MINUTES

A record of 64th Convention of the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches

held at Regina, Saskatchewan, July 6-8th 1975

SESSION I

Sunday evening, July 6, 1975 at 7 p.m. Chairman - Herbert Brandt Secretary - John Neumann

I. Inspirational

- Sing-Song -- Abe Block led the assembly in the singing of "It Is Well With My Soul" and "This Is The Day Which The Lord Has Made."
- Welcome -- The moderator, Herbert Brandt, welcomed the delegates and visitors and expressed appreciation for the large number present.
- Special Music -- The Saskatoon Gospel Tidings Radio Choir un-3. der the direction of Elmer Dick sang two numbers: "The Choir Singer's Prayer" and "Come Holy Spirit."
- Prayer -- The assistant moderator, Eugene Gerbrandt, led in the opening prayer.
- Additional Welcome By Provincial Planning Committee -- Henry Braun, chairman of the local planning committee, expressed words of welcome to all visitors. He further reported that, so far, there have been a total of 955 registrations made up as follows:

5. Motion Regarding Minutes -- the secretary made the following motion regarding the minutes.

That we dispense with the public reading of the Conference Minutes and ask, instead, that the minutes be scrutinized, prior to printing by the members of the conference executive and the assistant secretary.

III. Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns - Chairman, Victor Toews

V. Toews explained that questions have come from different churches
with regard to uniformity of Bibles used in devotional services.
In order to give some guidance on the subject, the Board has asked
a member to write a paper which will be published in the M.B.
Herald.

It was also explained that the "Suggested Procedure and Rationale for the Ordination of Men to the Preaching and Pastoral Ministry" has already been adopted by the Conference, except part E. This has been written in keeping with our Corn, Oklahoma decisions.

Moved that the report of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns be received.

CARRIED

The report follows:

Presenting Several Lively Issues - As a follow-up to the 1974 Faith and Life Convention we are bringing a number of resolutions to this convention. Each of these deals with one of the papers read at that time. It was felt that the resolution dealing with "The Place of Women in the Church and Conference," would require a little more thought than the others and therefore it was submitted by the Conference Executive to the churches. We trust that you have taken some time to discuss it at the local church level and that we are prepared to accept it.

At the Vancouver convention in 1974 a resolution was sent back to our Board to be referred to the churches. After further prayerful study we have sent it to you in a modified form under the heading, "Excommunication of Church Members Involved in Marriage to Unbelievers." We trust that you have considered that the resolution directs itself primarily to the practice of automatic excommunication and only in a secondary way to the problem of marriage. The Board is not sanctioning the practice of believers joining in marriage with unbelievers. We are merely saying that automatic excommunication is not a redemptive measure and should not be used.

We are further presenting to you a "Suggested Procedure and Rationale for the Ordination of Men to the Preaching and Pastoral Ministry." Most of the material in the suggested procedure is taken from the Minister's Manual published by the Board of Christian Literature of our Conference. We have added a section dealing with ministers from other denominations wishing to unite with and to minister in the Mennonite Brethren Church. In that section we have attempted to reflect the decisions reached by the General Conference at Corn, Oklahoma in 1966. We trust that this document meets with your approval and that we accept it as a guideline within our Canadian Conference.

Another question referred to us by one of the provincial conferences dealt with the so-called "levy system" of raising our Conference budget. It is suggested that we change the method to a more acceptable one. Brethren of our Board are in consultation with the Board of Management with respect to this topic. Out of their deliberations the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns will prepare a resolution to be presented to the convention.

Two other provincial conferences are looking to our Board for guidance in selecting a translation of the Bible to be used in the public services. It is felt by some that the use of too many translations, especially those which are paraphrased, could be detrimental in the long rum. Some brethren have already indicated to us that they are not very optimistic that we will reach any consensus in this matter. However, the least that we can do is to come up with a rationale as to why we would adhere to one translation, especially at the local level.

Your Board has attempted to be aware of various phenomena and teachings of our time. In the past we have asked brethren to write biblically oriented papers on these subjects and we have then cooperated with them in the publication. Such a publication under the name of our Board is not to be taken as a Conference decision but certainly as a biblical approach to the problem. We are presently in the process of preparing papers on the occult, homosexuality, marriage and litigation.

At the 1973 convention in Three Hills our Conference made the decision to join the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada for a period of two years. The 1975 convention must make a decision about our membership for the future and we will bring a recommendation.

The Pulpit Committee is a subcommittee of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns and was set up to act as a clearing house for pastors and churches seeking help in the area of the pulpit and pastoral ministry. We believe that as a Conference we have reached a very crucial point in this area. Up until two years ago very little use was made of this service by the churches. However, the picture has now changed. More than ten churches have contacted the Committee in the last year. This might be taken as a sign of encouragement for the committee but we must also inform you that we had only three names of brethren to offer to the churches.

We would like to encourage our churches to undergird the pastoral ministry with prayer. Please pray with us that the Lord of the harvest might send more workers into the field. Local congregations should encourage their young men to consider seriously the call of God to the ministry. We also should not neglect to consider brethren presently in other occupations who, with a little encouragement, might be persuaded to enter the pastoral ministry. Although we have made tremendous efforts and even sacrifices to build up theological educational institutions, let us not forget that they will remain barren if we as individuals and as a Conference neglect to dedicate ourselves to the work before us.

Please remember the spiritual and social concerns of our brother-hood in your prayers.

The Conference then went on to deal with the resolutions. All the resolutions were read first, but dealt with individually. Resolution #1 'Man and Woman Under the Lordship of Christ in the Home and the Community."

The eroding effects of a materialistic society on the family and the marriage relationship call for reaffirmation of the Lordship of Christ over man, woman and the family.

In the light of focused truths "highlighting" the Biblical teachings regarding marriage and the family, it is essential that the church reaffirm its acceptance of the revealed Scriptural precepts. It is proposed that local churches assume responsibility in planning teaching and learning situations to re-emphasize the family unit as an institution ordained of God. It is necessary that this reach as much of each local church as possible in circumstances where the persons can become involved in discussion and interaction. We further suggest that local churches utilize the study paper as a basic premise and that the teaching persons utilize the bibliographic resource material.

We further propose that local churches consider training specified persons in the local church in family guidance (pastor, deacon, or ...) and counselling. Potential "family guidance" counsellors should as necessary be subsidized to gain training at recognized clinics so as to aid the local church on family levels. These persons, having the confidence and support of the local church, will become nurturing and healing gifts to families of the church and community.

Resolution #2 "The Place of the Woman in the Church."

In the light of the Scripture both men and women are equal joint heirs of the grace of life (1 Peter 3:7) and in the light of the significant role played by women in the early church, the M.B. Church should rethink its traditional stand with respect to the place of the woman in the church.

The biblical texts which put strictures on the place of the woman in the Church we believe must be understood, in part, in the context of local violations of the rules of propriety, and in the light of the status of womanhood in the first century culture. Since, however, the creation order is not abrogated by redemption (but only its abuse), we must recognize a distinction between the function of the male and female in the church.

In keeping with this freedom Christ has brought, and out of respect for this order of creation, we should recommend:

i. That at this time women should be eligible to be elected as delegates for conferences, as members on church committees and church councils, and for other services they may be called upon to preform from time to time.

ii. Such election should not be made a source of contention and irritation by insisting that there must be women on every committee.

iii. Should local congregations not have the freedom to accept this

practice, they should not be pressured to do so.

iv. In the light of certain strictures which the Scriptures suggest (1 Cor. 14; 1 Tim. 2), the M.B. Church should go on record as not in favour of the ordination of women for the preaching and pastoral ministry. Boards and offices whose work is in the nature of eldership as per the above mentioned passages shall also come under stricture.

Inasmuch as the Scriptures are our guide in all matters of faith and conduct we need to continue to search them under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and to remain open for further enlightenment.

Resolution #3 "Mobilizing our Material Resources Under the Lordship of Christ."

As a Conference we affirm the scriptural principle that we and all that we have belongs to God. In His wisdom God has endowed our church Conference with many gifts including the gift of administration. This includes the ability to manage our material resources.

We, therefore, resolve that the lordship of Christ shall determine the exercise of this gift. In the acquisition and distribution of material wealth we want to be governed by the principles of God's word and not primarily by the standards of our society or business world. The principles of honesty and love to fellowmen shall prevent the exploitation of our fellowmen, be they employers, employees or any other with whom we deal in our business world.

We further affirm that in the expression of our stewardship we want to contribute a significant portion of our income to support the Christian ministries of the church. In this we want to be motivated by a deep love for Christ rather than a desire for a further material reward by God. We want to give realizing that Christ's simple life style is worthy of emulation.

Because we recognize a need for more knowledge and discipline in the area of stewardship we resolve that we emphasize stewardship training in our homes, our churches and our church related institutions.

Resolution #4 ''Mobilizing our Human Resources."

We acknowledge that God has endowed our brotherhood with a great potential of human resources and we recognize our responsibility to use it.

We challenge our leaders to encourage the members to become involved in the work of the Kingdom of God. We wish to recognize those who have received spiritual gifts and we want to channel them into active participation. Furthermore we challenge the membership to obey the scriptural injunction to "earnestly seek the better gifts" (1 Cor. 12:31).

As a Conference we pledge ourselves to create a climate in our churches in which our human resources can develop to their fullest capacity. Too often our service has become so stereotyped that there is not sufficient room for the available gifts. Rigidity of structure stifles activity. We desire to keep our programs tentative, functional and flexible.

Resolution #5 "Excommunication of Church Members Involved in Marriage to Unbelievers."

The New Testament scripture clearly teaches that believers shall contract marriage with believers only (1 Cor. 7:39; 2 Cor. 6:14). It is the responsibility of the Church to teach this clearly and persistently and to encourage obedience to this divine command. Whoever disobeys this command must assume responsibility for accepting the consequences of such action. Since marriage is for

life, even the acknowledgement of disobedience cannot lead to dissolution of marriage. The believing partner of a mixed marriage will be in special need of the help and fellowship of the church to foster his/her own spiritual life and to help win the umbelieving partner. An automatic excommunication seldom, if ever, serves a useful purpose. It is the understanding of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns that marriage of a believer to an umbeliever in itself is not sufficient grounds for excommunication, and unless accompanied by a spiritual condition that warrants such action on scriptural grounds, should henceforth not be practiced.

In cases where local churches feel conscience bound to former practice, those congregations shall not be bound by this resolution.

"Suggested Procedure and Rationale for the Ordination to the Preaching and Pastoral Ministry."

- A. <u>Initiating</u> the Procedure
- 1. The Local Congregation:
 - a. Feels the need and looks for a man to meet that need.
 - b. Recognizes the gift a man has and wishes to acknowledge this and thus gives the man incentive and freedom to serve.
- 2. The Candidate:
 - a. May begin to exercise his call within the church community before the church officially recognizes his gift.
 - b. May share with the Church what he considers to be his call of God.
- B. Provincial Conference Involvement
- To acquaint the wider fellowship with men who are called of God for the ministry.
- To advise a church which may be too hasty in moving toward ordination or to give clarification concerning such ordination.
- 3. To counsel a brother who may be seeking ordination and finds the church reluctant to comply.
- C. The Nature and Procedure of Examination
- 1. The Examiners:
 - a. The local church examines the candidate, and if 75% of the members present support ordination, a recommendation is sent to the Provincial Reference and Counsel.
 - b. The Provincial Conference now shares in the examination:
 - The Board of Reference & Counsel provides the candidate with a questionnaire and requests him to submit 5 copies of his statement.
 - ii. After the candidate's statement is submitted, the Board of Reference & Counsel appoints an examining committee of five ministers, including a representative of the local church wishing to ordain the brother.
 - iii. These brethren study the candidate's statement individually and later collectively.
 - iv. The committee then meets with the candidate to discuss the paper with him, stressing particularly his personal Christian experience, his call to the ministry, and such parts of his statement that may have raised questions in the minds of the examining committee.
 - v. The committee reports its findings to the Provincial Board of Reference & Counsel.

- vi. If the Board of Reference & Counsel concurs with the local church's conviction, all pastors in the respective province shall publish in their churches the name of the candidate and the church desiring to ordain
- vii. If at all possible, the candidate will be asked to give his testimony at a session of the Board of Reference & Counsel, at the Ministers and Deacons Conference, and/or Provincial Conference.

The Purpose of the Examination:

To assess the candidate's call and fitness for the task

To give necessary correction and encouragement

To ascertain that the candidate is well thought of by those both within and also without the church, and that his life conform to Christian ethical principles.

To insure that the candidate has a wholesome motivation and adequate goals, as well as some awareness of his per-

sonal strengths and weaknesses. The Content of the Examination (The Questionnaire): submitted in Writing.

a. Doctrine:

- i. Are you acquainted with the Mennonite Brethren Confession of Faith?
- ii. Are you in agreement with the Mennonite Brethren Confession of Faith?

iii. Will you respect and follow it?

Personal Life (Christian Life):

- i. Have you obtained pardon for your sins and found peace with God through the Lord Jesus Christ; and is the Spirit of God bearing witness with your Spirit that you are a child of God? (Please present a brief statement of your conversion experience.)
- ii. Do you believe yourself divinely called to preach the Gospel? (Please present a statement of your call to the ministry.)

c. Christian Ministry:

- i. What is your concept of the Church its nature, task, and hope; and how do you see your special responsibility toward the church family and the community at large?
- ii. Will you actively support the program of the Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches?
- The Ordination D.

Its Meaning:

The Church and the candidate enter into a covenant relationship in which the church confers upon the candidate a function the ministry of the Word of God in this present age.

Suggested Procedure of Ordination (Minister's Manual 1972, pp

11-13):

- The Candidate: a. : The Lord our God has redeemed and "Dear Brother sanctified you through the blood of Jesus Christ, His Son. Through the witness of the Holy Spirit, the confidence of the local church, and the acknowledgment of the Provincial Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches. He has called you into His special service as a minister of the Word of
 - God, and as a shepherd of His flock. I, therefore, ask you:

- i. Are you persuaded that the Holy Scriptures are the inspired Word of God, the all-sufficient truth for the salvation of souls through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ?
- ii. Do you have the unmistakable evidence and consciousness that you are a child of God?
- iii. Do you believe in your heart, and are you fully convinced that the Lord, the head of the Church, has called you to the Gospel ministry; and do you declare yourself willing to take upon yourself the high and holy calling of a minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ; and are you prepared to accept this calling in harmonious cooperation with fellow ministers, the Church, and the Conference?
- iv. Are you willing to render the services of your calling unselfishly, and with God's help to be an example to the flock in which the Holy Spirit has made you servant. And will you endeavour to learn and perform the duties of your sacred office to the best of your understanding and ability, inspite of hinderances that might be put in your way?
- b. The Candidate's Wife:

 "Dear Sister : The Lord our God has also redeemed and sanctified you through the blood of Jesus Christ,
 His Son, and has called you to assist your husband in his duties as a minister of the Lord.
 - I, therefore, ask you:
 - i. Are you willing to be a help and support to your husband in the ministry?
 - ii. Are you prepared to take upon yourself the denial and sacrifice that such a calling may bring with it? Then will you answer:
- c. To the Members of the Church:

The Lord our God has also redeemed and sanctified you through the blood of Jesus Christ, His Son. Under the guidance of the Holy Spirit you called and acknowledged Brother , as a servant of the Lord and your desired minister. If you are still of this mind, and if you assure Brother and Sister of your prayerful support, so that they may do their work with joy and confidence, I request you to rise to your feet in the acknowledgment thereof.

(Congregation rises to the acknowledgment thereof.)
Our Lord and Saviour, as the faithful and true witness, has heard the pledge and commitment of Brother and Sister

, as well as that of the Church. As your servants of the Lord Jesus Christ, we are therefore prepared to implore God's blessing upon you (Brother and Sister) through prayer and the laying on of hands. (They kneel upon the given signal and hands are laid upon them.)

