.
3. Resolved that the Board of Publications pursue a more active policy in the publishing of books. Initially this would mean proceeding on a limited scale, and then continue, depending on a review of sales and other objectives attained.
4. Resolved that an editorial assistant be appointed for

the M.B. Herald. This would take the form of a Christian Service Worker assignment, and be subject to review in one year.

5. Resolved that we continue to partially fund the distribution of the Mennonitische Rundschau in South America.

#### Action

All the recommendations of the Board of Publications were carried.

#### Discussion

1. In view of the economics of publishing and printing and in view of the desire for greater co-operation with the U.S. Brethren, should we consider entering into a joint printing and publication venture?

The Chairman replies that this is probably inevitable.

2. Should the Rundschau be amalgamated with another German Mennonite paper, Der Bote?

The M.R. editor feels that there are many readers who find spiritual nourishment from the M.R. Many of these are from other denominations other than Mennonite.

There is considerable concern regarding controversial articles in the Herald. Editorial policy should reflect this concern.

### XI BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Brother Block introduced the members of his board.

#### A. Report - H. J. Block

Luke 6:38 - "For if you give, you will get! Your gift will return to you in full and overflowing measure, pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, and running over. Whatever measure you use to give - large or small - will be used to measure what is given back to you.

It has pleased the Lord to bless our Board in the past year with love for one another and for the assignment the conference has given the Board of Management.

The responsibilities include:

- a) The management of all conference assets, including our Bethesda Institute.
- b) The administration of all Conference finances.
- c) To try and interpret the giving trends and patterns of the constituents.
- d) To examine and co-ordinate all conference paid personnel in respect to salary and employment conditions.
- e) To deal with all technical matters involving government action which may effect charitable institutions.

The Board of Management has attempted to carry out these responsibilities in love and according to the wishes of the brotherhood.

Much of our work is routine and a lengthy report would be superfluous. Only one particular action deserves time during this late hour of this conference.

After careful analysis of the Bethesda Farm, as to its usefulness to the Institute and the financial benefits, the Board decided to sell the farm which consisted of 96 acres and improvements.

An actual sale opportunity was presented to the Board and accepted.

The net result of this sale was \$100,000.00 cash and a \$26,000.00 mortgage due and payable within one year.

You will be asked to ratify the actions of the Board by a recommendation that we will place before you.

#### Treasurer's Report - J. J. Riediger (see following pages)

Brother Riediger read the auditor's report. It was moved and seconded that the auditor's report be adopted. Carried.

#### B. Recommendations

1. Resolved: That the Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Church of North America sell the property commonly known as "The Bethesda Farm: to Henry Brennkelman at and for the sum of \$126,000.00, the sum of \$100,000 to be payable in cash on closing and the Conference to take back a mortgage for the balance of \$26,000.00, repayable without interest within twelve months of the date of closing.

2. To accept the budgets as presented by the Conference Boards for the Conference Year 1973-74. (See page 96)

#### Discussion

The sale of the Bethesda Farm is discussed. It is explained that the operation is no longer profitable. At one time the farm provided an outlet for labour but since the switch to mentally retarded patients has taken place that is no longer the case.

The Conference will decide at a later date how to dispose of the money that has been realized from accumulated profits and the sale of the property (\$226,000.00).

The budget is then discussed. A number of changes in the figures were made and explained. These changes related largely to decisions made by the Conference during the course of this meeting. It was moved and seconded that we adopt the budget. Carried.

Brother Riediger, in conclusion, paraphrased Proverbs 22:9 as follows: "Happy is the Conference that teaches and spreads the gospel."

## XII STATISTICAL REPORT - George Epp

### A. Some guidelines in the use of statistical data.

1. Great care needs to be exercised in the reporting of statistical data. Accuracy is essential.
2. There must be a very high percentage of returns if the statistics are to tell an accurate story, i.e. all churches should report.
3. Statistics give only a partial description of the church, e.g. statistics do not measure spirituality necessarily.
4. Averages can be misleading. Very few churches are average.

### B. Some observations based on the statistical data.

1. Membership
  - a) There was a net increase in membership of 3% from May 31, 1972 to May 31, 1973. (2.7% in 1971-72)
  - b) 583 persons were baptized. (789 in 1971-72)
  - c) 521 persons left the M.B. denomination
2. Sunday School
  - a) The total enrollment is 18,486. (15,645 in 1971)
  - b) Twenty-three churches did not report offerings.
3. Week-day Educational Activities  
Total enrollment is 17,092; almost as high as Sunday School
4. Family Life  
Some churches have special needs especially in respect to number of widows. Four churches have approximately two thirds of all the widows. E.g. Clearbrook - 105.
5. Pastoral Work and Services  
Note the trend of decreasing church attendance from Sunday morning (124%), Sunday evening (54%), to midweek services (18%).

### Introduction

Statistical forms were mailed to the pastors of the Canadian M.B. Churches during the latter half of April, 1973. On the whole, the information requested seemed to be conscientiously submitted. The returns were prompt and where reminders were necessary these were received with courtesy. From a total of 124 churches, 119 returns were realized. Of the missing churches, these were small fellowships which were without permanent leaderships or they had ceased existing as fellowships but had not yet been eliminated from provincial conference church lists.

