75th Annual Convention Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches

Waterloo, Ontario July 4-7, 1986

SESSION #1: Friday afternoon, July 4, 1986 (4:00 p.m.)

Chairmen - John H. Redekop, Herb Neufeld Secretaries - Robert Friesen, Peter Falk

1. Opening of the Convention

Gerald Ediger, moderator of the Ontario conference, welcomed the delegates and guests to the convention.

Br. Ediger introduced Fred Lehman who led us in singing "Bind Us

Together"

Gerald Ediger read Psalm 86: 11-12. He then led the delegation in prayer.

Br. Redekop introduced John Reimer, Member of Parliament for Kitchener. He brought greetings from the Parliament and from the Prime Minister.

2. Preliminary Business

John Redekop asked the delegates in various categories to stand.

2.1 Rules of order

Robert Friesen, Conference Secretary, read an excerpt from the Rules of Order from the *Leadership Handbook* (p.28).

Section B: General Guidelines

 A convention of our brotherhood calls for united action involving the participation of all assembled for the transaction of business. Delegates should refrain from making remarks in the benches which are not directed to the entire assembly.

2. A delegate should stand when addressing the assembly and should first address the chair with "Brother Moderator." Except as otherwise allowed, he should begin to address the assembly only after he has been

recognized by the chair.

3. A delegate speaks to the chair. When he wishes to question an individual delegate he addresses the question to the chair. Personal remarks are out of order. Two delegates may not engage in a dialogue on the floor; statements must be directed to the chair.

- Delegates should confine their remarks to the particular motion or resolution under discussion.
- 5. If a delegate has spoken to a question once, he may not speak a second time to the same question so long as any delegate who has not previously spoken desires the floor. After others have spoken, he is permitted to speak again but he should not ask for the floor more than three times on one issue. The mover may answer questions to a motion as often as they are raised.

3.1 Report

John Redekop presented his report.

Our 1986 convention theme, "Jesus Christ the same, yesterday, today and forever", emphasizes a vital affirmation. In the midst of change—societal, financial, educational; organizational, and familial, the Person and promises of our Lord remain constant. We trust that even as we deal with a wide assortment of issues, our convention will be centred on our Saviour and Lord.

Since 1986 marks the 200th year since the first Mennonites came to what is now Canada, we will be joining with several other anabaptist conferences in celebrating the bicentenniel. Sunday forenoon and afternoon we will have joint services in the spacious Kitchener Memorial Auditorium and Sunday evening—for other conferences on Saturday evening—there will be a concert in the beautiful "Centre in the Square."

Because we will have no scheduled MB convention activities on Sunday, we will be pressed for time. Therefore our sessions begin at 4:00 p.m. on Friday afternoon. On Saturday and Monday mornings Dr. J. B. Toews, Fresno, CA, one of our patriarchs, will challenge the conference. Saturday evening's Church Growth Banquet will feature Dr. George Brunk, a dynamic Mennonite Church evangelist from Virginia. In earlier years brother Brunks' crusades and other ministries took him to all major MB regions in Canada.

During the past year the executive had six meetings, several spread over two days. In those sessions as well as in telephone discussions and by mail, we dealt with many issues beyond arranging for two Council of Boards sessions and planning this convention. Perhaps the most consequential one involved Canadian Conference restructuring.

In recent years it has become evident that changing conditions such as greater provincial conference activity, regionalism, "distancing" between provincial and national conferences, insufficient program coordination

among national boards, a weak national leadership structure, expanding national conference offices and challenges, as well as chronic budget problems indicated that we should review our organization. At the 1985 convention in Regina the executive presented a proposal to create an expanded national leadership committee. In October all churches were invited to respond to it. After evaluation of the responses and further study a more wide-ranging restructuring proposal was presented to the Council of Boards in Winnipeg on February 1, 1986. Again constituency feedback was solicited. Within two months almost all of our provincial executives and about 40 congregations sent written respones. Others telephoned their reactions and some reported personally.

After a two-day session in April where we read all responses. analyzed the general trends, and carefully and prayerfully considered various options, the executive again revised its proposal. This revision has been sent to all members of the Council of Boards as well as provincial conference moderators. Following further discussions with boards in early

July, we hope to bring specific recommendations to the convention.

Another major activity focused on MB higher education in Canada. Last November 9 and 10 more than 30 educators and conference leaders. invited by the Inter-Institutional Relations Committee of the Board of Higher Education, met at Columbia Bible Institute (now Columbia Bible College) for an intense study of the situation. The Canadian Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns, all provincial executives (except Quebec), and all schools including our Fresno seminary, were represented, all but one by both president/principal and board chairman. Given the enrolement data and projections, fiscal realities, and institutional trends, it quickly became evident that the time had come for a thorough study.

The assembled representatives decided to constitute themselves as an ad hoc coordinating council. Given the scope of the proposed undertaking, the Canadian Conference Executive, who were all present then assumed leadership at the request of the council. Together with the provincial moderators and the General Conference moderator, Brother Herb Brandt, we initiated the process of establishing a Higher Education Task Force. Soon the terms of reference were clarified and after some weeks the three brethren, Edmund Janzen, Herb Kopp, and Abe Konrad (chairman) were appointed. We are grateful for their willingness to serve. The task force will be meeting with the coordinating council on July 4 in Kitchener and will present an interim report to the convention.

A third major endeavor involved inter-Mennonite relations. For about a decade Canadian anabaptist moderators and secretaries have met annually, generally preceding the January MCC Canada meeting, to discuss various concerns of mutual interest. Some of our MB brothers and sisters have urged greater ecumenicity; others have urged caution. In January. 1986, during our sessions at the Fraserview MB Church in B. C., the moderators and secretaries decided to schedule a major consultation in which theological and practical commonalities and differences would be fully and frankly aired. Together with four other denominational leaders I serve on the planning committee for this historic event. It is scheduled for January 21 and 22, 1987, in Winnipeg. After those sessions we should understand one another much better.

A fourth significant activity developed out of a non-MB initiated study of anabaptist theological education opportunities in Canada. The first major meeting with MB participation took place at Conrad Grebel College in Waterloo, in June, 1985. The second was scheduled for Winnipeg in June, 1986. Together with several other MBs I represent you in these gatherings. It is important that we know what other anabaptist conferences are planning and to interact concerning the Canadian challenges and perhaps unique needs.

Various other duties and involvements, all interesting and rewarding, were undertaken on your behalf. Brother Herb Neufeld, the assistant moderator, and I represented the Canadian MB Conference on the General Council of the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada; as vice-president I also serve on the EFC executive. Membership on the board of MCC Canada, where MBs have a five-person contingent, involved many hours of challenging deliberation. More than 20 visits to MB churches and to provincial conference sessions allowed me to put in many a good word for our Canadian conference. Similarly, fraternal interaction with MBs in the US

and elsewhere provided enriching experiences.

Correspondence comprises a growing segment of executive activity. Hardly a day goes by without several letters needing to be answered. The many letters received from within our own constituency, as well as the letters from non-MBs, not to mention queries from media reporters, underscore the fact that if the executive's duty was once seen mainly as planning for conventions, those days are gone. Clearly the tasks at hand involve leadership during a convention as well as leadership of a conference. Our sisters and brothers rightly expect leaders to provide strong but fully accountable servant-leadership and, with God's enablement, we are prepared to provide it to the best of our abilities.

At a more personal level my ministries have ranged from serving on our seminary board, to "defending the faith" in debates with Marxists in Ottawa and B. C., to explaining evangelical anabaptism in varied settings,

and to numerous research, writing, and speaking assignments.

As an executive we are dedicated to provide the most effective servant-leadership we can. For us this includes addressing important issues, being innovative when necessary, making ourselves available, being sensitive to constituency wishes and needs, and exhorting ourselves and others to remain true to our evangelical anabaptist understanding of Christianity, an anabaptism primarily biblical and only secondarily historical.

Finally, on behalf of the executive I want to thank the many who prayed for us and expressed support in other ways. The brothers Henry Brucks, Jake Riediger, and James Nikkel have provided much help. Sister Elsie Brucks assisted with many mailings. I also want to thank brother Gerry Ediger, moderator of the host province, brother Henry Esau, brother C. J. Rempel, and sister Elizabeth Esau, who are giving strong leadership in the local hosting committee. A special word of thanks goes to Herb Neufeld, my able assistant, and to our computer-friendly secretary, Robert Friesen.

Our desire is that God would use us to his glory and that he would bless our convention participants in Kitchener-Waterloo in a mighty way. May our commitment to Jesus and our desire to serve him be strengthened. As we assemble, July 4 to 7, may we come to understand more fully the powerful truth that indeed "Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and

forever."

Thank you for the privilege of allowing us to be your servants. Sisters and brothers, please continue to pray for us.

3.2 Higher Education Task Force

Herb Neufeld introduced Abe Konrad, and Herb Kopp. Abe Konrad, the chairman of Task Force presented his report.

The Canadian Conference Executive appointed a Task Force to examine the status of higher education in the Canadian Conference—the needs, existing provisions, new options—and to prepare recommendations for future developments.

The mandate of the Task Force was outlined as follows:

 Evaluate the postsecondary needs of the Canadian Conference (nationally and regionally);

2. Assess the present options and resources;

Suggest possible options to meet the needs of the Conference;

4. Prepare proposals and recommendations for the future, with

supporting rationale;

- 5. The Task Force should feel free to address any relevant questions, including the following questions raised at the November 1985 Inter-Institutional Consultation:
 - a) Is higher education a national or regional issue;
 b) Coordination and clarification of a tiered structure;
 - c) The implications of 'financial squeeze' on our institutions;
 - d) What implications do our decisions have on the seminary and on the U. S. Conference.

- 1. High school enrolment data from our churches
- Enrolment and financial data from the schools.
- Written briefs from constituency members (Oct. 15/86)

4. Campus visits to each institution (Fall 1986)

Consultations with provincial executives (Fall 1986)

6. Presentation to Council of Boards (Winter 1987)

- 7. Presentations to provincial conventions (Spring 1987)
- 8. Recommendations to Canadian convention (July 1987)

Assumptions

 There exists a continuing need for higher education in our Conference—for Bible centered training for lay leaders and church workers.

2. Demographic projections suggest a stabilization, if not an actual

decline, in the potential student population.

- In many respects, higher education has become a national issue in Canada; none of our schools regards its boundaries in narrow regional terms.
- 4. Institutional developments leading to accreditation and degreegranting status will result in higher costs.

The escalating costs will present ever greater demands upon our resources—both fiscal and human.

6. New alternatives should be adopted only if they enhance program

offerings and opportunities.

Canadian Conference of M. B. Churches

To the Conference of Mennonites in Canada:

During recent years some leaders in the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches have been reminded of some earlier events which need to be addressed. Although we can find no conference or board decision calling for such action, we have evidence that in various parts of Canada the following practice did occur. Some congregations and leaders interpreted one of our conference principles to mean that if an M. B. member married a member of the General Conference Churches, now Conference of Mennonites in Canada, then that M. B. member should be ex-communicated. Fortunately the practise was not widespread but it did take place and for such action we are sorry and ask for your forgiveness.

We thank you for you willingness to hear us and for your graciousness in responding to our request.

1. Worship

2. Moderator's Message

John Redekop, the Conference Moderator, presented his message.

Jesus Christ the Same: Yesterday, Today and Forever

The fact that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever constitutes one of the pivotal Gospel truths. Today we will look at four key qualities or roles of our unchanging Lord. We will remind ourselves of what they mean, how we should respond, and consider also how we rate in acknowledging each one.

A. Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

The importance of the first role is underscored by Jesus' specific question to the Pharisees as recorded in Matt. 22:41; "What do you think about the Christ? Whose son is he?" For all Christians the answer must be assertive and unequivocal: Jesus Christ is the Son of God. He always was the Son of God, he presently is the Son of God, and he always will be the Son of God.

Jesus himself affirmed his sonship. Mark 14:60 and 61 records his words. Caiaphas, the prosecuting high priest, asked Jesus several trapsetting questions to which Jesus gave no answer. But when he asked, "Are you the Christ, the Son of the Blessed One?" Jesus did not hesitate but confirmed the fact. "I am," was his response. God the Father confirmed this truth also when, at Jesus' baptism, he proclaimed, "This is my Son, whom I

love, with him I am well pleased." (Matt. 3:17)

Unfortunately, most people on earth do not accept Jesus Christ as the Son of God; some because of ignorance, many because they choose to reject his claim. True, most people acknowledge Jesus as an historical person but they accept him for much less than what he was and thereby they actually deny him. It has been estimated that 80% of all people living today acknowledge that Jesus was a great moral teacher. Of course he was that but being a great teacher does not make him unique. It has also been estimated that 40% of the world's population, a 40% which includes all muslims, believe that Jesus was a very influential religious prophet sent by God. That's a higher view but it's not good enough either. Jesus was no mere moral teacher or great prophet sent by God. He was and is and will remain the Christ, the eternal Son of God.

Is that truly our view of him? Do we see him as exclusive, as the only divine incarnation? Of course we do. Article 1 of our Confession of Faith says so! But sometimes I wonder. The exalted holiness and majesty and uniqueness of Jesus is easily minimized in an egalitarian church and in a democratic society both of which stress equality and commonality. We may not be as correct and as Biblical here as we think. In some of our attitudes, our speech, our singing, in our all-too-common inattention and irreverence in the pews, and sometimes even in our worship arrangements and church facilities we deny Jesus' grandeur and glory. That may explain why we sometimes have difficulty praising our Lord. If we develop a high view of Jesus it is easier to praise him, if we develop a lower view of Jesus, it is more difficult. If we see Jesus mainly as an available friend we can still be sentimental about him but not really filled with praise. What is your focus? What is mine? Non-Christians focus on Jesus' birth, modernists emphasize certain aspects of Jesus' life, some Catholics and some Protestants dwell on Jesus' death, but all true Christians, of whatever persuasion, celebrate Jesus' resurrection, ascension, and eternal throne in heaven.

As the one and only Son of God Jesus is unique. Do we unashamedly assert that truth? Do we insist that all other self-proclaimed mediators, from Mohammed to the Rev. Moon are false? Do we say and teach with conviction that all religions which do not accept Jesus as the Son of God are inherently in error? At times I think that I detect just a little hesitance in this area. We all meet some very admirable, kind people who have a low view of Jesus and we can easily slip into a mindset which says "Can they really all

be wrong?"

