SESSION #1: Friday afternoon, July 3, 1987 (3:30 p.m.)

1. Opening of the Convention

John Redekop made some opening comments and then opened the convention with prayer

Ron Neufeldt led the delegation in singing "To God Be the

Glory" and "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."

Abe Konrad, the moderator of the Alberta Conference, welcomed the delegates to the convention.

Br. Konrad introduced John Braun, the chairman of the provincial hosting committee. Br. Braun also welcomed the delegates to the convention.

The moderator asked delegates to identify themselves by

province.

Br. Redekop introduced six visitors from the Soviet Union.

2. Preliminary Business

2.1 Rules of order

Robert Friesen, Conference Secretary, read an excerpt from the Rules of Order from the Leadership Handbook (p.28).

Section B: General Guidelines

- 1.A convention of our brotherhood calls for united action involving the participation of all assembled for the transaction of business. Delegates should refrain from making remarks in the benches which are not directed to the entire assembly
- 2.A delegate should stand when addressing the assembly and should first address the chair with "Brother Moderator." Except as otherwise allowed, he should begin to address the assembly only after he has been recognized by the chair.
- 3.A delegate speaks to the chair. When he wishes to question an individual delegate he addresses the question to the chair. Personal remarks are out of order. Two delegates may not engage in a dialogue on the floor; statements must be directed to the chair.

4.Delegates should confine their remarks to the particular motion or resolution under discussion.

5.If a delegate has spoken to a question once, he may not speak a second time to the same question so long as any delegate who has not previously spoken desires the floor. After others have spoken, he is permitted to speak again but he should not ask for the floor more than three times on one issue. The mover may answer questions to a motion as often as they are raised.

3. Executive Committee

3.1 Executive Committee Report

Herb Neufeld, the assistant moderator, introduced John Redekop, the Canadian Conference Moderator, who presented his report.

Moderator's Report

Our 1987 convention theme, "Run to Win", reminds us that all of God's people have been entered in a race, the one great race of our lives. Our heavenly Father wants us to run that race to the best of our ability. When we compete in that race, we are about our Master's business. As an executive we trust that even as we discuss and decide on a wide assortment of issues, as we worship and fellowship, that our convention experiences will help us as individuals, as congregations and as a conference to "run" more successfully.

The campus setting of Prairie Bible Institute enables all participants in this 76th annual assembly to develop a sense of community. We will spend many hours together and we want to make the most of them. Remember, it is much more of a privilege than a duty to be here. Let us take advantage of the opportunity to build new friendships and to encourage one another in the faith. Among other things, let us each consciously seek to strengthen at least two fellow Christians this weekend.

One of the advantages of meeting at Three Hills involves worshipping jointly with the tabernacle congregation. We will have a combined service Sunday forenoon. Rev. T.S. Rendall, currently the president of PBI, will deliver a theme message. Because a change in plans requires our guest conference speaker to leave us already on Saturday, the annual moderator's message will be given Sunday morning as well. The PBI congregation will also be invited to join us for the Sunday afternoon service, presented by our Mennonite Brethren Bible College, and the evening service which is sponsored by our North American Board of Missions and Services. Even though we have scheduled three Sunday sessions, you will have adequate time to enjoy the invigorating Alberta air and to relax.

Our guest speaker this year is Dr. Haddon Robinson, president of the Denver Conservative Baptist Seminary. Many of us have, for years, listened to his stimulating "teacher cassette" comments on the Scripture Press adult Sunday school lessons. He will be speaking Friday evening and Saturday morning.

Together with the hard-working Alberta hosting committee, we have again arranged for a Saturday evening church growth banquet. In addition to the inspiring musical presentations and testimonies, we will hear a Bible-based challenge from assistant moderator, pastor Herb D. Neufeld.

During the past conference year your executive has met on six occasions, sometimes for extended sessions, and sometimes with other groups or committees. During our meetings we have addressed many issues dealing with the mid-year and July Council of Boards sessions, long-term planning, executive participation in various consultations, items raised by our boards or task forces, queries from churches and requests from many organizations. We also deal with much correspondence. Together with the Alberta convention committee we have, of course, also organized these sessions. We want to thank our Alberta associates, especially John Braun, for their hard work.

We will discuss many important questions these days. The two dealing with conference restructuring, presented by task force chairman Peter Nikkel, and higher education, presented by task force chairman Abe Konrad, may well be the most important. Let us pray that we will deliberate in a spirit of brotherhood and then act wisely in responding to the wide-ranging recommendations. As we approach next year's centennial celebration of Mennonite Brethren church witness in Canada, the proposed changes could facilitate conference renewal and growth in numbers as well as in obedient discipleship and Christ-likeness.

Major executive participation last year included involvement last December, at a consultation in Techny, Illinois, organized by the North American Council of Moderators and Secretaries, where the proposed Christian Peacemaker Teams were thoroughly discussed. Although numerous Mennonite Brethren attended, the Canadian conference was officially represented by the moderator and the Ontario conference moderator, brother Gerry Ediger. When we were asked for a general statement of reaction, the Canadian Conference executive opted for voluntary participation and voluntary financial support.

The January Inter-Mennonite Theological Consultation in Winnipeg, a much enlarged version of the annual moderators and secretaries assembly, enabled all participants to ascertain areas of inter-conference agreement and differences. Mennonite Brethren carried major roles in the formal papers and the discussions. While many important questions were aired and we learned to understand

one another better, some important differences in emphasis also surfaced. At present I do not see a basis for all of the major groups of Mennonites in Canada moving toward formal, organizational unity. One practical result of this consultation was the formation of the Canadian Council of Mennonite and Brethren in Christ Moderators. This entity has no separate budget and no formal obligations. The current function of this body is to plan any future Canadian moderators and secretaries consultations. For more than a decade MCC Canada has planned and arranged these annual meetings and many of us felt that the participating conferences should take ownership of this venture.

Following the Winnipeg consultation, six of us in MB conference work, met for an evening with about a dozen representatives of smaller evangelical Mennonite conferences. These groups basically share our vision and emphasis. We discussed areas of common interest and possible cooperation, especially concerning theological training and Christian education. As contrasted with some other inter-Mennonite forums, this one rests on a basis of virtually complete agreement in doctrine, emphasis and very similar church polity and practices.

As in the past, brother Herb Neufeld and I have been the MB representatives on the General Council of the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada. That organization continues to grow in size, influence and overall quality. It proclaims an authentic and a credible Christian witness. At a time when certain segments of the evangelical spectrum are precipitating negative reaction, and justifiably so, it is important that we reinforce the true evangelical message. Many of you have observed part of the EFC activity by reading Faith Today.

During the past year our sisters and brothers in Winnipeg laid to rest our dear co-worker, brother Henry Brucks. Our departed Conference Minister was for me a source of much wisdom, encouragement and support. We thank God for his many years of effective service. We miss him. At the same time we also thank God for his successor, brother Roland Marsch, who has now served us for half a year and who is being well received.

On behalf of the executive I thank all of the Winnipeg staff for their diligent support. Our conference has been blessed with excellent secretaries, editors, accountants, executive directors, managers and all others who serve us.

A special word of appreciation is extended to my associates on the conference executive. I could not ask for finer fellow workers

than brother Herb and brother Bob.

Finally, I want to thank the large number of sisters and brothers who have written, telephoned or spoken to us directly. Even when you exhort or criticize us, your words are always welcome. Thank you also for all of your prayers. We need to continue to pray for one another.

After these years in office I have some particular hopes for our Canadian Mennonite Brethren conference. I hope that we would take ourselves less seriously and our Lord more seriously; that we would be more heaven-minded and therefore more joyful Christians; and that we would yield much greater place to the ministry of the Holy Spirit. After that, unity and effectiveness will follow.

Br. Redekop also referred to a report concerning the work of the Moderator:

During my fourth year as moderator I have again had the privilege of serving the Conference in numerous ways. Because some of you have enquired and because it may be useful occasionally to survey what a moderator does, I shall describe the various major activities.

1. Irips to the Soviet Union. Since last July I have travelled to the USSR twice. Last October I was part of a four-man invited delegation which, in addition to interacting with Baptist leaders and churches in several cities, also visited Mennonite churches and homes in the Orenburg region. The fellowship was truly inspiring. In April and May my wife and I led a tour group to Karaganda, Alma Ata, Frunze, Zaporozhye and other centres. Again the reception was very warm. During both trips I ministered with the Word and conveyed many greetings on your behalf. I also received many greetings for individuals, congregations, and this convention.

2.Council of U.S.S.R. Ministries. This body, with representatives from the major Mennonite Conferences in Canada, the Mennonite World Conference, MCC Canada, and some European Mennonites (and loosely some travel agencies), was established last December to facilitate and coordinate delegation and tour visits. Participating bodies, working with tour and delegation leaders, intend to share information, to coordinate various undertakings, and generally to provide a much needed umbrella agency. Several meetings have been held in conjunction

with other inter-Mennonite assemblies. Some part-time staffing is

planned.

3. Christian Peacemaker Teams Consultation. Last December 16-18, the Ontario moderator, Gerry Ediger, substituting for a second Canadian Executive member, travelled with me to Techny, Illinois, for this major North American consultation. Mennonite Brethren from the General, Canadian, US and regional levels played key roles in the discussions. As reported in the press, a decision was made to proceed although details remain vague. The Canadian MB Executive has gone on record as going along with the proposal provided that only voluntary financial support is involved. We are being urged to recommend Conference support.

Mennonite and Brethren in Christ Theological Consultation. Last January 21-22 more than 100 representatives from 12 groups met in Winnipeg to discover and discuss areas of theological agreement and disagreement. As a member of the planning committee and as one of the respondents I represented this Conference. About 25 Mennonite Brethren participated. From my perspective it became clear that despite substantial growth in fellowship, goodwill, and cooperative ministries in MCC, MDS, etc., significant differences in theological emphases remain, most notably in our understanding of what is meant by peace theology. To speak of an inclusive Mennonite ecumenicity would therefore be unrealistic. Let us continue to respect one another and to work

together.

5. Canadian Council of Mennonite and Brethren in Christ Moderators. This entity established at the Winnipeg consultation mentioned above, has taken over from MCC Canada the responsibility for scheduling and organizing the (annual) Moderators and Secretaries Consultations. Representing six Mennonite and BIC conferences this body serves as a forum for communication between conference leaders in Canada and between them and MCC Canada. It will speak for and represent the participating conferences only in those matters which the participating conferences authorize. In planning the consultations this body will no longer limit itself to MCC-related matters but will at times also focus on theological questions in light of Anabaptist theology. The theme of next January's consultation in Saskatoon is, "Children in the Church: Conversion, Nurture, Membership". The minimal office expenses are covered by small donations from conferences. Currently Arden Thiessen (EMC) serves as chairman, Jack Heppner (EMMC) serves as secretary, and I serve as

vice-chairman. 6. MBBC Presidential Search Committee. As representative for the Canadian Executive I attended several meetings and participated in the committee's activities.


- 7. Evangelical Fellowship of Canada. As one of the two MB members of the General Council I attended several council sessions. As one of the two vice-presidents I also attended some six executive meetings and carried out various tasks. This growing organization of many parachurch agencies and some 23 denominations representing about 650,000 members has come to play a significant role on the Canadian scene, especially in speaking to governments and governmental agencies, the media and to other religious bodies. Our 10 cents/ member annual dues constitutes perhaps the best investment this Conference makes. (Rates will soon rise.) Denominational dues actually paid constitute less than 5% of the current budget of over \$800,000. The EFC has achieved an important and positive profile and serves as a useful forum for all members. Among the many issues which it is presently discussing with the Canadian government is the question of Old Age Security Pensions for missionaries. A recent Revenue Canada Information Circular, No.87-1, reflected suggestions made by EFC through its "Joint Committee". The benefits to all religious charities are very great. Recently the EFC has established a National Task Force on Evangelism. In early October a National Symposium on Human Life will be held in metro Toronto. (See the brochure in your folders).
- 8. Canadian Evangelical Anabaptist Dialogue. In the years before I became moderator several individuals, including our departed brother, Henry Brucks, have intermittently met with leaders of several smaller Canadian Mennonite conferences. On January 24,1987, about 20 leaders of the Evangelical Mennonite Conference, the Evangelical Mennonite Mission Conference, the Mennonite Brethren Conference, and the Chortitzer Mennonite Conference met in Winnipeg to discuss common interests, concerns, and vision, especially in regard to post-secondary theological training. Some participants envisioned an eventual coming together, perhaps even organizationally. Others anticipate only mutually beneficial exchange and cooperation in various undertakings. I have served as a member of the organizing group.
- 9. The Higher Education Task Force. The executive works with the Task Force but is not part of it.
- 10. The Canadian Conference Restructuring Task Force. This Task Force was created last July by the Conference to revise the proposal which the Canadian Executive had prepared in consultation

with the BSSC and other Conference bodies. While I continue to receive relevant mail, I have not been involved in the deliberation of this Task Force.

- 11. Mennonite World Conference, Winnipeg, 1990. During the past year I have been involved in various aspects of early planning. Several recommendations will come.
- 12. Writing and speaking. The moderator has numerous occasions to write for and to speak for the Conference.
- 13. Planning for the Council of Boards sessions and the Canadian Convention. The Executive Committee spends considerable time on these responsibilities. The usual chairman's tasks require continual attention.
- 14. Other. As ex officio member of the BSSC and as elected member of MCC Canada and our seminary board I have often been asked to comment for the Canadian Conference. I have also written several reports and papers for the BSSC. I trust that this brief overview of how I spent about 30% of my time is useful. It has been a privilege to be your servant. In Christ,

3.2 Higher Education Task Force

Abe Konrad, chairman of the Task Force introduced the members of the Task force: Edmund Janzen and Herb Kopp. Br. Konrad then presented his report.

HIGHER EDUCATION TASK FORCE

BACKGROUND

For the past decade, inter-institutional consultations convened annually by the Canadian Conference Board of Higher Education have brought together presidents, academic deans and, occasionally, board chairmen of the high schools, Bible institutes, Bible colleges, and seminary. These consultations have developed closer relationships among our institutions and have sharpened the issues that face our institutions.

In November 1985, a special consultation was held in Clearbrook, B.C., sponsored jointly by the Canadian Conference Executive, Board of Higher Education, and Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns to address the following questions:

- 1. Is higher education a national or regional issue?
- 2. Does the tier structure of education still exist and, if so, how can coordination among institutions be achieved?
- 3. What are the implications of the "financial squeeze" upon our institutions?
- 4. What implications do our responses to these questions have upon our seminary and the U.S. Conference? In addition to representatives from the sponsoring agencies, board chairmen, institutional leaders, Provincial Conference Executives, and the General Conference moderator were invited to attend this consultation. The outcome of the consultation was the appointment of a Task Force on Higher Education.