- 3. The Role of the Ordained Man:
 - a. He is servant of the local church (Christian Community) in some area of the Christian ministry.
 - b. He is open to a ministry within the wider brotherhood.

- E. Ministers from Recognized Denominations Wishing to Unite With and Minister in the Mennonite Brethren Church (1966 Gen. Conf., Corn, Oklahoma, pp 34-36 Yearbook).
 - The minister brother concerned will also complete the questionnaire and be examined according to the prescribed procedure for ordination (C.3. a-c)

 The Provincial Reference & Counsel will examine the brother as in C.1&2, and if satisfied, submit his name for full ministry within the Mennonite Brethren Conference of Churches.

- Church will charge the brother concerned to state openly, that he has accepted the Bible to be the inspired Word of God and the final authority in all matters pertaining to life and doctrine, that he has the inner assurance of being born again, and he has the conviction of being called of God to preach the Gospel, that he pledges himself to work in harmony and in cooperation with the ministering brethren of our conference and to uphold, promote and support wholeheartedly the total program of the Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Churches.
- 4. The Church should be charged to recognize the brother to have been called of God to be a minister of the Gospel, to commit themselves to support him faithfully in prayer, to hear from him the Word of God willingly and attentively and to support him satisfactorily with the material needs.
- He shall be recognized and welcomed as an ordained brother in our Conference.

Resolution #6 "Resolution Concerning Giving in the Canadian Conference."

A request has come from the Alberta Conference to the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns that the Canadian Conference levy be discontinued and that we change to a system of voluntary giving. In studying this request the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns concludes:

- That although there are some flaws in our present mode of financing our Canadian Conference Program, there are also some distinct advantages which are not to be overlooked.
- 2. That although a significant number of members would like to see a change to complete "voluntary giving", the majority appear to have adjusted favourably to the method of giving as practiced in our churches.
- That the readjustment of the former method of giving on the basis of many special appeals would be difficult and the results unsatisfactory.
- 4. That basically we are not now operating on a strict levy basis since no demands are made at the end of the fiscal year to churches and Conferences that have not fully met the anticipated allotments.

We, therefore, recommend to the Canadian Conference:

- That we gratefully acknowledge the benefits that have accrued to us by this long term experiment of assessing ourselves on the basis of membership for the support of our Conference ministries.
- That we continue our present method of calculating our budgetary requirements on the basis of membership, but refrain from the

use of such terms as "levy," "assessment," etc. that imply

3. That where and when it seems advantageous the Conference readjust the percentage of operational income anticipated from Conference grants and/or from special donations.

Resolution #7 "Recommendations by the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns."

1. Regarding membership in the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada. We recommend that we retain membership in the Evangelical

Fellowship of Canada for the next two years.

We recommend that the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns appoint two brethren to represent our Conference on the executive of the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada.

Resolution #8 "Notice of Motion Regarding Reception of Churches into the Conference of Mennonite Brethren."

According to the Confession of Faith of our Conference, a church that is accepted as a member church in a provincial conference at the same time becomes a member church in the Canadian Conference as well as the General Mennonite Brethren Conference. For this reason our practice of formally receiving churches into the Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference is not in harmony with our Confession of Faith. We, therefore, hereby serve notice of motion that we amend our Constitution to correct this situation at our 1976 Canadian Conference.

Resolution #1 ''Man and Woman under the Lordship of Christ in the Home and the Community." CARRIED

Resolution #2 "The Place of the Woman in the Church."

A lively discussion took place. Several amendments were considered. The first amendment, that we add in par. i) after the word "conferences" (in the second line) the words "as members of its boards and committees," was carried. The second amendment after more discussion which moved deletion of the words "and church councils" following "as members on church committees," also in i) was carried by a narrower margin.

The debate ranged over a wide area. The Conference was warned not to "conform with the spirit of the age." It was urged to consider all of the implications of accepting this resolution. Where would it lead us? Would it not make matters more complicated for the future? References were made to various articles by leading breth-ren and other authorities warning against putting women in a place of leadership. Some felt that women, who hold positions on committees in churches already are acting as "elders" in the church because, by merit of their positions on committees, they are also members of the church council in some churches. The matter of interpretation of Scriptures was discussed. The manner in which the Scriptures are used to either support leadership roles for women in the church or to argue against, reflect different approaches to biblical hermeneutics. The Conference was warned that it should be careful about cultural arrogance. It became clear, however, from the discussion that the membership was divided on the

issue and on the resolution as it stood.

The chairman of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns explained that the question itself had arisen from the conference membership and the Board was attempting to come to grips with a problem that exists now in the churches. The Resolution, he said, was the result of many papers and discussions and believed to be an expression of the thinking of the brotherhood. It was hoped that it would unite the Conference rather than divide.

Near the end of the session a motion was made to refer the matter back to the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns for further study and a redrafted resolution to this Conference. This motion was carried.

In answer to a question from the floor, "Should the sisters at the Conference now consider themselves dismissed?," the chairman replied that he would rule that all persons who had come to the Conference as delegates would continue to be treated as delegates. This ruling was heartily applauded.

MENNONITE CENTRAL COMMITTEE (CANADA) REPORT To The Constituent Conferences Summer 1975

INTRODUCTION

This report must begin with a note of gratitude to God and to a constituency that is responsive to human need. The giving to MCC has been most encouraging, and there are also indications that more people are applying for service.

This report summarizes activities of MCC (Canada) for approximately the past year. Since MCC (Canada)'s fiscal year begins December 1, this report will include activities and statistics which overlap two fiscal years.

PERSONNEL

There has been a notable increase in the number of applications to MCC this year, as compared to a year ago. While statistically this is very encouraging, we do find that the level of skills and training tends to be lower on the part of more applicants. This results in the need for more careful screening and may at times be discouraging for some well-motivated, though less well-skilled, applicants. MCC continues to need high-calibre leadership-type persons. This is particularly true in the areas of agricultural development and general leadership overseas.

VOLUNTARY SERVICE

Service programs in Canada continue with prospects for new projects in Newfoundland, northern Manitoba, and probably several other provinces. The services rendered in Canada cover the areas of teaching, work with offenders, relating to handicapped people, and a variety of other community-type services. Within a year or so, it is reasonable to assume that we may approach 100 persons in service in Canada through MCC. Currently there are approximately 70 persons serving in Canada.

FINANCES

A most generous response by the MCC (Canada) constituency has enabled MCC to move quickly into the purchasing of relief goods and services for emergency needs in such areas as the Sahel, Bangladesh, and Honduras In the first six months of this fiscal year, MCC (Canada) has received nearly as much in contributions from the constituency and CIDA (Canadian International Development Agency) as was received in the entire year of 1974. This puts a great deal of responsibility on the directorship of MCC, whose aim it is to expend funds as responsibly as possible.

Over the course of the past year and a half, a further development has been the provincial government arrangements to match certain dollars for overseas development to private agencies, such as the provincial MCCs. Because these funds in turn can be matched by Canadian government resources, it has the effect of quadrupling the amount which our provincial MCCs raise.

MATERIAL AID

Material aid collection and distribution is continuing on a fairly even

scale, with much material being turned into cash through used clothing shops which have been set up in several provinces. This is a good way of turning items into cash, which in turn can be used to purchase appropriately styled clothing for tropical areas in which MCC works.

OTTAWA OFFICE

On May 1 of this year, Bill Janzen began on a half-time basis to serve as Ottawa Office Director. At the time of this writing, he has just begun his assignment, and as time goes on there will be more to report. We hope that Bill Janzen will be able to meet many of the constituents during the course of the provincial annual meetings in the month of November. We believe that Bill has many qualifications, including sensitivity to the wishes of the supporting constituency for this assignment. Beginning September 1 of this year, he will be working in this capacity full-time.

PEACE AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

The MCC (Canada) Peace and Social Concerns Committee is in the process of searching for a full-time staff person to give attention to areas of peace and social concerns. The work of this person will be confined primarily to Canadian concerns, while there is also a joint committee with our U.S. counterpart to give attention to international matters.

One of the items which the joint committee has worked on is the production of twelve 15-minute cassette tape recordings of peace educational materials. These are available through the provincial MCC offices and can be ordered for free use or can be purchased at \$10 per set in Canada. Later the publishing houses of several denominations will also have these lessons in printed form as options to other Sunday school curricula.

IMMIGRATION

MCC (Canada) was invited to share any concerns with regard to the review of Canada's immigration policies by the Minister of Manpower and Immigration. Items on this concern have been shared by both MCC (Canada) and several provincial MCC organizations. Some of these are of a general nature, while others speak to specifics which have grown out of particular experiences in the provinces.

OVERSEAS SERVICES

Special attention is being directed toward the food crisis in many parts of the world today. John Wieler is giving this major attention from the Canadian side as he works together with Edgar Stoesz from MCC in the United States. Educational seminars are being planned on a regional basis in North America at the same time as special efforts are being put forth in Third World countries to increase food production and distribution. Simultaneously, overseas personnel are being encouraged to increase the intensity of educational programs along the lines of family planning.

At the time of this writing, four MCC volunteers are still in Vietnam by their own choice because they felt they did not want to leave the people they have learned to know and love during this difficult time. We have had indirect word that all four are well and working hard with

the settling of refugees and other needed services. MCC also responded by making available \$100,000 worth of canned pork and powdered milk for refugees. Perhaps at the time when this report is shared in the respective conferences, there will be more information available.

In a recent orientation for new MCC volunteers, the writer was favourably impressed with the calibre of spiritual commitment and dedication of those who were accepted for service. Coming from a North American orientation, these people will be in for many severe adjustment needs, but it was encouraging to sense the depth of their dedication to their Lord as they have committed themselves to serve some of needy humanity in the name of Christ.

PUBLICITY

At the last annual meeting of MCC (Canada) the appointment of a publicity, or information services, director was approved, and we are able to announce the appointment of Lydia Penner to this role beginning June 1 of this year. Lydia comes to us with some journalistic experience, as well as a dedication to the task of sharing the information about MCC that will help constituents to become more knowledgeable of the agency which they support so well.

STAFF

Other staff people in MCC (Canada) include John Wieler in the area of overseas food production and development, Reg Toews in voluntary Service in Canada and personnel recruitment and processing, Menno Wiebe as Native Concerns Director, Eric Olfert as assistant to John Wieler, and secretaries Martha Dyck, Judi Rempel, Shirley Dyck, and Jennifer Lau. Sarah Reimer serves as Office Accountant, and Daniel Zehr continues to serve as Executive Secretary.

The MCC (Canada) office and board are always happy to receive questions or comments on the work of MCC.

Hugo Friesen, British Columbia Kurt Sawatsky, Alberta IX. Board of Higher Education -- The chairman, H. H. Dueck introduced the members of the board as well as the President, Henry Krahn, the Academic Dean, Abe Dueck, Alumni President, Dan Block and several others.

He referred to the printed reports as they appeared in the $\underline{\text{M.B.}}$ Herald, and then read the "Supplementary report."

Year of Growth and Development -- 1974-75 has been a year of development, growth, and optimism for the future. The Board is gratified to be able to report that projections of a year ago have been carried out and also exceeded expectations. Conscious efforts have been made to establish a closer working relationship with local churches, to discern the wishes within the brotherhood, and to develop a program of higher education which aims to meet the needs of our youth today. Experiences of the past year give us much joy and optimism to plan for future development with confidence.

MB Bible College and College of Arts

We are grateful that the College has had a very good year under the direction of Dr. Henry Krahn in his first year in the presidency. The Board is pleased with the positive spiritual atmosphere on the campus and the good morale among faculty and students.

Faculty

For next year, Allen Guenther will return to full-time teaching duties at the College following three years of doctoral studies at the University of Toronto, In January 1976 Peter Hamm, who is also pursuing doctoral studies, will return to full-time teaching duties, as well as take on the responsibilities as Registrar. Vern Ratzlaff will return after a year's leave of absence teaching at Tabor College. James Pankratz will be increasing his duties at the College, whereas two additional part-time appointments are Dr. John Unger, Christian Education, and David Loewen, Contemporary Ministries. Ken Reddig will be leaving the College on the completion of a one-year appointment. Plans are also underway for the appointment of a Public Relations staff member whose responsibilities will be the on-going articulation of the College to the constituency, recruitment of students, and a support staff function so that faculty members will have more free time to devote to their teaching assignments.

Curriculum

In order to establish a more stabilized curriculum development the Board has approved the formation of four departments in the College: Theology, Contemporary Ministries, Music, Humanities and Social Sciences. The aim is to give a particular faculty member a specific area of responsibility to develop within the College program and also to make it easier for students to relate to a specific faculty member in his field of interest. We are also pleased about the continuing developments in our relationship with the University of

Winnipeg, the arrangements for cross-registration and the transfer of courses as approved by the University Senate. It is important to emphasize that the College continues to enjoy expanded course offerings on a credit basis for its students without becoming heavily involved financially in mounting these courses within our own program. At the same time the College is in no way being restricted with the teaching program and emphasis of the courses being taught by our College faculty.

Alumni Association

The Association has increased its activity under the leader-ship of Dan Block of Winnipeg during the past year. Several provincial alumni associations for the College have been re-activated, and others are in the process of being established. A great deal of latent interest and goodwill for the College is being brought to the surface and former Alumni members are taking a renewed interest in the life and program at the College. We are particularly grateful for the \$900 given as Alumni Scholarships and the \$1,000 donated towards a worthy student project.

Future Projections

For 1975-76 we are anticipating a 20 percent increase in the student body. It is particularly significant that representation from all provinces is increasing. With current inflation we also have correspondingly increasing budget requirements. The Board is grateful for the continued financial support of the churches for the College program. For 1975-76 the Board is planning to undertake the raising of some funds for its budget on a project basis. The Board is also considering the establishment of a master plan for the College in order to provide guidance for long-term planning.

H. H. Janzen Memorial Scholarships

Upon the death of Dr. H. H. Janzen some interested friends took the initiative in establishing a Memorial Scholarship Fund for deserving students at MB Bible College who are planning to prepare for the ministry. A goal has been set for \$3,000 to \$5,000 to be collected from interested individuals within the constituency. The interest from the proceeds of this fund would then be used to provide the scholarship funds annually. The Board is very pleased to accept this new scholarship program in order to assist students who have a deep interest in the future work of the church, a work which was so close to the heart of brother Janzen.

Ministers' Course

Dr. John A. Toews and Dr. Myron Augsburger were the key speakers at the annual Ministers' Course in February. Approximately 55 people were in attendance during the four-day conference. There was considerable excitement and enthusiasm expressed by the participants.

Some discussions have taken place concerning the possibility of a changed format for the Ministers' Course for the future. Possibly the course could be offered on the MBBC campus and in regional areas in alternate years. Plans are also underway to conduct it in cooperation with faculty from the Seminary in Fresno.

Canadian Students at Biblical Seminary

During the 1974-75 year 11 Canadian MB students enrolled at the Seminary, for which we paid \$11,000 in grant support. Of this amount each student received \$500 personally. In January, the Council of Boards passed a resolution stating that for 1975-76 \$500 be paid directly to full-time MB students from Canada upon application to the Board of Higher Education. Another resolution was approved which stated "that the home church of the student be encouraged to assist their students financially," because Canadian students cannot obtain U.S. work permits for commercial jobs.

Inter-School Relations Committee

Our conference has been blessed by a number of schools: Christian high schools, Bible institutes, Bible college and college of arts, and seminary. This Committee is concerned that each institution be promoted and that a harmonious spirit of cooperation be evident among the institutions. Some informal discussions took place between faculty members at the College and each of the Bible institutes, as well as the Seminary, during the past year. Several members from a study commission in B.C. visited the College for several days in order to get a better understanding of the program being carried on at the College. It is evident that this is an area which must be promoted continuously in the future. Each institution has a distinct role to fulfill and yet the institutions are functionally integrated in the total program of Christian higher education.