Generally the compromises and difficulties are subtle, not easily detectable. Often they involve our own theological slippage quite apart from interaction with people of non-Christian persuasions. What is the situation in our own congregations? Have we popularized Jesus too much? Have we humanized him at the expense of his deity? Do we affirm his sonship less than we used to? less than we should? The danger is not that we will formally declare Jesus to be less than he is, a mere moral model or great prophet; the danger is that we will simply treat him that way. If in practice we scale Jesus down to our limited understanding, if we describe him mainly as a fellow man, then he is misrepresented, our heavenly Father is grieved, we are missing rich blessings, and a spiritually lost world is short-changed.

If I were an examiner charged with assigning Canadian Mennonite Brethren a mark on their affirmation of Jesus' sonship, I could go no higher than a "B". We need to recognize Jesus more fully as the holy, majestic,

enthroned Son of God.

On the question of unique and exalted sonship we can yield no ground because the fact of this sonship is foundational to the whole redemption story. Jesus' own exclusive claim stresses the point. "I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). This claim by Jesus not only underscores his uniqueness but also brings us to the second major unchanging role.

B. Jesus Christ, the Saviour of Sinners.

Our great redeemer said, "I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance" (Matthew 9:13). Jesus came as saviour and remains our unchanging saviour. That's what the angels announced at Bethlehem. "Unto you has been born this day a saviour..." (Luke 2:11). Two questions are at issue here. First, do we still hold to this vital doctrine? And second, how faithful have we been in proclaiming it? Jesus' role as saviour takes on meaning only if we believe that we need a saviour. Do we still believe that there is no salvation apart from the transformation which comes by rebirth?

In some circles today Jesus' role as saviour gets short shrift. For some people the whole notion of Christian salvation becomes so depersonalized. blurred, and generalized that it lacks any real meaning. Everybody is a child of God, and there is no need to talk about the saved and the lost. Since the need for salvation has been rationalized away, we needn't think much about the saviour either. May such attitudes never gain a foothold in our ranks. God's requirement has not changed. Without a personal acceptance of salvation no one enters into the kingdom of God. The beginning of Christian life may take various forms. For those of us who have always believed the Bible stories, the initiation into God's family may involve not so much a radically changed belief system or lifestyle as a conscious and unreserved commitment to confess Jesus before others and to obey him, to give him first place and to yield our will to him. But such a commitment is still a personal decision, nobody else can make it for us. And it is an authentic personal decision even if we cannot remember exact dates and even if it comes gradually. Let me illustrate the point. I cannot tell you exactly when I decided to ask a certain girl to marry me. I do not even know if I made the decision on any one day, but I certainly know that I made the decision. The evidence is there for me to experience and for all to see.

Becoming a Christian takes various forms. It can be sudden and traumatic, as for Paul, or it can be a process culminating in a clear public statement. Both experiences are valid. I cannot remember a time when I did

not believe, in terms of mental concurrence, that Jesus was the saviour of the world but I can well remember a time when I was not a Christian. I had not cashed in the salvation cheque which Jesus had made out in my name. I knew that I was lost because I knew I was still living for self, not for God. Many of you remember such a time. And I cannot tell you exactly when I decided to accept Jesus' invitation, partly because I always intended to accept it and partly because I accepted it in stages. With Paul I can say that I am still working out my salvation but that does not negate the fact that I have made a personal decision to be a Christian and at a certain time took a clear and public stand. For me Christian commitment was gradual and I cannot identify its beginnings, though several experiences were important, but it culminated in the knowledge of forgiveness, renewal, and assurance of eternal life. Such an experience is no less real than the sudden decision of the thief on the cross.

Whatever its particular nature, if one does not make a personal decision, an acceptance of salvation which Jesus offers, then one is no better off than Satan and his angels who all believe the facts but who have no personal faith commitment and who therefore tremble as they contemplate their miserable end. Mere mental concurrence is not enough. Did King Agrippa believe? Did Judas Iscariot believe? Did the rich young ruler believe? Did Pilate believe? Did the Roman soldiers at the cross believe? Did the priests and pharisees who asked the tomb to be sealed believe? Are we in danger of accepting such intellectual or mental belief as adequate?

It was Jesus himself who said, "I tell you the truth, unless a man is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." (John 3:3) In II Corinthians 5:17 Paul stresses the aspect of necessity and newness. "If anyone is in Christ, he

is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come."

Are Mennonite Brethren still firmly committed to the view that Jesus came to save sinners and that if we do not accept this salvation then we are lost? Yes, indeed. But are we still preaching it clearly from the pulpits and teaching it clearly in our homes? Thank God, generally we are. Equally important, are we still giving the whole spectrum of evangelism a central place? That's the second question we must raise. We must raise it because some Christians are saying that evangelism is less important than discipleship and that church growth should not be a crucial consideration. I have trouble with such distinctions. I cannot separate evangelism from discipleship. Did Jesus not select and train disciples so that they could evangelize Jerusalem, Judea and Samaria and the uttermost parts of the world? Where did some of us ever get the notion that discipleship and evangelism are different emphases?

In his devotional writings Selwyn Hughes makes the point effectively. Concerning the church's responsibility to the outside world, evangelism, he insists, is God's highest mandate. Every generation requires regeneration. "And any church that doesn't set out to convert people is sub-Christian, no matter how often it names the name of Christ." Can any such churches be found in our midst? Does such a description fit some of our churches

sometimes? I trust not.

As Jesus insisted on conversion, so also must we. Note his unequivocal statement. "Unless you are converted...you will by no means enter the Kingdom of Heaven." (John 3:3) "It is the church's business to focus on the need for conversion, and when it does not do so...it has no right to be called a Christian church." Our services may be inspiring, our singing

impressive, our giving generous, our preaching eloquent, our friendship warm, and our welcoming of strangers sincere, but, important as all of these aspects are, if we fail to point the lost to Jesus as saviour, then we have lost our way.

Some churches have lost their way. That is why masses of people today are deserting churches where personal commitment rarely takes place and flocking to churches where it is normative and commonplace. Let us be both warned and encouraged. Having received the Gospel we must share the Gospel or it will turn out to be less than the Gospel. If we do not express

the Gospel within us, it will begin to wither.

There are some church people, perhaps even a few in our ranks who minimize evangelism. They say that the main ministry of the church should be to counteract poverty, unemployment, exploitation, famine, racism. injustice, and militarism. Some of these people argue that evangelism is only verbal and personal and that we must make the Gospel practical and social. that we must address immediate and pressing evils. Of course Christianity must be made practical but an emphasis only on the practical and external is inadequate. The practical emphasis is good but not good enough. Such an emphasis by itself substitutes fruit for root and mistakes consequences for essence. Deeds of compassion, as James tells us, are vitally important and should be increased but they are no substitute for new life. The central, and I stress central, purpose in Jesus' atonement was not to make people healthy. literate, clean, employed, fairly-treated, disease-free, enlightened or peaceful. A strictly external emphasis remains as inadequate for Lucky Lake and Leamington, or Dartmouth and Delta, or Main Centre and Montreal, as it would have been for the apostolic churches in Antioch and Jerusalem. For we cannot walk in the path of Christian service until we get onto that path. And we can only get onto that path by becoming children of God and inviting fellow-sinners to do likewise.

How does our conference rate in this area? In orthodoxy of language we do well. In foreign missions, by the grace of God, we also do quite well. At the congregational level the situation is less encouraging, or at least so it seems to me. It can be described as very uneven, although there are many notable exceptions. Some of us are inclined to neglect our Lord's evangelical business. In many instances zeal, persistent and fervent prayer, personal involvement, boldness and a readiness to sacrifice for evangelism are in short supply. We continue to believe and state that Jesus is the Saviour of the lost but many of us never get around to doing much about it. I acknowledge great personal shortcoming in this area. In my classrooms and elsewhere I utilize more opportunities than I used to, but I still fall far short of what I should do. I can give myself only a "C" at best. Do you deserve a higher rating? Does your church? Does our conference? I know of some people whom I would give an "A." Let us pray that there would be more. Let us be such people.

Concerning the future I have some concerns. Increasingly I have heard some fellow Christians talk about God not condemning true believers in other faiths, for they are so sincere. May God's spirit help us not to yield ground in this vital area. We want to be tolerant and open-minded but we must also be true to the Word. Jesus, and he alone, is the saviour of

mankind.

We turn now to our Lord's third unchanging role.

C. Jesus Christ, the Head of the Church.

Jesus himself said, "...I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." (Matt. 16:18) Jesus is now and will always be the head of his church, the church for which he gave his life. In writing to the Colossians Paul emphasizes this basic truth. "And he is the head of the

body, the church...." (Col. 1:18)

What does this basic and eternal doctrine mean for us? It means that in the church we must never give first place to anything or anyone else. You will recall the difficulties in Antioch. Some Christians, doubtlessly sincere, gave primary allegiance to Paul, others to Appollos, and still others to Cephas. Paul tactfully but firmly reprimanded them for their misguided emphasis and reminded them of Jesus' pre-eminence. Paul had to break their attachment to men and reinforce their attachment to the eternal head of the eternal church. He was saying, in essence: "glance at men but gaze on Christ."

We too must develop and maintain the right emphasis. We must rid ourselves not of denominations but of any denominationalism that puts the denomination ahead of Christ. God is not honoured when any denominational emphasis focuses on founders and leaders and traditions at the expense of the true head. For decades I have loved this conference, the brothers and sisters in the church. You are my people, but I trust that my love for my church and conference, my Christian family, will never take

precedence over my love for the head of the church.

We need also to remind ourselves that the Mennonite Brethren Conference does not sum up Christianity. We all know that but sometimes we have problems looking beyond ourselves. Other groups have similar problems. We have made considerable progress but we still need to stress the following. Because we are only one part of our Lord's great church we cooperate readily and gladly with other members of the body, whether in the Mennonite Central Committee, the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada, with various assemblies of the faithful in our local communities, or in other settings. God is honoured when we accept and respect other members of his church.

Further, because Jesus is the head of the church, the church for which he died, we worship him. We must not separate Jesus as head of the church from Jesus as object of worship. Again I cite Hughes. "The first and foremost duty of a Christian community is not to work for God but to worship Him." I agree. The Biblical sequence, as I understand it, is thus. The church helps unbelievers to become converts, helps converts to become worshippers, and then helps worshippers to become workers. If we either short-circuit or reverse that sequence we are headed for trouble. We must avoid the error of assuming that to serve man is to worship our Lord or that serving even our Lord himself, as Martha did, constitutes worship or is a substitute for worship. The old catechism is right. The chief end of man is to glorify God. If we first make worshippers out of converts-and that has great implications for what we do in our churches-then we need not fear that converts will not become workers. Do we remember that the Great Commission, as recorded in Matthew 28, was given to Christians who were worshipping? A worshipper who adores and praises God will inevitably say with Isaiah, "Here am I-send me "

How does the M. B. Conference rate in acknowledging Jesus as head of the church? That depends on whether we concur with the M. B. pastor

who told some of us in a meeting, "If I am not a Mennonite, then I am nothing." If we agree with him then we are surely in trouble and need to repent. For we are Christians first and Mennonite Brethren second. But if we can agree with Paul when he said that in comparison to the greatness of knowing Christ, the head of the church, all else is loss, even rubbish, (Philippians 3: 7-8), then we do well. It seems to me that as M.B.s we must still learn to focus more on Jesus and less on ourselves.

In fact, sometimes I think that we need to confess some collective sins. Sometimes we have come across as arrogant towards other Christians, including other anabaptists. Some have told me that they have sensed such attitudes in us. Maybe we have been tempted to take personal credit for a biblical theology of evangelical anabaptism which we have been privileged to inherit, or maybe there are other reasons, but if there be any spirit or attitude of superiority, let it be set aside, for it does not please the head of the church.

Dare we give ourselves a "B-" concerning our response to Jesus as head of the church? Would a lower mark be more accurate? Whatever the present situation, let us jointly covenant to honour and exalt the unchanging head of the church more diligently and to worship him more whole-heartedly. Where the focus has shifted from Jesus, the head, to founders and leaders. Where worship has become only fellowship, and where inspiration has degenerated into mere relaxation, let us resolve to do better.

We turn now to the fourth and final role of Jesus which we will consider today.

D. Jesus Christ is Lord, Lord of Life and Lord of All.

Jesus was Lord, is Lord, and will continue to be Lord. Scripture informs us that, among other things, he is Lord of creation, Lord of life, Lord of the sabbath, the risen Lord, and Lord of lords. To acknowledge Jesus as Lord means that we submit to him and accept his rule in our lives. While Jesus' lordship is supreme it is never imposed. It began before creation and will culminate in the final judgments when all people will recognize Jesus as King of kings and Lord of lords. But between these two times, more specifically in our present age of grace, the acceptance of Jesus' lordship is optional for us. He remains the same supreme Lord but we are free to accept or reject his direct rulership and lordship in our lives.

Lordship focuses on the person of Christ, on the submission of the disciple to the master. Lordship involves trust and a close relationship. One commentator has written, "One of the tragedies of today's church is that some are preaching the principles of Christ and missing the person....The Christian life then becomes a tense striving to live by principles, instead of a trustful fellowship with a person." My experience and observation leads me to conclude that the M. B. conference has focussed much on the principles of Christ, which is ethics, and at times relatively less on the person of Christ, which is essence. That's one reason why some M.B.s tend to experience the Christian life as one of frustrating struggle rather than a celebration of victory. The solution lies not in minimizing Christian ethics but in maximizing the person of Jesus and our relationship to him. He has given us acceptance and standing. We don't have to earn it by doing the right things. Let us not be mistaken, if a person, a church, or a denomination loses the emphasis on a personal Jesus who indwells and guides Christians as a personal Lord. then the result in the short term will be legalism and in the long term barrenness.

The acceptance of Jesus as Lord begins with mental concurrence, moves on to a reorientation of the will, then verbal affirmation, and then it expresses itself in obedient attitude and action. A mature, whole-hearted acceptance of Jesus' lordship means that we delight in living out the kind of love and compassion that Jesus did and does. In this matter Chuck Swindoll makes a telling point. He says that one of the biggest problems evangelicals have is seeing Jesus as a compassionate Lord. Evangelicals tend to answer with the right words rather than the right deeds. Recall with me Jesus' pentrating query. "Why do you call me 'Lord, Lord,' and do not do what I A disciple's verbal affirmation of lordship not (Luke 6:46) accompanied by a practical expression of the essential qualities of the lord, is a contradiction in terms. That's what Jesus emphasized in his stern warning that, "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven." (Matt. 7:21) If you and I are not doing the will of the Lord then we are rejecting his Lordship. If you and I are not practicing compassion, letting our Lord claim our possessions, setting Christian priorities for our time and talents, then we are jeopardizing our citizenship in our Lord"s kingdom and also robbing ourselves of much joy.