MANDATE The purpose of the Task Force was to examine the status of higher education in the Canadian Conference -- the needs, existing provisions, new options -- and to prepare recommendations for future developments. The mandate of the Task Force was outlined as follows:

- 1. Evaluate the postsecondary needs of the Canadian Conference (nationally and regionally);
 - 2. Assess the present options and resources;

- 3. Suggest possible options to meet the needs of the Conference;
- 4. Prepare proposals and recommendations for the future, with supporting rationale.

ACTIVITIES

Although Task Force activities were pursued through written and telephone communication, planning meetings were held in April, May and October, 1986. A series of activities were undertaken to address the mandate:

- Data collection from churches. Local congregations were surveyed as to the number of students in grades 10 to 12 in September, 1986.
- 2. <u>Institutional data</u>. Enrolment and financial data were obtained from each of the institutions for the past five years, and projected data were requested for the next three years.
- 3. <u>Written submissions</u>. A notice published in the M.B. Herald invited written briefs from institutions, churches, groups and individuals in support of developments that could improve higher education in Canada. Twelve briefs were received that addressed national and/or regional concerns relating specifically to the purpose, existing provisions, and new alternatives in higher education.
- 4. <u>Campus visits</u>. Visits to Columbia Bible College, Bethany Bible Institute, Winkler Bible Institute and Mennonite Brethren Bible College were made, November 2 to 6, 1986. These meetings allowed us to dialogue with board executives, administrators, faculty members and students regarding their perceptions of the continuing need for Christian higher eduction, institutional programs, projected developments, and national perspectives.
- 5. <u>Consultations</u>. Consultations with provincial conference executives were arranged to develop an understanding for the educational and fiscal expectations held by conference leaders and to facilitate the development of recommendations for new developments in higher education.
- 6. Reporting. The Task Force reported its activities to a special consultation at the Canadian Convention on July 4, 1986. Interim reports were presented to the Council of Boards in January 1987, and to provincial conventions in B.C., Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba during the first half of 1987.

COMPELLING ISSUES

Mennonite Brethren place a high priority on biblical education for faith formation, lay leadership training, and for the preparation of church workers. Although most of the issues in higher education facing us today are not new, in our view the following have taken on compelling dimensions:

- 1. Theological and polity fragmentation. A major factor influencing denominational education is an increasing theological and polity fragmentation within our brotherhood. A weakening of denominational identity strikes deeply at the heart of our educational programs, and makes it difficult to enunciate a vision for Mennonite Brethren higher education.
- 2. <u>Program articulation.</u> For some years, three levels of higher education were offered among Mennonite Brethren -- Bible institute, Bible college, and seminary. More recently, some of the distinctives among these institutional types have become blurred and costly duplication has developed.
- 3. <u>Institutional planning</u>. Institutional developments seem to be based upon expediency rather than a definitive master plan. Without systematic planning, programs have developed that overlap with those offered elsewhere and, consequently, institutions compete for the same students.
- 4. Attendance at non-M.B. schools. An increased number of students attending non-M.B. institutions has heightened the competition for students among our institutions and increased the theological and polity fragmentation within the denomination.
- 5. <u>Declining demographics</u>. Demographic data suggest a stabilization, if not an actual decline, in the potential student population. The enrolment in our schools follows closely the population trends in society, and unless we retain more MB students and/or attract more non-MB students our schools will no maintain quality programs.
- 6. <u>Escalating costs</u>. The escalating costs of higher education in a time of economic constraints present ever greater demands upon our resources. It is no longer economically feasible to maintain quality programs as student enrolment declines. We must realign our educational offerings to reflect the fiscal realities of our times, and to develop greater cost effectiveness in our programs.
- 7. <u>Human resources</u>. Our institutions also compete for scarce human resources. We cannot provide appropriate staffing for duplicate programs at our institutions.

8. Regional loyalties. In many respects, higher education has become a national issue in Canada; none of our schools regards its boundaries in narrow regional terms. At the same time, however, regional loyalties to institutions provide a substantial part of the student and fiscal support base of an institution.

EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

Conference leaders, institutional boards, administrators, faculty members, staff, and students all provide strong support for the continuing need for higher education in our conference -- for Bible centered training of lay leaders and church workers. The following educational needs were identified:

- 1. To articulate a national vision for Mennonite Brethren higher education
- 2. To establish a national Board of Higher Education with a comprehensive mandate for all institutional programs in Canada.
 - 3. To develop a comprehensive program of offerings.
- 4. To differentiate institutional emphases through careful articulation and coordination of programs.
- 5. To establish a national funding formula to support all institutional programs.
- 6.To employ constituency relations and student rcruitment staff for our institutions nationally.

NEW ALTERNATIVES

The Canadian Conference of Mennonite Brethren Churches stands at the threshold of a new era in higher education. Over the past 60 years, as many as 27 Bible schools have served the needs of our churches and its young people. It is time for us to work together in a coordinated comprehensive system of biblical education. Within such a system, there would be a place for different types of institutions, each with its own mission and with clearly defined relationships to each other. Moreover, a national board would promote a national transcendent vision and philosophy of biblical education, while local control would be retained by institutional boards.

A coordinated system could formalized the tiered nature of higher education in Canada. Bible institutes could offer high quality short term, one- and two-year programs, focused primarily upon spiritual formation and lay training; whereas the colleges could offer degree programs, focused largely upon lay and leadership training for church ministries. For example, CBC could develop its internship program, and MBBC could maintain its university affiliation as well as offer the first year of a seminary program. In a coordinated system,

clarification of institutional mission would occur at the system level, but specific course development would be institutionalized. New programs would be reviewed and approved at the system level, but implementation of strategies would be developed institutionally at the local level. In a fully coordinated system, all Conference support would be coordinated through the national board, but each institution could engage in special and unique fund-raising activities.

To adopt a coordinated system would strengthen substantially the relationship of the institutions to the denomination and, at the same time, it would enhance institutional developments. Cost reductions could be achieved through careful program articulation, and transferability would be strengthened within a unified system. A single system would have stronger student appeal because alternatives would be available within the larger network of institutions. In such a system, alternatives could be pursued within a covenantal community of education.

The Task Force recommends

- 1. That a comprehensive coordinated system of higher education in Canada be adopted in principle.
- 2. That a three-member Commission on Higher Education be appointed by the Executive to develop operational guidelines for the new system of higher education in consultation with and seeking the approval of provincial conferences and institutional boards and for submission to the July 1988 Canadian Conference convention.
 - 3. That the terms of reference for the Commission include:
 - a. To develop the governance structure of the system;
- b. To specify duties and responsibilities of a national board and of institutional boards;
- c. To clarify the transitional role of boards of existing institutions;
 - d. To explore program articulation among institutions;
 - e. To develop cost projections and a national funding formula;
 - f. To clarify matters regarding capital assets; and
- g. To examine issues related to constituency relations, student recruitment, and staffing.
- 4. That a new national Board of Higher Education be elected at the 1988 Canadian convention.
 - a. to develop a national vision for Biblical education;
- b. to develop governance policies that will allocate operational matters to the institutional level;
- c. to develop a comprehensive coordinated program of education to meet the needs of our churches and its young people;

d. to articulate institutional programs;

e. to develop a student recruitment policy; and

f. to establish a national funding formula.

3. Evening message

John Redekop introduced Dr. Haddon Robinson.

Outline of message: "How does God keep his promises?"

- 1) Intervention- God reaches into a difficult situation and lifts us out
 - -God does a miracle- e.g.. Exodus 14
 - -e.g.. Luke 18
- -If we believe that this is the only way that God works we will be living with an illusion which will lead to disillusionment.
 - 2) Interaction
- -God leaves us in a situation but empowers us to make a difference.
 - -e.g.. Exodus 3-4

CANADIAN CONFERENCE RESTRUCTURING PROPOSAL

Presented by the Joint Executive Committee Board of Spiritual & Social Concerns Task Force (March 3, 1987)

A. Rationale for Conference Restructuring

- 1. To provide leadership in promoting vision and setting goals for the extension of God's Kingdom through the churches of the Conference.
- 2. To improve inter-board coordination, planning and program implementation.
- 3. To improve communication and cooperation between the provincial and the Canadian conferences.
- 4. To develop a greater sense of responsibility and collective accountability among Conference leaders.
- 5. To increase the sense of ownership of ministries among our Conference leaders, churches, and members generally.
 - 6. To avoid duplication or gaps in Conference ministries.
- 7. To develop better communication between the Canadian Conference Executive Committee and the Conference boards.
- 8. To provide a forum for board chairmen to interact and to become better informed about Conference ministries and specific planning by other boards.
- 9. To develop a more broadly based leadership and coordinating group than the present three-person structure of the Executive Committee.
- 10. To establish structures and arrangements which will enable our provincial conferences, as conferences, to take greater ownership of our national Conference ministries, thus recognizing and building upon some basic strengths of our Conference.

B. The Revised Restructuring Proposal

1. The Executive Board

(i) Composition:

The Board shall consist of the following:

Moderator

Assistant moderator

Secretary

- The above all elected for a two-year term. Each shall

be eligible for not more than three consecutive terms.

The chairpersons of the Canadian Conference Boards Provincial M.B. Conference moderators (or designates) selected by each provincial conference

Executive Director - ex-officio

Treasurer- ex-officio

(ii) Duties:

- a) Provide leadership in promoting vision and setting goals for the extension of the kingdom of God through the churches of the Conference.
- b) Plan the annual conventions. The Executive Board will consult with the Executive of the host province regarding facilities and logistics.
- c) Act as consultant in the planning of all special national Conventions.
- d) Submit to the churches all issues which require church action or vote.
- e) Be responsible for the administration of the conference offices.
 - f) Appoint and supervise the work of the Executive Director.
 - g) Supervise the work of the Nominating Commission.
 - h) Represent the Conference between sessions.
- i) The Board shall coordinate the plans and activities of the various boards of the Conference.
- j) The Board shall respond to provincial and General Conference matters as they relate to the Canadian Conference.
- k) The Board shall appoint a personnel commission which, in consultation with other boards, shall be responsible for determining salary schedules and benefits for all Conference personnel.
- The Board shall be responsible for fostering inter-church relations and contacts with other church-related agencies.
- m) The Board shall oversee the Constitution and implement any changes as required.
- n) The Board shall be responsible for providing direction in matters of church polity.
- o) The Board shall be accountable to the Conference at its annual convention.

2. The Board of Faith and Life

(i) Composition

see below, item 6

(ii) Duties:

- a) The Board shall watch over the spiritual life of the Conference and its churches and give guidance, and direction in matters of faith, doctrine and the Christian life, including the giving of leadership in the clear teaching of our *Confession of Faith* within our Conference and its churches.
- b) The Board shall, when it deems necessary, initiate the appropriate action or serve as a reference body in issues of social concern. Further, it shall be responsible for giving directives for teaching and structuring our peace witness in our country and our constituencies.
- c) The Board shall appoint and supervise the work of the Conference Minister.
- d) The Board is charged with the responsibility of publishing Conference publications. This will include the appointment and supervision of the appropriate staff.
- e) The Board shall encourage, promote and supervise the publication of materials designed to meet specific needs of the Conference.
- f) The Board shall plan Faith and Life Conventions in consultation with the Executive Officers of the Conference.
- g) The Board shall establish and maintain a functioning pulpit committee to assist churches in ministerial placement.
- h) The Board shall be responsible for the Mennonite Brethren representation on the Board of the Mennonite Central Committee (Canada).
- i) The Board chairman shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive Board.
- j) The Board shall be accountable to the Conference at its annual convention.

3. The Board of Trustees

- (i) Composition: -see below, item 6
- (ii) Duties:
- a) The Board is charged with the administration and supervision of all the physical assets of the Conference. It shall also be responsible for any business ventures undertaken by the Conference.
- b) The Board is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Conference budget, as well as for carrying out the required budget control.

- c) The Board is responsible for the provision and maintenance of adequate Conference offices.
- d) The Board appoints a treasurer whose duty shall be to receive, hold in custody, and disburse all funds under supervision and administration of the Board.
- e) The Board chairman shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive board.
- f) The Board shall be accountable to the Conference at its annual convention.

4. The Board of Evangelism and Church Ministries

- (i) Composition see below, item 6
- (ii) Duties
- a) The Board shall seek to initiate, promote and strengthen the work of Evangelism in local churches and all individual agencies of the church, by such means as seem expedient, desirable and fruitful.
- b) The Board shall seek to initiate, promote and strengthen the program of Church Ministries (e.g. music, youth, etc.) in the local churches of the Conference by providing counsel, offering courses, providing publicity and instructional materials, arranging and conducting regional and national conferences.
- c) For the execution of their program the Board provides staff and office facilities subject to the approval of the Conference.
- d) The Board promotes and supervises the work of evangelism and outreach which does not fall within the jurisdiction of a provincial conference.
- f) The Board may, in special cases, assist provincial conferences in church planting.
- g) The Board chairperson shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive Board.
- h) The Board shall be accountable to the Conference at its annual convention.
 - 5. The Board of Higher Education
 - (i) Composition: see below, item 6
 - (ii) Duties
- a) The Board operates and promotes the Mennonite Brethren Bible College.
- b) The Board is responsible to seek to structure and integrate, together with the boards and faculties of the Bible institutes and Bible Colleges, the biblical and theological training program of the Conference.

c) The Board is responsible for initiating and supervising a Student Services Program to give spiritual assistance to students on the various university campuses in Canada.

d) The Board is charged with the responsibility of arranging for and distributing assistance to students in the form of bursaries,

scholarships, etc.

- e) The Board is responsible for all Canadian Conference relationships to schools and colleges other than Mennonite Brethren.
- f) The Board chairperson shall report the plans and activities of the board to the Executive Board.
- g) The Board shall be accountable to the Conference at its annual convention.

6. Board Membership (other than for the Executive Board)

- a) Each of the four boards shall consist of provincial representative from each provincial conference and several members-at-large. The number of members-at-large shall be determined by conference decision. Unless the conference decides otherwise, the number of members-at-large for each board shall be six.
- b) The senior staff would usually meet with the board and would be given such status in board meetings as each board decides.

C. COMMENTS AND EXPLANATION

- 1. Under the present constitutional arrangement each board has twelve members: six provincial representatives and six members at large. With the three-person Executive Committee that results in a total of 75 board members. Under the proposed arrangement the four boards would have a total of 48 members. With the Executive Board the total of board members would be 58.
- 2. The revised proposal does not describe the number or nature of support staff for each board. That matter would be decided by the boards and by the conference.

MOTION: That we receive this report. CARRIED



Neil Fast, chairman of the Board, introduced the members of the Board.

4.1 Report

Br. Fast presented his report.

Board of Management Chairman's Report

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed you in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places (Eph. 1:3).

God has given us many promises, but too often they go unclaimed. Let us receive the abundant life God has made available to us in Jesus Christ.