Student Services Committee

During the past year Howard Loewen has been Director of Student Services for the Board. Only Ontario and B.C. appear to have an organized Student Services program on a continuing basis, and efforts are being made to encourage this work in the other provinces as well. There continues to be a need for a Canadian Student Services office in order to co-ordinate activities and to provide encouragement to the regional groups. The real function of service to our Christian youth at institutions of higher education must take place at the local level, and local churches are encouraged to take a keen interest in the welfare of their students. The Committee also undertook a review of the policy whereby the IVCF His magazine and Forum are being provided to students on request. A Canadian university student retreat is being projected which would take into account the specific interests and needs of the college and university age group, as distinct from the youth rallies which have been held so successfully at Banff.

Historical Committee

In the past year considerable progress has been made at the Archives Centre located at the College. Archival material has been requested from the Canadian conference boards, from the provincial conferences, and from individual churches. Many of the notes, lectures, etc. of Dr. H. H. Janzen will be transferred to the Archives in the near future.

The general principle of having three archival centres for the Mennonite Brethren Church in North America has been established; the general principles and policies to govern ownership of archival materials and the operation and function of these archival centres has been agreed upon. A handbook of guidelines concerning the use and function of the centres is being prepared by Dr. J. B. Toews. In order to enable historians to utilize the material, Herbert Giesbrecht, Conference Archivist, has recently completed a subject index for Dr. A. H. Unruh's History of the Mennonite Brethren Church. This work has been very much appreciated.

For the future, further expansion of the facilities is envisioned; further encouragement to various groups to deposit archival material is given, and it is hoped that more active participation in research can be initiated.

Summary

The Lord is continuing to bless the programs of Christian higher education within the brotherhood. Let us continue to look to the future with anticipation and optimism. Even though the cost is high we do have the financial resources to undergird our institutions with our funds; and as a brotherhood we can all pray for Christian higher education and give it our moral support.

2. President Reports Upswing at College -- The faculty of MBBC began the 1974-75 school year with the promise from Isaiah 30:15: "In quietness and in confidence shall be your strength." As Isaiah was encouraged to depend on God and his chosen people, so we were exhorted to trust God and have confidence in the brotherhood. In retrospect, we can say that we enjoyed the undergirding power of God and the support of faithful brethren throughout the year. We wish to express our gratitude for this help by dedicated service to the youth ministry of our Conference.

My objective for the year was two-fold: to make the change in administration as smoothly as possible and to become thoroughly acquainted with the entire program of the College. The members of the Board and the faculty helped greatly in achieving these objectives. I have gained a deep appreciation for the concern and vision the members of the Board and the faculty share, and consider it a privilege to work with them in the challenging area of Christian higher education.

We are agreed that the College program needs to be consolidated and expanded in a manner which can meet the expectation of the constituency and is responsive to the real needs and concerns of students and the larger academic community. We are agreed that we must give highest priorities to excellent training in the areas of biblical studies, theology, and contemporary ministries. The new faculty appointments will provide additional strengths to these areas. We are pleased that the conferences (provincial-Canadian-American) and the churches continue to look to our College for trained workers.

In keeping with our understanding of the mandate given to us, we have continued to offer courses leading to the Bachelor of Religious Studies degree with a major in Theology, Christian Education, and Church Music. A parallel program in the area of the humanities and social sciences leads to the Bachelor of Arts degree with the University of Winnipeg. Many of our own graduates and Bible school transfers are pursuing the BA program. In all the courses taught we are seeking to stress the unity of all knowledge under God. We acknowledge all truth as having its origin in God, and confess Jesus Christ as the Truth.

Following are summaries of statistics gathered throughout the school year which reflect on the various aspects of College life:

Contemporary Ministries Major

During the past year MBBC has developed a new major in Contemporary Ministries which will be offered beginning in September of 1975. This program is designed in particular to equip students to function as leaders in such areas as pastoral ministries, Christian education, and cross-cultural communications. The first two years will give the student a strong academic base both in biblical-theological studies as well as in such areas as the social sciences. The latter part of the student's training will feature a heavy emphasis on supervised field work in the area of concentration which the student has chosen. It is hoped that such an integrated approach to the training of Christian leaders will translate into an effective ministry in the church in the years ahead.

University Relations

The College continues to enjoy a very good relationship with the University of Winnipeg. Several developments have taken place during the last year which will be of real value to College students:

- (1) Students are no longer required to take the final five courses at the University to obtain the B.A. degree. The five courses at the University may be taken in any year and do not have to be in the area of the major.
- (2) Five new courses have been approved for University credit, three of which are in religion.
- (3) All courses approved by the University, whether or not equivalent courses are offered on the University campus, are entered on the University transcripts as official University courses rather than as transfer courses. This eliminates any problem with regard to the transfer of courses to other Universities.

A Cappella Choir

The 39-voice A Cappella Choir under the direction of William Baerg travelled more than 5,000 miles during the past year visiting MB churches, high schools and occasionally churches of other denominations. The choir presented a total of 49 programs during the year. Major tours included visits to Ontario and B.C. The choir was very warmly received and we trust was an inspiration to many. In some churches and schools the students presented a drama which was directed by Esther Wiens. The visit to the churches has given to the choir members a new appreciation for our Conference. The gracious hospitality extended to us all will be long remembered.

Our Graduates

In the four years 1972-75 MBBC has graduated 45 persons from its own degree program. The following categories indicate what the 45 grads of the past four years are planning for the coming school year:

Continuing toward a BA degree - 6, taking teaching training - 1, farming - 2, teaching in government school system - 4, employed gainfully in other ways - 3, teaching in denominational high school - 1, homemaking - 1, attending seminary - 2, serving as pastor - 12, serving as associate pastor - 1, serving in missions and Christian service - 7, other, or undecided, or unknown (of these at least three are looking to church ministries) - 5.

Of the 45, at least half will next year be active full-time in some form of church ministry. About eight or 10 others are moving deliberately toward such ministries. A number who are gainfully employed outside the church are carrying significant responsibilities in the church.

3. Board of Higher Education - Supplementary Report

Introduction

We are grateful to be able to report a number of positive developments since we last reported to the Conference in July, 1973. With the Psalmist, we must respond by saying "We give thanks to Thee, O God." Board members and College faculty members have attempted to be sensitive to the counsel and needs of the brotherhood, as these would find their expression in the developments and programs entrusted to our Board.

The following new actions have been taken by the Board at this Convention, which we want to share with you.

M. B. Bible College and College of Arts

- Dr. A. Dueck has been appointed as Academic Dean for a three-year term.
- 2. A Master Planning Commission has been established by the

Board for the future developments at the College with the following terms of reference, based on the aims and objectives established in 1973:

review the curriculum

to study the optimum enrolment for the College (ii) to review the long range space needs and require-(iii) ments for the College.

- A number of new scholarships have been offered to the College to encourage students in their studies in specific areas, which the Board has gratefully accepted. These are as follows:
 - H. H. Janzen Memorial Scholarships. A sum of \$5,000 is being collected to establish a principal sum, so that the interest generated would provide an annual scholarship for deserving students at the College who are preparing for church-related ministries. We appreciate that \$3,400 has already been collected and other churches and individuals are invited to contri-

bute to this fund. Scholarship in Historical Studies, donated annually by Dr. Helmut Huebert. Value: \$250.

Grant in Anabaptist-Mennonite studies donated annually C) by Dr. Helmut Huebert for students or faculty to promote research. Value: \$250.

MCC Peacemaker Scholarship. Value: \$1,500. d)

Scholarship in Contemporary Ministries donated by g) Independent Jewellers. Value: \$400.

Study-Internship Scholarship. Three scholarships h) annually will be provided from funds from the Braun-Janzen grants and the Endowment Fund for the Board of Higher Education. These will be available to students interested in combining studies in the three-year program at the College together with practical internship experience in a local church. Several additional scholarships are presently under negotiation.

The Board has established a Personnel Committee to study faculty rank, tenure, salary and other related matters. The Committee will work together with a representative from the Board of Management, as in the past on salary matters.

The reports from the Study Commission for Post Secondary Education in B.C. have been shared with the Board. We appreciate the work the Commission has undertaken and believe that it is very beneficial in clarifying many of the issues involved.

We are studying the best approach for the Ministers Course together with the B.S.S.C. For 1975-76, it is being planned to be held at M.B.B.C. together with a faculty member from the Seminary. For 1976-77 we are planning to respond to requests for a regional Ministers Course in some of the provinces. We have been meeting with Bible Institute representatives to determine the possibility of also carrying out some of this with faculty members from these institutions.

Budget projections for the College have given the Board a

great deal of concern. An increase of \$46,000 in the salary component is responsible for some of the problems, which includes an addition of 1.75 full-time equivalent faculty members for 1975-76. The Board also has approved the hiring of a staff member for public relations and student recruitment purposes, so that faculty members can be relieved of some of this work and devote more of their time to their teaching duties.

In order to raise some of the increased funds necessary for next year, the Board has agreed to pursue two avenues

more vigorously:

Church Donations. This year we received \$25,798 which is above the \$25,000 budgeted amount, for the first time in many years. We also note, that of the 128 churches in Canada, only 64 have participated in the two offerings per year for the College as agreed by the Conference. We appreciate the donations which were received and plan to increase this sum to \$35,000 for next year.

b) Special Drives. We plan to raise \$25,000 by means of banquets in some areas, personal solicitations from some groups and individuals, etc. We are aware that some of our members are contributing large sums of money to institutions outside of our Conference, and would like to challenge them also to donate funds to the College. This is a new venture but we believe that more funds can be raised this way.

Student Services Committee

The Board has become aware of the needs for a Canadian College-Careers retreat on a national basis similar to the Banff retreat. We have agreed to establish a joint Committee together with the Board of Christian Education to study and plan such a retreat jointly.

Br. James Pankratz from the College has been appointed as Director of Student Services for the next two years.

Inter-School Relations Committee

We are continuing to attempt a closer working relationship between the College and Seminary as well as between the College, the Bible institutes and Christian high schools. the week of October 16 a two-day meeting has been approved by the Board, to bring the administrators and their Board chairman to the College to discuss the inter-relationship of the three levels of institutions within the Brotherhood. At a later date, the College faculty will meet with Bible institute faculty members to follow-up areas discussed.

Historical Committee

The translation of the P.M. Friesen historical account is being translated into English by a number of brethren. We would like to receive response to the thought of a future Canadian M.B. Historical Society. The Board has also approved that funds for the Archival Centre can be received which

would assist in research and study of M.B. history in general.

Henry H. Dueck, Chairman

The President, Henry Krahn spoke briefly about the objectives of the College as such, as well as of his own.

John Redekop spoke briefly about the support which is being given to the Canadian students attending the M.B. Biblical Seminary in Fresno, California.

Adoption -- The motion was made to accept the reports as presented.

- XI. Constitutional Amendments -- Walter Kehler of the Board of
 Management explained the purpose of establishing two new Boards -a Board of Stewardship, (Canadian members of the General Conference Board of Trustees) and a Board of Missions and Services
 (Canadian members of BOMAS).

The new Boards will have legal status within Canada but continue to be part of General Conference Boards.

These Boards will not participate in a practical sense in Canadian Conferences, nor will their creation have any budget implications.

Amendments to Establish Board of Missions and Services in Canada

All references in the proposed amendments below are based on the 1970 edition of the Constitutional Booklet of the Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Churches of North America.

Amendment #1 -- Refer to page 13 of Constitution, article V, section 3. To the list of Boards under part (a) of section 3 should be added the following:

(7) "Board of Missions and Services."

Amendment #2 -- Refer to page 15 of Constitution, article V, section 6. The heading which now reads "Election and Term of Office" should be changed to read as follows:

"Election and Term of Office for all Boards except the Board of Missions and Services and Board of Stewardship."

Amendment #3 -- Refer to page 15 of Constitution, article V. There are presently six sections under this article and there should be added a new section 7 to read as follows:

"Section 7 -- Election and Term of Office of Board of Missions and Services

(a) The Board shall consist of those members elected at conventions of any by the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches in accordance with the terms of the Constitution

of the said General Conference.

(b) The term of office and conditions of office of this Board shall be as set forth in the Constitution of the General Conference of Memnonite Brethren Churches."

Amendment #4 -- Refer to page 17 of Constitution, article VI, part A, section 2, referring to the Executive Committee. There should be added here a further sub-item lettered (h) reading as follows:

"(h) Considers for approval or otherwise those resolutions of the Board of Missions and Services of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches provided for under part F hereof; provided that when it deems necessary it may refer these to the Council of Boards or to a convention of the Conference."

Amendment #5 -- Refer to pages 17 to 23 of Constitution, article VI. To this article should be added a new part. It is proposed that this should be inserted between the present part G and the present part H. The new part should then become part H and the present part H relating to the Nominating Commission should be lettered "I". The new part H would then read as follows:

"H -- Board of Missions and Services

Section 1 -- Except as hereinafter provided this Board shall have all those duties and powers provided for the Board of Missions and Services in the Constitution of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches.

Section 2 -- Subject to sub-section 3 below this Board is responsible for such part of the missions and services enterprises of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches which may from time to time be delegated to it by the Board of Missions and Services of the General Conference and on such terms and conditions as it may by resolution provide.

Section 3 -- Subject to sub-section 4 below, this Board shall accept only such duties and responsibilities for the missions and services enterprises of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches as are approved by resolution of the Executive Committee of this Conference.

Section 4 -- The Executive Committee may, of its own motion, refer for approval or otherwise by resolution, any matter referred to in Section 3 hereof to the Council of Boards or to a Convention of this Conference."

Amendments Relating to Establishment of Board of Stewardship

All references in the proposed amendments below are based on the 1970 edition of the Constitutional Booklet of the Canadian Con-

ference of the Mennonite Brethren Churches of North America.

Amendment #1 -- Refer to page 13 of Constitution, article V, section 3. To the list of Boards should be added the following:

"(8) Board of Stewardship."

Amendment #2 -- See Constitution page 15, article V, section 6. Following section 6 will be added a new section 7 relating to Board of Missions and Services. This should be followed by a new section 8 to read as follows:

"Section 8 -- Election and Term of Office of Board of Stewardship

- (a) The Board shall consist of the Canadian members of the Board of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches as they are elected in accordance with the terms of the Constitution of the said General Conference at conventions thereof.
- (b) The term of office and conditions of office of this Board shall be those established for the Board of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches in its Constitution."

Amendment #3 -- Refer to pages 17 to 23 of Constitution, article VI. To this article should be added a new part. Following part G (relating to Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns) is anticipated a new part H referring to Board of Missions and Services. It is proposed that immediately following this new part H should come a new part I relating to the Board of Stewardship. This would then be followed by the part relating to the Nominating Commission which would then become part J to article VI. Under this lettering the new part I would read as follows:

"I -- Board of Stewardship

Section 1 -- The Board shall have all those duties and powers provided for the Board of Trustees in the Constitution of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches insofar as those may be delegated to it by the said Board of Trustees and subject to the provisions of Section 4 of this part.

Section 2 -- Subject to delegation by the Board of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches and subject to the provisions of Section 4 below this Board is responsible for the carrying out of the Stewardship program of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches within Canada. This duty shall include the receipt of funds, whether absolute or subject to trust conditions, and shall also include entering into any lawful contracts with donors to the said Stewardship program as the Board may from time to time determine.

Section 3 -- The Board shall be responsible for all

such assets of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches which may from time to time be delegated to it by the Board of Trustees of the said General Conference, subject to the provisions of Section 4 of this part. The Board shall be responsible for such personnel of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches as established by delegation from the said Board of Trustees and subject to the provisions of Section 4 hereof.