When I see pastors, many pastors, struggling to get church members to accept responsibility and even a little sacrifice for the cause of our Lord's church, then I must ask myself how it is that these people who would loudly insist that they are Christians have so very little desire to please and serve

their Lord—either in their church or elsewhere.

How do Canadian M.B.s rate? Are we gladly accepting and affirming our unchanging Lord and his lordship? Are we willingly and happily expressing our discipleship and servanthood in our daily walk? Would our family attest to Jesus' lordship in our lives? Would our pastor? Would our co-workers? Would our neighbours? The human inclination is to be self-assertive, independent, and unsubmissive and such tendencies are especially strong in our age when the inclinations are widely labelled as good and praiseworthy. Our M. B. ranks have not been unaffected. Notions of "More of mine and less of thine" can be found. But we also have many saints among us who convincingly model what the lordship of Christ really means.

But even as we reflect on our individual situation we remind ourselves that because Jesus is lord of the church, the full blessings of lordship can never be experienced individually. I believe that many of us have missed much of the blessing of the lordship bond because we have individualized it too much. Jesus" full lordship, his headhship, can be experienced only by a body.

Dare we give oursevives another "B-" or would the Lord's totally accurate assessment be lower? In any event, let us all commit ourselves to grow in our acceptance and reflection of Jesus' lordship in our lives.

E. Conclusion

Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever. He does not change.

Jesus is the unchanging Son of God. His uniqueness and majesty must remain foundational for all of us.

Jesus is the unchanging Saviour of sinners. Let us reemphasize the importance of personal commitment as well as of evangelistic proclamation.

Jesus is the unchanging Lord. He is our Lord individually and corporately. The extent of his Lordship in our words and deeds depends on us, on our yieldedness. May the Holy Spirit help us to yield completely.

When I think of the unchanging Jesus, the only begotten Son of God, who is my Saviour, the head of my church, and the Lord of my life, I am filled with both gratitude and joy. What a privilege is mine. Christians, of all people, are indeed most privileged and most blessed. Let us all respond by rededicating ourselves to our unchanging Lord.

Thank you, Jesus, for being the unchanging Son of God, saviour of

sinners, head of the church, and Lord of all. Amen.

3. Executive Committee (continued)

Herb Neufeld, the Assistant Moderator introduced John Redekop who presented the following recommendation:

CANADIAN CONFERENCE RESTRUCTURING PROPOSAL

A. General Goals

- 1. To improve inter-board coordination, planning and program implementation
- 2. To improve communication and cooperation between the provincial and the Canadian conferences.
- 3. To develop a greater sense of responsibility and collective accountability among Conference leaders.
- 4. To increase the sense of ownership of ministries among our Conference leaders, churches, and members generally.
- 5. To provide better mechanisms for feedback and reaction on a continuing basis.
- To avoid duplication or gaps in Conference ministries.
- 7. To eliminate any unnecessary staffing or expense.
- 8. To develop better communication between the Canadian Conference Executive Committee and the Conference boards.
- To provide a forum for board chairmen to interact and to become better informed about Conference ministries and specific planning by other boards.
- 10. To provide Conference leadership which does not, by default, derive from the actions of those who are entitled and responsible to supervise financial affairs.
- 11. To develop a leadership and coordinating group which does not include only a three-person national Executive Committee.
- 12. To establish structures and arrangements which will enable our provincial conferences, as conferences, to take greater ownership of our national Conference ministries, thus recognizing and building upon some basic strengths of our Conference.

B. The Revised Restructuring Proposal.

(NOTE: All changes from the present constitution are in bold print.)

1. The Executive Board

(i) Composition:

The Board shall consist of the following:

moderator
assistant moderator
secretary
(The above all elected for a four-year term)
Provincial moderators (or designates) - selected by each
provincial conference
executive secretary - ex-officio

(ii) Duties:

- a) Plans the business convention in consultation with the executive of the province in which the Convention is held.
- Serves as consultant in the planning of Faith and Life Conventions, and acts as Executive Officers of these conventions.
- c) Prepares the agenda for the sessions of the Council of Boards.
- d) Submits to the churches all issues which require church action or vote.
- e) Supervises the work of the Executive Secretary
- f) Supervises the work of the Nominating Commission
- g) Represents the Council of Boards between sessions.
- h) Considers for approval or otherwise those resolutions of the Board of Missions and Services of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches provided for under part H hereof, praovided that when it deems necessary it may refer these to the Council of Boards or to a convention of the Conference.
- i) The Board shall coordinate the plans and activities of the various boards of the Conference. The chairpersons of the boards shall report the plans and activites to the Executive Board at a meeting called for that purpose. Normally these meetings will be held prior to the meetings of the boards.
- The Board shall respond to provincial concerns as they relate to the Canadian Conference.
- k) The Board shall appoint a personnel committee which, in consultation with other boards, shall be responsible for determining salary schedules and benefits for all Conference personnel.
- The Board shall be responsible for fostering wholesome inter-church relations as well as for contacts with other related agencies.
- 2. The Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns.
 - (i) Composition (see below, item 7)
 - (ii) Duties:
 - a) The Board shall watch over the spiritual life of the Conference and its churches and give guidance, and direction in matters of faith, doctrine and the Christian life, including the giving of leadership in the clear and forceful teaching of the peace position within our Conference and its churches. Further, it shall be responsible for giving directives for structuring our peace witness in our country and our constituencies.
 - b) The Board shall, when it deems necessary, initiate the appropriate action or serve as a reference body in issues of social concern.

- The Board shall be responsible for providing direction in matters of church polity. It shall also establish and maintain a function pulpit committee to assist churchs in ministerial placement.
- omit section 4 and 5 (section 4 deals with inter-Church relations and section 5 with the constitution)
- d) The Board shall plan Faith and Life Conventions in consultation with the Executive Officers of the Conference.
- e) Concerning Mennonite Central Committee (Canada)
- -The official Canadian Mennonite Brethren representatives on the MCC (Can.) Board shall constitute a committee of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns.
- -All MCC (Can.) representatives shall be appointed by the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns and at least two of the appointees shall be members of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns.
- -No official MCC (Canada) representative may serve in that position for more than two consecutive four-year terms.
- -One of the MCC (Canada) representatives shall be designated as
- chairman of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns' MCC (Canada) committee. This chairman must always be a member of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns
- f) The Board chairman shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive Board.

3. The Board of Management

- (i) Composition: (see below, item 7)
- a) The Board is charged with the administration and supervision of all the physical assets of the Conference. This shall include the operation of Christian Press.
- b) The Board is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Conference budget, as well as for carrying out the required budget control.
- c) The Board is responsible for maintenance of adequate Conference offices.
- omit section 4 (This deals with providing salary schedules)
- d) The Board appoints a treasurer whose duty shall be to receive, hold in custody, and disburse all funds under supervision and administration of the Board.
- e) The Board chairman shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive board. The treasurer may be invited to assist with this reporting.

The Board of Christian Education and Publications

(i) Composition:

(see below, item 7) (This combined board would have to be phased in over the appropriate number of vears.)

(ii) Duties:

- a) The Board shall seek to initiate, promote and strengthen the program of Christian Education in the local churches of the Conference by providing counsel, offering courses, providing publicity and instructional materials, arranging and conducting regional and national conferences. The particular areas of concern are:
 - -Sunday School
 - -Youth work
 - -Vacation Bible School
 - -Mid-week Program
 - -Church Worker Training Program
 - -Music and Choirs
 - -Camps and Clubs
 - -Library
 - -Any other educational agencies as the churches and/or the Conference shall from time to time establish.
- b) For the execution of this program the Board provides staff and office facilities, subject to the approval of the Conference.

omit F section 1 (which refers to the operation of Christian Press)

- The Board is charged with the responsibility of publishing Conference publications.
- d) The Board shall encourage, promote and supervise the publication of materials designed to meet specific needs of the Conference.
- e) If the Conference has a book store then the Board shall maintain and operate such a book store.
- f) The Board shall seek to distribute helpful Christian materials.
- g) The board chairperson shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive Board.

The Board of Evangelism

(i) Composition (see below, item 7)

(ii) Duties

- a) The Board shall seek to initiate, promote and strengthen the work of Evangelism in local churches and all individual agencies of the church, by such means as seem expedient, desirable and fruitful. For the execution of this program the Board provides staff and office facilities subject to the approval of the Conference.
- The Board is entrusted with the integration and extension of the mass communications media such as radio and television.
- c) The Board supervises and promotes work of evangelism and outreach which does not fall within the jurisdiction of a provincial conference.

- d) The Board of Evangelism works in close co-operation with the Board of Christian Education and Publication in all areas of common concern.
- The board chairperson shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive Board.
- 6. The Board of Higher Education
 - (i) Composition: (see below, item 7)
 - (ii) Duties
 - The Board operates and promotes the Mennonite Brethren Bible College.
 - b) The Board is responsible to seek to structure and integrate, together with the boards and faculties of the Bible Institues and Bible College, the biblical and theological training program of the Conference.
 - c) The Board is responsible for initiating and supervising a Student Services Program to give spiritual assistance to students on the various university campuses in Canada.
 - d) The Board is charged with the responsibility of arranging for and distributing assistance to students in the form of bursaries, scholarships, etc.
 - e) The Board is responsible for all Canadian Conference relationships to schools and colleges other than Mennonite Brethren.
 - f) The board chairperson shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive Board.
- 7. Board Membership (other than for the Executive Board)
- a) Each of the 5 boards shall consist of a provincial representative from each provincial conference and several members-at- large. The number of members-at-large shall be determined by conference decision. Unless the conference decides otherwise, the number of members-at-large for each board shall be 4.
- b) The senior staff who would usually meet with the board and would be given such status in board meetings as each board decides, would include at least the following.

Board of Management - treasurer

Board of Evangelism - executive director

Board of Christian Education and Publications - senior editor/staff

Board of Higher Education - president of M.B.B.C.

Board of Spiritual & Social Concerns - Conference Minister

C. COMMENTS AND EXPLANATION

1. Under the present constitutional arrangement each board has 12 members: 6 provincial representatives and 6 members at large. With the 3-person Executive Committee that results in a Council of Boards numbering 75. Under the proposed arrangedment the 5 boards would have a total of 40

members. With the 10-person Executive Board the Council of Boards would number 50.

- 2. The revised proposal does not describe the number or nature of support staff for each board. That matter would be decided by the boards and the conventions.
- 3. Suggested implementation procedures:

a) The Executive recommends that the transfer of Christian Press, be

implemented on an interim basis in July, 1986.

b) The Executive Committee, as Notice of Amendment of the Constitution recommends that the assembled delegates accept, in principle, the Revised Canadian Conference Restructuring Proposal. (See Artcle VII, section 1)

c) The Executive Committee recommends that the Executive Committee, together with the Executive of the B.S.S.C., be authorized to appoint an Ad Hoc Joint Committee to draft the final form of the Revised Canadian Conference Restructuring Proposal.

d) The Executive Committee recommends that after the Revised Canadian Conference Restructuring Proposal has been drafted in the appropriate form by the Ad Hoc Joint Committee, it be sent to the churches for consideration

and a vote. (See Article VII, section 2)

e) The Executive Committee recommends that the Revised Canadian Conference Restructuring Proposal shall be voted on during the convention

of the Conference in July, 1987. (See Article VII, section 3)

f) The Executive Committee recommends that in anticipation of possible constitutional changes, no "at large" elections be conducted in July, 1987, which would conflict with the intent of the Revised Canadian Restructuring Proposal.

g) The Executive Committee recommends that the Conference Executive Committee, together with the Executive of the Board of Christian Education and the Executive of the Board of Publications, draft an agreement concerning the merger of those two boards. (All present members would be entitled to serve a full term.)

Herb Neufeld declared that since it was time to recess, the discussion would continue the following morning.

3. Closing of session

3.1 Report

Br. Fast reported that all expenses had been met with approximately a \$25,000 surplus. He then presented his report.

"Commit thy works unto the Lord, and thy thoughts shall be established" Proverbs 16:13.

Although the conference had the largest deficit ever in 1985 and is facing a deficit in this current year, we praise God for his faithfulness and commit the whole financial matter of the work that is entrusted to the Mennonite Brethren church to the giver of life and substance—the Lord.

We began the conference year with a \$158,000 deficit and a projected deficit of another \$184,000 for this current year, a total of \$340,000. The work for the year 1985/86 was committed to the Lord. Thoughts and projections were established to enable the work to continue and hopefully balance the expenditures to revenue. The goal to clear out the previous year's deficit hopefully will be achieved by May 31st. With the cooperation of the boards, the budgets were trimmed at the Council of Boards meetings in January. With increased efforts for voluntary collection along with budget trims and the anticipated income for May, it may be possible to balance the income and the expenditures.

1986-87 Budget. All the boards were notified of the possible cash shortage at the January board meetings and were asked to trim budgets for the coming year. Due to the projected shortfall, the boards have reviewed their budgets and have trimmed costs wherever possible.

Personnel commission. The commission continues to work on a general manual of direction to boards on personnel employment. A salary grid has been established to achieve equality in pay to conference executives as well as secretarial staff.

Amalgamation of services. A proposal has come to the Board of Management to consider the amalgamation of the Board of Stewardship (Canadian members on the General Conference Board of Trustees) with the Board of Management bringing the Canadian activities of the General Conference Board of Trustees under one board. The proposal will be studied by the Board of Management with a possible recommendation being placed before the convention in July for approval of such actions.

In closing a word of appreciation for the support of the constituency, Council of Boards and the board and staff of the Board of Management.

3.2 Financial Statements

J. J. Riediger presented the financial report.

The financial activities of the year can be summed up by two scripture passages: Matthew 7:7-8, "Ask and it shall be given to you, seek and you shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you. For everyone who asks receives, and he who seeks, finds and to him who knocks it shall be opened." The other portion of scripture is found in Psalm 36:5, "Covenant your way to the Lord. Trust also in him and he will do it." These were the words of encouragement that I claimed at the close of the 1985 convention.

The deficit for the previous year was \$158,000, but before the conference ended, the generous gifts of the delegation reduced this deficit to \$102,000. The conference-adopted budget projected an additional deficit for

the present year of \$184,000 based on previous years' contributions.

At the Council of Boards meeting in January, the Board of Management reduced the budget by \$70,000, leaving a projected budget deficit for the year at \$110,000. The previous year's deficit was not yet covered and the college reported a projected deficit of some \$30,000 due to lower enrollment. The boards were asked to reduce their current budgets by 10% and also reduced their 1986-87 budgets by 10%, a shocker to say the least, but essential in order to come to this convention with expenditures balanced to the income.