Retirement. The Board of Management wishes to acknowledge, with thanks, our brother Jake Riediger's 22 years of faithful service as treasurer of the Canadian conference.

On behalf of the board, we wish to thank Jake and wish him many healthy and enjoyable retirement years. May God bless you and your wife, Mary, richly.

New Appointment. On May 4th, Jake Neufeld joined the Canadian conference offices as J.J. Riediger's replacement. Jake Neufeld's appointment was announced in the March 20th issue of the *Herald*. This date was selected so that he could join J.J. Riediger in our year-end closing.

We, again, wish to welcome Jake to the position and would suggest that convention delegates take the opportunity to meet our new treasurer.

January board meeting. At our January board meeting we were pleased to report that income exceeded expenditures by approximately \$37,000 compared to last year's deficit of \$132,000. Optimism was expressed that we would complete this year with possibly a small surplus. This, however, cannot be determined until accounts are closed and audited.

1987-1988 Budget. All of the boards were notified at the beginning of their board meetings, in January, of our recommended guideline of a four percent global budget increase.

Personnel Commission. The commission will be recommending some changes in the grid program for conference employees and will be considering a policy for study leaves for senior conference personnel.

Amalgamation of services. At the 1986-87 convention our board made a recommendation, proposing amalgamation of the Board of Stewardship (Canadian section of the General conference) and the Board of Management.

The transfer of administrative responsibilities from the General conference to the national conferences is taking a different direction (during these past 12 months) than presented at our July convention.

The new proposal is that the General conference will continue to administer the financial program through the Board of Trustees. Constitutional changes, at the General conference level, will propose that this board have the authority to delegate the responsibility of administering the national program to the national boards.

Conference restructuring. Should the convention decide that the management of *Christian Press* be transferred to the Board of Management, this action would be acceptable.

Thank you. The Board of Management and staff wish to express their appreciation for the support of the constituency and the Council of Boards. *Neil Fast*

NOTE 1

Significant accounting policies

Basis of consolidation

Inter-funding between the consolidated entities has not been eliminated from the Statement of Operating Surplus (Deficiency).

Depreciation

Fixed assets are depreciated using the straight-line method, at the following rates:

Buildings	-	2 1/2%
Library	-	5%
Office equipment and furniture	***	10%
Automobiles	-	25%
Publication and computer equipment	4	20%
Xerox equipment	-	10%

No depreciation is taken on fixed assets in the year of acquisition.

Fixed assets - foreign missions

Land, buildings or equipment acquired in the field missions are not recorded as assets, but as contributions to the mission or congregation given support. Expenditures for such items are charged to project expense for the year in the attached financial statements.

Income and expenditure recognition

The Canadian Conference accounts for income and expenditure generally on a cash basis.

Interest on long-term notes

Interest on long-term notes is accounted for on the accrual basis.

Foreign exchange reserve

The foreign exchange reserve was established to provide for additional Canadian funds required to retire debt repayable in U.S. dollars. During the year, the inter-office funding of \$1,500,000 U.S. owing to the U.S. Board of Trustees was repaid prior to its scheduled retirement in 1989. The repayment caused the foreign exchange reserve to be overdrawn as at May 31, 1987 by \$204,514. Management has decided to expense this overdraft against operations for the 1988 and 1989 years.

Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

NOTE 8

Registered Retirement Savings Plan Trust Fund

The Board of Trustees (Stewardship) has an R.R.S.P. Trust Fund for members of Canadian Conference churches. Funds are directed to first mortgages of member churches at a rate of 1/2% to 1% above the 5 year guaranteed savings certificates at the National Trust Co. Interest is calculated on member savings every six months and credited to each account on December 31.

Members' accounts are administered by the National Trust Co. and mortgage investments are supervised by mortgage trustees nominated by the Board of Trustees (Stewardship). At May 31, 1987 there were 313 R.R.S.P. accounts.

Mennonite Brethren Communications Chairman's report

Forty years ago Henry Brucks and Henry Poetker prepared a gospel program for release on Winnipeg radio station CKRC. No one would have thought that in 1987, programs by Mennonite Brethren Communications would be broadcast across Canada and Mennonite Brethren Bible College to a precisely designed two story possible. This dream became possible because the work is gives.

The vision for everything radio station of the program
The vision for evangelism by radio continues. Communication on modern technology systems is both costly and complex. Our goal is not to entertain but to take advantage of every minute to proclaim the Gospel of Christ and call all people to be saved. Year by year new techniques are being implemented to convey messages to people. This past year has been no exception to changes. We want to share with you our excitement, challenges and concerns.

There was no television in Canada in 1947 when Gospel Light Hour began. MBC has attempted to keep the ministry relevant to the needs of the times and therefore also has a television ministry. The "Third Story" program is seen on numerous television and cable stations in the provinces of Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and B.C. The budget of nearly \$130,000 does not allow us to purchase broadcast time. We are grateful to all the stations who consider *Third Story* of such quality as to warrant "free time". Much of this is possible when local churches such as in B.C. and Saskatchewan demonstrate to their local stations that their communities need this program. Letter response to the *Third Story* is good and many ask for follow up literature and Bible study material. In addition, our video library, particularly suitable for discussion groups, is available to all churches. Why not consider purchasing the complete set for your church library?

In January of 1987, J.J. Neufeld who, for 28 years was the producer-speaker for the Low German program Licht vom

Evangelium, retired. We are grateful for his many years of uninterrupted service to God (over 4000 programs). We are also thankful that God raised up a new worker. Gerhard Friesen, after 12 years of pastoring in Canada and in Asuncion, Paraguay, returned to MBC to be the speaker on both the Low German and High German programs. Abe Quiring, after seven and a half years of being the producer-speaker of Licht des Evangeliums, has left to become the pastor of the Central M.B. Church in Winnipeg. We wish him God's blessing. By re-arranging the programs, Gerhard has been able to start by producing both Low German and High German Changes have been made to the release of the programs. The distribution is now spread more evenly across Canada. This has resulted in two half hour programs per week i.e. one of Licht des Evangeliums and one of Licht vom Evangelium instead of five quarter hours of each per week. The commitment to Low German and High German continues. Increased opportunities for the Low German ministry are seen as hundreds of Mexican Mennonites return to Canada.

For many years MBC has not had an English language radio program. after much research and prayer we feel the time has come to launch a new English, half hour, weekly, "magazine format" program. As we continue the search for suitable staff we would welcome your suggestions and request that you consider sponsoring the program in your area. The program is intended for distribution across Canada, in places where there are established MB churches. Its goal is Christian witness and to provide marketplace exposure for the work of Mennonite Brethren Churches in Canada.

The board of MBC is thankful for the smooth internal staff changes. Dan Block is now executive director and moved into this assignment when Neil Klassen requested to be reassigned to the position of technical director. The new studio requires the skills of experienced technical staff and Neil, who has been with MBC for many years, certainly fills the requirement. We continue to look for someone willing to fill the position of promotion/ development director which Dan vacated.

The Russian programs have exceptionally strong response from committed and uncommitted listeners from within the Soviet Union. Viktor Hamm, at the time of writing this report, is preparing to go on a personal preaching tour inside the Soviet Union. This is another way of keeping in touch with the spiritual needs of our listeners.

We are grateful for God's guidance in this past year as we

went through changes at MBC. Our new studio is a tool with great potential and we thank you for making it a reality. We thank our conference for its encouragement to continue gospel broadcasting. Our vital links are the pastors and members of the churches. Thank you for strong financial support from individuals, churches, fellowship groups and corporations. May we sincerely ask you to continue to pray for us as we attempt to be on the front line with the message of hope in a desperate world. *Jack Hoeppner*



Moderator's Message

At the Sunday morning service the moderator, John Redekop, presented his message to the convention.

"Running God's Race"

I Cor. 9:19-27

I. Introduction.

In our text the Christian life is presented as a foot race and as a boxing contest. Such metaphors occur frequently in the New Testament. (Acts 20:24; Gal. 2:2; Phil. 3:13-14; II Tim. 4:7; Hebr. 12:1-2) The starting place of this great race is at the foot of the cross. Pressing on we run past Golgotha and the empty tomb to the Mount of the Ascension, then on to Pentecost. Beyond those heights we encounter the hills and valleys of our own lifetime, our battle with evil, our victories over temptations, our race then takes us to our heavenly home and the eternal city of God.

The Corinthians to whom Paul wrote understood his imagery. The Isthmian or Corinthian games, more prominent even than those at Olympus, were run every few years near Corinth. The readers of Paul's letter knew them well.

The first part of the passage, verses 19-23, is not couched in athletic language but it belongs with the latter part because it describes well various traits and prerequisites which Paul restates or subsumes in the subsequent verses. The concept of winning, although used in two senses, serves as a constant thread.

In analyzing this text we will consider the following aspects:

The Participants in the Race

The Purpose of the Race

The Prerequisites for a successful Race

The Problems in the Race, and

The Prize at the end of the Race

II. The Participants in the Race.

Who runs in God's race? All of God's people do. At conversion we move from our spectators' benches in the stadium and step onto the race course. There our names are proclaimed by the world.

Of course, no one is compelled to run. We choose to run. Just as I raced along country roads this morning with these shoes

because I wanted to, so also we enter God's race by volunteering.

With Paul we can say, see verse 19, we are free. No one is compelled. But those who do not run, cannot win.

While Paul's image involves individual athletes, we remind ourselves that we do not run alone. Not only does the Holy Spirit guide and sustain us, but we, as God's elect, run this race together. We run as individuals, as families, as congregations, as a conference, and as the gathered bride of Christ. In all these ways in which we run, God, the judge, observes us.

III. The Purpose of the Race

In verse 19 to 23 Paul spells out the compelling motive and key concern of his entire life's race. This central purpose comes across very specifically and repeatedly. The unequivocal purpose is to win people to Christ. We read that Paul wants to win the Jews, he wants to win the Gentiles, he wants to win the weak, he wants to win as may as possible among "all men." (v.22) Let there be no mistake about it, Paul commits himself singularly and enthusiastically to the goal of winning people to Christ.

How do we rate in comparison. Does salvation for a lost world and for specific individuals still dominate our thinking? Is it central in our homes and in our churches? Is it central in our preaching and our teaching? Is it central in our prayers? Is it still central in our giving and in our living? Our Confession of Faith says "yes." Would our Lord, the judge, come to that same conclusion if he saw only our denominational statistics?

IV. The Prerequisites for a Successful Race

If we believe, as most commentators suggest, that the race analogy serves mainly as a reinforcement of verses 19 to 23, perhaps triggered by Paul's repeated use of the word "win," then we can properly look to the entire passage for specific prerequisites. The goal of winning the lost cannot be achieved without cost. Consider the following items.

1. <u>Self-denial</u>. Paul powerfully models and teaches voluntary servanthood. Verse 19 tells us that he voluntarily "enslaved himself," to use Barnes' phrase. He did so first for the sake of the lost, but ultimately also for himself, for his own good. Such gaining by such giving is part of the genius of Christian servanthood. Paul gave up so much, so that he could gain more. The message to us becomes clear. So live, so deny yourself, so run,

as Paul did. We are not called to a life of ease and self-indulgence but to a profoundly fulfilling and thoroughly rewarding life of sacrifice and self denial. Does stringent self-denial characterize us as we run in the Christian race? I submit to you, dear sisters and brothers, that often it does not. If all of us practiced the kind of self-denial that Paul did, then in all of our conference ministries and undertakings, be they local or distant, there would be no shortage of time or talent, of people or resources. Unfortunately, many otherwise serious and committed Christians are missing many blessings because they have not learned the fundamental Christian virtue of self-denial.

- 2. <u>Singlemindedness</u>. As participants in the Christian race we must not allow ourselves to be diverted from our central object. Our concentration needs to be complete. With Paul we look to the distant goal and say, "This one thing I do" (Phil.3:13). All else becomes secondary. "Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith" and with him, as well as with one another, contemplate the joy set before us (Heb.12:2). In verse 26 Paul says that he does not run aimlessly. He who runs aimlessly may make good time but not good progress. He may put everything into his effort, but unless such singlemindedness keeps the goal in view, it leads nowhere. The alert and disciplined Christian runner, with his eyes steadily fixed on the end zone, bends his whole being to this single effort. "Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal," writes Paul (Phil.3:13-14).
 - 3. Strict training. This requirement comes through strongly in verse 25. In his recent commentary, David Ewert reminds us that the term athlete, as used here, is the term from which we derive the word "agony." In preparation and then in performance, the Grecian runners pressed themselves to the point of exhaustion. They allowed no bodily desires, no baser passions, to interfere with their conditioning and their performance. A pampered, undisciplined body meant disgrace and loss. Indulgence and neglect produced disappointment and disaster. It still does, as many of us know all too well. At times we set aside all Christian discipline, anything that requires sustained effort and disturbs our comfort, and then we wonder why we do not win!
 - 4. Adaptability: Accommodation. We come now to the prerequisite which Paul describes most fully. The apostle Paul accommodated himself to all sorts of people. He did not cast downward glances on other classes of people but rather, driven by

love, became as one of them. Let us draw this point carefully. Like Paul we must be clear concerning who we are and whose we are, about our identity. For clarity about identity must properly precede zeal in ministry. But then, when our identity and our priorities are acknowledged and affirmed, then we willingly become adaptable. In order to win as many of the lost as possible, and to run the race well,

Paul willingly yielded privilege and tradition. So should we.

(a) "To the Jews I became like a Jew" (v.20). Here Paul used his ethnic background, for him a secondary identity, to reach out to his non-believing ethnic kinfolk. We will recall that in a moving passage in Philippians 3, Paul describes his rich Jewish roots, his enviable ethno-religious identity. He was a Hebrew of the Hebrews" with all of the attendant privileges and benefits. But this great advantage, this impressive background, he then unhesitatingly describes as "loss," even as "rubbish," in comparison. His new identity in Christ overwhelms all else. Importantly, he never denied his identity, whether as ethnic Jew, or as a Roman citizen, or as a believing Christian. Nor should we ever deny our several identities. But like Paul, we must keep the elements of our identity in proper Biblical priority. Then, like Paul, we must utilize our identity to reach out to others and to win them.

- (b) Then Paul went a step further. Given all of the memories that this additional step conjured up in his mind, it doubtless was not an easy one. "To those under the law I became like one under the law." Acceptance of the long litany of rites, customs and dietary laws, which is what is probably meant, involved a type of regression. This adaptation involved a difficult step for Paul, it seems safe to assume, but he wavered not. He did not let his feelings dictate his actions. Courageously he did what he knew to be right. In a spirit of love he made appropriate concessions. That, too, was a price he gladly paid to achieve his goal.
- (c) To those not under the law of Moses, that is, to the Gentiles, he became as one of them. For "a Hebrew of the Hebrews," a distinguished and learned Pharisee, that was no small accommodation. Yet because of his unqualified desire to win people to his Lord, he gladly identified with them.
- (d) Further, to the weak in faith, to the overscrupulous, as described in I Cor.8 and Romans 14 and 15, to those whose consciences were overly tender, Paul willingly became as if he were weak also. Again, that was no natural or easy undertaking. Paul took for himself the barely justifiable scruples of the weak. He gave up his rights, his greater freedom in order to win the lost.