Section 4 -- The Board shall carry out its delegated duties on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches wholly at the expense of the said General Conference. All authority of this Board to act shall terminate with the termination of necessary funding by the said General Conference. Any and all contracts executed by this Board and which impose any present or future liability upon the Conference shall require agreement to indemnify in full by the said General Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Churches."

XII. Seminary Progress Report -- H. H. Dueck introduced the Canadian Seminary Board representatives and then referred to the report "Biblical Seminary a Thriving Institution," as it appeared in the M. B. Herald.

Biblical Seminary a Thriving Institution -- On May 23, the Mennonite Brethren Biblical Seminary celebrated its 20th anniversary, marking the completion of two decades of successful ministry in the preparation of young men and women for service in the local church and related services abroad. The U.S. Area Conference is to be commended for the establishment and impressive development of this fine institution, our brotherhood's only theological training centre operating at the graduate school level.

During the past four years it has been the privilege of several Canadian representatives to serve as members of the Seminary Board of Directors and to share in the responsibilities and decisions involving the operation for the Seminary. At the Canadian Conference in July 1973, the Canadian brotherhood elected the brethren C. Braum, H. H. Dueck, F. C. Peters and J. H. Redekop as the four Canadian representatives on the Seminary Board of Directors for a two-year term ending in August 1975.

The Board has met twice a year to receive reports from the President, to deal with recommendations and numerous operational questions, and to undertake the necessary projections for the continuous operation of the Seminary in anticipation of its transfer to the General Conference in August, 1975.

The purpose of this report is to provide institutional informatio to the constituency so that we will be in a better position to understand the issues at stake and can make our decisions in

August on the basis of informed opinion.

Faculty

The full-time faculty at the Seminary consists of the following brethren: Henry H. Dick, President; Elmer A. Martens; Ken Berg; David Ewert; Abram J. Klassen; Waldo D. Hiebert, Dean of Students; George Konrad, Academic Dean; Loyal Martin, Registrar. In addition, various brethren including J. B. Toews, D. Edmond Hiebert, and Henry J. Schmidt who serve the Conference in other capacities also serve the Seminary on a part-time basis. They have sacrificially demonstrated their commitment to the brotherhood and their concern to prepare Seminary graduates, spiritually and academically, to work in the local church and other places of service.

Curriculum

The Seminary presently offers two-year programs leading to the Master of Divinity, Master of Arts, and Master of Religious Education degrees, with majors available in a variety of fields. The general admission requirement for any of these programs is the General B. A. degree or equivalent from an accredited institution. The Seminary is accredited with the Western Association of Schools and Colleges as well as the Association of Theological Schools, which makes it possible for our graduates to receive academic recognition on an international basis for work completed at the Seminary.

In addition to the degree programs, the Seminary also conducts some short-term projects such as the Institute of Cross-Cultural Church Missions Program (in cooperation with the Board of Missions and Services), the mid-East study tour (in cooperation with the Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminaries), as well as a Theological Education by Extension program in South American churches and a School for Ministers in the various Conference districts. At the present time the Seminary faculty is also involved in an institutional self-study in preparation for another accreditation assessment to be completed by the Fall of 1976.

Student Enrollment

Throughout the years the Seminary has continued to enroll an increasing number of students from both Canada and the United States. During the Winter quarter, 1975, 116 students were enrolled, which included 92 regular students and 24 auditors. It is interesting to note that of the 24 auditors, 23 were women, a situation which reflects the fact that wives of Seminary students are now strongly encouraged also to take courses where possible. Fifty percent of the students come from Mennonite Brethren church backgrounds, whereas the other fifty percent represents 23 different denominations. This year there were 18 students from Canada representing four different denominations, as well as seven students from other foreign countries.

Although 50% of the student body come from non-MB churches, the Seminary feels that it is important that training these students at our institutions is also part of the larger missionary mandate. It is felt that there is a distinct advantage in broadening the horizon of Mennonite Brethren students by having them interact with representatives from 23 other denominations in their classes.

At the spring convocation, 26 students graduated with Master's degrees, and all have been placed in churches or church-related ministries. It is interesting to note that all 1975 Canadian MB graduates have been placed in assignments in Canada.

Campus Facilities

The campus is located on a beautiful six-acre site and consists of the following buildings: the main Teaching and Administration building, Seminary and Conference office building, Chapel, and Missionary Court apartments. Because it is immediately adjacent to Pacific College it is possible to have joint facilities in the dining room as well as the library, and consequently reduce the overall cost of operation of these divisions. The Seminary section of the Library has recently acquired a collection of 6,000 volumes which were donated by Dr. D. Edmond Hiebert from his personal library when he retired this spring; this gift constitutes a substantial increase in Seminary library holdings. Although the optimum number of students that could be accepted may be a matter of conjecture, it is believed that 150 students could be served quite adequately in the present facilities.

Finances

In 1974-75 the Seminary had an operating budget of \$218,680. For the 1975-76 year the Board has approved a budget of \$269,100. This represents an increase in the Conference grant from \$122,000 in 1974-75 to \$158,000 for 1975-76. In the past, these subsidies have been borne in their entirety by the U.S. Area Conference, with the exception of \$500 per full-time student paid annually by the Canadian Conference during the past few years for the Canadian MB students enrolled at the Seminary.

Sunmary

The U. S. Area Conference has operated the Seminary for the past twenty years. It has been developed upon sound principles with a faculty deeply committed to the spiritual heritage of our brotherhood. It is also an academically respectable institution whose graduates have immediately found placement and areas of service on completion of their studies.

As Canadian Board members we are convinced that since the Canadian Conference does not have a Seminary of its own it is most important that we join with our U.S. brethren at this time in the operation of a General Conference Seminary.

Canadian Seminary Board representatives.

Upon motion the report was accepted.

H. H. Dick, president of the M.B. Biblical Seminary spoke briefly on the work of the Board and other pertinent facts. He reported that seven Canadians graduated this year from the Seminary, with all of them serving in Canadian churches.

Several questions were asked and concern expressed such as:

- Will the large non-Mennonite student body have a tendency to affect the theological position of our M.B. Conference?
- Where do we make the decisions about the steps which seem to have been approved leading to a joint seminary--as was reported to this conference?
- 3. The question was also asked as to why we are not making a definite decision at this conference. It was explained that we have presented all of this to the churches and asked for any negative reaction to be reported to the conference executive--and none came. Reference was also made to the action at the Three Hills conference.
- 4. The feeling seemed to be that we should take a definite stand at this conference. The chairman then ruled that the conference will receive a resolution on Tuesday morning to be worked out by the brethren who are informed about the seminary question.

XIII. Board of Christian Education -- Henry Petkau, chairman, reported as follows:

Christian Ed Office there to help Churches -- The Christian education ministries of the Canadian Conference have continued to revolve around the teaching of the Word of God so that individuals may be brought to the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ and nurtured to Christian growth and discipleship.

In Retrospect

We are grateful to God for the work of our executive secretary, John Unger. He has served in this capacity since the Canadian Conference in July, 1974. During his first year, he has spent considerable time visiting churches, conducting workshops, assisting in planning church Christian education programs, and presenting the message from God's word.

Of necessity, the executive secretary has spent approximately 50 percent of his time in this ministry during the past year so that we might become better acquainted with the work of Christian education in our churches across Canada. During his visits, he has endeavoured to challenge those involved in some phase of Christian education to a renewed commitment and a revitalized effort to con tinue as faithful servants building his church.

During the period of August/74 - May/75 inclusive, John Unger preached 53 messages, conducted 71 workshops, on occasion taught Sunday school classes and presented children's features while serving the churches, was involved in Banff '74 and Glorieta '75, and took part in the following conferences or meetings: United States Area Conference-Henderson, Nebraska Board of Church Schools Sessions--Omaha, Nebraska Prov. Bd. Mtgs.--of B.C., Ontario, and Manitoba Prov. Sunday School Bd. Mtgs.-- Manitoba Prov. Sunday School Superintendents Conference--Manitoba Ministers & Deacons Conferences--Manitoba and Ontario Canadian Conference of Church Musicians--Winnipeg

Mass Media Commission Seminar--Kansas City, Kansas Youth Media -- Chicago, Illinois International Center for Learning--Ontario Denominational Day at Scripture Press--Wheaton, Illinois Scripture Press Convention--Detroit, Michigan Gospel Light Publications Seminar--Glendale, California

The Board is also appreciative of the services of Wilmer Kornelson who continued in the work on a part-time arrangement, August through December, so that Banff '74 might be another great youth conference.

For the purposes of centralization, the Christian Education office was moved to the second floor of the Christian Press building located at 159 Henderson Highway, Winnipeg, with the other Canadian Conference offices. This is where the Executive Secretary devotes considerable time to the editorial workload which has become somewhat heavier since the Executive Secretary of the United States Conference resigned and has not been replaced at the time of the writing of this report.

One of the highlights of the past two years was the second national youth conference (Banff '74), in Banff, Alberta, December 1974. This was where 868 young people gathered to share the blessings the Lord had in store for those who came in anticipation of experiencing the Lord's nearness. As we look to a possible Banff '77, the projected plans will have to be revised since facilities at the Banff School of Fine Arts are being renovated to accommodate only 500 young people. This situation along with some conflict in calendar dates, may necessitate some investigation of alternative sites for the rally.

Following Banff '74, 150 "Survey Questionnaires" were sent out to retreaters in various provinces. Ninety questionnaires were returned. Some of the comments of young people indicate the impact which the conference had on their spiritual lives. Here are a few of the responses to the questions: "What value (benefit) do you feel the rally has for you now that several weeks have passed?"

closer relationship with Christ influenced my thinking and planning for long-range goals for my life. Banff '74 reinforced some convictions to prepare for full-time service; greater confidence to move ahead.

Since, the 1973 Conference at Three Hills, Alberta, the Board of Christian Education, through the efforts and research of specially appointed commissions, has endeavoured to review (1) the conference mandate for the Board of Christian Education and (2) the job description of the executive secretary.

During the period of January 17-19, a Church Musicians Conference was conducted in Winnipeg. The conference was jointly sponsored by the Music Departments of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College and the Canadian Mennonite Bible College. Keynote speaker was Dr. Erik Routley. Many of those who were able to attend spoke most enthusiastically about the conference. We trust that the Lord will continue to bless the ministry of music in the Christian education programs of our churches.

On behalf of the Board, we would also like to report that the following aspects of the work have been discontinued for a variety of reasons:

(a) The pilot project of the Parental Involvement Program, (b) the publication of the Book Review Messenger, (c) the Feature Article in the Adult Quarterly, (d) membership with the National Sunday School Association.

Current Events in Christian Education

As has been reported at previous Conferences, the Office of Christian Education continues to work in the areas of Sunday school, youth work, music, and other related programs within the framework of the Canadian Mennonite Brethren churches. The C.E. office is continuing in the following ministries as they relate to what has been stated above:

- (a) Publications--(1) Youth Worker, (2) Adult Sunday School Quarterly, (3) Calendar of Activities, (4) Christian Education column in MB Herald, (5) Other special materials: library, children's church, bibliographies.
- (b) Promoting and assisting in the planning of the Service Training Program courses for C.E. workers in MB churches across Canada.
- (c) Encouraging provincial music committees to assist local churches in conducting music workshops in the area of Sunday school singing, children's and youth choirs, senior choirs, congregational singing, instrumental music, music committee organization and function.

 A subsidy has been made available over the years to each province for this purpose, along with a policy statement which spells out conditions and expectation.
- (d) <u>Cassette Tape Ministry</u>--Presently our office has 12 sets of <u>cassette tapes</u> available upon request for a three-week period without charge. Topics include: Evangelism, Marriage, the Home, Teacher Training for Sunday School, Leadership Training, Success with Youth, etc.
- (e) Book Review Services are expedited through our office. Book publishing agencies from various organizations are submitting samples of their newly printed books to our office for review. A slate of reviewers has been drafted and the responses have been extremely gratifying. Librarians will continue appreciating this service.

- (f) Increased liaison and involvement with Provincial Boards of Education through an exchange of minutes of Board sessions as well as a sharing of provincial and national concerns. We would like to commend the Provincial Boards who have carried out this request, and encourage the other provinces to do so as well, to further the work of Christian education to our churches.
- (g) Assisting youth in South America to get involved in youth conferences, and attend Bible schools. Financial assistance is being forwarded in the form of: Bible School Bursaries (8 x \$75) \$600.00 Youth Rally Grants (30 x \$25) \$750.00 Travel Assistance to Conference Speaker

Projections in Christian Education

- (a) Banff '77--tentative booking of the School of Fine Arts at Banff has been made for December 29, 1977 to January 6, 1978, and alternatives to accommodate the many young people who are anxious to attend, are being explored.
- (b) 1975 has been designated as "Provincial Christian Education Conference Year." Tentative plans for such conferences are well underway in some of the provinces.
- (c) 1976 is being considered for a National Christian Education Conference with a focus on music. More details will be forthcoming as they develop.
- (d) A Christian Education thrust to encourage churches to plan programs around the family and assisting in the area of meeting family needs is being developed for further implementation.
- (e) A continued arrangement with the Mennonite Brethren Bible College to allow the Executive Secretary to teach one evening course in Christian education for one semester during the College academic year.
- (f) Because of the heavy workload of the Executive Secretary, along with expressions of concern from several provinces relating to a need for a more concentrated effort at the provincial and local levels, the Board of Christian Education is considering alternatives to best meet the expressed needs of some 135 churches of the Canadian conference.

May God give grace so that we may all continue to work together to promote the work of Christian Education in our conference. Your prayerful support is a vital factor as together we seek to serve the Lord so that his name may be praised.

Note from John Unger--The ministry of Christian Education is most challenging. We are living in a day when there is a renewed desire to search the Scriptures. This presents a challenge.

A number of educators in our churches have asked about "Neighborhood Bible Study" suggestions. This expresses interest in community evangelism.

In visiting the churches, I have found the pastors working with dedication and interest in their program of Christian education. The education committees in the churches have openly shared their strengths and needs. We have a tremendous core of workers in the educational program of our churches.

The youth ministry is of vital concern to many educators. We note that several churches have engaged the services of a youth pastor. Other congregations are inquiring.

There was a good response to the "National Youth Week" emphasis. We are finding the Youth Worker to be of increased service. Recently, the United States Area Conference has inquired concerning the possibilities of joining with us in its production and distribution to all their youth.

We are currently engaged in the production of a series of songs suited to special occasions such as Mother's Day. In addition to the booklet, they will be produced on cassette tapes for easy learning. Hopefully our music educators will continue offering their services to the conference.

To help meet requests for educational services, a core group of "consultants" or "workshop leaders" has been drafted. These will assist the executive secretary in conducting convention series.

The ministry of this office is of such a volume that additional personnel might be employed on a full-time basis to fulfill the demands for this ministry.

Christian Education is a vital ministry since it is a primary agency in determining the spiritual energy of the church. Christ is building his church and it is significant to be involved by his Spirit and enablement.

John Unger, executive secretary

The Executive Secretary, John Unger, addressed the conference briefly. The report and the supplementary oral reports of the chairman and executive secretary were received, after some discussion about the good work of the executive secretary.

XIV. Board of Publication -- H. H. Voth, the chairman, introduced the members of the Board as well as the editors Harold Jantz and Eric Ratzlaff. He then made reference to some highlights of the published report.

Publishing Progressing on Several Fronts--Two years have slipped by since this Board shared with you something of what had been attempted and achieved in the ongoing work in the kingdom of God. Since then God's blessing and sustaining grace have abundantly been extended to us and we would like to share with you what this grace has achieved.