The Council of Boards took the issue seriously and although some could not meet the objectives of the reduction, the giving increased. The college giving increased so that instead of a deficit as projected, a surplus was generated. Evangelism collections were also higher than projected, resulting in a reduction in conference subsidies, the overall net result being a decrease in budget spending of 11.24% for 1985-86. On the income side last year we achieved 77.86% of the budget. This year the percentage increased to 81.36%, an increase of 3.5% representing an increase in giving of 101,900. All these factors helped to close the year with a \$25,966 surplus over expenditures.

The 1984-85 deficit was also over-subscribed by \$3,300.

Thank you so much for the appeal support.

The excess of revenue and reduced expenditures along with the deficit appeal drive has left the conference with a modest operating revenue position of \$50,720.

To the delegates, please convey to your churches a hearty thank you for the support of the church extended programs administered by the conference boards and personnel.

Significant accounting policies

Depreciation

No depreciation is taken on fixed assets in the year of acquisition.

Fixed assets - foreign missions

Land, buildings or equipment acquired in the field missions are not recorded as assets, but as contributions to the mission or congregation given support. Expenditures for such items are charged to project expense for the year in the attached financial statements.

Income and expenditure recognition

The Canadian Conference accounts for income and expenditure generally on a cash basis.

Foreign exchange

U.S. deposits have been converted to Canadian funds for financial statement presentation purposes at May 31, 1986. The apparent gain on conversion has not been taken into income and is included in accounts payable in the current liabilities section of the financial statements. The gain will be reflected in operations at the time of conversion.

U.S. payables have not been converted to Canadian funds at May 31, 1986. If these liabilities are converted to Canadian funds at May 31, 1986 there would be an exchange loss of \$446,065 that would decrease Conference equity.

Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Registered Retirement Savings Plan Trust Fund

The Board of Trustees (Stewardship) has established an R.R.S.P. Trust Fund for members of Canadian Conference churches. Funds are directed to first mortgages of member churches at a rate of 1/2% to 1% above the 5 year guaranteed savings certificates at the National Trust Co. Interest is calculated on member savings every six months and credited to each account on December 31.

Members' accounts are administered by the National Trust Co. and mortgage investments are supervised by mortgage trustees nominated by the Board of Trustees (Stewardship).

We have examined the consolidated balance sheet of the Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Churches of North America as at May 31, 1986 and the consolidated statements of operating surplus (deficiency) and Conference equity for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests as we considered necessary in the circumstances except as noted in the following paragraph.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Canadian Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Churches of North America reports amounts for donations which are not susceptible to complete verification by audit procedures. Accordingly, our verification of receipts from these sources was limited to a comparison of recorded receipts with bank deposits.

In our opinion, except for the possibility of adjustments had donations been susceptible to complete audit verification, these consolidated financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Conference as at May 31, 1986 and the results of its consolidated operations for the year then ended, in accordance with accounting principles as outlined in Note 1, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

5.1 Report

Victor Toews, chairman, presented his report.

"Look there on the mountains, the feet of one who brings good news, who proclaims peace!" (Nahum 1:15).

Even as Nahum of old, so we as a Board of Publications have the pleasant duty of disseminating the wonderful gospel of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace. It is our privilege to spread our message in three different languages throughout our Canadian constituency and to some extent to people beyond our borders.

In the past year the board has again considered a number of pressing issues and we are now ready to submit our report to you. We ask your brotherly consideration and we want to listen to your advice.

As every other board in our conference, we too have seriously considered the basic question of our being. What is the purpose of our efforts? How are we attempting to reach our goals? As soon as this statement of goals and objectives is ready we will publish it in our periodicals.

One of the big problems facing us at this time is the matter of the costs in the production of our periodicals. Our position does not seem to be unique in that we are trying to reduce the budget without cutting back on services.

We believe that all of our staff has tried its utmost in reducing the production costs to a minimum but since a larger percentage of our expenses, such as printing and mailing, are beyond our control, we have to search very diligently as to where we can make a saving. To cut back might mean that we would begin publishing our major periodicals only once in three weeks or even once a month. If we did that we wonder how far our publications would serve as a binding element in our brotherhood.

The long-term future of our periodicals has also occupied our attention. Should Le Lien also be published bi-monthly? Should we also be doing something for our churches who come from a Chinese, Hindi-Punjabi, Greek, Vietnamese or even some other background? The circulation of the Mennonitische Rundschau has remained fairly constant during the last years but we are aware that the days of this periodical are numbered. Just how and when to make the final cut-off date will soon have to be determined.

Until the present the operation of the Christian Press has remained under the auspices of this board. We believe that Christian Press is serving us well and we are happy that in a time when other small operations have faltered, due to the depressed economy, our operation has remained solvent. Next to God we give our manager, Vic Schmidt, and his staff, credit for this. We must however, keep in mind that in order to remain competitive in this field we will seriously have to consider the upgrading of our equipment in the shop. When and if the operation of the press is taken over by another board. as suggested elsewhere, the above question will have to be monitored very closely. We believe that the question must not be considered only from the financial point of view.

In closing we take this opportunity to thank our whole staff, editors. clerks and managers for a job well done. God bless you in your ministry.

5.2 Rundschau

A. W. Schellenberg presented his report.

Conference time is reporting time for the Rundschau too and we want to make the dominant note of this report one of thanks. We are thankful to God that we could again publish Christian materials in a society flooded with vile literature. We are thankful to our conference for moral and financial support. During the Council of Boards meetings in February the call was issued for cutback in budgets. We have tried hard to do our share in trimming, without demur.

We want to thank our readers for support. This support is evident in

faithful payments of subscription fees.

Our circulation number is fairly constant. We would of course like to have more readers and so we invite those who do not read the paper today to give it a try. You might like it. Ask someone who is reading it. We will gladly mail out some sample copies.

For some time we have not increased our subscription fee. Costs of preparing, producing, handling and mailing the paper have sharply risen and we will have to raise our rate from \$14 to \$16. This price increase will take effect October 1, 1986. We also intend to increase our advertising rates by 15 percent.

We consider it our main task to report on matters of interest to our churches. During this last year we have published some 42 pages on missions, 25 pages of MCC reports, 89 pages of reports by churches, 146

pages of obituaries and about 126 poems, some long, some short. addition we have published pages and pages of devotional materials, essays on doctrine, human interest stories and news-and of course many pictures.

We regret to report that Brother Henry Regehr is not well. He is still faithfully writing the answers for the Fragekasten. Help us to pray for him that he might completely recover to continue this valuable column.

Of her part in the production of the Mennonitische Rundschau, our

associate editor Margaret Harder quotes a recent letter:

"I always have the Rundschau read through too quickly, so I reread parts and then wait for the next one." Such an expression of satisfaction from a reader, tucked in with the payment, makes all the work of writing, finding, typing, reading and rechecking of materials very worthwhile. I find my part in the production of the paper a rewarding task.

5.3 M. B. Herald

Herb Kopp, editor of the M. B. Herald, presented his report.

A year of settling in. How well I recall my feelings of a year ago, wondering nervously and through long hours at the office whether I could actually get MBH to the press on time and with everything in its right place! Well, we made it-and for that I thank God, a gracious board, a competent staff, and a very cooperative and helpful group of people at Christian Press.

In this first report, and incidentally, our 25th year of publishing (we celebrate 25 full years of publishing with the January 9, 1987 issue), allow

me to highlight five things.

Changeover review. The changeover of leadership, location and the manner of operating has made this a very interesting year. The initial insecurity of being editor of MBH was quickly brushed away by the nature of the job; that is, you don't ease into this job, you dive into it completely. Many

thanks to many people for making this transition as smooth as it was.

With the separation of MBH from the Christian Press operation, both through the physical separation (we are now in the new conference offices) and financial management, we have entered into a new phase at MBH. Beginning with the 1985-86 fiscal year, we now do our own typesetting. layout and design, and bring "camera-ready" copy to Christian Press for printing. We also manage, control and monitor our own budget (formerly this was done by CP). A big thank you to Joan Klassen for her able, competent work in layout and design.

Circulation. Circulation currently stands at 12,942 (though in summer we print 250 copies less). Of the toal press run approximately 275 are sent, in bulk quantities, to our own Bible schools, colleges and the seminary. Of the rest, the following breakdown gives you an idea of where our people live: Newfoundland, 7; Prince Edward Island, 4; Nova Scotia, 27; New Brunswick, 12; Quebec, 183; Ontario, 1713; Manitoba, 2871; Saskatchewan, 1782; Alberta, 1229; B. C., 4332; Yukon, 5; Northwest Territories, 5; U.S.A., 411; and foreign, 215.

During the past year a few gliches have occured with our computercompiled/computer-maintained mailing list. For the inconvenience to some of you, we apologize.

A warm thank-you to Elfrieda Balzer for her gracious and efficient work in circulation.

Editorial matters. It has been a good year of publishing for us. Some of the issues raised in MBH generated considerable dialogue. The letter section of the paper (a section with high readership) was brisk and stimulating. Our general policy is to bring thoughtful comment not only to the issues which confront us, but also good reading material to challenge and nurture our spiritual life.

Our regular columnists, John Redekop, Walter Unger and James Pankratz have written well, stimulating much discussion—some thoughtful and well-versed, others passionate and angry. The editorial page has been a blend of comment on issues and perceptions of life as we experience it.

Jim Coggins has done very fine work on the family pages, on "short

news" and reporting on church events. Thanks, Jim.

Reprints in other magazines. One of the ways to measure the success of a paper is by how many requests for reprint rights to articles were received. At MBH we have at least 20 such requests this past year. What this means is that MBH produces high-quality, biblical, and current copy on many different issues. Of course, we are quick to congratulate the writers who generate these articles (and always for only a token honorarium).

Budget. The Board of Management edict, in January, to cut budget in this current year was accepted by the Board of Publications without rancor. Although many of our costs are fixed and the final year-end statement not yet complete (the books are closed on May 31, 1986), MBH expects to have expenditures approximately 4 percent under budget. The MBH budget for 1986-87 shows a reduction in conference funding of 5.2 percent over 1985-86.

Summary. On the balance, it has been a good year for us. We, the MBH staff, after a year of learning and getting familiar with new tasks, anticipate the blessing of God on our work in the next fiscal year.

5.4 M. B. Herald Associate Editor

Jim Coggins, Associate editor of the Herald presented his report.

After two years as associate editor of the Mennonite Brethren Herald, I find myself more comfortable (and hopefully more competent!) in my job. I am grateful for the opportunity to write and to interact with many brothers and sisters.

Like many of our readers, I approach the Herald from the back and work my way forward. I am primarily responsible for the family columns, reviews, personalia, people and events and some of the news. Through these pages we seek to inform our readers of happenings within our brotherhood and in the church throughout the world. Through the reviews we not only recommend good Christian literature but also attempt to offer spiritual guidance in dealing with the culture that surrounds us.

One of the strengths of the Herald is the contribution made to it by the local congregation. Through the pages of the Herald we learn to know each other, pray for each other, rejoice with each other and even weep with each other. This is only possible through the many reports sent in by our other 180 staff people, the church reporters. These people receive no payment, yet their conscientiousness in what must often seem to them mundane duties does very much to make us a brotherhood. Their diligence and Christian spirit bring me much joy and encouragement.

Herb Kopp asked the delegation to fill in a questionnaire concerning the Herald.

5.5 Le Lien

Claudette LeBlanc, editor of Le Lien presented her report.

Le Lien is entering its sixth year of existence. It is still a small paper but it has now become regular and established; one can count on receiving it at the beginning of each month. About a thousand copies are printed 11 times a year. It is distributed to the MB churches in Quebec and in St. Boniface, Man., and to several other groups and individuals. Some copies are sent to Europe and Zaire as well. A special effort will be made this year to increase the number of paid subscriptions.

For me personally, working as editor of *Le Lien* during the last two years has been a new experience, satisfying and enriching, even though not always easy. I came to it knowing nothing of journalism, except for writing and a taste for learning. And I did learn a lot. Indeed, I have learned about news writing, interviewing, choosing pictures and fonts, convincing people that they are able to write if they try, doing layout, and many other things. It allowed me to find out that I actually like writing and that it is a useful way to serve the Lord and his churches. I am grateful for the assistance of the Quebec editorial committee, as we do brainstorming together and plan themes and writers, and for Jim Coggins from Winnipeg who takes care of things at the other end of the chain.

In the last year we addressed many issues of the Christian life in our modern world: ethics, aging, women in the church, social involvement and missions, music, environment and church growth. As much as possible we try to keep a balance between the various purposes of *Le Lien*: news, instruction, reflection and edification. For next year, we have already been working on themes such as being a Christian at school, adolescence, and church life versus family life. One of the hardest aspects of my work is to find authors; articles don't flow in by mail. Quebecois are not traditionally big readers, even less writers. Since the qualified persons are usually the busiest, it limits expansion dreams and exercises the faith in everyday work.

The prospect of being able to do the typesetting by computer from Quebec is very exciting. It would accelerate the whole process before the publication and allow more up-to-date information. It would really cut down on the time spent on routine tasks such as proofreading and sending material back and forth between Montreal and Winnipeg. It would be so much easier to simply send a small plastic disk without asking another person to type something in a langauge she doesn't even understand, with the risks of error involved. I would them work one month ahead of publication date instead of two as is the case now. *Le Lien* office will be moving to the new Institut Biblique Laval location in Montreal.

The Quebec Mennonite Brethren are very grateful for the Lord for being part of a big family who cares and shares in the growing process of the church of Jesus Christ here. *Le Lien* is a tool that we hope helps young and older Christians to become more conformed to the likeness of the Son.

5.6 Christian Press

I am pleased to begin my report stating that at this point of writing our first 10 months of operation have produced an earning surplus of 7.12 percent on gross sales, and we expect our volume of business to stay at this level until the end of May. We will come to the convention with a much better year than the previous one.

Our computerization of accounting and general bookkeeping has been working well, and we now have an adequate appreciation of our new costing system put in place this past year. This was a move we should have

made much earlier, and it has contributed much to our operation.

Staffing changes have been minimal this year, and we have again received good co-operation from our workers. A good spirit prevails generally and employees exhibit a good attitude to work. We are anxious to maintain a good working relationship with our staff, as well as all other

conference staff who use our services and supplies.

This year, I will complete 10 years of service at Christian Press. In that time, our shop has contributed a total of \$726,000 in earned surplus, return on investment, and a depreciation reserve directly to our conference coffers. Even during the severe years of the recession, Christian Press always returned a surplus to the conference. I'm trusting that we can continue to serve our conference in the same way during the next decade.