(e) Summing up his readiness to adapt he proclaims, "I have become all things to all men so that by all possible means I might save some" (v.22). Paul was willing to make the greatest possible concession which a good conscience would permit. How close are you and I to accepting such an attitude? Are we willing to make any concessions at all? Significantly, "have become" is in the perfect tense. This means that we have here not isolated instances of the end justifying the means but a fixed stance and continuing disposition. We here encounter unqualified and enduring adaptability based on Christian love. Paul might have said, "I will cling to all of my freedoms and rights as a liberated Christian." He could have but he didn't. He could have said, "I am who I am and I will yield nothing. People will simply have to accept me as I am. Don't ask me to change." Yes, he could have done so and then invoked many impressive arguments. Many runners in the Christian race have done so. But wisely he did not choose that option. His goal, after all, was to win others, not to assert himself or defend his identity. Paul took his task seriously and contended in earnest.

Now we must ask ourselves this question. Can a person be truly in earnest about his professed faith, and in his godly race, who is not willing to put the spiritual ministry to others ahead of his own well-being? Will such a person not put progress in the race ahead of all else? Matthew Henry comments thus: "A heart warmed with great zeal for God and breathing after the salvation of men, will not plead and insist upon rights and privileges." Does that description fit you? Does it fit me? Does it describe your congregation? Does that describe our conference? What rights and privileges are we prepared to give up? If we say, "none!" then we are surely not taking Paul's example seriously. If we insist on always claiming and exercising our liberties and rights to the limit - and we do have the moral freedom to do so -- then we could rightly be described as self-serving rather than Christ-like. Such a standard applies equally to individuals, to congregations, and to conferences. Paul, in running his race, was willing to give up much to save some. Are we prepared to do likewise? If not, then we are not running as he ran. If we are, then let us praise God and keep on running hard.

5. Readiness to lay all else aside When Canada's great sprinter, Ben Johnson, recently won several international competitions in world record times, he carried no weights. He would certainly not have won if he had. Nor should we who run in our infinitely more consequential Christian race. In Hebrews 12:1 we are reminded to "throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles

us" as we run. The weights will not be the same for all of us. They include pride and vanity, materialism, a violent temper, disposition intolerance, a judgmental attitude, secret sins, lovelessness, blatant greed, and apathy. A very small item, humanly speaking, can become a very big problem. Do we need to grapple with weights? Do we need to watch for sins that easily beset us? Yes, indeed. Every runner has one or more weak points in his characater, some spot of vulnerability, some special danger area. Our weakest areas need to be guarded the most. Doubtless most of us know full well where our principal danger lies. These weights that can trip us may involve our natural temperaments, or the sins which we freely indulged in before we were Christians, or tempations we encounter in the pursuit of our daily vocations. This principle applies to us individually but also to us as a conference. What weights us down and holds us back? Are we weighted down by unconfessed sin, by a barely camouflaged hedonism, by a too easy accommodation with the world, by pride in what we can do, or by a loss of that first love? Moving beyond the sin question, as well as the matter of accommodating himself to others, Paul asserts that he is willing to give up all, be it liberty, ease, comfort, possessions, or even life itself. In Acts 20:24 he states, "I consider my life worth nothing to me, if only I may finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me." Can you say that? I don't think I can. I pray that I would be able to but in honesty I must say that I have not yet reached that maturity.

But Paul reckoned that if he would have to lay down his life, that too would constitute finishing his course with joy. I have often wondered what such an attitude might mean for a congregation or a denomination. Or does such a selfless attitude apply only to individuals.

6. <u>Diligence</u>. In this race the half-hearted do not go far from the starting block. But with all-out Christian racers it is not so. In verse 26 Paul says, "I therefore so run"(KJV), by which he means, I exert myself to the utmost. I shake off all sloth, stretch every muscle, strain with each step, and throw the whole force of my being into the effort. One finds no room here for half-heartedness or indifference. No concession is made to occasional spirituality. Unfortunately, in our day many people want to enter the race only up to a point. They wish to be only periodically pious. Many supposedly qualified participants run only in starts and spurts. They accept only intermittent discipleship. Such lackadaisical involvement, such indifference, kills Christian joy and after that, it kills itself. Let us, like Paul, be fired with a sacred

flame and run with undiminished diligence. In the latter part of verse 26 Paul shifts his image. In the new metaphor Christians not only run, Christians fight. The race, after all, is also a struggle and there are powerful enemies to be overcome. We who have chosen to be known as Christian pacifists, the non-resistant disciples, need to hear that language. We have been called to confront evil with spiritual weapons and we should never forget that fact. I am firmly convinced that one negative spin-off of our otherwise sound emphasis on the peace emphasis is a reluctance to fight evil. Too often, individually and corporately, we have backed off. We have yielded ground too readily. Even in societal settings, we have too easily yielded the battleground to secular forces. Precisely because we uphold what is good, we must also oppose what is evil. As we race on, let us encourage one another to that end.

Paul, we note, now decribes himself as a boxer, a pugilist. He fights against the enemy and everyone of his blows strikes its mark. Contemplating the notion of boxing for God might do wonders in helping us to be more alert, more discerning of evil, more quick to act, and more nimble of feet.

V. The Problems in the Race. Paul identifies several problems, especially in some related passages. Note the phrasing in Galatians 5:7-8. "You were running a good race. Who cut in on you and kept you from obeying the truth? That kind of persuasion does not come from the one who calls you." The racers Paul has in mind may still be huffing and puffing but they are no longer moving ahead. Paul uses an Olympic expression. "What has jostled you and hindered you?" The PULPIT COMMENTARY makes the point even more forcefully. "What did drive you back?" The term, "persuasion," in verse 8, suggests an important point. It implies that this problem could have occurred only with the runner's own consent. These Philippians had somehow come to believe in error. Perhaps Paul had knowledge that they were blaming someone else. In any event, he holds them accountable for their falling back. Perhaps we too have tended to blame others when all along we have allowed someone or something to cut in on us and thwart our forward advance. It is not only certain television evangelists who have played with sin and fallen prey to it. If we permit evil to jog alongside, then we are fully accountable when it suddenly veers to cut in on us. If as a denomination we seem, at times, not to be moving forward much in our mandate to win souls for Christ, then we too, need to ask what our impediment, or distraction, or error may be. What has cut across our denominational

path? We must admit that at times our forward thrust has been impressive but at other times impressively slow. Why? What has deflected us and hindered us? Materialism? Pride? Individualism? Self-indulgence? Has it been unwillingness to become all things to all men in order to save some? Let us pray for clear perception and then courage to move ahead at God's full speed. Paul recognized, in particular, the danger of baser desires. In verse 27 of our text he states, "I beat my body and make it my slave." Paul means to tell us that he uses all means needed to subdue his carnal inclinations, as one writer put it. He may have had the truth of Romans 7:23 in mind. "The flesh lusteth against the spirit." In that contest the flesh will win unless we truly wish with our whole will, for the Spirit to prevail.

One further thought on this point. Yes, the Word teaches us to honor the body which God's wonder-working hand has framed, the temple of the Spirit. But we honor it most when we make it submissively useful, an agent for the soul's higher purpose. At the close of this passage Paul mentions a particular problem. He is concerned that in the end he might find himself disqualified, ineligible to receive the prize. Most commentators agree that at issue here is loss of reward, futility or mission, not loss of salvation. Whatever the intent, if Paul had reason to contemplate such an outcome, how much more should we be doubly alert and prayerfully careful.

VI. The Prize at the end of the Race. The Corinthian competitors raced hard to receive a garland given to the victor by the judges. The winners received a civic wreath, an earthly diadem of laurel leaves and boughs of olive. For such a withering prize and the quickly fading applause, those Grecian racers trained for months and exerted themselves to the last ounce. How much more should we contend for our eternal crown! Are we contending mainly for earthly crowns which inevitably pass away? Have we succumbed to such preoccupation which will last forever? It seems that many in our midst race frantically for an earthly and corruptible crown. For what are you and I running? For what is our conference striving? For what are we really yearning? A greater coronation awaits us. Christ Jesus has himself run, persevered, suffered, and overcome so that we too, can be crowned. He first wore the crown of thorns and then the crown of glory. That may be our lot also. For many martyrs it was. Those who shall hereafter triumph are those who now strive and endure. Note also, that in this heaven-bound race all can win. Thus there is nothing narrow, or envious, or selfish in striving hard to win. All can win. Moreover, there is no uncertainty. Faithful Chrsitians can all be

absolutely sure of a crown. You and I cannot fail, if we run well. What a proud moment it was when the successful Cointhian runner had the garland placed on his brow. What a much grander moment still it will be for the Christian athlete when the pierced hand of Jesus places that crown of glory firmly on each victor's head. Our Lord eagerly awaits to give us each his crown of glory.

VII. Conclusion. Every disciple of Christ has been called to be a spiritual athlete, to win against evil, to win other people for our Lord. and thus to win the race. As Mennonite Brethren, individually and as a conference, we have been summoned to run. We run not in a marble stadium in ancient Greece but in Laval, Leamington, Leaf Rapids, Lanigan and Langley. We compete at home, at the office, in the factory, in the classroom, on the field, and in retirement. The spectators in Ste. Rose, St. Catharines, St. Boniface, Saskatoon, South Calgary and Sardis are watching us run. By God's grace we can run well and we can win. Let us covenant together that we will courageously and eagerly press on. We will run the race that is set before us. We will run this race with zeal and with single-mindedness. Then we will with joy all cross that glorious finish line and receive the victor's crown from him who sits on the throne. We will then have a racer's reunion of all who have run. Paul will be there and Peter, and Mary the mother of Jesus, and your mother and father, and mine. There, in the presence of God, with all who have finished the course, we will rejoice evermore and praise him forever. Amen.

John Redekop read a statement regarding a balloting irregularity. Consultation between the moderator, parliamentarian and executive of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns resulted in a decision that the original decision must stand. After a comment from the floor, the delegation affirmed this decision by a round of applause.

2. Board of Evangelism

Henry Willms, chairman of the Board, introduced the members of the Board.

2.1 Report

Br. Willms presented his report

Board of Evangelism Chairman's report

The words of Jonathan's armour-bearer echo our response to the captain of our salvation ... "Do all that you have in mind ... Go ahead; I am with you heart and soul." (I Samuel 14:7). These words express the strong, forward-looking stance adopted by the Board of Evangelism in it's ministry, as mandated by the conference. They

reflect a spirit of advance, affirmation and availability to Christ and his cause. We commit ourselves to move ahead with a heart for the future.

Advance: In the Atlantic provinces. Through the existing, growing churches, the effective church planting association and the recently-appointed task force that is shaping vision and forging strategy, we are pressing forward in our goal of planting churches in the major cities of these provinces with a view to establishing an Atlantic provinces conference.

Advance: In church growth. In order to encourage and strengthen church growth mentality for ministry in our Canadian churches, we are doing several things.

- We are aggressively promoting the centennial Antioch Plan through promotional materials and personal consultation. Also, our executive director is preparing a manual of celebration ideas and church planting strategies for this thrust.

- We are, together with other boards, planning the 1988 Disciple-Making Institute which will provide valuable insight, inspiration and tools for church growth for the new centennial.

- We are, through our executive director, continuing to serve the local congregations through seminars/workshops/ preaching-teaching assignments and consultations.

- Our executive director teaches a church growth course at MBBC in the second semester.

Advance: In frontier. An emerging harvest field in Canada is that of ethnic people. In order for our board to become better informed on the methods and opportunities for reaching these groupings of people, we asked our executive director and a member of the board to attend a "Consultation on Ethnic Peoples" in Los Angeles, sponsored by our Seminary.

Advance: In co-operation. Our ministry is funded by the Canadian conference. We continue to look to you for your support in prayer, encouragement and finances. A growing part of our director's time has been invested in fund-raising and promotional activities. Because the funds were slower in coming this year, we felt compelled to increase the number of our appeals to the constituency. We wish to thank you for your generosity in giving and in praying. Our staff, executive director James Nikkel and administrative assistant/secretary Susan Brandt, have served creatively, energetically, selflessly and faithfully. We appreciate them deeply and commend them and their families to your prayers and God's grace. Henry Willms

2.2 Executive Director's report

James Nikkel, Executive Director of the Board of Evangelism presented his report.

Executive director's report

The task of evangelizing Canada is immense. We are increasingly aware of the fact that unless the Lord empowers us with his Spirit and provides us with a vision for the work, the harvest will not see much increase in yield.

There are several realities that apply specifically to the work of evangelism. First, the work requires a penetration mindset which calls for activities outside or beyond the church. Second, evangelism work requires vision and courage since the witness action must be done in unbelieving territory. Third, evangelism work requires faith and spiritual dependency on the Spirit of God to do a work of grace and transformation through the power of the gospel.

Evangelism philosophy or understanding. The Board of Evangelism works from the assumption that each Christian has been mandated and empowered to be a participant in the task of bringing the world to Christ. The board's role is to provide services and to facilitate ministries to make this task more fruitful within and beyond the church. The board also works from the assumption that it is not enough for the church to be a worshipping body. It needs to channel its energies and spiritual dynamic in such a way that the lifegiving Spirit is shared with people outside of the church. To encourage this process, the board has been printing the Evangelism Canada digest for inspiration and information on congregational evangelism.

Church planting is central to the biblical philosophy of evangelism. The board seeks to plant churches geographically in such a way that the new churches can cluster as a conference of churches. Where this organizing has taken place, as in Quebec, the board then works with the new conference until the provincial conference can carry the church planting program. At present we are helping the Quebec Conference with church planting in New Richmond, Quebec City and St. Donat. The English speaking Waterloo congregation in Quebec, under the leadership of Fred Sommerville, is presently reviewing its possible affiliation with the Quebec Conference.

In the Maritimes we are still at the church planting stage, as such we work together with the Campbellton and Dartmouth churches. We appreciate the pastoral leadership that Sieg Wall, Ewald Unruh and Ed Willms are giving to the Maritime church planting program. The implementation of the Lay Church Planting Associate program has provided an effective means of entry for young couples to minister in the Atlantic provinces. We are encouraging more people to relocate their professions into a designated target area in the Maritimes and help build up the church planting core.