Mennonite Brethren Herald

Harold Jantz took up the work as editor again in September 1973, after a year of study and travel leave. He reports that he considers it to be a distinct privilege to be at work in the kingdom of God, especially so when this service can be rendered in a world of unrest and disquiet, when the foundations are literally being shaken. For, as he says, it is precisely in such a world that the grace of God becomes most evident in its working.

The past year has been a good year for the Herald. The circulation reached the highest point in its history. During the winter months as many as 9,500 copies were being sent out. Included in this number were copies mailed to about 500 students in various schools, some 140 overseas workers (who receive their copies by air mail) and approximately 420 readers in the United States. Personal subscriptions netted an income of \$4,400 which was almost fifty percent higher than the year before.

The <u>Herald</u> was also sent to major daily papers in our country, as well as to leaders in other Mennonite conferences and people in a considerable number of non-Mennonite church groups. It is a satisfying experience to see <u>Herald</u> articles reprinted in a number of secular and religious publications. The practice of sending the <u>Herald</u> to all pastors and leaders in the U.S. Mennonite Brethren churches was continued, just as Canadian pastors and leaders receive the <u>Christian Leader</u>.

The editor says, "The <u>Herald</u> belongs to the brotherhood and is the most effective human instrument we possess to help us keep in touch with one another. It belongs to you even before it belongs to the boards, agencies and institutions of the conference and larger Mennonite brotherhood. We want you to feel that." The

Herald can also be a useful instrument of sharing information and instruction concerning our understanding of the Christian faith. Churches can have it sent to those who are interested in coming to know more particularly what the Mennonite Brethren church is all about. The approach of the MB Herald is consciously intended to be both positively Anabaptist and positively evangelical. The Bible must continue to be the supreme authority for life and practice. The "good news" of the gospel must be proclaimed but also, with equal faithfulness, the radical demands which this gospel makes on those who profess to believe and accept this "good news." The editor says, "Whether we are speaking of the family, or our economic systems, or of our life as congregations, we should be prepared to probe deeply and honestly."

Fellowship Bookcenter

Since the 1973 conference, the bookstore has been relocated. This is in accordance with the plans drawn up by the two participating conferences, the Conference of Mennonites in Canada and the Canadian Conference of MB Churches. The store is now in the heart of the downtown district of Winnipeg and is more generally accessible. The manager, Harold Petkau, reports that the volume of sales is rising, and that the operations of the store continue to be "in the black." A comparison of the sales for the period of October 1974 to April 1975 with that of the same period a year earlier shows an increase of \$16,939.44.

In addition to the books and items which most Christian bookstores carry, Fellowship Bookcenter sees itself as providing a distinct service. It stocks a good supply of German reading material, it provides the churches with Sunday school material and it carries a good stock of material which reflects and promotes an Anabaptist theology and perspective. The following figures (up to May 10) partly illustrate the latter claim:

The Earth is Round by Margaret Epp--835 copies sold, History of the Mennonite Brethren Church by J. A. Toews--540 copies sold, Mennonites in Canada by F. H. Epp--350 copies sold.

Mennonitische Rundschau

Erich Ratzlaff has continued to work faithfully at his task as editor of the Rundschau. Thus it is that the paper has appeared regularly and without interruption of the publication schedules. The editor acknowledges and is deeply grateful for the many who have worked with him in providing stimulating and helpful reading material.

The change to offset printing was successfully made on January 1, 1975. This is a distinct improvement: the print is clearer and more readable, and pictures and ornamental devices can be used to greater advantage. In spite of the considerable decrease in potential readers in our churches, due to declining health and death, the number of copies printed has remained relatively steady. This is due to the fact that among those coming from Russia as immigrants there are many who are interested in reading the Rundschau. There is also an increasing number of readers from other denominations.

Mailing difficulties have been encountered. Action has been initiated with the Winnipeg Post Office in an attempt to correct the often spotty and irregular delivery of the paper. A particular problem has arisen recently. The Rundschau has been airmailed, second class, to readers in South America, since January 1, 1975. None of these have apparently arrived. Investigation has been started to find out what is happening.

We believe the <u>Rundschau</u> is meeting a real and vital need in our churches and beyond the limits of our churches, and we consider it a distinct privilege to be able to minister to this need.

Publishing

Since the last conference, this board has carried out the publication of a novel, reflective of an episode in Mennonite history, aimed more particularly at the young reader, but widely appreciated by readers of all age groups, The Earth is Round. The board would like to acknowledge, with deep gratitude, the tremendous contribution of Margaret Epp in writing this novel for publication. Perhaps at this point it suffices to say that this book will deal with missionary work in Europe. Although the board was less directly involved, it helped facilitate the publishing of certain material written by our late brother, H. H. Janzen, Und ich sah...and Der Roemerbrief. Publication of several other manuscripts received had to be declined, either for lack of funds or because the manuscripts were not found to fit within limits which the board sees as its area of function. Dr. Helmut Huebert has assisted the board in publishing ventures by doing the major share of the work of making arrangements and initiating promotion.

Printing

It is self-evident that all written material, whether in periodical or book format, can only become widely accessible if it is printed. Don Kornelsen and his staff have provided this very vital service in an efficient and economical way.

Since the report at the last conference, the print shop has gone through a variety of changes and improvements. When the bookstore was relocated the second floor was re-designed for different uses. Conference offices take up a considerable part, the other section is occupied by an enlarged offset preparation department. The camera, plates, photo-setting and paste-up departments are now on the second floor. Because the Rundschau is also produced by the offset process, a second photo-setter has been installed. The hot-metal process has consequently been practically phased out. Other equipment has been secured (another 28 1/2 inch offset press) while some of the equipment already around was improved or repaired.

We as a Board are grateful for the staff that does the work of the print shop. Last November, James Friesen joined the staff as production manager. The manager reports that Jim's enthusiasm and experience have made his work much easier. One problem encountered has been the rather frequent change in the ranks of female employees.

The record projected \$260,000 of sales will probably make it possible to complete our year showing a slight profit. Last year we budgeted for a lower profit to provide an advantage to our periodicals. We may have set our goals too low, but the financial statement will show this. There are future equipment needs, but as in the past, these will be covered by depreciation allowances. An umpredictable factor for the future cost of periodical and commercial work is the anticipated wage scale settlement.

As the Board of Publications we wish to take this opportunity of thanking our editors, our manager and all other employees for the sincere and conscientious work they have done in the past two years. We appreciate their commitment and entrust the result of their efforts to the rewarding and blessing grace of God.

Recommendations -- The following recommendations were presented:

- I. In response to the assignment which the area publications boards received from the 1972 General Conference convention (see G.C.M. 1972, pp. 61, 62) and in consideration of the report of a BCL appointed study commission concerning the question of merging the periodicals of the area conferences, the Canadian Board of Publication recommends to the Conference:
 - 1. That we actively co-operate with the U.S. brotherhood in the publication of our conference periodicals, The Christian Leader and the M.B. Herald, with an openness to the possibility of an eventual merger of the two periodicals.
 - Such active co-operation would be for the next triennium, and would then constitute a practical basis upon which to plan what further action should then be taken.
 - Further, such active co-operation would include, at least, the following:
 - a) reporting coverage for one another on major events or developments within the area conferences which should be communicated to both constituencies.
 - b) providing copies of significant feature articles to one another.
 - c) periodically joining together in preparation of special inserts (e.g. General Conference, Study Conferences, etc.)
 - d) periodically co-operating to give coverage to various areas of our General Conference work and then over a period of time, acquainting readers within our total North American constituency, with the churches and the work of that total constituency.
 - e) The editorial staff of the two periodicals would meet at least once a year to discuss aims and philosophy and to plan concretely for specific co-operative ventures.
 - If through the experience of such co-operative work, it becomes evident that closer co-operation and merger would serve our brotherhood, appropriate plans for such action can then be developed.

- II. We recommend that the conference express its appreciation to Don Kornelsen, for the 10 years of dedicated and competent service, to the Lord and the Conference, as manager of the Christian Press.
- III. We recommend that the Conference accept our budget.
 - IV. "Unofficial Resolution": In response to the proposal of the Board of Higher Education as to the formation of an M.B. Historical Society for Canada, and in view of the following services such as society could perform on behalf of our brotherhood, be it resolved that the Board of Higher Education, in cooperation with other Boards and individuals produce a rationale and organizational structure to be presented to the 1976 Canadian Convention in Manitoba for implementation.

The advantages would be:

 Contributions to our Archival centres by gathering and producing historical data.

2. Publishing articles and books of interest to the entire

brotherhood.

 Spearheading and supplying historical material for anniversary celebrations of our churches, institutions, and conferences.

Whereas the churches of the Canadian Conference registered approval to the proposal submitted to them for reaction
Be it resolved

 that the delegation reaffirm the decision for the establishment of a General Conference Seminary with the churches at the U.S. Area Conference and

2) that the congregations of the Canadian Conference be informed once more that a final vote in this matter will be taken at the General Conference sessions in August 1975, and

3) that the proposal of the Commission on Finance of the General Conference Board of Reference and Counsel for the financing of the General Conference Seminary be distributed at this session for information.

Further questions were asked about what our vote really means. The question was then asked for with a request that the actual votes be reported to the conference.

The result of the vote was: Yes 307 No 61 83% in favor

A concern was expressed from the floor that when we express ourselves on issues we abstain from giving a connotation of not having proceeded properly or possibly having railroaded an issue.

Recommendation #1--Appointment of an Executive Secretary
A recommendation about the appointment of an executive secretary
was read:

Recommendation:

We recommend that the incoming executive re-examine the concept of an executive secretary as provided for in the constitution and present its findings and recommendations to the next conference in session.

Upon motion this recommendation was accepted.

*The following rationale was presented on request:

1. He is an appointed officer of the conference.

a) He is appointed by the conference executive with the approval of the conference.

b) He shall be directly responsible to the executive.

c) He shall carry out assignments given by the executive and by the convention through the executive.

- He shall execute many of the functions now performed by the moderator.
 - a) He shall represent our conference in areas normally assigned to the executive or as directed by the executive.

b) He shall attend to the routine business normally done by the moderator (clerical, etc.).

- He shall assume the major portion of the clerical work assigned to the conference secretary.
- He shall, with vision and creativity, make projection and provide direction for our conference.
 - a) He shall, under the guidance of the executive and Council of Boards, provide initiative and give assistance in implementing approved programs.
 - b) He shall be alert to areas of need in the conference.
 - c) He shall seek out and stimulate the gifts within the brotherhood.
- He shall move among the churches of our constituency and be present at provincial conferences, keeping abreast of issues within our conference.
- 6. He shall be responsible for inter-board communication.
 - a) He shall co-ordinate the work of the various boards.b) He shall work in close relationship with personnel of the various boards.
- He shall be called upon to evaluate the organizational structures and functions of the conference.

*Discussions on this "partial" rationale was ruled out of order as premature.

Recommendation #2--Combining Faith and Business Conferences A recommendation was presented about combining the two conferences:

Moved that in the future the Faith and Life and Business Conferences be combined into one annual conference and that this conference begin on a Saturday.



All accounts will be audited by Sill, Streuber, Fiske & Co. Details will be given at the Conference.



We propose initial establishment of the endowment at the commencement of the second triennium at an amount of \$600,000 to be contributed equally by the Canadian and U.S. areas at time of establishment. It is proposed that this initial fund be treated as a perpetual trust permitting the use of income only. Subsequent contributions to this endowment fund should be welcomed and solicited and should be used in accordance with the terms of trust upon which they are made. In the event of establishment of such an endowment, we would recommend that the Canadian Conference make its contribution from its available capital funds.

III. The Board of Evangelism

The Board was invited to the stage accompanied by the three French Canadian delegates from Quebec. These were asked to comment in their own language as to their personal reactions to the conference. Ernest Dyck translated.

The Board had a presentation on Saturday evening (see Inspirational Sessions), and their report was in the M.B. Herald.

The Herald report and an oral supplement were received.

Evangelism takes Many Resources--Greetings with II Cor. 5:19: "God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation."

We look back over the past two years with gratitude for God's goodness and love. The Lord has been building his Church! The keys to the kingdom have been entrusted to us. We see evidence of the Holy Spirit unlocking lives through the various ministries of our brotherhood.

Because of the broad scope of its work, members of the Board have each assumed particular responsibility in one of three areas, namely: (1) Canada Inland Mission, for the work in Quebec and the Maritimes; (2) Media Committee, spearheading mass media productions and releases; (3) Evangelism Committee, responsible primarily for Crusade evangelism and promotion of outreach through our churches. The reports of the Canada Inland Mission and the Media Committee have been submitted by their respective chairmen.

Evangelism

Since our last report to the conference several changes have taken place. As you are aware, Rudy Boschman terminated his ministry as conference evangelist in December, 1973. The Board has since then prayed and sought for a replacement. In the meantime, various brothers have ministered in single or multiple crusades under the blessing of God. We are deeply grateful. Although no appointment has as yet been made, we do have good prospects for a brother to be available full time for evangelism and deeper life ministries.

We trust to make appropriate announcements after our July board sessions. We thank God for his leading and supply.

We hereby also express deep gratitude for the ministry of the Messengers Quartet. Their songs and testimony have been used as keys to the kingdom. The advance bookings indicate their demand and the churches appreciation. John Block at the request of our Board has acted as interim coordinator for evangelism in our churches. Thank you, John!

As you doubtless are aware, Brother J. J. Toews has accepted a ministry under the Board of Missions/Services. As we have moved among our brotherhood many appreciative and unsolicited comments on Brother Toews' ministry have come to us. His family life emphasis has been very well received. Some churches have also availed themselves of his personal and friendship evangelism training classes. Ongoing results are still evident. Thank you Brother and Sister Toews for your years of untiring service in God's kingdom under the umbrella of the Board of Evangelism! The following resolution addressed to the Council of Boards at their January 1975 sessions expresses our official response to their life and work.

'Whereas Brother Jacob J. Toews has served the Canadian Conference as chairman of the Board of Evangelism for a number of years in its beginnings, and as evangelist and executive secretary for nearly nine years, and, Whereas the nature of Brother Toews' inspiring and fruitful ministry in and beyond our Conference demanded many sacrificial periods of separation from Mrs. Toews and the family and, Whereas the blessing of God was evidenced by revival in many churches and the salvation of souls:
The Canadian Conference publicly expresses their heartfelt appreciation for this ministry."

Let us continue to pray for them in their Missions/Services assignments.

In conclusion may we share with you the blessings of supply in the appointment of a new executive secretary. Brother Henry Brucks, former missionary, pastor, and associate secretary of Missions/Services, has assumed this position as of June, 1975.

A revised job description has been assigned to our Executive Secretary, including the following:

(1) the administration of the offices and affairs of the Board; (2) oversight of all programs and projects of the Board and its

various committees;
(3) advise and counsel to all personnel employed by the Board in spiritual, financial, personal relationship matters;

(4) take charge of promotion and publicity;

(5) actively initiate, promote, and nurture evangelism in and through churches, crusades and institutes;

(6) seek to coordinate the Canadian and provincial efforts in evangelism and therefore work in close cooperation with provincial boards and directors;

(7) recruit needed personnel.

The outline of responsibilites will certainly require time, energy, wisdom and above all the fulness of the Holy Spirit. We warmly commend Brother and Sister Brucks to you for your moral and prayer support. Thank you for standing with us, for your insights, and for your concern for evangelism. Jesus' command is that we be reproducing disciples. Through our obedience he is glorified!

Mennonite Brethren at work in Quebec--Greetings with Matt. 9:36-38: 'When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.'"