5.7 Budget for Board of Publications

J. J. Riediger reviewed the budget statements. (See pages 53-56)

5.8 Board of Christian Literature

Gilbert Brandt presented a brief report on behalf of the General Conference Board of Christian Literature and Kindred Press. He mentioned some of the literature which Kindred Press has published. He also told us about some of the future publications of Kindred Press.

MOTION: That we receive this report.

6. Fraternal greetings

Henry Schmidt, moderator of the United States Conference of M. B. Churches greeted the delegation with the words of Malachi 3:6. He invited people to attend the U.S. Convention in Colorado. He then led the delegation in prayer.

The meeting recessed for lunch at 12:00 noon.

1. Worship

Fred Lehman led the delegation in singing "I Will Sing," "Bless Thou the Lord,." "Jesus, Name Above All Names" and "Open Our Eyes Lord."

John Redekop introduced Martin Durksen of the Bridge Builders Mission. He talked about his concern for the ministry to the native peoples of Canada. He then prayed.

2. Greetings from Provincial government

John Redekop introduced John Sweeney, a member of the Ontario government. Mr. Sweeney addressed the delegation. We were challenged to be Christians not only in name, but also in action. Christians need to be in the world even though they are not part of it.

Mr. Sweeney read a letter of greeting from David Peterson the Premier

of Ontario.

3. Testimony

Angela Tieu and Paul Ng from the Chinese Mennonite Brethren Church in Toronto shared their testimony. They told us about the work among the Chinese speaking people in the city. They asked the delegation for prayer support.

Sue Schmidt sang, "Nothing But Amazing," and "No More Night."

3. Board of Publications (continued)

3.1 Budget of the Board of Publications

J. J. Riediger presented the budget of the Board of Publications. (See pages 53-56)

3.2 Recommendation

We recommend that the Canadian Conference of M. B. Churches purchase the M. B. Herald at \$215,140.00 and the Mennonitische Rundschau at \$86,110.00 for a total of \$301,250.00.

MOTION: That we accept this recommendation.

4. Executive Committee (continued)

John Redekop explained the procedure required to implement the Conference Restructuring Proposal. He then introduced Isaak Block, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns.

Br. Block reviewed the process up to date. Last year the delegation gave authorization to the Executive Committee to consult with the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns in order to plan for an enlarged Executive Committee. The Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns supports, in principle, the Executive's proposal to develop a new structure for the Executive Committee.

John Redekop indicated that the Executive Committee will work with the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns and will present notice of motion to the Council of Boards. Then the proposal will be sent to the churches for evaluation and will be voted upon at the next annual convention.

The session adjourned for a coffee break.

After the break , Br. Fred Lehman led the delegation in singing "Great God of Wonders."

MOTION: That we approve a study of the restructuring of the Canadian Conference and that a Task Force to pursue this matter be appointed by the Executive and the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns jointly and report to the convention in July,1987.

6. M. B. Communications

Helmut Huebert, chairman of the board presented his report.

Mennonite Brethren Communications continues to minister in a world where the medium is often the message. We have a message of reconciliation to give to the world; reconciliation through Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour.

In the past year, we have completed our new building. The office portion was occupied in October 3, 1985, with the official dedication on January 19, 1986. The studios are still under construction, although we have already started using one talk studio. We anticipate full operational status by the fall session. We heartily thank all those who have so generously contributed to this project.

Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches

The Third Story V, our newest TV release, has or is running in Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario. It will soon be aired in Newfoundland, and we have begun marketing in the Maritimes. Though some areas, such as the B. C. commercial TV market, seem to be closed to our programming, there generally does seem to be good response to our requests for free air time.

A spin-off the TV ministry is the production of video cassettes. A large selection is available at MB communications with substantial VHS libraries situated at Grantham MB Church in Ontario, and the B. C. Conference office in Clearbrook.

Translation of the low German New Testament has been completed. Arrangements are being made to publish, likely through Kindred Press and the Canadian Bible Society.

MB Communications has the mandate to share the ministry across Canada. During the past year, we have travelled to B. C., Saskatchewan, Ontario and the Maritimes. We thank God, and you our constituency, for the support our ministry has, now literally from sea to sea.

The delegation was shown some slides of the new M. B. Communications building.

Viktor Hamm, the producer of the Russian broadcasts told the delegation about the work of broadcasting into the Soviet Union. This project is sponsored by M. B. Communications and M. B. Missions and Services.

Dan Block, the associate director of M. B. Communications, further described some of the work.

7.1 Report

Br. Willms presented his report.

is clear and focussed impacts us: it calls, compels and costs.

Vision. The vision underlying the work of the Board of Evangelism is that of the ripened harvest. The development of an aggressive evangelistic, church growth, church planting mindset and practice within our Canadian churches grows out of this vision. The extensive work in Quebec is a product of this vision. In addition, the Atlantic provinces are a focal point of the vision of the ripened harvest field. We are actively pursuing the goal of planting churches in the major cities of these provinces with a view to establishing an Atlantic Provinces Conference. It is hoped that this will be realized within a

15 year time frame.

Implementation. The implementation of this vision remains challenging. For one, it requires the involvement of people—more people. To facilitate this facet, we introduced the Church Planting Associates (CPA) plan last year. We are pleased to report good interest in this program. One couple is being placed to this ministry in the Dartmouth area. Secondly, it requires the involvement in prayer. Prayer engages the power of God in the work and the persuasion of God in the (potential) worker (Matthew 9:38). We are very thankful to you for your prayer support and encourage you to continue in that vital ministry. A third requirement for implementing the vision is funds. We gratefully acknowledge the good support from many of our Canadian churches. It is affirming to see that congregations are including the Board of Evangelism ministries in their budgets. In order for us to raise 2/3 of our budget by special appeals, this generous and planned participation is most valuable and essential.

We are appreciative of the leadership that our Executive Director, James Nikkel, is giving our conference. His visionary, creative and committed leadership is valuable and vital in our work. We commend him

and his family to you for prayer and encouragement.

Br. Willms then introduced the James Nikkel, the Executive Director of the Board of Evangelism. Br. Nikkel introduced the pastors from the maritime provinces. He asked all of the representatives from the Maritimes to stand and be recognized.

James Nikkel presented his report.

The term that Jesus used to describe the work of evangelism is "making disciples". We have sought to be faithful to this discipling task during the past conference year. Evangelism, like farming, is an exercise of cultivation, sowing, reaping and garnering. Much patience and care is needed as we help people through these various seasons to spiritual harvest.

The parameters of our work are guided by the Conference By-Laws. Accordingly, the Board of Evangelism is to "initiate, promote and strengthen the work of evangelism in the local church" and do the work of evangelism in those areas "which do not fall within the jurisdiction of a provincial

conference." We are grateful to God for the many opportunities that we have

had to serve in the interest of promoting the gospel in Canada.

The methods and approaches used in fulfilling our conference mandate have varied. We have tried to serve our churches through the Disciple Making '85 Institute in October 3-5, 1985. This event, involving some 1200 people from across Canada, served as a good reminder that the work of harvest has really only begun in our churches. Some churches have used the Board of Evangelism resources for church retreats, friendship evangelism seminars and missionary conferences. The evangelism office also provides outreach consultation and various library resources. Our main resource tool is the "Evangelism Canada" digest which is printed four times a year.

Our program specialization and priority is church planting. We believe that the most effective means of reaching unchurched people is through church planting. Church planting is the biblically demonstrated and preferred way of fulfilling the great commission. Starting new churches has been our priority in Quebec and is now our concentration in the Maritimes. We plan, in the next 15 years, to begin two or three more churches in both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and so organize a Maritime Mennonite Brethren Conference. Our first Maritime Pastors' Retreat this spring was very helpful in planning for a future Maritime conference of churches.

Church planting is also our board's Centennial theme. In preparation for our Canadian Centennial celebrations in 1988, we are introducing the Centennial Antioch Plan. We expect to prepare materials that will encourage churches to consider planting a new church during the centennial year. As the Antioch church officially sent out Paul and Barnabas to launch new churches, so we are encouraging churches across Canada to begin thinking about sending out a group of people to start a new church during this

important historic year.

The recently launched Church Planting Associate program further illustrates our seriousness about doing evangelism through church planting. We are currently inviting people to move into one of the target areas such as Halifax, Dartmouth and Ottawa. We are encouraging people to relocate their business or profession with a view to help start new churches. We are thankful for Ed and Karin Willms who are moving to Dartmouth under this

CPA program.

The Maritimes. The Board of Evangelism is working at the eventual development of a Maritime Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches. A projected timeline of one church in five year intervals for both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia is being considered. Some of the long range planning principles were formulated at our first pastors' and church planting associate retreat held in Moncton in May of this year. The Church Planting Associate (CPA) program is launched as one of the ways of bringing about this Maritime vision.

The Campbellton Restigouche Valley Church in New Brunswick under the pastoral leadership of the Sieg Walls, has had a good year of evangelism and growth. The church has worked hard at developing community relationships.

The Dartmouth Cornerstone Community Church in Nova Scotia has had a year with many physical and spiritual advances. The church has given

itself a new name and is doing a major physical face-lifting.

Ed and Karin Willms from the Westwood Community Church Mennonite Brethren in Winnipeg have accepted a Church Planting Associate position in Dartmouth beginning this summer. They will be the first couple to make the move to the Maritimes under the Church Planting Associate Program.

The program. The Church Planting Associate Program is for couples or individuals who are prepared to relocate for the purpose of helping to start or establish a new congregation. Specifically, we are looking for people who are ready to join with us in the development of churches in the Atlantic provinces. We are convinced that there are many lay people across Canada who are looking for more involvement in church ministries

after their job hours.

The assignment. The church planting associates would move into the targetted areas for the express purpose of helping plant the church. Based on the individual's gifts, experience and time available, a specific assignment would be worked out. The evangelism office together with the church planter and the prospective associate, would work out a definite lay ministry assignment. This could include community involvement such as youth work, leading Bible studies, contact visitation, or campus work. It would also include some in-church activity.

The Church Planting Associates program is basically a non-budget

employment relocation program.

James Nikkel introduced Jean Theoret, the President of Institut Biblique Laval. Br. Theoret presented his report.

Institut Biblique Laval

Tenth anniversary. The Quebec Institut Biblique Laval is celebrating its tenth year amidst rapid change. After considerable research and discussion, the Quebec Association decided to relocate the school into Montreal. They will share the St. Laurent Church facility. The coming of Pierre Gilbert will make the teaching predominantly French. The new credit relationship with MBBC will furthermore strengthen the school academically. We are greateful for the past ten years of ministry. We acknowledge with much gratitude the many years that Brother Ben Klassen has given to the work of this school.

Robert Dagenais, the chairman of the Evangelism Comittee of the Quebec Conference presented a report on the work in Quebec. Pierre Wingender served as his interpreter.

Br. Nikkel introduced Ewald Unruh and Sig Wall, the two new pastors in the Maritimes. The two brothers conducted a dialogue in which they helped the delegation to understand the work of church planting in the Maritimes.

Peggy Talbot, a member of the church in Campbellton, shared her testimony with the congregation.

James Nikkel announced that the Board was considering repeating an event like 'Discple Making '85' in 1988.

MOTION: That we receive this report.

We live in an age of change, but we must not allow change around us to affect our relationship to the unchangeable God.

1. God as a person never changes

God's love, holiness and truth never conflict with each other. We must not teach a view of God's love which is not consistent with His holiness.

2. God is unchangeable in his relationship to man in redemption.

We cannot separate the assignment of world evangelism from the message of the power of God. Salvation must not be merely a response to

'benefit' but a response to God. We must also not separate the truth of God's

grace from an understanding of our own sinfulness.

Discipleship is based on the fact that the Absolute God demands that he have priority in our lives. It is the capitulation of mortal, sinful man before the Holy God. God will refuse to be simply a means to an end.

God's purpose in the church has not changed.

John 17:18 says that we have been sent into the world in the same way that Jesus was sent into the world. Jesus has demonstrated the character of God to the world.

The priority for the church must be the glorification of God. Then the church must demonstrate the character of God. The church will die without evangelism, but evangelism without character also dies. The world will believe when disciples reflect the character of Jesus.

Proclamation is important for the church, but the focus must be on the

glorification of God.

The Songs of Faith Trio sang "We Shall Behold Him."

4.1 Report

Br. Block presented the report.

My prayer for the members of our churches across this nation is

expressed in Eph. 3:16-21 (please read it before you read on)

Our board has prayed, deliberated, discussed and discerned many of the pertinent issues confronting us in our contemporary society. Decisions have been made on some of these. Others need more work which is presently still in process. We will deal with as many as possible in the July board meetings prior to the convention and bring recommendations and resolutions to the convention. Let me share an update in preparation for the convention.

Conference minister. We are grateful to God for the ministry of our brother and sister Henry Brucks. May God reward you brother Henry and sister Elsie for the warm, brotherly and more important Holy Spirit annointed ministry in our Conference. We pray for you God's very best and choicest blessings for your future.

Our board feels that the ministry of conference minister is needed on the Canadian level but that the future ministry needs to be redefined and reshaped carefully in consultation and co-ordination with our provincial

conferences, particularly as it relates to sensitive local church issues.

We have redefined the job description and spelled out more clearly the conference minister's responsibilities in relation to the provincial jurisdictions. Last January it was felt that we would be well advised not to proceed with the engaging of a conference minister until we have had opportunity to look closely at the total picture of a possible restructuring of our conference boards and ministries. We have a search committee in place which has planned and worked but we have put this matter "on hold" until July. Please come prepared to give us prayerful direction.

Let me itemize and comment on other issues dealt with at our January, 1986 board sessions. We will give more information as well as bring recommendations on these to the convention floor.

"I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, and his incomparably great power for us who believe" (Eph. 1:18-19).

Br. Henry Wiebe, Associate Pastor of the Central Heights Church reported on the situation of the Board Chairman, Rudy Boschman.

The delegation spent some time in prayer for Br. Boschman and for others who have suffered loss or are undergoing crisis at this time.

Br. Block presented the following report from the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns.

4.2 Conference Minister

Henry and Elsie Brucks were called to the front of the auditorium. They were presented with a plaque in appreciation for their years of ministry to the Canadian Conference.

Br. Brucks, the Conference Minster, presented his report.

"But as for you, O Israel, you are mine, my chosen ones; for you are Abraham's family, and he was my friend. I have called you back from the ends of the earth and said that you must serve but me alone, for I have chosen you and will not throw you away. Fear not for I am with you. Do not be dismayed. I am your God. I will strengthen you; I will help you; I will

uphold you with my victorious right hand" (Isaiah 41:8-10).