Antioch Centennial Plan. Much dialogue has taken place in 1988 Mennonite Brethren the for celebrations. To join in this celebration the Board of Evangelism is promoting the Antioch Plan as a bridge into the second century of Mennonite Brethren church life in Canada. In the Antioch Plan each church and agency of the conference, as well as individual families. are encouraged to do something during the centennial year that would resemble the vision and character of the Antioch church. Our prayer is that a goodly number of churches will consider setting apart a group of church leaders for the planting of a new church as the New Testament church did (Acts 13).

Our goal is to move into our second century of Canadian church life with new vision, new hope and new growth. centennial year has the potential for being a year of personal renewal and corporate growth. We are seriously calling on the Canadian constituency to make evangelism a "front burner" issue during the centennial year. An Antioch blueprint manual of church planting information and church growth ideas will be available at the July 1987 Canadian Convention.

Disciple Making '88. Much time has already been given to the planning of the Disciple Making '88 institute. The planning committee, from the various boards, will provide a program update to the delegates of the July '87 convention. This disciple making institute, which is slated to be held in the Central Heights Mennonite Brethren Church in Abbotsford, October 20-22, 1988, is expected to draw an attendance of 1500 from across Canada. We expect to be able to announce the key speakers at the convention. We are looking to the Lord to use this major centennial event to encourage our churches in their disciple making efforts.

Atlantic task force. Another "historic first" happened this spring with the formation of the Atlantic church planting task force with representation from the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia churches and the Board of Evangelism. This task force embraced a short term goal of establishing one new church in both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick over the next five years and a longer range goal of having an Atlantic provinces conference of seven to ten established churches by the year 2000. Six principles are to serve as a development guide in the formation of the Atlantic Provinces MB Conference of Churches. - That the major centres will receive priority status for new churches. - That a "Macedonian" call from individuals for a church in a given area receive serious church planting consideration. - That the expansion and planting of new churches be done in consultation and cooperation with the existing churches. - That the churches incorporate church planting as part of their philosophy of mission and ministry. - That MCC programs and people be used wherever possible to help us accomplish our church planting objectives. - That the Church Planting Associates program be one of the major program links in our Maritimes vision.

National Evangelism Task Force. The Board of Evangelism accepted the invitation to participate in the first ever all- Canada Task Force on Evangelism initiated by the Evangelical Fellowship of The agenda of this task force was to determine opportunities and obstacles to the fulfillment of the Great Commission in Canada. The task force gave considerable time to reviewing the hopes and dreams that God's people, across Canada, have for bringing people to Christ and into meaningful fellowship and ministry in the local church. The task force concluded its first meeting with a list of imperatives to be shared with the Canadian Christian community. - We must renew our commitment to pray. Christians in Canada must spend more time in prayer for this - We must have Spirit anointed leaders who model both nation. the Great Commandment of Christ and the Great Commission. Leaders of faith and vision are needed to mobilize the body of - We must provide relevant discipling environments that will allow for the healthy, contextualized growth of God's people. A more joyous and harmonious climate among believers is needed. - We must do a better job of defining and contextualizing our outreach ministry within culturally diverse communities. We need to be more effective if we are to be more fruitful. - We must see ourselves as servants of God, gifted to provide a priestly, Spirit anointed ministry for the spiritual and physical needs of the world. We must get more involved. - We must renew our commitment to being unashamed of the gospel of Christ which proclaims Christ crucified and risen for our salvation. Christians need to become more vocal in their faith. One of the bottom line goals of the task force is to double the evangelical presence in Canada by the year 2000. The Mennonite Brethren Conference of Canada should have no hesitation in embracing these imperatives and the Canadian

growth goals of this national task force.

Institut Biblique Laval. This training institute, for pastors and evangelism workers, was established in 1975 largely through the effort and vision of brother Henry Brucks. We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Lord for the many years of ministry that Henry Brucks gave to the work in Quebec. His commitment to church planting and to Bible institute training will long be remembered in Quebec and throughout North America.

The churches in Quebec and the Maritimes will miss his warm brotherly counsel and his rich advice on all matters of church

and family life.

Sieg Wall, pastor of the church at Campbellton informed the delegation of the work at the Restigouche Valley Church.

James Nikkel concluded his report by referring to the Antioch plan.

3. Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns

Rudy Boschman, chairman of the Board, introduced members of the Board.

3.1 Report

Br. Boschman referred to the passing of the former Conference Minister, Henry Brucks. Isaac Block was asked to pray.

Br. Boschman presented his report.

Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns Chairman's Report

"The plans of the Lord stand firm forever, the purposes of his heart through all generations. Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord ... From heaven he looks down on all mankind; from his dwelling place he watches all who live on earth ... He who forms the hearts of all, who considers everything they do. May your unfailing love rest upon us O Lord, even as we put our hope in you" (Psalm 33).

The Conference minister. Brother Henry Brucks is with the Lord. We are reminded of Rev. 14:13, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord... they will rest from their labour, for their deeds will follow them". May God comfort and bless you, Elsie and family.

Roland and Lorina Marsch are beginning where the Brucks' have left off in the ministry to our Canadian conference. Our concern and prayer is "To him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever! Amen" (Eph. 3:21). The ministry is multi-faceted and brother Marsch will report on this. We hope that sister Lorina will be able to accompany Roland at times as he travels, and have provided for this in our budget. Financial assistance from churches where brother Marsch ministers in a series of services are in order where possible. These should be sent to the Winnipeg office.

The Pulpit Committee. The Pulpit Committee of our board relates closely to the conference minister and his work. The assistant chairman of BSSC takes the lead in this and also chairs

those particular agenda items in our board sessions.

The Institute for Church Ministries. The Institute for Church Ministries, March 2-6, 1987, was well attended. The topic was "Interpreting and proclaiming God's Word". Speakers were John E. Toews, Frank C. Peters, Clark Pinnock and MBBC faculty. This institute is sponsored annually jointly by MBBC and BSSC.

Disciple-Making '88. Disciple-Making '88, in which our board is also involved, will take place in B.C. Details will come

elsewhere in our convention agenda.

National Capital Community Church. The Ontario conference executive committee came to us with a request for assistance in capital funding of the Ottawa, National Capital Community Church. Our response was as follows:

- That we in principle support funding of the project through the Canadian conference.

- That we appoint a three-member task force to formulate policy guidelines on how we fund this project and future capital projects associated with church planting ventures under the Canadian conference.

- The task force should include representatives from the Board of Management, BSSC and the conference executive and report their recommendations to the 1987 Council of Boards meeting.

MCC Canada. Our representatives are: Werner Schmidt (1991), Lora Sawatzky (1991), John Redekop (1991), John B. Epp (1991) and Jack Block (1987). This continues to be a credible, growing relief/development agency. Workers now exceed one thousand and more are needed. A ministry mentality needs to be continually fostered in our churches. The MCC Canada constituency consists of 75,000 members: 25,000 MBs, 29,000 GCs

and various smaller groupings. The board meets twice a year and the executive at least four times annually. The budget is \$17 million, 50 percent of which is government grant and 50 percent constituency contributions. This world has many needs and we must be faithful!

Baptism/Church membership/Lord's supper. We will be coming to the convention with a recommendation/resolution.

A People Apart. We had hoped that a copy of this book would have come to all our pastors much sooner and that copies would be available for any and all shortly. The delay is regrettable. We are indebted to brother Redekop for a research project which has turned out to be much more comprehensive than we had at first envisioned. You will remember that concern has been expressed many times and in various settings that many of our Mennonite Brethren churches are not using that name, but rather the "community" church label, as well as other designations to identify their congregations in their community.

Some of you have read *A People Apart*, studied, discussed and possibly discerned its content. We thank those of you who have responded to us. It is not the desire of the BSSC to press for or even to come to a decision at this time. In the context of brotherly dialogue, Spirit-led discussion and thorough God-directed discernment we want to find the most effective means to fulfill our God-given mandate to mission.

May we wait on God together and may this publication, *A People Apart*, stimulate, challenge and encourage us to fulfill the mission mandate of the church with joy and unity, in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Leadership Handbook. Translation of Leadership Handbook into French (as well as other books published by our board) has become a necessity. The cost of such publishing is our responsibility. The Quebec association has agreed to carry the translation costs.

Various papers. There are still numerous papers in process: Guidance in relation to ministry to homosexuals; biblical research on questions pertaining to cremation; statements on lawsuits; the pornography manuscript is in process of preparation for publication; the materialism manuscript is in process of preparation for publication; principles to be observed in dealing with grievances in church/pastor relations will find its way into the *Church Leadership Manual*.

The Medical/Moral Dilemmas conference is being planned;

John B. Epp and Dr. Ferdinand Pauls have been asked to coordinate and prepare details for January '88. May the God of all grace bless us together in our convention with unity, wisdom, faith and direction.

Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns Report and Recommendations, July, 1987

CONFERENCE MINISTER It is my pleasure to act on behalf of the B.S.S.C. as I introduce Roland and Lorina Marsch to the delegates of this convention. By now you are aware that we have appointed Roland to serve us as our Conference Minister. The Marsches have three children and two grandchildren.

Roland is a graduate of the Coaldale Bible School. He received a Th.B from M.B.B.C. in 1965 and has earned a Master of Ministry degree from W.T.S. in 1984.

The Marsches look back on 21 years of pastoral ministry, two years in Grassy Lake, twelve years in Germany, and seven years at the North Kildonan M.B. Church. Roland brings a great deal of energy to his work. But more importantly, he has a deep love for the Lord, a high respect for the Word of God, and a strong commitment to the Mennonite Brethren Church. We request your prayers for Brother and Sister Marsch.

I move, and Brother Boschman seconds the motion that the appointment of Brother Marsch to the office of Conference Minister be ratified.

The Board has asked Roland to provide the following specific ministries in the coming year: - To develop teaching materials on ethical issues regarding which we have current conference resolutions.

- To prepare materials that will give guidance to churches in matters pertaining to law suits. - He will send several papers to pastors that are intended to help us minister to people with a homosexual preference.

- Part of his time will be given to the Conference Executive when called upon.

Visit pastors, leaders

and churches across Canada. In this ministry we have an understanding that he will work closely with provincial conference ministers or their counterparts, as well as with the provincial representatives on our Board.

- While we don't require financial remuneration for Roland's ministries, we would appreciate offerings that would offset the costs.

SPECIAL PROJECTS FUND Last January our Board received a request to initiate the establishment of a fund for special projects. After consultation with the Board of Management we bring the following recommendation:

We recommend that the Canadian M.B. Conference through the Board of Management establish a special projects fund for initiatives that have both national and provincial implications but do not have an obvious connection with one of our Conference Boards.

The process would be as follows:

- 1. Initiatives for special projects come from the local settings.
- 2. The responsibility for special projects is taken by the provincial conference.
- 3. The provincial conference makes a referral to the B.S.S.C. and the Board of Management.
- 4. All special projects must be approved by the Conference.

PUBLISHING As you know, our Board is involved in publishing. The *Leadership Handbook*, to which our Moderator makes frequent reference, is one of the publications. During this conference year we completed the translation into French of the *Leadership Handbook*. We have also begun the new Faith and Life Series. In this series we have published a booklet On *Pornography* and *On Capital Punishment*. We commend these materials to you.

At the present time we are in consultation with Gilbert Brandt from the B.C.L. and our Conference Treasurer regarding a comprehensive publishing policy. We have already agreed to cooperate with B.O.R.A.C. in the Faith and Life Series. We have also agreed that our publications shall be published in both French and English. The costs of translation and publishing will be included in our estimates and spread equally between the French and English issues so that the purchase cost will be the same in both languages.

We offer our special thanks to Gilbert Brandt who does the publishing on our behalf.

7. A People Apart The naming of our churches has been a

subject of discussion and concern on the part of many of you.

(a) <u>Board Response</u> In response to numerous expressed concerns about the identity of the Canadian M.B. Conference, the B.S.S.C. commissioned one of its members, Br. John Redekop, to bring a statement to the Board that would address the issue. In the initial stages of the discussion, the Board agreed that the statement should be based on careful research. Br. Redekop accepted the assignment and gave periodic progress reports on his work. At each stage, he was encouraged to continue his work. The work grew and culminated in the publication of the book, <u>A People Apart.</u> At its January meetings, the B.S.S.C. endorsed the basic findings of the research and took ownership of the project by receiving the report. The issue of the research centered on the confusion between Mennonite ethnicity and Mennonite Brethren as a church.

(b) <u>Press Release Excerpts</u>: "We are indebted to the author for his thoughtful and informative treatment of the subject. It reflects the views and feelings of a person who loves his church and his

God."

"While the topic is timely and important, for some Mennonite Brethren it is also an emotional one. We ask all of our members to read the evidence with an open mind. We want to commit ourselves to work together with patience and in love to do what is best."

"Brothers and sisters, let us covenant to weigh the evidence and the suggestions carefully, to consider the options prayerfully, and then to discuss the matter frankly and calmly." (c) <u>Covering Letter Excerpts to all Boards</u>: "This publication is sent to the leadership of all our Canadian churches and will be available to anyone who may wish to acquire a copy at a later date."

"Please do what some have already done ... read, study,

"Please do what some have already done ... read, study, discuss, discern the contents and if you feel so inclined, please respond to Br. Redekop or to the Chairman of the Board of Spiritual and Social Concerns. We do greatly appreciate feedback!"

"We are <u>not</u> asking for a response in order to make a decision in our Board or on any other level at this time ... because we believe it to be necessary to dialogue on this subject <u>thoroughly</u> in order to find the most effective means to fulfill our God-given mandate to MISSION."

Based on our current Conference Yearbook the scene is as follows: Province Using MB Not Using MB Alberta 63% 37% British Columbia 56% 44% Manitoba 63% 37%

Ontario 55% 45% Saskatchewan 63% 37% Quebec 0% 100%

The tone and dynamic of the responses proves to our Board that we as a conference are onto a right issue. If this were a non-issue this would not be the case. We are saddened and disappointed at less than brotherly interchange that has taken place in dialogue, correspondence by letter, as well as through the media.

We believe God wants us to dialogue openly. We welcome speaking what is on our mind, heart and spirit and we believe as in all areas of our Christian walk our Lord provides boundaries within which we must remain. We are called to "have our speech seasoned with grace". To "speak the truth in love" always being mindful that Jesus said, "but I tell you that men will give account on that day of judgment for every careless word they have spoken". Some dialogue and correspondence has been most inappropriate and less than charitable, even caustic and destructive. This is not befitting for children of light.

(d) <u>Unfortunate Errors</u>: (i) The way the news release was handled. (ii) That somehow our Board seemingly did not clearly enough state that it had taken ownership of the project. (iii) A perception error - at no time was it ever our plan to bring this issue to this 1987 Convention for decision. We desire to give ample time to read, study, reflect, pray, absorb, digest, dialogue, discuss, and discern in the spirit of love and brotherhood.