This report is to reflect on the various activities that come under the jurisdiction of the C.I.M. Committee which oversees the work in Quebec and Nova Scotia. In his visits to the Quebec churches in November 19-26, 1974 Henry Brucks writes:

"I visited the churches in the Montreal area during the above mentioned days, in response to an invitation extended to me by the chairman of the Canada Inland Mission. It was a great experience. It reinforced my faith in the conviction that the Catholic world has been awakened, and that there is a greater openness for the Gospel now than there has been in the past decades. I

had seen such an openness in some of the Latin American countries. It always appeared to me that Quebec was strongly resisting the trends of liberation and of change. But this belongs to the past. The emergence of the new universities and provincial colleges; the greater equalization of liberties--religious, cultural and economic--seems to substantiate this. I was greatly impressed to see the forces of change at work in this province, which could be called the "sleeping giant of Canada."

The harvest is truly plentiful. Never before has there been such a hunger for the Word of God as in the 'Now Generation'. Our young people in Quebec are invited to give instruction in Christianity with the blessings of the hierarchy in at least one of the institutes of higher learning. Praise God!

Presently we have five areas of concerted effort in Quebec. They are as follows:

- (1) St. Laurent Church: This church is located in the suburb of Montreal. The membership consists of approximately 11 members. At present they are without a pastor and are shepherded by Brother Ernest Dyck and his church. Pray that the Lord 'will send forth laborers into his Harvest.'
- (2) Ste. Therese Church: This church is approximately 16 miles north of Montreal under the leadership of Brother Ernest Dyck. Twelve adults have been baptized and added to the church in the past year. There have been 10-12 conversions, including three couples largely the result

of a tragedy in one family. Membership at Ste. Therese is approximately 54. Many are becoming more involved in leadership. Giving is increasing. There are plans for another baptism.

- (3) St. Jerome Church: Brother David Franco has taken over the leadership of this church since the beginning of the year. After a year of internal struggles, the church is growing in stability and spiritual maturity. Recently God visited the church with refreshing showers from heaven. Eight souls found their way to the heart of God, which made the heavens ring with a joy unspeakable and full of glory. We wish to take this opportunity to thank the Ben Heppners who were used by the Lord in a spiritual healing ministry last summer.
- (4) Ste. Agathe Church: This is our youngest church which is nestled in the Laurentian Foothills, some 65 miles north of Montreal. The Ste. Agathe Church is pastored by Brother Danny Wolfe. Presently the church is meeting in the Anglican Parish Hall, and is adequately meeting the present needs. The Church is planning their first baptism in the near future.
- (5) Eastern Townships, Quebec: What proved to be a trial project is now an emerging church, thanks to brother Jim Carter and his leadership in Waterloo. The group is meeting in a school with an average attendance of 60-70. In all there are at present 130 people enrolled in Sunday school.

Another valuable asset for our churches in Quebec is Camp Laurel, which was purchased for the sum of \$30,000.00. Situated in the Laurentians, Camp Laurel meets the needs of young and old during the summer months.

We, the C.I.M. Committee, wish to thank all churches and individuals who gave so generously towards the purchase of the camp. Some \$9,000 are still needed to liquidate the indebtedness.

Dartmouth, Nova Scotia:

On January 14, 1973, the Mt. Edward Fellowship was born. The church has a membership of approximately 13 members. Brother Harold Schroeder has ministered here in an interim capacity but has now left for further study. Pray that the Lord will provide a shepherd for this flock.

The Mt. Edward Fellowship is worshipping in a Seventh Day Adventist Church. They are negotiating for the fairly new building which would accommodate from 150 - 200 people.

This is a brief glimpse of the work under C.I.M. As members of the Committee, we are keenly aware of our responsibilities as well as our limitations. God, however, is not thwarted by man's limitation. One plus God always ensures a majority. Our need of the hour is prayer. Pray for our pastors and their wives and children; pray for our churches; pray that present vacancies might be filled.

Media Commission favors Cooperation--The Lord has given us unprecedented opportunities in the proclamation of the Good News of Jesus Christ. And he has given us the resources, the means by which we can reach millions of persons who would never come close to a church or an evangelistic service. Television and radio have become the most influential attitude-changing media of our time. And the Church, God's people, can utilize these channels in communication of the One who forgives and gives Life.

Our media activities have been largely undertaken in cooperative projects. We've been participants along with other Mennonite groups (General Conference, Mennonite Church and U.S. Mennonite Brethren) in the production of television 'spots'. The last series of two 'spots', one 30 seconds, the other 60 seconds, invited viewers to consider Jesus' way of forgiveness and loving acceptance. The one showed a couple talking about forgiveness; the other 'spot' showed a run-away girl in a phone-booth calling home and responding to her parents' love.

The present series of two spots is aimed at marriage situations and invites viewers to consider marriage to be for life "... as in the teachings of Jesus." The other spot encouraged forgiveness and love as elements vital to lasting, fulfilling marriage relationship. To date, 52 and 72 English language T.V. stations and 20 Cable systems in Canada have shown these 'spots'. This time, however, the networks didn't accept the 'spots', ("too much Jesus talk!").

The cooperatively-produced radio 'spot' series Choice have also received wide coverage. The messages, 90 seconds in length, are designed to be aired daily, five times per week, for 13 weeks. They are aimed at persons who may not usually be found listening to traditional kinds of Gospel programs. The current series is or has been aired by 43 stations across Canada. Of these 14 station placements were made by local pastors and 27 were placed by Mennonite Radio Television (MRTC), the marketing agency in Canada.

Option is the French language version of Choice. Twenty programs have been prepared and are being marketed in Quebec and French language stations in the U.S. The follow-up for these programs will be undertaken in Quebec. TV 'spots' have been adapted with 'French-Canadian' voices and are being marketed. "Avoir Le Coup de Foudre," the French translation of David Augsburger's tract, 'Like Falling in Love', was produced the past year. Twenty thousand copies have been published and will be used as a 'response piece' for the radio programs. Copies are available from the MRTC offices in Winnipeg.

We also participated in the production of a 43-minute film. If There Be Peace. Four stories in the film illustrate that peace making is a way of life, the way of love. The film, with study guide, posters and brochures, will be available from the Board of Evangelism offices in Winnipeg.

Future plans involve a multi-media approach. Radio, T.V., print and display media will be produced and released simultaneously. The problems of alienation, loneliness, fear and hopelessness will be addressed with the truth that a relationship with God provides us with strength to sustain hurts, risks and separation and frees

us to experience his love and the love of others. "God gives us love that sets us free!" These messages would be released in 1976-1977. The cost of the campaign is estimated at \$100,000 over three years.

The media committee and the Board have considered the implications of a proposal that would have Mennonite Brethren becoming partners, with the General Conference Mennonites and the Mennonite Church, in re-organized Mennonite Broadcasts Incorporated. The delegates at the General Conference sessions (August, in Winnipeg) will be asked to respond to a recommendation from the Board of Mass Media to this effect.

We ask you to pray for us, as we, with others, seek to bring the Gospel to the attention of media 'congregations'. Pray that God's truth in Christ would continue to be the "power of God unto salvation" for many.

- Discussion: There is some concern as to the large amount of money, some \$50,000 or \$60,000 being loaned to a small group. The Board of Management shares this concern.

Amendment: Add the words . . . "provided that the local group first raise 20% of the amount."

The amended motion then CARRIED Yes 187 No 146

Recommendation 3 also CARRIED, considered to be a part of recommendation 4.

Budget -- The budget was presented and discussed.

XIX Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns - (continued)

The recommendation regarding the role of women (Resolution #5), was again brought to the floor by way of a new resolution, as follows:

Resolution #5--The Scriptures teach that men and women "are joint heirs of the grace of Life" (I Pet. 3:7). They also record the significant role women filled as fellow workers in the early church (Romans 16; Phil. 4:2-3). However, several biblical texts also put strictures on the place of the woman in the church (I Cor. 14; I Tim. 2) on the basis of which we must recognize a distinction between the function of men and women in the church. God's creation order has not been abrogated by redemption.

Be it therefore resolved:

- That the Canadian Conference of M.B. Churches go on record as not favoring the ordination of women for the preaching and pastoral ministry nor their election to Boards and offices whose work is of the nature of eldership, such as the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns, and the Board of Reference and Counsel or its equivalent.
- 2. That the Canadian Conference declare women eligible to be elected as delegates to conferences and to church and conference boards and committees other than those referred to in recommendation #1.

Some discussion took place, including a response by two women who spoke on behalf of the lady delegates present.

- 1. This report includes the data from 119 of the 126 Canadian Mennonite Brethren congregations. The data from 14 congregations was sent in either too late for inclusion here or else it has not been received to date. One of the problems is that 28 congregations end their church year in the spring of the year, April, May, or June. As a result difficulty is experienced in getting this material to the statistician in time for compilation in readiness for the Annual July Canadian Conference. For this reason I wish to request a change in the statistical reporting period. For the 1976 July Conference I wish to report to the end of 1975. This report will, however, then include the 28 congregations which are also included in this present report. To facilitate this changeover there will be this necessary duplication for one reporting period only.

 I do wish to acknowledge the many pastors, church statisticians and secretaries who so promptly completed the question-
- Following are some observations I wish to make on the basis of the material on hand. This is by no means a definitive list. Several interpretive articles will appear in future editions of the MB Herald.
 - A. Sunday School--An average of 5,535 adults attend Sunday School. A conservative estimate indicates that approximately 7,000 church members do not attend Sunday School. This number does not include adults active in Sunday School, teaching or assisting in some other way. Why don't they? What are the reasons for not attending? What are the implications for our children in terms of the models the parents present?
 - B. Education

naire.

- The attendance at MB Bible Institutes has shown a steady climb from 1972-73 - 341, 1973-74 - 371, 1974-75 - 426.
- Attendance at Conference or Church-sponsored Christian High Schools is at an all-time high of 755.
- 3. A total of 28 Canadian MB students attended Tabor and Pacific College. An enquiry at Trinity Western College, Langley, B.C. revealed that 32 Canadian MB

students were attending that institution (30 from B.C., 2 from Alta.).

C. Demographic Information

- There were 17 cases of mixed marriages (MB member to an unbeliever).
- There were 17 divorces and separations as opposed to 7 for the previous year.
- 3. There are 909 single persons over age 30. 736 of these are women. Is there an awareness of the unique service contribution that these persons can make? Are these persons kept in mind in the planning of the church program? Are they involved in the main stream of the life of the church?
- 4. There are 1,066 widows and widowers. Of these 957 are widows and 490 are concentrated in 11 congregations. One congregation alone has 118 widows. Are the needs of the aged and lonely being adequately met? What are the unique service contributions which these people can make? Has the conference an obligation to provide leadership and assistance in ministering creatively to these members of God's family?

D. Pastoral Work and Services The Sunday morning worship service still is the best attended meeting with 22,793 present. Are the best efforts made to maximize this opportunity for the proclamation of the Word?

E. Workers in the church

- 1. There seems to be a definite pattern of commissioning deacons/elders in lieu of ordaining them. 147 commissioned and 3 ordained.
- BOMAS engages 66 Canadian MB missionaries and non-MB Mission Societies engage 105 MB's.

F. Membership Statistics

- 1. 212 persons transferred to an MB church from another denomination whereas 174 MB members transferred to another denomination (an increase of 14 over the previous year).
- 2. 41 persons were excommunicated
- 3. 137 persons were released but joined no other church.

G. Finances

- Total increase for all causes increased by 27%. The previous year's increase was 20%.
- Contributions to MCC & Relief increased over the past year from \$179,040 to \$343,355, an increase of 91%. Thus an increase from \$.027 to \$.05 per member per day.
- Contributions to BOMAS increased from \$741,216 to \$889,421 an increase of 20%. Thus an increase from \$.11 per member per day to \$.14. Contributions to non-MB missions programs increased from \$133,288 to \$244,010, an increase of 83%.
- 4. The question that is often raised is "but these figures aren't accurate since people give to other causes

which are not accounted for here." To arrive at what we might possibly call a more accurate figure nine brethren from nine congregations across the country assisted in a survey of 10 members of their respective congregations. These members were asked the question, "What percentage of your charitable donations are not channelled through your local church treasury." Of the ninety persons who co-operated in the survey it was revealed that a median (or average) of 10% of their financial contributions to charity were not channelled through the local church treasury. Thus a more accurate average per member contribution for the Canadian Conference of MB's might be \$426.00.

It is hoped that the information gathered and presented in this report will be used by congregations to analyze areas of need and to take steps to correct areas of weakness and deterioration so that the Family of God would be strengthened and extended.

Able to Feed Yourself I.

-- A man is a missionary when he can feed himself out of the Word of God, without help, friends, pastor, fellowship, etc.

-- Problem is most of us in our culture never get to this point. Too easy to buy a book, phone the pastor, write a radio program, etc.

-- Even in church services--climate has to be just right before some believers can be fed.

-- ''My meat is to DO the will of God." Knowing and doing becomes the strong meat of the Word.

-- Can you feed yourself?

II. Able to Cleanse Yourself

-- Last institution to preserve the purity in our perverted world is the church.

-- Need in world today for people who will not lie, cheat,

commit adultery, etc.
-- 1 Jn. 2:1 "must be pure even as He is pure."

-- Need for church to stand firm on the principles of holiness, goodness and morality.

-- Greatest treasure on earth--good persons--for those are the people out of whom God builds strong churches and strong families.

III. Able to Take Family Responsibility

-- Example of Jesus--He was a man--when the adulterous woman brought before Him, forgave.

-- On the cross, he said to the thief, "this day, you shall be with me in paradise."

-- Must "grow up" in Christ.

-- As in the poem of "The Toy Soldier," little boy blue is dead, for he has grown up into full manhood, mature and responsible. This is to be the case with every believer, but the question remains -- is it?

Sunday afternoon message: Job 29:5

-- Great thought for the old Man.

-- Need to take time for children. God could have made us

all fully mature.

-- As Christian parents, our I PRIVILEGE to teach our children according to the ways of God. For this to be so, mothers and fathers must be ONE in the things of the Lord.

Image: Father--Mother joined into one

Child--under one influence if really ONE -- Many Christian homes divided in ideals of life, values, goals, etc. Hence two influences.

-- Two such children joined--mixed up. This is a major

problem in society today.

-- Children are like computers, what's put in, will come out. Hence Bible emphasis.

II. PREMISE

-- "Train up a child in the way which he should go."

-- Sometimes there are exceptions to this rule. Reason: child is a sinner. Fearful fact, but it's true.

- THE PRESENCE "the Almighty is with me" III.
- -- We walk today not where Jesus walked, but where He walks today. In the nursery, on the street, in the home, church, etc.
 - -- As parents who have a vision of Jesus, we must beware of building our children into modern pagans -- under the influence of our materialistic, secularistic society. -- What is the difference between Christian parents who go to church and the good moral pagans who do not?

THE SENATE OF CANADA BILL G6.

Chap. 52

An Act to incorporate Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Church of North America. (Assented to 18th December, 1945.)

Preamble.

WHEREAS the persons hereinafter named have by their petition prayed that the Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Church of North America be incorporate for the purpose of adminstering in Canada such of the property, business and other temporal affairs of the said Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Church of North America as may be entrusted by the said Canadian Conference to the corporation hereby incorporated, and for the other purposes and objects hereinafter set out, and it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition: Therefore His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows: --

Incorporation

1. Henry S. Voth, of the town of Winkler, in the province of Manitoba, clergyman; Jacob F. Redekop, of Main Centre, in the province of Saskatchewan, clergyman; Cornelius A. DeFehr, of the city of Winnipeg, in the province of Manitoba, merchant; Abram Arthur Kroeker, of the town of Winkler, in the province of Manitoba, farmer; Benjamin B. Janz, of the post office at Coaldale, in the province of Alberta, clergyman; Cornelius F. Klassen, of the city of Winnipeg, in the province of Manitoba, collector; George David Pries, of the town of Winkler, in the province of Manitoba, teacher; John A. Harder, of the post office of Yarrow, in the province of British Columbia, clergyman; Frank Cornelius Thiessen, of the post office of Abbotsford, in the province of British Columbia, teacher; Gerhard Wilhelm Peters, of the post office of Hepburn, in the province of Saskatchewan, teacher; Henry S. Rempel, of the city of Saskatoon, in the province of Saskatchewan, missionary; being the Official Board of the said Conference by virtue of their office and their successors in the said offices, together with all the qualified voters from time to time of the said Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Church of North America, are hereby incorporated under the name of "Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Church of North America," hereinafter called "the Corporation."