There were some revisions made to the statistical form. Some questions were eliminated and new ones added. A further revision needs to be done. For this I wish to enlist the assistance of pastors. I plan to mail a copy of the present form with an attached questionnaire to the churches. Since the American Mennonite Brethren are also in the process of revising their statistical form, perhaps we can be of mutual benefit to each other. Our objective will be to develop a form which can be completed with greater ease, yet tell the story as accurately as possible.

I expect to send out the 1973 statistical forms early in 1974. Since it is a report of the churches' activities of the calendar year, the reporting need not be delayed into the next year and the information could be processed and perhaps some analysis could be made in preparation for Conference Sunday.

I trust that you will find this the information which has been gathered, not only interesting, but also helpful in assisting all of

us to be better stewards.

A final thanks to all the persons - pastors, secretaries, and church workers - who assisted in the gathering of statistical information. I'll be calling on you again early in 1974.

#### XIII NEW BUSINESS

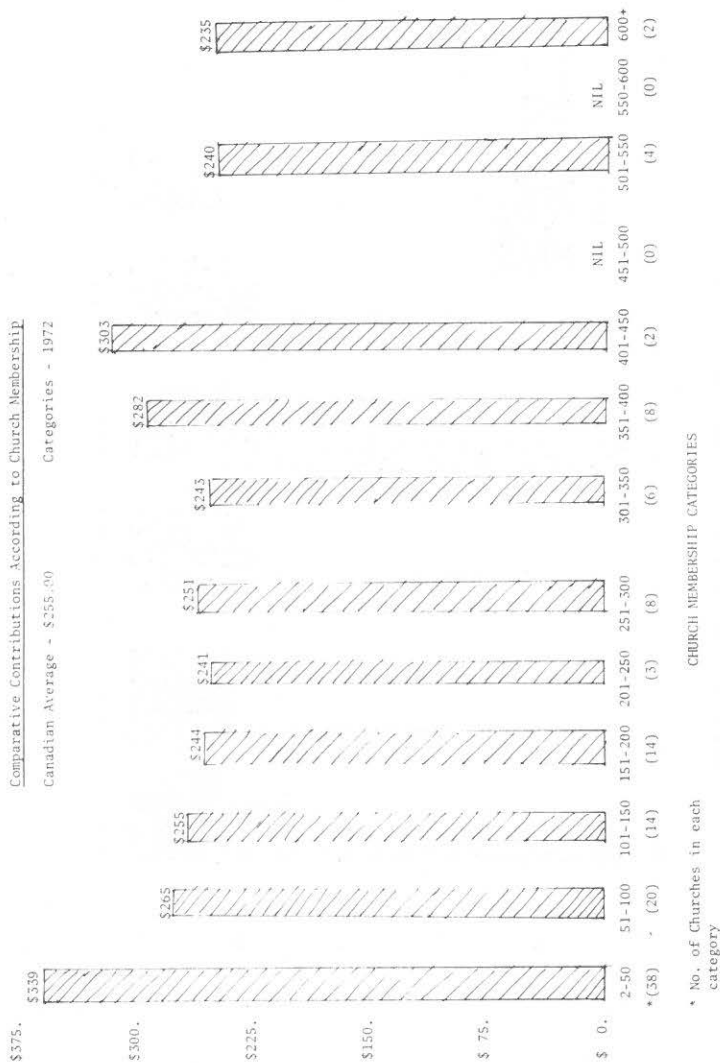
1. 1974 Canadian Conference - It was moved and seconded that the offer from B. C. to host the 1974 Conference be accepted. Carried.

#### Message - "Eschatology" - R. Heidebrecht

I have no intention of dealing with the various schools of interpretation in the realm of eschatology. My objective in this message is to deal with the purpose of eschatology.

Negatively: The eschatological events are not revealed to us in order to gratify the curiosity of those who might seek needlessly to pry into the future.

Positively: The real purpose of eschatological revelation is that of furnishing the light that might be required for present faith and duty. Eschatological truth comes to us to produce a simple trust in God.

Eschatological truth is practical in purpose. As correct eschatology inspires:

#### I Watchfulness (Matthew 24:42,44)

Our Lord says, "Watch for you know not what hour your Lord comes."

##### A. Watchfulness is expressed through faithfulness as servants

True Christians ought to live as good servants.

##### B. Watchfulness is expressed through a possession of an inward Spiritual Power that imparts Light, Warmth, and Value to external religion (The Parable of the Ten Virgins)

Watchfulness is expressed by an inner life of constant communion with the Spirit of God. Spiritual power is gained through personal experience.

#### II Stability (I Corinthians 15:58)

The Corinthians were prone to fickleness. They need instruction in the doctrine of the resurrection. Verse 58 indicates that stability speaks of purpose and purpose speaks of labour. Faith in the resurrection produces a consciousness of boundless and endless power for work.

#### III Holy Living (I John 3:3; II Peter 3:11, 14)

A hope that rests on Christ cannot but have a purifying effect in the life of the one who hopes. The basis of our purity is His perfection. Presently Christians are urged "to lead a life worthy of the calling with which God has called them" (Ephesians 4:1). This calling involves their ultimate being glorified with Christ (Romans 8: 28-30).

#### Conclusion

The teachings on the last things must involve the hearer in decision. If this is not so, then the purpose of eschatology is not realized (II Peter 3:11, 14).

The Business Sessions of the Conference concluded with this message and with a closing prayer.