- (e) <u>Some Serious Concerns</u>: (i) Diversification and fragmentation of identity in name, philosophy, organization, structure, polity, etc. (ii) Can we maintain our unity and essential brotherhood commitment if we are not alert to these uncomfortable issues and do not deal with them together through careful and prayerful discernment and process? (iii) Do we want to remain a brotherhood or are we going to become an association of churches?
- (f) <u>Suggested Process and Time-line</u>: (i) By September 30, 1987 Appoint six individual persons to independently of each other test the validity of the research, write a three or four page summary with two or three major observations and some possible proposals to be in the hands of B.S.S.C. by November 30, 1987.
- (ii) January, 1988 Appoint a commission (three from B.S.S.C. and three from outside B.S.S.C.) to thoroughly study the data and bring back a comprehensive appraisal and proposal to B.S.S.C. in July, 1988. The B.S.S.C. in turn, would present a progress report to the Convention in July, 1988.

8. Conversion/Baptism/Membership/Lord's Supper

The purpose of this resolution is to help free our churches to celebrate the ordinances of the church in their best understanding of the biblical teachings, the tradition of the Mennonite Brethren Church, and the context of the local congregation. The resolution assumes the following definitions.

<u>Baptism</u>: It is the rite of entry into the local church. Believer's baptism symbolizes the beginning of a dynamic relationship with Christ and His Body, the Church.

The Lord's Supper: The Lord's Supper is the rite of Christian fellowship. It symbolizes the ongoing dynamic relationship with Christ and His Body, the Church.

Church Membership: Each local church has a registry containing the names of all persons who have joined the church through baptism; a letter of transfer or personal confession of faith. Members in good standing with the church carry the leadership, financial and decision-making responsibilities that go with church membership.

Fellowship of Believers: The fellowship of Christians consists of church members and the believing members of their families, recent converts to Christianity, and practicing Christians from other church backgrounds. Within Christianity, it is an open fellowship and can reflect our unity in a kind of Christian pluralism.

Serious attempts must be made to preserve the Biblical intention of the ordinances. Their observance though must be contextualized.

Resolution: Be it resolved that

(a) We continue to teach and encourage new converts to Christ to be baptized.

(b) The basic requirement for baptism is a clear confession of a personal faith in Jesus Christ and a statement of readiness to receive the instruction of the local church.

- (c) The practise of joining the membership of the church at the time of baptism be continued.
- (d) The Lord's Supper is a rite to be observed and celebrated by the fellowship of believers who gather for worship, and that within this fellowship the service is open.
 - 9. Institute for Church Ministries

February 29 to March 4, 1988. "The Work of the Holy Spirit in the Individual and in the Church." Travel assistance for pastors (contact M.B.B.C. office).

10. Disciple Making '88 (Antioch Plan of B.O.E.)

SESSION #6: Monday afternoon, July 7, 1987 (1:30 p.m.)

1. Worship

Ron Neufeldt led the delegation in singing "Christ We Do All Adore Thee."

2. Mennonite Brethren Biblical Seminary

John Redekop introduced Dr. Larry Martens, President of Mennonite Brethren Biblical Seminary. Br. Martens prayed.

Larry Martens introduced John E. Toews, the Academic Dean at M.B.B.S. These two brothers then presented a report from the Seminary.

Greetings with the prophet's words and the words of Jesus: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because the Lord has anointed me to preach good news to the poor, He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor..." (Isa. 61:1-2;Luke 4:18). That was his task; it is our task. God calls; the Seminary equips; the church sends. The ministry God has given us is challenging and rewarding.

Gratitude for God's Blessing

The year began with a smooth transition of administrative leadership at MBBS. We can report God's gracious blessing in providing a joyous, harmonious spirit among administration, faculty, staff, and students. In October, Larry Martens was installed as the seventh President of MBBS.

We were privileged to host a moderators' seminar and the BORAC study conference in October. These events brought to our campus large numbers of church workers, pastors, lay leaders, and conference leadership and staff personnel from across Canada and the United States.

During January, we suitcased Seminary courses in pastoral counseling, pastoral care, church growth, and spiritual formation to various parts of our constituency; including Waterloo, Bethany Bible Institute and Columbia Bible College. In addition, the faculty was involved in numerous Bible and mission conferences, renewal services, workshops and seminars in the churches. We are grateful for the opportunity to serve the churches in this manner.

The Seminary as a Community

The spirit of worship was vibrant, stimulating and upbuilding.

The emphasis in our chapels this past year, "Spirituality: the Closet and the Road" during the first semester, and "God's Work in the World" during the second semester, stressed effective ministry throughout the world. Students, faculty and guests provided meaningful, inspirational and challenging experiences of worship.

This past year students from 10 foreign countries came to MBBS to prepare for ministry as pastors, teachers, missionaries and Christian workers. They joined 125 North American students for a total enrollment of 146 credit students.

Students were challenged and stretched in the areas of biblical, theological, historical, and practical studies. While learning is intellectual and academic, it is also spiritual and interpersonal. We continue to be concerned that students grow in the disciplines of personal Bible study and prayer, and in their ability to relate with a variety of people and cultures.

Pro-Mission Emphasis

A strong mission emphasis pervades campus life and our teaching ministry. Eighteen students were enrolled as mission majors this past year. The Center for Training in Mission and Evangelism, directed by Dr. Henry Schmidt, keeps the challenge before us all.

Students emphasize the need from around the world in informative sessions each month, followed by prayer and intercession for mission work in various parts of the world.

A Growing Alumni

This year's 31st commencement service was a highlight. Twenty-six students completed their studies. Of this year's graduating class, four were placed in Canadian churches and three have been accepted for MBM/S assignments.

A Changing Faculty

Tim Geddert joined the faculty as Assistant Professor of New Testament last fall. Tim has experienced a warm reception by both faculty and students and is deeply appreciated for his warm and vibrant spirit and stimulating classes. Arlee Johnson, former pastor at Sardis Community Church (B.C.) and Bethany M.B. Church (Oklahoma) has begun his assignment as Associate Professor of Pastoral Theology and Director of Field Education. Hans Kasdorf returns to campus this fall after a semester study leave.

Elmer Martens continues his leave of absence. He will return to his teaching assignment at MBBS in the fall of 1988.

A Supporting Church

We continue to give gratitude to God for the affirmation of the

church for our ministry. You tell us by letters and in person that you pray for us. You send some of the best workers in the church to prepare for ministry. In the past year, 42 of our students were from Canada.

You have also given sacrificially to meet our financial needs. We give praise to God that we were again able to complete the past fiscal year in the black. The following is a review of the giving from our churches:

Through the years numerous pastors and lay people have spent the January interterm, a semester, or several weeks, on campus for personal enrichment. While they are being stimulated. stretched and encouraged, they enrich campus life. We encourage such continuing education and personal enrichment.

The 1988 January interterm will offer a variety of on-campus classes: Divorce and Remarriage, Missionary Anthropology, Advanced Youth Ministries, Church Planting/Church Growth, and others. In addition, the following special events are planned: a mission consultation (January 21-23), a new pastors' orientation session (January 25-27) and the School for Ministry (January 27-29). The theme for the 1988 School for Ministry is "Conflict Resolution in the Church" with noted author and teacher Norman Shawchuck.


Partners in Ministry

British Columbia

The MCC B.C. material aid centre and warehouse has shipped out a record amount of material aid this year: three 13-meter containers, each weighing about 18 metric tons, of blankets, soap, sewing and health kits. Jayettes and other materials. Two shipments went to Sudan and one to Vietnam.

Another kind of aid went to people in Cuba who have disabilities. Thirty donated wheelchairs were repaired by members of the Clearbrook, B.C. Golden Age Society for shipment to Cuba in spring, in response to a request from Cuban churches channelled through MCC's Disabled People's Concerns program.

Women's Concerns

The "Sharing Our Stories" project of Women's Concerns is an attempt. through the collection of women's personal stories, to understand how their feelings and experiences of childbearing, family formation, pregnancy, abortion, childlessness adoption and singleness have shaped their lives and affected their choices The intent is to discuss ways in which the church and community can respond more wholistically to women's experiences and the needs that grow out of the complexity of their lives. Further contributions are welcomed and should be sent (in confidence) to MCC Canada Women's Concerns, 134 Plaza Dr., Winnipeg R3T 5K9.

Alberta

Spouses and families of prison inmates are often the forgotten victims of Canada's justice system, suffering loneliness, poverty, the stigma of crime and the difficulties of single parenthood. But MCC Alberta is doing something about that in Calgary, where a new W2 (Woman to Woman) program is matching Christian volunteers with inmate spouses who would like a friend for practical and emotional support Since the program began last September, coordinator Evelyn Klassen has been in contact with 20 inmate families and has matched ten of them with volunteers. Many more volunteers are needed

Maritimes

MCC worker Mark Hurst serves as the Community Chaplain of Saint John, N.B., a post that involves working with ex-inmates referred to him by penitentiary chaplains. Hurst is developing a fellowship group and offering support to released offenders trying to return successfully to society. Part of his time is also devoted to motivating Christians in the area to become involved in prison ministry.

Manitoba

Young offenders with mild mental handicaps aren't easy to love, so it's not surprising that there are few places such people can go to find help and hope. One of them is El Dad Ranch, a farm-based group home and training centre sponsored by MCC Manitoba. Headed by Addison and Gerda Klassen

along with other Christian staff, El Dad offers a loving but disciplined environment that teaches work and social skills to young men whose ability to live successfully on the "outside" is otherwise limited. Some graduates of the program have found jobs and been able to adjust to independent living remarkably well.


Quebec

Deborah Martin-Koop has been assigned to serve as Quebec's first provincial MCC representative, beginning August 15. Workers have been placed in Quebec in the past, but their involvement has been administered through the Winnipeg MCC Canada office rather than a provincial MCC office as is usual west of Ontario. Martin-Koop will relate directly to the growing number of francophone Mennonite congregations in Quebec and oversee administration of MCC's work in that province.

Ontario

15 Tobermory Drive, the high-rise home of 12,000 people in the Downsview section of Toronto, is the site of the latest venture in community mediation for MCC Ontario's Community Justice Ministries program. Since January, "Conflict Mediation Services of Downsview" has formed a racially and ethnically mixed board of people drawn from this low-income community and trained over 20 volunteers in conflict mediation. In panels of four or five, these volunteers mediate neighborhood and family conflicts, Although some volunteers

were originally skeptical, they now enthusiastically affirm that the model really works. Community development is happening in Downsview.

East/West

MCC's East West program works at improving understanding and deepening ties between Christians in North America and the Soviet Union. A happy event recently was receiving word that Soviet authorities have granted permission to import 5,000 editions of the 17-volume Russian Bible commentary published jointly by MCC, the Baptist World Federation and the All Union Council of Evangelical Christians/Baptists in the USSR. God has graciously answered the prayers of those who have worked on this major translation during the past 11 years.

Exchanges of music groups and delegations sponsored by MCC will continue this year and next. Also, Prime Minister Brian Mulroney will be given a list of names of persons who would like to be reunited with their relatives in Canada, to give to officials in the USSR when he visits there in fall.

SELFHELP

SELFHELP craft and thrift shops, which employ the skills of thousands of Canadian volunteers each year, have become an integral part of the MCC program, supplying needs in the home community while supporting MCC's development programs and providing income for thousands of craft producers overseas. MCC thrift shops celebrated their 15th anniversary at a gathering in

Winnipeg April 30. Beginning with a modest outlet in Altona, Man., they now number 123 across North America.

Kanadier Concerns

Kanadier Concerns, part of MCC Canada's Overseas Program, is committed to bring some togetherness to the far flung groups of "colony" Mennonites in Latin America and Canada. The Mennonitische Post, published in Manitoba, continues to be the primary connecting link, but has been supplemented in Mexico with the addition of a local Menno-Zeitung.

Kanadier Mennonites are continuing to come to Canada, especially from Mexico, and are straining the ability of communities like Aylmer, Ont., and Winkler, Man., to find housing and employment for them. A recent visit to the new Mennonite community at Upper Kennetcook, N.S., indicates this group, which has moved from Belize, is doing well but needs help getting some of the families of lesser means economically established.

A counsellor couple for Cuauhtemoc, Mexico, is to begin work helping colony Mennonites this summer.

Native Concerns

Gardens are growing again in Canada's native communities, some of them the work of 24 McCers who were invited to spend the summer in places like Ft. Providence, N.W.T. and Fox Lake. Man. Among this year's participants in the Native Gardening Program are a couple and single woman from Germany. two Americans and others from four provinces, aged 20 to

72. The decade-old program promotes gardening as a healthful, economical and enriching activity. In a small, even symbolic way, gardening allows native people to gain access to resources on their own lands. The program also provides opportunities for native Canadians and non-native Christians to develop meaningful, mutual relationships, in contrast to a history of injustice and prejudice.

The failure in March of Canada's first ministers to resolve the issue of aboriginal rights in the Constitution was a great disappointment to MCC Canada and other church groups who had hoped for the creation of a "new covenant" between native and non-native Canadians. MCC workers continue to speak for justice in such areas as land entitlement and to work with native people in developing greater economic and social opportunities.

Peace and Social Concerns

In recent months, news coverage of starvation in Mozambique has indicated that the suffering there is linked not so much to drought as to the terrorist war supported by South Africa. In the past year, peace and social concerns workers have worked at communicating the need for a wholistic response to the suffering caused by war and preparations for war. Suffering people in Mozambique need both food and spiritual sustenance. At the same time we as Christians need to work at "making peace" by addressing justice issues, both at home and abroad. That may mean speaking out against militarism and apartheid in southern Africa. It may mean that we encourage the leaders in our country to settle the

many unresolved land issues with our native peoples. In Labrador, for example, NATO fighter pilots are practising low-level flying over-land which its native inhabitants, the Innu. have never ceded to government. The Innu see this as an infringement of their rights and a danger to their way of life. As peacemakers, should we be speaking to government leaders on their behalf before growing dissatisfaction leads to violence? What does it mean to be a peacemaker in such a situation?

Employment Concerns

A project being planned by MCC Canada's new Employment Concerns program for Edmonton is geared to provide training for 18 unemployed people while helping to restore dilapidated old homes to new usefulness. The pilot project will employ 23 workers and supervisors in repairing and renovating city-owned houses that have been allowed to go to seed. The city of Edmonton has agreed to make the homes available and to supply all materials needed. The project will go ahead this summer, pending approval for a federal grant through the Canadian Jobs Strategy program.

China

Friendly bonds between China and North American Mennonites continue to be strengthened by the China Educational Exchange, a cooperative project of MCC. Mennonite mission boards and several Mennonite colleges. Thirty North Americans are serving at post-secondary institutions in China

under CEE. Reciprocal visits were made by three Chinese educators who studied and two others who lectured at Mennonite colleges this year. Shortterm exchanges in medicine and agriculture are continuing, while plans are being laid for technical and mental health exchanges next year.