The Mennonite Brethren of Canada have a deep understanding of the words, "I have called you from the ends of the earth." We are acquainted with many people who have been uprooted and who have been brought to a new country, and this by the mighty intervention of our gracious Lord. They have become members of the family of God in Canada. We are also acquainted with the present mosaic of the Canadian Mennonite Brethren Conference comprised of the many people with different cultures and languages worshipping the same Lord Jesus Christ. At least ten different languages are being used in worship services on a given Sunday morning. A picture of the first Pentecost seems to be shining through. This is the Lord's doing. We take comfort from the words, "Fear not, for I am with you. Be not dismayed. I am your God."

Conference activities. Since the summer of 1975 I have had the privilege of ministering to our churches and conferences across Canada. When we began the work Quebec was our primary focus, however, this ministry was enlarged to include evangelism and disciple-making across Canada. While ministering in our churches I shared with them the responsibilities entrusted to our conferences, whether at the provincial, national or international levels. The purpose for doing this was to assist our churches to gain a larger vision for the work entrusted to us and to deepen their loyalty and commitment. To guard the unity of the brotherhood is always very important. Today we are grateful to the Lord for the blessing with which he has blessed us. We recognize that we are standing at growth in this multicultural country called Canada.

Deeper Life ministries. As Conference Minister I have been involved in deeper life ministries, missions conferences and evangelistic meetings. The deeper life emphasis often sets in motion evangelism in the church and neighbourhood. A weekend of deeper life meetings is so often confirmed by the Holy Spirit in revitalizing the church. The ministry to the local church is enlarged through special consultations with the leadership team of the church. Questions pertaining to conference activities can be clarified, special needs of the local church are reviewed and questions relating to the life and witness of the church are discussed. The Lord has so often blessed the brotherly interaction at these meetings with a new sense of direction and purpose.

Pastoral care ministry. We read in Ephesians 4 that "He gave some... pastors". These gifts were given for "the perfecting of the saints". We are thankful to the Lord for the leaders he has given us. We are grateful for the institutions, the Bible institutes, MBBC and MBBS, that help so much in preparing leaders for kingdom work. These leaders find themselves in the forefront of the struggle in the life of the church and are often lonely. As earthen vessels they are also keenly aware of their limitations and the task of guiding the church seems so awesome. A ministry to these pastor couples is both important and essential. Let us continue to uphold them in our prayers.

Disciple-making '85. This special convention in October, 1985 was a very enriching experience for the more than 1,000 people who attended the event. The biblical input by the three main speakers, Augsburger, Wagner, and Coleman, coupled with ministries of Bible teachers and workshop leaders, was instrumental in enlarging our understanding of church growth and deepening our commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ. The three boards responsibile for the developing of this convention were the Board of Evangelism, the Board of Christian Education, and the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns.

Study Papers. During the course of the year we kept in touch with the pastors of our churches by mail. We have sent study papers to them that we trust can be of help to both the pastors and the churches. Let me list a few

Elsie has worked as secretary for the Board of Management, General Conference Board of Trustees and the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns. My work has been in the churches and thus with pastors, churches and conference leaders. We are grateful for the ministry entrusted to us. It has been a very enriching experience for us. We have become acquainted with our churches across Canada. We have prayed with church leaders and members of the congregations, cried with them and rejoiced with them. To all we say, "We love you. May God bless you." We close this chapter of conference related ministry at the end of July 1986.

5. M. B. Biblical Seminary

John Redekop introduced Larry Martens, President of Mennonite

Brethren Biblical Seminary.

Br. Martens introduced the Canadian Seminary Board members. He asked the alumni of the Seminary to stand. Then he recognized those pastors who have been involved in continuing education at the seminary. Finally he asked those retirees who have been to the seminary to stand.

President Martens presented his report to the delegation.

"Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.'... As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" (Rom. 10:13-15)

The Seminary was established 31 years ago to train men and women who are committed to the beautiful task of proclaiming the good news of Christ's love to those who have not heard. This past year, students from 13 countries came to M.B.B.S. to prepare for ministry as pastors, teachers, missionaries and Christian workers.

Our Emphasis

The pro-mission mood on campus was most encouraging this year. Seventeen families and singles befriended international students at a nearby university. A record number—24—were enrolled as mission majors. On a visit this spring, Victor Adrian was kept busy for two days, interviewing prospective candidates for MB Missions/Services. A new mission resource center kept the challenge before us all. The Center for Training in Mission/Evangelism further focused the needs and responsibility to carry the good news throughout the world.

Tenth Anniversary as a General Conference School

Even before M.B.B.S. was founded by the U. S. Conference in 1955 the vision for advanced theological education for both the U.S. and Canada has been kept alive through our Bible Institutes, Tabor College and Mennonite Brethren Bible College. In the early 1970's the move toward a common training institution was accelerated by a rapid proliferation of seminary education generally in North America. The expanding Canadian enrollment at the Seminary, a growing concern for unity between the conferences, the catalytic leadership of M.B.B.S.'s then president Henry H. Dyck and conference leaders on both sides of the border—all these converged to give birth to M.B.B.S. as a General Conference seminary in 1976.

Our Graduates

On May 24 we graduated 30 fine men and women who are committed to the beautiful task of proclaiming the good news. Fourteen received Master of Divinity Degrees, 15 received the Master of Arts and one received the one-year Certificate of Christian Studies. Twenty-four were Mennonite Brethren; the rest represented General Conference Mennonite, Baptist, Assemblies of God, Free Methodist, and Christian and Missionary Alliance churches. The class included fourteen Americans, eleven Canadians, two West Germans, one Paraguayan, one Japanese, and one Indian. The total number of M.B.B.S. graduates now stands at 477.

Preparing for Ministry

Ninety-six of our 140 credit students this past year were from Mennonite Brethren churches: 44% of these were from the U.S., 42% from Canada, and 14% from overseas. The non-MB portion of the student body represented 23 other denominations. In addition to the "regular" student body, we were enriched by the wisdom and experience of several pastors, missionaries and lay people who came for all or part of a semester, or interterm.

Opportunities on the Horizon

We encourage churches to free their pastors for a time of renewal at M.B.B.S. During the 1987 inter-term period in January, we will be hosting several three-week and one-week courses in Fresno and in our constituency. Our Finances

We praise God that this year, we again finished the fiscal year in the black, with the following breakdown of giving toward our \$1.1 million budget.

The new administration has been given a significant legacy which it receives with joy. It will continue with an unswerving commitment to the authority of Scripture and to a vital missional emphasis which reflects an evangelical, Anabaptist understanding of the nature of the Church.

Tim Geddert, a native of Saskatchewan, has just completed doctoral studies in Aberdeen, Scotland, and will be joining us in September as Assistant Professor of New Testament. Tim's wife Bertha died February 23 of a brain tumor. We commend Tim and his two boys, Matthew and Andrew, to

your prayers as they move to Fresno.

We see ourselves as partners with you in the ministry of the Church. We are grateful for the trust you extend to us, for your prayers for this ministry, and for the financial support which makes it possible.

Br. Martens introduced Ron Penner, Student Dean at M.B.B.S.

Br. Penner talked about some of his experiences and observations during his first year at the Seminary.

6. Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns (continued)

6.1 Report

Isaac Block continued his report.

A. The Conference Minister

At our winter meetings and again at these meetings, we discussed the continuing need of the office of the Conference Minister. Upon reviewing the mandate of our Board, as well as the work of the minister, we are persuaded of the need to continue this office.

We have subsequently rewritten the job description. This job description reflects the suggestions that came to us from a large number of pastors, as well as our own view of the task. The job description also serves as the criteria in our selection of a successor to Br. Brucks. We want to report to you that we are actively engaged in a search for a conference minister and have prepared a short list of nominees.

Since Br. Brucks' ministry ends this month, we are making interim arrangements to deal with some aspects of his work. As a matter of policy the conference minister serves as the executive secretary of the Pulpit Committee. The members of the Pulpit Committee are Allan Labun (chairman), John Epp and Isaac Block. Until further notice comments or inquiries regarding pulpit supply should be directed directly to this committee.

We have asked Allan Labun and John Epp to deal with the mail that comes to the office of the conference minister. Telephone calls will be directed to Isaac Block. The address and the telephone number will remain

unchanged.

B. Constitutional Matters

It seems to us as though some matters pertaining to the constitution were neglected during this past year. We apologize for this. One of our recommendations will rectify this matter.

We received a submission regarding a proposal to work towards a constitutional change that would affect our board of Management. We have a recommendation to cover this matter.

C. Institute for Church Ministries

We plan to seek an arrangement with the administration of M.B.B.C. to arrange for a special pastors forum, hopefully on the Monday evening of the Institute. Our plan is to begin with supper, to have an inspirational time, as well as a discussion of vulnerabilities in the pastorate. We are urging all churches to seriously consider sending the pastoral staffs, together with spouses, to the Institute and the Forum. Further information will come to the leaders.

D. Baptism/Church Membership/Lord's Supper

For the past several years the Board has been studying the issues in our churches that pertain to the relationships between Baptism/Church Membership and the Lord's Supper. This has been done in several stages with the objective of helping local churches deal with the particular questions that arise.

We have written, studied, and circulated a number of papers. We invited responses. We also hoped that these papers would be useful at the local level.

We also circulated a questionnaire, in the past year, to pastors and this year to church councils. The purpose of the questionnaire was to help churches clarify local issues and to help the Board to discern where we as a conference are in agreement and where we disagree. Your packet contains a summary of our findings.

We will continue to address the ambivalent issues and explore ways of helping our churches and the conference deal with them. It may not be realistic to work toward uniformity in all the issues. However, it is worth our joint effort to work toward retaining a spirit of unity in our churches and our conference.

THE RELATION OF BAPTISM/THE LORD'S SUPPER/CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

Study papers dealing with these issues were prepared and carefully reviewed by the B.S.S.C. Copies of these papers and a relevant questionnaire were sent to all pastors inviting their reply. In order to get a broader reading and greater involvement of local church membership, summaries of these papers were prepared and sent, together with the questionnaire referred to above, for study in and response from the leadership group of each local church. 95 churches responded.

The questionnaire and survey results appear here:

A direction-giving statement on issues that are unclear will come from this Board at a later date.

E. Medical/Ethical Dilemmas

As a Board we are aware and appreciate that many members of our conference serve in the health services professions in our communities. It was brought to our attention that a forum was needed to facilitate a discussion by persons in the health services, pastoral services, and theologians. People in the health services are asking for help in dealing with ethical dilemmas. We invited Dr. Margaret Petkau and Dr. Arnold Voth to each write a paper and to meet with us to help us sharpen the focus. The result of this consultation is reflected in a recommendation that we are bringing forward.

F. Pornography

The B.S.S.C. commissioned Harold Jantz to write a paper on pornography and to help us give counsel to our churches regarding our response as Christians to the problems related to the pornography that is being circulated in our society. In your packet are some materials to which I will draw your attention and explain how we wish these materials would be used. We also have a recommendation in relation to this matter.

Pornography: A Concern for the Church

Must be seen as part of a larger concern connected to attitudes which disregard dignity of life, depersonalize people—especially women, disregard sanctity of sex, and embrace anything which generates economic activity. It is a scourge to society and ought to be a concern to the church of Christ.

What are we talking about?

Pornography has been defined as "that which exploits and dehumanizes sex so that human beings are treated as things, and women, in particular, as sex objects." Feminists have often defined it as the "verbal or pictorial material which represents sexual behaviour that is degrading or abusive to one or more of the participants in such a way as to endorse the degradation."

Our government has sought to stop or inhibit the flow of such materials by various kinds of legislation, some involving prior restraint, requiring approval before materials can be sold; some post restraint, by which complaints can be lodged after materials are seen; and some involving restriction of access, by which pornography can be made less obvious to the eye.

Why should we be concerned?

The pornography industry is estimated to be a \$5 billion industry in North America, about \$500 million annually in Canada. The number of different monthly pornographic titles circulated in Canada was estimated to be about 200 in 1983. A researcher who wrote about the problem of boy prostitution was able to find 264 different child-porn magazines.

Is it as bad as we claim?

I drew mainly on research done by the Manitoba Advisory Committee on the Status of Women. With relatively little difficulty this group was able to find pornographic material in Winnipeg which featured sexual violence, sadism, child pornography, incest, bondage, mutilation, rape and more. The easy availability of pornography all over this country is appalling. Two of the provinces which have been widest open have been B. C. and Quebec.

Why should we as Christians be concerned?

Because pornography treats people in sub-human ways.

Because it creates an appetite which requires more and more to satisfy.

Because it turns a thing of blessing and intimacy into a source of degradation and destruction.

Because it makes one person's gratification another person's sorrow and pain.

Because it contributes to a loss of innocence for children.

Because Christ called us to holy living and indulging in pornography cannot be reconciled to such a call.

Meeting some of the objections.

Are we infringing on freedoms and bringing in censorship? If society is being hurt by pornography, if children are being psychologically and literally raped, it cannot reasonably be called censorship to restrain what is known to cause harm to others. That is what governments are called to do all the time.

Are we trying to legislate morality? Many laws have moral aspects to them. They may not induce us to do good, but they do restrain us from giving full rein to lust, greed and hate.

We can't stem the tide. Community standards count for something in the control of pornography and a profound responsibility rests upon church

and civic leaders to establish such standards.

Isn't pornography a necessary safety valve for natural impulses? Countries which have opened the doors wide to pornography on that belief—notably Sweden and Denmark—have begun to close them because they have found that the safety valve idea didn't work. Sexual offences, rapes and abuse of children did not lessen, but increased.

Why be concerned, the influence of pornography can't be that great? Those who say this are often the same people who become very upset about the influence of certain kind of advertising, or of sex stereotyping, or of racial biases in the media. Beward of those who make arguments for or against something chiefly on the basis of whether it advances their economic

interests.

Isn't this just a feminist issue? It most often involves exploitation of women and much of the struggle against pornography has been carried by feminists, but it should be seen as an issue for men and women. Men may not want to tackle this issue at times because they don't want to acknowledge attitudes which nurture pornography.

What can we do?

We can pray. We wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against powers of evil which must be faced in the strength and spirit of God. We can read.... The Bible. Books like John Court's *Pornography* or Neil Gallagher's *How to Stop the Porno Plague* or William Stanmeyer's *The Seduction of Society, Pornography and its Impact on American Life.*

We can gather data. Find out what is happening in your community. We can know the law. Minister of Justice, House of Commons, Ottawa,

ON K1A 0A6.

We can speak. Praise those who remove pornography from their

shelves. Express your concern to those who don't.

We can write. Use moderate but firm language. Thank where there has been a response. Write to stores, newspapers, government, etc.

We can unite with others.