Head Office

2. The head office of the Corporation shall be at the city of Winnipeg, in the province of Manitoba, or at such other place in Canada as may be decided upon by the Corporation.

Objects

- 3. The objects of the Corporation shall be: --
 - (a) to promote, maintain, superintend and carry on, in any and all parts of Canada, in accordance with the doctrinal laws, constitution, acts and rulings of the Mennonite Brethren Church of North America, any or all of the work of that body:
 - (b) to organize, maintain and carry on, in any and all parts of Canada, charities and missions, and to erect, maintain and conduct therein churches, schools, colleges, orphanages, hospitals and homes for the aged;

(c) to advance in other lawful ways education, religion,

charity and benevolence;

(d) to administer in Canada the property, business and other

temporal affairs of the Corporation; and

(e) to organize and carry on, in any and all parts of Canada, in furtherance of the lawful objects of the Corporation, and not otherwise, the business of printing and publishing.

Management

4. (1) The affairs of the Corporation shall be managed by a board of directors to be known as the Official Board consisting of not less than eleven and not more than fifteen members who shall be elected by the said Canadian Conference at its annual meeting in each year, and who shall hold office during the pleasure of the said Canadian Conference.

(2) The first Official Board of the Corporation shall consist of the persons now in office as the Official Board of the said Canadian Conference, and shall hold office during the

pleasure of the said Canadian Conference.

(3) All vacancies occurring by death, removal, resignation or otherwise shall be filled by the said Canadian Conference.

Incidental powers

5. The Corporation may do all such lawful acts and things as are incidental or as may be conducive to the attainment of its objects.

Committees

6. The Corporation may exercise all its powers by and through such committees as it may from time to time by by-law appoint.

Rules, regulations and by-laws

7. The Corporation may make such rules, regulations and by-laws as it may deem necessary for the exercise of the powers conferred or which may hereafter be conferred on it by or under this or any other Act relating to it and which are not contrary to law nor inconsistent with this Act, including rules, regulations and by-laws for:

(a) the administration, management and control of the pro-

perty, affairs and business of the Corporation;

- (b) the appointment of committees and the designation of their duties:
- (c) the appointment, functions, duties and remuneration of all officers, agents and servants of the Corporation;

(d) the calling of meetings, regular or special, of the Official Board of the Corporation or of committees;

(e) the fixing of the necessary quorum and procedure in all

things at such meetings; and

(f) generally for the carrying out of the objects and purposes of the Corporation.

Capacity to acquire and hold property

8. (1) The Corporation may purchase, take, have, hold, receive, possess, retain and enjoy property, real and personal, corporeal or incorporeal, whatsoever, and for any of every estate or interest whatsoever given, granted, devised or bequeathed to it or appropriated, purchased or acquired by it in any manner or way whatsoever to, for or in favour of the ecclesiastic and eleemosynary uses and purposes of the Corporation or to, for or in favour of any religious, educational, eleemosynary or other institution established or intended to be established by, under the management of, or in connection with the uses, purposes or work of the Corporation.

(2) The Corporation may also hold for the uses and purposes aforesaid such real property or estate therein as is bona fide mortgaged to it by way of security or conveyed to it in

fide mortgaged to it by way of security or conveyed satisfaction of debts or judgments recovered.

Various powers

9. Subject always to the terms of any trust relating thereto, the Corporation may also sell, convey, exchange, alienate, mortgage, lease or demise any real property held by the Corporation, whether by way of investment for the uses and purposes of the Corporation or not, and may also from time to time, invest all or any of its funds or moneys and all or any funds or moneys vested in or acquired by it for the use and purposes aforesaid, in and upon any security by way of mortgage, hypothec or charge upon real property in any part of Canada; and for the purposes of such investment may take, receive and accept mortgages or assignments thereof, whether made and executed directly to the Corporation or to any corporation, body, company or person in trust for it; and may sell, grant, assign and transfer such mortgages or assignments either wholly or partly.

Power to invest

10. The Corporation may also invest and reinvest any of its funds

and moneys --

(a) in any bonds or debentures of any municipality or public school corporation or district in Canada, in bonds, stock and debentures or other securities of Canada or of any province thereof or in any security the payment of which is guaranteed by Canada or any province thereof: or

(b) in first mortgages or freehold property in Canada and for the purposes of the same may take mortgages or assingments thereof whether such mortgages or assignments be made directly to the Corporation in its own corporation name or to some company or person in trust for it, and may sell and assign

the same; or

(c) in any securities in which life insurance companies are authorized by Parliament to invest funds.

Power to make gifts and loans of property

11. The Corporation may make a gift of or loan any of its property, whether real or personal, for or to assist in the erection or maintenance of any building or buildings deemed necessary for any church, college, manse, school or hospital or for any other religious, charitable, educational, congregational or social purpose upon such terms and upon such conditions it may deem expedient.

Power to borrow, etc.

12. (1) The Official Board of the Corporation may from time to time for the purposes of the Corporation: --

(a) borrow money upon the credit of the Corporation;

- (b) limit or increase the amount to be borrowed;
- (c) make, draw, accept, endorse or become party to promissory notes and bills of exchange, and it shall not be necessary to have the seal of the Corporation affixed to any such note or bill;
- (d) issue bonds, debentures or other securities of the Corporation;
- (e) pledge or sell such bonds, debentures or other securities for such sums and at such prices as may be deemed expedient; and
- (f) mortgage, hypothecate, charge or pledge all or any of the real and personal property, undertaking and rights of the Corporation to secure any such bonds, debentures or other securities or any money borrowed or any other liability of the Corporation.
- (2) Nothing in this section shall be constructed to authorize the Corporation to issue any note or bill payable to bearer thereof, or any promissory note intended to be circulated as money or as the note or bill of a bank, or to engage in the business of banking or insurance.

Duration of holding of unrequired land disposal thereof

13. (1) No parcel of land or interest therein at any time acquired by the Corporation and not required for its actual use and occupation and not held by way of security, shall be held by the Corporation, or by any trustee on its behalf, for a longer period than ten years after the acquisition thereof, or for a longer period than ten years after it shall have ceased to be required for actual use and occupation by the Corporation, as the case may be, but shall, at or before the expiration of such period, be absolutely sold or disposed of, so that the Corporation shall no longer retain any interest or estate therein, except by way of security.

Extension

(2) The Secretary of State may direct that the time for the sale or disposal of any such parcel of land, or any estate or interest therein, shall be extended for a further period or periods not to exceed five years.

Limitation

(3) The whole period during which the Corporation may hold any such parcel of land, or any state or interest therein,

under the foregoing provision of this section, shall not exceed fifteen years after the date of the acquisition thereof, or after it shall have ceased to be acquired for actual use or occupation by the Corporation.

Forfeiture

(4) Any such parcel of land, or any estate or interest therein, not within the exceptions hereinbefore mentioned, which has been held by the Corporation for a longer period than authorized by the foregoing provisions of this section without being disposed of, shall be forfeited to His Majesty for the use of Canada.

Statement to Secretary of State

(5) The Corporation shall give the Secretary of State, when required, a full and correct statement of all lands, at the date of such statement, held by the Corporation, or in trust for it, and subject to the provisions of this section.

Application

(6) This section shall apply only to lands and estate or interests therein which, by reason of the situation of such lands or otherwise, are subject to the legislative authority of the Parliament of Canada.

Mortmain

14. In regard to any real property which, by reason of its situation or otherwise, is subject to the legislative authority of the Parliament of Canada, a licence in mortmain shall not be necessary for the exercise of the powers granted by this Act; but otherwise, the exercise of the said powers shall in any province of Canada be subject to the laws of such province as to the acquisition and holding of lands by religious corporations, in so far as such laws apply to the Corporation.

Transfers to the Corporation

15. In so far as authorization by the Parliament of Canada is necessary, any person or corporation in whose name any property, real or personal, is held in trust or otherwise, for the use and purposes aforesaid, or any such person or corporation to whom any such property devolves, may subject always to the terms and conditions of any trust relating to such property, transfer such property, or any part thereof, to the Corporation.

Execution of deeds, etc.

16. Any deed or other instrument relating to real property or any interest therein shall be deemed to be duly executed if there be affixed thereto the seal of the Corporation and the signature of any officer of the Corporation duly authorized for such purpose or his lawful attorney.

Extra territorial powers

17. The Corporation may exercise its functions throughout Canada or elsewhere, and meetings of the Official Board of the Corporation and of any committees of the Official Board may be held at any place within Canada other than the head office of the Corporation.

BY-LAWS OF THE CANADIAN CONFERENCE OF THE MENNONITE BRETHREN CHURCH OF

NORTH AMERICA

ARTICLE I -- Confession of Faith

The Confession of Faith of the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches, hereinafter referred to as "the Conference," is the Confession of Faith of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches.

ARTICLE II -- The Conference and Other MB Conferences

Section 1 -- The Conference is an area Conference of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches and is sub-ordinate to its decisions.

Section 2 -- The provincial conferences are functionally united with the Canadian Conference and are subordinate to it. Each provincial Conference develops its own By-laws, it being understood that such By-laws will be in harmony with the provisions of the Constitution of the Conference.

ARTICLE III -- The Conference and Its Churches

Section 1 -- Any organized church desiring to become a member of the Conference must first become a member of some provincial Conference. The provincial Conference which has received it into membership then recommends its acceptance into the membership of the Canadian Conference. All the member churches of the provincial Conferences are also member churches of the Canadian Conference.

Section 2 -- Each member church is autonomuous in the structuring and management of its own local affairs. However, member churches accept as binding the decisions made by the Conference according to provisions of its constitution.

Section 3 -- When a member church is unable to resolve an issue which is harmful to its life and witness, the Conference has the right and the duty to offer its assistance in resolving the difficulty, upon request or in consultation with the respective provincial Conference.

Section 4 -- The Conference may withdraw the privilege of membership from any church which ceases to be in harmony with ideals and standards of the Conference.

ARTICLE IV -- Conventions of the Conference and the Council of Boards

Section 1 -- The Conventions of the Conference may be of two kinds:

a) Business Conventions -- At these Conventions the Boards of the Conference report on their work and present projections and recommendations for the future. The Conference acts on these reports and recommendations and carries out the necessary elections.

b) Faith and Life Conventions -- These Conventions are devotional and inspirational in character. Papers are presented and discussed and resolutions are accepted concerning pertinent areas of faith and practice in the churches

of the Conference.

- Section 2 -- The frequency, the character, the time, the place and other details of such Conventions are decided by the Conference.
- Section 3 -- Council of Boards -- The Council (Art. V, sec. 3) shall meet regularly twice a year, at the occasion of the Board meetings (Art. V, sec. 2), or at the call of the executive to:
 - share concerns and present plans and proposed actions of the various Boards;
 - b) act as the Conference-in-Interim.

ARTICLE V -- Organizational Structure of the Conference

Section 1 -- Executive Officers and Executive Committee

a) The Executive Officers of the Conference are:

1) The Moderator

2) The Assistant Moderator

3) The Secretary

Section 2 -- The Executive Secretary is an appointed officer of the Conference who serves in a consultative and liason capacity. He is appointed by the Conference Executive Committee with the approval of the Conference.

Section 3 -- Boards and their Committees and Commissions

a) The Boards of the Conference are:

1) Board of Christian Education

2) Board of Evangelism

3) Board of Higher Education

4) Board of Management

5) Board of Publication 6) Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns

7) Board of Missions and Services

8) Board of Stewardship

- b) Committees of the Boards -- Each Board may, at its discretion, appoint committees to supervise one or more sections of the board's responsibilities. Such committees are responsible to their respective Board.
- c) Commissions -- Boards may appoint temporary committees, known as commissions, for special assignments.

Section 4 -- Council of Boards -- The Council consists of the following:

a) The Executive Officers of the Conference who also serve as the Executive of the Council of Boards.

b) All the members of the Boards of the Conference.

- Section 5 -- Nominating Commission -- Each provincial Conference, one year in advance of the business Convention at which elections are to be held, elects one person to serve on a Nominating Commission. The chairman of this Commission is appointed by the Executive Committee of the Conference from the provincial representatives.
- Section 6 -- Election and Term of Office for all Boards except the Board of Missions and Services and Board of Stewardship.
 - Each Board consists of 11 members:

 Each provincial Conference elects its representative to each of the six Boards of the Conference.

- -- The other members of each Board are elected at large by the Conference at its business sessions from candidates nominated either by the Nominating Commission or from the floor.
- -- Newly elected provincial representatives and members elected at large shall take office after adjournment of the Conference convention.

The term of the Executive Officers is two years.

- The term of office of each Board member shall be four years. The terms of office of no more than six members of any Board shall regularly expire at any one business convention.
- d) No person may serve in the same position for more than two successive terms. In special circumstances this provision may be set aside by a 2/3 majority vote of the delegates of the convention.
- e) Vacancies occurring on any Board involving a member at large or the Executive between conventions shall be filled, if deemed necessary, by appointment by the Council of Boards from candidates nominated by the respective Board or Committee. When a provincial representative on a Board must be replaced, the respective province makes the appointment.
- Section 7 -- Election and Term of Office of Board of Missions and Services.
 - The Board shall consist of those members elected at conventions of any by the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches in accordance with the terms of the Constitution of the said General Conference.
 - The term of office and conditions of office of this Board shall be as set forth in the Constitution of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches.
- Section 8 -- Election and Term of Office of Board of Stewardship.
 - The Board shall consist of the Canadian members of the Board of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches as they are elected in accordance with the terms of the Constitution of the said General Conference at conventions thereof.
 - The term of office and conditions of office of this Board shall be those established for the Board of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches in its Constitution.

ARTICLE VI -- Duties

C)

A -- Executive of the Conference

Section 1 -- The Executive Officers

- Moderator -- The Moderator serves
 - 1) as chairman of all Conference Conventions; 2) as chairman of the Executive Committee;

3) as chairman of Council of Boards;

- 4) as official representative of the Conference.
- Assistant Moderator -- He assists the moderator and serves in his stead when circumstances require it.
- Secretary -- The secretary serves as 1) recording secretary at sessions of the Conventions of the Conference;
 - 2) recording secretary at Council of Boards sessions and

also Executive Committee sessions;

3) secretary for business arising out of the Executive of the Conference responsibilities.

Section 2 -- The Executive Committee:

Plans the business conventions in consultation with the executive of the province in which the Convention is held.

b) Serves as consultant in the planning of the Faith and Life Conventions, and acts as Executive Officers of these conventions.

c) Prepares the agenda for the sessions of the Council of Boards.

d) Submits to the churches all issues which require church action or vote.

e) Supervises the work of the Executive Secretary.

f) Supervises the work of the Nominating Commission. g) Represents the Council of Boards between sessions.

g) Represents the Council of Boards between sessions.
h) Considers for approval or otherwise those resolutions of the Board of Missions and Services of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches provided for under part F hereof; provided that when it deems necessary it may refer these to the Council of Boards or to a convention of the Conference.

Section 3 -- Council of Boards:

a) Seeks to co-ordinate the plans and activities of the various Board of the Conference.

b) Acts as the Conference-in-Interim and is subject to the Conference in its decisions.

c) Arranges for the filling of any vacancies occurring on any Board of the Conference or on the Executive Committee during the interim, in consultation with the respective body concerned.