Food Program

Providing food to hungry people has become increasingly complex, given current food surpluses in some areas and food shortages in others. War and civil unrest as well as unemployment are the main causes of hunger today. The goal of the Food Program is to respond to hunger in a way that makes the most sense. During 1986, 8,950 metric tonnes of Canadian grain were sent through one part of the Food Program, the Mennonite account at the Canadian Foodgrains Bank (CFB). This was used for relief feeding programs and food-for-work development projects

But sending Canadian food isn't always the most appropriate response. Because the CFB can only be used to send Canadian grain, cash donations designated to the general Food Program are used to purchase food available regionally. For example, in 1986 Zimbabwe had a surplus of white corn. MCC purchased some of this surplus and shipped it to Ethiopia, where there was still much hunger. This not only benefitted the Zimbabwean agricultural economy but also provided a food familiar to Ethiopians at a cheaper cost than shipping Canadian grain. The Canadian International Development Agency helped fund the purchase and

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shipping costs.

Food Program donations are also used to pay shipping costs for donated commodities (skim milk powder) and to fund food-related development projects. Those who support MCC Canada's total Food Program are ensuring that their dollars can be used for the most appropriate response to the needs of hungry people.

Saskatchewan

Voluntary Service workers Larry and Shirley Born have served the past two years as dorm parents to about 30 girls attending school away from their isolated home communities. Most of the youngsters living at Timber Bay Children's Home, operated by the Brethren in Christ, come from families working northern traplines or have family problems that make it difficult for them to remain at home. The Borns try to provide a loving Christian environment for girls going through a difficult time in their lives. Another MCC volunteer, Sheila Bauman, heads the home's kitchen staff.


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
CIDA Multi-Year Grant

During the past three years, MCC Canada has received S6 million from the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) under a multi-year grant agreement. This grant was matched with constituency contributions and provincial government grants during this three-year period on a SI (MCC Canada) to SI-72 (CIDA) ratio. These funds were directed to 24 countries to support programs and projects within the global MCC development program.

A second three-year grant totalling \$8.7 million has been requested. Continued support is anticipated because of the positive experiences developed over the years that MCC Canada has received CIDA funds.

conference in many areas and especially in Christian education. One year ago at the conference we talked of being at the crossroads of change. That corner has been turned and change is being processed. A number of elements of change are necessary as we cope with the changing world around us. Let me suggest some of these.

First and foremost we would like to introduce to you, in person, our new coordinator. He is Bob Rempel from Winnipeg, Man. You read about his pilgrimage to this point in the Herald just a few months back. Bob will be assuming his responsibilities in the office, in Winnipeg, on August 1, 1987. As a board we have prioritized the activities of the central office and see the following as key areas of concentration over the next few years: - One area will be to represent the board in planning and implementing Disciple-Making '88. A number of boards are working together at setting up a national conference in British Columbia, and the respective coordinators in the central office will need to work together closely to facilitate this occasion. - A second area of concentration will be to consolidate and coordinate the ministry of Christian education nationally by meeting with provincial and area Christian education boards, pastors, and leaders of individual churches and schools. This will better facilitate a general direction for the conference as a whole, including both churches and educational institutes. - A third major area of thrust would be giving leadership to the planning of Banff '89. The experience of a Banff retreat has been the highlight and turning point in the lives of many of our young people and we feel this needs strong encouragement to be continued. We have not said mush about Banff '86 in this report since the Herald carried an excellent section on it this past winter. We appreciated the coverage. We also thank Dave Wiebe and Valerie Kroeker for their yeoman efforts in the office to see this thing through. Well done! - We continue to work at four publications during the course of the year. These require editing and coordinating, which of course would fall into the hands of our staff person. More on these will follow later. - A resource centre has been established in the central office, containing much material which we would like to make available to the churches. This requires time, effort, research and advertising. Our staff person would begin work on this almost immediately, assisting churches in fulfilling ministry at a lower cost to themselves. - Finally we would see an area of concentration simply as being flexible, adaptable and available to respond to other needs and concerns within the

conference as they become apparent and are identified.

We see these as some of the most urgent needs requiring immediate attention. There are many others on which we would focus as time allows: helping the aging in our circles to learn to adjust; dealing with the increasing number of single parents and helping them; focussing on better ways and means of having successful camping programs and relating those as extensions of the local church; establishing better rapport with para-church organizations to assist one another in common goals; helping churches in the area of choosing suitable curricula for Sunday school and mid-week programs and helping to set direction for them, as well as giving guidelines for follow-through.

Work is plentiful, for the fields are white unto harvest, but the labourers are few. This truth leads me to share with you the fact that we solicited the services of Dr. Linda Cannell from Winnipeg to do a study on voluntarism. The survey has been completed and is available (from our central office) to anyone wishing to read it. A summary form prepared by one of our board members has been sent to each church for study and use at the local level. Voluntarism and/or the lack of it appears to be a challenge in many of our local congregations. We do well to work aggressively at overcoming this potential dilemma, and we would encourage provincial boards to give some leadership here.

As we anticipate discussion on the potential reorganization of our conference structure, we realize the possible necessity of it in view of the history of the conference; however, we sense a keen urgency to continue the ministry. Although the form may change somewhat, the ministry must continue. The work of God does not stop.

In keeping with the above comment, we as a board have also discussed a name change for the work of Christian education. Some provinces are already using other terms to describe this work and we too would suggest calling the work of Christian education in our conference, the Board of Church Ministries. the scope has become so broad and the emphasis so all-encompassing that a new handle to describe it might be in place. It is as we read in II Corinthians 5:17b "the old has gone, the new has come". We anticipate the new as we serve God together in the midst of change but with a message that never changes. Let's pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth workers into his harvest field (Luke 10:2b).

I am completing 10 years of involvement in Christian education at the conference level this year and have appreciated the

opportunities. May God continue to give wisdom and insight as the vision for Christian education/church ministry continues to find acceptance and fruiting within our conference. Abe Block

Youth Ministries Incites was prepared in three issues. In November, Blaine Greiner dealt with the topic "Youth Reaching Youth". The February issue focussed on discipleship and disciple-making with Brad Julihn providing input and editing. Bob Rempel prepared the May issue on the topic of teaching programs for youth.

The Educational Idea Bank, this year mailed in March, was edited by Al Enns, one of our board members. It included a "Report on Voluntarism" by Linda Cannell of Winnipeg, in summary outline form, prepared by Al Enns, along with a set of discussion questions. Carlin Wienhauer selected 10 "principles" for overhead masters, and Lorlie Barkman did the artwork for the masters.

The materials for *National Family Month*, May, 1987, were prepared and compiled by Elfrieda Dick and Annette Thiessen. It consisted of Sunday worship ideas, family month home activities and a variety of miscellaneous ideas and resources.

The *Music Maker* also went out in three issues this year: November, February and May. It contained, among other items, articles on the training of church musicians and some sample programs for the Easter season. As usual, each issue carried a number of repertoire selections.

As a board, we are concerned that these periodicals are helpful to workers in various church ministries. We continue to ask for your response to these materials. We are anticipating, together with our new coordinator, a review of all the publications with a view to improving our service to the churches and possibly consolidating some of the efforts.

7.Board of Higher Education

Harry Heidebrecht, the chairman of the Board, introduced the members of the Board. He also introduced those members of the faculty who were present.

7.1 Report

Br. Heidebrecht presented his report.

Board of Higher Education Chairman's report

We are grateful to God for his blessings and to our churches for their support. Paul's thanksgiving in Philippians 1:7 includes a word of gratitude to the churches for their "partnership in the gospel". MBBC exists because we are linked together with our churches. We are committed to fulfilling our part of that partnership and to working with other boards and schools of our conference as partners in ministry.

The board's mandate includes the direction of MB Bible College, oversight of the Centre of MB Studies, co-ordination of inter-institutional concerns, and supervision of student services ministries. We will report briefly on each aspect of our assignment.

The presidential search. We gratefully acknowledge the

leadership of our president, brother David Ewert. In accepting reappointment in 1985, Dr. Ewert gave notice of his intention to retire on May 31, 1988. At our board meetings in January, 1986, a search committee was appointed. It consisted of Len Siemens (chairman), Harry Heidebrecht (board chairman), John Redekop (conference moderator), George Baier (alumni representative) and two faculty representatives, Isaac Block and Esther Wiens. The search committee worked diligently in seeking a suitable candidate to succeed brother Ewert as president. The participation and prayer of churches and leaders was very much appreciated.

The Board of Higher Education is pleased to present for ratification the name of Dr. James Pankratz as the next president of Mennonite Brethren Bible College. He presently serves the College as associate professor of Contemporary Ministries in the area of

missions.

James Pankratz, together with his family, has given priority to involvement in the local church. James has served as Sunday School teacher, member of council and assistant pastor. He believes that the College must affirm the ministry of the local church and provide academic and practical education to equip students for ministry within the local church and its agencies. His particular interests in missions and worship will be an asset to his leadership. Each year he serves extensively in preaching, workshops in churches, conferences and at retreats.

Pankratz's administrative experience includes Dean of Students and Academic Dean at MBBC. From 1982-1985 he served in Bangladesh as MCC Program and Personnel Advisor for South Asia (1982-1984) and as Country Representative and Director for MCC in Bangladesh (1984-1985).

In accepting this assignment, James Pankratz enjoys the support of his wife Goldine and two daughters, Carmen and Rachel.

Historical committee. The Centre for MB Studies continues to serve our constituency by providing archival materials for scholars, students and other interested persons. During the past year some 1,058 researchers utilized the resources available in the archives. This did not include the numerous daily enquiries received by letter and telephone.

New accessions this year will include microfilming of congregational and conference records from our churches in Quebec. During this past year we received numerous contributions of personal papers, congregational records, periodicals, as well as minutes and reports of various MB institutions and agencies. Our

centre was also named the archival repository for the Mennonite Economic Development Association (MEDA).

Several publication projects are currently in process. Among these is a joint publication by our three centres in North America entitled, *Perilous Journey: The Mennonite Brethren in Russia, 1860-1910.* Our centre is planning to publish the English translation of Anna Thiessen's book, *The Winnipeg City Mission*, translated by Ida Toews. This summer the film series with Dr. J.B. Toews entitled, *The Mennonite Brethren Church - A Missionary Movement*, will be completed.

The Centre for MB Studies is involved in the publication of a newsletter entitled, *Mennonite Historian*. We also are cooperating with the Mennonite Heritage Centre in this publication. Copies are sent to all our churches and should be available through local church libraries.

The Centre for MB Studies is also involved in planning for the centennial of the MB Church in Canada in 1988. We are cooperating with local churches, as well as the Manitoba and Canadian conferences.

Ken Reddig continues to work as our conference archivist. He is assisted by Erica Fehr, who will be terminating her services this year. We wish to thank them for their faithful and often hidden service to our conference.

Inter-school relations. Much of our interest and activity has focussed on the Canadian Conference Task Force on Higher Education. A consultation with the task force was planned for November 7-8, 1986 in Winnipeg. Due to an early Manitoba blizzard, a major part of this consultation had to be cancelled. Our plans are to continue these annual consultations. The purpose of the Inter-School Relations Committee is to foster ongoing dialogue among our schools; including the Seminary, Bible colleges, Bible institutes and high schools in Canada. Our mandate is to "structure and integrate the biblical and theological training program of the conference".

Student services. Each year the Board of Higher Education sponsors a Student Services Seminar in one of our provincial constituencies. They are designed to assist pastors and local church leaders in their ministry to university students. During the forthcoming conference year we will be completing the cycle of seminars by meeting with pastors and church leaders in Ontario. The date for this seminar is Saturday, September 26, 1987. Joyce

Schimpky, board member from Ontario will be coordinating this event.

Our approach to student services is currently under review. We welcome your constructive criticism.

The future. During the next several years we will no doubt see changes in higher education within our conference. We are in ongoing dialogue with the Seminary, seeking ways of formalizing and strengthening the first year seminary program currently offered at MBBC. We will continue to foster ties between MBBC and the Institut Biblique Laval in Quebec. We are pleased with our present affiliation and with the opportunity of working together. Should the proposal for Canadian conference restructuring be approved, we will need to redefine the relationship between the Board of Higher Education and the Institute Biblique Laval.

Harry Heidebrecht introduced the President of Mennonite Brethren Bible College, David Ewert.

President's report

"I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart; I will tell of all thy wonderful deeds" (Ps. 9:1). As we look back on our 43rd college year we are filled with gratitude towards God and towards all those who helped make 1986-87 a good year. Let me mention some of the areas in which God's mercies were evident.

Students. College opened in September with a total of 192 students (80 new students and 112 returning). They came from across Canada, Quebec to British Columbia, and 17 of them from other countries (USA, Europe, South America and Asia). Several students came straight out of high school, but most of them had already been to other Bible institutes or universities. Thirty- eight of them were married.

We were generally pleased with the level of maturity of our students, the seriousness with which they approached their studies and their commitment to Christ and his cause.

The faculty met for several days in August to think of ways in which they could better meet the spiritual needs of the students. Besides personal counselling, in which our student deans, Isaac Block and Esther Wiens, take a leading role, and participation in advisee groups, we seek to help our students in their spiritual formation through regular chapel services. Also, students participate in a great variety of Christian service in the city. Moreover, we

encourage all of our students to identify with one of our congregations in Winnipeg while at college. About 40 of our students at this time, have signed up for summer ministries.

We also have a strong student organization as well as dormitory counsellors who help to set the tone for student life at MBBC. The new student centre, dining hall and the dormitory for women have contributed much to student life on campus. One facility we still need is a gymnasium.

Twenty-six seniors, this spring, completed their three-year course of studies with majors either in Bible and Theology, Contemporary Ministries, or Music. Since all of our courses (with the exception of the church ministries course) carry university credit, many of our students spread their studies over four years and in that way receive also their bachelor's degree from the University of Winnipeg. Three of this year's graduates were from Quebec. Through the affiliation of IBL with MBBC we hope that even more students from that province will enroll at our College in the future. Five graduates came from B.C., one from Alberta, three from Saskatchewan, ten from Manitoba, one from the U.S., one from Switzerland, one from Germany and one from Paraguay.

We anticipate a good enrollment for the coming year. At the time of writing we have considerably more applications than we did at this time last year. The average age of the new applicants to date is 24 years.

Faculty. We are grateful to God for a well-trained faculty that is committed to Christ and his church. It is their concern that students be deeply rooted in the word of God. Our constant prayer is that students be open to the call of God for service at home and abroad, that all of them grow in their Christian faith, and that they develop a deep loyalty to Christ and his church.

We have 15 regular faculty members. Three are entirely in administrative positions: Harry Olfert, Campus Administrator; Herb Giesbrecht, Librarian; and Doug Schulz, our Registrar and Admissions Counsellor. Unfortunately for us he has decided to go back to teaching and has accepted a position at MBCI. By conference time we hope to have a replacement for him.