We can exemplify. If our actions don't serve as a model, the validity of the message will be in doubt. Life up a standard by what you read, watch or how you talk. The church is known by her doing.

The Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns presented the following letter to be sent to the Minister of Justice.

Hon. John Crosbie Minister of Justice House of Commons Ottawa, K1A 0A6

Dear Mr. Crosbie:

We wold like to applaud you for your courage in bringing forth legislation which if passed will clearly bring stronger controls on the distribution of pornographic materials and more severe penalties to those who sexually abuse children.

In the first place, we welcome legislation which will go farther than in the past to protect children against exploitation for sexual purposes. We think that such legislation has been needed and will be helpful. We are dismayed by the growing incidence of such abuse, often in the home or at the hands of others whom children should be able to trust. It hurts to think that adults might make use of children to produce pornographic films and magazines or that children might be secured for prostitution. You are to be commended for trying to strike hard at such activity.

We commend you also for proposing means whereby more can be done to get at the causes of such sexual abuse. We would encourage you to see churches and Christian youth ministries as strong allies in the effort to insure that children have the opportunity to grow up in a secure, loving environment. We hope that you will continue to encourage the local regulation which will insure that even the literature which is ultimately permitted in stores stays out of sight of children, so that they don't find themselves sexually affronted by it.

You have received a good deal of criticism for the proposed legislation concerning pornographic literature. While we too believe in a free press and recognize a healthy eroticism, we see no reason to justify pornography. We believe that pornography devalues people, it is antisocial, it feeds fantasies which require more and more perverted forms to satisfy, it undermines marriages and families, it almost invalirably involves the exploitation of someone, and ultimately it turns a thing of blessing into a thing of degradation. Please do not be easily deterred by the criticism to your legislation. If you are charged with going back to earlier standards in bringing out this legislation, surely for that you need not feel any embarrassment. Our sexually more permissive society has not brought about a better world. In fact, it has caused tremendous suffering and anguish.

It cannot be reasonably argued that it is censorship to restrain what has demonstrably been seen to cause harm to many within society. This is what governments are called on to do all the time. Furthermore, if some claim you are forcing self-censorship upon them, that too is not an evil. Self-restraint is right at the heart of civilization.

We want to encourage you in your work. Our prayers and well wishes as Mennonite Brethren Churches of Canada meeting in convention at Waterloo, Ontario, are with you.

A brief review of the government's new legislation Re: Sexual abuse of children and pornography

Two Major Directions

1. Sexual Abuse of Children. A major part of the government's concern on this issue is expressed in the new legislation. It adds to earlier legislation with offences like "sexual interference," sexually touching a child under the age of 14," "invitation to sexual touching," "sexual exploitation," using a position of authority to sexually abuse a child; and includes clearer guidelines about indecent acts committed against children. It also has new legislation about living off the avails of child prostitution, the kind of evidence children may be able to give (taped, without the offender present, in some cases uncorroborated). In addition there is new help in the search for missing children and very heavy punishment for child pornographers. In some cases the legislation applies to children up to 14, in other cases up to 18. Punishment may range from a fine and as little as six months to 10 or 14 years in prison, depending on the offence.

2. Pornography. In place of the old obscenity definition, the proposed legislation has now defined pornography as follows: "any visual matter showing vaginal, anal or oral intercourse, ejaculation, sexually violent behaviour, bestiality, incest, necrophilia, masturbation or other sexual activity." The legislation is concerned chiefly with three tiers of visual pornographic material: (1) pornography causing physical harm, (2) sexually violent pornography, and (3) explicit pornographic material or performances. The intent of the new legislation is to place considerably tighter restraint on the production, display and circulation of pornographic material. Stiff sentences can be given for producing pornography involving children, for

producing or distributing other forms of pornography, for selling, renting or displaying pornography to anyone under 18, for mailing pornographic material to anyone, for importing any pornography, and for giving

performances deemed to be pornographic.

How will the Law be Administered

 Definition of criminal law rests with the federal government. It has taken the responsibility to bring the new legislation into being and see that it is enforced.

2. The federal minister of Health and Welfare, Jake Epp, has been named the lead minister to oversee the social and educational initiatives to combat sexual abuse of children. Since the constitutional responsibility for the delivery of health and welfare services rests with the provinces, the federal government says it intends to work closely with provincial departments on these intiatives.

3. In addition, because it is recognized that much of the concern for children has to be carried at the local level, non-governmental agencies, church groups and other voluntary groups are expected to help participate in the effort to overcome child abuse and child sexual abuse in particular.

4. The legislation has been introduced to Parliament and will be dealt with in Committee hearings and in Commons debate after Parliament resumes its sittings in fall.

What has Been the Response to the Legislation?

1. There has been almost universal approval of the proposed legislation against the sexual abuse of children. While not all of that approval may be as genuine as it appears, it is clear both in the media and within government that public opinion could not tolerate exploitation of children by

adults for sexual purposes. The only criticism we have heard has possibly concerned the severity of the penalties for committing the offences against children.

2. Anti-pornography literature has been strongly criticized for being too restrictive, for capitulating to a right-wing church lobby, or for returning to a Victorian morality. It is quite possible that the outcry, even from quarters like the Anglican Church at its recent synod, will persuade the government phrase "or other sexual activity" as giving the law too much scope to seek out pornography. However, many of the critics have simply tried to dismiss the government's efforts as a reversion to 19th century morality, by ridicule and other methods trying to reject it as out of step with the times.

What can we do?

1. We can and should encourage the government, with moderate but

well-reasoned statements, to stick with its legislation.

2. We should seek the opportunity through local media to argue the case for strong legislation against pornography. We should not allow ourselves to be intimidated by those who want to dismiss us as "fundamentalist" or "right wing." Carrying concerns about sexual abuse of children or pornography represents neither.

3. We should take up the challenge to produce educational materials (through the Bible College, for example, or through our media ministries or publishing programs) which address the question of child sexual abuse and how it might be identified or treated. Or it might be that one of our schools could undertake research or demonstration projects which can assist in giving us better understanding of the short and long-term effects of child sexual abuse, or for that matter of pornography. The government is specifically asking for such material.

We believe that together these can be a valuable resource for our people. We plan to work towars publishing them in pamphlet form so that they will be readily available to our constituency.

H. M.C.C.

The terms of office of four of our M.C.C. board members expire at the end of this calendar year. We are in the process of making appointments to this Board. It is our plan to set aside a two-hour block of time at our next summer board meetings to consult with as many M.B. members of the Board as can be present without additional cost to the conference. We are asking the M.C.C. Board representatives to set the agenda in advance for this consultation.

I. Grievances in Church/Pastor Relationships

As a Board, we have been concerned for some time about the number of pastors and churches that are in pain on account of stressful relationships between pastors and churches. We are presently studying a paper that will be sent to all pastors and moderators. We hope that this will result in the following:

1) That pastors and moderators will meet to read and reflect on

the paper together.

2) That they will resolve to work for health in the relationships

between pastors and churches.

3) That they will report back to our Board on ways in which we can help foster healthy relationships and effectively deal with grievances. The Board will study these submissions and then endeavor to set up a series of guidelines to be used by pastors and churches.

MOTION: That we receive this report.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATION

The Boards of Trustees of the General Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches and of the U. S. Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches and the Board of Management of the Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches, all join together in recommending the adoption of a resolution intended to merge most of the functions of the General Conference Trustees into the equivalent boards of the two national conferences.

It is recommended that the Trustees of the two national conferences assume responsibility for the following funds and programs which have hitherto been the responsibility of the General Conference Trustees, namely:

- 1) endowment, annuity, deposit and trust funds,
- 2) RRSP (Canada) and IRA (U.S.) programs,
- 3) the assets and liabilities of the General Conference as situate in, pertaining to or referable to their respective areas (with exception of special provisions regarding the seminary as detailed below),
- 4) the national share of the General Conference budget for their respective area,

5) stewardship services in their respective areas.

There would continue to be a General Conference Board of Trustees but it would be made up of three appointees from the Board of Trustees/Management from each national conference respectively.

MOTION: That we accept the recommendation.

4.1 Report

Br. Block presented his report.

As most of us will attest, change is often difficult to accept. We are creatures of habit and consequently enjoy the security of establishment. That is not always necessarily the best nor the most rewarding or progressive. The Board of Christian Education has undergone "some" change over the last number of years. We may be at a crossroads involving a "new direction" for the future. Let me explain.

Growth in accountability. Over a number of years now, and through the leadership and encouragement of our co-ordinators in the central office, the provincial Christian Education boards have caught a vision for what can be accomplished by working together as local bodies within a regional framework. The youth events, teacher-training events, marriage enrichment

events, music events and sponsor events have been growing in number, size and value. Responsibility for these has been shifted from the central office in Winnipeg to the provincial boards, as it should. Much equipping for this has happened resulting in aggressive leadership by these boards. More and more sorting of curricula as well as advising on methodology is happening provincially and we want to encourage this kind of responsible leadership for the future.

Growth in available resource personnel. With the advent of greater interest in and availability of education and facilities to accommodate the pursuit of the same, there has been a tremendous increase in provincially available resource personnel to fulfill the needs relating to regional requests for expertise in most areas of Christian Education. Furthermore, there appear to be a greater number of good resource people available crossdenominationally to assist us in methodology, as well as theology. This is good but raises some obvious concerns we need to consider. We also have our own denominational schools, the faculty of which are not necessarily employed all year round and are therefore more readily prepared to help locally as resource. We have made some inroads using available people locally over the past few years but need to explore these possibilities further.

Growth in togetherness. It is possible for boards to work together. This past year we experienced the phenomena of "Disciple-Making". The Board of Christian Education, Board of Evangelism, and Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns worked together in producing a tremendously enriching experience for all present. Many churches are in process of implementing lessons learned on this occasion as well as using resources made available as a result of this conference. It might just be possible to do more of this together with other boards as well. Then we have the General, Canadian and Provincial boards. Is is possible to carry on the work with less duplication in these areas? Each is involved in areas that the other can possibly not do alone increasing the need for all three. However in overlap areas they might be able to work in greater unity. I believe we need to be frugal and wise in examining our vision for the future.

What does all this mean for us today? It could mean we are looking at potential changes in our functional operation. This raises serious questions,

some of which I would draw to our attention.

What happens to aggressive provincial planning if there is a decrease

in centralized planning and encouragement?

What becomes of assistance to smaller churches where both finances and resources are not as readily available? Will there be a greater disparity between haves and have nots?

Are we in essence belittling the tremendous role that Christian

Education has played in our conference over the years?

Included in the report are some reflections regarding the Banff conference, *Incites*, and *The Music Maker*. How do we constantly enhance these activities for the benefit of our total conference and make them an integral part of the whole without proper centralized attention?

A new concern already brought to our attention needing centralized input, is the relationship to the new Quebec conference regarding Christian Education. At this point we see a need to be more strongly available to them

with resource and personnel rather than decreasing availability.

We, as a board, see a tremendous need in the constituency for increased direction setting along with resourcing. Change is here to stay—a

changing economy, a changing relationship to a lost world, and a changing need within our churches to cope with many new non-churched believers, requires added diligence.

What changes are we ready, willing and able to make that will increase our effectiveness as a people of God within the multi-culturalism of

our day without eroding the basic tenants of our faith!

We need a vision for the future, as Ed Boldt mentioned in his report last year, without losing the heritage of the past and the momentum of the present. Let's look at change and welcome it, but also take time to evaluate so change will be an improvement in ministry.

Banff '86

Dave Wiebe presented a report on Banff '86.

The theme "Reach, Risk and Rejoice" will soon become a familiar phrase to youth and their sponsors as the interest mounts for our triennial Youth Convention. Murray Philips of Columbia Bible College will be our speaker.

The theme speaks to three areas of need as we see them today. Youth need to reach to Christ to experience a vital, living relationship with him. The old phrase "on fire for God" might be applicable here with its connotations of being "hot", not cold nor lukewarm in commitment. We want

to promote a healthy concept of body life within the MB context.

Risk relates to the aspect of youth's lives which is characterized by conservatism and "playing it safe". Many kids simply focus on themselves and their own needs or wants. They are content to allow this focus to direct their lives. Our youth need to be challenged by the possibilities the world "out there" offers. They need to become acquainted with the ideas of service.

sacrifice and the courage that it takes to stick your neck out for Christ.

Rejoice relates to the need for kids to really be excited about their faith. People are really excited about Christianity once they've experienced Jesus in a real way and have done something hard for him. However, they also need to experience the positive excitement of Christianity in community in order to see the attractiveness of Christ. It seems the kids today are jaded by overstimulation from media sources, and by their pursuit of material pleasure. They get bored easily and are given to skepticism. The time is right to promote the celebration of real life.

Commitment to Christ and community in the Mennonite Brethren

context, service, and celebration are our focus this time around.

Preparations continue as registrations come in. Our limit this year is 1,000 (including resource personnel), about the same as Banff '83. The Banff School of Fine Arts, which has made some remarkable improvements to their facilities--including the dining complex--will again be the location for our retreat.

Make this convention a prayer priority. We should look for a revival of the power of God in our youth at Banff.

Incites

This year we sent out three issues of *Incites*.. This paper is designed for youth workers. It focuses on some particular topics relevant to youth ministry, and usually adds a miscellany of articles or columns on ideas,

resources, tips and, as in the case of this year, promotion of the Banff Youth Convention.

In the absence of a Christian Education coordinator, we lined up guest editors who were in charge of submitting material for the focus of each issue. Ben Wohlgemut of Bethany Bible Institute did our September issue on Parent/Teen relationships. It included a review of the book "The Emerging Generation: An Inside Look at Canada's Teenagers" by Bibby and Posterski.

Our December issue carried ideas for Christmas and the National

Youth Week material which was supplied by John Longhurst.

Murray Phillips and Ron Voth of Columbia Bible College provided the March issue material. The topic centred around helping teens to broaden

their horizons so that they will enter into other people's worlds.

We need to consider the relevance and usefulness of the *Incites* publication. Currently, organizations devoted to youth work (e.g. Group, Youth Specialties) are publishing very fine periodicals for the youth worker. However, Canadians have their own issues to face, and our Mennonite Brethren youth work encounters the issues in its own peculiar way. We need to help our youth sponsors address issues like use of alcohol, dancing, sexuality, what it means to be a covenanting community and a brotherhood, pacifism—and much more—from our uniquely MB perspective. This is something the American publication cannot do.

We could still benefit from *Incites* but a strong publication depends on a coordinator who is interested and acquainted with Christian Education of Youth and who is up to date, through visiting the constituency, on the current

situation.