Section 4 -- The Executive Secretary is responsible to the Conference Executive Committee..

B -- The Board of Christian Education

Section 1 -- The Board shall seek to initiate, promote and strengthen the program of Christian Education in the local churches of the Conference by providing counsel, offering courses, providing publicity and instructional materials, arranging and conducting regional and national conferences. The particular areas of concern are:

a) Sunday School

b) Youth Work

c) Vacation Bible School

d) Mid-week Program

- e) Church-Worker Training Program
- f) Music and Choirs g) Camps and Clubs

h) Library

- Any other educational agencies as the churches and/or the Conference shall from time to time establish.
- Section 2 -- For the execution of this program the Board provides staff and office facilities, subject to the approval of the Conference.
- Section 3 -- The Board of Christian Education works in close cooperation with the Board of Evangelism in all areas of common concern.

- C -- Board of Evangelism
 - Section 1 -- The Board shall seek to initiate, promote and strengthen the work of Evangelism in local churches and all individual agencies of the church, by such means as seem expedient, desirable and fruitful. For the execution of this program the Board provides staff and office facilities subject to the approval of the Conference.
 - Section 2 -- The Board is entrusted with the integration and extension of the mass communications media such as radio and television.
 - Section 3 -- The Board supervises and promotes work of evangelism and outreach which does not fall within the jurisdiction of a provincial conference.
 - Section 4 -- The Board of Evangelism works in close co-operation with the Board of Christian Education in all areas of common concern.
- D -- Board of Higher Education
 - Section 1 -- The Board operates and promotes the Mennonite Brethren Bible College and College of Arts.
 - Section 2 -- The Board is responsible to seek to structure and integrate, together with the boards and faculties of the Bible Institutes and Bible College, the biblical and theological training program of the Conference.
 - Section 3 -- The Board is responsible for initiating and supervising a Student Services Program to give spiritual assistance to students on the various university campuses in Canada.
 - Section 4 -- The Board is charged with the responsibility of arranging for and distributing assistance to students in the form of bursaries, scholarships, etc.
 - Section 5 -- The Board is responsible for all Canadian Conference relationships to schools and colleges other than Mennonite Brethren.
- E -- Board of Management
 - Section 1 -- The Board is responsible for the operation and supervision of Bethesda Home.
 - Section 2 -- The Board is charged with the administration and supervision of all the physical assets of the Conference.
 - Section 3 -- The Board is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Conference budget, as well as for carrying out the required budget control.
 - Section 4 -- The Board is responsible for the maintenance of adequate Conference offices.
 - Section 5 -- The Board is charged with providing salary schedules for Conference personnel.
 - Section 6 -- The Board appoints a treasurer whose duty shall be to receive, hold in custody, and disburse all funds under the supervision and administration of the Board.
- F -- Board of Publications
 - Section 1 -- The Board is charged with the responsibility of operating, promoting and supervising the Christian Press.

- Section 2 -- The Board is charged with the responsibility of publishing Conference publications.
- Section 3 -- The Board shall encourage, promote and supervise the publication of materials designed to meet specific needs of the Conference.
- Section 4 -- If the Conference has a book store then the Board shall maintain and operate such a book store.
- Section 5 -- The Board shall seek to distribute helpful Christian materials.
- G -- Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns
 - Section 1 -- The Board shall watch over the spiritual life of the Conference and its churches and give guidance, and direction in matters of faith, doctrine and the Christian life, including the giving of leadership in the clear and forceful teaching of the peace position within our Conference and its churches. Further, it shall be responsible for giving directives for structuring our peace witness in our country and in our constituencies.
 - Section 2 -- The Board shall, when it deems it necessary, initiate appropriate action or serve as a reference body in issues of social concern.
 - Section 3 -- The Board shall be responsible for providing direction in matters of church polity. It shall also establish and maintain a functioning pulpit committee to assist churches in ministerial placement.
 - Section 4 -- The Board shall be responsible for fostering wholesome contacts in Inter-Church relations as well as for contacts with other church-related bodies.
 - Section 5 -- The Board shall watch over the Constitution and implement required amendments.
 - Section 6 -- The Board shall plan Faith and Life Conventions in consultation with the Executive Officers of the Conference.
 - H -- Board of Missions and Services
 - Section 1 -- Except as hereinafter provided this Board shall have all those duties and powers provided for the Board of Missions and Services in the Constitution of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches.
 - Section 2 -- Subject to sub-section 3 below this Board is responsible for such part of the missions and services enterprises of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches which may from time to time be delegated to it by the Board of Missions and Services of the General Conference and on such terms and conditions as it may by resolution provide.
 - Section 3 -- Subject to sub-section 4 below, this Board shall accept only such duties and responsibilities for the missions and services enterprises of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches as are approved by resolution of the Executive Committee of this Conference.
 - Section 4 -- The Executive Committee may, of its own motion, refer for approval or otherwise by resolution, any matter referred to in Section 3 hereof to the Council of Boards or to a Convention of this Conference.

- I -- Board of Stewardship
 - Section 1 -- The Board shall have all those duties and powers provided for the Board of Trustees in the Constitution of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches insofar as those may be delegated to it by the said Board of Trustees and subject to the provisions of Section 4 of this part.
 - Section 2 -- Subject to delegation by the Board of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches and subject to the provisions of Section 4 below this Board is responsible for the carrying out of the Stewardship program of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches within Canada. This duty shall include the receipt of funds, whether absolute or subject to trust conditions, and shall also include entering into any lawful contracts with donors to the said Stewardship program as the Board may from time to time determine.
 - Section 3 -- The Board shall be responsible for all such assets of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches which may from time to time be delegated to it by the Board of Trustees of the said General Conference, subject to the provisions of Section 4 of this part. The Board shall be responsible for such personnel of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches as established by delegation from the said Board of Trustees and subject to the provisions of Section 4 hereof.
- Section 4 -- The Board shall carry out its delegated duties on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches wholly at the expense of the said General Conference. All authority of this Board to act shall terminate with the termination of necessary funding by the said General Conference. Any and all contracts executed by this Board and which impose any present or future liability upon the Conference shall require agreement to indemnify in full by the said General Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Churches.
- J -- Nominating Commission
 - Section 1 -- The Commission shall prepare a slate of candidates for all the offices that are to be filled at the Business Conventions of the Conference.
 - Section 2 -- The Commission is responsible to the Executive Committee of the Conference and presents its slate of candidates to the secretary of the Conference two months before the convening of the Convention.

ARTICLE VII -- Amending the Constitution

- Section 1 -- Notice of Amendment of the Constitution may be given at any Convention of the Conference or at any session of the Council of Boards.
- Section 2 -- Such Notice of Amendment is then to be presented to the churches of the Conference at least three clear months before the Convention of the Conference at which it is to be voted on.
- Section 3 -- A two-thirds majority of those present and voting shall be required to carry an amendment.

APPENDIX I

GUIDELINES COVERING SESSIONS OF THE

COUNCIL OF BOARDS*

I. Purpose of the Council of Boards Sessions

Each board shares a resume of plans, proposals and recommendations with the members of the council. This sharing may be for one or more of the following purposes:

1. To obtain counsel from the brethren of the Council of

Boards concerning some specific proposals.

2. To give notice to other Boards whose work may be affected by a specific proposal so that necessary consultations and adjustments can take place before the issue is presented to the Conference.

3. To have the Council of Boards act as the Conference-in-Interim. The Council of Boards is always responsible to the

Conference for such decisions.

II. Method of Effecting Purpose

1. After a Board has submitted its plans, proposals and recommendations, opportunity is given for questions to be directed to the Board reporting.

2. The Council of Boards should limit the length of time for

discussion on the concern of any one Board.

3. If it is deemed advisable, a vote may be taken to indicate to the Board concerned what brethren who are not specifically involved with that particular issue think. Such a vote is taken for information purposes only, and does not represent Council of Boards authorization other than as indicated in I. 3 above. No Board should at any time attempt to influence voting on such issues at a Convention by making reference to support indicated in the Council of Boards.

4. Only when the Council of Boards acts as the Conference-in-Interim is the regular conference procedure of motion and

voting followed.

BASIC PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE*

1. Financial Responsibility

One of the major responsibilities of a Board is to make certain that finances are administered properly. This involves seeing that adequate revenue is obtained, that funds are spent without waste, and that accounting and auditing are properly handled.

Boards must remain within the limits of Conference budget decisions in their spending. An accepted budget is a charge to the Board and should never be treated lightly. Only upon proper authorization may a Board spend beyond the limits of an accepted budget.

2. Board Functioning

A Board is a Board only when it is in session. As an individual, the Board member functions as a church member. There is no Board except in meetings duly called and convened, and then only after roll-call and before adjournment. Not even in Board meetings has a member any personal authority, he has only his voice and his vote. The control of the work is in the vote. The resolutions that are regularly adopted govern the work. Every congregation or Conference must guard against possible "power methods" exerted by certain influential people. Board members may convince by facts and persuade by the logic of argument but never coerce.

Legally, then, the Board member has no authority outside of sessions of the Board except when such authority has been delegated to him by the Board. Much trouble can be saved the Board if the individual members will confine their exercise of prerogatives to Board sessions. Board members must be careful not to appear to commit the Board to any stand in private or public statement which the Board as a whole might be unwilling to take, No one person ever speaks for the entire Board unless so delegated.

3. Rules of Order

- 1. A brotherhood session calls for united action involving participation of all assembled for the transacting of business. Brethren should refrain from making remarks in the benches which are not addressed to the entire assembly.
- 2. Brethren should stand when addressing the assembly and should first address the chair with "Brother Moderator." Only after the Moderator has recognized the speaker, should he begin to address the assembly.
- the assembly.

 3. A brother speaks to the Moderator. When he wishes to question an individual brother, he addresses the question to the Moderator. Personal remarks are out of order. Two brethren may not engage in a dialogue on the floor; statements must be made to the Moderator.
- 4. Brethren should confine their remarks to the particular motion under discussion.

5. If a brother has spoken to a question once, he may not speak a second time on the same question so long as any member who has not previously spoken desires the floor. After others have spoken, he is permitted to speak again but should not ask for the floor more than three times on one issue. The mover may answer questions to the motion as often as they are raised.

B. Specific Procedures

1. Motions

a) The form of a simple main motion is: "Brother Moderator,

I move that "

b) The form of a complex main motion is: "Brother Moderator, I move the adoption of the following resolution: Resolves, that this Conference...."

Every complex main motion should be in writing, and, if necessary, printed copies should be available to the delegates. The Moderator has the right to require that any main motion be put into writing by the mover and deposited, if passed, with the Secretary.

c) A motion must be seconded before it can be discussed. If no one can be found to second a motion, it is not discussed and the Moderator simply rules that the motion fails for lack

of seconding.

d) Immediately after a motion has been seconded, the Moderator announces that the motion is now before the brotherhood for discussion. The mover may speak to the motion first. This privilege is for the sake of clarification of the motion.

e) The Moderator must not allow two separate motions to come

before the brotherhood at the same time.

f) Whenever a motion has been made, seconded and discussed, it must be voted upon at that meeting unless the brotherhood agrees to dispose of it in another way.

g) Several motions are voted on without discussion, as for

example:

i. a motion to adjourn

- ii. a motion to table or withdraw a motion, and
- iii. a motion for an immediate vote.

2. Amendments

a) A motion to amend takes precedence over the main motion.

b) The form of an amendment is "Brother Moderator, I move that we amend the motion by (adding, striking out, inserting the word...."

c) The amendment must be seconded and may be discussed.

- d) There may be an amendment to the amendment. Amendments of the third degree are not permitted.
- e) An amendment changes one aspect of the main motion; it may not introduce an entirely new motion nor negate the main motion.

Referrals

a) An issue may be referred to a committee before the brother-

hood votes on the question.

b) The form of a motion to refer would be: "Brother Moderator, I move that we refer this question (or resolution) to (name the Board or persons)."

c) A motion to refer may be discussed and amended so that the

Board receives specific instructions.

4. Withdrawals

- a) A main motion may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a final action is taken. The consent of the seconder is not required.
- b) Every motion made and seconded is property of the brother-hood. The Moderator says: 'Brother X asks leave to withdraw his motion. Is there an objection? I hear none; therefore permission is granted."

Should someone desire to retain the motion on the floor, he may object. The motion cannot then be withdrawn unless some delegate moves that Brother X be permitted to withdraw his motion. A vote follows without discussion.

5. Closing Discussions

- a) A brother may move to limit discussion on a question and should state the limitation of time (eg. twenty minutes) or the number of persons to speak. Such a motion must be seconded, must not be discussed, and requires immediate vote and a two-thirds majority for its acceptance.
- b) After the alloted time, or the number of speakers designated have spoken, the time may be extended by a motion to extend the limits of discussion.
- c) A motion to close discussion must be brought to a vote immediately. It is not discussed nor can it be amended. A two-thirds majority is required to pass it.
- d) Discussion may be closed by general consent. The Moderator will say, "Are you ready for the question?" If no objections are raised, he proceeds to the vote. Should there be an objection, the discussion must be closed by motion.

6. Tabling a Motion

- a) When the brotherhood wishes to delay action on certain business, the motion to lay on the table may be used.
- b) The form used is, "Brother Moderator, I move that we table this motion."
- c) The motion to table may not be discussed nor amended, requires a second, and is passed by a simple majority.
- d) The tabled motion may be taken from the table by a motion from the assembly. The motion to take from the table is not debatable and requires a simple majority to carry.

7. Reconsidering or Rescinding a Motion

- a) When a brotherhood realizes that a motion has been passed which might not be in the best interest of the work, it may be returned for reconsideration. The motion to reconsider must be made on the same day that the motion to be reconsidered was passed, or on the day immediately following.
 - b) The form is, "Brother Moderator, I move to reconsider the vote on (name the motion)."
 - c) A simple majority is required to return for reconsideration a motion previously passed.
 - d) No question may be twice reconsidered.
 - e) The motion to rescind may be made at any time, regardless of time lapse, and requires a two-third vote to pass.
 - f) The form is, "Brother Moderator, I move that we rescind the motion that (state the motion)."

8. Nominations

a) When nominations are entertained from the floor, the Moderator will say: "Nominations are now in order for the

office of....."

b) Nominations do not require a second.

c) A motion "to close nominations" is not in order until the assembly is ready. Where a brother makes a premature motion to close nominations, the Moderator should ignore the motion and simply say: "Are there further nominations?"

d) The Moderator may ask if there are further nominations and, if none are given, he may declare nominations closed. He may also entertain a motion to close nominations.

e) A motion to reopen nominations may be made when it seems advisable in the interest of securing additional good candi-

dates for an office.

f) When nominations are secured through the report of a committee, additional nominations may be made from the floor. g) A motion to elect by acclamation is in order only when the Constitution permits it. If the Constitution does permit

such a procedure, a two-thirds majority is required to pass

the motion.

9. Voting

a) Before voting the Moderator clearly states the motion or election before the brotherhood.

b) The vote is taken by voice, by show of hands, or by ballot.

c) Any brother may move to vote by ballot. Such a motion is not debatable and must be brought to a vote at once.

d) Any brother may request an accurate count of hands. request is sufficient to order a count.

e) Brethren should not decline to vote without good reason.

10. Point of Order

a) The purpose of a "point of order" is to call attention to an error in procedure or improper conduct. A point of order may be raised by the Moderator or a brother of the assembly. b) In a brotherhood meeting a point of order could refer to a personal or an unbrotherly remark made by some delegate. It would then take the form of an admonition. Normally, the brother would then retract the remark.

c) The Moderator rules on a point of order and declares that the point is either "well taken" or "not well taken." A point of order requires no vote, except when challenged by

someone.