Four faculty members teach in the field of Bible and Theology: Abe Dueck, Historical Theology; David Ewert, New Testament; Gordon Matties, Old Testament; George Shillington, New Testament.

We have four teachers in Contemporary Ministries: Isaac Block, James Pankratz, John Regehr, and Esther Wiens.

In our Music Department we have the following four regular instructors: William Baerg, Choral Work; Irmgard Baerg, Piano; John Martens, Vocal; Linda Schwartz-Trivett, Composition and Theory.

Besides these 15 regular faculty members the College annually employs a number of instructors who have expertise in subjects which enrich the education experience of our students. This past year James Nikkel, taught a course in Evangelism; Jonathon Dent, Psychology; Gerald Bowler, History; Spencer Estabrooks, Philosophy. John Derksen, taught several courses in Historical Theology; and Ken Reddig, taught a course in Mennonite History. We also employed several teachers in applied music: Marion Braun, Jenny Regehr, Judy Siebert (piano); Geraldine Patterson, Mel Braun (voice).

We are also pleased that Gerald Ediger, Vineland, Ontario, has accepted an appointment to our faculty. He will begin teaching a year from now, after he attains candidate status for a doctorate in Historical Theology. His teaching and pastoral experience will make him a valuable addition to our faculty.

Several of our faculty spend part of their time in administrative duties: David Ewert, president; Abe Dueck, academic dean; Isaac Block and Esther Wiens, student deans. Isaac Block is also in charge of Christian service.

We are grateful to God for a fine spirit of cooperation and unity in our faculty and staff, which helps us to concentrate our time and energy on the great task of Christian higher education. Frequently churches, schools, other organizations and denominations will call upon the services of our faculty. We are always glad to contribute to the life of the church as time permits.

We also encourage our faculty members to strengthen the church through the writing of books, articles, dramas, musical compositions, etc. We are pleased that some of them are using their gifts in these and other areas.

This past year Abe Dueck and James Pankratz had study leaves for one semester each. Next year Gordon Matties will be off in the fall semester to complete his dissertation; William and Irmgard Baerg plan to spend their study year in Germany. Qualified music teachers for their courses have been appointed.

Staff. The faculty could hardly do its work effectively without a support staff, and we gratefully acknowledge before God that we have been blessed with a faithful and dedicated staff. This includes our secretaries in the general office and in the library, the kitchen staff, and those who look after our buildings and grounds. Katie

Thielmann, director of food services, has been with us for 25 years. Two of our secretaries, Sherry Plett and Bev Dyck, who have been with us for seven and five years respectively will be leaving this year and will need to be replaced. All other staff persons have agreed to stay on.

Constituency relations. Since our churches are scattered across the entire country, it is not easy to present the work of the College to all our churches through personal visits. Although faculty members serve in a great many churches in the course of the year, we do not reach nearly all of the churches.

There are several ways in which we try to keep our constituency informed on our work at MBBC. One is through our College Bulletin which is published quarterly. It includes not only instructive articles but also news about the College and its alumni. Also, I write to all our pastors every three months to keep them informed on developments at the College. Our A Cappella Choir and smaller groups visited a goodly number of churches and schools this year. During "Reading Week" in February the A Cappella Choir gave 17 programs in Vancouver and the Fraser Valley. The choir also visited a number of Manitoba and Saskatchewan churches.

Finances. MBBC's operating budget for the current year looks like this: Total operational budget - \$1,251,102. 34 percent (\$419,690) of this is a grant through our Canadian conference treasury; 37 percent (\$461,478) comes from students (tuition, room and board, etc.); 16 percent (\$200,000) from churches and private donations (a sum we must collect); 13 percent (\$159,934) comes from other sources (rental of facilities, dining hall use, etc.).

The government of Manitoba this year increased the payroll tax (something over which we have no control). Increases in utilities have been announced for the coming year. Annually we pay about \$50,000 in municipal taxes. We have tried for some time to get an exemption from this tax, but so far we have been unsuccessful.

College events. Following the Canadian convention in July the College hosted the Church Mission Institute, sponsored by our Board of Missions and Services. On the weekend prior to registration our student deans, Isaac Block and Esther Wiens, led a retreat for our student council and dorm counsellors for the purpose of clarifying perspectives on student life.

We had our opening convocation at the McIvor MB Church. Len Siemens gave a fine address; the music was uplifting, and the testimonies of our students were well received. September 19-21 was our annual college retreat at Camp Arnes. Student leaders took an active part in the planning and directing of the retreat. John Derksen gave a series of talks on "community".

October 6-9 was our spiritual enrichment week, at which several faculty members led the student body in a series of meditations. The week closed with a Thanksgiving program, prepared by the senior class. November 7 we had a well-attended alumni homecoming. After the banquet and a short program, the audience moved from the dining hall to the auditorium for the premiere presentation of the drama, "Sanctuary," written by Dr. Esther Wiens.

Our second semester began on January fifth. The first weekend following the beginning of classes the students had their annual winter retreat at which Dr. Tim Geddert from our MB Seminary, gave a series of messages on prayer. Another event in the month of January that brought a great many visitors to our campus (and that of CMBC) was the church Music Seminar. During the first week in February we had our Missions Festival with Don Posterski of IVF as the main speaker. In the middle of the week a Summer Services Opportunities Day was held.

March 2-6 was our annual Institute for Church Ministries at which Drs. Clark Pinnock, F.C. Peters and John E. Toews were visiting lecturers. A number of the lectures were given by our resident faculty. The overall topic was "The Interpretation and Proclamation of the Word of God". More than 125 workers from all across Canada were in attendance.

April 24 our choirs gave a concert in the Elmwood MB Church as part of our closing exercises. On April 26, in the morning, we had our baccalaureate service in the Central MB Church, and in the evening our graduation exercises in the North Kildonan MB Church, at which Dr. Victor Adrian, executive secretary of our Board of Missions and Services, gave the commencement address. On April 28, we had a recognition banquet for all the faculty and staff members who have served so faithfully over the years.

Let me close on a personal note. This completes my fifth year at MBBC since my return from the USA and it has been a good year. This coming year (my last) will be my 25th on the MBBC faculty and I trust God will give strength to finish our commitment to the College and to facilitate a smooth transition for the next president. David Ewert

Board of Publications Chairman's report

We trust that you have found the publications arm of the mission of the church has continued to serve diligently in the past year. Our three publications reach into each home on a regular

basis and are likely, most directly, the glue that binds us together. They help nourish our spiritual lives and hopefully contribute toward our recognition of who and what we are. Should amalgamation of board structures proceed as planned, it is the hope of the Board of Publications that the operations of the papers, as well as the management of the press, not become poor step children, relegated to the bottom of the agenda of their new found parents.

We are thankful for the dedicated and effective service of our editors and support staff, as well as our manager and the staff at the *Christian Press*. Without their efforts, well beyond the call of duty, it could not be possible to continue.

The three year appointment of Herb Kopp as editor of *MBH* comes up for review in March of 1988. Herb has given the board notice that after much prayer, discernment with family, friends and conference leaders, that his gifts, interests and aspirations lie closer to a more direct line of church ministry. It is with regret but also with an understanding of the principles behind his decision, that the board has accepted the notice, effective at the end of the conference year in May, 1988. We are in process of looking for a new senior editor. *Helmut Huebert*

The Christian Press

At the end of 10 months we can safely predict that this will be a good year for the *The Christian Press*. We are currently eight and one-half percent over our forecasted budget and our current order backlog looks good for the next two months. The area of major increases is in the book section, where several major hymnal printings account for a large increase. We have had correspondingly higher expenses in the trades category since all our books are bound outside of our shop.

With the exception of a brief period last summer, our shop has run very steadily, with few highs and lows. We closed for one week during the convention and we are doing the same this year. The office, of course, remains open.

Staff morale and co-operation have been at a good level and we have had no staff changes for some time. We are currently negotiating wage increases which likely will fall in the three percent range, about standard for the industry, also coinciding with the conference level of increases.

The concern for a new press, which we felt could make our shop more competitive and efficient, has dwindled somewhat at this point. The high cost of these presses make it absolutely necessary that we are certain the efficiencies obtained are sufficiently well demonstrated to justify such an expense. Cost, in the last three or four years, has jumped from \$50,000 to over \$290,000.

We are attempting to keep up with the technological changes that abound in the printing industry and we are able to remain competitive with other shops. A great deal of copy, generated by our conference agencies, is now captured on disc at their initial keying and through an interface we are able to put their floppy discs through our typesetting equipment. A few outside commercial customers are also using this facility.

Our computerization is constantly increasing and we have one or two accounting programs we wish to institute into our own system, such as the payables and receivables. It has been a good system for us, despite our earlier frustrations. We are also currently looking at other hook-up options, which could save us about \$800.00 to \$1000.00 per year. Cost control in all areas is a constant concern.

We have been pleased with the operation this past year at *The Christian Press*. We think our shop serves the conference very well and we look forward to serving our brotherhood for the next year. I might also add that we are more than pleased that this matter of shop viability is behind us. In our minds it was not a positive indicator that our bottom line figures were required as evidence of this shop's viability. *Victor Schmidt*

We have continued to carry out, with diligence and with personal satisfaction, the mandate assigned to us. Our services are appreciated by our readers and this appreciation makes our work pleasant and rewarding. Currently our circulation is about 3800 with copies going to Canada, U.S.A., Latin and South America as well as Europe.

At times we have to go far afield to find material for each of our 25 yearly issues. Even at that we are quite selective when making our final choice of items for our paper. We would like to bring the best to our readers.

Some of our most devoted readers find that their eyes "grow dim" and so we plan on printing at least one page of our paper with

larger type to accommodate these readers.

We would like to remind the pensioners of our churches that they are eligible to receive the *Mennonitische Rundschau* free, even if they are also receiving the *Mennonite Brethren Herald*. If you qualify, please ask for the *Mennonitische Rundschau*.

We are always happy to receive visitors at our office. It is interesting to meet our readers from other parts of the world: Germany, Paraguay, Brazil, Latin America, the USA, and we especially welcome visitors from across Canada. If you come to Winnipeg, we invite you to drop in and talk to us.

We will be at the July convention in Three Hills. If you see Margaret Harder or myself, please talk to us about the things you enjoy in life and also about the *Mennonitische Rundschau* - good or

bad, but preferably good.

The mail has a funny way of getting mixed up! We want to remind you that our offices are still at 159 Henderson Highway, Winnipeg, MB.,R2L 1L4. Abe W. Schellenberg

Claudette Leblanc presented the report for Le Lien.

Le Lien

Le Lien is going well. At seven years of age it is still young but it looks healthy. It has reached a certain cruising speed that, considering the number of authors available, is satisfactory. People have good comments in general and some issues, such as the one on the impact the arrival of children has on their parents' lives, were particularly well received.

We are grateful to the Lord, who blesses the work of our hands and minds. We want to keep doing our best "to win full approval in God's sight, as a worker who is not ashamed of his work, one who correctly teaches the message of God's truth" (II Tim 2:15). Currently, our press run is about 825 copies. Most of the copies are sent, in bulk, to the Quebec churches; a few are sent to subscribers in other parts of Canada.

The year 1986-87 has been one of growth in terms of revenue from advertising and subscriptions. At the end of March we were already over budget for these items. It is a good feeling.

Le Lien has become computerized. Since we purchased a used IBM-PC in February, we have researched and learned many things regarding computers. Le Lien will now be typed on a diskette that is then sent to Winnipeg for printing. I am still in the process of adjusting to the complicated simplicity of our technological era. The June 1987 issue is the first to be done with the help of the computer. It is a wonderful tool that saves much time once one is accustomed to it.

The mailing procedure has been changed as well. Until March 1987 the packaged issues going to Quebec churches were sent by bus to Montreal and from there mailed or handed out directly to pastors (most were mailed). In March we started to mail the packages from Winnipeg, fourth class. It seems that they reach their destination faster at a lessor cost.

The themes we developed in the last few months included the involvement of the Christian in society, ethics, adjusting to the arrival of children, welcoming people into the church, Sunday school, adolescence, the coming of the *Logos* ship to Montreal and the Christian at school. In the future we plan to deal with marriage, IBL and the relevance of theological studies, lifestyle evangelism in the business world, urban evangelism and the integration of various ethnic groups into the church.

Once more I want to mention the gracious help I receive from Jim Coggins, the Christian Press staff and the *Le Lien* committee in Quebec. This all accounts for a good team spirit. May God continue to bless this work.

Herb Kopp presented the report for the Mennonite Brethren Herald.

Mennonite Brethren Herald

Introduction. The Mennonite Brethren Herald is 25 years old. It was founded in 1962. In this quarter century of publication it has matured, with a style very much its own, into a magazine that reaches all MB homes in Canada with feature material, news about the church, short news items about events around us, book reviews, commentary and family notices. MBH is a link, tying together a diverse church which worships in eight languages and has members distributed from St. John's, Nfld. to Port Hardy, B.C. It reaches to the northern of Leaf Rapids, Man. and to members living in Windsor, Ont., which is on the same latitude as northern California.

We are grateful to God for his continuing grace and guidance in publishing MBH. We acknowledge our dependence on him. Many

of our prayers for wisdom and discernment have been answered. Other times we pray, then make decisions and hope that our intent will be perceived by our readership as we deal with sensitive issues.

The publishing year. It has been, in our judgement, a good year of publication. Most issues were well received. Many issues generated good reader response. This past year we tried to develop themes in each of our issues. Much affirmation has come to us for this approach to publishing, though some letters hoped for a broader range of subjects to be treated in each issue.

One interesting trend I've noticed is that the larger, churchly questions such as Signs and Wonders, media, capital punishment and John Redekop's study on ethnicity, generate much mail, while the deeply personal matters like coping with marriage breakdown and suicide generate telephone calls (but not letters).

Our projections for the new year include issues on native peoples in Canada, the simple life, hermeneutics (or, how we read the Bible), a youth issue, worship, pastoral care, planning for retirement and a special centennial issue.

With the first English-speaking generation moving into retirement, many calls have come asking us to increase the size of type in our magazine on pages 24-31, where we use a considerably smaller type-size. The board will be addressing this matter at the July convention.

Finances. The past fiscal year has been very good for usthat is, revenues are strong and expenditures well within budgetary limits. The 1987-1988 budget is projected to have the conference funding sum equal to the amount expended in the 1984-85 budget year.

Circulation. A major mailing list review this past winter added almost 1,000 new household units to our list. At present we mail 13,600 copies to MB households. The breakdown looks like this:

Conclusion. We commend ourselves to you for prayer. We

recognize how dependent we are on God for strength and courage to do our work well. We are open to your counsel and enjoy the candor with which you write to us. We look forward to another year of publishing the good news for the Mennonite Brethren church. Herb Kopp