The Music Maker

The musical activity of the Christian Education board has consisted primarily of publishing the quarterly paper, *The Music Maker.* At its July, 1985 meetings the board asked me to assume the responsibility of editing this periodical. For several years it has been prepared in turn by our educational institutions or provincial music committees. This practice seemed to have run its course and the decision was made to revert back to soliciting contributions of individuals rather than institutions or committees.

The objective of *The Music Maker* is to provide musicians in our congregations with material that is helpful to them in their local context. We want to provide items of inspiration as well as practical tips. For this reason we attempt to make the bulk of each issue material from contributors who are actively involved in the music ministry of a local congregation. This may then be supplemented by articles from the music departments of our institutions or from other published sources.

In addition to these articles we like to include news items and reports of musical events that are occurring in the churches which may be of interest and encouragement to others. For this material we are dependant upon communication from individuals or provincial music committees. Each issue of the paper concludes with about four or five selections of repertoire suggestions. Here again the objective is to choose material that is capable of being used by the average church musician.

Besides the publication of *The Music Maker* our board has also been following with great interst the progress of *Sing Alleluia*, our new hymnal supplement. Although we are not responsible for this book, two of our members are on the hymnal committee and we have been receiving regular

reports on its progress. We have also been encouraging its use in our churches.

We would like to express our gratefulness for the many in our churches who are leading and participating in the music ministry. We encourage you to remain in communion with our board, and we want to be open to your suggestions on how we can better serve you.

Abe Block introduced Harold Jantz who told the delegation about *The Adult Quarterly.*

5.1 Report

Br. Heidebrecht presented his report.

We greet you with the words of II Corinthians 4:1. "Therefore, having this ministry by the mercy of God, we do not lose heart." To understand that our ministry is rooted in the mercy of God changes the focus of reporting. It is not so much what we have done for him, as what he has done for us. His

mercy compels us to remain humble, to be grateful, and to acknowledge our

continued dependence on God.

God in his mercy has granted us a very rich and meaningful year. As board, administration, faculty, staff and students of MBBC we have not only worked hard, but have sorrowed, searched, served and prayed together. In all of this, we have sensed God drawing us closer to himself and to each other. We praise God for his mercy. It is because of his mercy that "we do not lose heart".

Presidential search. We gratefully acknowledge the ministry of our president Dr. David Ewert. He has now completed the fourth year of his assignment. As a board we continue to affirm him as president. Our entire brotherhood has benefitted widely from his ministry in the college, in our

churches and in the wider Christian community.

In accepting reappointment in 1985, Dr. Ewert also gave notice of his intention to retire at the end of his present term. He will complete his second term in 1988 and at the same time reach retirement age of 65 years. On the basis of this information we have undertaken a search for a successor to Dr. Ewert

A search committee consisting of Len Siemens (chairman), Harry Heidebrecht (board chairman), Bill Fast (board member), John Redekop (conference moderator), George Baier (alumni representative) and two faculty representatives has been appointed. We are hoping to discern a suitable candidate during the course of this conference year to succeed Dr. Ewert for the 1988-89 college year. We are open to your suggestions and

count on our brothers and sisters for prayer support in our search.

Financial restraint. At our board sessions in February we were encouraged to exercise financial restraint. Because we could not cut program without seriously jeopardizing the course requirements of students, we did everything else in our power to end the year in the black. For the coming year we have taken further short-term measures to meet guidelines established by our Board of Management. By freezing the salary level of faculty and by filling two faculty positions with part-time instructors we hope to remain within guidelines. These are, at best, short-term measures, most effectively remedied by increased student enrollment. We depend on you to assist us by encouraging your young people to consider MBBC.

Institut Biblique Laval. For more than a year we have been exploring a possible affiliation of IBL with MBBC. A joint committee consisting of representatives of the Board of Evangelism and the Baord of Higher Education has worked with administrators of both schools to formalize arrangements. Under this affiliation, accredited courses will be taught at IBL in French for transfer to MBBC. A student at IBL may take the equivalent of two years academic credit at IBL and graduate from the College with one

additional year at MBBC.

Both schools are pleased with this arrangement. It enalbes IBL to upgrade their program and also creates the possibility for some MBBC students with French proficiency to take a portion of their training at IBL. We are grateful for this opportunity of working in cooperation with our Quebec brethren.

Inter-Institutional activities. This year marked the tenth sucessive year in which administrators and board representatives of our seminary, MBBC, Bible institutes and high schools met in consultation. Perhaps this consultation was the most significant. Thirty-five leaders from across Canada,

including provincial moderators, the Canadian conference executive, school administrators and board chairmen, together with representatives of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns and the Inter-School Relations Committee, met in Clearbrook, B. C. for several days of consultation on issues related to MB post-secondary education in Canada. Together we wrestled with issues such as a growing regionalism, waning conference and denominational loyalty, upgrading of Bible institutes to college status, limited student and financial resources, and possible alternatives to our present structures. A consensus was reached that, although many of our institutions were provincially controlled, post-secondary education was of national concern. A Task Force on Higher Education was appointed to study the issues related to MB post-secondary education, with a view to preparing specific recommendations for consideration at our convention in 1987.

Student services. In March of this year, the churches of Manitoba hosted a two-day Student Services Seminar at the Fort Garry MB Church, under the leadership of Ron Neufeldt and Dan Unrau. These seminars are designed to assist pastors and church leaders in ministries to university students. The presentations were of excellent quality and were appreciated by participants. If there was a persistent theme that kept surfacing it was that churches were not adequately dealing with questions related to sexuality, career and service choices and faith formation. During the forthcoming conference year we will be completing this cycle of seminars by meeting with

pastors and church leaders in Ontario in a similar setting.

Historical committee. The Centre of MB Studies continues to serve a vital role in collecting historical materials and disseminating relevant information to our churches. The faithful and thorough work of our archivist, Ken Reddig, is much appreciated. A list of significant new accessions is available from the archives. Besides collecting historical materials, the Centre of MB Studies is currently involved in the indexing of the *Rundschau*, in planning a major symposium for the fall of 1986, and in publications. Among projects being considered is a proposed book by David Ewert entitled *Remember Your Leaders*, containing biographical sketches of prominent leaders in the history of our Canadian brotherhood.

President's report

David Ewert, the president of M.B.B.C., presented his report.

It is with a deep sense of joy and gratitude that we report on the 1985-86 College year. With the prophet we confess, "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is thy faithfulness" (Lam. 3:22).

We have just completed our 42nd year and we marvel at the mercies of God, bestowed upon us so undeservedly and abundantly. Let me briefly

recount some of the mercies of God.

Students. Once again God gave us a good student body. We can't help but think that we must have some of the finest young people in Canada. Most of them take their studies seriously and want to be instructed in God's ways. The quest for spiritual formation is strong and the interest in serving the Lord is given a high priority.

The student body meets for chapel four times a week. Besides, students are divided into groups with faculty advisors for the purpose of spiritual nurture and fellowship. Also, students serve during the year in a

variety of ministries in the city, under the supervision of our Christian Service director.

We were down a bit in total numbers (228 all told), but we are hoping for a slight increase next fall (there are indicators to that effect). Several students have declared their intention of taking their first year of seminary at MBBC, as others have done these past two years. Of the 228, we have 96 new and 132 returning students. They came from a variety of denominational backgrounds, although the majority were Mennonite Brethren. We have 171 single and 57 married students. Our students came from all across Canada, from British Columbia to Quebec. Also we had 15 students from other countries. Twelve students are doing Field Education for credit this summer (six of these in pastoral internships). Others will be in a variety of other church and mission related settings.

1986 graduates. On April 28, thirty-five seniors received their degrees, after completing the three-year course of studies at MBBC. Most of them were Mennonite Brethren, but several graduates came from other denominations. Of the 35, 14 were Manitobans, five came from B. C., six from Alberta, four from Saskatchewan, three from Ontario, two from Germany, and

one from Paraguay. Eighteen of the 35 are married.

The future plans of this year's graduating class are quite diverse; all of them, however, are committed to serve Christ and his people. Ten of the 35 plan to enter pastoral or church music ministries; two have missions abroad as their goal; three are on their way to seminary. Others hope to be engaged in Christian education and youth work. Still others plan to continue their education in preparation for various vocations.

The college is grateful to God for the work of grace that is evident in the lives of our graduates, and we commend them to our churches with the

prayer that they may all be good servants of Jesus Christ.

There's nothing quite so rewarding as to see young men and women

dedicating their gifts and energies to the building of God's kingdom.

Faculty and staff. God has given MBBC a strong faculty who work with joy and dedication. We began the year with 17 regular faculty members, but just before Christmas God, in the mystery of his ways, called Dr. Henry Krahn to himself. By God's grace we were able to find appropriate substitute teachers for Henry's classes in the second semester. The college is in the process of finding a replacement for Dr. Krahn, but the next year plans to employ part-time instructors in historical studies.

At the end of January our board accepted the resignation of Sig Polle, who had been student dean for five years. Isaac Block, assisted by Esther

Wiens, has assumed this responsibility for the coming year.

In order that you might pray for us, let me list our regular faculty

members according to their teaching areas.

Besides the regular faculty, a number of part-time instructors helped us in the areas of their specialty, such as missions, music, philosophy, and sociology. for the coming year we have engaged John Derksen, M.A., history, University of Manitoba; M.A., theology, Fuller Theological Seminary, to teach in the field of historical theology; Spencer Estabrooks, Ph.D. (cand.), in philosophy; James Nikkel, D.Min., in Evangelism. Several others will be added in the course of the summer.

The college faculty takes seriously the goals and purposes which our conference has set for MBBC, and it is gratifying to notice a growing sense of unity among faculty and a dedication to the high calling of giving our young people a thorough grounding in the Christian faith.

What helps to make the work of the faculty even more enjoyable is the fine support we have in the library, the general office, the kitchen, and in

buildings and grounds.

Facilities. Among the many mercies of God upon MBBC are the two new buildings (Projects '84 and '85) which now grace our campus. Project '84 provided us with a new kitchen and dining hall—a facility greatly in demand by church and conference agencies. The Student Centre in the lower auditorium has also been completed and provides lounges, typing, student organization offices, and games rooms.

The top floor is occupied by our conference offices and provides us with an excellent opportunity to work with other church agencies in building

the Kinadom of God.

This facility, which was built at a cost of \$875,000, will be paid for in the next few months when the last of the pledges are received. We can't express our gratitude enough to those of you who contributed so generously to this building.

Also, we now have a new facility for single women, the C. A. DeFehr Residence, which provides room for 45 women, plus two 2-bedroom suites for married couples with children. (Riverton Hall and Mighton Apartments

provide housing for single men and married couples.)

This facility was constructed last summer at a cost of \$413,064. Two of our brothers provided us with an interest free loan of \$220,000 (to be paid back by student rent), the government chipped in with \$75,000 under a job-creation program, donations of \$25,000 were received, and businesses within Manitoba and as far away as British Columbia supplied the materials at cost (and below cost price) for a saving of approximately \$87,000.

Just before winter we completed the landscaping of our campus and as the trees and shrubs grow it will become more and more attractive. Some of the older buildings are showing signs of wear and we plan to renovate and

improve some of them this summer.

Publicity and recruitment. For three years we had no one who could give him or herself to recruitment. But this year we were fortunate to have Doug Schulz on our faculty and he has done us an invaluable service in contacting students in the provinces and spreading the word about the great opportunities at MBBC.

Also, several singing groups, accompanied by a faculty member, visited a number of churches in B. C., Alberta and Saskatchewan. Our choir visited a number of Manitoba churches. (Next year our choir plans to visit B. C. churches during reading week.)

The ministry of our faculty members in our constituency also helps to

tie our churches and the college more closely together.

We publish the *College Bulletin* every quarter. This bulletin carries not only alumni news and information on current events at MBBC, but always contains a few articles designed to instruct and encourage our readers. We thank our alumni for the help they give us in publishing this bulletin.

Four times a year I write a letter to all our pastors, to keep them up to

date on developments at the College.

Finances. The July 1985 Convention approved a \$1.2 million budget for the operations of the College. Two factors early in the year indicated that changes would have to be made. Firstly, the increase in enrolment did not materilize, and secondly, the higher than anticipated expenditures relating to the operations fo the new building forced a revision of the budget. A number of significant expenditure reductions were made. Following discussions between the administration and board along with the board of management it was agreed that the College seek to increase revenue from donations to offset an anticipated deficit. The result of this decision was that instead of raising \$150,000 in donations the amount to be raised was increased to \$180,000. It has been encouraging to experience the generous support of churches and individuals from across our conference.

College events. After a few weeks of classes, the College community enjoyed a weekend retreat at Camp Arnes (Sept. 20-22). Dr. James Pankratz led in a series of meditations. At the beginning of October we had a week of spiritual enrichment, as Dr. John Regehr led us through the Lord's

Prayer step by step.

On November 17 we had our annual Alumni Homecoming, which was well attended and which is always a joyous occasion. This year we said goodbye to "Ebenezer Hall," and thanked God for our new facilities. On October 26 we had a special evening of thanksgiving at which we recognized those who had served in various committes that helped us in our building projects.

After several delightful musical events just before Christmas, the college community was plunged in sorrow by the sudden death of Dr. Henry

Krahn.

The second semester began with a retreat at which Dr. Vernard Eller, professor at a Church of the Brethren university, and author of many books, spoke to the students. He followed this up with the Staley Distinguished Lecture series.

January 22-23 Ron Reed, Adjunct Professor at Regent College, led the two Mennonite colleges in a festival of fine arts. This was followed, February 3-7, by our annual missions festival with Fletcher Tink of the Bresee Institute

for Urban Training, Los Angeles, as our main resource person.

Our Institute for Church Ministries (March 3-7), sponsored jointly by the College and our Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns, was certainly one of this year's highlights. Dr. Dennis Guernsey, Fuller Theological Seminary; Dr. David Augsburger, Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminaries; and Dr. John Regehr, MBBC, were the main resource people lecturing on various aspects of the vital topic, "Marriage and the Family."

This year ended with a series of commencement exercises at which we felt the presence of God in a special way. Parents and friends from all across Canada, U.S.A. and even Paraguay came to celebrate this occasion

with us. To God be the glory!

Tom Brown, an alumnus of M.B.B.C. presented his testimony.

- Br. Ewert had the ushers distribute a copy of the new M.B.B.C. Calendar to each of the delegates.
- Br. Heidebrecht reported that the faculty at M.B.B.C. will receive the same salary increase that the rest of the conference employees have received this year (contrary to what was anticipated in the above report).

Ken Reddig presented a report on the Centre for M. B. Studies which serves as the archives of the Canadian Conference of M. B. Churches.

The chairman of the board introduced Harry Olfert, Campus Administrator, who presented the financial statement. (See p. 51)
